Politics and the Delta variant

Pandemic response leaves schools in the middle

In the spring, it seemed we had COVID-19 on the run.


People discarded masks and tossed aside social distancing advice from the medical community.

Some went so far as declaring the pandemic was a hoax, ignoring the evidence of a half-million dead in this country alone.

With their mandatory adjournment hours away, Oklahoma legislators made sure to pass SB658 on May 26. The House vote was 76 to 18 and the

Senate's was 38-8.

The bill landed on Gov. Kevin Stitt's desk in time



for him to sign it into law on May 28.

In brief, the law prohibited school districts,

technology centers and colleges and universities from tying admission eligibility to vaccination status or from implementing mask mandates for unvaccinated students.

The new law went into effect July 1 and by then any notion the pandemic was over had been put to rest by the highly infectious Delta variant.

The law included a scenario in which schools could mandate masks if certain conditions were met first.

Such a mandate first has

Designing gardens for year-round color and protecting your investment

Create a colorful year-round garden filled with flowers, greenery, colorful fruit, fall color, winter interest and a few surprises. Consider seasonal interest when planning a new garden or landscape. Adding a few key plants to existing gardens can help boost your landscape’s seasonal appeal.

Include a variety of plants with multiple seasons of interest as well as bird and pollinator appeal. You will look forward to the change of seasons as your landscape transforms throughout the year.

Use trees and shrubs to provide the framework and longevity in your landscape. Serviceberries, crabapples, dogwoods, and many others have flowers, fruit, pollinator, and bird appeal and add winter interest with their bark or form. Look for those with colorful exfoliating bark like paperbark maple, hep-








tacodium, and river birch for a beautiful statement in the winter garden.

Include a few summer blooming shrubs like St John’s wort, buttonbush, panicle hydrangeas and Rose of Sharon. They add an unexpected fresh look to your summer landscape. Perennials combine nicely with trees, shrubs, and annuals, adding seasons of color and texture. Include those that also attract songbirds, bees, and butterflies by creating a beautiful habitat.

Blue star (Amsonia), Siberian iris, sedum, Rudbeckia, coneflower, and grasses are just a few that can brighten any garden with several seasons of color, provide homes for beneficial insects and food for the birds.

End the season with fall bloomers like goldenrod, asters, and hardy mums.



Gardens:

These provide food for late season pollinators. Leave healthy plants stand, providing homes for many beneficial insects, winter interest in the garden, and food for the songbirds.

Use annuals to fill any voids, add season long color and yearly changes in the landscape. Containers on steps, decks and patios help bring the garden to your front and back door.

Include spring flowering bulbs like tulips, daffodils and hyacinths planted in fall for a colorful welcome to spring. These and many of the earliest bloomers like winter aconites, grape hyacinths, and crocus provide needed nectar for early season pollinators.

Evergreens are always a welcome addition to any landscape. They provide shelter for the birds and year-round greenery. Find new and interesting ways to include them in your landscape.

Use taller evergreens for screening bad views, buffering traffic and other noises, or creating privacy. Use evergreens with interesting form and texture to create a focal point in a garden bed or landscape. Combine them with perennials and flowering shrubs for added seasonal interest.

Then keep your landscape looking its best by protecting key plants from hungry critters like deer, rabbits and voles. Skip the fencing and

scare tactics by applying a rain resistant, organic repellent like Plantskydd (plantskydd.com) at planting.

You will need fewer applications and the odor-based repellent sends animals dining elsewhere before taking a bite out of your plants.

Apply repellent before animals start feeding and follow the label directions for best results.

Continue to gather ideas with visits to public gardens and partaking in garden tours. Be sure to take notes and pictures that you can reference later. Creating a year-round landscape is an ongoing process that is part of the fun and adventure of gardening.

OSU physicians explain vaccine science

Since March 2020, it’s impossible to calculate the loss of life and productivity as well as societal damage caused by COVID. A vaccine is the world’s best hope for preventing deaths and staffing hospitals while helping people return to work and school.

Widespread infections of severe acute respiratory syndrome (SARS), Middle East respiratory syndrome (MERS) and other coronaviruses prompted scientists to begin studying messenger Ribonucleic Acid (mRNA) vaccine technology decades ago, but the arrival of COVID rerouted all resources to achieve one common goal. Scientists and researchers united to develop a vaccine using mRNA technology.

“It’s the very first time an entire world of researchers worked together to figure this out quickly, but the concept was decades in the making,” said Kelly Murray, a doctor of pharmacy and clinical associate professor in the Department of Emergency Medicine at the Oklahoma State University Center for Health Sciences in Tulsa.

RNA is a type of molecule that all humans carry in their bodies to produce cell protein needed for biological functions. The COVID vaccine’s mRNA technology is distributed via a lipid vehicle, which helps the protein enter the cells of the body more easily.

The vaccine is injected into a person’s arm and goes to work sharing the message with the body’s cells to identify and fight the CoV-2 virus.

The mRNA vaccine is an instruction manual that teaches

cells how to recognize the spike protein that lives on the outside of the CoV-2 virus. The mRNA administered by vaccines does not enter a cell’s nucleus or alter DNA.

“Once your body learns what the spike protein looks like, it’s able to metabolize the vaccine and get rid of it,” Murray said. “The vaccine’s main job is to provide your body with instructions on how to recognize the virus once a person comes in contact with it again.”

For the next two weeks, a person’s body will continue sharing the mRNA instruction manual with cells until all have received the message. The strongest immune system response typically occurs 12 to 36 hours after vaccination.

“Those symptoms you feel, like a cold or the flu, are the result of your immune system kicking on and practicing how it’s going to fight the virus when it faces it in real time,” Murray said. “The vaccine ultimately allows you the opportunity to fight the virus much more proficiently when you come into contact with it.”

For most vaccines, a 50 percent reduction in illness is considered a successful efficacy rate. The COVID vaccine’s efficacy is much higher than that, but it’s important to remember that no vaccine is 100 percent effective.

“Nothing in medicine is 100 percent. We all want that and hope for that, but the virus gets smart. It mutates and figures out ways to survive. That’s nature,” Murray said. “If you get vaccinated and still get sick but don’t end up hospitalized or placed on a ventilator, that’s the vaccine doing exactly what we expect it to do. It’s keeping

you from catastrophic illness.”

Mousumi Som, OSU Medical Center chief of staff, has worked in COVID units at her hospital from day one of the pandemic and can attest to the vaccine’s impact.

“From a hospital standpoint, more than 90 percent of the people hospitalized in intensive care units are not vaccinated,” Som said.

Some are skeptical of the COVID vaccine because they believe it has not been adequately studied for safety. According to Som, the reason many medications that treat cardiac, diabetes or rheumatology conditions require such lengthy trials lasting years is because there is not enough of an eligible population to study.

With other drugs or vaccines, researchers must wait to find people to enroll in a trial. However, the widespread infection rate of COVID provided researchers with a large population to study within months.

“We had a patient population we could immediately enroll to determine the vaccine’s efficiency and side effects very quickly,” Som said. “Because of the numbers and how quickly they escalated, scientists could study the drug much faster than they could traditionally with other treatments and therapies.”

We will never forget

The WTC tragedy has changed our country forever. We can only hope we don't have to go through a similar situation in the future.

Twenty Years Later

Knowing that the 20th anniversary of 9/11 was fast approaching, I knew I needed to address it. I struggle writing about 9/11 because in many ways it still brings on strong raw emotions and I want to do it justice. For my own history, it is the foremost event and has done more to change this nation during my lifetime than anything else.

While it is a unique event for me, it is not unique historically. I can make many comparisons to other events in our history – JFK's assassination, Pearl Harbor, the sinking of the Maine, John Brown's attack at Harper's Ferry, the attack on Gen. Zachery Taylor at Brownsville, or the first shot fired at Lexington.

Historically speaking, each of these events shook the people then as much as 9/11 has shaken me and has affected the population in different ways. As I consider the major life-changing events in our history, it is interesting that most led to war but yet not all united us the way 9/11 did.

We often think that in times of great crisis the nation comes together, yet history has shown in its biggest moments that that is not true. In 1775, colonial militias in Massachusetts gathered on Lexington green with the idea of stopping the British Army from marching to Concord and seize weapons stored there. Their bravery did not last long as the Redcoats pointed their muskets at the colonials and ordered them to abandon the green. Just as the colonists were about to leave a shot was fired from the woods that set off a chain reaction of the British soldiers firing on the militia and starting the American Revolution.

We may think this rallied the colonists to the cause of liberty, but in fact only about a 1/3 of the colonists ever really supported the revolution. It would even take Congress another year to agree to issue the Declaration of Independence. What actually happened in many parts of the colonies was civil war between the loyalists and the patriots who used the war as justification to kill each other.

In 1846, President James K. Polk, wanting to pull the Mexicans into a fight, sent Gen. Zachery Taylor to Brownsville, Texas, knowing Mexico did not consider the region south of the Nueces River as part of Texas. Taylor got what he wanted, and the Mexican army attacked, giving him the evidence needed to ask Congress for a declaration of war.

The Mexican-American War was probably the most controversial and divisive war before Vietnam, with many in the north believing the war was solely for the purpose of expanding slavery. Henry David Thoreau famously went to jail rather than pay taxes to a government engaged in what he considered an immoral war.

Finck:

A few years later in 1859, radical abolitionist John Brown and several of his followers attacked the federal arsenal at Harper’s Ferry. His plan was to arm the slaves in the region and begin an all-out war for slaves’ emancipation. His plan completely failed yet his attempt closely resembles the 9/11 attack for the south. A religious radical wanted to start a campaign of violence against the south to hurt the south’s way of life.

When Brown was hanged for his crimes, people in the north celebrated him as a martyr, further angering the south. How could the man who wanted to kill them be hailed as a hero? Obviously, the Civil War led to America’s greatest division.

In 1898, the USS Maine was attacked while docked in Havana. The American public had been supporting the independence movement of the Cubans against the Spanish and the sinking of the Maine was seen as an attack by Spain. The attack forced President McKinney to ask for a declaration of war.

This has been a forgotten but significant war. It was the war that pushed America into an imperial power as it colonized many of the Spanish islands that it just liberated. Though most Americans supported some sort of retaliation for the Maine, the nation became completely divided over a war that gave America colonies.

Then came the 20th Century. Though Americans were not united over every conflict, especially Vietnam, they seemed to come together for the major events. The attack on Pearl Harbor united the nation possibly more than we had ever been before. It was not hard to see the threat from Nazi Germany or Imperial Japan and we needed to come together to defeat an evil threat.

Then with the assassination of JFK, we all mourned together. Both Democrats and Republicans, whites and blacks, rich and poor, and north and south shed tears as they watched a young charismatic family man get struck down. Some good came from this. As a nation we came together and passed Kennedy’s bill that became the 1963 Civil Rights Bill. I personally am not sure it would have passed without JFK’s death. We were divided on civil rights, but his death brought us together.

Finally, there was 9/11. As with Pearl Harbor and JFK’s assassination, Americans mourned together as a nation. There will be a lot of discussion on the events of 9/11, as there should be, but what I remember just as much and want to focus on was 9/12.

We live in a nation where today some claim the American Flag represents hatred. One leader has claimed she fears people who fly the flag. Yet I still remember 20 years ago when everyone from every walk of life and background flew that flag with pride. There was hardly a home or car without a flag of some sort.

At sporting events across the nation, whether it was President Bush throwing out the first pitch at a Yankees game, Mark Messier wearing the FDNY helmet on the ice, or NFL players running out of the tunnel with flags waving, no matter the sport, the crowds chanted “USA-USA-USA.” In 2001, the Women’s National Soccer team represented America at every game the rest of that year, draping themselves with American flags, where now the majority of the team takes a knee when the flag is waved.

9/11 was a tragic day, but it also brought out the best in America. We were as unified as we have ever been as a nation. Personally, I think only Pearl Harbor looms as greater. I still mourn those who died on that day, especially heroes who rushed into the towers, but I also mourn 9/12 just as much.

I blame radical Islamists for the death of Americans, but I blame us and our elected leaders for the death of the America that was also born the day after. May we never forget 9/11 and may we ever strive to return to 9/12.

Abandonment of Refrigerators and Iceboxes in Places Accessible to Children

Any person, firm, or corporation who abandons or discards in any place accessible to children any refrigerator, icebox, or ice chest of a capacity of one and one-half (1½) cubic feet or more which has an attached lid or door which may be opened or fastened shut by means of an attached latch or who, being the owner, lessee, or manager of such place, knowingly permits such abandoned or discarded refrigerator, icebox, or ice chest to remain in such condition shall be deemed negligent as a matter of law and shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

Prior Code 1991, §8-115. State Law Reference: Similar provisions, 21 O.S. §120S.

young children, Rex and Lexi, loving parents, Johnny and Laura, and his sister, Jennifer, and her family. Please pray for his family.


With the current state of our country, Jason passing at such a young age is just another reminder to me that we should all give generously of our time and talents when we can, forgive more, love bigger and always seek com-

“We the People” care. The Kid cares, and so should you. It’s the United States’ rule book for our unique government.

Sandra Day O’Connor, first woman to serve on the U.S. Supreme Court, wrote:

“What makes the Constitution worthy of our commitment? First and foremost, the answer is our freedom. It is, quite simply, the most powerful vision of freedom ever expressed. ...

“What was revolutionary when it was written, and what continues to inspire the world today, is that the Constitution put governance in the hands of the people.”

In 2004, the U.S. Congress designated Sept. 17 as Constitution Day and required that all schools receiving federal funds teach about the Constitution on that day.

People have many ways to study this precious document and find teaching resources. The National Archives and the Library of Congress both provide crucial information.

The National Constitution Center in Philadelphia provides both in-person and online activities. The non-partisan center was chartered by Congress in a law signed by President Ronald Reagan in 1988.

The process for selecting a president created in the Constitution is perhaps its most controversial provision. The term “Electoral College” was coined later, using “college” as a group of colleagues gathered for a purpose.

The National Archives reports, “There have been more proposals [over 700] for Constitutional amendments on changing


the Electoral College than on any other subject.” All failed.

Notes from the 1787 convention provided by the Library of Congress say:

“[T]he members of the General Convention ... did indulge the hope [that] by apportioning, limiting, and confining the Electors within their respective States, and by the guarded manner of giving and transmitting the ballots of the Electors to the Seat of Government, that intrigue, combination, and corruption, would be effectually shut out, and a free and pure election of the president of the United States made perpetual.”

Events since last November’s election make clear that the Constitution is still evolving to meet all the goals of its preamble. They include insuring “domestic tranquility” and securing the “blessings of Liberty.”

Studying the Constitution and its Amendments is a great place to start.



Sales taxes good for most

The September 2021 distribution of sales tax collections by the Oklahoma Tax Commission totaled \$184,311,264 to municipalities. That is an increase of \$22,121,601 from a year ago. The use tax disbursement to cities and towns was \$26,165,880. Oklahoma's counties shared a \$31,792,136 sales tax dis-

bursement and \$5,199,011 use tax disbursement. Disbursements were based on sales from July 16-31 and estimated sales from August 1-15.

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OSU EXTENSION *News* Plant wildflower gardens in the fall

Driving across Oklahoma, it's not unusual to see patches of wildflowers along the highway. The variety of colors and textures makes these patches appealing to the eye.

Wildflower gardens are also a great addition to any landscape and recreating this beauty in a public garden or home landscape can create a pleasing aesthetic – provided the right steps are taken in its establishment.

"Gardeners are concerned with the environment, and in some ways, wildflower gardens are more environmentally friendly than traditional gardens," said David Hillock, Oklahoma State University Extension consumer horticulturist.

"Although most plants will survive for a time in any given environment without human intervention, wildflowers will need the right conditions to perform in the desired way. Fertilizers and other amendments may be needed when the environmental conditions aren't ideal," Hillock said. "Once established, wildflowers should grow well because

they're accustomed to the soils and growing conditions of the local climate."

Good choices of native wildflowers include blanket flower, black-eyed Susan, sunflowers, joe pye weed, purple cone-flower, purple prairie clover, butterfly weed, milk weeds, bluestars, goldenrod, Mexican hat and tickseed.

Late fall is ideal for planting a wildflower garden, but as with any gardening venture, site selection is vital. Consider factors such as sun and wind exposure, drainage, site topography, site access for maintenance and irrigation.

Hillock said if several options for a site are available, the desired plant species or aesthetic can dictate where the wildflower garden should be located.

Clearing any vegetation from the site is important and this process can take some time. Non-selective, post-emergent herbicides are an effective way to kill perennial weedy plants growing in the area and multiple treatments may be necessary.

After tilling, the area should be left relatively undisturbed for enough time to see new weed growth, which should then be treated.

"Another option for clearing vegetation is solarizing, as long as the existing vegetation is of manageable size," he said. "Solarizing is done using clear plastic sheeting and the sun's heat to basically cook the plants

and seeds. The heat of solarizing soil also can be used to reduce the amount of viable weed seeds but won't completely eliminate them. Using black plastic or other opaque material blocks sunlight and stops photosynthesis, thereby killing plants."

Tilling is another option to get rid of vegetation, although not as reliable as other methods. Tilling will kill and help in the removal of some perennial weeds with stubborn root systems, but it can help multiply others by dividing rhizomes and other plant parts that serve as propagules for new plants. In addition, this method also can kick up dormant seeds from below the soil surface.

Unlike traditional garden beds, soil amendments typically aren't needed because the species plants are generally adapted to poor soil conditions.

For gardening enthusiasts who plan to install a wildflower bed, it's important for them to understand seed dormancy. Many native species have evolved only to germinate when conditions are just right, such as after a heavy rain or a fire event.

Typically, seeds need a cold and wet period to break dormancy, also known as stratification. Dormancy can be broken artificially by placing seeds in a moist growing medium in the refrigerator for about four



Community Forestry grant applications available through Nov. 12

Applications are being accepted for grants to help communities across the state improve their forests.

Oklahoma Forestry Services, in conjunction with the US Forest Service and the Oklahoma Community Forestry Council, is accepting applications through November 12 from local governments, non-profits, neighborhood associations, civic groups, educational institutions and tree volunteer groups.

The grants are available to support for a wide variety of projects and resources needed to assess, plan, maintain and improve urban and community forests.

This funding can be used for projects such as forestry plans, conducting tree inventories, staffing, tree board development and tree protection ordinance development or revisions.

Other projects that will be considered include public education materials, training, arboretum development and demonstrations projects that include tree maintenance or construction protection. A full list of acceptable projects can be found in the application.

"We encourage organizations to use this opportunity to enhance their forested areas

because trees are a vital asset to communities, providing health, environmental and economic benefits," said Mark Bays, Oklahoma Forestry Services Urban and Community Forestry Coordinator. "We want to assist those communities that want to take a proactive approach to planning and caring for their trees."

The Urban and Community Forestry Grants range from \$1,000 to \$10,000 and require that recipients provide 50/50 matching funds in cash, donations or in-kind contributions and/or services.

Up with Trees, Tree Bank Foundation Oklahoma and the City of Norman were the recipients in 2019.

Applications are available on the Oklahoma Forestry Services website at www.forestry.ok.gov and must be filled out and mailed to Oklahoma Forestry Services, 2800 N. Lincoln Blvd., Oklahoma City, OK 73105 by 5 p.m on Nov. 13, 2021.

All applicants will be notified of the status of their application by December 15. Recipients will have one year from start date to complete their project.

to pass muster with the local county or city-county health department.

Once that hurdle is cleared, however, the district has to be located in an area that is under a current state of emergency declared by the governor.

Stitt has declined to make such a declaration.

For now, there is a temporary injunction against those provisions in the new law.

Districts like Purcell Public Schools are caught in the middle.

Dr. Sheli McAdoo told board members at Monday’s meeting that there’s been no indication how long the injunction will remain in effect.

The district’s Safe Return to Learn Plan can be modified in the future if necessary.

For now, however, there’s no need to make any changes.

McAdoo said if McClain County goes to red, the district may mandate masks.

It is possible such a mandate could be issued for a specific building and not the entire district.

She said the plan includes three possible reasons students can opt out of wearing a mask. Those are medical, religious and personal.

Board president Tracy Folsom said she likes the idea of tying a possible mandate to “what is happening in Purcell” instead of McClain County as

a whole.

McAdoo said the district is obligated to report cluster outbreaks to the health department.

A cluster outbreak is two or more unrelated students in a class who are both infected.

She added the highest number of positive test results was seven at the start of the school year last month.

In her other comments to the board, McAdoo encouraged the public to see the Dragons marching band’s new performance, “Machine.”

She said fall assessments in the district will conclude this week.

Drainage issues at Conger Field have been addressed with the installation of new curbing and a flume to “direct water where we want it to go,” she said.

In other business, the board:

- approved an FFA trip to the National Convention in Indianapolis next month, and
- approved appointments for the Teacher Induction Program. Those include Rachel Barnett, teacher, and Cyndi Childers, mentor; Jazmyn Short, teacher, and Kristie Craig, mentor; Misty Winters, teacher, and Megan Moreno, mentor; Chase Vickrey, teacher, and Stephanie Knowles, mentor, and Rebecca Franco, counselor, and Sara Nichols, mentor.

Wayne rolls over Lexington Wayne defense holds Lexington to -48 rushing yards

The Wayne defense continues to play at a high level for head coach Brandon Sharp and staff. They leaned on their swarming defense Friday night at Lexington to claim a 46-6 win and improve their record to 3-0. Through three games the first-team Bulldog defense has not allowed a point and no team has finished a game with positive rushing yards. "Our defense was all over the place and absolutely got after them," Sharp said. "The defense is playing well right now." Wayne opened the scoring in the first quarter with an 80-yard run by senior quarterback Ethan Mullins. Mullins also scored touchdowns on runs of 4, 25 and 6.

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



Living a virtuous life is not a simple endeavor. The annoyances of daily life sometimes cause our behavior not to reflect our Christian beliefs. Important topics like reading, writing, and arithmetic are taught year after year in school. In the same way, the Church provides guidance on virtuous living regularly.

Part Three of the Catechism of the Catholic Church is about Life in Christ. Article 7 is about The Virtues.

Today's column focuses on the virtues of fortitude and temperance.

Fortitude is mental and emotional strength in facing difficulty, adversity, danger, or temptation courageously. Grit is a term that comes to mind. Grit is a somewhat earthy word and does not sound like a particularly desirable attribute but it surely is. A prayer I say

regularly includes this: "Lord, help me to face my challenges with strength and dignity as well as grace and poise."

The Merriam-Webster Dictionary defines temperance as 1: moderation in action, thought, or feeling; Restraint; and 2: habitual moderation in the indulgence of the appetites or passions. Such moderation causes us to restrain ourselves from revenge, arrogance, excessive eating or drinking, and rage.

The cardinal virtues may sound to our human ears like rules against fun. Prudence and justice were discussed in last week's column. Today's column covers the other two cardinal virtues, fortitude and temperance. However, when we seek our best life, the cardinal virtues give us a solid base on which to live our lives.

To live well is nothing other than to love God with all one's heart, with all one's soul and with all one's efforts; from this it comes about that love is kept whole and uncorrupted (through temperance). No misfortune can disturb it (and this is fortitude). It obeys only [God] (and this is justice), and is careful in discerning things, so as not to be surprised by deceit or trickery (and this is prudence).

The Wednesday evening Bible class concluded their study of Philippians looking at the last half of the fourth chapter of the letter. Here the apostle Paul wrote about how he was able to get along in whatever circumstances he found himself and thanked the church at Phillippi for their financial support. He then closed out his letter with greetings to the church.

The Sunday morning adult Bible class, still studying the subject of racism, examined the responsibility man has to treat all others with compassion and tolerance.

During the Sunday morning assembly Keith Shackelford presented a lesson on the problem of instability. The lesson began by warning that the untaught and unstable would

twist the scriptures to their own destruction (2 Peter 3:16) then went on to warn of the dangers of unsuitability and concluded with Biblical teaching on how to secure and maintain stability.

Prayer and vigilance (1 Peter 4:7 and Collisions 4:2) were recommended as deterrents to instability and while neglect and conformity to the world (Romans 12:2) were cited as causes for instability.

The Sunday evening sermon looked at the subject of church discipline. It was pointed out that God ordained the home (Collisions 3:18-21), civil government (Romans 13:1-7) and His church (Matthew 16:18, Acts 2), and expressed the need for discipline in each.

Most of the principles of church discipline are found in 1

Corinthians 5, 2 Thessalonians 3:6-15 and Matthew 18:15-17. These scriptures outlined that the purpose of church discipline is to motivate unruly Christians to repent, not to to get even or to Lord over or belittle them. The procedure is to be administered out of love and concern (2 Thessalonians 3:15).

Pastor David's sermon this past Sunday was based on Philippians 4:13: "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me," written by the apostle Paul, a Roman citizen. He wrote these words from Rome while sitting in prison. He's in a bad spot and can't rely on his own strength. He is

speaking from a dark, dingy cell where he is likely hungry and without any comforts.

These words remind us that, though Paul's circumstances might be bleak, God is still with him. It's from this humble place, he still has the peace of God. The context of the passage tells us this, but for many who read this single verse in Philippians, they miss the real purpose of Paul's words.

He isn't giving a pep talk to win the game, but rather he is giving encouragement in the face of an almost certain defeat. It's in our own weakness that God's power is strongest. Paul is saying that God will get us through whatever confronts us daily, not that God will allow us to win the game or to accomplish whatever we want.

What does this mean for us today? We can have hope when life seems hopeless. Paul didn't write these words from a place of victory but from a prison. From a worldly perspective, he had nothing, not even his basic

needs. He was a loser.

Philippians 4:13 is not a war cry to go out and conquer. It is not motivation to achieve success professionally, academically, or athletically. It is not written to challenge the strong to become even greater. It is written to encourage the weak and those who find themselves in difficult circumstances.

The most common interpretations of this verse miss this most important distinction. To put things into proper perspective, Philippians 4:13 tells us that it's a challenge to be content no matter what situation that we find ourselves in. Paul was in a dark, damp, smelly prison cell with little food, yet he was content. Why? Because he had what matters most: a relationship with God, through Jesus.

One of this verse's primary applications for us today is to be content in Jesus alone. We

Re-visiting God’s Greatness

Last week, we shared some special moments out on Wyoming’s Snake River considering God’s greatness. And we visited that great song, “How Great Thou Art,” along the way, a visit we’ll continue today. It may be the greatest song ever written. If not, it’s on that top shelf with the best of the best.

The writer of ‘How Great Thou Art’ understood something about God’s glory and majesty. He had experienced wonders in God’s handiwork that made him stop right where he was and give God the glory.

You might think he stood and looked out over the Grand Canyon – ah, from high up there you can sing ‘Then sings my soul my Savior God to thee’ with vigor, can’t you! – or up high on the Smoky Mountains looking deep down into the foothills with the fall leaves shifting from color to color and the cool running Pigeon River churning confidently through it.

Carl Bobert, the Swedish preacher who penned these words in 1886, likely never saw either of those wonders, although he would have plenty of his own to admire in the beautiful landscapes of Sweden. Many scenes there display the glories of God and would cause him to sing, and write:

“O Lord my God, when I in awesome wonder consider all the worlds thy hands have made. I see the stars, I hear the rolling thunder, Thy pow’r throughout the universe displayed.”

The wonder we have of God, as with the song poet here, seems to come in stages. First we wonder at God’s greatness, marveling of Him in our mind, then we see all that He has made and hear the pow’r of the rolling thunder, our thoughts, our eyes, our ears all taking in God’s glory.

But there’s something still missing, some sense we possess that we have not yet engaged in our wonder and worship of God, but the writer will not leave it that way for long. As we come to the resounding chorus, he takes the wonder of his soul to new heights, writing,

“Then sings my soul, my Savior God, to Thee; how great Thou art, how great Thou art! Then sings my soul, my Savior God, to Thee; how great Thou art, how great Thou art!”

There we go to the depths of our being, down into our very soul. Our wonder looks up to the heights while our emotions reach down to the depths. Our whole being is overwhelmed with God’s glory, as we proclaim from deep in our souls, ‘How great Thou art.’ One time through that glad, triumphant refrain is not enough, for we must echo it, its ascending crescendo taking it to even greater heights than before: “Then sings my soul, my Savior God, to Thee; how great Thou art, how great Thou art!”

Thus, we sing today, and every day that we live, the glory of our Savior and the glory of our God. We acknowledge His greatness in our minds, marvel at it with our eyes, wonder at it with what we hear, and sing it, proclaim it, with all that we have, and all that we are, deep down in our souls.

Then sings my soul!

We sing it then, when we are overwhelmed with the Lord’s goodness, we sing it even now, and we sing it every day that we live. It is a glad refrain that will take us all the way home. “How Great, how great, Thou Art!”


