Both the Lexington Police Department and school administrators are currently investigating messages written on bathroom walls possibly threatening an explosion at the school.

The first one occurred Monday about 10:30 a.m. in a women's restroom at the high school, according to Lexington Assistant Chief of Police Ronnie Johnson.



Superintendent Chad Hall thinks the Tuesday incident was a copycat.

Hall said on the incident Tuesday, Lexington Police utilized some assessment protocols. Hall said he is convinced the Tuesday message was not credible.

Hall issued this statement: "Unfortunately, it has been necessary for Lexington High School to consider the credibility of recent graffiti messages of a threatening nature. LPS will work diligently to maintain the balance between

But first came the Army.


He enlisted in 1984 and after basic training at Ft. Sill was assigned to the 189th Field Artillery in northwest Oklahoma.

Rain chances could alleviate drought


If the Oklahoma Mesonet forecast holds, this week will bring welcome relief on two fronts—temperature and rainfall.



OBI relaunches COVID-19 antibody testing across state

In the face of rising cases across the state, Oklahoma Blood Institute is relaunching its COVID-19 antibody testing program. The test will provide donors an additional piece of health information, similar to the existing health screenings typically provided to all donors. Discovering if an individual had a previously-unknown COVID-19 infection is beneficial in the event of future health concerns. OBI uses an IgG antibody test created by Abbott, which measures antibodies from natural COVID infection and the antibodies produced as a result. The test will not measure the vaccine response, which is created through a different mechanism.

"Knowledge has always been power, especially as it relates to our health," said Dr. John Armitage, president and CEO of Oklahoma Blood Institute. "We're proud to bring this needed testing back to our donors to provide as more knowledge so they can make better informed decisions about their health." Oklahoma Blood Institute performed antibody testing earlier in the pandemic, beginning in July 2020 and extending through May of this year. During that initial testing period, nearly 300,000 tests were completed, with a 16 percent positivity rate. In addition to the COVID-19 antibody results, blood donors also receive information on

blood pressure, cholesterol and Hemoglobin A1c. The blood supply in Oklahoma - as with the rest of the nation - remains at critical levels, as demand for blood products continues to soar and donors are not yet back at pre-pandemic giving levels. Blood is needed every two seconds and has no substitute. Donating blood takes about an hour and can save the lives of up to three local patients. Oklahoma Blood Institute supports the inventory for patients in more than 160 hospitals, medical facilities and air ambulances statewide. 16-year-olds must weigh at least 110 pounds. Lawyers in other counties will also be giving free legal advice. About 300 lawyers will be volunteering statewide.

The Ask A Lawyer free legal advice project is one of several events in which Oklahoma lawyers participate to observe Law Day. The accompanying Ask A Lawyer television program will air across the state on September 30 at 7 p.m. on OETA.

The show is designed to share information about legal issues in easy-to-understand language. This year's topics are bankruptcy, divorce and a spotlight on the OU College of Law legal clinic.

Why Celebrate Law Day? Though Law Day is celebrated across the country, it was We-woka attorney and 1953 OBA President Hicks Epton who originally had the idea of celebrating the law and how it affects our lives in 1951.

President Dwight D. Eisenhower established Law Day nationally by proclamation in 1958; in 1961, Congress set aside May 1 as a day for all Americans to celebrate their freedom and the ideals of equality and justice under the law.

Rights of the condemned: What Oklahoma death row prisoners can and can't do in their final hours

As Oklahoma prepares to carry out seven executions over a five-month stretch, the U.S. Supreme Court will soon hear oral arguments in a case that could expand civil rights for the condemned.

Convicted of murdering a convenience store worker and sentenced to death in 2008, Texas prisoner John Henry Ramirez was scheduled to be executed on September 8. In the weeks leading up to the execution, Ramirez requested that his pastor be allowed to lay hands on him during the administration of lethal injection drugs.

Texas prison officials rejected Ramirez's petition, citing safety concerns. This prompted Ramirez's attorney to file a religious liberty lawsuit claiming his First Amendment rights were being violated, which advanced to the Supreme Court. Ramirez's execution date was postponed indefinitely after the Court agreed to hear oral arguments sometime in October or November.

Currently, the U.S. Constitution gives death penalty prisoners broad protection from cruel and unusual punishment. From there, states are free to implement their own procedural rules, including final clemency appeals, what prisoners can eat for their last meal and who may witness the execution.

State corrections department policy on capital punishment dictates everything from how the drugs are administered to who the condemned can talk to in their final days and hours.

From the last appeal to final words, here's a look at how state policy determines an Oklahoma death row prisoner's last hours:

The Final Appeal

Three weeks before their execution date, death row prisoners can appear before the State Pardon and Parole Board for a clemency hearing.

The prisoner's legal counsel, a prosecutorial representative and a victim's advocate address Board members during the proceeding. The five-member


clemency and the governor to act on that request. For example, former Gov. Brad Henry granted clemency to three death row prisoners, modifying their sentences to life in prison, during his eight-year term.

Visitors and Phone Calls

Death row prisoners' phone call privileges are revoked at 9 p.m. on the evening before their execution. An exception is made for legal counsel and any other person approved by the corrections director. Their in-person visitation privileges also expire at that time.

The prisoner may meet with their attorney for up to two hours on the day of the execu-

NEWS from the City of Purcell

The City of Purcell does free brush pickup two times per year in the fall and again in the spring. These schedules will be published in **The Purcell Register** and can be obtained at Purcell City Hall.

During the remainder of the year, the City of Purcell will do brush pickup by work order only. This means that the customer has to call in to City Hall to request pickup with charges to be assessed to the customer utility account.

The charges may range from \$15 for a small load up to \$50 for a large load.

The garbage company, WCA, does bulk waste pickup on the fourth Monday of each month. This includes small loads of brush. The brush needs to be cut in three foot lengths and bundled with twine.

Early voting in a \$24.5 million Washington school bond election will open October 7 and conclude October 8.

Hours each day will be 8 a.m. to 6 p.m.

The election will be October 12. Polling places that day will be open 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

McClain County Election Board Secretary, Karen Haley, said early voting is open to all voters.

"You do not need to pro-

vide an excuse to vote early. Oklahoma allows early voting for all elections conducted through the State Election Board—from school board and municipal elections to state and federal elections. The McClain County Election Board is located at 121 N. 2nd Ave., in Purcell.

Testing:

least 125 pounds and provide signed parental permission; 17-year-olds must weigh at least 125 pounds; 18+ year olds must weigh at least 110 pounds. Photo ID required. While supplies last.

Donors ages 16 or 17-years old need parental consent to be screened for COVID-19 antibodies.

This test has not been FDA cleared or approved. It has been authorized by the FDA under an EUA (Emergency Use

Authorization) for use by authorized laboratories. The test has been authorized only for the detection of the antibody IgG antibody against SARS-CoV-2, not for any other viruses or pathogens. Test results will be made available post-donation on the donor portal.

Don't take community journalism for granted

I recently received a news-room call asking for the editor.

The caller was upset about a particular developing story because we didn't republish a submitted press release verbatim. I explained that we rewrite press releases every day.

It reminded me of an **Oklahoma Gazette** cover story we published with the headline "Press released." That cover story was about the shrinking state Capitol press corps and the proliferation of press releases being published in lieu of news.

I asked the caller what was wrong with our story. If we reported something inaccurately, we would correct the mistake. We've certainly run corrections before. (Ultimately, nothing was wrong with this story.)

The individual then questioned why we sent out the story as a text alert via breaking news. I told the caller the story was about a public health issue, and it was our duty to inform the community.

No offense to the public relations industry, but no one really wants to live in a world where spin with an obvious agenda masquerades as news.

I hear daily accusations of biased news media. And you would be amazed at how many upset "customers" demand coverage when they don't even subscribe.

News flash: We don't get to choose what stories happen on any given day or night. Our agenda is not "hidden." We seek to report the truth, inform the

public and serve as a watchdog and guide dog for the public interest.

We don't make this stuff up, folks. With news developing at a breakneck pace, we don't have to and frankly wouldn't even have the time.

I often get messages from friends and colleagues asking about something they read on a social media source that they claim not to visit.

"So-and-so is saying such and such on the (insert political view here) Facebook page," they say. "Can you believe it?"

Good question. It it true? What documented proof do you have? Which on-the-record

NEWS FROM CAPITOL HILL

Providing for our National Defense

Last week, the U.S. House of Representatives passed its version of the National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) for fiscal year 2022.

In arriving at this point in the process of advancing this comprehensive bill to authorize critical and sustainable funding for our national defense, I was proud of the manner in which members on both sides of the aisle worked together to deliver.

When this bill was reported out of the House Armed Services Committee, it passed by a nearly unanimous vote of 57-2. Considering that Democrats have primarily produced and passed partisan legislation this Congress with no input from or consultation with Republicans, this was a refreshing development.

Indeed, this NDAA offered a clear example that the House can work together and pass bipartisan legislation for the good of the American people.

At a time when the Biden Administration's proposed budget revealed an effective cut for our defense, I was pleased that the NDAA passed in the

House rejected such action.

Fortunately, in the House Armed Services Committee, the panel's top Republican, Ranking Member Mike Rogers, successfully led a bipartisan effort to add \$25 billion needed for modernizing our military, countering major and proliferating threats around the world and sustaining ongoing missions, including those at Tinker Air Force Base in Midwest City and Fort Sill in Lawton, which are both located in the Fourth District of Oklahoma.

Along with several other important provisions, this bill rightly authorizes a 2.7 percent pay increase for service members and unprecedented investments, including an additional \$15 billion in the procurement of new aircraft, combat vehicles, autonomous systems, missiles and ammunition and \$6 billion in emerging technologies, including artificial intelligence, quantum computing, hypersonic and autonomous systems.

Passage of this NDAA comes at a time when our adversaries such as China, Russia, Iran and North Korea are building up their militaries. Due to President Biden's careless and com-

pletely botched withdrawal of U.S. troops in Afghanistan, there is now a resurgence of terrorist organizations in the region.

In response, the NDAA authorizes necessary tools and resources for our military to prevail in conflict with a wide range of potential adversaries.

Rightly so, this legislation includes more than 20 provisions to hold the Biden Administration accountable. These include requiring the U.S. Department of Defense (DOD) to submit a plan to Congress on how it will evacuate remaining American citizens from Afghanistan, conduct intelligence surveillance and reconnaissance missions and carry out counter-terrorism missions. It also includes language that prohibits DOD from providing any financial support to the Taliban.

Moreover, the legislation notably reverses President Biden's proposed budget cuts to our missile defense systems and continues funding for nuclear triad modernization. Amid the ongoing crisis at our southern border created by the Biden

Political Blame

As we continue to watch events unfold in Afghanistan and see what many consider a failure to exit properly, it is important to remember that, historically speaking, failure is common. Many of the men that we consider our greatest presidents experienced failures. What sets apart some presidents over others is how they handled the situation. One such complete failure happened in 1961.

In January 1959, Fidel Castro and his communist forces overthrew the government of Cuba. Once in power he nationalized the sugar industry and kicked American companies out of the

nation. America, fearing communism, especially so close to our shores, put an embargo on Cuban sugar, trying to crush their economy.

At the same time President Eisenhower began to put into motion a plan to remove the new dictator. Not wanting to get directly involved, the CIA trained ex-Cubans who fled the Cuban Revolution to lead the assault. When President Kennedy took office in 1961 the plan was already set. JFK was told there would be little resistance and that, instead, the Cuban people would rise up and support the invaders to overthrow Castro. Being in office for only three months and believing what he was told, Kennedy did not nix an operation already scheduled; instead, he gave the project a green light.

What became known as the Bay of Pigs invasion was a complete disaster. Castro was ready for the invasion and most of the men were killed or captured on the first day. It turned out the plan was far from secret and the Cuban people were not prepared to fight their new leader. All the invasion did was make Castro look like a hero for stopping the imperialist Americans. It also gave the Kennedy administration a black eye, not the way this young new American leader wanted to be introduced to the world. So how did Kennedy handle the situation?

The day after the invasion, April 20, Kennedy addressed the press. While not completely truthful about American involvement, he made three main points. First, "it is clear that the forces of communism are not to be underestimated." Second, "It is clear that this nation, in concert with all the free nations of this hemisphere, must take an even closer and more realistic look at the menace of external Communist intervention and domination in Cuba." And finally, "it is clearer than ever that we face a relentless struggle in every corner of the globe that goes far beyond the clash of armies or even nuclear armaments."

The more telling admission came the next day in a press conference. The president started the conference by saying that he would not make any more statements about Cuba. Yet one reporter, Sandy Vanocur, challenged Kennedy with "In view of the fact we are taking a propaganda lambasting around the world, why is it not useful, sir, for us to explore with you the real facts behind this, or our motivations?"

Kennedy answered the question by saying that, unlike with dictators, in free societies leaders must judge what information is helpful and harmful to the nation. About Cuba he said, "There's an old saying that victory has 100 fathers and defeat is an orphan. And I wouldn't be surprised if information is poured into you in regard to all of the recent activities."

He then talked about how it's the same in the space race. He had read an article where someone said all America does is talk about putting a man in space while the Soviets just do it. Dictators have no obligation to the people or press, he said.

Kennedy finished his answer with, "But I will say to you, Mr. Vanocur, that I have said as much as I feel can be usefully said by me in regard to the events of the past few days. Further statements, detailed discussions, are not to conceal responsibility because I'm the responsible officer of the Government--and that is quite obvious." Kennedy could have easily blamed Ike, or the CIA. Maybe he should have. It really was their failed plan and intelligence, but not a word.

Now compare Kennedy's press conference to President Biden's. He began by praising the "extraordinary success" of the mission, the same mission most saw as a failure. He did recognize flaws in the mission, starting with the Afghan Government. "The people of Afghanistan watched their own government collapse and their president flee amid the corruption and malfeasance, handing over the country to their enemy, the Taliban," he said.

The President then turned his attention to the man he replaced, "My predecessor, the former President, signed an agreement with the Taliban to remove U.S. troops by May the 1st, just months after I was inaugurated. It included no requirement that the Taliban work out a cooperative governing arrangement with the Afghan government, but it did authorize the release of 5,000 prisoners last year, including some of the Taliban's top war commanders, among those who just took control of Afghanistan. And by the time I came to office, the Taliban was in its strongest military position since 2001, controlling or contesting nearly half of the country. The previous administration's agreement said that if we stuck to the May 1st deadline that they had signed on to leave by, the Taliban wouldn't attack any American forces, but if we stayed, all bets were off."

I am not saying President Biden is responsible for what seemed like a botched exit. Trump may have handled it the same way. What I do see is a difference between the way Kennedy and Biden handled a situation that they inherited. Historically speaking, Kennedy's approval ratings continued to be strong. We will have to see what happens with Biden moving forward.

Absentee voter

Request must be received by Tuesday

The deadline to request absentee ballots by mail is approaching.

Applications must be received by the County Election Board no later than 5 p.m. Tuesday, according to McClain County Election Board Secretary Karen Haley.

"In Oklahoma, no excuse is needed to vote by absentee ballot, and it's easy to apply," she said. "Voters can submit their application online, in-person, by fax, mail, or even email."

To apply online, use the OK Voter Portal at oklahoma.gov/elections/ovp. Applications are also available at the County Election Board or can be downloaded at oklahoma.gov/elections.

Haley said only the applicant can submit his or her own absentee ballot application. It is against the law to submit an absentee ballot application for another person.

Voters who submit their application in-person at the County Election Board will be asked to provide proof of identity.

Administration, the NDAA also declares that the record number of illegal crossings there is a national security crisis.

Last week, the Senate Armed Services Committees favorably reported a bipartisan NDAA for future consideration in the U.S. Senate. This development was also the result of bipartisan cooperation and due to the leadership exemplified by Chairman Jack Reed and Ranking Member Jim Inhofe.

Once the Senate takes up the legislation for a vote in the coming days, I am hopeful that it too will pass with strong bipartisan support and that both chambers of Congress can

then resolve any differences in conference and send a final bill to the president's desk.

While no bill is perfect, passage of a final and truly bipartisan NDAA is critical to strengthening our national defense and repudiating the Biden Administration's effort to use defense to subsidize its bloated spending elsewhere. The conference process of reconciling the two versions of the NDAA is essential to further addressing and eliminating remaining concerns.

However, it's worth nothing that in order for the priorities contained in the House-passed NDAA or the Senate Armed Services Committee's reported bill to be fully accom-

plished, the authorized funding increase must be replicated in the appropriations process.

At this point, Democrats have already established an effective cut in that annual appropriation. I hope they soon change course and finally adopt a bipartisan posture on that legislation, too. In fact, that must happen in order to receive my support.

In times like these, our national defense deserves our full support to counter threats of terror and hold the line on our strategic adversaries. In the days and weeks ahead, I remain committed to continuing this bipartisan process to rightfully provide for our common defense.

1 can Rotel tomatoes

1/2 cup salsa

2 cups shredded cheddar cheese

Shredded lettuce, sour cream, guacamole and taco sauce for topping

tion. Otherwise, the prisoner is placed in a holding cell until their scheduled execution time.

Execution Method

Unlike a handful of states, including Tennessee and Virginia, Oklahoma's death row prisoners don't have a say in how they're killed.

Execution by nitrogen gas and firing squad is only authorized if the state is unable to secure a reliable supply of drugs or its lethal injection protocol has been deemed unconstitutional.

A ruling on the constitutionality of Oklahoma's lethal injection drug mix could come soon. A group of Oklahoma death row prisoners is challenging the state's use of midazolam in executions in a federal lawsuit, claiming that the sedative's use constitutes cruel and unusual punishment.

Last month U.S. District Judge Stephen Friot ruled that the lawsuit could proceed to a trial, likely sometime in early 2022. However, Friot rejected the claims of six death prisoners who didn't provide an alternative execution method, clearing the way for the state to set some execution dates. A seventh death row prisoner, Bigler Stouffer, did not join the lawsuit.

Last Meal

The prisoner's last meal is served between 5 and 7 p.m. the night before their scheduled execution. Corrections department protocol states that a "reasonable effort shall be made to accommodate the request, which shall not exceed \$25."

The last meal is a widely adopted, though not universal, practice among states that carry out executions. In 2011, Texas prison officials opted to end the tradition after convicted murderer Lawrence Russell Brewer refused to eat a meal that included a plate of fajitas, two chicken fried steaks and a meat lover's pizza.

Witnesses

The prisoner can request that a maximum of five relatives and friends attend to view their execution. The witnesses, subject to corrections department approval, must be at least 18 years old and pass a criminal background check. The prisoner may also ask that two pastors attend the execution.

Witnesses aren't allowed inside the execution chamber. In 2010, convicted murder Donald Wackerly asked prison officials to let his Buddhist spiritual advisor stand beside him during the administration of the execution drugs. A federal judge dismissed the request after prison officials agreed to let the spiritual guide

perform rituals on Wackerly's dead body.

Up to five media witnesses are also authorized to view the execution, with priority given to one reporter from the market where the crime was committed and The Associated Press.

Last Words

Death row prisoners may make a final statement that is "reasonable in length and does not contain vulgar language or intentionally offense statements directed at the witnesses." Prison officials may turn the microphone off if the prisoner violates these conditions.

How Did We Get Here?

Following a series of botched executions, former Gov. Mary Fallin agreed to halt all executions in October 2015 until a reliable supply of approved drugs became available. The

state explored nitrogen gas as a lethal injection alternative but encountered supply issues.

In February 2020, former Attorney General Mike Hunter announced that the state had secured a reliable supply of lethal injection drugs and was prepared to resume executions. However, Hunter agreed to not schedule any executions until a federal lawsuit challenging the state's lethal injection protocol settled.

On August 11, U.S. District Judge Stephen Friot ruled that the lawsuit challenging the state's use of midazolam in executions could proceed to a trial, likely sometime in early 2022. However, Friot in his ruling rejected the claims of six death prisoners who did not provide an alternative execution method, clearing the way for the state to set execution

dates. A seventh death row prisoner, Bigler Stouffer, never joined the lawsuit.

At the request of Attorney General John O'Connor, the state Court of Criminal Appeals on September 20 set execution dates for the seven death row prisoners. Among them is Julius Jones, who faces a November 18 date if Gov. Kevin Stitt does not intervene. Stitt has not yet acted on the state Pardon and Parole Board's September 13 request that Jones' sentence be commuted to life in prison with the possibility of parole.

The new software is designed to provide responders with seamless communication and a real-time connection between dispatchers and command staff even while handling large call volumes, disasters, and the most complex incidents.

Dispatchers can also recover valuable time by responding to misdials with an automated

text instead of a phone call.

A standout feature, particularly for rural areas of the county, is a locate feature which sends a link to the caller's phone. When accepted by the caller, dispatch will be

able to view realtime location data, accurate within just a few feet. This feature also enables callers to send photos to dispatch and deputies helping to identify subjects and enhance officer safety.

Neighbor:

called up and spent one year on active duty.

But the Army didn't send him to the sands of the Middle East or the mountains of Afghanistan.

Instead, his orders were for Ft. Sill where he was an instructor for field artillery forward observers.

"After 9-11, I was on active duty more than working for DOC," he said.

Mike entered corrections thinking he would use the experience to realize his goal of becoming an Oklahoma Highway Patrol trooper.

Life had other plans. He applied for the OHP Academy in 1996 and while his scores were among the highest, he wasn't selected.

"I didn't let it sour me," he said.

Instead, he took another look at his options and reassessed his goals.

"It's a good, solid career," he said of corrections. "I decided let's double down with corrections and see where it takes me.

"This field chooses you." Where its taken him was up through the ranks.

He's spent the majority of his career at Crabtree.

Among the different hats he wore there were correction activities officer, case manager, unit manager and chief of security.

He was also assigned different taskings – auditing or sitting on interview boards – for the department which sent him on visits to all but one of the state's 23 prison facilities.

He came to LARC in January during the height of the COVID pandemic's first wave.

"I've enjoyed every job with corrections," he said, quickly listing unit manager as the most fun and deputy warden as the favorite.

Mike was born in Kiowa, Kans., and grew up near Morris, Okla. He graduated from Hennessey High School.

His wife, Cyndi, is also from Kansas. They've been married 32 years.

Cyndi also works for corrections in human resources and classification.

The LARC posting puts them closer to two of their three adult children – sons Jake and Josh who live at Blanchard and Norman, respectively.

A daughter, Ali, is a teacher and coach in Missouri.

They also have four grandchildren – Ada, Henry, Blake and Rowan.

Those Kansas roots run deep and for 20 years while he worked at Crabtree, Mike commuted from Medicine Lodge to Helena.

The drive was 71 miles each way.

"I saw a lot of beautiful sunsets and sunrises," he said.

The commutes ended in March 2019 when he was promoted to chief of security and was required to live on the grounds.

Mike estimates he's come to know 10,000 or more inmates during his career.

It's a rare – but uplifting – experience when he meets a former inmate who is succeed-

ing outside the walls.

There's no sweeter sound than hearing "the way you treated me changed the way I think."

Mike's reaction is always the same.

"Gosh, I made a difference in someone else's life," he said.

Mike said his job has always been about service – both to staff and inmates.

That point was especially driven home by COVID.

"We didn't shut down because of COVID," he said, pointing out the obvious that inmates are a "captive audience."

The initial response to the virus was harder because COVID was something new.

But the department has always had a policy for dealing with an epidemic such as the flu.

"We had to tweak the policy we had (for COVID)," he said.

"I think the agency adjusted well. It would have been easy to not handle it correctly, to say this is too much."

All that has happened has stressed staff to the max.

Mike has to deal with that, too.

While the minimum security unit at LARC has returned to normal operations, the remainder of the facility remains in lockdown.

That translates to more demands on staff.

"The inmates' health and safety has to be the main thing," Mike said. "They are wards of the state. (But) lockdowns are a necessary evil."

Mike has learned the value of programs that enable inmates to turn their lives around.

But in the final analysis, such programs come down to money and staffing.

LARC's longtime Friends for Folks dog training program has closed. Mike hopes one day it will come back.

"We can only do so much with the money we are given," he said.

He is excited about a new program offered through Oklahoma Baptist University, however.

The institution has started a four-year divinity degree program for long-term inmates.

The goal is once those inmates graduate to transfer them to other facilities where they can assist staff chaplains.

"It's been a very difficult two or three years," he said.

"Programs are the only things that are going to make a difference. And the inmate has to want to change."

In his free time, Mike enjoys cooking, camping and hunting upland game birds.

Quail are his favorite, pheasant not so much.

Mike reached retirement eligibility "four or five" years ago.

But he's not willing to step back just yet.

"I enjoy working for corrections and as short-staffed as we are, we need everyone we can get."

After all, it's what happens when corrections chooses you.

"If you join for glory or money, you're in the wrong job," he said.

Farmers to return custom rates survey ASAP

Oklahoma State University Extension is asking agricultural producers who received a custom rates survey to please fill it out and return it in the postage-paid Business Reply envelope by October 8.

The research results provide important, reliable estimates about custom rates in a given

area, said Roger Sahs, OSU Extension specialist for enterprise budgets and land values.

"Reported custom rates provide information that is key for negotiations between farmers and custom operators," he said. "They let producers who hire work done to plan their budgets and those who perform custom work to know the range of what should be charged."

Producers' mailing identi-

fication is kept separate from their individual questionnaire to maintain confidentiality. Only totals, averages and other statistical measures are made public.

Results are published annually in OSU Extension Current Report 205, "Oklahoma Farm and Ranch Custom Rates." The report will be available online and through all OSU Extension county offices beginning

January 2022.

OSU Extension conducts the surveys in cooperation with the Oklahoma Field Office of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's National Agricultural Statistics Service.

"Be aware it's not unusual for NASS to follow up and call individuals who received a survey but did not respond," Sahs said. "The information really is that important."

the grip of a moderate drought. McClain County's Mesonet station at Washington has recorded 24.6 inches of rain from January 1 through Monday.

In fact, as of Monday, McClain County received just 83 percent of normal rainfall from 1981 through 2010.

That percentage showed the county five inches below normal during those years.

Granted, it's been unusual weather-wise since a crippling ice storm downed trees and power lines in October 2020, leaving thousands in the dark.

February brought a second crippling winter storm that dumped heavy snow across much of the state.

Typical summer temperatures didn't arrive until well into July.

One year ago, 17.2 percent of the state was experiencing moderate drought, according to the Oklahoma Climatological Survey.

As of September 21, that area covered 39.37 percent of Oklahoma.

As recently as June 22, that figure was reported at 5.75 percent.

And on September 14, it stood at 11.29 percent.

Rain was forecast to move into the area earlier this week with 50 percent chances Tuesday and Wednesday.

The likelihood today and tonight (Thursday) and Friday rises to 70 percent, dropping to 60 percent Saturday.

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
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



Five of the Warriors' touchdowns were 24 yards or longer. They scored on pass plays of 48, 80, 43 and 31 yards and had a 24 yard touchdown run.

The Dragons limited the Warriors to 126 yards on the ground.

"We pretty much did a good job on the rushing game," he said. "They just big-played us."

Scott pointed to the defensive play of Brodrick Smith, Jose Ochoa, Creed Smith and Zicorrie Davis.

"And we had good defensive line play from Brody Holder, Tavian Engert, Brendan Bacon and Kevin Lawson.

"They're (Washington) are really good," Scott continued. "They give you match up problems with their two big tall receivers. Well, actually they have three."

"Both of our outside linebackers played well," Scott said. "Ochoa had seven tackles and batted down two passes. At corner, Austin Burton played well. He had a tough draw (guarding Kobe Scott) but he had eight tackles and broke up a pass. He got after it and competed.

Brodrick Smith led the team with 11 tackles. Right on his heels was Davis with 10 stops. Joining Burton with eight tackles was Brody Holder while Ochoa, Creed Smith and Kash Guthmuller all registered seven stops.

On offense Scott said Smith ran the ball well from his quarterback position and his three running backs played well.

Smith finished the game with 131 yards rushing and a one-yard touchdown in the first

quarter. Ryker Fink also found the end zone with a one yard plunge in the fourth quarter. He finished with 52 yards rushing while Payson Purcell added another 18 yards on the ground.

As a team, Purcell rushed for 201 yards for 297 yards of total offense.

"All our running backs ran hard," the coach said. "Titus (Mason) ran the ball well finishing with 77 receiving yards.

"We saw good things from Payson Purcell, Ryker Fink and Creed. He is doing a good job for us."

Creed Smith also passed for another 96 yards.

Dragon notes: Purcell Head Coach **Tracy Scott** nominated **Brodrick Smith** as the Defensive Player of the Week. He made 11 tackles against Washington last Friday night.

In the Defensive Line, **Brody Holder** was the nominee with eight tackles.

Getting the nod as the Offensive Lineman of the Week was **Carter Goldston**, who graded out at 85 percent.

There was no nominee for Offensive Player of the Week.

they led 28-7.

Cantrell's 43 yard touchdown pass to Cage Morris came after halftime.

The only Warrior touchdown on the ground came via sophomore Kade Norman.

"His 24-yard run was one of the best runs of the year," head coach Brad Beller said. "He's a utility guy. He plays everywhere from running back to slot receiver and three different positions on defense. He's only a sophomore and has a bright future ahead of him."

Cole Scott carried the pigskin 16 times for 79 yards. "If you look at our passing game, even though we only threw it 16 times, I thought we were effective," Beller said. "Major Cantrell continues to grow in maturity and experience. He's starting to play really good football and efficient football at the right time."

Cantrell spread the wealth with all four of the receivers that found the end zone also making multiple catches as the game went along.

"They were making plays all night," the coach said. "I was really proud of those four receivers and what they were able to do."

Linebacker Layne Spaulding led spearheaded the defense with 11 tackles. Rope Scott had five stops from his defensive lineman position and recovered a fumble.

Kickoff is set for 7 p.m. for the Friday night affair.

The Wildcats operate out of the spread on offense and utilize a 4-3 alignment on defense.

Beller reports the key to success against the Wildcats is stopping their running attack.

"They have two really good running backs and are by far the biggest and most athletic linemen we've seen so far," Beller said.

"They are all 240 pounds plus but they are a very athletic 240 plus. They have size and speed.

Herman Cheadle

Herman Cheadle attended classes at Purcell Booker T. Washington until racial segregation ended in the 1955-56 school year when he started attending Purcell Schools.

He was a four-year letterman and four-year starter on the high school football team from 1957-1960.

Cheadle was a starting offensive and defensive tackle on the 1960 PHS State Semifinalist team that went 11-1-1. That set a new standard for wins in a season. The season ended in the semifinals to eventual Class B State Champion Choctaw.

He was named to the All-District (B5) team and to the All-Arbuckle Conference team in 1960.

That same year he was named Honorable Mention All-State in football.

He was named to the All-Arbuckle Conference Basketball team as a forward in 1961. He was selected as an alternate to both **The Daily Oklahoman** and **Tulsa World** High School All-State Basketball teams as a forward in 1961.

He started and lettered all four years when Boney Matthews' teams went 100-17.

Cheadle was the starting forward on the 1959-60 basketball team that went 23-3.

He was the starting forward on the 1960-61 Class B State Champion team that finished the year 28-1, losing only to 5A Dallas, W.W. Samuel High School in the finals of the annual Lawton Bi-State High School Basketball Tournament.

He scored 11 points in the 1961 State Quarterfinal game against Stigler when Purcell won 48-41.

He poured in 20 points in the Semifinals when Purcell topped Cordell, 57-46.

In the finals that year, Cheadle again pumped in 20 points when Purcell topped previously undefeated Lawton Douglas, 69-59.

A tenacious defensive player and rebounder, Cheadle was also able to average almost 10 points a game over his four-year basketball career as a starting forward for the Dragons.

Herman was a two-year letterman on the Purcell High

School track team in 1960 and 1961.

Not only was Cheadle an outstanding athlete at PHS, but he was also a four-year member of the Purcell High School FFA organization from 1957-61.

Cheadle will always be remembered for his great physical strength and power, coupled with the unique finesse he had as an athlete. His teammates still say he had the strongest hands of anyone to ever play for the Dragons in any sport.

He was named as a defensive lineman on the 1960's PHS All-Decade football team by Purcell Football Alumni.

James Bell graduated from PHS in the Class of 1922.

He lettered in football from 1918-1921. Bell lettered in basketball from 1918-1922 and lettered in baseball from 1919-1922. He also lettered in track from 1919-1922.

James was known for many years as the fastest person in Purcell as he would race anyone who came to town and challenge him. This included a sprinter from back East who was traveling the country from town-to-town by train and would race the fastest person in each community. Bell was one of the few to defeat him.

As a junior, Bell was a star running back on Coach Gene Ward's 1920 PHS football team that scored an amazing 49.43 points per game during their 6-1 season.

In the 145-7 PHS victory over Sulphur in 1920, which is the most points ever scored by a Dragon Football Team in a single game, James drop-kicked a phenomenal 19 out of 21 PATs. That is still a PHS school record for most extra points kicked (and attempted) in one game by either a drop-kick or placekick.

Recognized even years later by his peers and the Purcell citizens of that time period for his great speed and his overall superior athletic ability in any sport but especially in football and baseball.

Bell was named as a running back on the 1895-1934 All-Decade(s) football team, selected by Purcell High School Alumni.



Vernon Bass

Vernon Bass graduated from PHS in 1925. He lettered in football from 1921-1924 and basketball from 1921-1925. He lettered in baseball and track from 1922-1925.

Up to the 1922-23 school year, all of the PHS athletic teams had played games as an independent. Bass was a member of the 1922 football team that was a Charter Member of the Southern Association, which became the Southern Oklahoma High School Conference in 1923. PHS athletic teams would remain members of the Southern Oklahoma High School Conference until 1928 before joining an early version of the old Arbuckle Conference.


Bass was a senior on the first PHS football team to use the nickname "Dragons" in 1924. In his later life, Vernon worked 42 years for the Santa Fe Railroad as an Engineer Foreman before retiring in 1972.

Bass was a faithful member of the Purcell First Baptist Church where he served as Sunday School General Secretary for at least 15-20 years. His wife, Ruth, was the FBC organist for many years.

Vernon's son, Bill Bass (PHS Class of 1967) spent some time as the sports editor of **The Purcell Register**.

Vernon was recognized by his PHS football peers and Purcell citizens of that time period as an outstanding athlete who brought great size and strength, fantastic speed and a natural athletic ability to any sport he participated in, but especially football and track where he excelled.

He was named as a defensive back on the 1895-1934 All-Decade(s) football team selected by Purcell High School Alumni.



Big Tom Smith

Thomas G. Smith

Longtime attorney Thomas G. Smith practiced law and was involved in civic affairs and politics most of his adult life. He served as Purcell City Attorney, McClain County Attorney and as Administrative Assistant for Congressman John Jarman.

As a graduate of the University of Oklahoma, and the University of Oklahoma Law School, he was awarded Phi Beta Kappa as well as Order of the Coif. Tom became an avid Sooner fan, as well as a Dragon fan.

Smith came to Purcell from Santa Barbara, CA. Both of his parents were originally from this area. After his father had died, he returned with his mother, Dilce, and younger brother, Norman.

Having been a standout soccer player in California, Tom turned his interest to football when he moved to Oklahoma. He was over 6'1" and 135 pounds and with sprinters speed he became a breakaway threat running back from anywhere on the field.

By the time he was a junior, playing with other great talents such as Joe Al Cunningham and Vernon Turner, Purcell became a threat to win it all on Boney Matthews' first PHS football team.

In a game against Comanche, he ran for 194 yards and three touchdowns. In the 1946 Class B State Semifinals against Poteau, he ran for 107 yards, including a 79-yard dash.

Tom played on both sides of the ball with great impact, as he was also a defensive back on the 1946 PHS Football Team that registered six shutouts over a seven-game period during the regular season. For his outstanding efforts on the football field, Tom was named

to the 1940's PHS All-Decade Team as a defensive back.

The real impact Tom, or as most knew him as 'Big Tom', was on the kids and people in the town. After graduating from law school, Tom came back to practice law in Purcell. He married a girl from Chickasha, Barbara Jean Smith, and they raised five children through the Purcell School system.

Tom genuinely cared about the people in the town, always willing to help those in need, and support his fellow Dragons.

He was an avid supporter of the PHS sports teams, even long after his own children graduated from Purcell High School. Big Tom was legendary for driving across the state to watch the Dragon Track teams compete in meets. He even received a plaque from PHS Head Track Coach Bob Haley and the entire Boys Track Team called the "Rubdown Award" for his participation and support.

Big Tom was an inspiration to many, and a friend to more. He loved young people and they loved his wit and sense of humor. He loved Purcell and made Purcell a better place to be.

"Big Tom" Smith really was a Dragon forever.

Joe & Marilyn Ellis

Joe and Marilyn Ellis moved to Purcell in the winter of 1961 and that was the year that began the streak of the Ellis' attending 319 straight Purcell High School Football games as a couple.

Joe remembers many times with his job at the Santa Fe Railroad, that if he needed to lay off to see the Dragons play, he would come down with "Dragon Fever."

When asked what stood out the most, they both replied, "They all do."

They remember each season to be completely different than the one before.

They vividly remember watching Hubba Green in the mid-1960's and Joe McReynolds in the early 1970's Joe and Marilyn remember watching Cliff Thrift play every game in high school and from their recliner in 1985 when his Chicago Bears team captured a Super Bowl World Title.

Their memories are such as going to the 1972 Class A State Finals Football Game at Stillwater's Hamilton Field and seeing the Dragons bring home a State Championship.

They also remembered going back to Stillwater's Hamilton Field two years later in 1974 when the Dragons lost to Skiatook in the Class 2A State Finals.

But their memories are mostly watching their son Ronnie playing for the Dragons in the mid 1980's. They watched him helping the 1985 PHS Track Team win another State Title for Coach Bob Haley.



Harold Simeroth

Harold Simeroth was born in Purcell in 1922 where he grew up on a farm with 7 other siblings. Harold was of large stature, especially for the 1940's, and grew eventually to 6'6" and 260 pounds.

He graduated from Purcell High School in 1941, where he was a star athlete in foot-


ball, wrestling and track. He received All-State honors in all three sports.

Simeroth received an athletic scholarship to The University of Oklahoma where he continued to participate in all three of those sports. Harold lettered as a tackle for the Sooners football team in 1942.

His time at University of Oklahoma was cut short due to World War II and Harold joined the Army Corp of Engineers. He had almost completed his courses when they shut down the classes and sent him and his classmates to the front line in Europe.

Harold was in three major battles during the war including The Battle of the Bulge, The Bridge at Ramage and the Plain of Cologne. Among other accomplishments in the Army, he received three Bronze Stars and the Medal of Valor and he served under General Omar Bradley, and later under General George Patton.

After the war, Harold remained in Europe for six months as he was invited to be a part of an Armed Forces Wrestling Clinic Team. The team traveled through most of the European countries and Harold wrestled the heavy weight champion of each country. We are told that he won every match.

When Harold returned home, he attended Oklahoma A&M University where he completed his bachelor's degree in engineering. He also participated on the Oklahoma A&M wrestling team where he lettered in 1947. He also lettered on the A&M track and field team in 1943 and in 1946-1947.

Harold spent the next few years in Oklahoma but moved to California in 1951 where he worked as an engineer for Northrup. Later he was an engineer and worked on radar systems for Hughes Aircraft in Fullerton, CA. During his career at Hughes, he completed his MBA degree at Pepperdine and eventually retired from Hughes Aircraft in 1980.

In 1982, Harold was inducted into the Oklahoma State University Track Program Hall of Honors. Recently, Harold has also been selected by Purcell Football Alumni to the 1940's PHS All-Decade Football Team as a defensive tackle. He was also chosen as a member of the All-Time PHS Football Team (1895 - present day) as

a defensive tackle.

Harold married Ann Castleman in June 1942 after they had both completed their freshman year at The University of Oklahoma. They had six children including Harold (Bo), John L., Marilyn, Debbie, Danny and Rosann.

Harold and Ann were married 64 years when Ann died in 2006.

At 98 1/2 years old, Harold is still alive and just recently moved from his home, where he was living independently, into an assisted living place in Hemet, CA where he lives in his own apartment.



Bill Simeroth

Bill Simeroth

Bill Simeroth grew up in Purcell and graduated from Purcell High School in 1945, where he was a star athlete in football, wrestling and track.

A multi-talented athlete, Bill received All-State Honors in football in 1944 as an offensive tackle even after playing full-back the entire season.

After high school graduation, which was right at the end of World War II, Bill joined the Army Air Corps, where he served for two years and then was Honorably Discharged.

He then attended Oklahoma A&M University in Stillwater for two years, where he majored in economics and played on the football team and participated on the track and field team where he lettered in 1950.

After graduation, Bill joined the United States Air Force where he trained as an Aircraft Electronic Countermeasures Technician. He traveled to various special assignment locations around the world while in the Air Force including those in Alaska, Brazil, Guam and Hawaii.

It wasn't until late in Bill's life, that his family discovered that he had a "Top-Secret Clearance" from the U.S. Government and that many of his Temporary Duty (TDY) assignments were classified. One of those assignments was at Shemya Air Force Base (now known as Eareckson, Air Station) on Shemya Island, AK, which is at the far western tip of the Aleutian Islands in the Northwest Pacific Ocean.

"Project Rivet Ball" was a Top-Secret Program that was initiated with a single RC-135S (serial 59-1491, formerly a JKC-135A) on Dec. 31, 1961. The aircraft operated from Shemya AFB. This specialized RC-135S had an elongated nose radome housing an "S band" receiving antenna. The aircraft first operated under the "Nancy Rae Project" as an asset of Air Force Systems Command and later as an RC-135S reconnaissance platform with Strategic Air Command under "Project Wanda Belle." The project name "Rivet Ball"



was later assigned to the mission in January of 1967.

When Bill was first deployed to Shemya Island, he was part of the original 41 men assigned to the "Nancy Rae Project" and the men who flew and maintained this reconnaissance aircraft were known as "Ali Baba and the 40 Thieves". Bill was one of the "40 Thieves".

Throughout his career, Bill was also based at several locations including Texas, Mississippi, Florida, Ohio, Germany and in New Mexico during his 20-year Air Force career. He received The Air Force Commendation Medal for outstanding initiative and for professional competence and devotion to duty. He contributed significantly to the successful completion of a project of national importance.

Bill has been recently selected by Purcell Football Alumni to the 1940's PHS All-Decade Football Team as a defensive tackle. He was also chosen as a member of the All-Time PHS Football Team (1895 - present day) as a defensive tackle.

He married Irma Ochner in 1954. She came with a built-in family, two daughters, Sandi and Rynna. They had a son together, Craig. Bill died in March of 2007.



Peck Martin

Charles C. "Peck" Martin
Peck was a teacher at Pur-

cell High School and assistant coach to Boney Matthews in all sports from the mid-1940's into the mid-1950's.

He was known to be Boney's right hand man for many years at PHS.

Peck served as an Oklahoma High School Oil Bowl Football Coach in 1957 along with the legendary C.B. Speegle of Oklahoma City Capitol Hill High School and Art Young of Altus High School.

Peck had an overall head coaching record of 9-17-1 coaching at Wetumka from 1958-59 and at Vian in 1960.

After Stillwater, coach went to Lewisville, TX for three years.

Welcome to Fall! Remember to give thanks to God that we may get the good rain that we need.

This Sunday, October 3, many Christian churches will celebrate World Communion Sunday (WCS). This offers congregations a distinctive opportunity to experience Holy Communion in the context of the global community of faith. The first Sunday of October has become a time when Christians in every culture break bread and pour the cup to remember and affirm Christ as the Head of the Church. On that day, they remember that they are part of the whole body of believers.

Whether shared in a grand cathedral, a mud hut, outside on a hilltop, in a meeting house, or in a store front, Christians celebrate the communion liturgy in as many ways as there are congregations. WCS can be both a profound worship experience and a time for learning more about our wider community of faith. Last year the pandemic interfered with celebrating WCS in person, but many churches celebrated virtually.

The first attempt at forming an ecumenical group, the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America (FCCCA), was in 1908. WCS itself began at Shadyside Presbyterian Church in Pittsburgh, Penn., in 1933. The Rev. Hugh Thompson Kerr and his congregation sought to demonstrate the interconnectedness of Christian churches, regardless of denomination.

Rev. Kerr appropriately chose the sacrament of Holy Communion to symbolize this unity. In 1940, the FCCCA, which included all of the predecessor denominations of The United Methodist Church, adopted World-Wide Communion Sunday. The group expanded through merging with several other ecumenical organizations to become the National Council of Churches (NCC) in 1950.

During the late 1950s and early 1960s, the NCC was partially funded by the "Foundation for Youth and Student Affairs" which was a front funded by the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) to oppose communism.

The NCC is the largest ecumenical body in the United States. It is an ecumenical partnership of 38 Christian faith groups in the United States. Its member communions include mainline Protestant, Eastern Orthodox, African-American, evangelical, and historic peace churches.

The term "historic peace churches" refers specifically only to three church groups among pacifist churches: 1. the Church of the Brethren, including all its daughter churches; 2. the Religious Society of Friends (Quakers); and 3. the Mennonites, including the Amish, Beachy Amish, Old Order Mennonite, and Conservative Mennonites. This phrase has been used since the first conference of the peace churches in Kansas in 1935.

Individual adherents of more than 50 Christian faith groups actively participate in NCC study groups, commissions, and ministries. Some of these participants belong to Christian faith groups such as the Catholic Church, fundamentalist groups, Southern Baptists, and Missouri Synod Lutherans, which are not officially a part of the council's membership.

All NCC member organizations subscribe to the NCC's statement of faith, which forms the preamble to the NCC's charter: "The National Council of Churches is a community of Christian communions, which, in response to the gospel as revealed in the Scriptures, confess Jesus Christ, the incarnate Word of God, as Savior and Lord. These communions covenant with one another to manifest ever more fully the unity of the Church. Relying upon the transforming power of the Holy Spirit, the communions come together as the Council in common mission, serving in all creation to the glory of God."

The first Sunday of October has become a time when Christians in every culture break bread and pour the cup to remember and affirm Christ as the Head of the Church. On that day, we remember that we are part of the whole body of believers. If your church will be celebrating communion together virtually and you would like to participate, please have something to eat and drink ready. It can be whatever you have on hand, not necessarily bread and juice.

United Methodists believe in an open table--anyone may receive communion. The United Methodist Book of Worship says, "All who intend to lead a Christian life, together with their children, are invited to receive the bread and cup."

Please join us in celebrating World Communion Sunday this week on October 3. We invite all of you to worship with us at 9:30 a.m. We have a short fellowship after church. Sunday school starts at 11 a.m. Our address is 631 East Ash, just west of Lexington High School. Establishing legumes by the numbers

September and early October are a good time of the year to establish cool season legumes in your Bermuda grass or fescue pastures. Legumes improve the quality and production potential of a pasture due to their ability to produce their own nitrogen with the help of a Rhizobium bacteria.

Reducing the amount of nitrogen fertility required to produce the same amount of forage can have a major impact on the cost associated with keeping a cow well fed.

Many times a producer will attempt to plant legumes in a pasture with little or no success and decide that legumes will not work in his pasture system.

The truth is that legumes will do well about anywhere in southeast Oklahoma as long as the medium into which they will be planted fits a set environmental window that the legumes need in order to survive.

The following is a step by step recipe for establishing legumes in a pasture situation. All the steps must be followed if a good legume crop is expected to germinate, survive and to thrive.

No. 1—Legumes need a pH between 6 and 7 in order to grow their best. If your pH is below these levels it is best in a pasture situation to lime that pasture according to soil test this year with the intent of planting the following year.

By waiting a year you will give the lime time to react chemically with the soil. This will allow the soil to change its pH into a more hospitable place for the legumes to grow. If your pH is as low as 5 and you can't afford to lime, don't waste your time and money planting legumes, they probably won't make a stand.

No. 2—Legumes need adequate phosphorus (P) and potassium (K) levels in order to establish and grow well. If your soil test indicates that the

P&K levels are low you will need to add the appropriate amount each and every year you expect legume production.

If you add it the first year and not the subsequent years the plants that did establish will disappear over time. Don't waste your money on legumes if you are not willing to provide the P&K required by the soil test every year.

No. 3—Although legumes will respond to nitrogen fertility, it is normally not a good idea to apply nitrogen in a pasture where you are trying to establish legumes. The grasses in that pasture will utilize that nitrogen to grow aggressively and will provide those little legume plants with too much competition for light and water.

No. 4—Legume seedlings are very small and weak plants when they first emerge from the ground. They cannot stand much competition from the established pasture grasses. Pastures should be grazed down close, 2 inches or less by mid September if the legume plants are expected to survive.

Tall pasture grass not only shades the legume plants, but will have a lot of leaf area that transpires more water and will dry out the soil before the legume plant has a chance to get its root deep enough to become established.

Disking the grass sod lightly before planting will increase the odds of getting a good stand of legumes since it will set the grass plants back enough for the legume to become well established.

No. 5—Choose the right legume for the right environment. Arrowleaf clover will do well on a well drained upland soil but may fail in a wet tight soil. Conversely, white clover may grow well in tight bottom land clay that will not grow a very good crop of red clover.

No. 6—Be sure and inoculate the seed with the proper Rhizobium bacteria that is adapted to that specific species of legume. A commercial sticker should be

used when mixing the bacteria with the seed. Without proper inoculation, the plants will not produce nitrogen and the plants will not grow.

No. 7—If you are serious about establishing legumes, use a well calibrated drill to get the seed down to the soil surface where it will have a good chance of germinating and becoming established. Good seed to soil contact is essential for stand establishment.

Legumes should be planted at 1.5 times the size of the seed. If broadcast seeding must be done, increase your seeding rate by 25 to 50 percent to make up for the number of plants that will germinate and die due to the lack of seed to soil contact. Dragging a harrow over the sod after broadcasting will help get the seed down to the soil surface.

No. 8—Timing is everything. Cool season legumes should be planted in late September or early October for the best results in sod seeding conditions in Southeast Oklahoma.

No. 9—Grazing should be deferred until the plants have become well established. On annuals this could be in November. On perennials it would be best to wait until the following spring before letting cattle on the pastures. Grazing and treading of young legumes can result in a significant loss of seedlings.

No. 10—Maintenance of a legume stand is very important if stand is to remain a viable part of the forage system. A) Phosphorus and potassium levels must be kept at adequate levels if the legumes are to survive and thrive. B)

Legumes will need a rest from grazing in the spring to allow them to either refill their roots with carbohydrates or produce seed or both. C) Lightly over-seeding perennial legumes with 2 to 3 lbs of seed every fall will increase the population and longevity of the stand.

Legumes are a welcome asset in a forage system, but, just like anything else worthwhile they require some management and maintenance in order to continue to thrive and survive.

OMRF seeks volunteers for osteoarthritis study

The Oklahoma Medical Research Foundation, in collaboration with the University of Oklahoma Health Sciences Center and Oklahoma Sports Science & Orthopedics, is recruiting volunteers with osteoarthritis of the knee to study the progression of the disease.

OMRF physician-scientist Matlock Jeffries, M.D., is a lead researcher on the Systematic Oklahoma Osteoarthritis Epigenetics Research, or SOONER, study.

The ongoing research will take place at OUHSC and is open to adults with early moderate osteoarthritis of the knee.

Jeffries' research investigates the role of the microbiome — the collection of thousands of tiny organisms in our digestive tracts — in the body's response to OA. He also studies ways the immune system may predispose an individual to OA

progression.

The joint disease is the number one cause of disability in the U.S., and its treatment accounts for the largest procedure expense to Medicare annually. Despite this, Jeffries says, the advancement of the disease in people is not well understood.

"The purpose of the SOONER study is to identify biological signs that could help predict the severity of the disease," said Jeffries, a board-certified rheumatologist who treats patients at OMRF's Rheumatology Research Center of Excellence. "We're trying to understand which patients are likely to quickly develop strong symptoms so we can help improve treatment options for everyone with OA."

Volunteers will undergo a phone screening to determine eligibility. Once accepted, participants will complete visits

twice a year. These visits will include blood draws, microbiome sampling, X-rays to examine joint health and a questionnaire.

Participants will be compensated based on participation. Strict Covid-19 protocols are followed to ensure participant safety.
