Schools holding their own

Supply chain issues are seen across the country as the major cause of empty grocery store shelves and restaurants scrambling to offer full menus.

But so far area schools have been spared much of the angst those issues generate.

Dr. Sheli McAdoo, Purcell Public Schools superintendent, said obtaining bus parts, not groceries, has posed a problem.

"We utilize a food

service management company and have not had significant issues at this time, with the exception of the bottled water shortage due to the hurricane," she said.

Washington Public Schools Superintendent Chris Reynolds has a similar report on food stuffs.

"The relationship Washington has with its supply companies is outstanding," he said.

Redistricting proposals that could overhaul Oklahoma politics

Oklahoma’s only competitive congressional district over the past decade could return to firm Republican control — or it could be changed to give Democrats the best chance they’ve seen in years. State lawmakers will return to the Capitol on November 15 for a special session to complete their once-every-decade redistricting work. In addition to rewriting the boundaries for legislative districts, the Legislature is also

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tasked with creating a new map for the state’s five congressional seats. Since Oklahoma’s population grew by 200,000 residents — with much of that 5 percent growth coming in urban areas around Oklahoma City and Tulsa — there will be some big changes for many residents. Some proposed changes could dramatically shift Oklahoma’s political dynamics for the next decade. “The key question is what they are doing with (U.S. Rep.) Stephanie Bice’s district,” said Michael Crespín, director of the University of Oklahoma’s Carl Albert Congressional Research and Studies Center. “I think if or how they are going to carve up Oklahoma City is something everyone is watching.” **The Fifth District, Explained** Oklahoma’s 5th Congressional District, which currently



covers most of Oklahoma County and all of Pottawatomie and Seminole, is the state’s only congressional district that has seen competitive races since 2012. Democrat Kendra Horn broke a long-running GOP winning streak in the district in 2018 when she defeated incumbent Steve Russell with 50.7 percent of the vote. Bice retook the seat for the GOP in 2020 when she beat Horn with 52.1 percent of the vote. With Democrats holding a 220-to-212 member advantage in the U.S. House of Representatives, the race holds importance beyond the state’s borders. Last election cycle, the Hill named the 5th District one of “10 bellwether House races to watch.” Depending on what lawmakers do with redistricting, it could again play a pivotal role in the 2022 mid-term elections. State lawmakers began publicly discussing specific plans on how they will redraw congressional districts when they met Tuesday to review 10 map submissions from the public. **Proposed Changes** Six of the proposals would favor Democrats in the 5th District in a partisan lean score developed by Dave’s Redistricting App, a program the state partnered with to allow users to

submit maps to the Legislature.

Others would split Oklahoma City into multiple congressional districts, breaking up a voting block that has been trending more Democratic and making it more difficult for Democrats to win based on current demographics.

This includes a map by Pat McFerron, a longtime GOP pollster and political consultant who has given nearly \$15,000 to candidates since 2016.

McFerron’s plan would divide Oklahoma City into three congressional districts by:

- Moving part of Oklahoma City’s southwest side into the 3rd District, held by U.S. Rep. Frank Lucas, R-Cheyenne, that covers northwest Oklahoma.
- Extending the 4th District, held by U.S. Rep. Tom Cole, deeper into south Oklahoma City.
- Adjusting the 5th District so it covers most of central, northern and southeastern Oklahoma County, expands into Canadian and Logan counties and encompasses Lincoln County.

McFerron, who did not attend Tuesday’s meeting, included a statement saying his map focused on compactness and keeping whole counties together with limited splitting of precincts.

In addition to keeping the GOP strongly favored in the 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th Congressional Districts, McFerron’s map would build upon Republicans’ advantage in 5th District. The Republican partisan lean there, currently at 52.4 percent, as defined by Dave’s Redistricting App, would move to 57.9 percent.

Only two of the other public submission maps would give Republicans a higher edge.

Although the Legislature’s redistricting committee passed guidelines stating that the political makeup of the districts should not be one of the criteria map writers consider, Crespin said that is likely on lawmakers’ minds.

Since Oklahoma is not among the 14 states with independent redistricting panels, the GOP-dominated Legislature will get the final say.

“The drawing of the map is always very political,” Crespin said. “Except in a few instances where they just use population, the maps are drawn more to get a political outcome more than anything.”

At least two lawmakers, however, expressed concern about proposals to split Oklahoma City.

“I have to ask if you don’t think it’s a little bit ridiculous that I might be driving through two or three different congressional districts from my house to the Capitol,” said State House Rep. Forrest Bennett, D-Oklahoma City. “I live five minutes from here.”

He and others also expressed concern that this would split up minority groups in Oklahoma, specifically the Hispanic population on the southside, in a way that could dilute their vote.

State Sen. Julie Daniels, R-Bartlesville, also expressed concern about the idea.

“I would say my argument against three districts touching Oklahoma County is that you can end up with four urban Congress people and only one representing rural Oklahoma,” she said. “So I would have the same objections (as Bennett), but for different reasons.”

The Greater Oklahoma City Chamber of Commerce is among those that support splitting up the state’s largest city into different congressional districts. Its argument is that if multiple representatives cover Oklahoma City, the city will gain influence in the U.S. House of Representatives.

What Do the Other Proposals Say

Other public submissions took different approaches.

One map from David Greene, an Oklahoma City resident, sets out to create five “geodiverse” districts with each district containing some urban, suburban, rural and agricultural areas. This map, which likely won’t mirror the final plan passed by lawmakers, would have all five congressional districts cover parts of Oklahoma County.

This would give Republicans the biggest advantage in the 5th District of all the public submission maps. It would increase the Republican partisan lean to 62.6 percent.

Another plan from Rachel Melot, CEO of the Shawnee Chamber of Commerce known as Shawnee Forward, would keep Pottawatomie and Seminole counties in the 5th District by moving much of southwest Oklahoma County into Lucas’ 3rd District.

A proposal most closely mirroring the current congressional map came from Andy Moore, executive director of People Not Politicians, a group that unsuccessfully tried to get a state question on the 2020 ballot to create an independent and nonpartisan redistricting committee.

Moore’s plan would keep most of Oklahoma County in the 5th District with the exception of Tinker Air Force Base, which would remain in Cole’s 4th District. His map would accomplish this by moving Pottawatomie and Seminoles to the 4th District.

“In drawing this map we sought to prioritize equal representation, fairness and honesty, common sense,” he said. “Our goals were to equalize representation between the districts, minimize splitting of counties, keeping communities of interest together whenever reasonable and possible to reflect existing natural and political boundaries.”

Moore’s proposal would slightly improve Democrats’ chances in the district. But the GOP would still hold a partisan lean score advantage of 50.9 to 44.7.

What Comes Next?

State House Rep. Ryan Martinez, R-Edmond, who is one of the chairs of the Legislature’s joint Select Committee on Redistricting, said a proposed map has yet to be finalized. He said lawmakers wanted to wait for the hearing on the public map submissions before proceeding.

The committee is expected to

release their proposal “weeks” before the November 15 session starts, he said.

Once the Legislature enters the special session, Martinez said the committee will vote on proposed congressional and state legislative district maps, which need to be redrawn now that the complete Census data has been delivered.

Whatever the committee advances is likely to win support of the Republican-led House and Senate. After that, it will go on to Gov. Kevin Stitt for his signature.

If Democrats or others think the map was unfairly drawn to give Republicans an advantage, Crespin said they likely have little recourse.

State and federal courts have been reluctant to override maps based on politics alone. Crespin said that unless the maps raise constitutional concerns or run afoul of the federal Voting Rights Act, gerrymandering along political lines is not explicitly illegal.

“Just because it looks funny or it helps strengthen Bice’s chances (in 2022), that’s not necessarily illegal or anything,” he said.

Standing against vaccine mandates

I’ve been getting a lot of emails about President Biden’s call for vaccine mandates. I want to make clear I don’t support blanket mandates such as this. Vaccines should be a matter of personal freedom.

Gov. Stitt and Oklahoma Attorney General John O’Connor announced recently they would sue the Biden Administration if and when federal emergency rules are put in place to order vaccine mandates for private workers.

In a statement, O’Connor urged Oklahoma employers to disregard the Biden Administration’s demands.

I join Gov. Stitt is saying these actions are not just federal overreach but unconstitutional.

During the spring, the Oklahoma Legislature passed House

Bill 1236, which gives the attorney general the authority to monitor and evaluate whether actions by the federal government, including executive orders by the President, violate the 10th Amendment.

If a review concludes infringement, the attorney general must determine whether the state should seek an exemption or seek to have the action declared unconstitutional.

I supported this timely legislation and am thankful the new law it created is acting exactly as intended.

The 10th Amendment is very clear that what is not specifically listed as one of the limited federal powers is specifically reserved as a right of the state.

On another note, redistricting map details are still be-

ing finalized and should be released soon. Redistricting of state legislative districts as well as congressional districts is required every 10 years after the most recent Census. Census data was delayed this year, forcing the need for the Legislature to come into special session in order to finalize the process.

We held a number of virtual and town hall meetings to solicit public input into this process, and that work will be shown prior to and during our special session, which starts November 15.

On a final topic, I wanted to mention the Oklahoma Office of Management and Enterprise Services’ first-ever State

An invasion of privacy

In an attempt to pay for their irresponsible socialist spending package, Democrats have put forward a radical proposal that would authorize the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) to spy on the bank accounts of every American.

This is an outrageous invasion of privacy and contradicts U.S. societal norms.

Following public outcry, Democrats recently revised their socialist regulatory surveillance plan. However, their “scaled back” version is hardly different in its real impact.

Democrats’ snooping plan would require banks to monitor any accounts with more than \$10,000 in annual deposits or withdrawals – including inflows and outflows made with physical cash, transactions with a foreign account and transfers to and from another account with the same owner.

So along with weaponizing the IRS, Democrats want to turn local and community banks into new regulatory divisions, implemented with \$80 billion added to the taxpayers’ tab.

While the Biden Administration claims this regulation would help the IRS identify tax cheats amongst high earn-

ers, the reality is that every American who pays rent or a mortgage would be targeted.

Beyond rent or mortgage, hardworking American families could be opened up to surveillance simply by investing in a child’s college education, taking out a loan to buy farm equipment or start a small business, starting a part-time job to make some extra money or even transferring money from a savings account to a checking account or vice versa.

Indeed, this surveillance scheme is not about preventing tax evasion of wealthy people or large corporations, it is about taxing blue-collar workers and family-owned businesses, farms and ranches, so Democrats can subsidize programs and fund tax giveaways in blue states.

In response to this highly invasive proposal, I recently signed two letters to the IRS and U.S. Department of the Treasury expressing my opposition to any threshold for Americans’ bank accounts to be spied on.

Additionally, I am a co-sponsor of the Prohibiting IRS Financial Surveillance Act, which would prohibit the Treasury from requiring any financial institution to report

the ins or outs of any account maintained by the institution.

Aside from the intrusion of privacy, the proposal also raises very real fears related to cybersecurity, especially considering that the IRS is often targeted by cybercriminals and has experienced multiple data breaches in recent years.

Allowing the IRS to collect sensitive and personal financial information could pose a very serious threat to millions of Americans if another breach were to occur.

I wish I could say that the Biden Administration’s desired overreach of private banking data ended here. Sadly, there is more cause for concern over his nominee for Comptroller of the Currency, Saule Omarova, whose confirmation hearings are currently underway in the U.S. Senate.

This position oversees the charter, regulation and supervision of all national banks. A 1989 graduate of Moscow State University on the Lenin Personal Academic Scholarship, Omarova has applauded Russia’s economic system as superior.

Even more alarming, she has

Editor’s Note:
This is the column by Marietta Monitor Publisher Willis Choate that ran in their newspaper last week about the recent Amtrak-car transporter accident that happened October 15 near Marietta.

The Amtrak-car hauler collision last week was caused by something that should not have happened. Sure, the truck should not have been on the track when the train came through. That is a no-brainer. The follow-up to that is “Why was the car hauler’s long trailer sitting on the tracks?”

It appears the trailer was hung, high centered, on the rails. More than one railroad crossing in the county have been raised to the point that a long truck-trailer doesn’t have enough clearance in the middle to cross the tracks without high centering. When that happens, they can’t move forward or backward.

It appears to me that every time the track bed is reworked, additional rock is placed under the cross ties. The rails are raised while the approaches or ramps leading up to them aren’t. Over time it is raised to the point the ramp isn’t long or high enough that a trailer doesn’t drag.

I don’t believe the problem should be corrected with tax-

payer money, county, state or federal.

Hypocrisy in Sports

I have heard sports described as either soap operas or reality shows for men. It really is as Jim McKay used to say: “the thrill of victory and the agony of defeat.” The problem is that sports are meant to be fun (unless my Hokies and Razorbacks both lose as they did last week) but, with the politics of the day, they are losing some of their enjoyment as mindless entertainment. What is really starting to get hard is the hypocrisy in sports, yet, historically speaking, maybe it always has been this way.

The big news of last week was the resignation of Las Vegas Raiders Coach Jon Gruden. At first, I was not sure what I thought about an email sent 11 years ago but, as more and more inappropriate emails began to surface, it became clear that he needed to go. His emails were full of racist, homophobic, and sexist language that the NFL has condemned. It is right that the NFL condemns this type of language and the League has tried recently to stand up for what is right.

Who will pay for the \$2 trillion infrastructure project?

If you are making less than \$40,000 a year then you probably don't care that single people making over \$523,601 pay 37 percent of their income in federal taxes.

Married people filing jointly making over \$628,301 also pay 37 percent.

These people make it and can afford to pay it we often say. What affects someone else doesn't bother us that much when it comes to income and taxes.

Let's say you are making \$35,000 this year but next year you have an opportunity to make \$45,000. Suddenly your federal tax rate increases from 12 percent to 22 percent. This is a big jump. You have the opportunity to make more but more of what you make goes to taxes.

You start calculating the hours and time worked versus how much more you have to pay in taxes and you start wondering if it's worth what it will take to earn the extra income. If a great job comes your way to earn \$209,426 then you start calculating maybe it would be better to figure out how to make \$208,000 and stay in the 32 percent tax bracket.

Our government is hungry for money. The \$2 trillion infrastructure project that is on the table will mean our government will desperately need lots more money for many years to come. Our grandchildren will be saddled with this debt for most of their lives.

We need infrastructure updates. Roads, bridges, new water lines, better energy sources, internet and more. The project will create a lot of jobs. However, don't be fooled into thinking someone else will pay for the project.

We hear reports that the debt will be passed onto America's 600 billionaires. Do you really think Jeff Bezos, Elon Musk, Bernard Arnault, Bill Gates and Mark Zuckerberg are going to pay for this \$2 trillion-dollar infrastructure deal?

America's billionaires should pay their fair share like all Americans but a nation that penalizes prosperity is unfair. I don't feel sorry for billionaires but a billionaire shouldn't have to pay 40 percent of his/her earnings to the government.

Also, America's billionaires have the resources to move to another country if they choose to. Their tax rate should be fair but we shouldn't run them out

of the country.

If your income grows from \$30,000 a year to \$60,000, that is no reason for you to be penalized by your country. Congress needs to push for a flat tax and tax everyone including billionaires.

A tax rate of 12 percent to 15 percent on all individuals and corporations would encourage people to make more and America would have more money to cover our infrastructure costs.

Plus, more manufacturing would come back to America. Instead, our nation discourages prosperity by penalizing those who make more.

much worse than Gruden's. Add to that the violence and drug use these entertainers promote. I want to say sports can't have it both ways, yet it does.

There is plenty of modern history showing the hypocrisy of sports. Most recently is Lebron James, who claims to be a champion for social justice yet attacked Rockets General Manager Daryl Morey for supporting democratic protesters in China. China was threatening to cut ties with the NBA, meaning James and the NBA could lose millions.

James said of Morey, "But I believe he wasn't educated on the situation at hand and he spoke." It seemed what James really meant was Morey may not have been considering how much he might lose by supporting oppressed people not in America.

Then there is Nike, who also claims to support social justice and human rights. Nike used major social justice warriors like Megan Rapinoe and Colin Kaepernick in its ads but also refused to pay a real wage to workers in third-world countries, helping to keep those workers in poverty.

There are championship sports teams that took their conservative players to meet Democratic presidents but refused to take their teams to either Bush's or Trump's White House. Then there was Monday Night Football, which dropped country legend Hank Williams Jr. for comparing President Obama to Hitler, while having no issues with artists and celebrities who made the same references to Trump.

Speaking of Hitler: When I think of one of sport's biggest hypocrisies, he is at the center of the controversy. Most people know the story of the 1936 Olympics and American track star Jesse Owens (if you want to learn about these games

from a non-track perspective, I highly recommend Boys in the Boat). Hitler planned to use these games to showcase his nation's power and the strength of what he thought of as the "Aryan race."

What he was not prepared for was a Black man from America showing up his track and field athletes. While Hitler's Germans did win the most medals overall and the most gold medals, Owens walked away with four golds, more than any U.S. athlete at the time.

While Owens' dominance was the main story, the side story was his treatment by Hitler. After the first day of competition and after Hitler shook hands and congratulated the German winners, he left the stadium. The head of the Olympic Games told him that he either had to shake the hands of all the winners or none of them. He chose none of them.

Americans were furious and the story began to circulate that Owens, now a true American hero, was snubbed by the German leader. Yet when Owens was asked about the mistreatment, his answer was telling: "I wasn't invited to shake hands with Hitler. But I wasn't invited to the White House to shake hands with the President either."

FDR, who had spent much of his life in the South, in true hypocrisy did not invite Owens to the White House or acknowledge his accomplishments as he did with the white athletes. Americans who were outraged at Hitler did not seem to care about FDR's own snub.

It is sad that politics and hypocrisy take over what many Americans like me use to get away from the world for a short time each week. Though it has not always been the case, sports today are the one place where merit rises to the top Black or White, rich or poor, the best players in the games play together. It should be the place with the least amount of divisive language.

I applaud the NFL for condemning the words of Jon Gruden. But if the League is serious about ending the hypocrisy and truly wanting to unite the nation and end this type of language, the NFL needs to find a new half-time show.

Update from the Capitol

As we begin to wrap up interim studies this fall, the special legislative session to finalize the state's redistricting process is quickly approaching. Governor Stitt called the special session to begin on November 15, and it's expected we will convene as a legislative body throughout that week.

Many of you may be wondering what a "special session" is. This is a legislative session that is most often called outside of our normal gathering time of February through May, set by our state's constitution, to address an issue that cannot wait until the next scheduled session.

While special sessions can also occur concurrently with a regular session, they most often take place during the interim to deal with issues that cannot wait. A special session can only be called by the governor or by a two-thirds majority of the Legislature. To put that in perspective, 32 Senate members and 67 House members must be willing to call a special session if the governor does not and such a meeting is needed.

Special sessions are also very limited in scope. While any type of legislation may be brought up during a normal session, this is not the case in a special session. The reason we are meeting must be very clearly defined, and only the subjects listed on the call may be brought up.

For example, we will convene on November 15 to address the following: to redistrict Oklahoma's congressional district; to update and redistrict, as necessary, Oklahoma state legislative districts; and to amend statutory candidacy and redistricting deadlines, including amending residency and candidacy deadlines, as necessary by the Census Bureau's failure to meet the production deadline of census data.

To refresh your memory, redistricting is the process of redrawing legislative district boundaries for all 101 House and 48 Senate seats across the state. This is done every 10

years to ensure each district, and in turn, Senate or House member, has approximately the same number of constituents, resulting in equal representation. Population numbers were collected from the United States Census, which was conducted last year.

Due to Census Bureau delays caused by the COVID-19

pandemic, states across the nation were not issued finalized census information by the original deadline of April 1. In fact, we didn't receive our final numbers until August – a few months after we adjourned the First Session of the 58th Legis-

What's in your go-bag?

Most people don't prepare for disasters until it's too late. In the last decade, Oklahomans have gone through some of the worst natural disasters in history—tornadoes, floods, earthquakes, and winter storms. Whenever a disaster strikes, Oklahomans pull together.

We roll up our sleeves and get to work on cleaning up the endless piles of debris. While we cannot prevent another natural disaster from occurring, we can use these past experiences to Get Ready.

Developing a plan in the event of a disaster is one of the most important steps you can take to mitigate your risk. Having a bag packed and ready to go in case of a natural disaster will help you and your family evacuate on short notice. Here are some of the essential items you should include in your Go-Bag:

- Cash: If the power goes out, credit cards won't work. Keep cash on hand for replenishing supplies.

- Medications: Pharmacies might be closed, and hospitals could be overwhelmed. You must pack any necessary medications and assume you may not have access to refills for several days.

- A battery-powered radio: If electricity is out and cell towers are down, this is the best way to know what's happening.

- Important documents: Social Security cards, passports, birth certificates, driver's licenses, and prescriptions could be lost or destroyed in a flood, wildfire, or any natural disaster. Keep copies of these documents in a waterproof container or digital image saved online.

- Insurance Information: Keep a record of your insurance company, agent, policy numbers and phone numbers on your cell phone or download your insurance company's app. As Oklahoma's weather can be unpredictable and dangerous, everyone should be prepared for quick evacuation in case of emergency.

Keep your go-bag in a designated place and have it ready in case you have to make a sudden evacuation. Make sure all family members know where the bag is kept.

1 package of dry ranch salad dressing mix
Cheese, tortilla chips, sour cream (optional garnishes)
Cook ground beef, chopped onion, and minced garlic, drain grease.
Dump all the ingredients in the morning. Run your errands and let it cook all day. If you have it on low, you can easily cook it for 6-8 hours. If you put it on high, cook for 3 hours and then turn to low. Since all meat is cooked, it’s just about heating thoroughly and letting flavors meld.

lature in May, which is required by our state’s constitution. We used American Community Survey (ACS) data provided by the Census Bureau as an estimate of what our final population numbers would look like to redraw Oklahoma’s House and Senate districts, but we could not use that data to redraw our state’s five congressional districts since those districts have to be completed based on final information from the Census Bureau. Since we received the completed census numbers this summer, state staff have been working diligently to complete the process of drawing fair and accurate congressional maps. This year’s redistricting process has been the most transparent and open in our state’s history, with robust involvement from the public. Oklahoma citizens were even encouraged to draw their own maps based on the data and submit those for consideration. Overall, we had 21 public town hall meetings held in all four corners of the state to discuss the process as well as 10 public map submissions for congressional redistricting and nine submissions for legislative redistricting. When we reconvene in November, we will be presented with the finalized congressional maps for both chambers to approve. Because there were some differences between the data we received from the ACS and finalized census data, some House and Senate seats will also have

to be modified from the versions we passed earlier this year. Thank you again for the privilege of serving as your voice in the Oklahoma Senate. 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Don’t let kids be tricked by tobacco

This Halloween, the Tobacco Settlement Endowment Trust (TSET) is reminding parents, teachers, health care providers and community leaders about the dangers of flavored tobacco and vaping products disguised to mimic candy and other treats.

“Flavorings make it easier to start using tobacco or vape products,” said TSET Executive Director Julie Bisbee. “The staggering use of flavored tobacco products by youth threatens to reverse more than 20 years of gains made in tobacco prevention. Now a new generation of Oklahomans stand to suffer a lifetime of addiction and poor health as the tobacco industry profits.”

Research shows that flavored tobacco products have played a major role in the increase of tobacco use among youth, particularly e-cigarettes. Four out of five kids who have used tobacco started with a flavored product, whether traditional cigarettes, smokeless tobacco, e-cigarettes or nicotine-only products, which are gaining in popularity.

Nearly 31 percent of Oklahoma high school youth reported currently using one or more tobacco products, including e-cigarettes, according to the most recent data available. The CDC has stated that no tobacco use is safe for youth.

Nicotine addiction affects the

brain, which continues to develop until age 25. The younger a person is when they start using tobacco, the higher their risk of addiction and premature death.

Although federal law prohibits selling cigarettes with candy and fruit flavors, other tobacco products like little cigars, hookah, smokeless tobacco, and e-cigarettes, also known as vapes, are exempt.

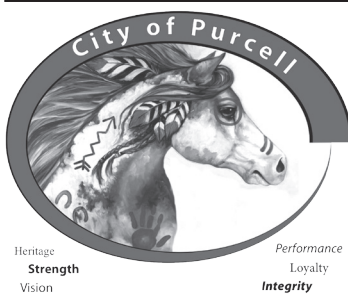
These products come in a variety of flavors, including bubble gum, candy and fruit. Menthol, a popular flavor among youth, is also exempt from the flavor ban and is still found in cigarettes, smokeless tobacco and vape products.

Brightly-colored packaging, enticing names and discreet designs also help vapor products appeal to youth and allow the device to be hidden in plain sight, making them all trick and no treat for parents and caregivers.

To help protect children from the harms of tobacco products, TSET programs provide a variety of free resources, including fact sheets, posters, conversation guide for parents and teacher lesson plans.

The TSET Healthy Youth Initiative and Tobacco Stops With Me (TSWM) focus on youth tobacco prevention and

Section R319 Site Address

R319.1 Address numbers. Buildings shall have approved address numbers, building numbers or approved building identification placed in a position that is plainly legible and visible from the street or road fronting the property.

These numbers shall contrast with their background. Address numbers shall be Arabic numbers or alphabetical letters. Numbers shall be a minimum of four inches (102mm).

Where access is by means of a private road and the building address cannot be viewed from the public way, a monument, pole or other sign or means should be used to identify the structure. This will allow emergency crews to locate the house number.

Growing and reblooming moth orchids

Brighten your indoor décor with beautiful blooming orchids. These living bouquets provide months of beauty with minimal care. Just provide the proper growing conditions and success is sure to follow.

Start with a Phalaenopsis, moth orchid, that is best suited to the home environment making it the easiest to grow. Purchase a healthy plant with green leaves, a few open flowers, lots of buds on a firm green flower stem and no signs of neglect.

Provide your orchid with proper care, similar to that of an African violet, for the best results. Water thoroughly with room temperature tap water just as the planting mix is beginning to dry. This is usually once a week in most indoor gardens. Pour off any excess water that collects in the saucer to prevent root rot.

Grow your moth orchid in a bright location near an east-, west- or slightly shaded south-facing window. Plants do best when they receive 12 to 14 hours of bright light.

Give plants growing in low light locations a boost with

artificial light. Keep lights 4 to 10 inches above the plants. Placing the plants on a reflective surface helps bounce light back up into the lower parts of the plant.

Look for one of the many economical, energy efficient and attractive options for sale. Keep the lights on for 14 to 16 hours if this is the only light the plant receives.

You can reduce the time to five or six hours for plants receiving natural light.

Boost the humidity around your orchid while creating a beautiful display by placing it among other indoor plants. As one plant loses moisture from its leaves, it increases the humidity around the neighboring plants.

Use gravel trays to further increase the humidity around all your indoor plants. Fill the saucer or plant tray with pebbles. Set the pots on the pebbles, elevating them above any water that collects in the saucer.

When you water thoroughly the excess collects in the saucer. As it evaporates, it increases the humidity around the plants right where it is needed. Fer-

tilize actively growing plants when the soil is moist.

Use a dilute solution of a complete fertilizer such as a 20-20-20 labeled for use on orchids or flowering houseplants. Avoid excess fertilization that can cause damaged black root tips, green floppy growth, and prevent flowering.

Once your orchid finishes flowering, continue growing it in a brightly lit location and water and fertilize as needed.

You can either remove the faded flowers, leaving the flower stem intact and wait for a flush of smaller flowers at the tip of the stem or cut the flower stem back above either the second or third node, the thickened part of a plant stem where new growth appears, from the bottom.

A third option is to cut the

Feed issues Rancher sues over cattle gains

Fifteen-hundred head of cattle didn't gain weight as promised in a contract and now a McClain County rancher is suing the Washita County feed yard for more than \$75,000.

The lawsuit in McClain County District Court was filed October 15.

According to the petition, John Parker and Paramount Cattle Co., contracted with Weichel Feed Yard to place the cattle on feed at Colony.

The feed yard allegedly indicated they had "ample inexpensive feed sources" for the cattle to gain 2.5 to 3 pounds per day.

Instead, according to the lawsuit, the cattle were fed "damaged" silage and the feed yard refused to provide a nutrient profile for the feed.

In addition, smaller cattle were penned with larger animals, impacting weight gain, and several cattle developed eye problems.

"To conceal ... the lack of weight gain and despite being told to refrain from this act, defendant was observed feeding the cattle early in the morning on the date the cattle were shipped out," the lawsuit reads.

This created an "artificial" weight gain, according to the petition.

Charged with rape Lexington man posts \$50K bond

A Lexington man is free after posting \$50,000 bond on a charge of rape by instrumentation.

A preliminary hearing conference for Christopher A. Hoppis, 29, in McClain County District Court will be at 9 a.m. November 10.

Hoppis' alleged victim was his stepdaughter, who told investigators she believed he had a sexual interest in her since she was 14.

According to an affidavit, the alleged incidents were first reported to the McClain County Sheriff's Department in May.

The woman, accompanied by her mother, told a detective that Hoppis inserted his finger in her while giving her a massage.

She said she was financially dependent on Hoppis as she

and her infant were living with Hoppis and her mother.

When the couple's house was repossessed, she went with them on a trip to South Carolina.

It was during that trip that Hoppis reportedly coerced her into producing sexual content for an online site, using income from that to pay travel expenses.

The woman provided investigators with her cell phone, from which they recovered text messages from Hoppis, including one stating he was sorry for having made her feel uncomfortable, according to the affidavit.

They were also able to link Hoppis to a user name on the online site,

Hoppis' attorney has advised him against agreeing to be interviewed by investigators.

Colorado woman found guilty

A Colorado woman will serve four years in prison after a McClain County District Court jury found her guilty of first-degree manslaughter in the fiery pre-dawn death of a trucker nearly five years ago.

Joyce M. Holladay, 65, of Aurora, was also found guilty of two other counts and fined a total of \$1,300.

Those counts include leaving the scene of a fatality accident and operating a motor vehicle without a valid license.

Formal sentencing will be at 9 a.m. December 3.

On Nov. 17, 2016, Holladay was driving a 1992 Ford F800 and pulling a small single-axle trailer, part of a two-vehicle convoy traveling north on I-35. She was joined by Stuart Abdo

and Thomas Hoskins.

They had picked up the truck from a repair facility in Texas and were enroute to Colorado.

The truck was known to have electrical issues affecting the rear lights and the trailer lights were inoperable.

The vehicles pulled off the interstate south of Ladd Road to get fuel, but the station was closed.

They continued north with Hoskins driving the second vehicle.

The truck and trailer had just crested a hill and was traveling approximately 40 mph when it was hit from behind by a 2010 International semi pulling a 53-foot trailer.

The impact pushed the truck and small trailer into the me-

dian, where it rolled.

The semi ran off the right side of the highway, catching fire and killing the driver, Daniel Moghrabi, 53.

Holladay and Abdo were able to get out of their truck and were picked up by Hoskins.

Bypassing the Goldsby exit, they continued north to State Highway 9 West.

The trio arrived at Love's around 5:09 a.m., but waited until 5:23 to enter the store.

A store employee told investigators the three were acting strange.

Holladay told Oklahoma Highway Patrol Lt. Heath Meyer that she didn't use drugs.

However, a blood sample drawn from Holladay at the hospital showed drug presence.

Physical therapist reflects on career, education during National Physical Therapy Month

Recent Langston University graduate Dr. Mikayla Orr said that physical therapy is a career in which she is helping people improve their quality of life.

After earning her Doctorate of Physical Therapy, Dr. Orr began her professional career in August with the Chickasaw Nation at the Purcell Outpatient Clinic.

Dr. Orr said in her line of work every day is different and every patient is different. Physical therapy involves working with people who have many different problems. From learning how to balance again after traumatic brain injury to learning to walk after hip replacement, each case has its own set of challenges that she and the patient must identify and overcome together. Training people to use their bodies to their full potential is rewarding to Dr. Orr.

"I have a lifetime of learning ahead of me," Dr. Orr said. "There is so much for me to learn, both on the job through my patients and through continuing education. I am honored to be that constant person caring for my patients during some of the most difficult times of their lives. To be there for them and help them exceed their goals is so rewarding."

Dr. Orr grew up in Jenks.

Before attending Langston University, she spent time in Ada.

She receives her Chickasaw heritage from her father, Mike Orr. Dr. Orr is appreciative of the period she spent within the Chickasaw Nation, graduating with a Bachelor's of Science from East Central University. "I have great pride in being Chickasaw, being part of the Chickasaw Nation," Dr. Orr said. "Governor Anoatubby has really helped all his people – not just Chickasaws but all Oklahomans. I am proud to be Chickasaw."

Her Chickasaw heritage is something she has always been aware of. It has always been a part of Dr. Orr's life. According to Dr. Orr, the Chickasaw Nation has played an important role in helping her achieve her educational goals, and that has carried on to her professional career. She is proud to be able to give back to the people who have given her so much.

"I am at the Purcell Outpatient Clinic," Dr. Orr said. "I love it. The staff is knowledgeable and welcoming. It is a family atmosphere."

Typically, Dr. Orr works with First American patients in the Purcell Outpatient Clinic from four to eight weeks. This could be longer if needed. She reha-

bilitates many types of injuries.

At Langston University, Dr. Orr spent three years in classroom and clinical settings. Her last year of training was comprised of internships at various clinics and hospitals, in both outpatient and inpatient settings. These included St. Francis Hospital at its Neuro Rehabilitation Center in Muskogee and its acute care facility in Tulsa, among others.

Dr. Orr believes working with a patient's family may be as important as working with the patient, themselves.

"If the patient wishes, it is always good to involve the family in physical therapy," Dr. Orr said. "Family education is really important, especially if someone is going to be dependent on their family. Of course, with pediatric patients you work closely with parents or their guardians. It's important to let them know what is going on in therapy in order for them to take part at home, if needed."

Dr. Orr plans to continue working for the Chickasaw Nation for the foreseeable future. She will also continue taking advantage of learning opportunities to stay at the top of her profession.

She currently resides in Norman with her fiancé, Austin Little.

Supply:

“We have had to substitute a few items, but our menu has not changed for the most part.”

The most difficult items to keep in stock are paper goods and cleaning supplies, he added.

As for those bus parts, McAdoo acknowledged there have been some delays in service while waiting for them to arrive.

“We are trying to be proactive and anticipate needs to give ourselves plenty of time to receive parts,” she added.

Lexington Public Schools has been able to find the “necessities,” according to superintendent Chad Hall.

“But we are having great difficulty getting any big items,” he added.

At Wayne Public Schools, superintendent Toby Ringwald

said it just seems like everything is “delayed.”

For example, the styrofoam trays used in the cafeteria are a hard-to-obtain item.

Food that is ordered comes in, but not necessarily when expected.

That has led to some “on-the-fly” menu moves, shuffling the announced meal to a different day.

A bigger concern, he said, are orders for items like textbooks.

“They trickle in,” Ringwald said, “three or four at a time.”

Wayne is also still waiting for new library furniture that was ordered before the school year started and the speakers for a new sound system in the auditorium.

“We’re putting off some things until later in the year,” he said.

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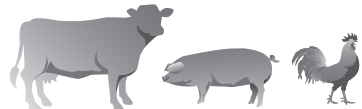

I do not know about the rest of you, but I can really see a difference in the prices of everything we buy from food to gas. The prices are rising fast.

What bothers me the most about all of this is the affect it is having on the people who served in our country. We are receiving more requests for assistance than I have ever seen.

Last week, two families called to ask if we had any cars to donate or sell as both were walking. For the last 15 or so years we would accept the donation of cars and trucks and then either give them to a veteran in need or sell them to raise funds to support our mission. It may just be a sign of the times that no one has donated a car or truck lately.

Most of you who have seen how we assist veterans with transportation to their VA medical appointments help with the cost of medical diagnosis

and evaluations for those who cannot afford them. I do not have the answers to what has caused this situation, it is the pandemic, or just the new era. I do know there is a shortage of some items where we shop, and then you watch the news where it shows hundreds of container ships waiting to be unloaded. It appears to me we should move some of that manufacturing back to America.

As we continue to see an increase in the number of surviving spouses who need assistance filing a claim for DIC benefits, I would like to say one more time everyone should know what your veteran's service-connected disabilities are.

If a Veterans Death Certificate lists a service-connected disability as the primary cause of death, or listed as a contributing factor, the surviving spouse and dependents will be able to receive VADIC benefits. Many times, the attending physician will not have access to the medical records of the veteran and is not aware of conditions that may have contributed to the veteran's death.

We have found that many of the attending physicians will assist surviving spouses to request that an amended Death Certificate be issued by the department of vital statistics.

The thirty-first Sunday in Ordinary Time is October 31, 2021. In the Catholic church, the focus of gospel readings switches from year to year. Year A focuses on the gospel of Matthew, year B focuses on Mark, and Year C focuses on Luke. During each year, there are readings from the gospel of John but John’s gospel is not the focus of an entire year like the other gospels.

The gospels of Matthew, Mark, and Luke contain many of the same events, sometimes

in the same chronological order. There are clearly differences, too, but the fact that all three gospels emphasize certain events recognizes the importance of certain values.

The Gospel reading for October 31 is from Mark 12. 28B One of the scribes came to Jesus and asked him, “Which is the first of all the commandments?” 29 Jesus replied, “The first is this: Hear, O Israel! The Lord our God is Lord alone! 30 You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all

your soul, with all your mind, and with all your strength.

31 The second is this: You shall love your neighbor as yourself. There is no other commandment greater than these.” 32 The scribe said to him, “Well said, teacher. You are right in saying, ‘He is One and there is no other than he.’ 33 And ‘to love him with all your heart, with all your understanding, with all your strength, and to

This weekend is Halloween (October 31), also known as All Hallows’ Eve. A “hallow”

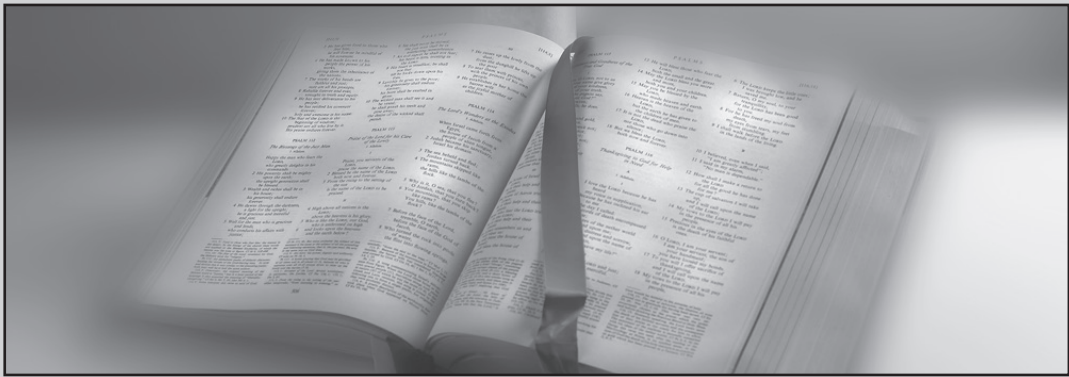

church, both known and unknown, particularly those who do not have a special feast day of their own or who have not been formally canonized.

We mainline Protestants inherited the listing of the known saints and their feast days from the Roman Catholic church. It is observed by the United Methodist Church, the Lutheran Church, and some other

love your neighbor as yourself’ is worth more than all burnt offerings and sacrifices.”

This paragraph and the next paragraph are from the October 29, 2021 column about Matthew 22:34-40. Jesus’ answer was a succinct summary of the Ten Commandments. The first three commandments are about our relationship to

God and the last seven are about our relationships with others. If you want to look at the commandments, they are in two places in the Bible, in the 20th Chapter of Exodus and in the 5th Chapter of Deuteronomy. They are also referenced several times in the New Testament.

Halloween, the evening before All Saints’ Day, soon incorporated some of the traditions of the ancient Celtic festival of Samhain (“SAW-win”). The Celts celebrated their new year on November 1, so Halloween was the equivalent of New Year’s Eve for us. People would light bonfires and wear costumes to scare off the ghosts that could pass between the spirit worlds on Samhain. Over time, Halloween evolved into a day of activities like trick-or-treating, carving pumpkins into jack-o-lanterns, donning costumes, playing games and eating treats.

In 1000 A.D. the church made November 2 All Souls’ Day, a

day to commemorate all those souls who have died and are in Purgatory. It can also be called the Day of the Dead. (We still see celebrations for the Day of the Dead, or Dia de los Muertos, for this time, especially in Hispanic communities.)

It’s believed that the church was attempting to replace the Celtic festival of the dead with a related, church-sanctioned holiday. This is much like the commemoration of the Nativity was “moved” from summer to Christmas on December 25 to replace the Saturnalia festival and the Yule festivities of the Winter Solstice on December 21.

On All Saints’ Day Catholics go to Mass and observe the

holiday typically by reading of the Beatitudes given in Jesus’ Sermon on the Mount from the Gospel of Matthew. Other groups may place candles or flowers on the graves of those who died during the year.

Something to keep in mind: you don’t have to be canonized to be a saint. A saint isn’t a statue in a church or in a garden. The Bible tells us that anyone who trusts in Christ alone for salvation is also a saint. (See Acts 9:13, Acts 26:10, Romans 8:27, and 1 Corinthians 1:2.) All Saints’ Day reminds us of our connectedness as Christians. It expresses a conviction that there is a spiritual connection between those in Heaven and

on Earth.

If you have a hymnal, you may want to read the words to a song called “For All the Saints.” Remember to give thanks for those who have guided others to Christ and to those who have influenced your spiritual growth. Remember: You are a saint, too.

The curtain is flowing, and the falls come almost straight down with a chorus of white water beating against age-old black and rusty rocks.

It is there that you get a rare view of peace and power joining together. You understand.

Coming to the falls, you see two sections, the one to the right not reaching quite as high and not flowing with the powerful force of the other. Facing the falls, the waterfall to your left is divided again into two sections,

one just above the other, the highest one hovering several hundred feet above the closest point you can stand.

All three sections of the falls, though divided, collapse together, beating against water, rock, and dirt until they all meet some three-hundred feet below the highest point. Then the water travels through several smaller falls until there’s a happy reunion when it flows together down the creek. There together again, it leaps playfully over one smaller waterfall after another, like a child skipping over mud puddles.

With all their dips and turns, the water falls continually –

never slowing, never pausing. From melting snow, from underground springs, from hidden reservoirs of water, it all gathers at the top of this mountain to have its chance to crash down together. For each drop of water, it’s a once-in-a-lifetime experience.

There’s a peace about Anna Ruby Falls, with its solitude, majesty, grandeur, and echoing sounds. You can stand at the bottom of the falls for hours and listen to it crash and roar, feel the cool breeze as it blows off of the water, breathe deeply as the water and air massage your mind.

That peace is something

indescribable. It reminds of “a peace that passes understanding.” That thirst for peace is the thirst David possesses. That peace within a man is no small thing. While peaceful, its flowing within us is as powerful as the hurling waters of the falls crashing down endlessly onto the rocks below, spewing and spitting as they go.

Such peace, and such power, mixed together from the Divine hand, can only come from the eternal source, just as that hand formed the ever-flowing stream of northern Georgia’s Anna Ruby Falls.

OMRF co-leading national extra dose Covid-19 vaccine trial

The National Institutes of Health has named the Oklahoma Medical Research Foundation one of the lead sites for a nationwide COVID-19 vaccine clinical trial.

The study will assess the antibody response to an extra vaccine dose in people living with certain autoimmune diseases who did not respond well to an original COVID-19 vaccine regimen.

OMRF Vice President of Clinical Affairs and Arthritis and Clinical Immunology Research Program Chair Judith James, M.D., Ph.D., is one of the study's lead investigators. The Phase 2 trial, called COVID-19 Booster Vaccine in Autoimmune Disease Non-Responders, is sponsored and funded by the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases (NIAID), a part of NIH.

NIAID selected OMRF as one of the lead trial sites due to its designation as an Autoimmunity Center of Excellence, one of just 10 in the nation. James, an immunologist and board-certified rheumatologist, is internationally recognized for her work on autoimmune conditions. Since the earliest months of the pandemic, she's led a team investigating the body's immune response to COVID-19.

The first Oklahoman to enroll in the trial was Darrell Barnett, a patient in OMRF's Multiple Sclerosis Center of Excellence.

"When I heard about the extra dose for people who had low antibodies, I wanted to come in right away. I want to do anything I can do to help," said Barnett. "It feels awesome that this might mean things can go back to normal."

An estimated eight percent of Americans have an autoimmune disease, including a disproportionate number of people in the minority communities most severely impacted by COVID-19. Researchers have reported higher rates of severe COVID-19 and death in people with autoimmune disease than in the general population. It is unclear whether this is attributable to the autoimmune disease, the immunosuppressive medications taken to treat it, or both.

"We're concerned about

people with autoimmune conditions because they are more likely to have breakthrough episodes of COVID even when fully vaccinated due to an inadequate antibody response to their original vaccine regimen," said James, who holds the Lou C. Kerr Chair in Biomedical Research at OMRF.

"In this study we are testing whether giving these people an extra vaccine dose, potentially while pausing their autoimmune disease medicines, will elicit a stronger antibody response without flaring their autoimmune disease," James concluded.

The study team will enroll approximately 600 participants at more than a dozen sites nationwide.

The study will initially include people with one of five autoimmune diseases: multiple sclerosis, rheumatoid arthritis, pemphigus, systemic sclerosis or systemic lupus erythematosus.

Participants must have a negative or suboptimal antibody response to two doses of the Moderna or Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 vaccines or one dose of the Johnson & Johnson COVID-19 vaccine, all received before enrollment. Participants must also be taking one of three immunosuppressive therapies: mycophenolate mofetil or mycophenolic acid, methotrexate, or B cell-depleting drugs such as rituximab or ocrelizumab.

All participants will get an extra dose of the same COVID-19 vaccine as they received initially. Participants taking MMF/MPA or MTX will be randomly assigned to continue taking their immunosuppressive medication without alteration or to pause taking their medication for a short period before and after receiving the extra vaccine dose.

Samples collected from all participants over the next 13 months will be processed and stored at OMRF. Preliminary results are expected in November 2021.
