Veterans Day honors all who served

By late 1918, the world was weary of war.

The global conflict of World War I ended with an armistice on the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month.

And the world gave a collective sigh.

Armistice Day was

remembered one year later and a Congressional resolution in 1926 called for November 11 to be an annual observance.

The date gained national holiday status in 1938. It was celebrated as Armistice Day until 1954 when President Dwight Eisenhower renamed it Veterans Day.

In 1971, the observance was moved to the fourth Monday in October. But the date change was short-lived and in 1975



§ 106-405 Junk Vehicle on Private Property Prohibited.

No person in charge or control of any property within the city, whether as owner, tenant, occupant, lessee, or otherwise, shall allow any partially dismantled, non-operating, wrecked, junked, or unlicensed vehicle to remain on such property longer than seven days and no person shall leave any such vehicle on any property within the city for a longer time than seven days.

This section shall not apply with regard to a vehicle in an enclosed building, a vehicle on the premises of a business enterprise operated in a lawful place and manner when necessary to the operation of such business enterprise, or a vehicle in an appropriate storage place or depository maintained in a lawful place and manner by the city.

> The soldiers retreated to the Philippine Peninsula when Japanese forces were reinforced and overwhelmed the U.S.-Filipino soldiers.

> On April 9, 1942, the U.S. and Filipino soldiers surrendered after seven months of battle combined with exposure to the extreme elements, disease, and lack of vital supplies. The tens of thousands of U.S. and Filipino soldiers were forced to become prisoners of war to the Japanese. The soldiers faced horrifying conditions and treatment as

The soldiers were deprived of food, water, and medical attention, and were forced to march 65 miles to confinement camps throughout the Philippines.

The captive soldiers were marched for days, approximately 65 miles through the scorching jungles of the Philippines. Thousands died. Those who survived faced the hardships of prisoner of war camps and the brutality of their Japanese captors.

The POWs would not see freedom until 1945 when U.S.-Filipino forces recaptured the lost territory.

These soldiers would be impacted by the poor conditions of the camps and the mistreatment by their Japanese captors. from Bataan.com). My wife's grandfather, Lyle C. Harlow, was one of the thousands who lived through the 65-mile march and almost four years as a prisoner of war. When he and the others who survived were freed, he came back to his wife in Kentucky who had also survived and a daughter born right after his departure overseas.

He returned broken, weighing less than a hundred pounds and had to rebuild his life essentially from zero.

Harlow like thousands of others, never received a dime from the United States government after his release from the military. He received some VA medical benefits and would later die in a VA

How can parents prevent digital damage to teens?

Social media algorithms can subvert children's normal social growth patterns and replace them with reinforced negativity about bullying, unrealistic body imagery and depression, Oklahoma State University Extension specialists said.

Fortunately, parents and other caregivers still wield some of the strongest tools to counter damage caused by those digital platforms. But winning the fight won't be easy.

"It's about keeping up with our kids' lives, knowing who they talk to, how it makes them feel, the problems they're struggling with," said Rachel Morse, OSU Extension youth mental health specialist. "Sometimes, ultimately, we make our best guess. But as long as parents and guardians show their attention is coming from a place of love and concern, it will make a difference."

Leaked Facebook documents examined by Congress in early October show company officials knew for years that its Instagram app was making body image issues worse for teenagers, particularly girls.

By its very nature, social media influences users to click hyperlinks to popular material instead of steering away from harmful content, a point emphasized by the Facebook whistleblower.

The congressional documents also show company algorithms prioritized angry emoji news posts. Online platforms push content tailored to each user's profile of online behavior, creating a spiral of self-perpetuating negative interests.

A key difference between the experience of electronic media and face-to-face interactivity is the speed at which it occurs. The smartphone echo chamber never ends, whereas talking with people in real space

toxic thoughts and allows the opportunity for parents to enter the conversation, Morse said.

Humans are naturally prone to make social comparisons – among family, peers, coworkers and even celebrities – but coping with emotions that accompany those comparisons is a skill that takes a lifetime to hone, said Ron Cox, OSU Extension child and family sciences specialist.

As children enter adolescence, they need feedback from peers to help them determine their own identities. That is why they seemingly soak up comments like sponges, both good and bad. It is not a new phenomenon, but it has gotten more problematic since the advent of the internet.

Because the internet is always on with such easy access, Extension specialists include: the youth become addicted to their friends' approval.

a fertile ground for kids trying to navigate that stage of development," Cox said. "Developmentally, they're trying to figure out, 'Who am I? And who am I in relation to you?' They can't do that in a vacuum."

When a teen's emotions take a dark turn, it might be more than an age-appropriate bad mood. Over time, toxic social media exposure can build up and trigger eating disorders, anxiety attacks, substance abuse, suicidal thoughts and other problems.

Pandemic pressures – health, isolation, uncertainty – have made social media's influence even tougher to manage.

Being able to assess subtle that cutting kids off completely behavioral shifts requires knowing the child's or teen's baseline behavior, which a parent can only develop from conversations, said Laura all access. Discuss it. Be more Hubbs-Tait, OSU Extension parenting specialist.

Changes in daily behaviors related to health and safety are

provides time to reconsider important signals to parents to initiate more serious talks with the youth and to seek professional help if the conversation doesn't reduce parental concerns.

A particularly dangerous aspect of the influence of social media is often referred to as the contagion effect. Like a virus, ideas can spread over the internet, provoking kids to do things they wouldn't otherwise do.

Cox said research has found spikes in suicide attempts shortly after news of an adolescent committing suicide hits the media.

Parents should be especially vigilant during those times and not be afraid to ask even the toughest question: "Have you been thinking about harming or killing yourself?"

Other tips provided by OSU

• Set online time limits – this is more than a response to a "Social media has become toxic environment; it can also help children learn to manage other interests.

> • Activate electronic parental controls-native apps and thirdparty developers offer ways to put boundaries on social media use.

• Talk more – still the most useful approach overall, engaging in meaningful conversation with children face to face lays the foundation for years of good judgement and self-respect.

Also, don't make social media changes feel like punishments or personal judgments. Focus on the power to make good choices, discuss alternatives and consider consequences, they said.

"Parents need to remember is like keeping them from a necessary developmental process of figuring out who they are," Cox said. "Don't forbid involved in your child's life and help them navigate difficult

"Understanding the differences in how males and females age is a critical barrier to developing sex-specific treatments," Stout said. "This is an important building block in combatting diseases of aging and chronic illness."

The grant, R01 AG070035-01A1, is funded by the National Institute on Aging, a part of the NIH.

In a profession that involves backbreaking labor, life-altering financial decisions and the favor of Mother Nature, farmers and ranchers are especially vulnerable to mental

The number of Oklahomans who struggle with a mental health condition such as anxiety or depression jumped 25 percent during the pandemic. Other research also published by the Oklahoma-based, nonpartisan Healthy Minds Policy Initiative reported the state's rural suicide rate has increased 27 percent since 2017, compared with a 3 percent rise in urban areas.

That's why the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food and Forestry requested training and education for help from the Oklahoma State University Center for Health Sciences and OSU Extension to develop Heal the Harvester, teracting with farmers and a Project ECHO line of assistance for rural Oklahomans. Hundreds of Project ECHO programs worldwide connect community providers with support specialists through virtual sessions on learning and mentorship.

OSU's Project ECHO offers several training courses on topics, such as addiction medicine jobs even better." and pediatric psychiatry.







The Wednesday evening Bible class examined the lyrics of four more songs in the song book the congregation uses in the light of scripture.

The Sunday morning adult Bible class, continuing a study of racism, looked at some of the terminology used by those promoting Critical Race Theory. The terms "racist," "not-racist" and "antiracist" and their definitions were discussed.

During the Sunday morning assembly Keith Shackleford presented a lesson which examined the reign of King Uzziah of Israel. First it was noted from the 26th chapter of Second Chronicles that he became king when he was 16 years old and reigned 52 years.

The final point of the lesson was that the Lord's supper is to be taken by all Christians on the first day of each week (1 Corinthians 16:2-3, Acts 20:7, Acts 2:42).

Today is Veterans Day, when we remember all of our U.S. military veterans both living and dead. This was originally known as Armistice Day. An armistice is a ceasefire signed between two or more parties for the suspension of armed hostilities. The signing parties maintain the state of war between the parties, but suspend hostilities for a period of time.

An armistice is a truce, not a peace treaty. The armistice initially expired after a period of 36 days and had to be extended several times. A formal peace agreement was only reached when the Treaty

of Versailles was signed in 1919. Many Western countries and associated nations have since changed the name of the holiday from Armistice Day to Veterans Day. It was changed in the United States in 1954. Pastor David's sermon this

past Sunday told the story of Desmond Thomas Doss, who was born Feb. 7, 1919 and died March 23, 2006. He was a U.S. Army corporal who served as a combat medic with the 77th Infantry Division in World War II. He was twice awarded the Bronze Star for actions in Guam and the Philippines.

Doss further distinguished himself in the Battle of Okinawa by saving 75 men, becoming the only conscientious objector to receive the Congressional Medal of Honor for his actions during the war. His life is the subject of the documentary "The Conscientious Objector" and the 2016 Oscar-winning film "Hacksaw Ridge."

In March 1941 he started working as a ship joiner at Newport News shipyard in Virginia. When the U.S. entered the Second World War after the Battle at Pearl Harbor, he volunteered to join the Army despite being given the option of deferment because of his work in the shipyard. He joined the Army on April 1, 1942, in Virginia.

He was a devout Seventh Day Adventist who refused to carry weapons to the battlefield. He staunchly believed in "Thou shalt not kill" and in observing the Sabbath on Saturday, which put him in conflict with his Army superiors from the start of his training days.

He later said that he wanted to help those who were fighting for our country, even though his religious beliefs did not allow him to bear weapons. He

preferred to describe himself as a "conscientious cooperator" instead of a "conscientious objector."

When he enlisted, he refused to carry weapons and had to endure a lot of criticism, ridicule, and bullying at the hands of his colleagues and superiors in the Army because of his religious views. Though he wanted to become a combat medical soldier, i.e. a medic, he was assigned to a rifle company because his superiors wanted him to quit the Army. He was almost courtmartialed for refusing a direct order to carry a rifle.

There was also an attempt made to file a "Section 8" charge against him so that he could be discharged from the Army on mental health grounds. However, he survived these attempts and continued his training. In spite of the efforts to force him out of the Army, his superiors finally decided to train him as a combat medic and to exempt him from duty on Saturdays. His selfless dedication to his work earned him the respect of these same people, resulting in his being awarded many medals for his service.

In John 15:13, "Greater love has no one more than this, that someone lay down his life for his friends." In 1 John 3:16-18, "By this we know love, that he laid down his life for us, and we ought to lay down our lives for the brothers. But if anyone has the world's goods and sees his brother in need, yet closes his heart against him, how does God's love abide in him? Little children, let us not love in word or talk but in deed and in truth."

Doss exemplified these teachings. After he completed his training, his division was assigned to serve on the Eastern Front in Asia to fight the Japanese. He was recognized as a fearless combat medic who did not care for his own life while tending to the injured on the battlefield.

He earned a reputation of going fearlessly into battle to help and evacuate his injured comrades without bothering much about the flying bullets or exploding shells around him. While serving in Guam and the Philippines in 1944, he was awarded a couple of Bronze Stars with a V device for his heroic service and meritorious achievement in battle.

In May 1945, he participated with his platoon in the Battle of Okinawa with the mission to secure "Hacksaw Ridge." The Japanese had a diabolical plan. They offered minimum resistance until the Americans climbed up the ridge to reach the plateau.

When the Americans successfully reached the plateau, the Japanese launched their counterattack resulting in many casualties. Overall, America lost 12,281 soldiers while 110,000 Japanese troops were killed in

the Battle of Okinawa. In this battle at Hacksaw Ridge, Doss showed no regard for his own safety. He tended to the injured American soldiers on the Ridge and single-handedly lowered each and every soldier from the plateau. He refused to leave a single soldier behind, although his own life was at risk.

He worked continuously for (405) 406-6174.

12 hours amidst heavy gunfire, exploding artillery shells, and hand-to-hand combat to save as many soldiers as he could. He helped rescue at least 75 wounded men, including some Japanese soldiers, by treating their injuries after lowering them down the cliff. The level of courage and endurance Doss demonstrated is beyond the imagination of most of us.

In the New Testament, war is universally seen as evil. Jesus emphasized peace instead of war and advised us to avoid retaliation and revenge, extending love even to our enemies. Unfortunately, that is not the nature of humankind. Too often we look for battle when peace and love are the true solution.

Desmond Doss took his faith in God and made the transition we often face in life with the very character God placed in him. He made that transition with his deeply held beliefs in the value of human life without regard to a particular nationality. He put aside his fears and anger, reaching out to the world in which he lived and made a difference. Can we as Christians really do any differently?

ORDINANCE NO. 16 3-21

AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWN OF COLE, OKLAHOMA, AMEND-16-12 IN CHAPTER 16, AND ADOPTING AND ADDING NEW SECTION 16-1 TO SAID CHAPTER 16, WHICH SECTION AMENDS THE WATER AND FEES FOR COLLECTION FOR SAID TOWN.

BE IT ORDAINED by the TOWN BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF COLE. **OKLAHOMA**

SECTION 1. Section 16-12 of "Code" REPEALED.

Section 16-12, Article 2, Chapter 16, is hereby repealed. SECTION 2. New Section 16-12 Adopted and added to "Code" A new section 16-12 is hereby adopted and added to Article 2, Chapter 16 of the "Cole Code of Ordinances", which Section 16-12 shall now read as follows:

Section 16-12. Water Rates, Fees, and Charges.

1. The following rates shall be in effect for the water service provided by the Town of Cole, Oklahoma (except as this schedule may be affected or altered by the User Charge System in Article 9 of this Chapter):

a.	First 1000 Gallons	\$21.58	
b.	2000 Gallons	\$32.83	
C.	3000 Gallons	\$44.28	
d.	4000 Gallons	\$55.98	
e.	5000 Gallons	\$67.68	

2. Deposits for water service shall be two hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00); the Town will provide connection services, upon written request and payment of a reasonable fee, to be determined (on the basis of cost) by motion of the Town Board.

3. Each new water connection to the municipal water system shall cost three thousand five hundred dollars (\$3500.00) and shall be computed as one (1) consumer, except in cases where one (1) family, business, or commercial establishment, in such cases, EACH family, business, or commercial establishment receiving water shall be computed as (1) consumer.

4. If a bill for water service is not paid in FULL within five (5) days of the due date: (I.E. 20th of each month), service will be turned off and a fee of fifty dollars (\$50.00) will be added to the water bill.

If the turn-off day fulls on a weekend or holiday, a fee of seventy-five

dollars (\$75.00) will be added to the water bill.

5. If water service has to be disconnected for lack of payment within five (5) days of turnoff, there will be a fee of fifty dollars (\$50.00) added to the water service bill. There will be an additional fee of fifty dollars (\$50.00) added to the water service bill BEFORE water service will be reestablished. 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


