An Interesting Neighbor
Everyone has a story

Some 15 months ago, Clayton Lee sat down with The Purcell Register and talked about his service in Vietnam and lingering health problems linked to his exposure to Agent Orange.

He explained how, after enduring bouts of skin disease and cancer, the Dale Graham Veterans Foundation helped him obtain a 100 percent disability from the Veterans Administration.

He was so grateful that when he closed his auto repair business in Dibble in 2005, he put himself at the DGVF's disposal.

On call 24/7, Clayton is one of two transport drivers who volunteer to shuttle fellow veterans to doctor appointments, medical tests and the like.

Together, they have put more than 300,000 miles on the foundation's Ford van.

There are veterans from multiple conflicts and wars, starting with World War II and Korea and continuing with Vietnam, Desert Storm and the Global War on Terror.

He's done it going on 17 years and shows no signs of slowing down although after turning 78 in October 2021 he conceded that quitting after three more years was possible.

Then again, he may just continue what he's doing "as long as I'm in pretty good health."

Over the years, Clayton estimates he might have transported 200,000 or more veterans to assorted locations and appointments.

Those journeys have taken him all over the state. Literally. He has racked up 100,000 miles a year behind the wheel and said 99 percent of his volunteer time has

Bill filed to give counties more say in marijuana apps

Rep. Todd Russ, R-Cordell, has filed legislation for the upcoming session that will give county voters the say over who is licensed to grow marijuana within their counties.

House Bill 2989 would require applications to grow marijuana to be filed by June 30 each year in the county where the grow facility is to be located. County Commissioners would then set a date for a vote to be held every other year for applications to be approved or denied.

If denied, an applicant would not be able to reapply for five years within that county. If growers operate in multiple counties, they would have to apply and be approved by voters in each county where they do business.

"Many of our rural voters did

not approve the state question that resulted in the legalization of medical marijuana in our state," Russ said. "Yet they are saddled with the ill consequences. And they are facing

The Cleveland County Board of County Commissioners has issued a 14-day burn ban for Cleveland County in response to high fire danger as verified by Cleveland County fire chiefs.

This ban is effective immediately and prohibits all fires, campfires, bonfires, burning trash or other materials.

Enforcement of this county burn ban may be carried out by

Supreme Court denies overturning McGirt 31 times

The Supreme Court on Monday in a sweeping series of rulings denied 31 Oklahoma appeals of multiple McGirt-related decisions, a landmark case that reaffirmed the Muscogee (Creek) reservation in eastern Oklahoma had never been dissolved.

The court's decisions came a weekend after it agreed to review one of the more than 30 appeals the state has lodged since the McGirt ruling was issued in 2020. The court last week agreed to hear one appeal, Oklahoma v. Castro-Huerta, that the state should have authority to prosecute non-Natives who commit crimes against Native Americans in Indian Country.

The controversial Supreme Court ruling grew out of the McGirt v. Oklahoma case, a July 2020 decision by the court affirming the Muscogee Nation's Reservation boundaries. Oklahoma courts have since ruled that the reservations of the Cherokee, Choctaw, Chickasaw, Seminole and Quapaw tribes were never dissolved by Congress.

The sweeping denials are a significant setback in Oklahoma Gov. Kevin Stitt's effort's to overturn the McGirt ruling.

While Stitt didn't comment on the Supreme Court's denials on Monday, his communications director Carly Atchison said the state is encouraged that the court agreed on Friday to hear a case involving a non-native accused of child abuse involving a native child. She said that "could be a huge relief for Native victims of crime."

Stitt in a statement Friday said he "encouraged that the Supreme Court has decided to address whether a state has authority to prosecute non-Indians who commit crimes against Indians in Indian Country," Stitt said in a Jan. 21 statement. "The fallout of the McGirt decision has been destructive. Criminals have used this decision to commit crimes without punishment. Victims of crime, especially Native victims, have suffered by being forced to relive their worst nightmare in a second trial or having justice elude them completely."

Muscogee Nation Monday called the court's decisions a "clarion call" for state officials to begin collaborating for the sake of all Oklahoma citizens – Native or not.

"Today's Supreme Court action should end the State of Oklahoma's long, unfruitful campaign of litigation that has come at the cost of untold millions of taxpayer dollars and has diverted resources away from properly implementing the sovereignty ruling for the benefit of all who live and work in the Mvskoke Reservation," said the tribe's Principal Chief David Hill.

There has been a long and heated debate between Stitt and tribal leaders on the implications of the McGirt rulings on Oklahoma's criminal justice system, as well as disagreement about the nature of the law itself.

Stitt claimed on Friday that the McGirt ruling "has hamstrung law enforcement in half of the state."

But tribal police chiefs across Oklahoma told a different story when Gaylord

News reported increases in tribal cross-deputization and bolstered law enforcement departments in light of McGirt.

Stitt maintains that McGirt allows criminal law to apply differently to different people because it's "based on race." The tribes and Indigenous law experts agree that McGirt is based on a political status because of the United States' unique treaty obligations with tribes as sovereign nations.

OU Law professor Alexander Pearl, an enrolled member of the Chickasaw Nation who specializes in property law and natural resource conservation litigation in Indian Country, said he feels the governor sees "the McGirt problem" differently from the state and tribal officials on the ground working together to make McGirt work for everyone.

He said that could stem from a general lack of understanding and education about what tribes are and the powers they inherently have the right to exercise.

"The problem for them (officials) is ensuring that there's adequate cross immunization agreements, adequate communication, coordination, resource sharing, and so forth. Those are the sort of problems that are logistical problems," Pearl said. "My view of the governor's definition of the McGirt problem is that he does not want tribal reservations to exist."

recreational marijuana."

Since Oklahomans approved medical marijuana in 2018 with very loose regulations the number of licensed cannabis growers in the state has ballooned to more than 7,000.

This far exceeds the number of licenses issued in other states such as Colorado, California or Oregon.

It has taxed rural water supplies and electricity usage as well as local law enforcement,

county tax assessors and others, Russ said.

"We must give our county residents this measure of local control over how many grow houses are allowed to operate within their borders," Russ said. "This affects public safety, their access to public utilities, their ability to fair and equitable collection of taxes from property owners and other issues."

The Legislature convenes February 7.

Boren files bill to secure guns, promote safe firearm usage

Firearms are the second leading cause of death for children and teens in Oklahoma, a statistic Sen. Mary Boren hopes to change with her Senate Bill 1294.

The legislation would clarify that it is legal for a child to possess a firearm for hunting or for hunter safety classes, education and training in the safe use and handling of firearms, and other sporting events.

The bill also clarifies the responsibility of firearm owners to supervise a child's use of their firearms.

"Every year, hundreds of children across the nation get ahold of firearms and unintentionally and tragically shoot themselves or someone else. Oklahoma has the tenth highest rate of gun death in the country, with an average of 711 people killed each year, including 55

children and teens," Boren said.

"Most of these deaths are tragically due to suicide, and too many deaths are a result of preventable accidents. Something must be done to better protect our state's youth and prevent these accidental shootings and senseless deaths," she said.

The bill defines a child's possession of a firearm to include the negligent or intentional act of a firearm owner leaving a gun unsecured and accessible for a child to take, obtain, or possess.

"Oklahomans love their guns, hunting and recreational shooting, but we must do better to make sure children don't have easy access or unsupervised use of firearms," Boren said.

Sarah stood in a crowd on the steps of the courthouse next to her grandmother. It was a beautiful spring day with fluffy clouds floating above the muddy Mississippi. Sarah could feel her Grandmother Annie's thin hand clinging to hers as they stood among the onlookers. Sarah would much rather be spending such a spring morning playing with neighbors. But her grandmother had insisted that they walk down to the courthouse together.

"Grandmother," Sarah whined. "What are we waiting for?"

"Hush now, Sarah," her grandmother told her, craning her neck to see above the crowd. "We're waiting to hear the outcome of a significant legal case. I know it's hard to be patient," she told Sarah. "But my father brought me downtown on another important day, and now it's your chance to see history!"

In Sarah's mind, history was something that happened a long time ago to old people!

The crowd quieted down when a man in a suit came out of the courthouse.

"Judge Alexander Hamilton has formally approved freedom for Mr. and Mrs. Dred Scott!"

There were shouts, jeers, and cheers; some sounded angry, and some sounded joyful.

"Did you hear that?" Sarah's grandmother asked excitedly.

"They've been freed!"

Sarah's family didn't own slaves, but she knew others who did. She saw them in her community, just as her grandmother had, throughout her lifetime. The adults around her seemed to be arguing a lot about slavery. Some people wanted there to be slaves while others wanted slavery to end. The anger from both sides seemed to be reaching a boiling point.

Standing side by side, Sarah and Grandmother Annie watched the Scotts leave the courthouse. They looked tired, weathered even. But Dred and Harriet stood with their shoulders straight and their backs proud.

As they began the walk home, Annie told Sarah a little bit more about the case.

"The Scotts have been fighting for their freedom in the courts for over a decade now," she told her. "Just a few months ago, their case went all the way to the Supreme Court! But the judges said that people of African descent were not intended to be included as citizens in the United States Constitution. The Supreme Court did not grant the Scotts their freedom."

"So, how did they get to be freed today?" Sarah asked.

"Their owners now live in Massachusetts. They transferred ownership to the Blow family here in St. Louis, and the Blows emancipated them."

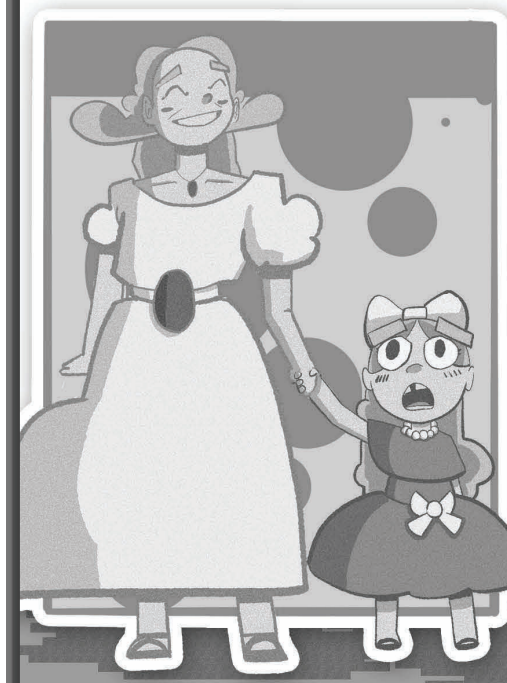
"Emancipated?" Sarah asked.

"Freed."

Sarah wondered what it would feel like to be "owned" and then "freed." She'd been free for her entire life. She and her family had always been citizens.

She listened to the strident voices debating the day's events. She pictured the Scotts standing weary yet proud on the courthouse steps.

The tension in the air bothered Sarah. It felt as if something big was coming. She held her grandmother's hand the entire way home.

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Red Cross blood supplies low

The American Red Cross is facing a national blood crisis – its worst blood shortage in more than a decade, according to their recent press release.

“Dangerously low blood supply levels are posing a concerning risk to patient care and forcing doctors to make difficult decisions about who receives blood transfusions and who will need to wait until more products become available,” the release stated.

Blood and platelet donations are critically needed to help prevent further delays in vital medical treatments, and donors of all blood types – especially type O – are urged to make an appointment now to give in the weeks ahead.

In recent weeks, the Red Cross had less than a one-day supply of critical blood types and has had to limit blood product distributions to hospitals. At times, as much as one-quarter of hospital blood needs are not being met, the release stated.

The Red Cross continues to confront relentless challenges due to COVID-19, including about a 10 percent overall decline in the number of people donating blood as well as ongoing blood drive cancellations and staffing limitations. In addition, the pandemic has contributed to a 62 percent drop in blood drives at schools and colleges.

“Please, if you are eligible, make an appointment to give blood or platelets in the days and weeks ahead to ensure no patient is forced to wait for

critical care,” said Dr. Baia Lasky, medical director for the Red Cross.

Over the next month, about 80 percent of donation appointments remain unfilled in Oklahoma. Make an appointment to give blood or platelets as soon as possible by using the Red Cross Blood Donor App, visiting RedCrossBlood.org or calling 1-800-RED CROSS (1-800-733-2767).

Update from the Capitol

I’ve never been one to shy away from hard work, and this session I’ll have my hands full for sure. Thursday was the bill filing deadline, and I ended up introducing 50 pieces of legislation. Altogether, nearly 800 bills were filed in the Senate, along with just shy of 1,500 in the House.

I’ll be going over all of my bills in the coming weeks. As I mentioned previously, we’ll spend the first four weeks of session considering bills in our committees. In order to move forward through the legislative process, bills must first be approved in committee.

Improving healthcare in our state is one of my main focuses as this is what I’ve dedicated my career to. SB 1158 would increase the membership of the Oklahoma Health Care Authority (OHCA) board to include a medical doctor and an osteopathic doctor.

OHCA is the agency responsible for oversight of the state’s

Medicaid program. This bill was requested by the Oklahoma State Medical Association to ensure the nine-member board includes medical experts. Currently, there are no physicians on this board to advise the agency making critical health decisions for more than 200,000 Oklahomans.

This bill would ensure that these professionals are involved, who can provide direct knowledge of patient care needs and how decisions made by the board will impact those providing health services to Medicaid recipients.

Supporting our veterans is also a high priority for me. We have one of the highest populations of active and retired military, yet continually get ranked as one of the least tax-friendly states for these heroes.

My SB 1790 would exempt all military retirement benefits from the income tax beginning in tax year 2023 and every year thereafter. Currently, Oklaho-

ma military retirees can deduct the greater of \$10,000 or 75 percent of their retirement from state income tax. This isn’t enough. They deserve better.

Thirty-two other states, including bordering states Arkansas, Kansas and Missouri, already exempt military retirement from state income tax, so this isn’t a new idea but one that needs to become a reality in Oklahoma soon.

These are highly trained professionals, who could help fill so many jobs in critical industries in our state and help boost our economy. You have to remember that military members get to retire after 20 years of service, so many of them are only in their 40s and 50s, and still want to continue working as civilians.

This is an issue that has made its way through the Capitol for many years now, so hopefully

Filing your 2021 taxes

This week marks the beginning of tax filing season with the Internal Revenue Service (IRS). While this can often feel like a daunting task, I wanted to provide you with some timely tips concerning the 2021 tax year that can hopefully answer some of your questions or point you in the right direction.

Last year, many taxpayers received advanced payments for the 2021 Child Tax Credits (CTC). If this applies to you, be advised that the IRS will send you Letter 6419, which contains important information to help ensure your return information is accurate – including the total number of payments you received in 2021 as well as the number of qualifying payments.

For information on how to

understand your letter, visit irs.gov/individuals/understanding-your-letter-6419.

In addition, taxpayers may be unaware that the advanced CTC payments made in monthly installments starting in August are considered an advance on what is normally claimed as a tax credit on an income tax return. As a result, be aware that your refund amount could be less than expected.

Those who received the advanced CTC payments can also check the amount of the payments received by using the Update Portal at irs.gov/credits-deductions/child-tax-credit-update-portal.

If you received the third pandemic-related Economic Impact Payment, or stimulus check, sent during the 2021 tax year, be on the lookout for Letter 6457 that confirms the total

amount of your payment and any other payments received.

And if you did not receive one or any of your Economic Impact Payments, you may be eligible to claim a Recovery Rebate Credit on your federal tax return.

For information on how to claim a missing payment, find out which payments you received and check the status of payments at irs.gov/coronavirus/get-my-payment.

This year, the IRS has advised Americans of possible delays in processing returns and issuing refunds. I certainly understand that such delays can be burdensome for Americans, especially those who count on and plan for refunds as part of their annual household budget.

Session begins soon

The State Capitol is busy with activity as session approaches.

We’ve begun hearing budget request presentations from various state agencies. We use the months prior to session to hear directly from agency heads so we have the opportunity to ask questions about their budgets and how they used their appropriations last year.

These meetings will continue throughout the remainder of the month and into session as we begin drafting our next state budget.

January 20 was our deadline to introduce new bills to be considered for the upcoming session. House members filed 1,502 bills and resolutions this year. 1,701 bills and resolutions from last session are still eligible to be considered this year.

I filed five bills this year. I am still working to finalize language for three of them, and that language will be submitted prior to committee meetings.

However, I have submitted the final language for two of my bills.

House Bill 3313 creates an enforcement mechanism to

the No Patient Left Behind Act from last session. When the act was passed last year, it had no enforcement component. HB3313 would create a pathway through civil courts for patients and families.

House Bill 3311 creates a reporting requirement for higher education medical programs. The intent is to find possible ways to alleviate the healthcare workforce shortage, which has posed problems since before the pandemic began.

Session starts Monday, February 7, at noon with the Governor’s State of the State address. He’ll outline his legislative priorities and his budget request for the next fiscal year, which begins July 1.

From there, the legislative session begins in earnest. Bills will undergo “first reading,” which is the first time they are read on the House floor, after which they will be assigned to committees.

Before I wrap up, I want to provide an update on the recent

Protecting young minds

I’ve filed three bills this year to help protect youth from having access to obscene materials in their school classrooms, media programs and libraries.

The goal is not censorship but protection of young minds in a formative state. The fact that obscene materials targeting youth are available at all is unacceptable, but to have them in our schools and readily available for checkout at the public library is beyond disturbing.

Studies show exposure early, when young minds are unable to understand the material, often leads youth to end up acting out the behaviors on family members or others in neighborhoods or schools.

When introduced to sexually explicit materials, young minds often seek out other materials. This leads to pornography addiction and/or sex addiction, drug and alcohol addictions, teen pregnancy, and in some cases violent crimes such as molestation and rape.

How many of our men and women currently incarcerated for sexual crimes were exposed

to sex and or sexually graphic materials at an early age either through abuse or pornography?

We must give parents better ways to protect their children. Teachers, school board members and librarians need clear guidance on this matter.

House Bill 4012 would require school boards to approve a written policy establishing the process for parents, guardians or adult students to challenge certain materials in school libraries and media programs and used by teachers in classrooms.

The policy would create a community standards review board consisting of elected district board of education members with input from parents and school employees.

The board would review and rate materials not already approved by the State Textbook Committee and share the information with parents and guardians.

Prohibited materials would be those that violate state laws

ruling from the Supreme Court regarding the Biden administration's vaccine mandate for private businesses.

Last week, the Supreme Court ruled that the Biden administration overstepped its powers by attempting to require private businesses with over 100 employees to mandate vaccines or host weekly testing.

on child pornography and obscene material as already defined in state statute.

This bill has an emergency clause making it effective immediately upon it being signed into law. This will allow us to put this in place for the next school year.

House Bill 4013 would amend the definition of obscene materials in state law to include any book, article, magazine publication, or written matter of any kind, or any drawing, etching or painting.

House Bill 4014 would

amend state law allowing parents and legal guardians to request records and registration information of their child from any library that is in whole or in part supported by public funds. This allows parents to see what their child is accessing from a public library.

Schools are places where children should learn to read, do math, study our national and our state history, explore science, the arts, computers and more.

Libraries, likewise, are wonderful places that foster the love

of reading and exploration. But they are not places where a child should have access to obscene or pornographic materials.

I believe parents and guardians will appreciate the updated tools these laws will give them as they seek to protect the minds of their children.

I believe teachers and librarians will appreciate the clarification and protection these laws will give them as well.

Considering that many have still not even received their refunds from the previous 2020 tax year, I signed a letter sent to the IRS in December raising concerns about the tax return backlog and asking how it plans to solve this issue while also processing 2021 returns.

To avoid further delays, please verify that any information necessary for processing is correct and nothing is missing. Additionally, to track the status of your refund, visit irs.gov/refunds.

As you start gathering the documents and paperwork you need to prepare your tax return, know that there are some free resources that could apply to you.

Many Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) organizations serve our communities and provide free help, including to those who earn \$58,000 or less, those with disabilities and those who speak limited English as well as our older population.

There are also resources for our seniors like Tax Clinics for the Elderly (TCE) programs, which provide free tax counseling and federal return preparation to those who are 60 or older. To find a VITA or TCE site close to you, use the VITA Locator Tool at irs.treasury.gov/freetaxprep or call 800-906-9887.

You can also find TCE locations operated by the AARP Foundation's Tax Aide program site through the months of January to April by using the AARP Site Locator Tool at aarp.org/money/taxes/aarp_taxaide/locations or by calling 888-227-7669.

If you choose to receive help from a VITA or TCE program, make sure you are prepared for your visit and know what to bring by visiting this website: irs.gov/individuals/checklist-for-free-tax-return-preparation.

Finally, as you prepare to file your taxes before the April 18 deadline, know how to keep your personal information safe and secure from bad actors and scams.

It also important to have a full understanding of what you are qualified to receive or required to report.

Health Insurance

- Will they pay all or some of your monthly premium?

Health Savings Account (HSA) or Flexible Spending Account (FSA)

Voters have options on election day

Registered voters who become physically incapacitated after 5 p.m. Tuesday and cannot make it to the polls still have an opportunity to cast their ballot.

McClain County Election Board Secretary, Karen Haley said state law permits voters who become emergency incapacitated after that time to vote under special provisions.

Haley said emergency incapacitation is something most voters don't think about.

"Voting is our constitutional right, but life happens. Injury, illness or even childbirth can prevent a voter from being able to go to the polls. That's why it's important to make sure voters know their rights in the event of an emergency," she said.

If you or someone you know becomes physically incapacitated after February 1, contact your County Election Board as soon as possible.

Haley said Election Board officials will work with you to make sure you have all of the necessary information to cast your ballot. Forms and information can also be found on the Oklahoma State Election Board website at oklahoma.gov/elections.

The McClain County Election Board is located at 121 N 2nd, Purcell and is open from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Senate completes bill filing for 2022 session

The Senate has completed filing bills for the Second Session of the 58th Legislature. The deadline was January 20.

A total of 774 Senate Bills and 23 Senate Joint Resolutions were filed. Additionally, 771 Senate Bills and 25 Senate Joint Resolutions were carried over from the 2021 session and are available for consideration during the 2022 session.

The January 20 deadline did not apply to appropriations bills, which can be filed throughout the session. Senate rules also allow for bills by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate to be filed throughout the session.

Senate Resolutions and Senate Concurrent Resolutions can be filed throughout the session as well.

Members of the public can read and download current

legislation by going to the official Senate website at www.oksenate.gov and following the link for legislation at the top of the homepage.

The Senate website also includes daily agendas, meeting notices, calendars, and other helpful information.

The 2022 legislative session will convene at noon on Monday, February 7.

The Senate offers streaming audio and video with closed captioning from the Senate Chamber, as well as from all committee rooms.

Wireless Internet access is available to all Capitol visitors throughout the Senate Gallery, rotunda, committee rooms, offices and press rooms.

Grants available to homeowners with financial setbacks

Oklahoma homeowners who have experienced financial setbacks stemming from the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic may be eligible for up to \$20,000 in grant assistance through the Homeowner Assistance Fund (HAF).

Grant uses include delinquent mortgages, property taxes, home insurance, and homeowner association dues.

Made available through the American Rescue Plan Act and administered by the Oklahoma Housing Finance Agency (OHFA), the Oklahoma HAF program has nearly \$74 million available to help Oklahoma homeowners at risk of losing their homes due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Applications and more information are available at www.ohfa.org/haf. Individuals in need of assistance in completing the application can call (833) 208-2535 or (405) 419-8202.

The Oklahoma HAF portal opened January 10 as one of the first 10 states to begin accepting applications.

“Homeowners impacted by

COVID-19 are often finding it difficult to keep up with mortgage payments,” said Valentia Doolin, director of the HAF program in Oklahoma. “We want to make sure our neighbors have the resources to recover and restore homeownership stability.”

Homeowner eligibility criteria includes:

- Homeowners in Oklahoma who occupy the property as their primary residence;
- Homeowners who have experienced a COVID-19 qualified financial hardship after Jan. 21, 2020;
- Homeowners who are United States citizens or those who can show proof of a green card; and
- Homeowners who are at or below 100 percent of the Area Median Income or homeowners who are socially disadvantaged and are at or below 150 percent of the Area Median Income.

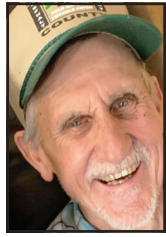

been spent on the road.

Not all of his transport referrals have come from the foundation.

There have been calls, too, from the McClain County Sheriff's Department when prisoners who happen to be veterans exhibit mental problems. "I take them to the VA in Oklahoma City for treatment," Clayton said.

Some runs he transports three or four veterans at a time. The only times he's turned down requests for transport is when winter weather makes Oklahoma's roads unsafe to travel.

The demands on Clayton's time can be directly traced to the foundation's reputation as the best in the world at helping veterans and surviving spouses receive their benefits.

It's that reputation that draws veterans from far-flung states to the foundation.

Clayton has transported veterans from Florida, the Dakotas, California, Texas, Tennessee and beyond.

His transport driver gig has also given him a romantic interest.

His wife, Linda Lee, died in 2019. They were married 35 years.

He now has a girlfriend. They met when he transported her brother, a Vietnam veteran, from Ada to the VA in Oklahoma City.

He is excited about the new offices for the foundation at 1233 W. Lindsay in Norman.

There the foundation has 6,000 square feet that includes computer rooms.

Filing online forms means veterans can get their disability faster.

"Dale Graham is recognized as the best in America on getting disability," Clayton said. "Before Dale Graham, a

veteran didn't have a chance to get nothing."

Clayton is also active closer to home, serving on the board of directors for the Dibble Senior Citizens.

He regularly checks the temperature on coolers and the freezer, as well as delivers meals to shut-ins.

The center serves meals Monday, Wednesday and Friday. And on Fridays, boxes of groceries are given away from the center's pantry.

Some seniors aren't able to drive, so Clayton makes it a point to deliver the groceries to them.

He also helps organize monthly bus trips for the seniors.

He stays busy, that's for certain.

It is just his nature. "I enjoy driving and I like helping people," he said. "I don't get a dime for this."

Corea:

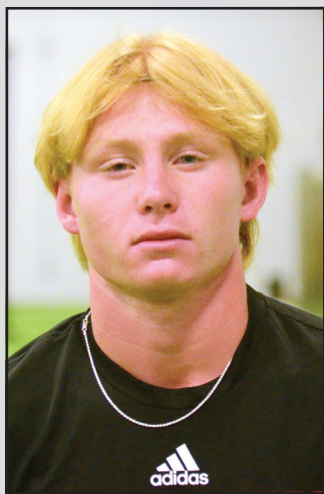

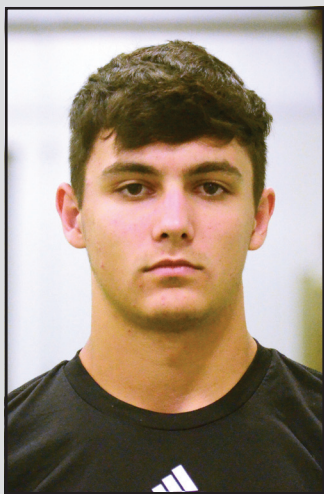

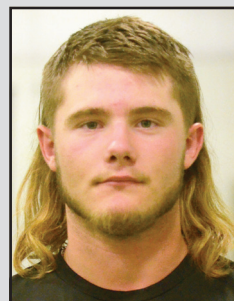

Quinonez rounded out the double figures scoring with 10.

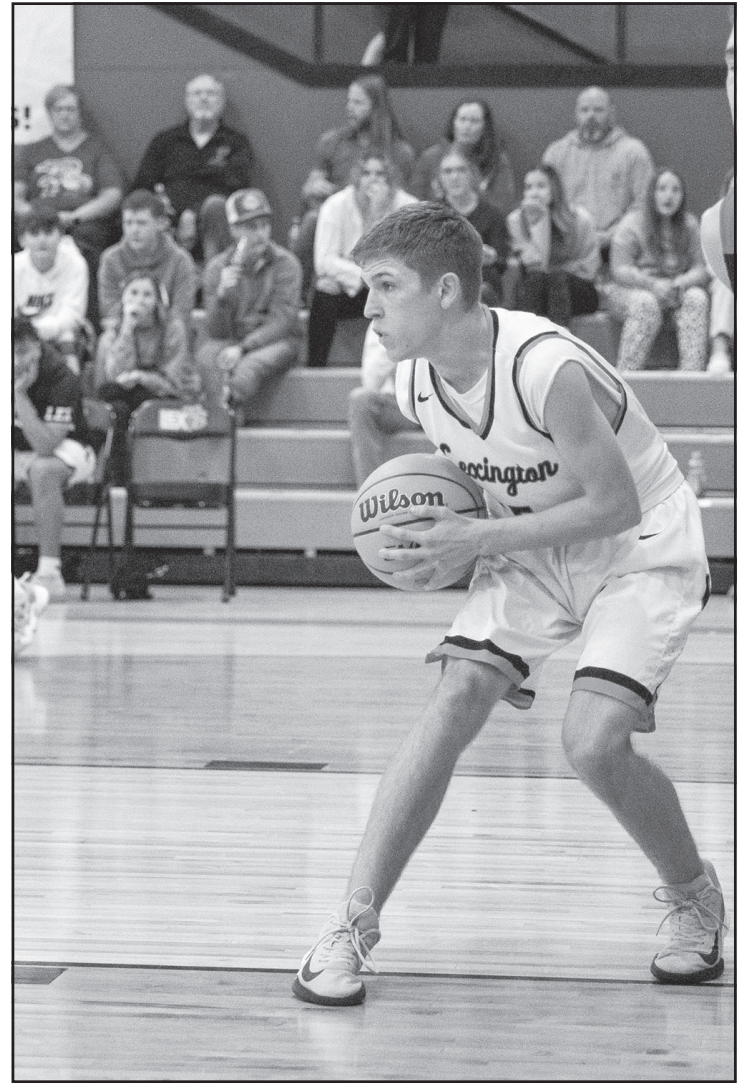

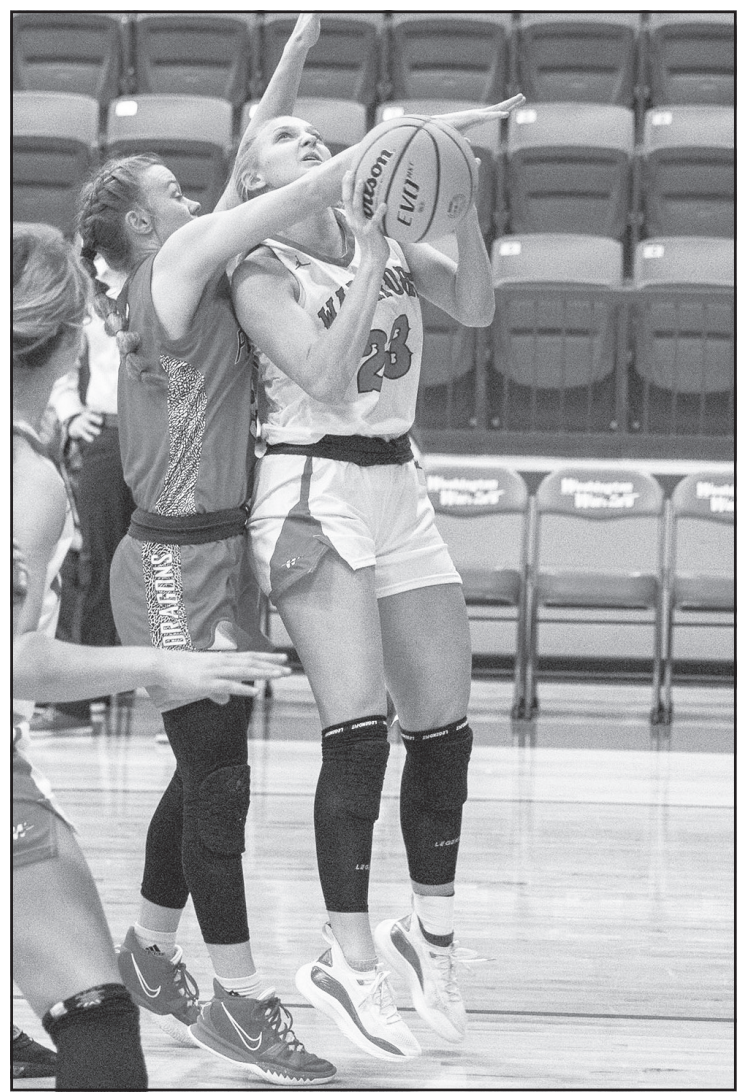

Boren introduces legislation updating Parents' Bill of Rights

Sen. Mary Boren, D-Norman, filed legislation January 13 extending the Parents' Bill of Rights to better inform families about issues important to their children's education.

Senate Bill 1268 would add information about upcoming school elections, community "wrap-around" resources for youth, ability to use free instructional materials at home, and parents' right to opt out of certain student testing data collection.

"The Parents' Bill of Rights first became law in 2014 to help parents be successfully engaged in their child's education. It's proven that when parents are supportive collaborators with schools their children are more successful in the classroom," Boren said. "My bill modernizes parents' rights and gives them better access to tools to help their children be more successful in school and life," she said.

SB 1268 would add the opportunity for parents to register to vote in local elections at their child's school and learn about upcoming dates for board of education and school bond elections.

It would further list procedures for parents to learn about community resources available to better equip their children to be successful at school, including, but not limited to, access to health care, dental care, eye care, assistive devices, professionals and specialists, community counseling centers, social workers, private counselors, tutors, mentors, and other resources.

"Schools are directly impacted by electing local school boards and voting on school bond issues. However, many

parents are not aware of deadlines to register to vote or when elections that impact the daily education of their children will occur," Boren said.

"A child's education can also be impacted greatly by access to supportive resources for their health and well-being — needs that may be met through community resources. This bill will recognize a parent's right to have access to this kind of information to help their child get the best education possible.

"Voting and community resources can be routinely identified and shared through websites and enrollment paperwork," she said.

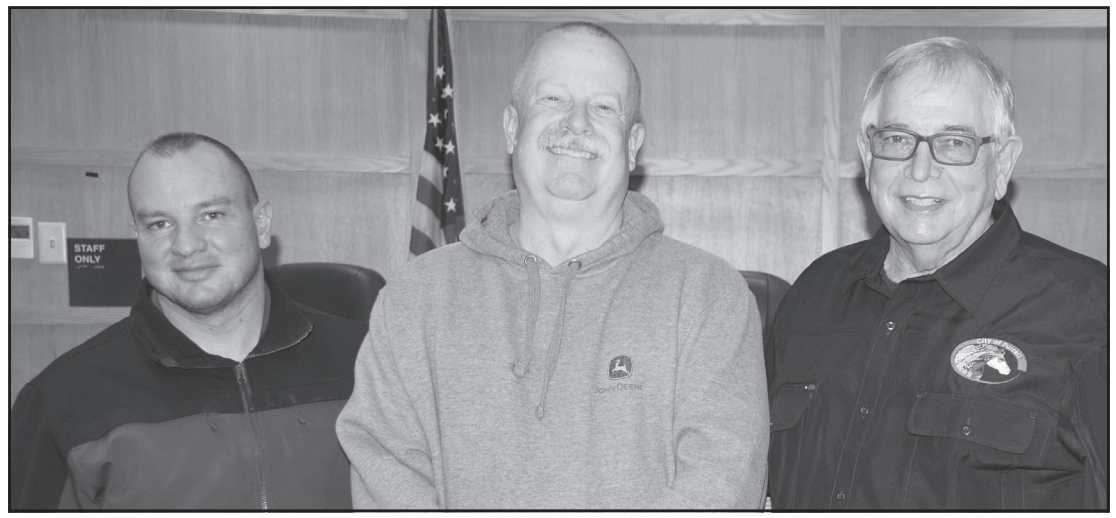
The bill would also add the right to access free instructional materials at school and at home to the list of parental rights.

"Parents in too many schools regularly struggle to access textbooks to help their children with homework," Boren said. "Hopefully, this bill will solve that problem."

Lastly, SB 1268 would modify parents' right to opt out of any data collection for inclusion in the longitudinal student data system to include district-required standardized tests, field tests, or benchmark tests.

"As schools have been swept up in test-based accountability, many districts have implemented test-prep assessments to monitor students year-round," Boren said.

"Parents should have the right to collaborate with schools on their child's participation in these kinds of standardized tests to make sure they are helped by the assessments and not demoralized by them," she concluded.

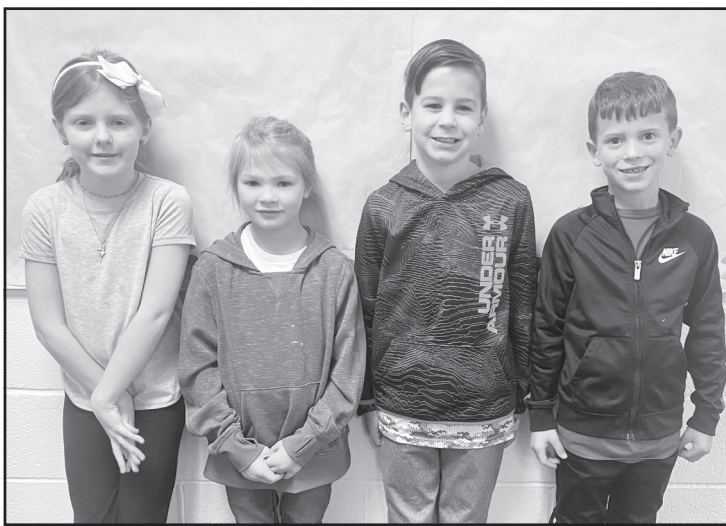

We have double the amount of work stations for our volunteers to process veterans and surviving spouse claims for VA benefits.

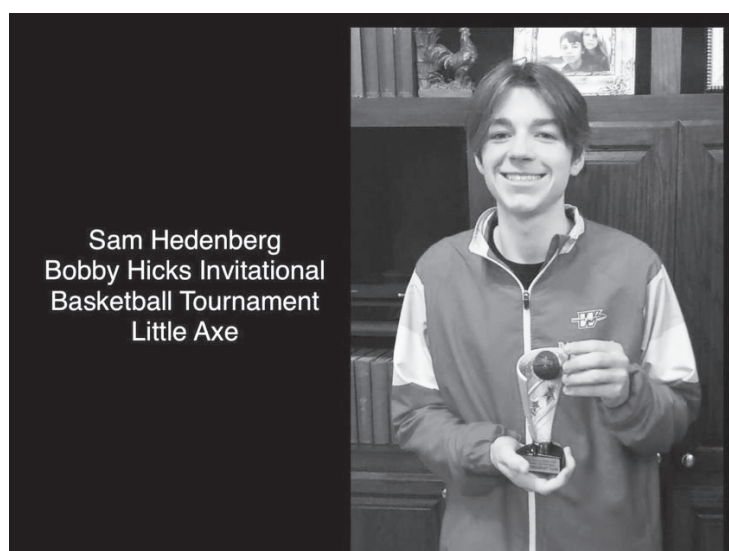
We will begin to schedule onsite appointments next week for those who need them. When we have our next intake event our new computer lab will be up and running for our clients to fill out their intake sheets and to start new claims. Each computer in our lab will have a scanner for veterans to upload their DD-214 Discharge along with their medical evidence and military records that support their claims.

If anyone would have told me that we would have an operation like this when we helped veterans out of my workshop in Goldsby 20 years ago I would have never believed it would be possible. It just goes to show what a bunch of old veterans and volunteers can accomplish with good leadership.

I'm very proud of our Board of Directors who has moved this organization to the forefront of veterans and their families VA benefits. I also want to express my appreciation to our CEO, Jon Foti, along with his staff who is doing their part to make this one of the best veterans service organizations in the country.

With the COVID situation continuing to cause the deaths of many veterans and their spouses, there are a few points I would like to clarify. For a surviving spouse to receive death benefits (DIC), the veteran's death certificate must list a service-connected disability or one presumptive to their service either as the primary cause of death or under the contributing conditions section. Every veteran who is service-connected should explain this to their spouse and dependents.

An example could be if a veteran died from a heart attack and was service-connected for hearing loss. There have been many university studies showing hearing loss contributing to heart conditions. In other words, if that veterans cause of death was heart disease and hearing loss is listed as a contributing condition the

surviving spouse and dependents may be eligible for VA benefits.

In cases where the veteran has already passed it is sometimes possible to ask the attending physician to review the medical records for any links to a service-connected disability. If a link is found the physician can ask that the veterans death certificate be amended to reflect those conditions that contributed to the death.

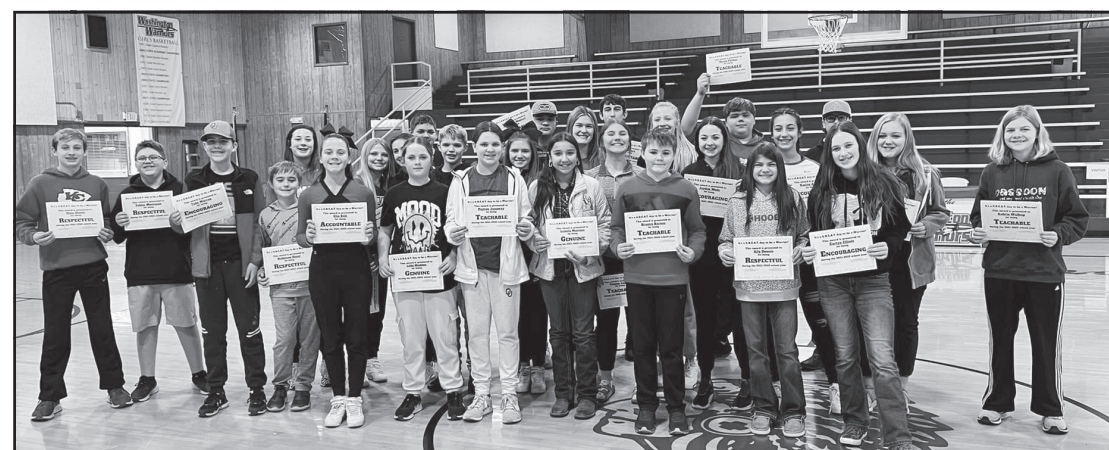

January 30, 2022 is the fourth Sunday of Ordinary Time. Recall that in Ordinary Time we read about the teachings and miracles Jesus performed during his time on earth. Sometimes people criticize others for being two-faced. Those being criticized have a pleasant side they show to the outside world and a less pleasant side they show to those over whom they have authority. All of us have a similar quality. Think of your behavior as either vertical or horizontal. Our most readily recognized vertical relationship is that with God. Horizontal relationships are those we have with other people. Our goal needs to be presenting the love we receive from God to others. You may recall that the four readings on each Sunday are complementary of each other. (Complementary means they work together for a better whole, as opposed to complimentary, “You look lovely.”) The readings this week each speak to God’s intimate presence in our lives from concep-

tion on. The first reading is from Jeremiah 1 where he says, “4 The word of Yahweh came to me, saying: 5 ‘Before I formed you in the womb I knew you; before you came to birth I consecrated you; I appointed you as prophet to the nations.’ In Psalm 71, the psalmist says, “5 For you are my hope, Lord, my trust, Yahweh, since boyhood. 6 On you I have relied since my birth, since my mother’s womb you have been my portion, the constant theme of my praise.” And as they grew, the words of First Corinthians 12 say, “11 When I was a child, I used to talk like a child, and see things as a child does, and think like a child; but now that I have become an adult, I have finished with all childish ways.” God has loved us since our beginning. There is a bit of a problem, though, when other people have known us from our beginning. In the Gospel reading, Luke 4, the people are astonished by the gracious words of Jesus, but ... they became enraged when he said, “In truth I tell you, no prophet is ever accepted in his own

country.” Then they wanted to throw him off a cliff! How does all this relate to us today? As humans, we err. We did what we did until we knew better. We could continue down our path telling others about Jesus but still behaving in unchristian ways. Or we can strive to love others as God loves us. Certainly, there will be those who knew us when we put cherry bombs in the neighbor’s mailbox. Some will recall our failings and struggles. But the God who has known us from our beginning and loved us wants us to bear witness to his love and redemption for all. We celebrate the love of Jesus at Our Lady of Victory parish all year long. Going Back Home

Good cold, February day to all. Welcome to the ‘Front Porch.’ We are continuing some reflections based on the gospel of Mark. We have thirty or more ‘official’ Bible students studying along with us. If you want to join in, feel free to Facebook at Steven Ray Bowen or email. For the next two weeks, we’ll be looking at chapters 6 – 10, beginning here with the early verses of chapter six. This segment is titled, appropriately, “Going Back Home.” Here in the sixth chapter, Jesus’ visit back to Nazareth isn’t what we would’ve thought— or maybe it is: As you read Mark 6:1-6, you’ll be stopped in your tracks at two statements: One, “And he could there do no

mighty work ...” - v. 5. And, two, “And he marveled because of their unbelief,” v. 6. This is back home. These are the ones for whom he carpentered and did stone work, whom he met in the synagogue regularly, those with whom he saw at the market for the better part of thirty years. ... I think I understand the idea. I’ll tell something to illustrate that I think you’ll understand thoroughly: This weekend, Lord willing, the amazin’ blonde and I are going home – LaGrange, Ga., my old stomping grounds. I noticed something a long time ago as I and my family would take that trip to my Southland. I was always a different person back home than I was way out

in Texas, all the way from the beginning. That was mostly good, but there was also some reality to it, too. On the good part, going home was a way to reset the dial, to go back to the values that every landmark and every person there seemed to represent. It slowed life down. It was Grandma’s cooking and shooting baskets down at the Y and seeing all of those church folks. It is still that way, and, Lord willing, I’ll spend a few minutes with many of those same folks this Sunday. It’s always a thrill I can’t duplicate anywhere else. But I noticed a long time ago something else. When I went

back home, my home folks weren't affected one way or another by what I may or may not have accomplished. It was okay, but they weren't overly impressed, at least in my mind, that I had coached a thousand basketball games and taught thousands of classes and laid brick for a decade to get to that point and gone to college so long they named a wing after me (ok, maybe not actually).

You get the picture. No, when I went back home, I've always been much closer to the bare-footed boy riding his bike all over Juniper Street and Truitt Avenue and the one who stood up with knees shaking to lead his first song or give a talk. And —and you can relate here— I was the one who was the last one to get anywhere because I dilly-dallied those growing up years. I'm still the last one sometimes, but I claim it's not for dilly-dallying. I have to talk to everybody wherever we are until the last person is out the door and all the cars are gone.

About dilly-dallying, I think that helped me in coaching because one thing I did not allow was dilly-dallying to get down to the gym to get practice started or dilly-dallying on a drill. Your weaknesses do sometimes become your strengths. That's another front-porch talk for us. But the point

is that people at home still see you as the boy you were, and I'm okay with that. I like it. You don't have to put on any airs.

And here's the good part: They care about you, you and your family, they don't care so much about whether you're the president or not ... So, there's a real good side to going home, to that “prophet in his own country.”

But for Jesus — while there may have been plenty of ‘hey, good to see you, my, you’ve grown into quite a man’ when he went home, the trip home is characterized by the fact that he was too close for them to accept Him. Mr. Maclaren wrote, “It is possible to live too near a man to see him.” So true. Even though they recognize His wisdom and mighty words, v. 2, and are ‘astonished’ by them, that awe is neutralized by their acquaintance with Him in His former life.

For the Master, those are the drawbacks to going home. But, note, it is more than a drawback. Mark records that Jesus ‘cannot’ do any mighty works there, v. 5. Pause at that thought a moment -- Jesus ‘cannot’! ... We’ll come back to that, but think on it awhile, until we see you next week, here on the ‘front porch.’

Masks can be provided if you do not have one (especially for those who have certain medical conditions), and hand sanitizer is also available.

I have had chronic depression my whole life, although I had more symptoms when I turned 17. I tried talk therapy off-and-on until around 1998. At that time, I went through an extensive checkup and was diagnosed with depression.

I remember feeling so relieved—it wasn't my fault! I didn't do it to myself. It was something that was wrong with my body, a chemical imbalance in my brain. It took a while to find the right combination of medications that would allow me to live a more normal life.

Many people don't believe psychiatric medications are necessary or that they are a “crutch.” I had a number of “friends” who told me that I just needed more faith. If I had enough faith, God would heal me without having to take any drugs. This put me back in the mind state of believing that having depression was my fault after all.

Medication plus talk therapy helps me carry on with my life. I will admit that I still have depressive “blips”, but I can get through most things in a more normal way. Talk therapy gives me a professional in my life who has more tools in their “arsenal” to help me figure out how to make better choices for myself. One of those choices is not blaming myself for having depression and accepting that it can be seen as a gift.

One example from the New Testament that has also helped is in 2 Corinthians 12:7-10. This will probably sound familiar. Paul says, “To keep me from becoming proud, I was given a thorn in my flesh, a messenger from Satan to torment me and keep me from becoming proud. Three different times I begged the Lord to take it away. Each

time he said, “My grace is all you need. My power works best in weakness.”

So now I am glad to boast about my weaknesses, so that the power of Christ can work through me. That's why I take pleasure in my weaknesses, and in the insults, hardships, persecutions, and troubles that I suffer for Christ. “For when I am weak, then I am strong.”

There have been many speculations about what Paul's thorn was. Some think that it may have been all of the humans and groups that were trying to discredit him and his teachings. Others see the thorn as the hurtful, painful, harmful but not deadly annoyances of life. More physically, the thorn may have been a chronic disease like epilepsy, eye disease, malaria, sciatica, a club foot, or a hunch back. Or it could have been a temptation of some sort.

The grace that he (and we) are given by God is a gift that we don't deserve. God's grace means that we can quit feeling inadequate. God's mercy relieves us of our suffering with our thorn and that we are not being punished for having a thorn.

I see my depression as my “thorn” and that it has been given to me to show strength that comes from God. It can be seen as a weakness, but it is a source of strength. I realized that, for me, depression can be seen as a gift. It is difficult for someone who has not experienced depression to understand how it feels. Even though we ourselves may need help, it doesn't mean that we in our weakness are unable to help someone else.

I'll repeat again: we don't have to feel inadequate. God loves us. God is merciful to all of us. God has given us the gift of grace. We are enough just as we are.
