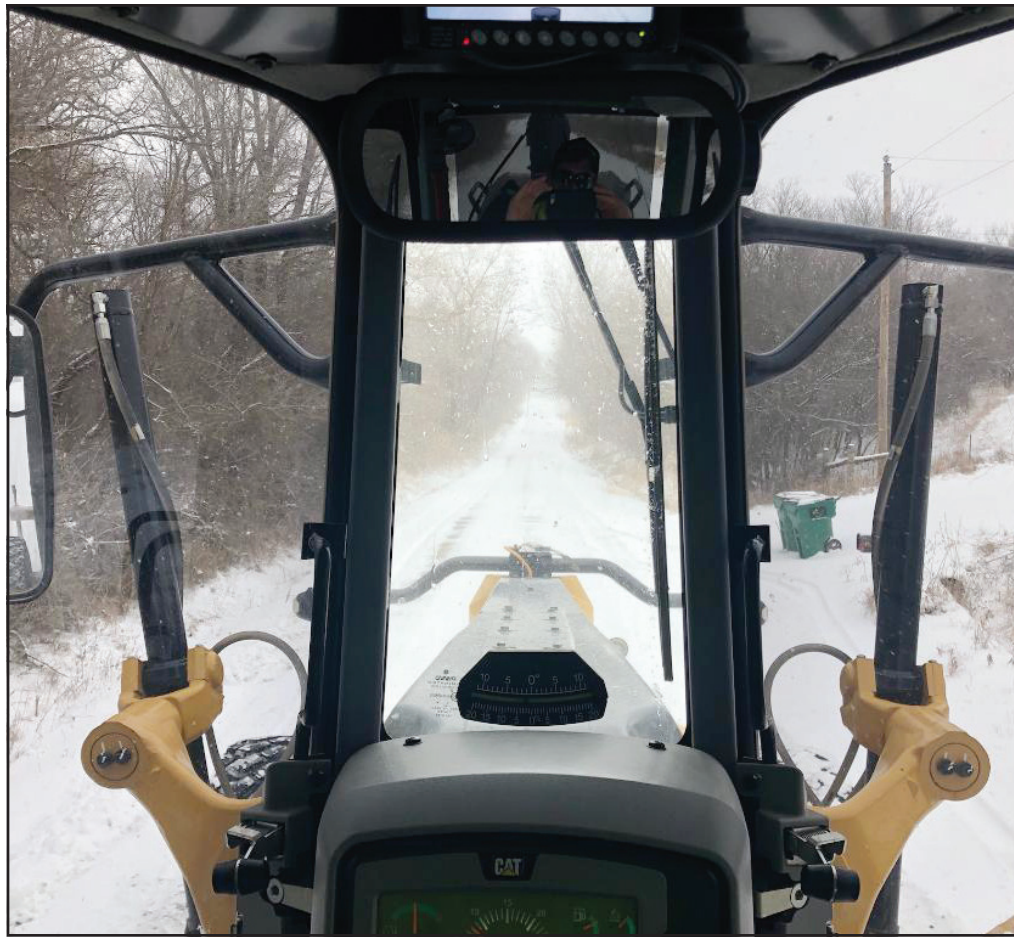

Man JAILED after HOMICIDE

Purcell Police are continuing their investigation into the death of a 39-year-old Purcell woman discovered in a house at 211 W. Adams Street Saturday.

Police were informed of a deceased person in a residence in the 200 block of W. Adams at 2:50 p.m. That's where they found the body

of Margarita Moody.

Police reported she had "severe facial trauma."

With assistance from the McClain County Sheriff's Department and the Oklahoma Highway Patrol they found the suspect, Steven M. Moody, Jr., 40, of the same address.

A K9 was deployed and Moody was located at a separate location.

He was arrested on a first degree murder complaint.

Police report other charges may be pending.

The exact cause of death is pending an autopsy by the State Medical Examiner's Office.

BNSF employees have been working on the cleanup after a four car derailment February 2 just north of Wayne.

Wayne, Purcell and McClain County first responders were called to the scene of a train derailment just north of Wayne just after 3 p.m. February 2.

There were no injuries.

Initially, authorities worried that a hazardous material may have been spilled but that turned out not to be the case.

According to Purcell Fire Chief Greg Cypert, four freight cars went off the tracks to the east. A large section of track was visible pointing skyward.

Little safety compliance

Firework stands in Purcell spark discussion, no action

Firework stands are a staple of the 4th of July - even in Purcell where a city ordinance prohibits setting them off inside the city limits.

Still for years the city has permitted the sale of those fireworks.

Now the Purcell Fire Department has suggested

prohibiting those stands, as well.

Fire marshal Quinn Kroth presented the department's case to the city council at Monday's meeting.

The reason? The owners and operators of those stands don't comply with safety regulations.

"We have to stretch the rules" to allow the stands to remain open, Kroth said.

Kroth conceded that for years the firefighters ran a fireworks stand.

But they and local organizations are out of the game.

It falls on Kroth to inspect the stands and insure safety protocols are followed.

Congressman Cole slams America CONCEDES Act that helps China

Congressman Tom Cole, (OK-04) released the following statement after voting against H.R. 4521, the America COMPETES Act.

"Although titled by Speaker Nancy Pelosi as the America COMPETES Act, H.R. 4521 would be much more appropriately called the America CONCEDES Act since it does more to prop up Communist China than to strengthen and protect our own country's competitive edge," said Cole.

"Considering that members on both sides of the aisle agree on the need to counter China as a growing adversarial threat

and address the country's unruly behavior, this legislation could have been and should have been bipartisan. Instead, it was hastily cobbled together behind closed doors in Speaker Pelosi's office without any Republican input.

"The legislation contains no new policy provisions to combat Chinese military ventures and no new economic policies to reposition America to better compete.

"In fact, the legislation would actually funnel more U.S. taxpayer dollars to programs and efforts tied to the Communist Chinese Party.

"Moreover, the bill is being used by Democrats as a last-ditch effort to implement controversial progressive climate policies that could not pass Congress on their own merit, all in the guise of addressing the challenges posed by Communist China. America needs to take a real stance on the global war waged by China, and I am deeply disappointed that this legislation seriously misses the mark," Cole concluded.

Cole also made remarks during the Rules Committee's hearing on the legislation earlier this week.

OBI needs blood donors to help rebuild blood supply

Oklahoma Blood Institute has an immediate need for blood donors to help rebuild the blood supply.

Blood drive cancellations caused by the recent winter storm have resulted in the loss of over 70 percent of anticipated collections, and more are expected to come.

The demand for blood products is also above average, adding additional strain to the blood supply.

As the weather clears and road conditions improve, do-

notors of all blood types, age 16 and older, are urged to give at the nearest donor center or mobile blood drive as soon as possible.

A secure blood supply is essential to ensure disaster preparedness and serve patients who depend on transfusions to survive.

"The need for blood is constant—someone needs a life-saving transfusion every two seconds," said John Armitage, M.D., president and CEO of Oklahoma Blood Institute.

"We are calling on all healthy Oklahomans to take about an hour of their time to give blood for our friends and neighbors in need. Together we can rebuild the blood supply."

OSU EXTENSION News**Give grace with failed New Year's resolutions**

A new year leaves people feeling invigorated to make changes in their lives.

Resolutions such as losing weight, saving more money, learning a new skill or decluttering the house often top the list.

For many, one month into the new year, those goals have gone by the wayside, said Rachel Morse, Oklahoma State University Extension mental health specialist with the Oklahoma 4-H Youth Development program.

"There's nothing wrong with setting lofty goals for yourself, but it's important to keep them

realistic in order to be successful. Often, when people don't see results right away, they quickly give up on the idea of attaining their goal," Morse said. "However, it doesn't have to be an all-or-nothing deal. Don't give up on your goals; just readjust them to make them more attainable."

It's important to set goals using the SMART acronym: Specific. Measurable. Achievable. Realistic. Timely.

"It's one thing to say you want to lose 50 pounds in a month, but that isn't achievable or even realistic," she said. "Setting goals you can measure and seeing the progress will help keep them on track, and

you won't get so discouraged. Keep a written log so you can see what steps you're taking to achieve a certain goal."

Those who want to exercise more can keep track of how much time they spend exercising. Again, be specific.

Instead of planning to exercise more, make it a goal to exercise 15 minutes, three times per week. Once that becomes a habit, either increase the duration or the number of times per week.

If saving money is important, keep a log of how much you spend. Keep a food log to

Managing gnats on houseplants

They flit across your face, hover near your houseplants, or gather by the window. Fortunately, these fungus gnat insects are more annoying to us than harmful to our plants.

This pest finds its way into our homes on plants added to our indoor houseplant collection or those moved inside after a summer outdoors. Some may enter on organically rich, non-pasteurized soil.

The small, 1/8-inch adult resembles a fruit fly or mosquito but does not feed on overripe fruit and vegetables and it does not bite. Adults live for only seven to ten days, but the female can lay up to 200 eggs in the cracks and crevices of moist soil in that short time.

Eggs hatch releasing worm-like larvae with black heads and elongated white or clear legless bodies.

The larvae begin feeding in the top two to three inches of soil, dining on fungi, algae and organic matter and occasionally plant roots and leaves on the soil surface.

Plant damage is usually insignificant. If conditions are right, fungus gnat populations can reach damaging levels, resulting in root damage that leads to wilting and stunted growth.

Over and under watering, over fertilization and other environmental factors are more likely the causes of these symptoms. Provide proper care to reduce the risk of this type of damage.

Fungus gnat populations

on houseplants seldom reach levels that require control for the plant's health and longevity. The adults can be annoying, especially to the non-gardeners in the family, and are often the motivation for managing this pest.

Start control by adjusting your watering practices. Since fungus gnats thrive in moist soil, avoid overwatering. Allow the top few inches of soil to dry between thorough waterings.

Pour off excess water that collects in the saucer to avoid root rot. Or place pebbles in the saucer to elevate the pot above any excess water that collects in the tray.

Adjust your watering schedule with the change of the season. As day length and light intensity change throughout the year and heat and air conditioning is employed, a plant's water needs change as well.

Use containers with drainage holes or self-watering pots with overflow outlets, also known as weep holes, to avoid water-logged soils. Refresh potting mix as needed.

Older planting mixes degrade over time, retaining moisture longer and creating an inviting environment for fungus gnats.

Manage unwanted fungus

gnats with an organic Bacil-

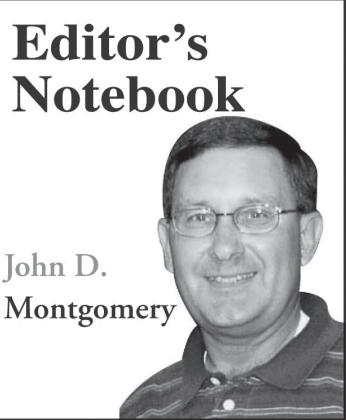
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Winter weather - Yuck

Update from the Capitol

The 2022 legislative session officially got underway Monday. We held a joint session in the House where Governor Stitt presented his State of the State address. I'll discuss that in more detail next week once I have time to review his executive budget and policy proposals. We're wasting no time this year getting committee work done. Historically, not many committee meetings are held the first week of session as bills are still being assigned and members are getting settled. But we have a new floor leader this session, and he doesn't want any time wasted—all bills have been assigned and our committee agendas are full. On Monday, the House and Senate both approved a resolution modifying the deadline

calendar. Because of how the first Monday fell this month, we lost a week to work and the deadline to report bills out of the chamber of origin fell on March 17, which is spring break. This is always a short work week, so members and staff can spend a few days of this school break with their children. We voted to move the floor deadline to the following Thursday, March 24. For now, however, our focus is working through the nearly 1,600 Senate bills available for consideration. A few of my bills will be heard this week, and I'll let you know if they get sent on to the floor for further consideration. In the meantime, I'd like to go over a few more of my bills

I hope to get to the governor's desk this year. Our state is facing a mental health crisis, especially among our youth. Schools are scrambling to find ways to better assist students in crisis. My SB 1379 would authorize a school district board of education to enter into a written contract for student mental health counseling with a person not certified by the State Board of Education as a school counselor or school psychologist if he or she is licensed to practice mental health counseling in the state and has completed record checks. It clarifies that such an individual is not to be considered a **Garvin**, page 5A

Biden's coronavirus catastrophe

Shortly after President Joe Biden was sworn into office, Democrats in Congress rushed to pass a supposed coronavirus relief package with a \$2 trillion price tag, calling it the American Rescue Plan. Unfortunately, the partisan legislation was focused more on funding unrelated policies and programs on their radical wish list than actually addressing the ongoing needs of the pandemic. Since the pandemic began, six supplemental funding bills have been enacted with more than \$97 billion allocated specifically for coronavirus testing. In the so-called American Rescue Plan, this included \$47 billion. Despite this generous amount, Americans continue to face massive shortages nationwide, making it clear that there has not been a lack of funding for testing, but rather a lack of planning on the part of the Biden Administration. More-over, President Biden re-routed nearly \$2 billion allocated for testing to re-stock

the depleted Strategic National Stockpile to deal with his self-created crisis at our southern border. Beyond the testing failures, the Biden Administration has completely missed the mark in assessing and scaling the nation's needs for lifesaving therapeutics. Regrettably, the legislation was woefully short on funds to purchase urgently needed therapeutics. In addition, the Administration poorly planned for the delivery of these therapeutics, resulting in confusion, frustration and loss of care. Instead, the Administration focused primarily on a strategy of vaccinations, including illegal vaccine mandates for large businesses. The United States has developed several lifesaving therapeutics, including oral antiviral pills and monoclonal antibodies that have proven to exponentially reduce the dangerous effects of this virus. Yet, under President Biden's direction, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration recently revoked emergency use authorizations for two monoclonal

antibody therapies, citing that they were ineffective in treating the Omicron variant. Prematurely pulling a treatment from the market based on one variant is a dangerous move. Americans continue to contract the Delta variant, and we do not know what the next variant will be. When it comes to saving lives, all options should remain on the table. As a direct result of the Administration's rationing of therapeutics, governors are being punished for doing their best to get medical resources for their state's residents. Last week Oklahoma only received 504 monoclonal antibody treatments and 4,960 antiviral pills for the entire state. For reference, last week there were 62,852 new COVID-19 cases in Oklahoma. Final preparations for Session

As of noon Monday February 7, the legislative session is officially underway. The Governor gave his annual State of the State address in the House chamber, where he outlined his budget request and legislative priorities. The remainder of the week will be spent officially assigning bills to their respective committees, where they'll undergo their first votes. I've been meeting with staff and stakeholders to finalize the language of my bills. One bill I filed this year would allow COVID-19 patients to designate an individual with full visitation rights. We passed similar legislation last year, but that law didn't have any enforcement mechanisms, so some facilities have not been complying. My bill, House Bill 3313, would allow the patient or the patient's family to sue if the hospital denies visitation. As a nurse practitioner, I've seen firsthand how encouragement from a loved one can improve a patient's mood and instill hope. Now that bills have been assigned, we'll begin present-

ing them in committees. Bills that pass committee may then be heard on the House floor. We'll also be drafting our next state budget while keeping in mind the budget requests that we received from state agencies in hearings over the last month. Committee meetings begin during the first week of session. Last week, the State Dept. of Education allotted almost half of the grant money available through the Redbud School Funding Grants to 330 qualifying schools statewide. Several schools in House District 42 were eligible for this grant, including Blanchard, Dibble, Maysville, Paoli, Pauls Valley, Purcell, Washington, Wayne and Whitehead. The funding is the result of legislation passed into law last year to address funding disparities for brick-and-mortar school districts receiving below-average funding from local tax revenue. Money from a Redbud grant may only be used to maintain **Roe**, page 5A

Redbud school funding grants

The Oklahoma State Department of Education recently allotted half of \$38.5 million to 330 brick-and-mortar public schools statewide as part of the Redbud School Funding Grants program signed into law last year. The grants are part of Senate Bill 229, which was drafted to help address funding disparities for brick-and-mortar public school districts that receive below-average funding from annual local tax revenue. Because the funding is appropriated from medical marijuana taxes and the Common School Building Equalization Fund it can only be used for acquiring and improving school buildings. With the funding from the Redbud Grants, the hope is that other funding streams will be used for classroom instruction materials and reading and math

interventionists to improve student outcomes. With disruptions caused by COVID, our students have education gaps to close, and every bit of funding possible needs to be directed towards closing those gaps. This legislation equalizes funding for school districts that are below the state average per student in local property taxes for the building fund and the county-wide millage. Only public charter schools that provide in-person or blended instruction to a minimum of two-thirds of enrolled students as the primary means of instruction may receive these funds. Statewide virtual charter schools are not eligible. The initial allocations were made at the end of January. **Conley**, page 5A

My grandpa had received an advertisement in the mail about a great used car he could buy for \$500. He ordered the car to surprise my grandma and we were all really surprised when this man pulled in front of the store in an old beat up looking car. He had driven the car from New York City, which was a long drive on those roads back then.

After being drop jaw stunned silent for a few minutes, everyone loosened up and eventually started talking to the man who was just doing a job but now had to get back to New York. By this time, some of us were chuckling just a little. A couple of the family members took the guy over to Kermit, West Virginia, to catch a Greyhound bus to begin his long journey back home.

A part of American culture has been hand shaking and embracing those we know. A part of most American religious gatherings has been shaking hands. One church I attended insisted on everybody hugging each other.

COVID-19 has impacted our

world with death, sickness and business failures. The distancing for many of us continues to be tough.

We wear our masks and seldom know who else is in the grocery store. We’re fearful of going to the funeral home to honor and respect the deceased.

Shaking hands or embracing anyone anywhere is typically totally unwelcome. Many holiday parties of large gatherings were fewer over the past holidays. People don’t want to be sick and so the distancing continues.

We do have the telephone, social media and email which helps us at least stay connected.

However, please keep in mind, when you do recognize someone at the grocery or any public place you may not feel comfortable embracing or shaking hands, but you can still convey a greeting and kindness by at least saying “howdy.”

White House Sized Ego

This week I intended to write about the jobs report put out by the White House and give a historical comparison. Biden claimed that he has the largest growth in jobs throughout history, and I thought surely that is not right, especially with the numbers FDR put out.

However, when I checked the White House webpage, I decided to change my topic after reading the list of accomplishments released last week.

What I found interesting about the list was the Trumpian language used. Of the 15 achievements, 13 of them are listed as the best of all time. Among the many points were the greatest or biggest. Two were the lowest, two were the most, one was more than any other, two were the first, two were the largest and, finally, one was the strongest.

How is it that no one noticed these claims? Possibly we became used to hearing Trump proclaim he was the greatest president of all time or maybe it’s just that in order to run for president you have to have an ego the size of the White House. What is also interesting is that Trump was accused of being an egomaniac for making similar claims. Yet no matter how bad Trump was or possibly Biden, historically speaking, neither tops the list of narcissists.

In 2013 the Pew Research Center ranked all the presidents in order of their narcissism. Pew did not list which presidents were narcissists and which were not. All presidents have egos. The report concluded that presidents are more narcissistic than average Americans.

According to the survey, the most narcissistic presidents were, first, Lyndon B. Johnson; second, Teddy Roosevelt; third, Andrew Jackson; fourth, Franklin D. Roosevelt; and fifth, John F. Kennedy. The list includes some of the most famous presidents of all time and some of the most loved and respected. The oddball on the list is the top, LBJ; he is not as well known or respected as the others. Yet if you know anything about Johnson, you should not be surprised.

I wish I had room to discuss each of these fascinating presidents, but my editors are already upset with the length of some of my columns. I will have to keep this short. Between JFK’s public and personal personas, he may be the most bi-polar of all the presidents. He was beloved by the masses, while hiding his womanizing and drug abuse.

FDR is another of the most beloved yet was the first president to believe he was so important that he ran for four terms. Andrew Jackson believed he was so important that he vetoed more bills than all his predecessors combined. Teddy has one of the best quotes to show his arrogance. Norman, Wanette and Wynnewood are not receiving a Redbud grant as these districts receive at or above average local tax revenue.

Redbud School Funding Grants are in addition to the Republican-led Legislature’s expansion of funding for public education to historic levels over the past five years.

This includes teacher and staff pay raises, restoration and an increase of textbook funding, increasing appropriations for classrooms and school activities and other positive investments that seek to make Oklahoma students among the best prepared in the nation.

With the investments the Legislature has made over the last several years and addressing the disparities in the School Funding Formula there have been record-high appropriations to education.

Oklahoma students deserve excellence. They get that through creating and investing in a strong educational system.

or repair existing buildings or purchase new buildings; however, money previously allotted for these purposes may then be used for other reasons, such as purchasing classroom supplies.

The remainder of the grant money will be distributed to qualifying schools this summer.

“teacher.” We’re going to have to give schools the freedom to reach out to private entities to provide these crucial, and often lifesaving, services.

Another idea I’m anxious to put before my legislative colleagues is SB 1178 to provide additional education programs for inmates to prepare them for a career once released.

My bill would authorize the Department of Corrections (DOC) to establish a Hospice Care and Certified Nurse Assistant inmate training program administered through the Health Services Division under the direction of the Chief Medical Officer.

One of the main contributors to our high incarceration and recidivism rates is poverty. Some turn to selling drugs, stealing and other crimes to make money. When someone gets out of prison, they can be

overwhelmed with fines and fees, which leads many back to their life of criminal behavior.

If we can equip those interested with the skills to start a career as a Hospice Care or Certified Nurse Assistant once they’re released, they should be able to find employment quickly and start earning a paycheck, keeping them from returning to criminal behavior.

The last update I would like to share is that Donna Lisle, the executive assistant for our district, has accepted a position with the Oklahoma State Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse and will be leaving the Capitol on February 21.

Donna has become like family to me, and I honestly couldn’t have survived the past year and a half without her wisdom, experience, and friendship. She has been an

incredible asset to SD43, and I know many of you have had the benefit of getting to know her and appreciate how hard she works for our district.

hardly been seen or heard, rarely appearing at White House or COVID-19 media briefings since he was appointed to his position.

Stitt touts paying Oklahoma teachers \$100,000

Oklahoma Gov. Kevin Stitt says computer science education, an increased focus on career tech and higher teacher pay are keys to the future industries of Oklahoma.

Stitt said he foresees the day in the not too distant future where Oklahoma teachers, who once were next to last in pay, will earn as much as \$100,000 a year.

“One of my priorities this year is to unleash some pay for performance. We want to keep our best and brightest in the classroom,” said Stitt, who

is facing reelection this year. “I want teachers to be able to make \$100,000 a year and stay in this profession.”

Over the four-day National Governors’ Association Winter meeting, governors held policy discussions on infrastructure, bi-partisan leadership and the importance of K-12 computer science education. Arkansas Gov. Asa Hutchinson, chairman of the NGA, emphasized the link between increased student digital literacy and a stronger workforce.

A 2021 State of Computer Science Education report estimated that only 53 percent of Oklahoma high schools offered

a computer science curriculum, ranking the state as number 27th in accessibility to these courses. Arkansas currently boasts 92 percent and is ranked as number one in the nation under the computer science initiative by Hutchison.

“We’re going to lead in training the talent for the digital age,” Hutchison told his fellow governors during the conference last weekend.

Last year, Stitt signed into law Senate Bill 252, which requires that all public and charter high schools offer a computer science course by the 2024-25 school year. In 2020, only 37 percent of Oklahoma

high schools offered computer science courses, but that number rose significantly in 2021.

“We know that training our workforce for those jobs of tomorrow is the most important thing we can do,” Stitt said. “As the governor and leader of Oklahoma, I’m just trying to learn and put our state in the best spot for success in the future.”

Stitt said commerce focused on the electric vehicle industry is a part of Oklahoma’s future as an energy producer. Canoo, an electric car company, plans to bring research and development centers to Tulsa and already has a factory in Pryor.

The governor met with Toyota and General Motors while in Washington and said he sees Oklahoma leaning heavily on electric vehicles in the future.

He said understanding computer science and other educational requirements for STEM-related jobs will be crucial to building Oklahoma’s economic future.

Stitt said Oklahoma should be focusing more on career tech and getting more high school students into STEM, engineering and the trades after graduation to fill these employ-

This recipe delivers tender, juicy pork every time and it's completely hands-off.

Easy Slow Cooker Pork

1 Tablespoon oil
3-4 lb. pork loin, excess fat removed
Salt and pepper
1 large onion, sliced in thin rounds
4 cloves garlic, chopped
1/2 cup brown sugar, lightly packed
1/2 cup water
1/2 cup balsamic vinegar
2 Tablespoons soy sauce

Season all sides of pork loin roast generously with salt and pepper.

Place cut onions in the bottom of your slow cooker.

Heat a large skillet over medium-high heat. Add oil and sear pork loin on all sides until golden brown, 2 minutes per side. Remove from pan and place on top of onions in slow cooker.

Turn off the heat on your skillet and add garlic, water, balsamic vinegar and soy sauce. Stir together ingredients, making sure to scrape up any brown bits that stuck to the pan.

Sprinkle brown sugar on top of pork loin and then pour sauce mixture over the pork.

Cover and cook on Low for 5-6 hours, or until the internal temperature is 145 degrees Fahrenheit.

Once cooked, remove pork loin to a plate and cover with foil. Allow to rest for 10 minutes.

While pork is resting, pour the sauce and juices from the slow cooker into a saucepan. Bring to a simmer over medium heat and allow the sauce to thicken, 5-6 minutes. Stir occasionally.

Notes:

The pork loin is finished cooking when the internal temperature reaches 145 degrees Fahrenheit. Since it is a lean cut, it will not fall apart and you will be able to slice it.

This recipe also works with pork shoulder. Cook 3-4 lb. pork shoulder on Low for 9-10 hours. It will be fall-apart tender.

Oklahoma County Director LaDonna Hines has been named the 2022 Oklahoma State University Extension Distinguished Educator. She recently was recognized during an awards presentation in Stillwater.

Mrs. Hines is the former Ladonna Howeth. She is a 1984 graduate of Wayne High School. Her family lives northwest of Purcell and her father, Joey Howeth, is a longtime pastor and recently retired from Iron Chapel Freewill Baptist Church.

The Distinguished Educator award is the most prestigious title attainable by a county educator, district program specialist or area specialist. Distinguished educators serve as role models for other Extension educators and are expected to uphold the highest standards of OSU Extension.

The recipient must have conducted a strong county, district or area program and established a state, regional or national reputation as an outstanding educator.

"We are pleased to recognize LaDonna's distinguished career in Extension with this honor reserved for a select few," said Damona Doye, associate vice president of OSU Extension. "She does exemplary work and is a role model for others. She has been innovative in advancing the Extension mission and stands out for her vision and service to Extension in her local community, in the state and nationally."

Hines is a registered dietician who joined OSU Extension in 2001 as the Community Nutrition Education Program area coordinator for the northwest district. She also served five years as the Family and Consumer Sciences/4-H Youth Development educator in Oklahoma County before assuming the role of county director in 2009.

Hines' career has presented a wealth of fulfilling educational opportunities to help communities thrive and Oklahomans acquire valuable life skills.

"The services we provide are priceless, and I've learned the importance of building relationships with state legislators, county commissioners, budget boards, commodity groups and city government," she said. "It is very rewarding each day to serve and make a difference in the world."

"It has been refreshing to see the strong relationships LaDonna has developed with Oklahoma County elected officials," said Claude Bess, OSU Extension director for the southeast district. "She is highly respected by local of-

icials and regarded as a leader in the county."

Hines leads an office of 17 employees and more than 400 volunteers while assisting educators with programming and curriculum development. Her dedication to the role is evident in the many projects she has helped established over the years, including the Master Wellness Volunteer Program in 2017.

She, along with a group of OSU Extension specialists, obtained funding to train FCS volunteers on how to incorporate health and wellness habits into their daily lives.

As the Oklahoma County Extension director, Hines is active in all program areas, including horticulture, urban agriculture and natural resources. She assists 4-H educators with water conservation programs made possible through a five-year grant secured from the Oklahoma City Water Utilities Trust.

The project received the Oklahoma Extension Association of Family and Consumer Sciences Environmental Education Award and the OSU Extension State Outstanding Team Award in 2020.

"Since 2019, we have created and delivered 24 different innovative water conservation programs and reached 4,414 participants," Hines said. "I've got an awesome team, and when they have a win, I have a win."

In addition to securing program funding, she regularly partners with local media to recognize 4-H members and their outstanding community service projects.

Hines has completed the OSU Advanced Leadership Program and OSU Extension Mentor Training. She is a member of Oklahoma Extension Association of Family and Consumer Sciences, CE-FCS Ambassadors and National Urban Extension Leaders.

"LaDonna is nationally known in urban Extension," Bess said. "The organization's mission is to advocate and advance the strategic importance and long-term value of urban Extension activities, and she has done a tremendous job in this capacity."

Hines has also been instrumental in the creation and design of a unique farmers market concept scheduled to debut in northeast Oklahoma City in May.

"In the next two or three years, I envision this market feeding the community and providing an additional outlet for farmers to sell their produce," she said. "When our office moved to northeast Oklahoma City in

2015, it was a food desert. The legacy I want to leave is one of establishing a food access hub for residents many years into the future."

Outside of her OSU Extension responsibilities, Hines enjoys spending time with her husband, children and grandchildren. She has devoted 20 years to OSU Extension and views her team members as close as family. When asked what advice she

has for younger peers, she suggested making the most of the organization's potential for community partnerships.

"There's always networking and opportunities for programming," Hines said. "My biggest weakness is my big heart, but it's also my greatest strength. I like to give back and pay it forward when I can, and when you have a great staff like I do, you want to work hard for them."

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OMRF awarded grant for lymphatic system research

The National Institutes of Health has awarded the Oklahoma Medical Research Foundation \$2.1 million to continue research on the lymphatic system.

OMRF scientist Sathish Srinivasan, Ph.D., received a four-year grant to focus on mechanisms that control the growth of lymphatic vessels.

Lymphatic vessels are one of our two main vessel systems. Blood vessels transport blood, oxygen and nutrients throughout the body.

Lymphatic vessels collect lymph – fluids that leak from blood vessels – and return it to the bloodstream.

When lymphatic vessels stop functioning properly, those fluids build up in tissue, resulting in lymphedema, a chronic and potentially dangerous condition marked by painful swelling.

Lymphedema can result from surgery, genetic or environmental reasons, or the presence of a cancerous tumor that blocks the normal flow of lymph. There is no known cure.

“Our lab is trying to understand how lymphatic vessels normally form and what molecules regulate their growth,” said Srinivasan, who joined OMRF from St. Jude’s Children’s Research Hospital in

2013.

Currently, no therapies exist to repair or regrow lymphatic vessels.

Srinivasan envisions someday identifying molecules that can mimic the normal flow of lymph in areas affected by lymphedema. This step, he said, could lead to a therapy to regenerate lymphatic vessels.

“If we can promote the growth of these vessels, we can stop the damage caused by lymphedema,” Srinivasan said. “But that’s down the road. First, we need to fully understand the basic mechanisms that promote growth of the lymphatic vessels.”

Abandonment of Refrigerators and Iceboxes in Places Accessible to Children

Any person, firm, or corporation who abandons or discards in any place accessible to children any refrigerator, icebox, or ice chest of a capacity of one and one-half (1-½) cubic feet or more which has an attached lid or door which may be opened or fastened shut by means of an attached latch, or who, being the owner, lessee, or manager of such place, knowingly permits such abandoned or discarded refrigerator, icebox, or ice chest to remain in such condition shall be deemed negligent as a matter of law and shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

identify how much your caloric intake should be reduced to reach personal health goals.

Morse said one of the keys to achieving goals is to build flexibility into the plan.

“Approach your goals with baby steps. Make small changes that soon become habits. Tweak your plan as you go along,” she said. “Babies learning to walk fall often, but they always get back up and keep going. It’s the same with setting goals. Just because you fall down isn’t any reason to give up. Get back on

your feet, dust yourself off and start again the next day.”

Morse said it is important to break tasks into manageable chunks. For example, if a goal is to clean the house, instead of looking around at everything that has to be done, divvy up the chores into easier-to-achieve tasks.

One day, tackle cleaning the floors. The next day, concentrate on the bathrooms. De-

cluttering the kitchen counter can be done the following day. By the end of the week, the house is clean.

“We must give ourselves grace when it comes to our goals. You simply can’t beat yourself up because you fall short one day, or even several days in a row,” she said. “Wipe the slate clean and start over. It’s OK to struggle sometimes, but it’s not a reason to give up.”

Gnats:

lus thruingiensis israelensis (BTI) product such as Summit Mosquito Bits® (www.summitresponsiblesolutions.com) labeled for controlling fungus gnat larvae.

Just sprinkle it on the soil surface and this naturally occurring soil bacterium kills the fungus gnat larvae in the soil. It’s safe for people, pets, and plants. Read and follow label directions repeating as needed.

Use yellow sticky traps to monitor adult populations. Place homemade or purchased traps on sticks in houseplant containers.

Use 1/4-inch slices or wedges of potatoes to attract and monitor fungus gnat larvae. Stick a portion of the potato into the

soil. Check for fungus gnats after a few days and replace the potato wedge to help manage this pest.

Understanding the fungus gnat and its preferred environment will help you safely and effectively manage this pest.

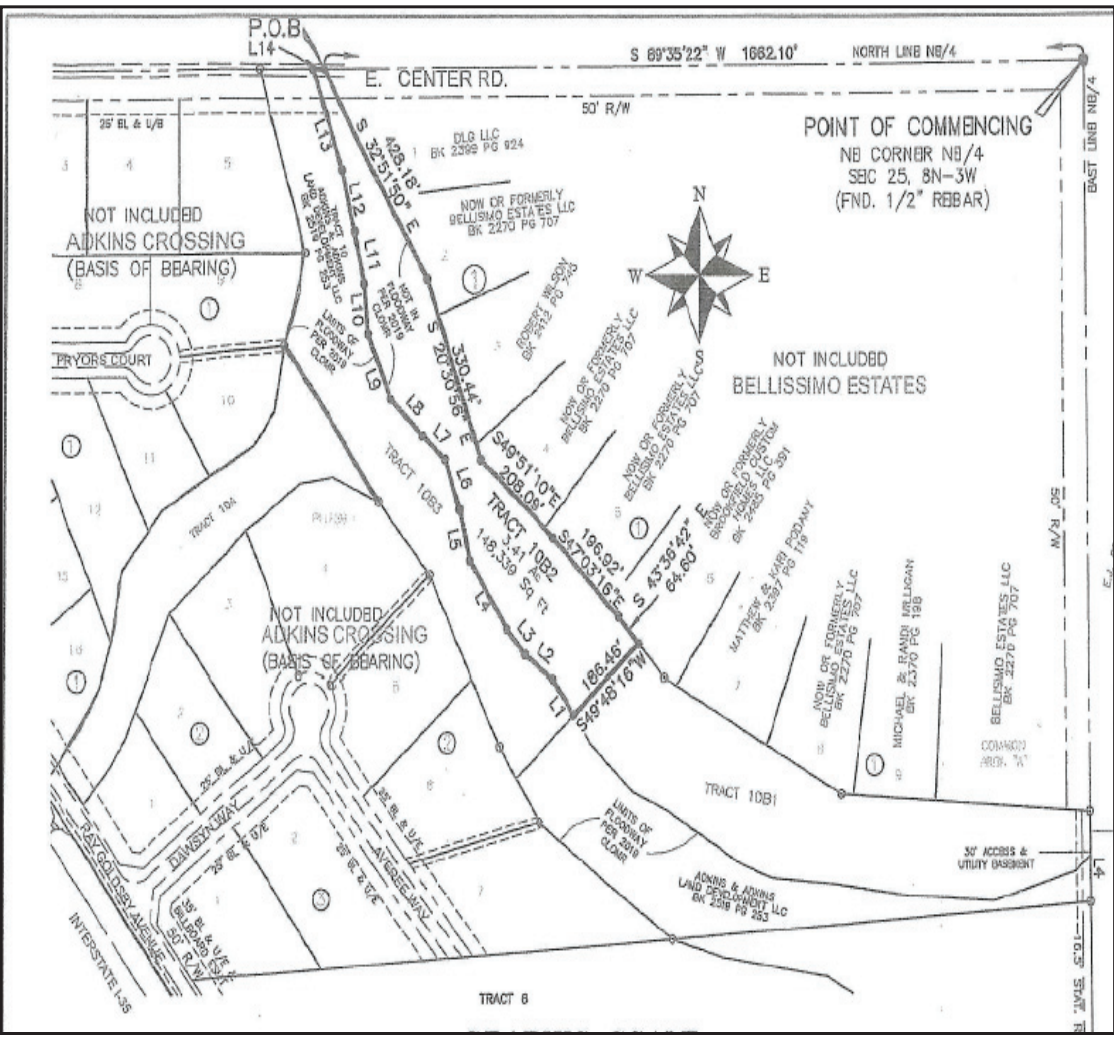
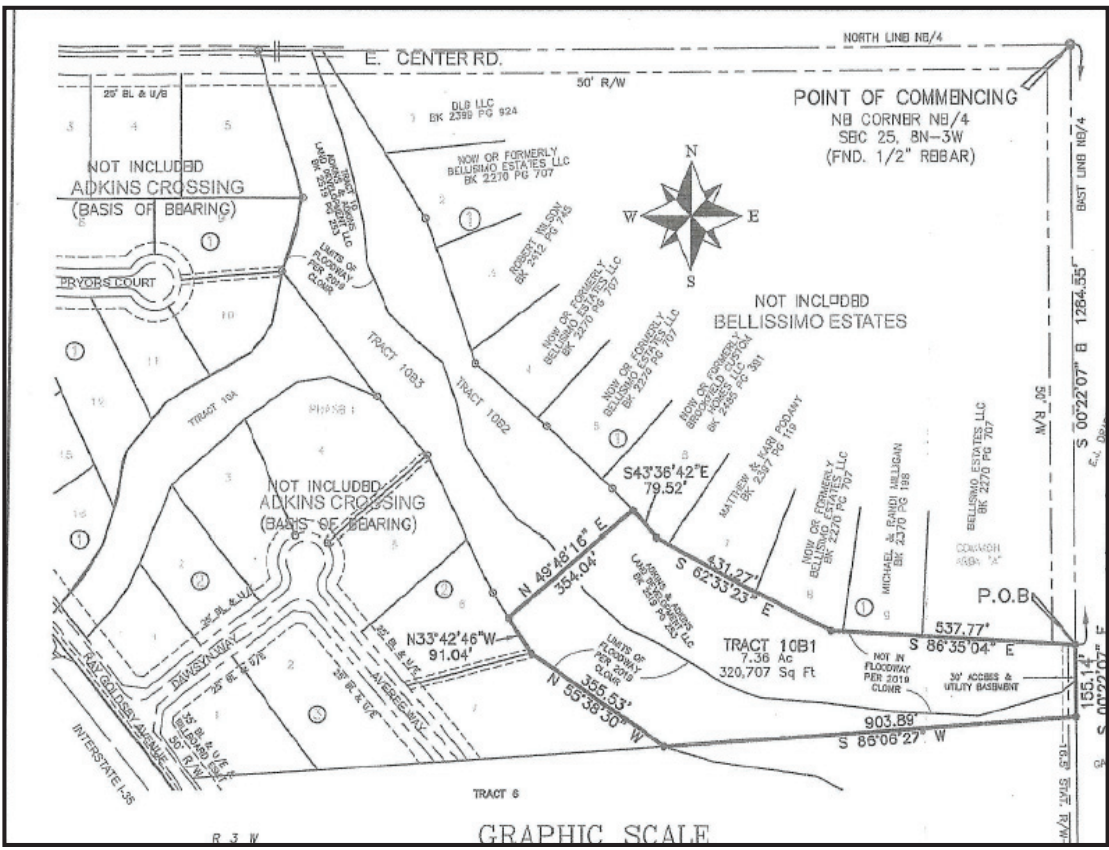

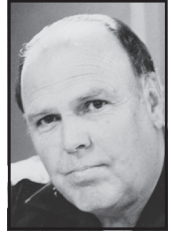

ment gaps.

“We want to make sure that career paths are very well established for high school kids that maybe don’t want to become an engineer, but they want to become an electrician, or a plumber or HVAC,” Stitt said, “All of the different trades are so important, and we’re trying to create those pathways to make sure every kid has a great opportunity coming out of Oklahoma high schools.”

Oklahoma K-12 schools are currently experiencing a teacher shortage due to COVID-19 surges. Recently, Stitt signed a law allowing state employees to serve as substitute teachers to fill staffing gaps. Stitt said he thinks the teacher shortage will be a temporary issue and will not affect any future plans to expand computer science programs across the state.

“We were just trying to fill the needs and make sure that our schools stayed open. Because the number one priority is to make sure our kids are not getting behind,” Stitt said.

Stitt said he intended to lead by example and solve the employment shortage.

Under SB 252, sponsored by Oklahoma State Sen. Brenda Stanley (R, Midwest City) and State Rep. Rhonda Baker (R, Yukon), schools that do not have a computer science teacher will offer an online course with a remote teacher. With additional programs added to teachers’ workloads, Stitt says he plans to continue investing in education and teachers.

In 2018, Oklahoma passed a law that provides \$3,000 to \$5,000 extra to teachers who provide mentoring to other teachers and spend 25 percent to 50 percent of their time mentoring. And some Oklahoma districts offer teachers additional pay based on performance and mentorship of other teachers. But the program is not statewide yet.

Texas uses a pay-by-performance program called the Local Optional Teacher Designation System. The program was created in 2019 and has been met with backlash for being heavily reliant on standardized test scores, disincentivizing the teaching of struggling students and causing high turnover rates of teachers. Although teachers’ average salary increased by \$7,000, the Texas American Federation of Teachers has called the program “ill-conceived.”

However, the Texas Education Agency reported the state turnover rate fell to nine percent for the academic year of 2020-2021. That attrition rate was lower than the past nine years.

Stitt says such a program would help to incentivize younger teachers to stay in classrooms rather than move

toward administrative roles. The governor said he also hopes to draw more attention to education by moving school board elections to November to increase participation.

“School board elections have never been more important,” Stitt said, “Right now, school board elections are held in April like nobody knows about them. Nobody votes in them. So I’m trying to get those moved to the general election timeframe.”

Senate Bill 962, proposed by Sen. Greg Treat, (R, Oklahoma City) would shift school board elections to November, but the Oklahoma State School Boards Association has declared the move to be a “legislative alert.” The OSSBA said SB 962 would invite party politics into non-partisan races.

Stitt said education’s role in Oklahoma’s future is signifi-

cant, with continued unprecedented challenges and additional educational programs.

“We are hyper-focused on training the workforce,” Stitt said.

The NGA Winter Meeting and the Republican Governors Association Winter Meeting took place over the same weekend and Stitt emphasized the benefit of both.

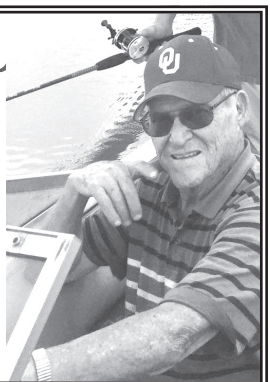

that violations no longer exist. He cited examples of violations – smoking, running a generator inside the stand, semi tractor-trailers parked next to a stand, etc. "It's important for them to be safe," he said, "(but) I have a very full schedule." Kroth said the fire department has the right to shut down stands for non-compliance. In 2020, four fireworks stands were open in Purcell. All were set by outside entities. Mayor Ted Cox said he would like to see compliance with safety regulations. He also noted the city charges a permit fee for each stand. "My understanding is our fee is one of the lowest in the state," Cox said, raising the possibility of raising that fee. "When you cost people money, it encourages them to do the right thing," Kroth agreed. Council member Graham Fishburn said before the city outlaws the sale of fireworks it should look at higher permit fees and perhaps limiting the number of stands. "I hate to see us run businesses off," Cox said. "I definitely don't want to make a decision tonight." The council set the date for Purcell's Independence Day Celebration on July 1, a Friday. City manager Dale Bunn shared several updates on city projects with the council.

Work at the new hospital remains on schedule, though paving was delayed by last week's winter storm. Inside the building, 20 dry-walls are at work. The project remains within budget. The design of an interchange at State Highway 74 and I-35 is on track for construction to start in 2025. The Oklahoma Department of Transportation is now conducting an environmental study at the site. The State Historic Preservation Office is causing delays in the Main StreetScape project, Bunn said, with their insistence that the city not use pavers or stamped concrete and cover existing brick with asphalt. It will now be September or October before the project can go out for bid. That pushes the actual start to January. Another issue on the city's plate is poor drainage around the Amtrak station. A possible solution will be a sump pump. Bunn also shared that the city's financial advisor, Ben Oglesby, is being replaced by Rick Smith. In other business, the council:

- appointed Ariel Anglin to fill a vacancy on the Parks and Recreation Board;
- approved Parks and Recreation's request to seek bids for roof replacements of park pavilions;
- approved the \$26,744.09

purchase of a Federal Signal storm siren for the Quail Ridge Run area;

- approved a \$10,000 insurance claim from Sherrie Snell whose vehicle was struck by a city truck on December 28;
- authorized Cox to sign a proclamation declaring March 8 as the 100th anniversary of McClain Bank;
- approved an agreement to reimburse Fraternal Order of Police members for tuition and required items for new hires once those individuals complete a 4-year contract with the police department; and
- approved a budget amendment increasing animal shelter donations and ground maintenance appropriations, each for \$5,000.

The Purcell Public Works Authority approved the purchase of a Wright nuclear medicine machine for the new hospital. The cost is \$265,333.17. Trustees also agreed to submit plans to ODEQ for a water line extension along 240th Street west of Washington. A second water line extension will provide water to the South Bryant Subdivision off of SH 39 west.

Also approved were:

- an electric utility rebate to Mayes Properties for \$1,142.28; and
- an agreement with McClain County for relocating a city waterline at the Pennsylvania Avenue bridge north of SH 39.

EMS:

person on the other end of the line have the trained staff to send to your aid. That is staff capable of assessing your condition and starting treatment as you are transported to a hospital's emergency department. Nationally, it's not looking good. Jackie Wadley of Wadley's EMS shared the startling statistics with the Purcell Public Works Authority Monday. Across the country, certifications of emergency medical technicians totaled 293,891 in 2020. In 2021, however, the number had fallen to 184,787 – a loss of 109,104 or 37.1 percent. Among paramedics, 111,953 were certified in 2020, compared to 87,497 in 2021. That 24,456 loss amounted to 21.8 percent. And there's no one stepping up to fill those vacant slots. First-time certifications for

EMTs were 58,969 in 2020 and 4,284 in 2021. That is a single-year decline of 54,685 or 92.7 percent. The first-time certifications for paramedics were 9,415 in 2020. But a precipitous 95 percent plunge dropped the number of 470 in 2021. Wadley said some EMTs and paramedics leave EMS for jobs with fire departments. Hiring bonuses in the thousands and tens of thousands of dollars are too tempting for others to ignore. Wadley said his staffing is holding steady for now. But he lost one paramedic who took a job in the Virgin Islands. "The world of EMS is changing as fast as hospitals," Wadley said. Whether this new normal will revert to the old normal when the pandemic is past is anyone's guess. But the statistics aren't encouraging.

Liqueur:

Rather, it's a bourbon liqueur with hints of vanilla, pecan and cinnamon. And if that sounds familiar, well there's a good reason, according to Jamie Howard, the man behind the liqueur's development. "Honestly, we looked at a pecan pie recipe," he said. The finished product was months in the making. The nutty flavor comes from pecan flavoring rather than oil pressed from the nuts. That is a safety issue since so many people have potentially deadly allergies to nuts. Howard formed a limited liability company in May 2020. He wanted to "create an original bourbon to reveal the Old West is all of us," according to the product's website. But it was October 2021 before he perfected the blend and started production. He works with small batches of the liqueur. That hands-on approach allows him to control Territory Whiskey's quality and signature taste. When the blend is spot on, the liqueur is bottled, it is sent to Triple B Distributing in Tuttle.

From there, it ships to more than 30 liquor stores in Oklahoma and "a few" more in Wyoming. The Oklahoma liquor stores are mostly in the Oklahoma City metro, though a few are in Tulsa. In Purcell, Territory Whiskey can be found on the shelves of TK's Cork and Bottle, 503 S. Green Ave. The store will sponsor a tasting of the liqueur from 4 to 6 p.m. today (Thursday). Price is set by individual retailers, but on average, a 750 ml. bottle of the 70 proof liqueur sells for \$35. Howard estimates Territory Whiskey produces around 500 cases a year. Technically, Territory Whiskey is a craft spirit to the agencies which regulate the alcohol trade. Even when the volume goes up, the liqueur will never be a large spirit. Howard's wife, Wendy, is a very busy veterinarian and not directly involved in the

company. Before the couple settled around Wayne, they lived in South Dakota where Howard had a construction company. There he did a lot of promoting rodeo-type events. Now he draws on those skills to promote Territory Whiskey and ties to the West. Since moving to Oklahoma, he raises Paint horses that he races at Remington Park and Claremore's Fair Meadows. Howard isn't a distiller because the bourbon he uses is already distilled and aged in Kentucky. In fact, the Bluegrass State produces 95 percent of the world's bourbon, which must be aged in oak casks for a minimum of two years. Most bourbon is aged three years and the best bourbons languish 10 years in their oak casks. Territory Whiskey is an ideal choice for making Irish coffee, Howard said. It is also good served after a meal, over ice or in a cocktail.

Windfall:

by the Oklahoma State Department of Education. In total, 337 brick and mortar public schools shared half of \$38.5 million. The remainder will be distributed this summer to qualifying schools. Purcell Public Schools received the largest area allocation of \$88,391.87, followed by Lexington Public Schools at \$81,580.22. Washington Public Schools was awarded \$58,561.17 which Newcastle and Dibble Public Schools received \$36,228.06 and \$35,456.72, respectively.

The grant to Wayne Public Schools was \$3,163.48. The funding is the result of legislation passed into law last year by Rep. Kyle Hilbert, R-Bristow, and Sen. John Michael Montgomery, R-Lawton. Senate Bill 229 addressed funding disparities for brick-and-mortar public school districts that receive below-average funding from annual local tax revenue. The SDE awarded the grants with funding appropriated from medical marijuana taxes and the Common School Building Equalization Fund.

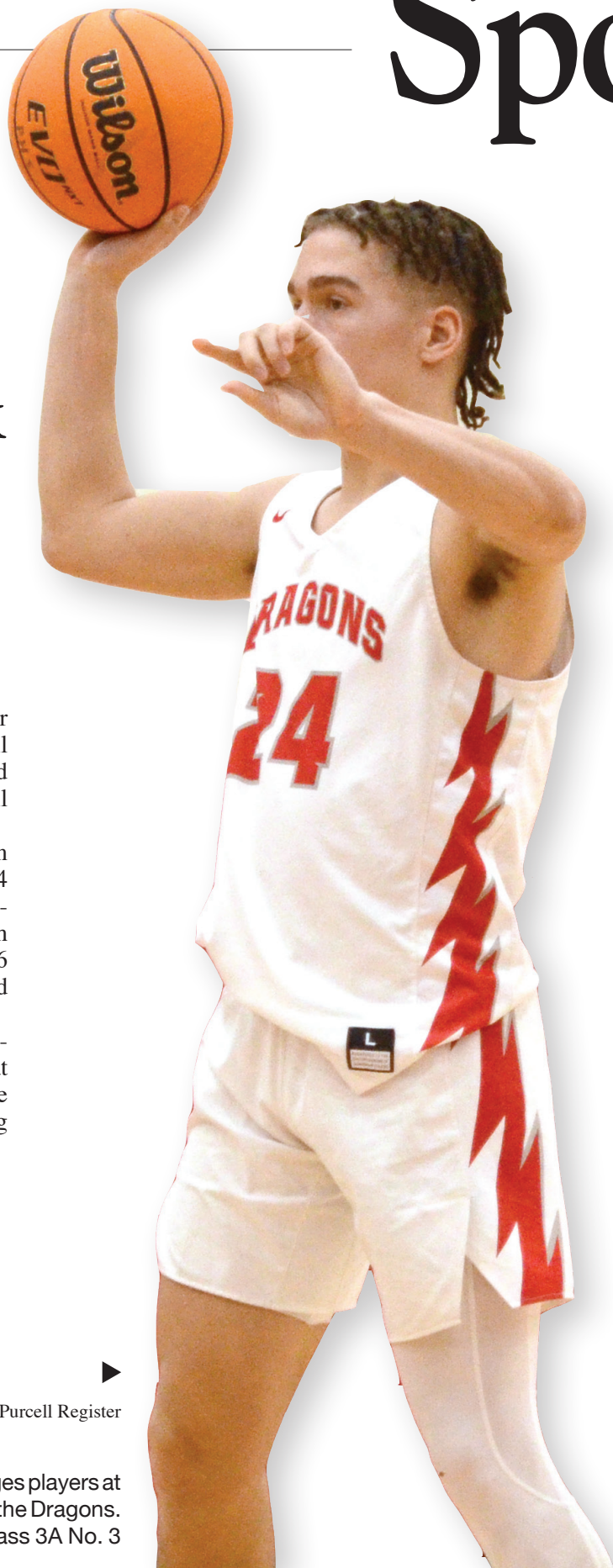

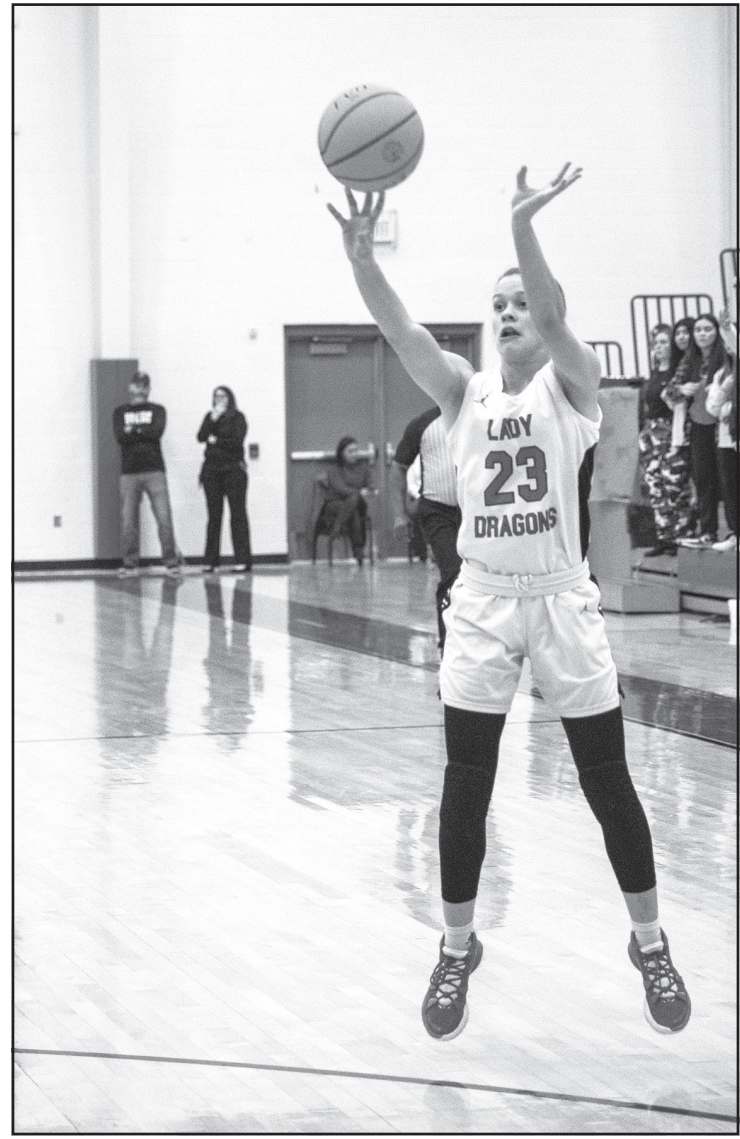

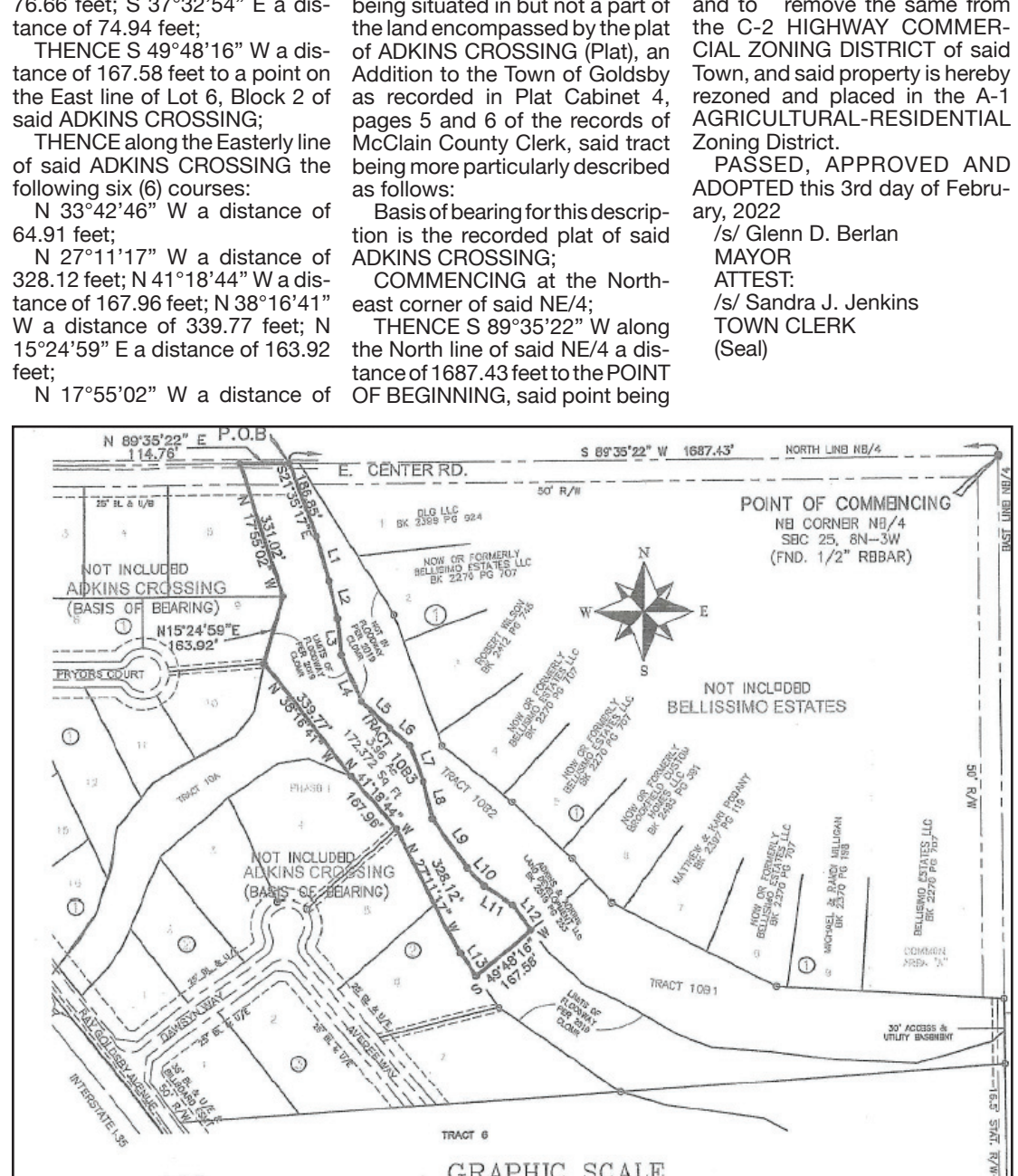

One Thing Christ Cannot Do!

Very good week to all! I'm still thinking about Mark 6, as we considered last week, where Jesus cannot do any great miracles. But I want to make it personal here. It is true not only that the Lord could not do great works in Nazareth because of the cold winds of unbelief; He cannot do great works in us, either, when those winds surround us.

To be clear, regular church members easily can have plenty of cold winds blowing around them; and, as something I noticed in Isaiah 6:1-6 recently, around God's throne are fiery, burning 'Seraphim,' not ice-cold angelic beings. You can't be close to the Lord and be cold!

You see, as we have been said, our unbelief hampers Christ's power. Oh, no, it is not for a lack of power, it's for a lack of our tapping into that power. Paul calls it the "power that works within us" - Eph. 3:20 - but that power only works in those men and women who have come to understand the depth and height, the breadth and width, of the love of Christ. As Paul writes in v. 17 of that context, his hope and prayer is "That Christ may

dwell in your hearts by faith ..."

Please note: That doesn't mean merely that Christ dwells in our hearts by our studying God's Word, even though delving into God's Word is a component of His dwelling, for a man may study God's Word until he's blue in the face and still not develop a working faith.

But it means that when we put our deep faith in Christ, depending on Him with all that we have, including trusting in His word, that Christ can dwell in us. His power can work in us. It means that He can do great things in us, that He can bless us with His greatest gifts because we open up our hearts in faith.

This faith is not a mere belief. We forget that sometimes. This faith is "the motion of your will and heart toward God." Many believe but never turn their will to Him. Many believe and never emotionally depend on Him in a way that warrants His opening up his treasure-house of blessings.

Something else: Christ's offering us His salvation, the greatest blessing, is not merely the absence of hell. I think that is what some people's religion

can amount to. He does not just promise that if we obey Him we won't go there. His work is greater than that: It is to give us the graces that come by walking by His Spirit, Galatians 5:16, to give us a new love, new desires, a new direction, a new Spirit living within us.

Again, remember Mark 4:24-25: The Lord measures to us His blessings in proportion to the measure of desire that we have. That statement needs to stay in the forefront of our minds. "With what measure we mete it shall be measured to us": The KJV words sound complex, but now we understand them better. We dig down, even as what you're doing now as you're searching for new perspectives, new insights, new knowledge, a greater hope in the Lord, and we seek; and the more we seek the more paths of blessings and peace He opens for us. That, precisely, is how Christ dwells in us by faith.

Thanks for joining the 'front porch' today. I hope you'll keep traveling along with us in Mark's gospel. Blessings to you in your work today!

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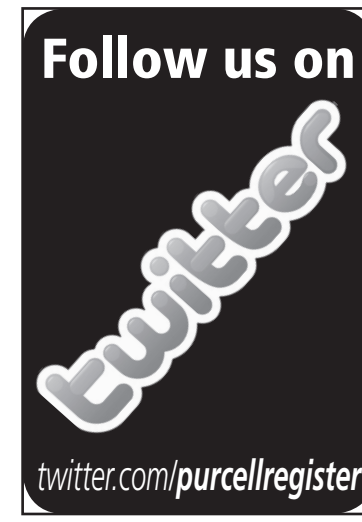
