

## Bunn: Turnpike extension will be economic boon here

Mayor Ted Cox and City Manager Dale Bunn were among those invited to attend the Oklahoma Turnpike Authority meeting last week for the big announcement that included extending the Kickapoo Turnpike all the way down the west side of Lake Thunderbird to connect with I-35 near the 95 mile marker.

“For the City of Purcell it is a major economic development event,” Bunn said after the meeting.

Cox was unable to attend, but earlier participated in a planning meeting to request changes benefiting Purcell that he shared back with the council their advice.

“The Kickapoo Turnpike will be continued south from I-44 and I-40 to end in a connection with I-35 north of Purcell,” Bunn said.

“Businesses in Purcell will benefit from the complete I-35 traffic before it splits at the

# First CENTURY in the books

### In the beginning

McClain County National Bank was chartered March 8, 1922.

McClain Bank will pull out all the stops on Tuesday when the financial institution celebrates a century of business.

The historic landmark will be marked by street bashes at the main bank in Purcell, as well as branch locations in Norman and Noble.

Festivities at those locations will be from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m.

The celebrations, bank officials say, are for everyone in the communities.

A history of the bank can be found on the bank’s webpage.

Main Street in Purcell was the site of the newly chartered McClain County National Bank.

Three men – John H. Perry, president; E.L. Sheets, vice president; and John H. Wells, cashier – were the only employees when the bank opened its doors on March 8, 1922. The new bank was formed with

With the moisture came a lifting of the burn ban for McClain County.

County commissioners voted to lift the burn ban at their Monday morning meeting at the McClain County Courthouse.

Additional rainfall is predicted for Sunday and Monday.

## OMRF receives funds for sepsis study

The National Institutes of Health has awarded the Oklahoma Medical Research Foundation a five-year, \$3.1 million grant for research aimed at reducing the main cause of death from infection.

OMRF scientist Florea Lupu, Ph.D., hopes his research leads to a new therapeutic treatment for sepsis, which kills about 270,000 people per year in the United States — more than lung cancer, breast cancer and drug overdoses combined.

"We are targeting a specific part of the immune system called the 'complement system,' which helps clear away bacteria in early sepsis but then becomes detrimental and

contributes to organ failure," Lupu said.

Sepsis occurs when the immune system overcompensates for an underlying infection, most commonly in the lungs, urinary tract, skin or gastrointestinal tract.

If not treated early, this overcompensation causes widespread blood clotting and ultimately septic shock, which is characterized by severe loss of blood pressure leading to multiple organ failure.

According to the World Health Organization, globally, sepsis accounted for 11 million or 20 percent of all deaths in 2017, the most recent year for which data is available.

Lupu's lab will build upon his prior research of the complement system's role in sepsis. The work will focus on two infections that often trigger the condition: E. coli and staph.

The complement system is a large protein network in plasma. Those proteins are activated to form a cascade response to fight infection. However, one of these proteins, known as C5, morphs from friend into foe during sepsis by killing healthy cells and causing inflammation.

Lupu hopes to pinpoint the moment when C5 turns traitor and then target it with a drug that inhibits activation.

"The timing for an inhibitor

is crucial," Lupu said. "If you try to block C5 too early, you also block the clearance of bacteria. If you go in too late, it's probably not helpful because the damage is already done."

Lupu also hopes to determine the value of treating sepsis early with a blood thinner before shifting to a C5 inhibitor. Both drugs would be used in tandem with antibiotics, Lupu said.

"Sepsis progresses very quickly," Lupu said. "Once it reaches the point of septic shock, the odds of survival decrease by eight percent for each hour of delay in treatment. So that's the biggest challenge — finding that narrow window to a successful outcome."

## Oklahoma deems billions in federal COVID relief fund applications a secret

Oklahoma's purchasing director has decided almost \$12 billion in applications for federal money under last year's COVID-19 funding package for states should stay secret as the Legislature and Gov. Kevin Stitt's administration consider projects for approval.

Included in the blanket exemption to the state's Open Records Act are state agencies applying for funding from the American Rescue Plan Act. Oklahoma has \$1.87 billion in funding to dole out, with another \$1.32 billion going to counties, cities and other local governments.

The Office of Management and Enterprise Services' purchasing director, Dan Sivard, made the latest secrecy determination in a Jan. 7 memo. That was one day after the federal government finalized rules for the Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds program.

"The State Purchasing Director has determined that information received in connection with the receipt and/or distribution of federal stimulus fund is similar to an 'offer' and therefore such information is determined to be confidential and not subject to release from an open record request," the memo said.

Oklahoma Watch earlier

this month requested a funding application from the Oklahoma State Department of Health for its relocated



public health lab and a new pandemic research center.

The agency said the in-

formation was in an online "portal" set up by OMES to take applications and therefore inaccessible to the health department. When pressed for details, the health department sent the purchasing memo and referred further questions to OMES.

The memo refers to an exemption in the Open Records Act that allows public bodies to withhold "personal financial information, credit information or other financial data" submitted to them to be a qualified contractor.

It also referred to a section of the state's purchasing law that gives the state purchasing director authority to decide what information in a bid is confidential.

of legislative and public affairs for OMES, said none of the project requests are available for release. Almost \$12 billion in funding requests have been received across 788 projects.

“These records have been deemed temporarily confidential as they are being considered as going through a procurement process,” Cleveland said in an emailed response to questions.

Typically, agency requests for appropriations or supplemental appropriations from the Legislature would be disclosed in budget hearings or during the legislative session. Cleveland said the requests for federal funds are hewing to a new process.

“The key differentiation is that this is a first-of-its-kind joint executive and legislative procurement process where the private sector and public sector are competing for a limited amount of federal funds,” Cleveland said. “In addition, the sheer number of requests is a big differentiator.”

He said the latest memo updates an earlier, less detailed memo from November.

The state worked with outside consulting groups Guidehouse and 929 Strategies to come up with a scoring process for awarding the American Rescue Plan funds. The money has to be allocated by the end of 2024 and used by the end of 2026.

The Legislature created a joint committee and several working groups to evaluate applications for funding to address the health and economic fallout from the pandemic. Infrastructure projects like broadband improvements and water and sewer improvements are also eligible for

funding.

“There’s a little over \$10 billion in requests at the moment in terms of projects that have been submitted through the portal,” House Speaker Charles McCall said earlier this month at a legislative forum. “Those will filter down and the governor will ultimately have the say on those funds. He’s asked the Legislature to be involved, which we’re appreciative of. We’re not going to try to push out \$1.8 billion in the next 12 months. You’ll see us take a very methodical look. What’s a priority to me is that projects are considered in all four corners of the state and throughout the state of Oklahoma.”

The process for the latest round of federal COVID-19 relief for states stands in contrast to the Coronavirus Relief Funds under the 2020 CARES Act. The early months of the pandemic featured states scrambling to secure tests, ventilators and personal protective equipment. Both the Legislative Office of Fiscal Transparency and the state

auditor and inspector found irregularities with some of Oklahoma’s CARES Act spending.

Cleveland said the American Rescue Plan details would become public as the legislative working groups approve certain projects to be considered by the full joint committee.

“When approved projects are awarded for the contract, the information is at that point no longer confidential,” he said. “This is similar to any procurement selection process where all submitted information by potential contract award recipients are kept as confidential until an award has been made.”

#### HEART ATTACK WHEN ALONE?

Since many people are alone when they suffer a heart attack without help, the person whose heart is beating improperly and who begins to feel faint, has only about 10 seconds left before losing consciousness.

This comes from Dr. Patrick Teefy, Cardiology Head at the Nuclear Medicine Institute, University Hospital, London, Ont.

1. Let's say it's 6:10 p.m. and you're going home (alone of course) after an unusually hard day on the job.

2. You're really tired, upset and frustrated.

3. Suddenly you start experiencing severe pain in your chest that starts to drag out into your arm and up into your jaw. You are only about five miles from the hospital nearest your home.

4. Unfortunately you don't know if you'll be able to make it that far.

5. You have been trained in CPR, but the guy that taught the course did not tell you how to perform it on yourself.

6. HOW TO SURVIVE A

7. However, these victims can help themselves by coughing repeatedly and very vigorously.

A deep breath should be taken before each cough, and the cough must be deep and prolonged, as when producing sputum from deep inside the chest.

A breath and a cough must be repeated about every two seconds without let-up until help arrives, or until the heart is felt to be beating normally again.

8. Deep breaths get oxygen into the lungs and coughing movements squeeze the heart and keep the blood circulating. The squeezing pressure on the heart also helps it to regain a normal rhythm.

In this way, heart attack victims can get help or to a hospital.

## Update from the Capitol

The first month of session is behind us, and so much has been accomplished. More than 300 bills were reported out of committee last week with just four days left until the deadline to wrap up committee work.

As of last Tuesday, the full Senate had approved nearly 60 bills and sent them on to the House.

Unfortunately, Mother Nature interrupted our work last week, forcing the House and Senate to close Wednesday and Thursday. Being this Thursday is the deadline, our committee agendas will be packed to try to make up for those lost days.

Improving public safety is a huge issue this session in the Capitol with several bills being considered. Senate Bill 1568 would require various forms of domestic abuse to be registered under the Mary Rippy Violent Crime Offenders

Registration Act.

In 2020, Oklahoma had the highest number of domestic violence reports in 20 years, and 61 Oklahomans were killed by their domestic abuser. This public database allows people to verify other's identity and whether they have a violent past, which can prevent them from getting into a dangerous relationship or allowing their children to be around them.

SB 1569 would create the Address Confidentiality for Child Survivors and Their Families Act to protect victims of human trafficking and child abduction by allowing them to be in the Address Confidentiality Program.

This provides these individuals with an alternative address to list on school, local and state forms to conceal their home address from public searches.

Another measure will protect

our retired public servants. SB 1522 would prohibit the doxing of retired law enforcement officers. This includes posting any of their personally identifiable information, such as their home address, with the intent to threaten, intimidate or harass them.

Besides working on legislation in our committees and on the floor, there are numerous caucuses for us to join in order to dive deeper into those particular issues that we're especially passionate about.

Caucuses bring together people with shared, but unique experiences. I'm currently a member of the Women's, Aerospace (AERO), Hispanic, Rural, Mental Health, Future, and Republican Caucuses.

The Rural Caucus recently

### America asleep at the wheel

Last week, the world watched in horror as Vladimir Putin effectively declared war and launched a full-scale invasion of Ukraine.

Indeed, with Russia's launch of the largest military operation in Europe since World War II more than 75 years ago, it has become abundantly clear that for decades the United States and our North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) allies have seriously miscalculated the audacity and aggressiveness of this tyrannical bully and thug.

Since 1991, Ukraine has been a sovereign nation after it declared itself free from the Communist Soviet Union. However, since the first rise of Vladimir Putin to power in Russia in 1999, the world has observed his criminal and repressive regime grow and manipulate U.S. administrations of both parties.

Putin has evaded the due critical attention of a succes-

sion of American presidents, first with surprising the Bush Administration by slicing off a piece of eastern Georgia in 2008. Then, the Obama Administration stood by and refused to provide support or impose serious sanctions on Russia in 2014 when Putin seized control of the Crimea Peninsula from Ukraine.

President Trump himself experienced a unique relationship with Putin, one that was not free of critique, albeit under a stronger umbrella of national defense and foreign policy.

While Putin's provocative behavior has spanned far beyond the last few months, the fact of the matter is his invasion of Ukraine happened under President Joe Biden's watch. The world watches what America's president does and acts accordingly.

Although President Biden ran his campaign on being a foreign policy expert, as our Commander in Chief he has been asleep at the wheel. His

self-claimed expertise was certainly missing in his bungled Afghanistan withdrawal and in his first budget, in which he proposed woefully insufficient funding for our national defense.

President Biden then showed his short sightedness and naivete when he green lighted Russia's Nord Stream II pipeline and directly undercut the American energy industry while strengthening Europe's dependence on Russia.

Furthermore, President Biden has failed to influence world leaders outside of Europe, refusing to answer questions about discussions with China or India regarding Russian aggression.

The United States should be the global arbiter of peace and stability during times of crisis. It is clear that these regional powers view the current leadership as lacking in the strength

## Turnpike opposition

Oklahoma Gov. Kevin Stitt and Transportation Secretary Tim Gatz recently presented a \$5 billion, 15-year-long plan to the Oklahoma Turnpike Authority Board of Directors to continue work on state turnpikes.

The plan is called ACCESS Oklahoma, which stands for Advancing and Connecting Communities and Economies Safely Statewide.

Expansion would be paid with bonds, while revenues from tolls, investments and concession leases would pay all operating and maintenance costs for the turnpikes and pay off the bonds.

Portions of the proposed project would come through our House District 20 including work on the spur near Newcastle and, on the east, the building of a connector route from Interstates 40 to 35 that would run near Slaughterville.

An additional route is planned between Norman and Moore from where State Highway 37 connects to Interstate 44 running east to where it would connect with the proposed turnpike route northeast of Franklin.

The governor and transportation secretary call these reliever routes designed to ease traffic congestion and improve travel times around the busy Oklahoma City metro area.

They also said they plan to add more access points for communities along the system, which could give rural residents quicker access to Oklahoma City and the services and opportunities available in the larger metropolitan area.

While the governor and the transportation secretary say this will ease travel times and lead to more economic development opportunities across the state, several people in our area have reached out saying they are opposed to the project.

One Norman resident said the turnpike would take out her home or would be in her back yard. Another Norman

resident said the area proposed for the turnpike is in a portion of Norman that has had restricted development to protect the city's water supply – Lake Thunderbird.

A Cleveland County resident said she is deeply opposed to the plan. In addition to the loss of homes or property, other concerns are noise, pollution, run-off and the potential destruction of wildlife habitat and forested acres.

The governor in his State of the State address this year mentioned the Kickapoo Turnpike, which opened east of Oklahoma City a year ago. He said it's created an economic explosion for the city of Harrah resulting in 2,200 new homes under construction and the opening of the city's first hotel. The city's population is estimated to almost double in three or four years.

The question, of course, is do residents in our area want that kind of growth. The Kickapoo Turnpike drew opposition as well. Many residents were upset over losing property, disruptive construction, and the changes to their way of life.

I'm in favor of improving safety for drivers and easing traffic congestion and travel times as well as connecting residents and businesses to services in other areas.

I do, however, understand why people choose not to live in metropolitan areas. We value our rural way of life for many reasons, and we don't always want to be so connected to the larger city. Progress is good, but is a subjective concept.

There are many families and businesses in House District 20 who will be impacted by this expansion. If I can answer any questions or be a resource to you, please let me know. I will help ensure your concerns are heard and questions are answered.

and conviction necessary to unite against Putin.

President Biden has projected unequivocal weakness to a watching world, and Ukraine is paying the price for that now. Indeed, Putin was amassing troops and blood on the Ukrainian border for months before initiating his invasion, in direct violation of international law.

President Biden was right to announce swift and severe sanctions on Russia, which are important for holding Russian politicians and other elites accountable. However, it is clear that Russia is neither intimidated nor deterred.

Now, after the Russian invasion of Ukraine, the price of oil has already eclipsed \$100 per barrel, the highest levels since 2014. President Biden has the ability to immediately address the rising price of oil by reversing his anti-American energy policies and allowing American companies to increase domestic oil and gas production.

Not only is such a move helpful to protecting and strengthening our economy, but it protects our national security and lessens our reliance on adversarial foreign producers. Producing more oil and natural gas at home could also aid our friends and allies around the world as a friendly exporter.

Unfortunately, at a time when our adversaries are becoming increasingly and alarmingly more aggressive, President Biden and many Democrats only very recently began to retreat from effective cuts in the current version of the annual defense appropriations bill.

The vital defense appropriations legislation, if ultimately appropriately increased and enacted into law, would provide necessary resources and funding to help stand up to our adversaries, like Russia, while also sending support to our allies. This bill should also include large amounts of additional security assistance and related support for Ukraine.

We should do everything in our power to punish Putin and his criminal and repressive regime for the egregious act of aggression against an innocent neighbor. If he succeeds today, we will face further aggression from him and other likeminded countries tomorrow.

But in order to fully accomplish this, the United States must prioritize our defense spending. It is unfortunate that President Biden has put funding and development of our national defense on the backburner during such a perilous time.

Fortunately, the president has the opportunity to formalize a reversal on his approach to defense spending when he delivers his State of the Union and his proposed budget for fiscal year 2023 to Congress. And I hope he does just that.

The Russian invasion of Ukraine is an unprovoked, naked act of aggression that is eerily reminiscent of what the world witnessed almost a century ago in the 1930s. The world was slow to unite to confront aggression in that era. It must not make the same mistake today.

to determine the best way to support our troopers throughout the state.


For such a short week, it was a full one and I'm anxious to see what we get accomplished this week.

# WISDOM with Wyatt

Lionfish, or scientifically called Pterois, is a very recognizable fish with their red and white striped patterns and their venomous spikes.

The lionfish is often considered a jewel or centerpiece in anyone's aquarium but that has led to devastating environmental effects on our world's oceans.

Native to the Indian and Pacific oceans, they are a fierce predatory fish to about anything smaller to them which mainly entails invertebrates and smaller fish. With few predators themselves, this allows them to thrive in these areas.

But seeing their largest predator, the Moray eel, is native to these areas. The population has never gotten out of hand.

The lionfish raised in popularity in the 1970s mostly thanks to the successful movie "The Spy Who Loved Me," a movie featuring James Bond posing as a marine biologist, which prominently featured lionfish in multiple scenes. After the movie was released, people flocked to vendors to own their very own lionfish.

An unforeseen consequence came when off the coast of Florida lionfish were discovered in the reefs of the warm waters. This was determined to be caused by irresponsible pet owners releasing their lionfish into the ocean intentionally or otherwise.

With a lack of natural predators, the lionfish was able to reproduce at alarming levels and has since spread from the northeast coast of New England to the islands of the Caribbean. With some reports coming from as far south as the Brazilian coast.

Thanks to the lionfish feeding behavior and their overwhelming numbers, they have proved to be a critical threat to ecosystems especially to the coral reefs.

The lionfish is known to prey on 70 species of known fish, several of these species are important to humans for economic and human needs such as the snapper and grouper, which are important in the fishing industry.

What have we done and are doing to combat the situation?

The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) are working on many projects to handle management and prevention in fact the NOAA's Office of National Marine Sanctuary is developing a lionfish management plan to guide the prevention, early detection, research, management, and control of the lionfish in the Florida Keys, Flower Garden Banks, and Gray's Reef National Marine Sanctuaries in the oceans of the southeast United States.

Another force fighting against the lionfish invasion are restaurants. Restaurants in the Southern United States have started to add lionfish to the menu. Recreational divers have picked up the sword as well with divers hunting the lionfish for sport and for personal consumption.

In conclusion, the lionfish that many have read about in elementary have come to plunder our native ocean ecosystems, but we have come to fight back against these beautiful creatures.

So, I say we need to eat lionfish to save the ocean!

As I watched the news last night of Russia's invasion of Ukraine, it scared me as it probably has scared many of you wondering what is going to happen next. Not that this helps the larger picture, but I thought I would write about the events to give a bit of historical perspective.

This week started with the invasion of two Ukrainian territories by Russian forces. Putin's justification is that these two sections broke away from Ukraine in 2014 and have been fighting for freedom. Putin claims only to be recognizing their independence and sending in troops for their protection. He is also claiming that, in fact, Ukraine should not be seen as a sovereign nation but is actually part of Russia and the land was stolen from Russia.

Given this, Putin claims Russia has the right to reclaim its former lands and people. While some of his claims have validity, historically speaking, this is not the first time a tyrannical leader has used this approach of reuniting his people to justify invasion and conquest.

Like all good villains, Putin is not telling a complete lie. He has mingled in some truths to justify and confuse his actions. Where Putin has some justification is this, and I only have room for a very short version. In the Ninth Century, Kyiv, now the capital of Ukraine, was once the capital of the first Slavic state, Kyvian Rusin, that today covers both Russia and Ukraine. This means that Russians have always considered Kyiv as their nation's birthplace.

The lands that are Ukraine were then fought over for the next century until 1793 when it was brought into the Russian Empire. Trying to control this new territory, the Czar outlawed speaking Ukrainian but really could only enforce his rulings over the eastern half. So Eastern Ukraine, where Luhansk and Donetsk are located, became very much Russian in both language and Orthodox Christianity while Western Ukraine still tried to retain its language and Catholicism.

During WWI when the new Bolshevik Russian government came to power and signed a treaty with the Central Powers (Germany) to pull out of the war, it agreed to grant Ukraine independence. However, when Germany lost the war in 1918, the Russians reneged on their agreement. There were some Ukraine nationalist movements, especially in the west, but those were crushed by the Russians. By 1922 Ukraine was completely under the control of Russia and the Russian language was enforced.

Ukraine emerged as an independent nation in 1994 with the breakup of the Soviet Union, but the nation has remained somewhat split as the West looked more to Europe and the European Union, while the East remained tied to the Russian Federation. So, the two regions in question, Luhansk and Donetsk, have actually been under the control of Russian-backed separatists since 2014 and consider themselves independent. They have erected statues of Lenin, follow the Russian constitution, and are run by small tyrannical leaders. It is only now that Russia has officially recognized them as independent and moved in troops.

The question now is: will Putin stay put? His actions of yesterday do not seem to suggest this. The borders of these regions historically have been larger and other areas of eastern Ukraine support Russia. If Putin is not stopped now, he may want to start adding other parts of Ukraine loyal to Russia. I am not sure of Putin's knowledge of history. He may be thinking his plan of consolidating all like-minded peoples into one nation as his own. However, whether he knows it or not, he is simply following the plan of one of Russia's worst enemies, Nazi Germany.

When Hitler took over Germany, one of his top priorities was reestablishing German pride to get popular support. One way he did this was to reclaim lost German land taken from them after WWI and, thus, bring all the German-speaking people back into the fold. After World War I ended, Germany lost territory to Poland, Belgium, Czechoslovakia, and France. Then in 1936, Germany invaded the Rhineland, claiming the land belonged to Germany.

Neither France nor England wanted to engage Hitler so instead they did nothing, a policy that became known as appeasement, a policy that only emboldened Hitler. Hitler then invaded Czechoslovakia and Austria under the same pretext. There was a Nazi Party in Austria that even welcomed Hitler, not unlike the Russian rebel groups in the Ukraine. Despite both these aggressive moves, England and France continued their policy of diplomacy and appeasement. It was not until Germany's invasion of Poland that the other powers declared war, but by then Hitler was already too powerful to stop.

Hitler's invasion of the Alsace-Lorraine Alsace-Lorraine territory is personal to me. My great-grandfather Alfons Finck was born in the German city of Haguenau. During the Great War, he fought for his nation and received the Iron Cross for being wounded in the Battle of Flanders. Yet when Germany lost the war, his home became part of France. He left France for the U.S. before Germany could take the land back.

I never discussed this with my grandfather, and he never talked about it in his writings, but I wonder what he thought about Hitler taking back this region. I know he did not support Hitler. He sent two of his sons to war against him, but at the same time I know that he considered himself German, not French.

The point of all this rambling is that the situation in Ukraine is complicated. I am in no way agreeing with Putin or Hitler. Putin is an evil tyrant who needs to be stopped. However, we can't ignore the history and history reminds us that German-speaking people from a previous time, who found themselves in a similar situation, considered themselves German and supported the take-over from another country.

Today, some Ukrainians support Putin. At the same time, some evidence suggests that some of the support in each case was manufactured from the outside by both dictators. It is also important to remember that most Ukrainians want independence and will fight for their freedom. The other complicated issue is appeasement. Most believe that if England had stopped Hitler when he first got started, the world would have avoided WWII. England only moved on Hitler when Churchill took over and then it was too late.

I am by no means saying we should go to war over Ukraine, only that history shows what could happen if tyrants are not stopped. President Biden has some important decisions to make in the coming weeks and hopefully he understands that he can learn from what has happened before.

### Philly Cheese Steak Tater Tot Casserole

1 lb. lean ground beef  
1 cup diced yellow onion  
1 cup diced green pepper  
1 cup sliced white mushrooms  
1 cup water  
0.87 oz. brown gravy mix  
4 cups shredded mozzarella and cheddar cheese blend  
28 oz. frozen tater tots

Preheat to 425F.

Dump lean ground beef into a large saute pan over medium-high heat along with a dab of margarine or butter. Crumble the ground beef well as it cooks.

Once the ground beef is only slightly pink, add the diced onion, diced green pepper and sliced mushrooms to the pan.

Stir well and continue cooking until onions are translucent and ground beef is completely cooked.

Add the water and gravy mix to the pan. Stir well and continue to cook until the gravy starts to boil and thicken.

Dump the ground beef mixture into a greased 9 x 13 inch baking dish and spread it out evenly.

Sprinkle 2 cups of the shredded cheese on top of the meat mixture. Place the frozen tater tots in a single layer on top of the cheese.

Place the dish in the oven and bake the casserole for 40 minutes. After 40 minutes remove the casserole from the oven and sprinkle the remaining 2 cups of shredded cheese on top of the tater tots.

Return the dish to the oven and continue baking the casserole just until the cheese is completely melted. 4-5 minutes.

Remove the casserole from the oven and leave it to sit for a few minutes before scooping and serving.

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# HS diplomas

## In reach through 3-week intense study

Oklahoma’s Resolute, the adult education program of Chickasha Public Schools, will be hosted by Purcell and Wynnewood Public Schools during March and April.

Mary Ann Ward, an instructor, said three weeks of intensive study are scheduled each month.

Classes in Purcell will meet in the old Junior High School from 8:30 a.m. to 2 p.m. Tuesdays through Thursdays.

In Wynnewood, the classes will be Tuesdays and Thursdays from 5:30 p.m. to 9 p.m. in the middle school.

In both locations, the classes will be the first three weeks of the month.

Ward said the classes are days before official tests are offered.

Cost is minimal and the program’s \$20 enrollment fee covers everything until the student graduates.

Students will be able to use the program’s internet and Chromebooks.

Those with phones, tablets or computers with internet access may also do work outside of class on a very good online program which Ward monitors.

Five subject tests are offered. Each test costs \$22.50 and there is a one-time state fee of \$10.

“Though this cost may be a bit prohibitive to some, often generous donors help out by making tax-deductible contributions to our parent-partner, Chickasha Adult Learning

Center,” Ward said. “We help our students in every way possible.”

“There are people who are unaware that this program exists,” she continued. “Some have gone years, thinking they have missed the opportunity to earn a diploma or thinking it will be a long, drawn-out process or they cannot earn their diploma while raising a family.

“However, for most, it only takes weeks or a few months of study to earn the treasured document.”

Ward added that the program, which is open to students age 16 and older, can also serve as a quick step for “those who find themselves a non-traditional student.”

“An educated workforce benefits our city, community and state,” Ward said. “We can do our part to keep industries from choosing other states simply because our statistics don’t reflect the intelligence and work-attitude of many of our citizens.

“We can bring up our numbers with higher graduation rates. We all benefit from educated neighbors and friends. You and I, our children and our neighbors should be rejoicing each time a student gets to walk across the stage.”

### St. Louis Arch Chapter Seven

Dorothy, age 45 & Barbara, age 18 | 1964

Barbara watched men scaling the construction ladder. They climbed high above the Mississippi River. Only halfway built, the Gateway Arch’s legs stood 300 feet above the ground. She clutched her homemade protest sign which read NO JOBS, NO ARCH.

Barbara had lived in St. Louis for her entire life. But it was at St. Louis University that she learned about the city’s history of racial inequality. While attending SLU, she’d seen historically black neighborhoods fall into disrepair. White friends and neighbors were moving west to the suburbs. She had been attending meetings of a group that was acting on some of these issues, the Congress of Racial Equality or CORE.

Today’s protest was taking place on the construction grounds of the Gateway Arch to address issues of racial inequality surrounding its construction. For most of Barbara’s life, people had talked about the plans for the Arch, a monument dedicated to the westward expansion of the United States. The Arch would be a feature of the St. Louis skyline. It was fascinating to watch workers stack shiny blocks of steel, one atop the

other, implementing architect Eero Saarinen’s elegant design. This massive project employed many people, yet very few were Black. CORE’s protest centered around this issue. She and friends marched through the construction grounds carrying their signs and chanting, “Skilled jobs now! Skilled jobs now!”

Suddenly two of CORE’s leaders, Percy Green and Richard Daly, began climbing the Arch’s construction ladder! Barbara held her breath in the July heat as they made their way skyward. The protest was taking place at noon while the construction workers were on their lunch breaks. This gave Percy and Richard access to the ladder. Police officers gathered at the base of the construction elevator while deciding what to do.

“Will they stay up there all day,” Barbara asked. “What’s their plan?”

“They’re making a point, they’ll come down in a few hours,” someone answered.

Three sweltering hours later, the men did come down. When they reached the ground, the two men lay down. This passive resistance move made it necessary for police officers to carry them.


“I read in the newspaper that Richard got 30 days in jail and Percy is out on bond,” Barbara told her roommate, Molly, the next day.

“I can’t believe you saw them climbing the Arch. That’s crazy!” Molly answered.

Barbara was proud of witnessing and making history. “Sometimes you’ve got to do something crazy to get things done.” She nodded at the poster board and paint.

“Percy’s protesting tomorrow at the Old Court House,” Barbara said. “Care to join?”

Molly smiled and the two women began to paint.

## Century:

\$30,000 in capital.

All the stock was owned by citizens in Purcell and the surrounding area.

Six months and one week later, at the close of business on September 15, the bank’s total assets had grown to \$298,212.95.

Flash forward 100 years, and the bank has assets of more than \$275 million and 55 employees are considered part of the bank family. If you doubt that, look no further than the longevity of those employees.

But that is getting ahead of the story.

In 1927, the bank purchased Chickasaw National Bank of Purcell.

Then in 1935 at the height of the Great Depression, Earl Sherman began working at the bank.

It was the start of a multi-generational family legacy that has continued to the present.

Earl persuaded his brother, Neil, a Lexington teacher, to come work with him in 1936.

Also in 1936, the bank purchased First State Bank of Wayne. It added to its acquisitions in 1941 with the purchase of Byars State Bank.

By 1955, control of the bank was vested in the Wells and Sherman families.

Then in 1980, the Sherman family acquired complete control of McClain County National Bank.

When the FDIC closed First

National Bank of Purcell and First State Bank of Lexington in 1990, McClain County National Bank purchased both from FDIC.

In 2001, the bank changed its name to McClain Bank in preparation of its presence in Norman and Cleveland County.

Ribbon cuttings at the McClain Bank Norman Branch and McClain Bank Noble Branch were held on Oct. 22, 2002 and April 4, 2007, respectively.

Earl Sherman would serve as bank president from 1955 to 1977 and chairman of the board until he died in 1999.

Neil followed his brother as president, serving as president until 1988. He died in 1990.

New generations of Shermans picked up the banking reins.

Neil’s son, Don, had more than 55 years of service at McClain Bank. He was president from 1988 to 2001 and chairman until his death in 2016.

Earl’s son, Charlie, began his career with the bank in 1974 and was named chairman in 2016.

Steve is Neil’s grandson and Earl’s nephew. Born in Purcell, he was raised in Arkansas City, Kan., where his father, Jim, was transferred by the railroad. Steve graduated from Kansas State with a finance degree.

He moved back to Purcell and joined the bank in 1983. He is the current president.

Donald is Don’s son. He

worked at the bank throughout high school and later earned an accounting degree.

He worked as a bank examiner and also worked for Price Waterhouse and Liberty National Bank before rejoining the family business as controller in 1992. He is presently chief executive officer.

Through the decades there have been good times and not-so-good times, Donald Sherman said.

“We’re thankful. We’ve been blessed by God and never had to close,” he said.

The Sherman family influence has been felt for 87 of the past 100 years and it’s not simply the longevity of employees as the loyalty of its customers.

It’s no accident that McClain bank counts generations of customers as one key strength.

“We have served several generations of the same families,” Sherman said. “It’s been an honor.”

McClain Bank probably isn’t the only century-old bank in Oklahoma. Still it weathered the Great Depression and the bank closures of the 1980s and 1990s.

One hundred years have brought changes too numerous to count.

The future is bright with promise, too.

“We have some really great employees we’ve groomed for leadership,” Sherman said.

# Purple Martins return to Oklahoma

In a sure sign that spring is not far behind, the first Purple Martins of the year have been spotted in Oklahoma.

The birds were seen on February 25 in Mooreland, Oklahoma by a Purple Martin enthusiast – one of many throughout the eastern and central United States who track and report on the birds’ annual migration on behalf of the Purple Martin Conservation Association.

The migration of these unique birds can be reported and tracked through a project called the Scout-Arrival Study.

“The first Purple Martin arrivals of the season are always an exciting event,” said Joe Siegrist, President of the Purple Martin Conservation Association. “Tracking the migration is not only fun, it also provides us with valuable information that helps inform our research and strengthen our efforts to make sure we’re doing everything possible to sustain the population of these amazing birds.”

North America’s largest species of swallow, Purple Martins winter in the rainforests of Brazil before making a 7000-mile migration north into the eastern United States and Canada.

The annual migration is a testament to the martins’ resilience as well as the unwavering dedication of thousands of ‘martin landlords’ who maintain multi-compartment nest ‘condos’ that are essential for

the birds’ survival.

Once widespread in rural America, this species, that eats billions of flying insects annually, has been disappearing at an alarming rate, experiencing a loss of one-third of its population over the last 50 years.

“The decline seems to be the combination of a few factors: nesting habitat loss, competing invasive species, decreasing prey availability, and climate change,” said Siegrist. “Over the majority of the Purple Martins’ range, they are unable to nest naturally any longer. Human-provided nest boxes are the only thing keeping the species alive east of the Rocky Mountains.”

Siegrist says the survival is due in large part to scores of dedicated conservationists who invest into maintaining housing for the martins.

“The landlords provide critical shelter for the martins,” Siegrist said. “In return, they are rewarded with a family-like bond with the birds who return to the same colony year after year like clockwork.”



The noise of the procession is no unusual thing, as well-wishers commonly pack the streets to encourage the travelers to Jerusalem on their yearly pilgrimage.

But the commotion is louder than usual today. One special traveler has taken His place in this crowd heading up to Jerusalem for the Passover. It

is a strong, young Galilean they had all heard about, Jesus of Nazareth. His fame has grown daily as he walked the streets and shores of Galilee elegantly for some years, hushing the Pharisees, calming the storms, offering peace to all.

The noise has grown to such a level that one particular man sitting up ahead on the side of the road turns to the nearest person and asks what all the commotion is.

“Don't you know,” he must have replied in shock. “Don't you know that Jesus is passing by?”

This news is what this man by the name of Bartimaeus has waited for years to hear.

Perhaps that is why he chooses to sit in this very spot today. Bartimaeus, you see, is a blind man; and he must have known that if he ever had hope of seeing a sunrise or looking into the eyes of his loved ones, this is the Man he must meet.

Bartimaeus immediately calls out, “Jesus, thou Son of David, have mercy on me” (Mark 10:47).

Those standing near quickly rebuke the blind man: Hold your peace, they say! Don't you know Jesus is busy! What's wrong with you, sir? Don't make a scene right here in the middle

of the street! Do you want to give our town a bad name? ... And on and on.

But I want to tell you that this man not only is blind, but he is deaf, too – deaf to the criticism and the rebukes. This is his chance for salvation, and he is not about to let it pass him by. The inspired writer tells us – and it is a beautiful thing – that “he cried the more a great deal, Thou Son of David, have mercy on me!” (v. 48) – this accelerated clamor much to the dismay of spectators nearby.

Bartimaeus is different from all of the others, and – perhaps – he is different from you and me, too. Bartimaeus is a complete and absolute desperate man. He has no worry in the world about what he is wearing, or how he might be perceived, or who particularly likes his pleas or who doesn’t. His only concern is to get the attention of the Master, to call and cry and plead, laying it all on the line, until by chance the Lord mercifully turns his face toward him.

Indeed – if you know this great story – you know our Lord hears the desperate cries of the blind man, and Jesus does an amazing thing when those cries come to His ears. He stands still (v. 49).

No, it is not that Jesus is not

busy. He likely has never been busier. He is on a mission. His “face set toward Jerusalem.” He is a man with a purpose. But he lays aside His busy schedule, diverges from his itinerary for a minute, and calls for the man. Our Lord must have known before He set foot on the ground that morning that He would meet such a man, a Bartimaeus, one to whom He could give a great blessing.

The Lord calls Bartimaeus, and – after a brief interview – does one of the most amazing things you will ever read: He reaches out and touches him!

Oh, the touch of Jesus! No touch can compare. It is a touch of warmth, a touch of compassion, a touch of love, a touch of healing!

The songwriter catches this moment poetically many years ago, writing, “He touched me! Oh, he touched me. And, oh, the joy that filled my soul. Something happened, and now I know, He touched me, and made me whole!”

Many of us through the years have enjoyed that beautiful melody and message, even as we have enjoyed this great story from the Jericho Road.

And I want you to know today that Jesus not only touches Bartimaeus, making him whole,

filling his soul with an indescribable joy. He also reaches out and touches another desperate blind friend who resides beside him. I am so glad that Matthew adds that complimentary point to this great narrative! (20:34). Because of this Jesus, these two men look up and see the splendid beauties of God’s nature for the first time. But that is not all: They lay aside their blankets and follow Jesus, glorifying God as they go. They had felt His touch of grace unlike few had ever done! (Luke 18:43).

Some might think: But Bartimaeus could have waited. This matter was not so urgent. This Jesus who passed down this Jericho Road would surely come back again, and he could’ve caught the Lord on the next trip. Why the urgency?

But we know that Jesus is not passing this way again, not ever. He is going to Jerusalem only this once more, and in a few short days He will be led outside the city to a little knoll called Calvary, and the world will there nail him to a cruel tree. For Bartimaeus – and for his suffering friend – this is not only a chance for him to meet our Master:




