# Hospital opening DELAYED

### New facility won't open as planned on May 3

Despite best efforts by all involved, the new Purcell Municipal Hospital won't open as planned on May 3.

That was the news Max Waldrop of Waldrop Construction shared with Purcell Public Works Authority at Monday's meeting.

Waldrop was spokesman for his company, the contractor for the project, as well as representatives from SSM and Miller Architects.

The contractor declined to speculate on another "go live" date for the facility,

adding that he expects to have that date by the authority's April meeting.

The planned open house is also a "no go," he added.

There are some supply chain issues, Waldrop said, but the biggest hold up is a manpower shortage.

"Nobody is saying Purcell is not a priority," he said. "I am also disappointed. We are behind on our parts."

City manager Dale Bunn said last month's action firing the paving contractor for sub-standard work is one

factor working against the May 3 opening.

Dirt work and the underlying rock layer has to be removed so a new company can properly construct the road around the hospital.

"We're not the only ones riding this horse," vice mayor Danny Jacobs said of the manpower shortage.

Waldrop did offer one silver lining, however. The hospital is still on track to be completed under budget.

A lack of manpower is

## OHP: DUI was cause of collision

One person was injured and transported to St. Anthony's Hospital in Oklahoma City after a three-vehicle traffic accident at mile marker 104 in Goldsby last Friday night.

According to the Oklahoma Highway Patrol a 2009 Lincoln MKS driven by Dustin Stokesberry, 41, of Del City entered the northbound lanes of I-35

heading southbound just after 8:30 p.m. March 4.

After traveling approximately 500 feet going the wrong way his vehicle struck a 2018 Toyota Tundra driven by Nancy Dudeck, 57, of Guthrie head-on.

The Stokesberry vehicle then struck a 2022 Subaru Outback driven by Daniel Shi, 23, of

Columbia, Mo.

Stokesberry, who was cited for DUI by the patrol, was transported by Wadley's EMS to the Oklahoma City hospital with head and internal injuries. He was admitted in fair condition.

The OHP said Dudeck was treated and released at the scene and Shi was not injured.

Those who donate blood with Oklahoma Blood Institute in March will receive a free t-shirt and their choice of one free entry to the Oklahoma City Zoo or the National Cowboy & Western Heritage Museum. Tickets may be used throughout the remainder of the year.


March is historically a challenging month for blood donations as many people are busy traveling for spring break and enjoying the warmer weather. Unfortunately, these factors have a negative impact on the blood supply. OBI needs 1,200 donors a day to maintain an

adequate blood supply.

"We take our role as the community blood provider very seriously," said Dr. John Armitage, president and CEO of Oklahoma Blood Institute. "Our blood supply is an essential part of our health care system, so we're extremely thankful for partners like the OKC Zoo and the National Cowboy & Western Heritage Museum for their partnership in helping ensure we have a healthy blood supply for patients in need."

Anyone who is healthy and 16 years old or older can give blood. Sixteen-year-olds must weigh at least 125 pounds and provide signed parental permission; 17-year-olds must weigh at least 125 pounds; 18+ year olds must weigh at least 110 pounds. A photo ID is required.

Donation typically takes only about an hour, and one donation saves up to three lives. Appointments to donate can be made online at obi.org or by calling 877-340-8777. Walk-ins are also welcome.

### Abandonment of Refrigerators and Iceboxes in Places Accessible to Children

Any person, firm, or corporation who abandons or discards in any place accessible to children any refrigerator, icebox, or ice chest of a capacity of one and one-half (1-1/2) cubic feet or more which has an attached lid or door which may be opened or fastened shut by means of an attached latch, or who, being the owner, lessee, or manager of such place, knowingly permits such abandoned or discarded refrigerator, icebox, or ice chest to remain in such condition shall be deemed negligent as a matter of law and shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

(Prior Code 1991, §8-115) State Law Reference: Similar provisions, 21 O.S. §120S.

## Update from the Capitol

Before we get into legislative matters, I want to recognize all the outstanding accomplishments of our local schools! From our school band programs and athletic programs, all the way to multiple academic awards and agricultural achievements, our schools are doing great things throughout Oklahoma.

You all have made Senate District 43 so proud and represented southern Oklahoma well. Congratulations to all of you! Keep up the good work.

We made it past a major legislative hurdle last week, wrapping up committee work on roughly 400 bills. It was

smooth sailing until the winter storms shut us down for two days, but we simply worked longer hours last week and got our work done.

To date, we have also passed more than 70 measures off the Senate floor and have another nearly 330 to get through before our next deadline on Thursday, March 24.

I'm happy to say that nearly 20 of my bills were reported out of committee, and two of those have already made it to the House. The others are awaiting a hearing by the full Senate.

Something special that we have the privilege of doing in

the Legislature is renaming bridges, roads, and highways in honor of Oklahoma's fallen heroes. One of my bills will designate the bridge over I-35 on State Highway 74 in Purcell as the "SSGT Cecil Wellman Memorial Bridge."

Army Staff Sergeant Wellman was born in Purcell in 1937 and served in the U.S. Army. He began his tour in Vietnam on July 2, 1970, as an Infantry Operations and Intelligence Specialist with the 1st Calvary Division, 1st Squadron, 9th Calvary, D Troop.

### America must stop buying Russian oil

Last week Vladimir Putin increased his ruthless invasion of Ukraine and gained de facto control over a major city in the country, demonstrating that this unhinged dictator has no intention of letting up.

Such outrageous and despicable actions must be met with the most severe and immediate response available to the President of the United States and our NATO allied leaders.

Unfortunately, President Joe Biden has thus far failed to cut off an obvious revenue stream from our country that is currently funding Putin's war machine, and that is the continued U.S. import of Russian oil.

During his State of the Union address last week, President Biden reinforced the importance of buying U.S. products, which taken on its face sounds promising. However, in the same speech, the president also doubled down on his anti-American energy policies and proposals that have resulted in a national energy crisis.

Remember, one of the president's first executive actions following his inauguration was cancellation of the Keystone XL pipeline and moratoriums on new oil and gas leasing on federal lands.

These misguided decisions not only damaged prior strides made in strengthening America's energy independence and empowering domestic producers, but it has meant that our country is much more reliant on adversarial foreign producers such as Russia.

The fact that America can thrive as both an energy producer and supplier makes it baffling that President Biden won't reverse his misguided policies, especially amid the threat of Putin's evil regime and its continued aggression against an innocent neighbor.

Indeed, the security threat posed by our reliance on Russian oil leaves us open to Putin's retaliation. At any point, he could choose to strike back on the dozens of countries, including our own, that have

imposed sanctions on him and his regime by simply turning off the spigot.

In light of this reality, I was very disappointed that last week House Democrats blocked a vote on the American Energy Independence from Russia Act, which would strengthen America's energy security and encourage domestic production of crude oil, petroleum products and natural gas.

If enacted, this legislation would help the United States produce enough liquid energy for ourselves and our European friends that need it most.

However, what is stopping the United States from quickly and immediately punishing Putin by banning imports on all Russian energy products? Nothing other than the support of the Biden Administration.

Even Democratic House Speaker Nancy Pelosi recently admitted the outrageousness of continuing to import Russian

### House completes committee deadline

On Wednesday, I presented three bills before the Public Health Committee, which I chair.

House Bill 3311 directs the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education and the Oklahoma Dept. of Career and Technology Education to prepare and publish an annual report with details on the number of students in the healthcare field, including how many graduate and ultimately remain in Oklahoma.

This will help the state assess Oklahoma's healthcare occupations and needs.

House Bill 3560 was another bill I presented. It was requested by the Oklahoma Dept. of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services. The bill allows the Board of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services to sell property held in a trust to

benefit the ODMHSAS.

The land to be potentially sold is currently leased to a treatment provider who is interested in purchasing the land outright.

The committee also approved House Bill 3313, which would provide an enforcement mechanism to the "No Patient Left Alone" Act passed last year.

In spite of last year's bill requiring patients be allowed to designate a visitor, many hospitals are not following the law.

The bill allows any person to bring a civil action against anybody who isolates a COVID-19 patient without visitation rights, knowingly aids in the isolation of a patient or intends to isolate or aid in the isolation.

As a health care professional, I believe human touch is essential to the healing process. It is inhumane to refuse a patient the right to see their loved one at a time when they need hope and love to encourage them in

## Legislative process

We're one-quarter of the way through the second session of the 58th Legislature. There are less than three months to go until we sine die. The dates for convening and ending the legislative session are specified in the state Constitution.

We are required to convene the first Monday in February each year and sine die no later than the last Friday in May.

The first month of the legislative session is primarily dedicated to committee work. Once bills are first and second read, they can be assigned to committee.

Of course, a committee chair has to agree to hear a bill. This often requires the bill's author to speak with the chair to explain what the measure will accomplish if it is signed into law. The author may also spend time talking to committee members to explain the legislation and answer questions.

When a bill is presented in committee, the author may face additional questions or debate before a vote is taken. Any House bill with a fiscal impact on state dollars has to first go through an Appropriations & Budget subcommittee and then the full House A&B Committee.

If a bill passes committee, it's eligible to be heard on the House floor, but again that is subject to the will of the majority floor leader.

Floor work is generally light the first month of session but picks up swiftly after committee deadlines.

This year, committee work faced the additional challenge of the House being closed for several days because of icy

roads throughout the state. Committee meetings were canceled February 23-24, forcing many bills to be carried over to deadline week. Agendas were quite lengthy in advance of the March 3 deadline for all bills to be advanced out of committee.

We have until March 24 to pass House bills over to the Senate, and we'll have until April 28 to pass Senate bills. Once bills reach the opposite chamber, they go through the committee process again and a floor vote in that chamber.

If bills pass without amendment, they advance to the governor who can either sign them into law or veto. If bills are amended, they return to their chamber of origin where the amendments are either adopted or not.

If not, the bill has one final chance of being advanced to the governor – through the conference committee process. This committee is made up of both House and Senate members from the committees that originally considered the bill. If they can work out final language, the bill can advance to the governor.

Many bills die in conference committee, however. If the governor vetoes a bill, that action can be overridden with a two-thirds vote of both the House and Senate. These instances are fairly rare.

We have a lot of session ahead of us and a good amount of legislation to still consider.

## Ava's Law receives passage in Senate

As Bre Frizzell watched from the gallery, the state Senate passed Ava's Law, a measure named in memory of her infant daughter who passed away a few weeks after her birth.

Sen. Jessica Garvin, R-Duncan, introduced Senate Bill 1462 to help prevent other Oklahoma parents from experiencing such a devastating loss by properly training them on infant cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR).

"This is really important for women to learn before they have babies because infant CPR is completely different as far as technique. When you talk about doing infant CPR versus adult CPR or child CPR, it's just completely different," Garvin said.

"This provides women who are pregnant with the informa-

tion they would need to save their child's life, so they don't have to suffer like my friend, Bre, and her family has. I'm grateful for her strength in bringing this important issue to the Legislature's attention," she concluded.

SB 1462 would require anyone licensed to practice medicine and surgery in Oklahoma or duly licensed as Advanced Registered Practice Nurses, like Certified Nurse-Midwives, to provide infant CPR and basic first aid, including contact information for training programs and cord blood banking and donation information to pregnant mothers.

The bill moves to the House where Mark Lawson, R-Sapulpa, is carrying the measure.

energy while Putin continues his unprovoked war and continued attacks against the Ukrainian people.

In fact, the U.S. currently imports approximately 700,000 barrels of Russian oil and other petroleum products per day. That means the United States is indirectly funding Putin's war chest, which is absolutely unconscionable.

Considering that Russia's energy industry makes up around one-quarter of its Gross Domestic Product, it is simply common sense for America and our allies to immediately stop buying these products from a country led by an evil and authoritarian dictator.

That is why last week I sent

a letter to President Biden urging him to immediately institute an embargo on all Russian energy, as well as encourage our allies and global partners to take immediate similar actions.

Additionally, I led introduction of the Prohibition on Imports of Russian Oil Act, which would immediately cease all U.S. imports of Russian oil and other petroleum-based energy products.

This legislation, if enacted, would cause immediate, crippling economic effects on the Russian economy. Indeed, the United States must hold Putin's regime accountable and stop further support of the atrocities committed.

Finally, the United States

must demonstrate clear resolve and strength that signals to Putin that we are capable of defending ourselves and our NATO allies. To achieve this though, we need to prioritize and increase funding for our national defense. Frankly, both parties have already agreed to defense spending well above the amount the president proposed in his budget.

With adversaries becoming emboldened, there is no room for President Biden to propose underfunding of our national defense. And I was disappointed that the president did not provide assurances that he planned to reverse that error in his previous budget when he addressed the nation in his State of the Union last week.

In a matter of days, the world has become an increasingly more dangerous place and the way in which the United States responds to Russia's aggression has the ability to either embolden or deter other adversaries and bad actors around the world.

In the days ahead, the United States must demonstrate unwavering strength and our Commander in Chief, President Biden, must do everything in his power to punish Putin and his criminal and repressive regime for the egregious acts of aggression against an innocent neighbor.

It is my hope that the president will start immediately by stopping purchase of Russian oil.

SSGT Wellman, but our words will never be able to truly express our state and nation's incredible appreciation and respect for Cecil's patriotism and bravery in defending freedom at all costs, nor our sadness at his passing.

This bridge will serve as a reminder for generations to come for friends, family and others of this great Oklahoma hero and the ultimate sacrifice he made for our country.

Another way we honor bravery is through simple and concurrent resolutions, which don't have the affect of law but simply express the will and

opinion of the Senate.

Last week, we approved Senate Resolution 27, affirming our support for Ukraine. What is happening to these people is incomprehensible, but the bravery and patriotism of all of their citizens, regardless of their age, is awe-inspiring.

## Considerations for backyard fruit trees

Backyard fruit trees can enhance the landscape with spring blooms, provide high-quality fruits, and serve as a satisfying hobby. However, home fruit trees require considerable care.

Those not able to devote time to the fruit trees may be disappointed with results. Consider some of these guidelines before planting fruit trees.

Knowing what all is involved and being able to devote the time can result in a bountifully sweet harvest.

Most tree fruits require annual maintenance. This includes pruning, training, and fruit thinning. Some trees need staking or trellising, especially when young.

Most fruit trees require pesticide applications to control insects and diseases. Pesticide applications to control diseases should be proactive. Once infection occurs it cannot be reversed.

Pesticide applications to control insects can be based off monitoring populations.

Fruit trees prefer a sandy loam soil with a slightly acidic pH. Good drainage is crucial to success of fruit trees, es-

pecially in areas with heavy clay soils. Drainage can be improved by installing drain tiling, planting trees on berms, or planting in raised beds.

Planting fruit trees on gentle slopes where cold area can drain away will lessen frost and freeze damage to blossoms in spring. It can also help with frost damage in fall.

The slope direction can impact the sunlight exposure and temperature. Northern and eastern facing slopes tend to be cooler. This can delay ripening of fall-harvested fruits.

Choosing rootstocks can be very important for fruit trees. It influences tree size and whether or not staking is required. It also affects disease resistance, winter hardiness, and tolerance to various soils.

Consider pollinations requirements of different fruits. Many fruits require that the flower is pollinated with pollen from different cultivars of the same fruit.

Planting only one cultivar of these fruits often results in masses of blooms in the spring, but few or no fruits.

# Party changing deadline near

Oklahomans who want to change party affiliation must submit their change no later than March 31, McClain County Election Board Secretary Karen Haley said.

Voters may change party affiliation online using the OK Voter Portal at [oklahoma.gov/elections/ovp](http://oklahoma.gov/elections/ovp) or by completing a new Voter Registration Application.

Haley reminds voters that no party changes are allowed between April 1 and August 31 in even-numbered years.

"If we receive your request after March 31, we are required by law to hold that request and process it in September," she said.

Oklahoma has three recognized parties – Democrat, Republican and Libertarian.

In Oklahoma, voters must be a registered member of a party to vote in that party's primary election.

Independents are permitted to participate in a primary election only if a party officially requests its elections be opened

to Independent voters.

Voter registration applications can be downloaded from the State Election Board at [oklahoma.gov/elections](http://oklahoma.gov/elections). Applications are also available at the McClain County Election Board in the McClain County Courthouse.

being felt elsewhere in the city. "Nobody wants to be a police officer," police chief Bobby Elmore told the council.

In the face of unfilled openings, FOP #194 has suggested the department implement 12-hour shifts for the existing officers.

That would cover any gap in police protection for the city.

On the down side, Elmore said, 12-hour shifts will also create four hours of overtime every pay period for every officer.

The council voted to approve the longer shifts until the department is back to full strength.

A Power Point presentation by Jerry Hayes called on the city to consider live streaming of council meetings.

"I wasn't born in a digital world. I was born in an analog world," he said, adding there "needs to be more information shared" with the public.

He pointed out this is the age when communities need to invest in themselves.

"Digital is the new normal," he said before polling council members after asking they "consider the options."

While council members Jay Tate, Theda Engert and Graham Fishburn spoke favorably about using the technology, mayor Ted Cox stopped short of an all-out endorsement.

"One of the things about being a little late in the game is learning from the struggles of others," Cox said.

And Jacobs refused to voice an opinion, explaining he didn't think that would be respectful since he will leave the council in April and be replaced by Allen Eubanks.

The council took no action.

daunting task. Kim had a closet that contained nothing but boxes of construction documents – architect's plans, bids, companies that won the contracts and change orders.

She clerked for the district until 2010 when she retired.

For the next three years, she stayed home to care for her grand babies.

Her charges included a newborn, a 14-month-old and a 3-year-old.

"I couldn't do it now," she admitted. "It was hard."

In 2013, she started working as a part-time administrative assistant at the fire department. "They needed somebody to

keep the budget and do all the paperwork," she said.

Her job went to full-time when city manager Dale Bunn tapped her to become the city's purchasing officer.

Kim spends roughly one-half day on purchasing and the other half on fire department tasks.

"I love it here. These are good people to work with," she said.

There were other life changes when she divorced her husband of 38 years. Six years ago she bought a home in Purcell.

The best part of her job, she said, is the people she works with. All those firefighters who call her "Mom."

Watching firefighters do

"whatever they can to help people," she explained. "They are absolutely selfless and so giving to other people. All are like that from the chief all the way down."

"What makes the job worthwhile is everybody helps one another."

Perhaps the most memorable event is one that still brings tears to Kim's eyes.

In July 2017, firefighters were dispatched to a bad wreck at mile marker 91 on I-35 south of Purcell.

Horror awaited them there. Killed at the scene were two children – a 10-year-old boy and 11-year-old girl.

A 13-year-old girl was airlifted to a hospital where doctors took her off life support when it was determined she had no brain activity.

The driver died after arriving at the hospital.

Kim received a call from Rocky Claunch, the assistant chief.

"You need to call Justin Blankenship," he told her. "There are kids involved. The guys will need counseling when they get back."

Kim called the Landmark Church pastor and then called Ann Cypert, the chief's wife, to tell her they needed to cook supper for the firefighters and have it ready by the time they returned to the station.

"I remember the trucks pulling in, the looks on those boys' faces. It was just awful," she recalled.

Kim went from firefighter to firefighter, taking their faces in her hands and asking the same question over and over.

"Are you OK?" One new firefighter she told "Call your mama and let her know you are OK."

She also soaked chill rags and draped them around each man's neck. It was over 100

degrees that day.

To this day, she's never read about the wreck or watched any of the television coverage.

"I didn't want to see what those boys went through," she said.

Time in the job has taught her that you can't always tell if a firefighter is still dealing with trauma.

So she never asks questions about what happened.

"But if they want to talk, they will come to my office and start talking," she said. "Usually it's when children are involved."

"They've all got kids." Kim will be 65 in October, but she doesn't know if she will be ready for retirement.

Her family is close. Her father and stepmother, Bill and Ann Black, live in Purcell and her children and grandchildren aren't far away.

Daughter Melissa Allen is a homemaker and lives in Noble. Her other daughter, Regina Kraft, and son, Jacob Barnes, both live in Lexington. Regina is an RN and Jacob is a contract welder for Silver Star Construction.

There are six grandchildren – Kaden Kraft is a volunteer firefighter with the Lexington Fire Department. Kason and Krosby Kraft both attend Lexington schools.

The other three – Makenna Allen, Tatum Allen and Kinzi Barnes – attend Noble schools.

Between blood kin and her firefighter "sons," you'd think Kim's family is big enough.

But the fact is she's embraced another, larger extended family at Landmark Church.

She volunteers whenever the church issues a call and every third Sunday she works in the nursery.

"I've been to a lot of churches, but in this church I found something very different," she said.

"We will have another goal next year to not only make it to State but compete when we get there," Raper said.

The coach had a special word of appreciation to all the fan and student body support this season.

"The support was incredible and we really appreciated you all being there," he said.

Purcell won the 3A Boys Academic State Championship this season.

"That is something we are extremely proud of," Raper said. "Our student athletes and teachers do a fantastic job," he praised.

Coach David Sikes' Dragons closed out the season at 16-10 after losing in the Regional Tournament finals to Luther, 62-50 and capping the season with a first round consolation bracket loss to Alva in the Area Tournament, 38-28.

KK Eck led the Dragon scoring in the Luther contest with 12 with Kenna Esparza right on her heels with 11.

"We turned the ball over way too much against Luther and didn't start the game the way we wanted," Sikes said.

"But we crawled our way back in the game by halftime," Sikes said with Purcell trailing by one at 22-21.

"We had a slow start to the second half and never could overcome it. I hope we can grow from that game."

The Dragons came out icy cold in the Alva game scoring only two points. They had 10 by halftime but only put in two more in the third period.

"Against Alva our slow starts continued to hurt us. We fought our way back but had trouble scoring," Sikes said.

Hadleigh Harp was the high scorer for the Dragons in the Alva game with eight.

"I'm proud of our season. We had a lot of success for a young group. Our older players

also learned from this run in the playoffs.

"We lost many games this season simply because we missed too many easy shots. We turned teams over an average of 24 times per game. That's huge and we need to be better at capitalizing on those extra possessions."

"Our rebounding was much improved down the stretch which is something I hope we build on going into next season," Sikes concluded.

Lincoln Eubank hit a buzzer beating trey to lift Purcell to a 47-44 victory in the weather-delayed Regional finals Tuesday night at Meeker over Sequoyah-Claremore.

Eubank, Evans and Ice all finished in double figures for Purcell in the victory that hiked the Dragons' record to 22-3 on the season.

Evans led the Dragons and all scorers in the game with 19 points followed by Eubank with 13 and Ice with a dozen.

Nate Willis, who finished with 10 assists, got the biggest one with 2.4 seconds left in regulation when Purcell and Sequoyah-Claremore were deadlocked at 44 apiece.

"We had a play drawn up," head coach Roger Raper said. "Nate passed to Lincoln who found an open spot in the opposite corner and knocked down the winning shot as time expired."


"I never want to hurt another

Collins' team plans to do


everything they can to get on base and stay there.

Then they travel to Bethel on March 22. And, to round out their week, the Lady 'Dawgs will be in Harrah March 24-25 for the Harrah Tournament.



plish this goal to provide our services to more veterans and their families.

I believe that our evidence-based claims system is the way of the future to help more veterans and their families to receive their VA benefits.

Each week we are copied on all of the communication that VA sends to Veterans and their families. On average, when we are reviewing the decision letters there will be from 10 to 15 of them weekly showing that the veteran was approved for the 100 percent rating for their service-connected disabilities. There will usually be from 40 to 60 who were approved for ratings from ten percent to 90 percent. The number of surviv-

ing spouses who are approved for DIC or Pension benefits is steady at six to nine each week.

There will always be some claims that are denied for one reason or another. As a rule, we will submit evidence in support of a veterans claim two times before asking for a Higher-Level Review or Appealing to the Board of Veterans Appeals.

I would like to see more people volunteering to help us serve the men and women who have served in our military. For many of them their lives have never been the same. Many of the young men and women who wore our military uniform were traumatized by some of the things that happened to them. Most of the Marines I served

with in Vietnam did look at things differently after returning home. There are many who tried self-medicating or other things to take the edge off of daily life. Today's veterans can take advantage of the Vet Centers or the VA Mental Health Clinic for help in dealing with the issues that are affecting them. I am thankful those support options are out there for them.

We see an increased number of both men and women who are suffering from military sexual trauma (MST). I guess it's a sign of the times where more veterans are coming forward after many years to talk about what happened to them and to file a claim for VA benefits. We have several mental health professionals who we recommend MST victims see.

We are continuing to add more volunteers every week to help us to accommodate the many veterans and their families who are requesting our assistance with their VA claims and questions. For those of you who would like to join our team volunteer applications are available on our website. Training is provided weekly either in person or online for your convenience.

Please help us to make a difference in the lives of the men and women who served our country. We are accepting volunteers from Oklahoma and all states in America. With your help we can make this mission possible.

### Lexington Westside Church of Christ

Very good week to all! Welcome to the 'front porch.'

As we have been strolling through scenes from Mark's gospel, one truth seems to stand: For many, the cost of following the Lord is far too great. In that, lies much lack of faith.

Every man will make his decision, won't they, just as they have all through the Bible! Remember old Joshua said, "Choose you this day ..." You know the rest, I'm sure. Those were some of his final words on this ol' lowland: Friends, he says in essence, I'm going to need you to make a decision, one way or the other.

In studying Lee Stroebel's discussion with theologian Lynn Anderson, I noted Stroebel's million-dollar question to Dr. Anderson: Why is it that some people choose to believe and some choose not to?

Mr. Anderson's answer is simple, but sobering: The cost is too great in most cases, he

says.

Look over at John's gospel: John describes a group of people who 'believed not' on Jesus (12:37), even though Jesus performs many miracles right in front of their eyes. But then when you read on a couple more verses, John writes that "they could not believe ..."

John moves from 'did not' to 'could not.' What a lesson! Truth is, if any of us deny the evidence hard enough, long enough, we, too, will take that short journey from 'did not' to 'cannot.' Remember how Mark records that thought in chapter 4: "For he that hath, to him shall be given: and he that hath not, from him shall be taken even that which he hath."

Dwell on that a moment: Either the Lord is giving to us, or He is taking away from us.

But still we wonder: Seeing how easy truth is to understand, why is it that those people in John 12 just outright reject what they hear and what they read?

Mr. Anderson answers that question, too, with a bit of a sigh: They made a "decision of the will to deny the message of the miracles - the evidence that Jesus is God - because they wouldn't pay the price, which would be their whole religious system being blown out of the water ... And they had made this decision not to believe for so long that they had dismantled their capacity to believe."

Then he adds: "Consequently, at its core, faith is a decision of the will that we keep on making, but we're given the option by God's grace. We're empowered to keep making it by his Spirit."

You noted there, I'm sure, that faith would 'blow their whole religious system ... out of the water.' Ah, just too much to give up.

We have just touched the 'hem of the garment' here: But

# Our Lady of Victory Catholic Church

March 13, 2022 is the second Sunday of Lent. It is a season of penance, reflection, and fasting which prepares us for Christ's Resurrection on Easter Sunday, through which we attain redemption.

You may recall that the most used Gospel varies from year to year in the Catholic faith. Year A focuses on Matthew, Year B on Mark, and Year C on Luke. These three Gospels are called "synoptic" because they "see together with a common view" (the word synoptic means "together sight").

Matthew, Mark, and Luke cover many of the same events in Jesus' life, most from Jesus' ministry in Galilee, in much the same order. "Nearly 90 percent of Mark's content is found in Matthew, and about 50 percent of Mark appears in Luke." All the parables of Christ are found in the Synoptics (the Gospel of John contains no parables).

While each of the synoptic gospels contain the story of the transfiguration, only Luke has Jesus beginning with prayer. Jesus is opening himself to the Father. As he prays and is one with the Father, he is transfigured, and his face begins to glow. He is the light of the world.

Then Moses, representing the law, and Elijah, representing the prophets, join him. All are reflecting God's light into the human world. ("What are the Synoptic Gospels?" GotQuestions.org. <https://www.gotquestions.org/what-are-the-synoptic-gospels.html>.)

In the same way we would act, Peter, James, and John can hardly believe their eyes. Again, in the same way we would act, Peter says "it's good that we are here, we can build you a shelter." It would have been hard for us to believe our eyes, too.

As Christians, we serve as the light of Christ for others. One line from the hymn "We Are the Light of the World" by Jean Anthony Grief, sums it up well: "We are the light of the world; may our light shine before all, that they may see the good that we do, and give glory to God."

During Lent, there are extra opportunities for worship. A mass of Anointing the Sick will be Thursday, March 10, at 6 p.m. Throughout Lent, Friday mass will be at 6 p.m. in the Church followed by Stations of the Cross in English, and will conclude with a soup supper served at 7 p.m. There will be a Lenten Penance Rite on Wednesday, March 23, at 6:30 p.m.

We celebrate the love of Jesus at Our Lady of Victory parish all year long. Our Lady of Victory Catholic Church is located at the 307 West Jefferson. The season of Lent began last week with Ash Wednesday. Throughout this time of preparation for Easter, we will visit the problem of Evil (with a capital e). We are in a time where Evil is "alive and well" around our world, but as the Old Testament writer said, "There is nothing new under the Sun."

What is Evil? A dictionary definition is: profound immorality and wickedness, especially when regarded as a supernatural force. What makes a person evil? They are someone who engages in malevolent behaviors.

"Malevolent" literally means wishing bad. Behaviors may be unkind, spiteful, nasty, or mean. Maybe a better description is having or showing intense vicious ill will or hatred, producing harm.

We often ask why does a perfectly good (omnibenevolent), almighty (omnipotent), and all-knowing (omniscient) God permit evil?

One of my favorite quotes from the movie "Oh God" is about good and bad. God (George Burns) says that it is built into the system. Without bad (evil), we wouldn't know what good is. You can't have a top without a bottom, an up without a down, light without dark. He mentions some other examples of opposites. In other contexts, we would call this characteristic one of duality.

Is there a purpose for evil? In Isaiah 45:7 "I form the light and create darkness: I make peace and create evil: I the Lord do all these things."

The world can be seen as a mixture of good and evil, an environment of growth and development, where humans can mature and work toward the perfection for which we were created by God. Evil is the example of what we aren't supposed to do.

Over the next few weeks, I'll continue, but for now, I'll close with this. Bad things happen to good people, and good things happen to bad people. It doesn't seem right, but... isn't that the way the system works, so far?
