Robin Frankenberg's life has been one of twists and turns – so many that she can talk about her five different lives.

She was born in southern Michigan where she grew up with ponies in the backyard.

Her father, a Teamster ironworker, had a sideline business of selling kid-broke ponies. On Saturdays, he would go to a sale barn, picking up a few skinny ponies.

At home he would feed them well. Robin would ride them and when they were in good condition and rideable, back to the sale barn they would go.

"He'd throw me on them at the sale barn to show they were 'kid broke,'" Robin said.

Those ended when he became one of the original '59ers – people who moved to the new state of Alaska to take advantage of that state's homestead act.

Over the following years, the Alaskan homestead never materialized and the family made several moves back to Michigan and then back to Alaska.

"Anytime we were in Michigan, there was always a pony or two," she said.

There were frequent school changes – changes that instilled independence in a young Robin.

When she was 16, she was homesick and drove solo

Snake identification program

Imagine you are walking around outside on a bright sunny day, and you see a snake. Is this snake venomous or not? Is it a beneficial species or not? A million thoughts and questions race through your mind, but you don't know what to do.

Have you ever had this happen to you? On May 12, 2022, at 6 p.m. there will be a Snake Identification Program at the McClain Co Farm and Home Building located at 1721 Hardcastle Blvd in Purcell. Game Warden, Ty Runyan, will be on hand showing the

differences in snake features, and discussing some very interesting snake facts. There will be live exhibits and should be a very fun educational event for the entire family. With snake season upon us now is the time to learn how to identify the snakes you may see on your property. This is a free program and open to the public. Please call the Extension Office at 405-527-2174 for more information.

Snake ID and Management
 Over 40 species of snakes occur in Oklahoma and the vast majority are non-venomous. Note that I use the term venomous, rather than poisonous. Venomous animals are those that inject a toxin directly into their prey as opposed to a poisonous animal that contains a toxin within portions of its body that cause harm if ingested or touched. Fortunately, most of the snakes that are capable of inflicting injury are very docile.

Senate votes to hang up on annoying solicitation calls

Oklahomans could be getting fewer irritating solicitation calls thanks to legislation unanimously approved April 26 by the Senate.


House Bill 3168, by Sen. Bill Coleman, R-Ponca City, creates the Telephone Solicitation Act of 2022, which would prohibit numerous types of marketing calls and set strict parameters on when others can be made. "There is nothing more annoying than getting constant calls from solicitors, from your car warranty expiring to something questionable on your credit report. This list goes on and on, and the calls are endless," Coleman said. "This act will limit robocalls and sketchy sales calls, giving citizens some peace. This is a consumer reform that has been desperately needed for some time to get control over this frustrating industry that is continually finding new ways to get around the federal

Do Not Call list," Coleman concluded. HB 3168 prohibits:
 • Automated telephonic sales/robocalls without prior express written consent;
 • Telephone sales calls that do not display the originating telephone number and name on the caller ID;
 • Telephone sales calls that intentionally alter the caller's voice to disguise or conceal their identity to mislead or confuse the recipient;
 • Sales calls before 8 a.m. and after 8 p.m.;
 • More than three sales calls within a 24-hour period on the same matter; and
 • Telephone sales calls that block caller ID or display a

As uncontested races are on the rise, how can voters have a greater voice

Oklahoma's campaign season is underway.

The filing period for statewide, legislative and judicial offices closed earlier this month and the full candidate roster will be finalized when the State Election Board holds its contest of candidacy hearings today.

But, as I wrote about last week for Oklahoma Watch, 44 percent of the 125 legislative races on the ballot this year have already been decided.

That's because, in 55 House or Senate races, only one person filed by the April 15 deadline, earning those candidates an elected office without securing a vote or making their case to

voters.

Does it have to be this way? I received some feedback from readers on what Oklahoma can do about the large number of uncontested races we've seen in recent years.



Some — such as waiting for the next redistricting round in 2030 to create more competitive districts — would take some time. Others suggested party leaders, specifically Democrats who have struggled to field candidates in rural Oklahoma, need to be more proactive in recruiting candidates.

I was also reminded of a bill eligible to be heard this session that would have placed incumbents on a retention ballot if they didn't draw a challenger. If they receive 51 percent of the vote or more, they are re-elected. If they don't, a special election would be called to fill that seat.

The proposal, House Bill 3059, was not heard in committee by a legislative deadline and will not be considered this year.

I talked with Rep. Andy Fugate, D-Del City, who authored the bill, earlier this year. Though he and other incumbents stand to benefit from the current law — Fugate is among 55 legislators who automatically won after not drawing a

challenger — he said it doesn't hold lawmakers accountable and it doesn't produce the most engaged constituency.

"The bottom line is voters should always have the final say," he said. "When the choice is already made for them, that's not good for representative democracy."

Of course, Fugate's proposal has some potential downsides. For one, there could be costs for the special election. And it's possible that this still wouldn't bring more candidates to the races.

This is a topic I plan to continue to explore throughout the year so I would love to hear your thoughts on how Oklahoma can deal with this issue or if you think it's even possible.

Update from the Capitol

I recently voted on an important public safety measure and have gotten some negative responses from individuals who weren't clear on what the bill actually was trying to accomplish; I'd like to set the record straight.

Senate Bill 1591 would have allowed the Department of Public Safety (DPS) to issue special licenses to workers who have been provided an Individual Taxpayer Identification Number (ITIN) by the IRS because they are paying state and federal taxes.

ITINs are given to business owners, foreigners or U.S. residents who don't have a Social Security Number. These individuals are not illegal, as they have registered with the federal government and had to do so to receive the ITIN.

Under current law, only U.S. citizens, nationals and legal permanent resident aliens can get a driver license.

This bill would allow these workers who present proof, like their ITIN, of filing a state tax return for the most recent tax period to be eligible to get

a driver license that indicates their non-resident status for an additional \$50 fee.

Again, these individuals must be registered with the federal government, meaning they have legally obtained the identification number. Illegal immigrants are unable to obtain these identifying numbers.

This change would have many positive impacts on our state.

First, this is strongly supported by the law enforcement community because it will help them do their job when more people have legitimate proof of identity. It's endorsed by the State Trooper's Association, the Sheriff's Association, the Fraternal Order of Police, the Association of General Contractors, and the Catholic Conference of Oklahoma.

Allowing these legal individuals to obtain a license would create \$2.5 million in additional state revenue through the new \$50 fee and other means.

It's estimated that it would create over \$61 million in additional liability policy sales

and would save existing policy holders nearly \$44 million in insurance premiums.

Because many of these individuals cannot currently purchase insurance without a driver's license, they drive on Oklahoma roads completely uninsured. This is a major risk to all Oklahomans and allowing them to become licensed drivers will protect others if an accident occurs with a non-resident driver.

There are currently 16 other states that already grant driving privileges to non-residents, and Oklahoma's standards are the strictest to date.

Since enacting this type of law, hit and run accidents have declined by 15 percent in Connecticut.

A driver license expansion like this would cover a larger auto insurance pool, which would also hold down premium costs while generating fewer claims that originate with uninsured drivers.

The uninsured motorist rate

Child Abuse Awareness Month

The Oklahoma State Capitol is often a site for advocacy days. On any given day, there's usually a few groups visiting the building to speak to legislators about issues they're passionate about.

On Thursday, supporters from the Oklahoma Institute for Child Advocacy came to the Capitol for the annual visit. Many legislators wore blue in recognition of Child Abuse Prevention Month.

Every year, OICA organizes a "field of flags" near the Capitol to demonstrate the need for investment in child abuse prevention programs. It was very moving to see the hundreds of American flags as we entered the Capitol on Thursday morning.

After completing our floor work for the day, I joined several of my colleagues and state officials for a ceremony to recognize child advocates at the Oklahoma State Department of Health. First Lady Sarah Stitt was among the speakers, as was interim State Health Commissioner Keith Reed.

After the ceremony, advocates carried Oklahoma flags to add to the field of flags in honor of the approximately 30,000 children in our state who suffered abuse or neglect in 2021.

The financial burden for victims of abuse and neglect,

and for our society as a whole, are significant.

Studies show that the total lifetime estimated financial costs associated with just a single year of confirmed cases of child maltreatment in the U.S. is approximately \$124 billion.

Many victims of child abuse develop health issues, such as type 2 diabetes, that they may struggle with for the rest of their lives.

Child abuse can take many forms, including physical and sexual abuse, neglect and emotional maltreatment, and any concerns should be reported to Child Protective Services.

We must continue to support agencies and organizations doing the work on the frontlines to prevent child abuse ensure each child in Oklahoma has a safe, loving environment to grow up in.

Democrat's student loan hypocrisy

For several years, radical liberals have called for mass student loan forgiveness with no indication with what it would do to our country's economy or how it would affect hardworking Americans.

While federal student loan repayments were understandably paused during the height of the coronavirus pandemic, now two years later, Americans have returned to work and should resume paying down their loans.

However, President Joe Biden has issued another extension on the repayment pause, yet again showing he is more focused on protecting the interests of the wealthiest and most radical faction of his party instead of policies that would actually help America's

current inflationary crisis.

The president's pause on federal student loan payments disproportionately benefits those who receive graduate degrees and higher incomes. In fact, nearly a third of student loan debt is held by the top 20 percent of earners and 56 percent of student debt is held by households with graduate degrees.

This would bail out the wealthiest 20 percent of American households at the cost of other hardworking Americans, setting a dangerous precedent for wealthy Americans to go to college and later expect low- and middle-income working families to pay off loans they promised to pay the government back. These sorts of policies are the real cause of inflation – not Russia.

While Americans are already spending \$3,500 extra a year because of inflation, the nonpartisan Congressional Budget Office estimates a cost of \$4.3 billion for every month the Biden Administration allows borrowers to evade payments without accruing interest. And since President Biden has assumed office, this handout has cost taxpayers nearly \$82 billion.

Finally, this action will not only increase the debt owed by American families by upwards of \$17 billion while driving up inflation, but also add \$1.6 trillion to our already more than \$30 trillion national debt.

In response to Democrats' blatant hypocrisy on student loan debt, earlier this year I introduced legislation aimed to dissuade members of Con-

gress from supporting some of these policies when they go to cast their vote on the House floor.

The Can't Cancel Your Own Debt Act would disqualify members of Congress from participating in federal programs enacted during their tenure to cancel student loans – whether established by executive order, agency action or an Act of Congress.

It is simply unconscionable that a Member of Congress making an annual salary of \$174,000, paid for by the American taxpayer, could then personally benefit by voting to cancel the repayment of their federal student loans.

Members of Congress collecting a six-figure salary should surely be required to repay the money they borrowed from the U.S. Treasury.

President Biden's decision to continue the pause on student loan repayments is completely contradictory to the announcement of the end of Title 42 coronavirus protections at the southern border. The president cannot have it both ways.

We cannot simultaneously have a pandemic so severe that no one needs to repay their student loans yet so mild that millions of largely unvaccinated illegal aliens can be allowed to enter our country unchecked for coronavirus.

The cancellation of student loans is yet another handout to a relatively well-to-do group at the expense average taxpayers who have worked hard, repaid their debts and played by the rules.

That is simply unconscionable.

- Go to the basement or storm shelter. Put your family emergency plan into action and check your go-bag in case you must leave in a hurry.

- If you do not have a basement or storm shelter, go to the room at the lowest level in the home (i.e., hallway or bathroom), away from windows and corners where objects tend to collect. Cover yourself with a heavy object such as a mattress or sleeping bag to protect you from broken glass or flying debris.

- Stay in place until you are sure the storm has passed.

2. Stay Weather Informed

- Stay informed on weather updates. Monitor the storm's progress and listen for warnings from local officials.

- Power outages are highly possible in severe weather. Unplug appliances that are not necessary for obtaining weather updates. Use phones only in an emergency.

- Have multiple sources to stay informed of the evolving conditions—TV and radio, emergency notifications

via mobile devices, NOAA Weather Radio, etc. Make sure to have at least one source that does not require electricity.

3. Plan to Evacuate If Necessary

- Before leaving your home or driving anywhere, listen carefully to local weather experts and government officials who will be coordinating evacuation plans.

- Go to higher ground if flash flooding or flooding is possible.

- Do not drive into high water. Six inches of water will wash away a person and two feet of water will wash away a car.

- Don't forget the footwear. It is dangerous to walk outside barefoot because glass and other debris are everywhere during a storm.

Garvin:

dropped from 28 percent to nine percent in New Mexico from 2002 to 2011 and Utah's dropped from 28 percent to eight percent.

Oklahoma currently has the 18th high uninsured motorist rate nationwide at just over 13 percent, so having this legislation could drastically lower that. Just as people with traditional driver licenses are required to carry insurance policies, so would those with these new driver licenses.

SB 1591 will not allow undocumented immigrants to vote because this strict legislation contains multiple provisions that prohibit these special licenses from being used for voter registration purposes.

I've also heard that this bill rewards people who have broken the law. Immigration is a federal matter, not a state one. However, this will reduce lawlessness in Oklahoma because it will lessen the number of uninsured and unlicensed drivers on our roads and allow our law enforcement members to positively identify more drivers.

Overall, this bill would greatly benefit our state because if an ITIN applicant wants the privilege to drive, they will have to show proof of their recent tax payment to get a license.

These are not criminals, but hardworking individuals contributing to our local communities and providing much-needed tax revenue. Unfortunately, the confusion surrounding this bill kept it from getting out of Senate committee, so for now it appears to be dead for this session.

School board election reform

Empowering parents

Recently, the Stillwater Board of Education announced it will not change course on its policy of allowing boys to use the girls' bathrooms unless given "no choice" by state officials.

They took that stance despite countless requests to change course from Stillwater parents and the fact that the rare non-gender-conforming student can easily use a single-stall bathroom at the school. The Stillwater board stuck with recommendations from State Superintendent of Public Instruction Joy Hofmeister's agency and ignored both parent wishes and actual legal requirements.

For parents who wonder why local school boards—not just in Oklahoma, but nationwide—seem increasingly indifferent to the needs of student families, one answer can be found in the fact that most school-board elections are in the spring, which results in very low turnout.

That has major, negative consequences for families, as research by the Annenberg Institute at Brown University demonstrated. That review covered data from four states, including Oklahoma, and showed low-turnout elections make school boards responsive only

to a relative handful of voters who have little in common, economically and racially, with the children served by a district.

In fact, researchers found "the majority of voters in a typical school board election in each of the four states we examine is 'unlikely' to have children."

Put simply, spring elections result in school boards controlled by people who don't have children in the district and don't care what most parents think.

"America's system of deference to local school boards in making essential educational governance decisions is premised on the assumption that the objectives of voters who elect these boards will be aligned with the educational interests of public school students," researchers wrote. "Our analysis points to several reasons for doubting the validity of this assumption in many contexts."

Fortunately, Oklahoma lawmakers are working to fix this problem and have advanced Senate Bill 962, by Senate President Pro Tempore Greg Treat, which would shift the general election for school-board seats to November.

This is a common-sense idea, so naturally the Oklahoma

State School Boards Association, United Suburban Schools Association, Organization of Rural OK Schools, Cooperative Council for Oklahoma School Administration and the Oklahoma Association for Career and Technical Education oppose it.

Those groups claim Oklahomans will be "less informed about school board candidates if they appear on a general election ballot" and there will be "less meaningful conversation about local education issues."

Seriously? The current system involves almost no meaningful conversation or voter awareness. In March 2021, less than four percent of eligible voters participated in a district-wide primary election for Oklahoma City School Board chair. Recent "high-profile" school board races in Edmond drew around seven percent of voters.

In contrast, turnout for November elections is many multiples greater.

Those who oppose school-board election reform aren't fighting for better schools. They're fighting to keep parents from having influence in Oklahoma classrooms.

Goldsby is on the move

There are a lot of positive developments and accomplishments going on in Goldsby.

The demographic of population change in Oklahoma is the driving factor. The majority of rural counties in Oklahoma lost population in the 2020 census and the metropolitan areas gained.

The OKC Metro population, which includes McClain County, is 1.4 million or where 35 percent of the state's population live and the Tulsa Metro has 25 percent of the population.

McClain County is the second fastest growing county in Oklahoma only behind Canadian County. Goldsby's population increased by 47 percent between 2010 and 2020 to 2,700. With the close proximity to Oklahoma City and being right next to Norman, the third largest city in the state, growth can only be expected to continue.

Goldsby has both residential and commercial developments planned or underway. Currently there are two residential developments in progress totaling 224 lots and another proposed development for 120 lots. Just outside our town limits is a mixed-use development, Selah, that is planned for 1,500 to 1,800 residences along with commercial development. Of particular note, the north half of Goldsby is in Norman School District and the south half in Washington School District. This creates significant planning for both districts.

There are five tracts for com-

mercial development that are either in planning, infrastructure work, under construction or already moved in.

Within the past two years, the following new businesses have located in Goldsby; Kubota Dealership, Extreme Outdoor Equipment, Trinity Climate Control, Wade's RV Supercenter and Bobcat.

Oldtown Square Development has commitments from First National Bank, Norman Regional Health System, a pharmacy, Multi-use Shopping Center, Sonic and a Collision Center.

A multipurpose indoor and outdoor sports complex is planned on the south 40 acres of Adkins Crossing Commercial Park. There have also been talks with a Travel Plaza, a hotel and a new car dealership.

All of this development takes a lot of planning, engineering, funding and execution especially for the infrastructure to support it. The commercial development centers around the I-35/SH 74 Interchange. A sewer project to support this commercial area has been

engineered, ODEQ approved and is nearing the final leg of funding.

Goldsby's Town Administrator, Adam Vossen, has been busy working with various funding agencies writing grants to help fund water and sewer projects. He has been working with the Association of Central Oklahoma Governments (ASCOG) and the Economic Development Administration (EDA) on a \$1.6 million grant to help fund the sewer project, which should be approved in the next few weeks. A grant from the Oklahoma Finance Authority has already been approved for \$1.2 million.

Adam is also working on grants to help fund putting a new face on our Main Street which is also SH 74. The vision for the project includes street lighting, sidewalks, landscaping and constructing five lanes from the I-35 entrance to Center Road.

Airport hanger expansion is expected at the airport as well as commercial development along the front entrance.

Snake:

Most bites are preventable and occur as a result of someone harassing the snake or putting their hands under objects without looking first. Snakes, both venomous and non-venomous, provide important ecological services.

Several species of rattlesnake occur in Oklahoma including the timber, western diamond-backed, prairie, western massasauga, and western pygmy.

Depending on where you live in Oklahoma, you are likely to encounter one of more of these distinctive snakes. Often, rattlesnakes give warning if you get too close.

However, the smaller rattlesnakes (pygmy and massa-

sauga) can be difficult to hear, and timber rattlesnakes are so docile they often do not rattle.

The copperhead is a common venomous snake in the eastern half of Oklahoma, but this secretive snake is seldom seen. Watch carefully where you put your hands to avoid copperheads as they often hide in ground vegetation or under debris.

It is commonly believed that every water snake is a venomous "water-moccasin." In reality, while there are several species of water snakes in Oklahoma, only one species is venomous — the northern cottonmouth. This species is confined to eastern and southeastern Oklahoma,

and it is easily identified by the signature white lining of the mouth.

The vast majority of snakes that a homeowner will encounter are harmless.

A good resource for snake identification in Oklahoma is the website <http://www.oksnakes.org> and the book *A Field Guide to Oklahoma's Amphibians and Reptiles* that can be purchased through the Oklahoma Department of Wildlife Conservation at <http://www.wildlifedepartment.com/outdoor-news/amphibian-and-reptile-field-guide-custom-made-oklahoma>.

If a homeowner finds a snake in their yard, what should they do? Almost always, the answer is to leave it alone! Killing the snake and then determining the type is not advised. Chances are the snake is harmless and the landowner has killed the snake needlessly.

So, if the snake is nonvenomous, simply let it be as the snake is doing its job of keeping rodents under control. Occasionally non-venomous snakes become a nuisance when they take eggs from your chicken house or from native birds in your yard.

If you are having trouble with chickens, try sealing the hen house as best as possible to limit snake entry. Also, you can put special snake/predator guards on trees with bird houses to help limit snake access.

Homes and other structures should be well sealed to prevent wildlife (including snake) entry.

If the snake is venomous, the best action is to keep dogs and children away from the snake

until it moves away. Most bites occur when people try to handle venomous snakes.

If you must move the snake out of your yard for safety reasons (or if it is in your home), put up any dogs and children and use a long-handled rake or pitchfork to gently lift it and then place it in a bucket that can be sealed before moving. If you move the snake to another property, make sure you have permission to release it there. Alternatively, call a nuisance wildlife control operator <https://www.wildlifedepartment.com/law/nwco-operators>. Finally, give snakes a break when you see them crossing a road by avoiding hitting them.

Redistricting to affect McClain County voters

Mandatory redistricting efforts have caused some precinct boundaries to change. As a result, some voters will be assigned to new polling places, Karen Haley, McClain County Election Board Secretary announced today.

Precinct boundary lines must be evaluated every 10 years following the redistricting of congressional, legislative and county commissioner districts. Redistricting occurs following the federal census to ensure that the population in the various districts is equal. Two new precinct and polling places were added in McClain County, due to the boundary lines of State House District 20 changing. Midway Baptist Church, Precinct 25, and Union Hill Baptist Church, Precinct 22, will have voters for the first time on the June 28, 2022 Primary Election. Wayne United Methodist Church is no longer a polling place. Those voters will now vote at the Mid-America Technology Center, Precinct 3. Haley said new Voter Identification cards, along with polling place information, will be mailed to all voters affected by the new precinct lines. Voters can also use the OK Voter Portal oklahoma.gov/elections/ovp to find their polling place information. Polling place changes will become effective immediately. All precinct numbers and polling place locations in the county since the adoption of the new precinct boundary lines are in this issue. Voters with questions should contact the McClain County Election Board at 405-527-3121 or mcclaincounty@elections.ok.gov. The McClain County Election Board is located at 121 N 2nd Ave. in Purcell and is open from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday.

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

Calls:

different phone number than the originating number.

The measure also provides 26 exemptions, including:

- Sales calls of an infrequent or one-time nature;
- Calls for noncommercial purposes;
- Solicitors who do not make the sales presentation during the call, but rather arrange a face-to-face meeting;
- Financial institutions or licensed securities, commodities, investment, or insurance brokers;
- Newspaper or cable solicitations, or book, video, or

record club plan; and

- Qualified business-to-business sales calls.

If a sales call violates this act, an aggrieved party can initiate legal action to have a judge require the solicitor to stop, and the called party can recover actual damages or \$500, whichever is greater.

HB 3168, by Rep. Logan Phillips, R-Mounds, now moves to the governor's desk for final consideration.

from Alaska to Michigan. The trip was 3,200 miles one-way and she made it alone at least three times.

She dated a high school classmate in Michigan for three years and then married him. When the economy went south in Michigan, she took her husband to Alaska. In time they moved to a farm in the northwest Ohio/southern Michigan area. It wasn't far from a man who raised Appaloosas. She broke some horses for him and also boarded some Standardbred horses during the off-season at a nearby track.

They had two children – a son, Clayton, and a daughter, Adriane – but the marriage ended in 10 years. She took the children and moved to Montana, where she had a couple horses. She barrel raced and did

some team penning and saw to it the kids learned to ride.

Under a shared custody agreement, the children lived with her ex-husband during the school year and spent summers in Montana.

That lasted until Clayton was 13 and her ex sought and gained full custody. Robin had just purchased a home in Montana, a home she could no longer afford. She moved out and relocated to Louisville where she could be close to her children.

A girlfriend was working the backside at Churchill Downs and got Robin a job as a groom in 1998.

Eventually, she worked her way up to exercise rider. An assistant trainer refused to consider her at first, but one day put her on a Thoroughbred. He

was amazed at her skill since “everybody tells you they can ride and they can’t,” she said.

She worked for top-ranked trainers, following a circuit from Churchill to Chicago and Hot Springs. She was well paid and enjoyed the work since her workday ended at 10 a.m.

In 2005, she accepted a job offer from Red Earth Training Center near Oklahoma City’s Remington Park.

One night she went to a dancing bar and met Dave Frankenberg. He asked where she lived and both were surprised to learn he lived just three miles away.

“He would drive to work in the morning and see them galloping on the track,” she said.

It is a successful business, but Robin admits she misses the competitive side of barrel racing.

“At my age, I would like to have a 4-year-old horse so I could go and compete with it,” she sighed.

On the family front, Clayton, who trained at a culinary school in Chicago, just moved from Louisville to manage and co-own the restaurant at Winter Creek Golf and Country Club south of Blanchard.

Robin called the move “a blessing for both of us.”

Daughter Adriane is married and still in Louisville. Her husband is a meteorologist for UPS. She had her own business at Churchill Downs at a cold water spa for the race horses.

Today she is a stay-at-home mom for Emmitt, her 5-month-old son and the apple of Robin’s eye.

Robin has a giving heart for any living creature in need – human or animal.

“You just run into people who need help,” she said. “You hear their story.”

As a child, Robin dreamed of one day having a farm.

Five lives later, the dream is realized.

“God gives you what you hope and dream for, but it’s in HIS time,” she said.

"We'll have to play solid defense and hit the ball well. They usually have a good team."


Pocola (22-3), ranked number two in Class 3A, and Gore (10-8) are also in the tournament.



Roy Welchel lived in the Blanchard and Dibble areas for many years. He was onboard a ship that sank during the Normandy Invasion. After being rescued from the sea he was transported back to England for hospital treatment after nearly drowning during the ship sinking. After he was released from the hospital he was returned to duty for the rest of the war.

After the war was over, he was a member part of the occupying forces. Roy served honorably in the US Army from April 3, 1943 to August 4, 1947. All of us at our Veterans Foundation are very proud to have been able to make difference in Roy's and his family's life.

His obituary reads: Roy Alexander Welchel, 98, of Blanchard, died April 21, 2022 at his home. The son of Richard Simpson Welchel and Lillie Melissa (Parker) Welchel, he was born on June 1, 1923, in Wapanucka, Okla. Roy married Patsy (Dewbre) on December 24, 1951, in Blanchard.

St. Augustine, Florida— Good day to all. Welcome to the “front porch”—and God bless!

The amazin’ blonde and I are in the oldest city in America, discovered by the great Spanish explorer Ponce de Leon. The occasion is the marriage of our good friend from Washington, Montana Wells, to a lovely Floridian named Anna Marie. Actually, they had already been married in a private ceremony but chose this moment for all their friends and loved ones to share in a great ceremony, held at the elegant Lightner Museum here in St. Augustine.

It was beautiful, and we were honored to be able to stand before them and offer them a special blessing. So, today’s piece -- ‘God bless you’ -- is dedicated to our good young married friends, Montana and Anna Marie.

I always told Carl that the “back page” was the best part of the paper. Why, sometimes I would not even have to open up the paper to enjoy that month’s publication. I would just flip it over to read the back.

Brother Carl, to me, has always been a giant of a man and a preacher. Eight years’ age difference makes a big difference when you meet someone

when you’re about 12 and then know him your entire life.

Hailing from Ada, Carl starting preaching the gospel right out of college and has held meetings all over the country, from early spring through late fall, for almost half a century. He is one of the few preachers who makes his living primarily traveling and preaching, holding 25 or more meetings each year.

May 1, 2022 is the third Sunday of the Easter season.

In the Gospel reading this week, John 21:1-19, Jesus meets with seven of his disciples. This is the third occasion when he revealed himself after the resurrection. At this time, the disciples had resumed their lives after Jesus had died.

Jesus was standing on the shore and called to the disciples who were fishing. He asked if they had any meat. The disciples had caught no fish. Jesus told them to recast their nets. (You may recall this happened at another time while Jesus was still living.)

As the fishermen made their way to the banks, the nets were

filled but not tearing. Simon Peter drew the net to land and there were 153 fish, the number of fish species known at that time. None of the fishermen asked who the man on shore was but they realized it was Christ.

After they had finished eating, Jesus asked Simon Peter, “lovest thou me more than these?” Simon Peter replied, “Yea, Lord, thou knowest that I love thee.” Jesus said, “Feed my lambs.” Jesus asked Peter two more times and Peter affirmed his love and Jesus repeated his answer, “Feed my lambs.”

We can only imagine Peter’s chagrin at his denying of

Christ three times before the crucifixion. Yet, Jesus did not scold Peter. He wanted Peter to take care of his flock. The reference to 153 fish shows that Jesus’ wish was that Peter take care of everyone.

What does this mean to us today? God knows our hearts want to serve him but he also knows we are fallible. We are not perfect but he accepts us where we are and will guide us to the tasks he wishes when we are willing to accept the direction.

A couple of suggestions to serve God: 1) ask someone to

ready humbled by this tribute. That’s the gentleman he is. But I cannot describe my friend without mentioning that his best quality may be a certain grace that he carries with him, both in the pulpit and out. He has that unique ability to be genuinely gracious and engaging to others when he greets them, always sharing a big, heartfelt Oklahoma smile and a sincere “Good to see you!” every time you meet.

You know how you look at people and try to borrow just a little bit of some quality they have. The quality from Carl that I have always sought — or, more accurately, “wished for” — is that rare grace. He is a big man physically, but I have always considered him a bigger man in graciousness.

So, you can understand why I was thrilled to receive a personal, autographed copy of his book. When I got it, I immediately looked for one particular article I had read some years ago, one that had long stuck with me, called, “God Bless You.”

Sure enough, I found it on page 309 of his new book. Carl used a sermon with that title to close out a meeting he held for us in Lexington several years ago, referencing several key scriptures that contain blessings. I never forgot the sermon nor the article.

One blessing he references is that well-known benediction in Numbers 6: 24-26 where the Lord commands Moses to tell Aaron to bless children of Israel. Bless them this way, says the Lord: “The Lord bless thee, and keep thee. The Lord make his face shine upon thee, and be gracious unto thee: The Lord lift up his countenance upon thee, and give thee peace.”

It is an amazing thing when a friend or loved one offers you a blessing, as Aaron does for God’s people. Near the end of his article, Carl brings the

beauty of offering a blessing to life, in these words:

“When you pronounce a blessing thoughtfully and sincerely upon another person...it can be a profoundly powerful act. Stop for a moment and think about saying to someone, ‘God bless you and keep you.’ Imagine looking them in the eyes when you say it. Emphasize ‘you.’ The pronouncement needs to be very personal. ‘God bless you and keep you. God make His face to shine upon you,’” and he bold-faces each “you” for emphasis.

“Such an approach is very intimate and can be disarming,” he concludes, “I have seen tears well up in people’s eyes because the earnest, heartfelt blessing touched their needy hearts so deeply.”

I have been changed in a very good way, I believe, by this simple lesson from my good brother. You see, now, whenever I say, “God bless you,” or — as I am more apt to say — just “God bless,” I try to make sure I mean it sincerely. If God allows us to bestow a blessing on another, we want to try to offer it in a way that the Lord will answer the plea with a true blessing.

Carl had no way of knowing this lesson has stuck with me for such a long time, that it would be the first one for which I would look when I took his new book in my hand. And he certainly has no idea the impact the latter part of his handwritten note would have, as he concludes, graciously, with this benediction:

“God bless and keep you. ~ Carl M. Johnson”

P.S.: Montana and Anna Maire-- Blessings for you two with many, many decades of marriage. May the Lord’s face shine upon you, and may He give you peace. God bless you.
