Reimer, who came out of retirement to become the current head coach at Asher High School, coached at his Alma Mater, Medford, including a State Championship in 1984, before taking the reins at Purcell for 31 years.

Reimer has amassed an overall record of 567-357. He was 485-313 at Purcell with one State Championship in 1994.

When Reimer started in Purcell Ronald Reagan was the President of the United States and Rick Clark was the head Dragon football coach.

Rain accompanies severe weather

1.3" recorded Monday from storms

The severe weather that resulted in the tornado sirens going off in Purcell for about an hour Monday evening resulted in no damage but some much needed rainfall.

Sirens also sounded in Lexington.

A super cell was reported in the Dibble area just after 6 p.m. and city officials sounded the alarm in Purcell starting about 6:07 p.m.

The sirens continued until

around 7 p.m.

The tornado in the cell actually went north of Purcell but did not actually do any damage in the Goldsby area.

That tornado eventually made it all the way to Seminole but did not hit the town, television reports confirmed.

Oklahoma Watch files
transparency lawsuit against state
agency over federal relief funds

Oklahoma Watch has filed a lawsuit against Oklahoma’s Office of Management and Enterprise Services over its decision to keep secret billions of dollars in applications for federal coronavirus relief funds.

The lawsuit, filed in Oklahoma County district court, wants the state to release the applications under the Open Records Act. The Local Legal Initiative of the Reporters Committee for Freedom of the Press is representing Oklahoma Watch in the lawsuit.

“We’re suing the state because it’s the only way to get records the public is entitled to,” said Ted Streuli, executive director of Oklahoma Watch. “There’s \$18 billion of requests and almost \$2 billion of public money. It’s tax money that’s been paid and is now to be reinvested in the community. These are public agencies,

public projects, and there’s every reason in the world the public should know what’s being requested.

“Keeping that in the dark just breeds the possibility of backroom, brother-in-law deals



without having some light coming through the window to see what the options are,” Streuli said.

A spokesman for the agency did not immediately respond to a request for comment about the lawsuit.

Oklahoma Watch filed an Open Records Act request on March 11 for applications submitted under the federal American Rescue Plan Act. The state has received almost \$18 billion in project requests for the \$1.87 billion it has to disburse under the law.

The Office of Management and Enterprise Services on March 21 declined to provide the records, saying the applications were temporarily confidential while they are considered by a joint legislative and executive procurement process.

The agency cited a section of the state’s purchasing laws and an internal memo that deemed the applications confidential under the Open Records Act.

In effect, the agency is counting all applications for federal money as one giant bid under state procurement rules. The relief funding can be spent on a wide range of infrastructure, health care and

Update from the Capitol

We're entering the final stretch of this year's session, following our last major deadline this past Thursday, which was when the House and Senate had to complete work on bills from the opposite chamber. Between the two legislative bodies, more than 400 bills are moving forward either to the governor's desk, to their original chamber for further consideration of amendments or to conference committee. Conference committees give the House and Senate the opportunity to save a bill by crafting language agreeable to both chambers, so it can get to the governor's desk. I'm thrilled to tell you that five of my Senate bills have been signed into law so far and another one is on Governor Stitt's desk. SB 1119 removes the 270-hour limitation adjunct teachers

may teach per semester in a classroom. These are educators who have distinguished qualifications in their field, such as accountants or journalists, who don't have to meet the standard certification requirements given their professional background, but can be authorized by the local school board to teach a subject related to their field of expertise. As our state continues to struggle to fill critical teaching positions, schools need to be able to utilize these willing professionals as much as necessary. The new law will go into effect on July 1, 2022, in time for the upcoming school year. Beginning Nov. 1, 2022, SB 1163 will authorize district attorneys to develop a multidisciplinary team to investigate and prosecute elderly and vulnerable adult abuse in coordination with the District

Attorneys Council. We've seen dramatic improvements since the creation of the multidisciplinary child abuse teams in the number of reported and prosecuted child abuse cases, and we want to do the same thing for these adults. SB 1224 raises the allowance for the Oklahoma Department of Transportation's (ODOT) special maintenance projects from \$500,000 to \$1 million for projects that can be performed and carried out by state special maintenance crews. Their special maintenance allowance hasn't been increased since 2014, so this will help adjust for inflation. They estimate that this change will bring about savings of 5-10 percent per project due to the increased level of production and being

Support for Ukraine

Since Vladimir Putin's ruthless and unjust invasion of Ukraine two months ago, the Ukrainian people have bravely fought to defend their homeland and their democracy. As befits their heroic defense, aid has poured in from dozens of countries around the world. And especially, North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) countries have banded together to provide crucial support during Ukraine's most desperate hour. As this international crisis continues, we are reminded of the importance of the NATO alliance. Formed in the aftermath of World War II, NATO has stood the test of the time through the better part of a century in an evolving and increasingly more dangerous world. Since 1949, NATO has endured steadfast cooperation in promoting and preserving freedom. Now, more than ever, the shared values that brought us together must keep this alliance strong. In Europe, we are seeing

strength and unity from our allies that should inspire courage even in the darkest of times. Germany has made a national decision to take a strong defensive posture as one of the world's leading economies, and together with Great Britain, France and many other nations, they are sending a clear and resolute message to Russia that Europe is not going to fall prey to authoritarianism or oligarchies. While it has been inspiring to see NATO countries rally together to provide the support asked for from Ukraine, we must remember that our allies cannot do it alone. The United States must stand by their side as we have for generations. The shared values that inspired us to storm the beaches of Normandy are what will bind our alliance to deter aggression from Russia and China. America does need to address its own needs, but it can also fulfill its role as the remaining democratic superpower. The United States should continue to do so for our people and for the world.

In the effort of aiding those around the world in defense of their democracy, I was proud that last week the U.S. House of Representatives passed the Ukraine Democracy Defense Lend-Lease Act of 2022 with tremendous bipartisan support. Like the famous Lend-Lease program from World War II, when the United States also served as a great arsenal of democracy, this legislation will ensure that defense articles, including weapons, munitions and other supplies such as food and fuel, are expeditiously provided to Ukraine. Indeed, the United States has stood shoulder-to-shoulder with our NATO allies in providing Ukraine with aid to enable the brave Ukrainian people to continue their stand against Russian aggression and Russian war crimes. We will continue to share the support and best wishes of the American people and millions around the globe, in the hopes that Ukraine's defense will soon be successful and its people can once again live in peace and freedom as citizens of a fellow democracy.

House hears marijuana licensing bills

April 28 was the third-reading deadline for bills to advance from the opposite chamber. In total, the Senate ended up passing 242 House measures, while the House advanced 214 Senate measures. This week, the House took action to protect student privacy and safety by passing Senate Bill 615. The bill makes clear that school restrooms should be designated based on biological sex for privacy and safety purposes, and that students should use the restroom that aligns with their biological sex as identified at birth. The bill also ensures that parents are allowed to inspect materials used for sex education curriculum in public schools. It adds that prior written notification to parents and legal guardians regarding sex education will include a list of the curriculum and materials to be used. Since the bill was amended in the House, it returns to the Senate for further consideration before it can move to the Governor for his signature. We also approved several bills to bring the illegal marijuana industry under control. Senate Bill 1543 separates the Oklahoma Medical Marijuana Authority (OMMA) from the State Dept. of Health, making it a separate and distinct agency. The bill directs the coordination of the transfer of records, property, funds and other assets, as well as gives the Governor authority to appoint the Executive Director of OMMA with consent from the Senate. We also approved Senate Bill 1755 to address licensing concerns. Under the bill, no medical marijuana business license will be issued until all relevant local licenses and permits have been issued by the municipality, including an occupancy permit or certificate of compliance, and all necessary inspections and reviews, including plan reviews, life safety inspections, and compliance inspections, have been completed. If an applicant has not met these requirements but has fulfilled all other required obligations, the Oklahoma Medical Marijuana Authority (OMMA) is to grant a conditional license, which does not entitle the applicant to operate or act as a licensee. Once the applicant has met the requirements of the measure, OMMA may approve the application.

Legislative session comes to a close at month’s end

The 2022 legislative session will come to a close this month. A budget agreement has yet to be announced, but we know that this will be the largest budget in state history.

Our state’s economy is booming, and hopefully legislative leaders will take advantage of this revenue growth by boosting appropriations to our 60-plus state agencies, especially those providing vital services like education, mental health and public safety.

So many of our agencies have suffered devastating cuts in previous years that have never been fully restored. With recession at a 40-year high, the cost of supplies and providing services has gotten extremely expensive.

Our agencies need significant budget increases to account for all of this in order to continue providing critical government services to the people of Oklahoma.

One of my major focuses this session has been the disturbing 15-year, \$5 billion turnpike expansion plan, ACCESS Oklahoma, that was announced earlier this year. I’ve been working almost nonstop to fight two of the proposed projects in our Senate district.

The first is a 29-mile southern extension of the Kickapoo Turnpike running from I-40 in Oklahoma City to I-35 near Purcell, which would run through the eastern part of Norman and other local communities.

The other project is a 28-mile outer loop east to west

connector from the I-44 Tri-City area, east to I-35 and then east to I-40, running through Moore and Norman.

These projects must not happen as they will displace hundreds of families and businesses. These toll roads would run through the only location in the world where Barite Roses, or Rose Rocks, can be found. This plan also threatens endangered animals and the home of WildCare, the state’s largest wildlife rehabilitation center, and one of the largest in the nation.

Fortunately, legislation has been filed to take a closer look at these disturbing proposals. I’ve signed on as a co-author of Senate Bill 1610, which is going to conference committee to allow the Senate and House to work out language agreeable to both chambers.

The bill would require the OTA to conduct and submit a full report on the construction of the South Extension Turnpike. The report would include, but not be limited to, why the route was chosen, if that route is the most effective, and what other alternatives were considered.

I’ll keep you posted on what happens with this measure in conference, but I pray our voices have been heard and this bill is approved. Please keep reaching out to the Senate and House with your personal stories and how this project will impact you, your family or your business.

Aside from my legislative duties, I’ve been working on

able to make investments and purchases easier and quicker.

SB 1278 simply repeals the advisory committee to the Oklahoma Science and Technology Research and Development Board because it is no longer needed. OCAST has switched its focus more to economic and workforce development through proven scientific strategies.

SB 1462 will require anyone licensed to practice medicine and surgery in Oklahoma or duly licensed as Advanced Registered Practice Nurses, like Certified Nurse-Midwives, to provide infant CPR and basic first aid, including contact information for training programs and cord blood banking and donation information to pregnant mothers.

This will go into effect Nov. 1, 2022. Hopefully, this will provide parents the tools and knowledge they need to save their infant in a moment of crisis, so they don’t have to suffer like our dear friends the Frizzells did when they were unable to help baby Ava.

I want to thank Bre again for her incredible bravery in publicly sharing her family’s heartbreaking story to help other Oklahoma families. That courage is going to save many lives in the future.

The next two weeks are going to be interesting as work continues to finalize the largest state budget in Oklahoma’s history.

At Rural Electric Cooperative, we recognize Electrical Safety Month every May, but we also know the importance of practicing safety year-round.

From our co-op crews to you, the consumer-members we serve, we recognize everyone has a part to play in prioritizing safety.

According to the Electrical Safety Foundation International thousands of people in the U.S. are critically injured or electrocuted as a result of electrical fires and accidents in their own homes. Many of these accidents are preventable.

Electricity is a necessity, and it powers our daily lives. But we know first-hand how dangerous electricity can be because we work with it every day of the year.

To me, safety is more than a catchphrase. As CEO it is my responsibility to keep co-op employees safe. Additionally, we want to help keep you and

all members of our community safe.

Electricity is an integral part of modern life. Given the prevalence of electrical devices, tool and appliances, I would like to pass along a few practical electrical safety tips.

Frayed wires pose a serious safety hazard. Power cords can become damaged or frayed from age, heavy use or excessive current flow through the wiring.

If cords become frayed or cut, replace them, as they could cause a shock when handled.

Avoid overloading circuits. Circuits can only cope with a limited amount of electricity. Overload happens when you draw more electricity than a circuit can safely handle by having too many devices running on one circuit.

Label circuit breakers to understand the circuits in your home. Contact a qualified electrician if your home is more than 40 years old and you need to install multiple large appliances which consume large amounts of electricity.

Use extension cords proper-

ly. Never plug an extension cord into another extension cord. If you “daisy chain” them together, it would lead to overheating, creating a potential fire hazard.

Do not exceed the wattage of the cord. Doing so also creates a risk of overloading the cord and creating a fire hazard.

Extension cords should not be used as permanent solutions. If you need additional outlets, contact a licensed electrician to help.

I encourage you to talk with your kids about playing it safe and smart around electricity. Help them be aware of overhead power lines near where they play outdoors.

Our top priority is providing an uninterrupted energy supply 24 hours a day for seven days a week and 365 days per year. But equally important is keeping our community safe around electricity.

Roe:

Our work is not yet completed. Amended bills will still have to return to their chamber of origin to win final passage. If amendments are not accepted, the measures can be sent to conference committee where final language is deliberated.

Bills that emerge with a do pass recommendation from conference committee face a final vote in each chamber before advancing to the governor for his consideration of signing them into law.

A major focus in the month of May is finalizing our state budget proposal. We work with agencies and state leaders throughout session to draft a budget for the next fiscal year ahead of our deadline to adjourn sine die on the last Friday in May.

Religious Intolerance 2022

Three years ago, I wrote an article about religious intolerance. My premise was that America had actually never been that religiously tolerant, that today religion, Christianity in particular, was the one area where intolerance was still acceptable, and that those who often cried for the most tolerance could be the most intolerant.

I used the fact that “The Book of Mormon” won a Tony Award as evidence, as well as how Hollywood continues to criticize Christians while attacking any who dares say anything negative about Muslims or Jews, let alone anyone of a different race or sexual orientation.

Upon seeing a preview of FX’s latest crime thriller “Under the Banner of Heaven,” I thought it’s time to maybe reexamine religion in America amongst this new culture of political correctness. What I found is that history has not changed and that Hollywood has once again used a similar scapegoat to attack those who believe in a God.

Let me start by saying I am a fan of Jon Krakauer. *Into the Wild* and *Into Thin Air*, the two books he wrote before *Under the Banner*, are both amazing reads. It’s his fourth book where he turns from his themes of exploring and often losing to nature towards religion and violence that seems unfamiliar.

The premise of *Under the Banner of Heaven* is that religious people are irrational and, as irrational and fanatical people, they commit irrational violent acts. As with the musical “The Book of Mormon,” FX is targeting an easy sect of Christianity, one that even other Christians are okay seeing attacked.

While this particular story deals with a polygamous splinter group of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints (Mormons), Krakauer’s premise is for all believers of God, as he wrote in Chapter Six of *Under the Banner of Heaven*, “All religious belief is a function of nonrational faith. And faith, by its very definition, tends to be impervious to intellectual argument or academic criticism.”

The TV adaption has not been released and so I do not know how closely it stays true to the book, but the book looks at the 1984 murders committed by two brothers belonging to the FLDS. Krakauer believes it was their fanatical devotion to God that allowed them to justify their cruel actions.

As part of his evidence, he examines the history of the Mormon Church, which he links with violence and extremism. As a historian, I am clearly not going to argue that religion has not played a part in violence. Examples would take all the space in this article and then some, so instead I want to focus on one quote Krakauer used to title his work, *Under the Banner of Heaven*.

This quote was taken from a speech given by the third president or prophet of The Church of Jesus Christ, John Taylor, given in 1880 in which he said, “God is greater than the United States, and when the Government conflicts with heaven, we will be ranged under the banner of heaven against the Government. The

Here’s an easy recipe to make in your dutch oven.

Italian Festival Bake

16 oz. rotini pasta
Jar of pasta sauce
16 oz. shredded cheese
Pkg. Johnsonville hot Italian sausage

Cook the pasta three minutes less than the package recommends. It will keep cooking in the oven later.

Set aside a mug of the starchy pasta water to add back in later because it helps stretch out the sauce. A trick from Rachael Ray.

Drain the pasta and let it sit in the colander while you use your pot to brown the sausage. Coat the pasta with a tiny bit of olive oil so it doesn’t start to stick to itself as it sits there. Remove the casings from the sausages and brown the meat the same way you would brown ground beef.

Do not drain the meat. Turn off the heat on the stove. Add the pasta back to the pot, pour in the sauce and the mug of starchy water and stir everything up.

Top with shredded mozzarella.

Put the lid on your dutch oven and bake it in the oven at 350° for 45 minutes.

Hailee Smith was chosen Outstanding Athlete by the judges out of over 1,000 athletes performing in the competition.



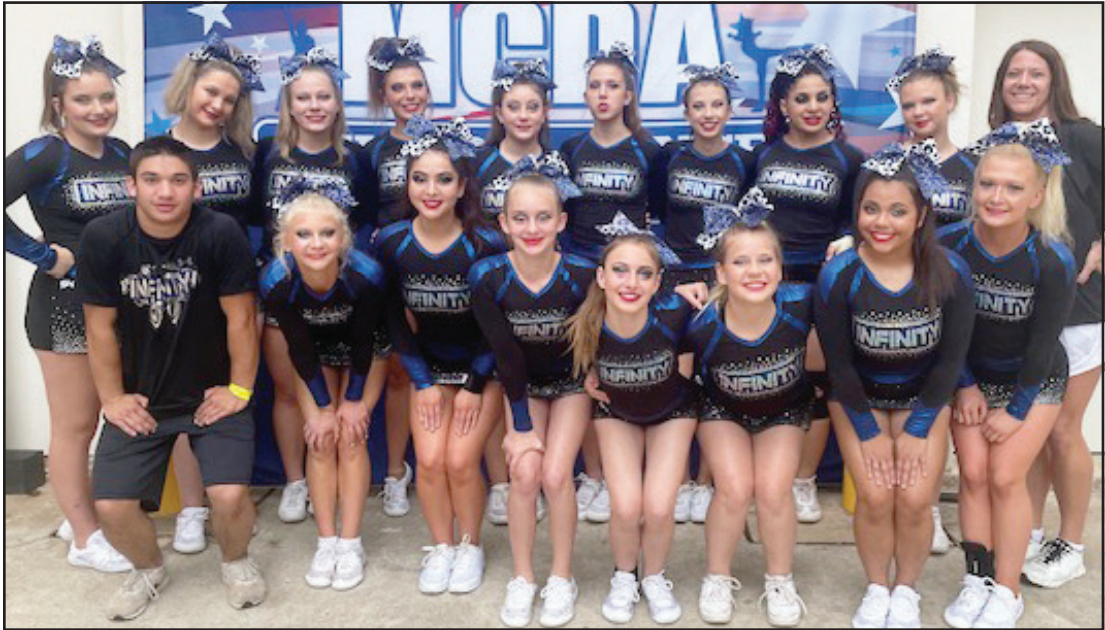

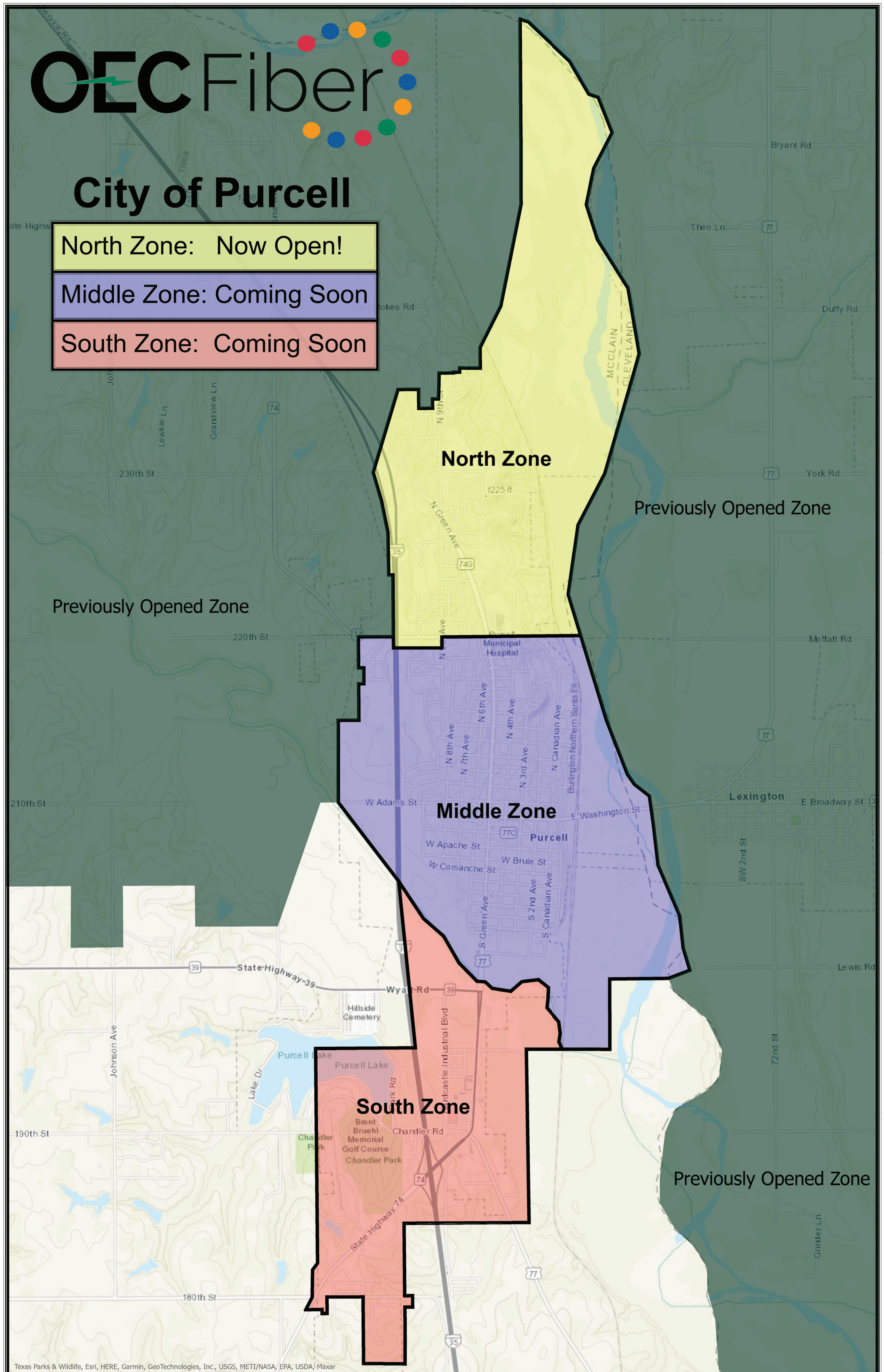

D.A.R.E graduation at Purcell Intermediate School culminated with awards and a pizza party at the school cafeteria last Friday afternoon. Purcell Police Cpl. Josh Van Oort was the instructor for the fifth grade 10-week program.

Speaking:

United States says we cannot marry more than one wife. God says different.”

While polygamy is appalling to the vast majority of Americans, historically speaking, the concept of standing up to authority for a higher cause has been common and even celebrated. In 1846 when America declared war on our neighbors to the south, not all Americans agreed with the invasion.

One such man was the author Henry David Thoreau. He so disagreed with America’s actions that he was imprisoned for his refusal to pay taxes to support what he believed was an unjust war. The year after the war he published his thoughts in an essay called “Civil Disobedience.”

Thoreau wrote, “I cannot for an instant recognize that political organization as my government which is the slave’s government also. All men recognize the right of revolution; that is, the right to refuse allegiance to and to resist the government, when its tyranny or its inefficiency are great and unendurable.”

He even went as far as to say about his own imprisonment, “In an unjust society the only place for a just man is prison.”

Starting in the 1920s, another man took up the cry for civil disobedience as he struggled for freedom against the British Empire. Mahatma Gandhi once said, “Civil disobedience

becomes a sacred duty when the state becomes lawless or corrupt.” He believed people needed to resist the civil government when that government hurt the people. Unlike Thoreau, Gandhi actually pushed out his oppressors in the name of justice.

Finally, a few years after Gandhi, another man made a similar statement about resisting the government for higher laws. In 1963 while in prison in Birmingham, Ala., Dr. Martin Luther King gave his justifications for breaking the law that landed him in jail. King wrote, “One has not only a legal, but a moral responsibility to obey just laws. Conversely, one has a moral responsibility to disobey unjust laws.”

Also, like Thoreau, King spoke to those in prison when he said, “An individual who breaks a law that conscience tells him is unjust, and who willingly accepts the penalty of imprisonment in order to arouse the conscience of the community over its injustice, is in reality expressing the highest respect for the law.”

I am not saying that John Taylor standing up for polygamy is the same as these men, but they were all standing up for something they believed in. They also had another thing in common: all their protests were nonviolent. As militant as Taylor’s speech may seem, there was nothing violent as-

sociated with him during his almost seven years as leader of the Church or any other church leader after him.

If Taylor’s words condemn his as violent, then Thoreau, Gandhi and King must also be condemned as violent. If Krakauer’s thesis is correct and Mormon splinter groups, Latter Day Saints, and all religious people are inherently violent, then so must be all civil rights workers, Indians, and, I guess, students of American literature. If only some of those first groups are inherently violent, then his logic must agree that all Muslims are terrorists because some are.

While I am not calling for any sort of cancellation, Hollywood has the right to air any kinds of program they want. Yet it reminds me of the saying that people who live in glass houses should not throw stones.

Also, that, historically speaking, America has had an interesting relationship with religion. While we still praise our concept of freedom of religion, we also have reserved religion as the one concept which is still politically correct to attack.

Loss from drought, fire or tornadoes? USDA programs are available

Spring weather and climate conditions can be a challenge for Oklahoma farmers and ranchers. Oklahoma State University Extension reminds producers that when operation loss occurs, financial assistance is available through the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Wildfire destruction and drought devastation are two of the biggest concerns facing producers right now. Those affected by either or both events should contact their local USDA Farm Service Agency office to report losses and learn about eligibility of various recovery programs.

“Sometimes a cost-share program doesn’t result in much of a payment to producers, but

with high input costs and inflation right now, these programs become significant,” said Amy Hagerman, OSU Extension agriculture policy specialist.

Expenses and repair costs associated with wildfires on pastures, grasslands and livestock add up quickly, and Hagerman noted that individual payment limits for the Emergency Assistance for Livestock Program (ELAP) and Livestock Indemnity Program have been lifted.

Other programs, such as the Emergency Conservation Program (ECP), offer landowners and property stewards financial and technical assistance to replace or restore fences as well as remove debris from farmland.

“ECP is designed to help share in the costs of repairing things that were damaged and not covered by regular home-

owners insurance,” Hagerman said. “ECP has been expanded to help cover 25 percent of the cost of repairing fences damaged by natural disasters, such as wildfires and tornadoes.”

Hagerman said producers should remain aware of all possible hazards and understand how to stack assistance programs.

“Many of our wildfires have occurred in counties that were already eligible for drought programs through the USDA. The programs available for wildfires may not address the fact that you’re going to need to bring in hay and water for animals, but you may be able to apply for those things under drought assistance,” she said.

In an emergency, Hagerman advises farmers and ranchers to contact their local USDA Farm Service Agency office

and insurance agent while beginning the documentation process.

Although it can be difficult to take photos and video, proof of damages is necessary when applying for the following USDA programs:

- Livestock Indemnity Program;
- Emergency Assistance for Livestock, Honeybees and Farm-Raised Fish Program;
- Livestock Forage Disaster Program;
- Tree Assistance Program;
- Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program;
- Emergency Conservation Program;
- Emergency Forest Restoration Program;
- Environmental Quality Incentives Program and
- Emergency Watershed Program.

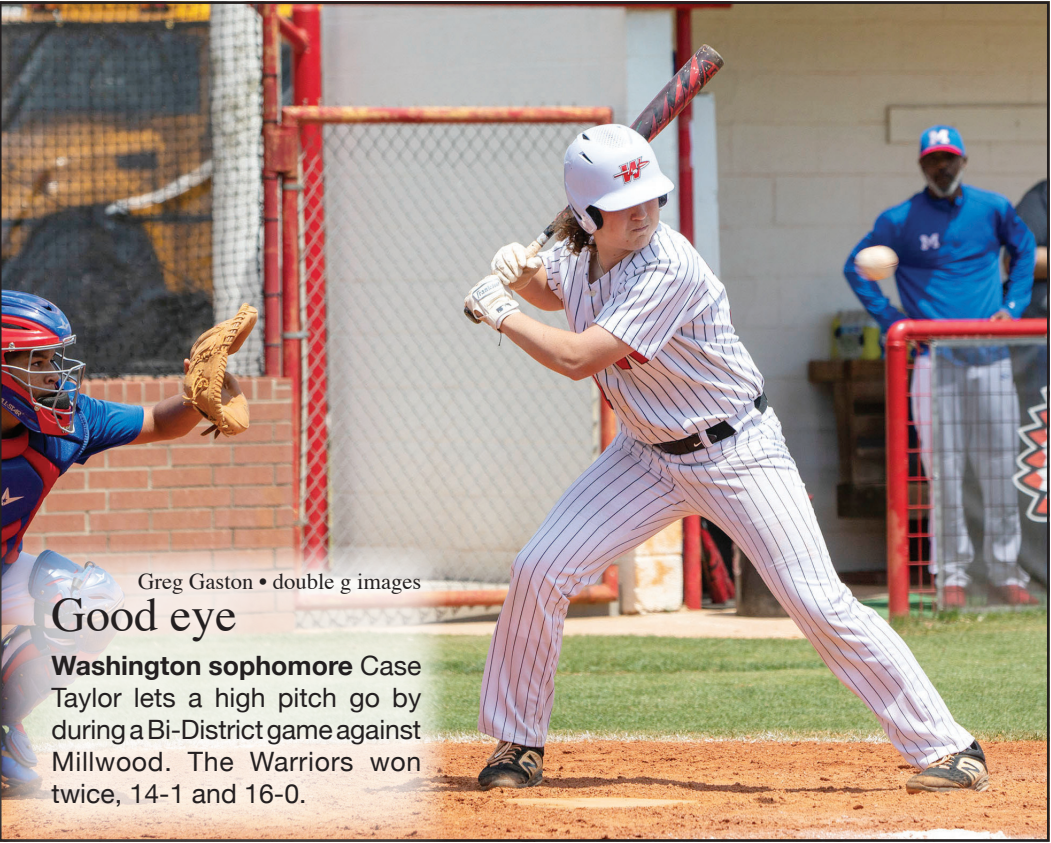

This week we want to recognize a special mother who never got the chance to sit here with us on this front porch, although she would have loved to, I know. We think of this Christian lady every day, though she’s been gone since October 3, 1973.

I do believe Louise Bowen was one of those remarkable women made from a rare and precious cloth. Had she lived during Bible times, her name

very well could have appeared up there with Esther, Ruth, Mary, and Rahab. The Lord might have pointed her out in a crowd and said, “I’ve not seen such faith, no, not in all of Israel.”

Although we may be a bit prejudiced, as all of us boys are toward our mothers, the inspired man of wisdom says that is the way it should be, that the children should “arise up, and call her blessed” -- not only that, “her husband also ... praises her” (Proverbs 31:28).

cornbread and stew she put on the table each night after a full day’s work were more than sufficient for the four of us. I always thought we were kind of rich, had everything we needed. I didn’t know until I was grown that we were a little poor. I don’t think Mama ever made more than \$1.50 an hour, making it the more amazing that she could build such a house of gold on those feeble wages.

Of the four children, I was the youngest. But that’s not how Mama said it. Whenever we’d meet somebody she knew, she’d say (with her face aglow), “And this is my baby.” That made me mad; and as soon as we walked away, I’d say, “Mama, I’m not a baby. I’m 10-1/2 going on 11. I’m almost a man.” And Mama would just smile and go about her business without a word.

Unfortunately, Mama never saw me become a man, but she almost did. In her latter days, with a brain tumor issuing her both blind and lame at the young age of 42, she’d have me come to her bedside to read the Bible to her.

The Lord preserved her most valuable sense, her mind, and she loved most of all to hear the reading of the Bible. Not long before her death (ah, I can still see it clearly), on a night in early August, 1973, the day before we turned 17, she asked me to sit by the bed and read to her.

I flipped through the pages and landed, providentially, no doubt, at the 13th chapter of First Corinthians. With a quivering voice, I read the story of Mama’s life right there in the words of the great apostle in that beautiful chapter of love. I read

the life of a lady who worked in a cotton mill and came home to make stew and beans and hauled us to the Lord’s house three times or more a week and to the dentist 50 miles away once a year.

I came to that portion where Paul says, “When I was a child, I spoke as a child, I understood as a child, I thought as a child. But when I became a man, I put away childish things” (v. 11).

Mama gathered her strength, lifted a tired hand for me to pause, and turned her dimmed eyes toward me: “Son,” Mama said, in a tone that still gives me chills, “Are you goin’ to become a man tomorrow?”

We could offer that dear lady nothing of substance in return; but, after gathering ourselves for a time, we offered only a faint and graspy assurance that I would. Somehow we were able to make out the blurry words that concluded the chapter, then sat for some time holding her hand that night and watched as she faded off to sleep.

Three months later, almost to the hour, the Lord sent the angels to take my godly mother to a much-deserved reward; and we were left to weigh it all, and to try to become that man she wanted us to be.

As we look back, I realize that it wasn’t so hard for the young fella she called her ‘baby’ to become a man. The weaving and spinning of the decades take care of most of that for you. The hard task, I’ve found, is becoming a man made of the same rare and precious fabric as she. -- May 2, 1016

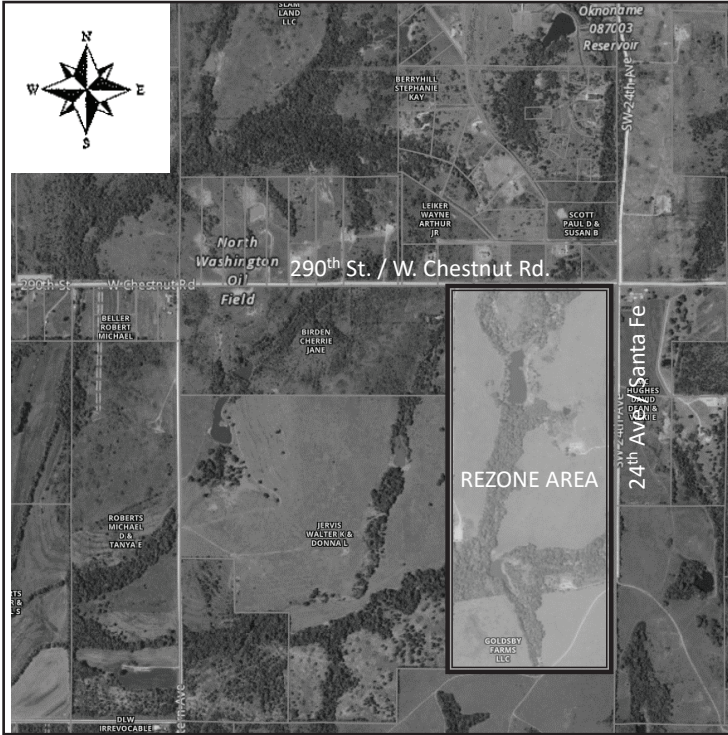
