## Real-life skills class a hit at PHS

No curriculum, no textbook, no problem for Zoe Swift

Automobiles that can go from zero to 60 in a quarter of a mile are highly touted and sought after.

Purcell High School's Zoe Swift and her teacher buddy Mindy Wells have done just that, only in the classroom.

With no curriculum and no textbook they started an "adulting" class last August.

The real-life skills class has been so successful they plan on having not one but two sections of it starting next fall.

They are not alone at PHS in teaching students about real life situations, however.

Swift reports Amber Findley does an internship program where students get real life job experience, job shadow and acquire real-life job skills.

"And, I'd put Ag teacher Erica Keen in there as well," Swift reports, "because they teach such a different set of skills."

"And then there is the adulting class taught by myself and Mindy Wells," Swift reported. "It's the first year I've ever taught an elective."

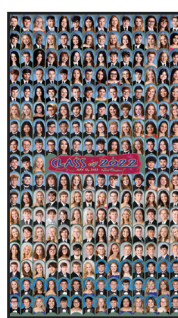

## Update from the Capitol

Work continues as we race to finish the 2022 legislative session. We’ve returned to our committees to continue vetting the governor’s nearly 150 executive nominations to the state’s boards and commissions.

I’m carrying the nomination of Blanchard resident Teresa Gerber to serve a three-year term on the State Textbook Committee. Her nomination will go before the Senate Education Committee and then the full Senate.

More than 200 bills have been signed into law, including three more of mine.

Senate Bill 1809 was a constituent request from Wes Brozek with Operation Freedom Outdoors, an Oklahoma non-profit that provides free fishing and hunting expeditions to veterans and first responders.

This group of men and

women do incredible work across Oklahoma and provide therapeutic outdoor experiences to the men and women who serve our country, state, and communities.

This bill creates an exception to allow a landowner or agricultural lessee, or their designated agent, to hunt coyotes or feral swine with a headlight and without a permit or bag limit in order to protect marketable agricultural crops, livestock feed, seed, or other materials used in the production of an agricultural commodity, as long as it isn’t deer gun season.

This bill will help farmers and ranchers protect their livestock and land, and I’m thankful for Wes working so hard to help Representative Boles and I get this done this session.

SB 1809, at the request of the Department of Wildlife, also modifies the penalties for

headlighting, which for those not familiar with this term is the use of a powerful light at night to hunt animals. It’ll increase the minimum fine for first offenses from \$250 to \$1,000 and from \$500 to \$2,000 for second offenses.

The measure will also allow the district attorney to request that one’s hunting and fishing license privileges be revoked for between one and 10 years. The offender will pay reinstatement fees if they previously had a lifetime license - \$200 for residents and \$500 for nonresidents.

Anyone who has pleaded guilty or has been convicted of violating headlighting or other hunting laws must wait three years before they can control nuisance coyotes or feral hogs

## America inching closer to recession

For more than a year, the heavy weight of a struggling economy has been crushing Americans.

While President Joe Biden and Democrats have continuously brushed off or attempted to shift blame over the warning signs of a potential recession, a recent report from the Bureau of Economic Analysis alarmingly showed gross domestic product (GDP) is indeed declining. That means there is no denying that the U.S. economy is in fact shrinking and moving toward a recession.

Although we already have witnessed job numbers below expectations and inflation at a 40-year high, the current state of America’s GDP reveals more about the overall health of the economy since it is used to measure the overall value of goods and services produced.

A decline of 1.4 percent in the first quarter of this year is the weakest showing since coronavirus pandemic recovery

began. This is a clear indication that Democrats’ far-left policies and out-of-control spending, both advanced and proposed, are not working.

While the last recorded economic recession took place in 2020, when the coronavirus pandemic drove mass shutdowns and layoffs across the country, we have since seen some periods of turnaround, recovery and a steady return to normal life.

With a life-saving vaccine and infection rates down tremendously, Americans should get back to work and back to normal life. However, with record-high inflation, Americans are paying more for groceries, fuel, household items and just about everything else.

This year, inflation is estimated to cost the average household in the United States more than \$5,000 and is already costing the average American family an extra \$327 a month.

As prices continue to climb, households may pull back on spending and businesses may

halt hiring and stocking their inventory.

In fact, the National Federation of Independent Business (NFIB) released a recent report showing that inflation is the top concern for small business owners.

In fact, 62 percent reported that inflation is having a substantial impact on their businesses. Additionally, in the same report, 86 percent of small businesses have already raised their prices and 68 percent plan to raise the prices as costs continue to go up.

Finally, while everything costs more, the wages of hard-working Americans are not keeping up. Since President Joe Biden assumed office and Democrats took control of Congress, real wages have decreased nine out of 13 months.

And since President Biden’s first full month in office, real wages have declined by more than three percent. To be more

## Springtime in Oklahoma

Many of you have likely heard by now the news out of the U.S. Supreme Court. Last Monday, a leaked draft opinion of the court revealed their decision to overturn Roe v. Wade and return the decision regarding abortions back to the states.

When the Supreme Court’s decision is officially released, likely in June, Oklahoma is poised to act immediately to protect children in the womb. Last year, the Legislature passed what’s known as a “trigger” law. This law states that in the event Roe v. Wade is overturned, Oklahoma would be able to enforce the law that was in effect prior to Roe v. Wade that makes abortion illegal, except when necessary to save a pregnant woman’s life.

The House has worked hard over the year to push pro-life legislation to protect our unborn children. I’m proud of the work we’ve accomplished and look forward to the day when the Supreme Court officially overturns Roe v. Wade.

Back in the district, we faced a round of severe weather last week. I’m grateful that there have been no reported casualties and minimal damage.

It’s springtime in Oklahoma, so severe weather can appear suddenly. Take steps now to protect yourself and your loved ones.

Ensure you have a safe room

to hunker down in during a tornado warning. This should be a room with no exterior walls on the lowest floor of your house.

Utilities may be disrupted in an emergency, and the Oklahoma Department of Emergency Management recommends setting aside a supply kit in the room where you will shelter.

Suggestions for items in the kit include water, nonperishable food, spare clothing, sleeping bags, a first aid kit and prescriptions, extra glasses, a battery-powered radio, flashlights and extra batteries, and specialty care items for infants, elderly and disabled people, as well as pets. You can protect important documents in a water- and fireproof safe.

During a tornado warning, shelter in your safe room away from doors and windows, and use items like bike helmets or sofa cushions to protect yourself from debris.

Being outdoors, in a vehicle or in a mobile home is extremely dangerous in a tornado, and finding stronger shelter before the storm arrives is advised. For those driving during severe weather, keep a car radio on to stay updated on possible tornado activity in the area.

Afterwards, contact emergency services ASAP if someone

Senate Bill 612 would fine anyone performing an abortion \$100,000 and impose a prison sentence of 10 years. He also signed into law a bill that will impose civil penalties on anyone performing an abortion after a fetal heartbeat is detected.

This is mirror legislation that passed in Texas and has withstood multiple court challenges. These are just a few of the many bills signed into law.

The reason the Legislature has passed so many different bills to limit or end abortion is because of the number of court challenges we know each bill will face. As long as babies are being killed, we cannot stop trying in every way possible to end their genocide.

Since Roe v. Wade was implemented in 1973, 62 million babies have been killed in the womb. This is more than the population of Oklahoma and six surrounding states combined.

This is an entire generation of children who will never get to grow up or contribute in any way to our communities or our society. This is tragic.

It’s important to know that if Roe v. Wade is overturned, it will not stop abortion altogether in our nation. It will still be up to each state to decide whether it should be legal within the state.

Oklahoma, however, has taken a firm stand on the right to life for the unborn. We have trigger laws in place that will end abortion the moment Roe is overturned.

I am pleased to have been part of promoting policies that protect life beginning in the womb. I pray the day comes soon when abortion ends within our state for all time.

We were shocked by the sudden death of Naomi Judd. She was a country music star and legend. She and her daughter Wynonna had racked up 14 number one hits. They had five Grammy awards and twenty million plus album sales.

A new tour was planned for this Fall and the day after her death an induction ceremony was scheduled for the Country Music Hall of Fame. She apparently had it all.

She had a long-term 30-year marriage, successful daughters and fame and fortune. What more could a human being want? Apparently, something was still wrong.

Depression and mental illness apparently can become a hole so deep and so dark that once someone is in it, they don’t feel they are emotionally able to survive or escape the darkness.

We have been shocked by other personalities who reportedly took their lives such as comedian Robin Williams and Anthony Bourdain who traveled the world tasting and showing various lifestyles and cuisines.

Mental illness comes in various forms and affects people in

different ways and on different levels. Everyone has down days, the blahs and feelings of unhappiness. The weather affects us. Rainy or snowy days may eventually get to us.

Too many bills and not enough money to pay them can work on our minds. A sick or troubled family member may worry us or make us feel bad. Our own personal health battles can make us feel down. Too much to do is troubling.

Terminal illness that is rapidly getting worse puts us in a state of desperation to escape the outcome sooner rather than later.

There is more to depression than snapping our fingers to get out of it as proven by Judd. She openly talked about her illness. She wrote a book about it and reportedly had spent years medically dealing with her diseases. Severe mental illness can end sadly and tragically.

Reviewing her life, it seems there would be a counter argument for everything we are supposed to do. Get help. Take medication. Have a good doctor and a good counselor.

We always have hope but we must be very aware of the seriousness of depression. Our mental state is serious and can be terminal.

Try to think of those left behind. Try to think about the spouse, the children and the loved ones who are left to go on.

I have known people who were so physically sick that I understood their pain and desire to escape their bodies. Try to keep in mind that God made us and we all have an appointment with death. We don’t have to push the appointment. It’s coming to us all.

Try to find a way to find purpose and peace with the brief life God has given to you. It will end soon enough.

Roe:

one needs medical attention or rescue. Be sure to avoid downed power lines, which may still be active. Additionally, do not enter rushing water or bodies of water, where the depth and content cannot be safely determined and it’s easy to be swept away.

If necessary, find a place to stay the night, whether that’s in a temporary shelter or with a loved one. ODEM also recommends designating an out-of-state friend or relative as the point of contact for all family members in the event

people are separated during an emergency.

Once the danger is passed, insurance companies should be contacted as soon as possible so the claims process can begin. Don’t start clearing a property until the adjuster has completed their duties.

Every spring, I hope these precautions are not needed and that everyone stays safe, but tornadoes and other severe weather are an unfortunate reality of living in Oklahoma in the spring. It’s best to be overprepared and not need it

than be underprepared and regret it later.

## Pandemic, new state law stressful for school board members

With no manual or list of emergency procedures, school boards across the country were each in a unique position to build district plans and decide what was best for their communities as the COVID-19 pandemic swept the nation. COVID-19 led members to make unprecedented decisions, and Oklahoma boards have also faced the integration into school curriculums of House Bill 1775, a law that made it illegal for schools to, either knowingly or unknowingly, teach students that they are inherently racist, sexist, or oppressive due to their sex or race. “Dealing with (the pandemic) was incredibly stressful at first because there was no manual to go by,” said Chris Cunningham, president of the

Yukon Public Schools board. “It seemed like no matter what decision we made, it was incorrect. We’re not going to please everyone because public opinion was divided, and it was divided equally.” School boards are nonpartisan, but issues in recent years have often divided constituents along party lines. “We try our hardest to compromise, keeping in mind what is best for the students. And that is what I will say about the school board that we have,” Cunningham said. “Our utmost concern is what is best for the students, and no matter what that decision is what we try to use and go by.” Norman School Board President Daniel Snell said constituents’ opinions about COVID-19 were obvious during a recent meeting, though it could have been worse.

“We had a segregated meeting where half the people were masked and sat on one side and the other half sat on the other, which we had never had before,” Snell said. “But they were decent to each other. They actually made fun of the segregation. You see the videos in Maryland or Virginia where they were yelling at each other, and that did not happen. But I do think it has been a struggle for everyone. You know, what’s the right public health decision?” Paula Lewis, president of the Oklahoma City Public Schools board of education, said families come first when decisions must be made. “We had more pushback from people who wanted us to keep kids out of school longer than

# County polling places change

## Due to redistricting following census

Mandatory redistricting efforts have caused some McClain County precinct boundaries to change. As a result, some voters will be assigned to new polling places. That’s the word from McClain County Election Board Secretary Karen Haley. Precinct boundary lines must be evaluated every 10 years following the redistricting of congressional, legislative and county commissioner districts. Redistricting occurs following the federal census to ensure that the population in the various districts is equal. Two new precinct and polling places were added in McClain County due to the boundary lines of State House District 20 changing. Midway Baptist Church – Precinct 25 and Union Hill Baptist Church – Precinct 22, will have voters for the first time on the June 28 primary election. Wayne United Methodist Church is no longer a polling place. Those voters will now vote at the Mid-America Technology Center – Precinct 3. Haley said new voter identification cards, along with polling place information, have been mailed to all voters affected by the new precinct lines. Voters can also use the OK Voter Portal [oklahoma.gov/elections/ovpt](https://oklahoma.gov/elections/ovpt) to find their polling place information. Polling place changes are effective immediately. Voters with questions should contact the McClain County Election Board at 405-527-3121 or [mcclaincounty@elections.ok.gov](mailto:mcclaincounty@elections.ok.gov).

The election board is located at 121 N 2nd Avenue in Purcell and is open from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.

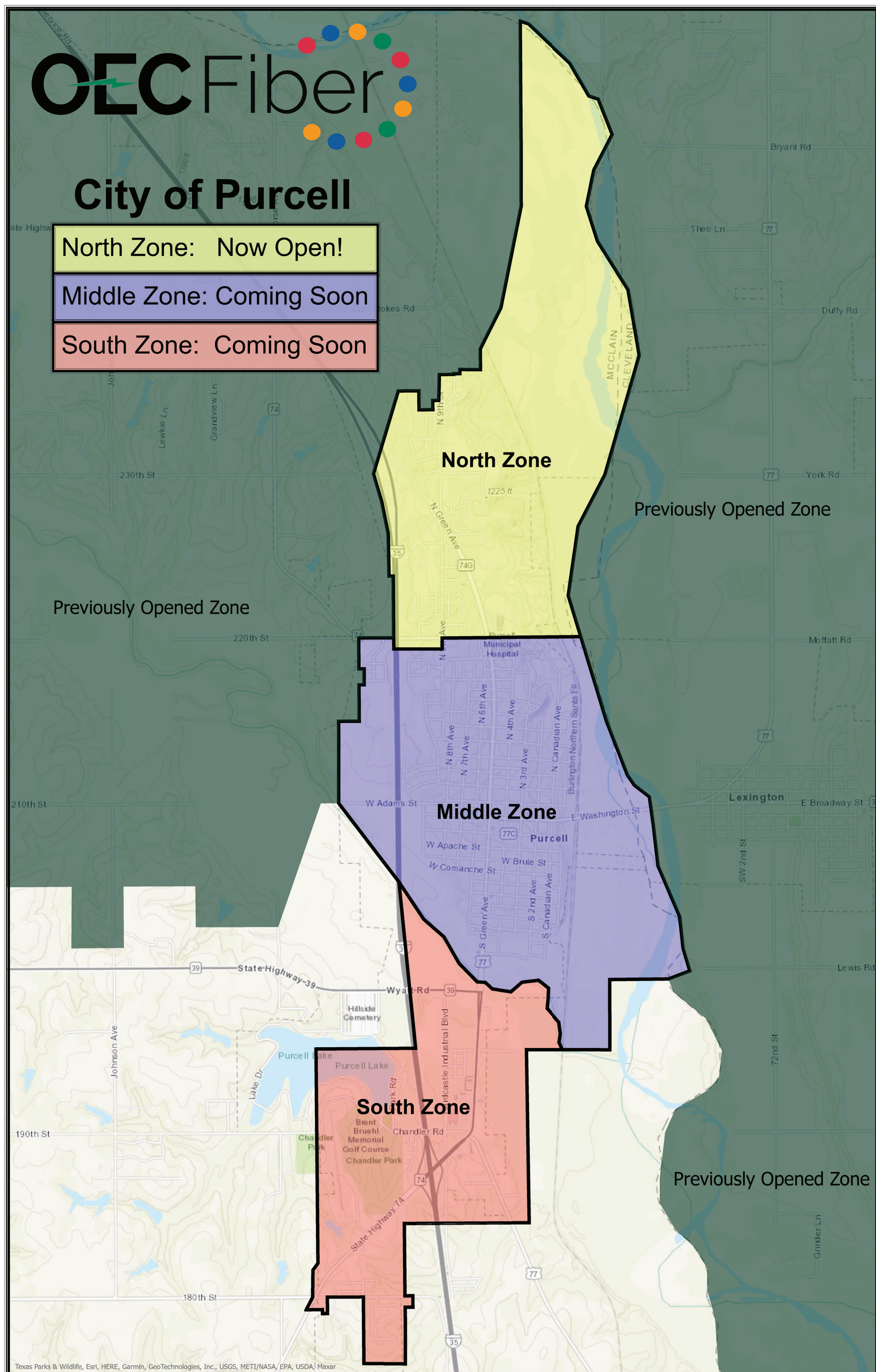

# How the lack of data hinders Oklahoma justice reform efforts

On any given day, several thousand people in Oklahoma are sitting in county jails.

Many will post bail and be released within a few hours or days. Others are serving weeks or months-long sentences for probation violations or misdemeanor offenses.

The remainder, unable to afford bail or deemed ineligible for pretrial release, will remain there until their case is resolved.

The outcome of a single case is simple to track, either through an online records service like the Oklahoma State Courts Network or by obtaining records in person. It's much more difficult to identify larger trends and possible disparities in the pretrial justice system.

Oklahoma doesn't collect data on the average jail stay or racial makeup of its detention centers. The state also doesn't track decisions made by 27 district attorney's offices, including the initial charging of crimes, plea agreements, and bail recommendations.

Lawmakers who support criminal justice reform say the absence of aggregate data makes it difficult to quantify and tackle a host of issues, from pretrial incarceration of nonviolent offenders to the availability of diversion programs in rural areas.

They also argue the public would benefit from having more information on how their local justice systems are operating.

"All of our conversations on reform or alternatives to incarceration really are centered on emotion and not fact," Rep. Meloyde Blancett, D-Tulsa, said in an interview. "I, coming from a business background, feel like it's important to get agnostic data that's not bent to drive a conclusion, but rather inform and tell us what the heck is going on out there."

In January Blancett filed House Bill 3848, which would require jail administrators, sheriffs, district attorneys and public defenders to send data to the Office of Management and Enterprise Services monthly by the end of 2024.

The proposal lost momentum in early March and failed to advance past the House committee deadline. It will be eligible for consideration next year.

Rep. Logan Phillips, R-Mounds, worked with Blancett on the proposal. While the bill has numerous logistical obstacles to overcome, he said lawmakers plan to study the issue this summer and fall and return next year with revamped ideas.

"It would be incredible for transparency, but even more than the transparency and the engagement of our communities, we can actually discover what best practices are," Phillips said. "If one county is doing something incredibly effective in criminal justice reform, then we can take that data and implement those methods in other counties. Without having the data you're really throwing spaghetti at a wall."

Local justice systems have limited resources and must set enforcement priorities, said Ron Wright, a professor of criminal justice at Wake Forest University and expert in prosecutorial practices. This can cause disparities in charging and sentencing between counties and regions.

Wright, a former trial attorney with the U.S. Department of Justice, said he could understand some elected officials being wary of submitting data because it could be misinterpreted or misunderstood.

"That's an annoyance to have to explain what the data is really showing," Wright said. "But the public deserves to make their choices and monitor how their

choices are going. Criminal law enforcement is not just an automatic, fill-in-the-blank, ministerial kind of job. It's something that involves real choices and values."

Most Oklahoma district attorney's races will be decided without a single vote this year. Of the state's 27 district attorney races, all but four are uncontested.

Prosecutor races in rural areas are often less competitive simply because fewer attorneys live there, Wright said. But urban races may draw enhanced inter-



est if aggregate data is compiled and made public, he added.

### Models for Reform?

A handful of states, including Florida and Connecticut, have passed sweeping criminal justice data transparency laws in recent years.

Such an undertaking requires funding, manpower and co-operation between agencies. Complicating the effort is the fact that many courts and jails are equipped with outdated technology.

"We generally underinvest in criminal courts," Wright said. "When the computers arrive there, they're older and slower, and the data we're able to generate is less reliable."

Florida lawmakers drew national praise in 2018 when they passed the Criminal Justice Data Transparency Act. Under the law, law enforcement officials in the state's 67 counties are required to submit information on bond amounts, charging decisions, jail stays and plea agreements to the state every month.

While officials there struggled for years to meet deadlines and make the database public, it's now accessible online.

Phillips, who chairs the House Technology Committee, said a similar effort in Oklahoma would likely take several years to complete. Many jails are still using paper-based data collection systems, he said.

"What works in other places seldom works in Oklahoma, especially with our belief that everything should be done at the local level," he said. "Right now our technology doesn't communicate and the paperwork doesn't match up. So getting an office that can organize that and update everything, requires moving several large entities inside state government."

While Blancett believes creating a comprehensive public criminal justice database is the best long-term solution, she said a model adopted by Michigan could provide answers more quickly.

In 2019, Gov. Gretchen Whitmer established a task force to study the cause of rising jail populations and recommend policy reforms. The task force, composed of district attorneys, judges, public defenders and policy experts, collected data from 20 sample counties and released a report less than a year later.

The task force found that jail admissions for parole violations and failure to appear warrants were driving population growth. They also noted racial disparities. While Black men made up just six percent of the resident population in the surveyed counties, they accounted for 29 percent of jail admissions.

The Michigan legislature

passed 20 jail reform bills last year, including measures to reduce arrests in nonviolent misdemeanor cases and limit jail time and arrest warrants for technical probation violations.

"A Michigan-style approach would allow us to get a handle on what are possible alternatives to our incarceration system, and to identify some of the problems and the pain points that some of our county sheriffs are experiencing," Blancett said. "With the passage of State Question 780 and 781, and us not funding the programs put forth, that's caused a real problem. As a result, nobody really wants to talk about any further reform at all."

### Where Justice Bills Stand

Justice reform advocates have seen a handful of successes this legislative session, including the passage of bills simplifying the expungement process and reducing fines and fees in criminal cases.

Other bills saw promise but ultimately lost momentum.

A proposal to create a felony classification system with reduced sentencing ranges for some nonviolent crimes cleared the Senate but stalled in the House. House Bill 3294, which would require the state to utilize the funding formula outlined in State Question 781 and allocate funds to county justice systems annually, also stalled in the opposing chamber.

During floor debates and media interviews, some lawmakers have expressed concerns that the justice reform movement has gone too far at the expense of public safety. Oklahoma's violent crime rate rose slightly in 2020, following national trends.

Blancett, who has advocated for bail reform legislation since being elected in 2016, believes reform advocates and law enforcement officials could find common ground if data is compiled.

"We need to get beyond saying the reform people are trying to defund us, or the district attorneys are just throwing people in jail willy nilly and they don't care if they're guilty or not," Blancett said. "That's what I was trying to attempt to do. I think as a result of all this, I've been able to have healthy conversations with a number of people. Maybe we'll get there."

from those who wanted to get them back in sooner," Lewis said. "I don't know if anyone in the OKC metro got pushback because private schools stayed in and they are more of a red demographic, and we are more of a blue."

School board members hear plenty of feedback from voters, said Tulsa board of education member Judith Perez.

"The majority of the district of Tulsa Public Schools has been receptive... the majority," Perez said. "The only thing is there are a few, and it's not the majority, but a few parents are loud. They have the privilege and they are loud, so it makes it seem like the community is not receptive, but it is."

School boards have also been taking action regarding House Bill 1775, which was signed into law in 2021.

"We denounced it unanimously as a board as soon as it came out," Lewis said. "The very first board meeting after that we had it on the agenda to discuss, and we voted and said we won't support that law or anything above that."

As Lewis sees it, the Oklahoma City district does not teach critical race theory.

"If anyone has taken the time to learn what CRT is, it's

a high-level law theory that is taught in law schools," Lewis said. "We don't expect them to call my son, just because he is a white guy, an oppressor, but if my mixed nieces can learn their ancestors were enslaved then my white son can learn that his ancestors were once

the slave owners."

Cunningham said Yukon is "not intending to change any curriculum at this time."

## Clarence “Paul” Ratliff

Funeral services for Clarence “Paul” Ratliff, 99, of Washington will be held at 10 a.m. Thursday, May 12, 2022 at Washington First Baptist Church, 100 S. Main, in Washington. Interment will be at Hillside Cemetery in Purcell under the direction of the Wilson-Little Funeral Home in Purcell.



Mr. Ratliff passed away Saturday, May 7, 2022 at the Norman VA Center.

He was born June 16, 1922 in Blanchard, Okla., to Jimmie and Maggie (Barnett) Ratliff. Paul was raised on the family homestead that started with his mother's 1899 Indian Allotment along with his other 10 siblings (Paul being next to the youngest).

He graduated from Washington High School with the Warrior Class of 1940 and joined the United States Navy in 1943. He served his country proudly as a naval aviator flying the F6F Hellcat and seeing action in both the European and Pacific theaters during World War II.

Paul married his best friend and the love of his life, Juanita Louise Townsend on December 11, 1943 in Mobile, Ala. They settled on the family homestead in 1947 and began working the ranch and developing a successful dairy operation.

During the 1950's, several years of severe drought hit the region and Paul took a job temporarily at an aircraft company, Aero Commander, hoping conditions would improve. But, the steady pay and uncertain weather eventually convinced him to relocate the family to Oklahoma City. He stayed with the aircraft company through multiple mergers with Rockwell International, Chrysler and finally Gulfstream.

While living in Oklahoma City, Paul and Juanita raised four children, son, Paul, and daughters, Dianah Sue, Paula and Jan. Shortly before and in preparation for retirement, they returned to the family ranch and built a new home in 1975. Paul worked for a few more years and eventually retired as plant manager and superintendent after more than 23 years of dedicated service.

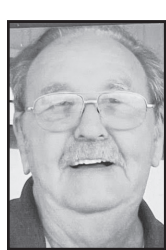

"Tinley struggled in the first game but I challenged her and told her as the three hole we had to have her," Lampkin said. "She didn't get out the rest of the day."

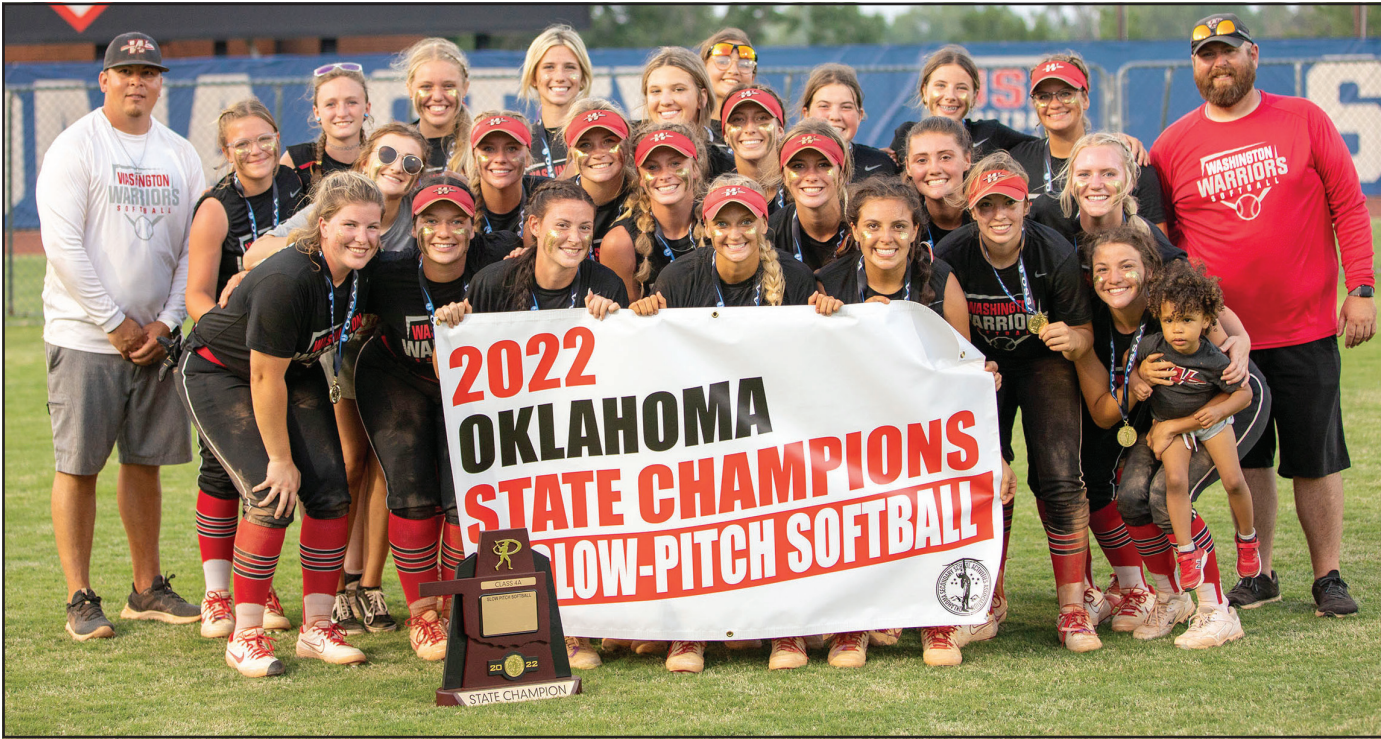

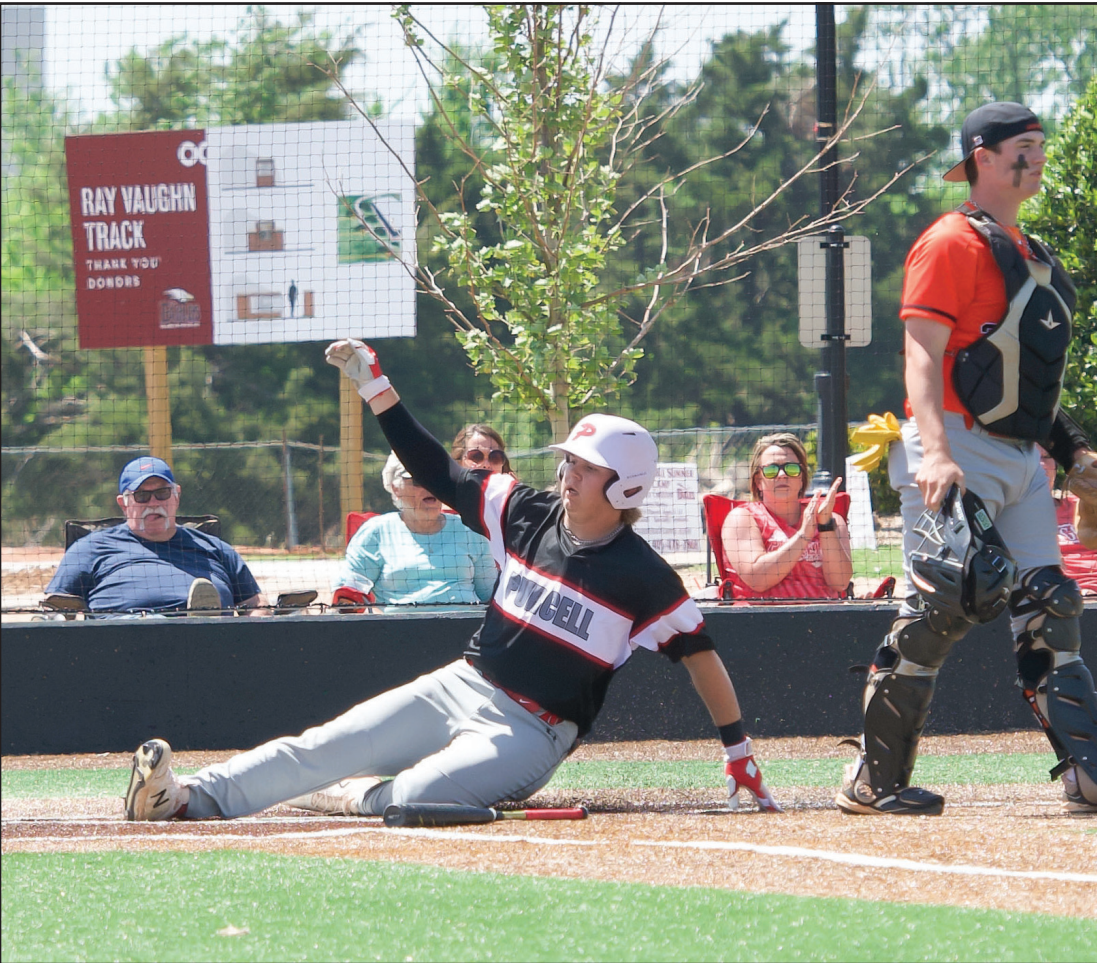

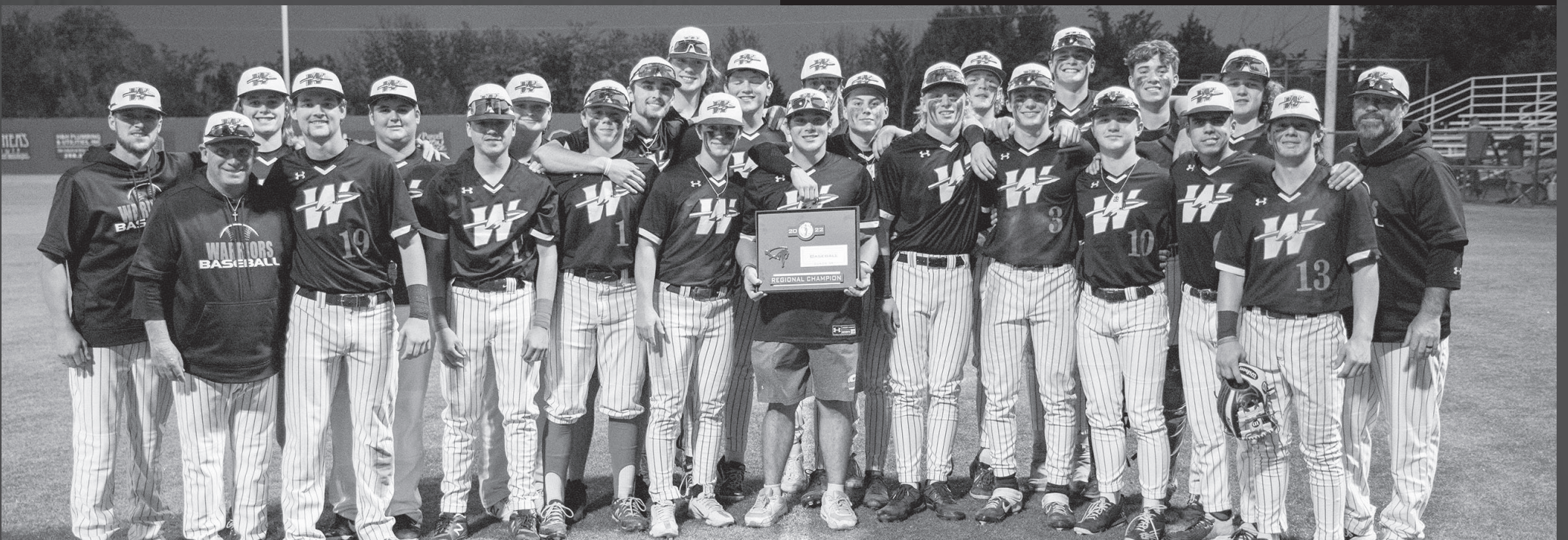

# OHCE 2022 theme “Back in the Saddle”

Oklahoma Home and Community Educators (OHCE) 2022 theme is “Back In The Saddle.”

We suffered through the COVID-19 Pandemic as many companies and community organizations. This is why members decided to get “Back in the Saddle” for this year. In doing so, we are recognizing our long-standing Washington Chapter OHCE Members.

The Washington Chapter of OHCE is led by President Delores Givens, Vice President Lois Stephens, Treasurer Lori Burton, and Secretary Deanna Surber.

Today we are focusing on the achievements of Deanna Surber as she has been breaking horses since she was 11 years old. This is one of Oklahoma’s finest female horsemanship stories and part of Washington, McClain County, and Oklahoma horse racing history:

“I broke my first Shetland pony when I was 11, then my sister Betty and I started breaking all of my Dad (Raymond C. Surber) and brother Burl’s race horses, Thoroughbred and Quarter Horses. Dad taught us to tuck and roll when we got thrown. When we got up with nothing dangling or bleeding, he would say, “Get back on, You can ride him.

“When I was 17, Betty and I entered our first All-Girl Rodeo in Duncan, Bull Riding and Barrel Racing. For the next three years we went to All-Girl Rodeos in Oklahoma, Kansas, and Arkansas. Betty did well in tie-down calf roping and bull riding. I rode bulls, bareback Broncs, and we both barrel raced. We quit after we got jobs and got married.

“Dad bought a yearling Paint filly named Painted Dream in 1965. We showed her and raced her lightly. She injured her shoulder, so Dad bred her in 1967 to Burl’s Quarter Horse Stud, Dream Man. I got her first foal, a brown and white tobiano stud colt, we named Spoiler. Dad trained him. Their jockey Sonny King galloped him and won several races on him, his two-year-old year.

“Sonny got killed riding someone else’s horse, so I finished the year with two other jockeys. When Spoiler turned three, Dad asked, “What are we going to do for a jockey?” I [Deanna Surber] said, “I’m riding him myself!” Sonny taught me how to gallop and ride in races.

“My first race was in June of 1971 at Eureka, Kan. We won the trials. When we came back for the finals, I had made myself red and black silks and helmet cover. We won the finals, and I became the First Female Jockey to ride in an official Paint Horse Race. We raced Spoiler from 1970-1973. He was the Leading Paint Race Horse in the Nation from 1966 through 1973. I continued to ride off and on in the Paint Horse races into the early 1990s. I never rode for the public...too easy to get hurt on horses I did not know.

“Growing up it was Dad’s

dream to race on a pari-mutuel track in Oklahoma. When Remington Park opened in 1989, Dad entered his three-year-old Paint Stud—Shut Out. I got in shape, rode him, and won! I was blessed to help make Dad’s Painted Dream come true.”—Deanna Surber

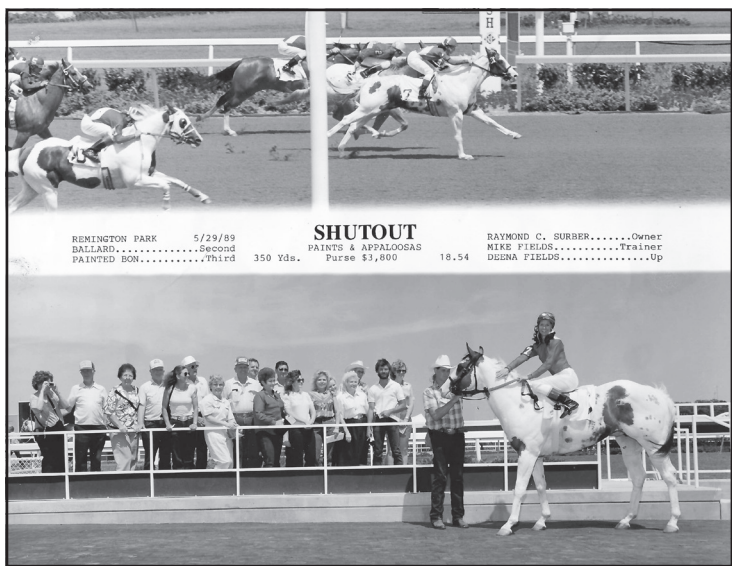

## Our Lady of Victory Catholic Church

May 15, 2022 is the fifth Sunday of the Easter season.

In the Gospel reading this week, Gospel, John 13:31-33, 34-35, Jesus said, 33 Little children, I shall be with you only a little longer. You will look for me, and, as I told the Jews, where I am going, you cannot come. 34 I give you a new commandment: love one another; you must love one another just as I have loved you. 35 It is by your love for one another, that everyone will recognize you as my disciples.

The new commandment sounds a good deal like the commandment, “Love your neighbor as yourself.” But Jesus, in the Good Samaritan parable, tells us that everyone is our neighbor. So Jesus’ new commandment, “love one another; you must love one another just as I have loved you,” expands our task to love everyone.

Never Ever Satisfied

Welcome, all, to the ‘front porch.’

We’ve gotten our Philipians study started; and I was thinking of one of the themes the apostle brings out: We are never ever really satisfied on our Christian walk. Pardon all the adverbs, but it’s true. We are not satisfied, but we hope to be better.

We hope to be further down the road, to be more pleased with what we have learned and how we have grown that we are here in the outset of our journey. I hope the Philipians’ journey helps us attain that. In any arena, ‘satisfaction’ leads, invariably, to complacency.

The Laodiceans of Revelation 3 show us the danger of

being satisfied with our walk. They think they have it made. They believe they are on fire for the Lord, but the Lord says they are far from that.

Instead, they are “lukewarm ... neither cold nor hot.” God’s Word is filled with examples of men and women, congregations, entire nations, and generations who believe they are in perfectly good standing—but a long, hard look in the mirror often shows they really aren’t.

The fact that many of our readers will find their faith lacking is not to say that those of you whose faith seems strong are not welcome to come along through any of our studies. No, you come, too. Even if you are skeptic and are thinking that

you have plenty of faith, why don’t you go ahead and grab their backpacks and head out with us. It couldn’t hurt, and you may find that the fresh air will do you good. A look into ‘gospel of excellent things’ always is a breath of “fresh air,” as we know.

Likely, most of us are more desperate than that—or, if not desperate, at least cautious. We know how hard it is to “walk by faith, not by sight” (2 Corinthians 5:7). We find the idea of faith pleasing to our thoughts, but an actual walking by faith with the integrity and strength and power that we need is far difficult. Even the Apostle Paul—after many years of traveling for Jesus—stops to take a good, long, hard look at himself and comes to this conclusion:

“I do not consider myself to have ‘arrived’, spiritually,” says Paul in the everyday language of the J.B. Phillips New Testament—“nor do I consider myself already perfect. But I keep going on, grasping ever more firmly that purpose for which Christ grasped me ... I do not consider myself to have fully grasped it even now. But I do concentrate on this: I leave the past behind and with hands outstretched to whatever lies ahead I go straight for the goal—my reward the honour of being called by God in Christ” (Philippians 3:13-14).

## Amos Smith honored as House “Veteran of the Week”

The oldest living World War II veteran in Oklahoma and Lindsay resident Amos Smith was recognized as the Oklahoma House of Representatives’ “Veteran of the Week” April 25.

Smith was presented on the House floor by Rep. Cynthia Roe, R-Lindsay, Rep. Brian Hill, R-Mustang, and Rep. Dick Lowe, R-Amber. The group presented him with a state citation to recognize his service.

Smith was born in Heavener

in 1919 and moved to Lindsay at age 11. In 1940, he joined the Army and specialized as an automotive mechanic and marksman carbine.

He served over five years and was stationed in Ardennes Rhineland, northern France and central Europe.

For his service, Smith received the EAME service ribbon, four Bronze Stars, an American Service Ribbon and the Purple Heart.

In 1940, he married Myrtle D. Pratt. Together, they had

three children and have 12 grandchildren and 13 great-grandchildren.

A few weeks ago, we celebrated Easter. However, for Christians, Easter is not just one day. We remember the Resurrection every Sunday we gather together.

Easter tide, the season following Easter, is made up of 50 days, which begins at sunset on the eve of Easter and ends on Pentecost (“fiftieth” in Judaism), the day we celebrate the coming of the Holy Spirit and the birth of the Christian Church (see Acts 2).

This time period is more than an extended celebration

of the resurrection of Jesus. In the early church, the Lenten season was when people who wished to become Christians were learning how to live the way of Jesus and preparing for baptism on Easter Sunday.

Christians have referred to this time of formation as “catechesis” or “echoing the way of Jesus.” We continue to see the word “catechism” in the Catholic church referring to their education program. It can also apply to any faith group’s membership preparation.

The original purpose of the Easter season was to continue the education of new Christians in the faith. Christians have historically referred to this formation process as “mystagogy” or “leading people into the mysteries.”

Today, this extended season gives us time to rejoice and experience what we mean when we say Christ is risen and that we, as the church, are the body of the Risen Lord. It’s a season for focusing on the core doctrines and mysteries of the faith and for preparing for the ministries the Spirit has empowered us to undertake in Jesus’ name.

Many churches use these weeks to teach about their sacraments and help people to discover their own personal spiritual gifts and callings. Congregations may do this both through small groups and as part of public worship.
