



In a general purpose pond as well as one available to live stock, University Extension specialist in aquaculture, said landowners should monitor the overflow structures, such as an internal standpipe, for floating debris.

"After a major overflow event has occurred, remove any floating limbs or items that impede or clog the pipe," Beem said. "One of the major dangers of a failed primary spillway is overtopping, which can quickly lead to a dam

Regulations for Garage Sales

- 1. A resident may have one garage sale per calendar quarter. A permit must be obtained from City Hall or each sale. A sale may be held for up to three consecutive days. There are no rain checks.
- 2. A garage sale permit fee of \$5 must be paid for each garage sale held.
- 3. Your garage sale permit must be displayed at the site designated on the permit.
- 4. Garage sale signs may not be placed on the city street right-of-way, on any utility pole or street sign, in the center median, or on any private property without the permission of property owner.
- 5. All signs must be removed within 48 hours after the sale. 6. If you have any questions, call the City of Purcell at 527-6561 daytime from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

If you have questions for the Oklahoma Tax Commission, call them at (405) 521-3274.

Violation of any of these regulations may result in revocation of your permit and a fine.

Special session called to take action on ARPA funds

In addition to passing our legislative budget for the state last week, the Legislature also called itself into special session for the purpose of allowing continued public input into how \$1.8 billion in federal American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds are spent.

The special session allows the Legislature to meet over the interim to enact an ARPA spending plan as agreed to by the Joint Committee on Pandemic Relief Funding.

The House and Senate bipartisan committee was established last year as an intrabranch partnership process with the executive branch to determine how ARPA funds are to be spent. Public committee hearings and project submissions have been ongoing for months and are continuing.

Through the joint committee process, \$17.8 billion has been requested through 1,400 projects submitted by the public to the committee. The state has \$1.8 billion to allocate.

This joint committee will continue to meet over the summer and fall and will continue to receive public input into how funds would best be spent. Once a spending plan is final or action is needed, the special session allows the Legislature to convene. Our regular session must adjourn

by 5 p.m. May 27.

After months of public testimony identifying needs, we've already established several priorities for strategic investments.

These include expanding broadband internet service to cover more of rural Oklahoma; rural water projects; and modernizing our Physician Manpower Training Commission, sending money to the University of Oklahoma Children's Hospital, and increasing the number of nursing training program spots available – all to address Oklahoma's health care needs.

The special session call also covers appropriations related to Project Ocean, a transformational economic development project considering Oklahoma for a major manufacturing operation.

Under legislation introduced this session, \$698 million would be allocated under the Large-scale Economic Activity and Development Act (LEAD Act) to pursue Project Ocean. This money would only be spent in the form of tax rebates once jobs and investment have been made in the state. An initial investment of \$3.6 billion is expected and as many as 8,000 jobs.

Why did Memorial Day change?

Decoration Day was observed on May 30th from 1868 to 1970 to decorate the graves and honor those dying in military service for our country. In the last Monday in May Memorial Day.

On this day, Americans take time to pay respect and decorate the graves of our military

service Americans who died to talk and laugh. keep America free. Because of them we can travel the country, have picnics, go to ballgames and more.

For me, Memorial Day has 1971 Congress officially made changed. Memorial weekend was a big time of family gathering. I can still remember Mamaw and Grandpa, all nine of their children and the grandchildren gathering to eat, play,



Price of Progress

Every year in May a colleague and I take about a dozen students on some type of weeklong outdoor experience. In the past we have done backpacking or canoeing, but this year we camped at different historical and environmental locations in western Oklahoma. We spent a few days camping at Black Mesa, followed by a few days at Alabaster Caverns, and concluded at the Battle of Washita.

It was on our last day while watching a video about the Battle that a line caught my attention. The video asked, "What was the price of progress?" I have thought about this for a few days.

Historically speaking, there have been too many instances to count where we thought we were doing the right thing at the time, in the name of progress, only to realize later that we had made mistakes. It makes me wonder, with so many social and cultural changes, what will our price be for progress.

During the Civil War in 1864, bands of Cheyenne and Arapaho began to attack whites who were encroaching on their lands. In response the Colorado militia under Colonel John M. Chivington attacked a village that included Chief Black Kettle. When the warriors fled, hoping to draw away the soldiers, the soldiers instead attacked the village mostly composed of old men, women, and children.

The government acknowledge their wrong and in the 1867 Medicine Lodge Treaty promised to take care of the Indians if they moved to Indian Territory. However, the government did not fulfill their side of the bargain and whites continued to encroach on Indian lands.

When the natives fought back and raided settlements, the army decided they needed to put a stop to Indian crimes and ordered General Philip Sheridan to punish the Cheyenne tribes. Sheridan turned to his trusted lieutenant and hero of the Civil War, Lt. Col George Armstrong Custer.

Though seen very differently today, Custer was one of America's most popular celebrities. Made a General during the war at only age 23, Custer was one of the boy generals and was seen as a romantic dashing character. After the war he was commissioned a Lt. Colonel and followed his mentor Sheridan out west where he continued to build his fame as an Indian fighter.

On the other side of the battle was Black Kettle. Even after the Sand Creek Massacre, Black Kettle tried to work with the U.S. government for peace. He worked so hard for peace that his band was forced to separate themselves from the other Cheyenne, Arapaho, and Kiowa camped along the Washita River.

On the morning of November 27, 1868, Custer with the 7th Cavalry attacked at dawn against the isolated camp of Black Kettle. Custer led one unit directly into the village while the others surrounded it to cut off escape. In the end between 30 to 60 Cheyenne lay dead, including Black Kettle. Custer then ordered the destruction of 650 horses belonging to Black Kettle's people to hurt them in the future. It was only after the other camps began to arrive on scene that Custer retreated to Fort Supply.

Here is the thing: today we see Custer as a villain, but in 1868 he was lauded a hero. He would go on to win several other major victories, each time increasing his fame. He was so popular by the time of his death at the Little Big Horn that the American population demanded revenge, which justified Sheridan's scorched earth policy that devastated the Native tribes and forced most of them onto reservations.

It is hard for us to understand the popularity of Custer today. His methods were almost on the level of genocide, but he did it in the name of progress. At the time Natives were standing in the way of U.S. progress. Their outdated ways and beliefs were hurting America's greatness. At the time Americans needed to grow. They needed more land.

The problem with Indians was that they had not changed with the times. They were too old-fashioned. For one thing, they did not use the land properly. In the U.S. view, land was meant to be tamed, to be controlled. You were not using the land properly if you did not section off what was yours with a fence, cut down the trees to build a house, and plow under the grass lands to plant crops.

New technologies were allowing Whites to progress faster than ever before, with railroads and steel plows. Railroads needed to cross vast areas of land, lands that had been promised to the Native tribes. With these new technologies, as well as the discovery of gold on Indian lands, the U.S. government began to shrink Native lands, or move them somewhere else altogether. Forget that these lands had been theirs for thousands of years. They were in the way of U.S. progress.

It is hard for us today to grasp that in the late nineteenth century, the army was seen as in the right. Those who stood up for the Natives were seen as out of touch and against America's progress. The Natives did kill Custer and his entire regiment. Anyone capable of such actions needed punishing. Yet the price of such progress was cultural genocide.

What is the price of progress that we will have to pay today? Nineteenth-century Americans could never have imagined that they would be judged harshly for their treatment of Indians, who were considered savages who were hurting America.

What are we doing today in the name of progress that people will look back on in 100 years and think why did they allow that? What are we doing that could ultimately cause harm to our society or culture but yet seems like the right thing to do?

Throughout the years I've attended too many funerals. This includes my wife of 27 years and our little stillborn baby.

Memorial Day has changed. So many people I celebrated the day with are gone. It would be impossible for me to visit all the graves of all these dear people. They are scattered out between Kentucky, Ohio, West Virginia and other states.

When Memorial Day comes, I try my best to make the six-hour trip to decorate my deceased wife's grave. Carole, who I married 17 years ago, has deceased parents who are buried three hours away from where we live.

It's never easy. There are flowers to buy. The drive is not easy and we have those who are alive we want to visit. It makes us feel bad that we don't have hours to go and spend at the cemetery and respect those we loved.

Sadly, there are so many forgotten graves of loved ones and American soldiers. The older we get the number of deceased people we know can become more than the living we know.

Do the best you can. This is all any human being can ever do. There are graves you know you must attend to and others you will have to trust to other family members or friends.

While we are trying to celebrate Memorial Day the right way, please continue to celebrate the living people in your life.

There is a story in the Bible where a friend of Jesus anointed him with expensive ointment while they were having dinner. It was her way of celebrating him and what he meant to her.

Try to find ways to anoint people in your life who are meaningful to you. Buy them flowers now if you can afford them. I hate to say it but it's true dead noses smell no roses.

I've always tried to buy flowers for those I love while they can enjoy them. It may not be flowers but maybe it could be a nice smile. A word of thanks or praise for a person in your life would be meaningful.

One way you might make Memorial Day meaningful is celebrating those people you have in your life today because, as we know, it won't last long.

Back in February, my brother-in-law Harold was very sick and I knew his time was limited. My wife and I agreed we needed to go and visit with him. We had a good visit and a good talk.

When I left him that day and we said goodbye to each other, I felt that it was truly goodbye at least for this life. He died just a couple of weeks later.

Memorial Day has changed for most of us. However, try to make a good memory or two with those people who are still alive in your life.

What you remember about those who have gone on is what you enjoyed while they were living. This Memorial Day weekend, be very safe and take time to enjoy the living.

It's storm season again and I wanted to remind everyone in the Purcell area of what and how we deal with storm season.

As some may know, we don't have a public sheltering in Purcell so I would suggest that if you have a neighbor or friend who has a storm shelter, plan with them to shelter there in the event of severe weather.

The City of Purcell also has the blackboard connect system that we utilize. If there is a forecast of tornadic storms and if it appears that it could impact the area, we will use blackboard to notify those in the data base of the possibility of severe weather.

If you don't receive notifications from the blackboard system and want it, you can go to purcellok.gov and sign up. It doesn't cost anything to be listed.

Lastly, in Purcell we are fortunate to have the siren system we have. As you know they test themselves every weekday at noon. This is a system test that ensures our sirens work correctly. If we sound the sirens in the event of a tornado, we will sound

the siren if there is a tornadic threat. When the threat has passed, the sirens will stop sounding.

Remember there isn't an all-clear siren. The reason is that if we sound the siren to give all clear then someone may not be able to distinguish the difference between an all-clear and a tornadic threat.

If you don't have a weather radio, inquire at a local store or online. Someone with Emergency Management or the fire department will program it for you if you need help.





Using surfactants to increase pesticide efficacy

Adjuvants (surfactants, stickers, spreaders, drift control) are materials that are added to your sprayer tank to increase the effectiveness of the pesticide you are using. They are especially critical during the use of herbicides on tough perennial or brush species that contain various defense mechanisms on their outer leaf surfaces.

If you've ever noticed the waxy covering (cuticle) of an oak or greenbriar leaf or the hairy leaf of common mullein or woolly croton it becomes clear why actually getting the chemical into the plant is the first hurdle in efficient weed control.

How many times have you heard someone say, "soap works just as well"? True, it might help on weaker weed species, but most don't compare to the advantage offered from a true commercial surfactant.

Although household soaps are essentially 10-20 percent surfactants, they are not as concentrated as true 50-90 percent the leaf surface.

Ag surfactants manufactured for use with agricultural pesticides.

This can make a big difference when it comes to enhancing the effectiveness of pesticide activity. Household soaps can also create problems with excessive foaming in the tank and some of these soaps will react with hard water to produce scum and precipitants that can affect pesticide performance.

Most Ag surfactants were developed for compatibility with hard or soft water and will not foam excessively in normal sprayer tank conditions.

Surfactants (short for surface acting agents) are most often used with herbicides to help the chemical spread out and penetrate the waxy cuticle of the leaf or to penetrate through the small hairs present on the leaf surface.

Since water has a high surface tension it tends to maintain its round, droplet shape when sitting on the surface of the leaf. The surfactant acts to break down this surface tension of the droplet allowing the liquid to spread over

This results in more of the pesticide coming into contact with the leaf and as a result, more of the pesticide gets into the plant.

Many surfactants on the market also contain an acidifying agent. This acidic additive reduces the pH of tank water prior to application. Why is this important? Many of our current herbicides

are formulated as weak acids and therefore are most stable in a neutral or slightly acid tank environment. What you may not realize is that most treated (chlorinated) rural water sources have pH values between 7.8-8.5 from the tap.

This alkaline environment begins to break down the acidic herbicide, eventually rendering it ineffective. Some pesticides can actually be fully inactive in as little as an hour! This is why acidifiers may be a smart addition to your pesticide toolbox when using tap water.

When you are considering using a surfactant, always consult the label as to when its addition to the pesticide will help in enhancing the control of the pesticide.







Today I wanted to pass along useful information for veterans considering filing a new claim for VA benefits or to increase their ratings. This is for only veterans who do not have any open claims for benefits.

Vets can call 1-800-827-1000 and tell the VCA agent you would like to start a claim. This will establish a start date of that month for benefits and will give the veteran one year to submit a Fully Developed Claim to the Department of Veterans Affairs. By doing this, the veteran start date is when they make that call and if benefits are approved, they will receive retroactive payments back to that date.
