On record setting
\$30 million
Purcell budget

A public hearing on the fiscal year 2022-23 Purcell city budget will be held at 5:45 p.m. June 7 in the Community Room of the Police Services building.

At the meeting the upcoming FY budget will be discussed and developed. The new fiscal year begins July 1.

The hearing is open to the public and citizen comments on the proposed budget will be welcome, city officials report.

A copy of the budget, which is subject to change, is available for review in the office of the city treasurer and is published in this week's **Purcell Register** on page 3B.

The bottom line on the new budget is a record \$30,535,220 with the lion's share of the total taken by the police and fire departments.

The budget for the police department is \$2,406,076 while the fire department's budget is \$1,505,262.

The street department comes in just under a million dollars at \$986,729.

In the Purcell Public Works Authority, the electric department tops the list at \$4,938,927 while the water department comes in at \$1,393,880. The PWA miscellaneous is a \$1,998,896 expenditure.

The lodging tax is budgeted to bring in \$110,050 in the coming fiscal year.

A public hearing will be held June 9 at 7:30 p.m. at the Goldsby Town Hall to discuss the 2022-23 town budget.

The proposed fiscal year budget is \$3,278,000 and is available at the office of the Town Clerk.

The budget was also published in **The Purcell Register** on page 10B of the May 26 issue.

The fiscal year runs from July 1, 2022 to June 30, 2023.

General government took the lion's share of the budget at \$719,000.

The street and alley department was budgeted for \$682,500 followed by the fire department at \$293,300, security department at \$237,000 and court services at \$91,900.

As they dined, Pruitt shared her plans to travel to Israel in May with a Methodist group, On Eagle's Wings Tours through Journey Unlimited.

When Howsley voiced her own desire to one day visit the Holy Land, Pruitt encouraged her friend to join the group.

"You can go," she urged. "You don't have to be Methodist."

Howsley took her at her word and the international adventure began May 9 from the Tulsa airport.

Forty-two were in the group, including six from Pauls Valley.

Led by the Rev. Tom Harrison, senior pastor at Tulsa's

Asbury United Methodist Church, the group landed in Tel Aviv 24 hours later.

They first had to clear customs and test negative for Covid before they were allowed to leave the airport.

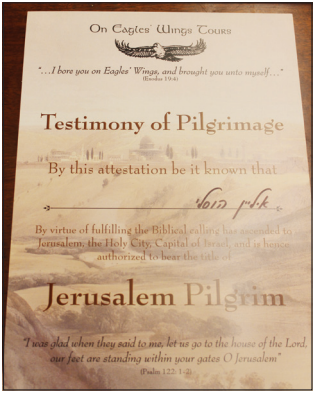
There they met Yoav, the tour guide from Jerusalem.

When Mike Phillips' family moved to Purcell in 1980, the teen thought his world had come to an end.

The move from Ada uprooted the 16-year-old from all things familiar – school, friends, activities.

Today, nearly 41-1/2 years later, Purcell is home and he can't imagine living and working anywhere else.

The late Jack Tyler was Mike's stepfather and role model. He married Mike's mother, Barbara, when Mike was 9.

For years, Jack was a wholesale hardware salesman working a territory that encompassed all of southwest Oklahoma.

But by late 1980, covering the large territory was wearing thin. He was ready for a change.

"His job he had was good," Mike recalled, "but he was constantly on the road and he just got tired of it."

He came up with a plan after picking up a Sunday Oklahoma City newspaper and seeing that three small town furniture stores were closing, the owners selling out.

He decided to visit all three, talk to the owners and see if the furniture business might be a good fit.

One store was Vaughn's Fine Furnishings in Purcell. It was Jack's first stop. The owners, Don and Ramona Vaughn, were ready to retire.

"Dad visited with them that Saturday," Mike said.

He never made it to the other two towns on his list. They shook hands and Jack bought the store that day.

Purcell's Main Street was a thriving retail environment, Mike said. There were four furniture stores, a couple of western wear outfitters, an Anthony's, two women's wear stores, Matthew's Sporting

Average gas prices push past \$4/gallon in Oklahoma

As gas prices in Oklahoma soared to record highs this week, Oklahoma’s junior senator joined fellow Republican senators challenging the White House for its response to the energy crisis. Average prices jumped above \$4 for the first time in this energy-rich state. Oklahoma was one of only three states that managed to stay below \$4 until last week. Many factors have led to these skyrocketing prices, Republican senators demand a change to be made in order to pull the country out of this crisis. At the news conference, Sen. James Lankford said the prices are affecting Oklahomans, pointing fingers at the Biden Administration for this pain at the pump. “Having to consciously consider gas in my weekly budget again has really impacted the way I plan meals,” Jeffrey Lewis of Norman, said on Friday. “I can’t eat out near as much as I used to!” Lewis said he is spending \$40-\$60 per week now for gas. Lankford pinned the blame on Biden. “When Oklahomans ask me why are prices up so high I can point to this,” he said pointing to a line graph headlined ‘Biden is driving up fuel prices.’ “Because the price of diesel is up, that means every single thing we buy that is transported by diesel truck all just went up in price,” said Lankford. “We are feeling the effects on every single area of the economy because President Biden is unwilling to deal with the base of our economy, that is energy, that’s energy prices.” White House officials reportedly are considering releasing diesel fuel from federal reserves to address the skyrocketing prices. According to AAA Gas Prices as of Friday, the average gas price in Oklahoma now sits at \$4.107 compared

to a year ago at \$2.754. Diesel fuel is selling for an average of \$5.08 per gallon. The soaring prices, which have more than doubled in the past year, has put a strain on many vulnerable Oklahoma families. Many families are having to choose between gas to get them to work, putting food on the table and paying mortgages. “This is going to probably go down as the summer of the energy crisis. Maybe for the most vulnerable households, or households that really truly do need the assistance,” said George Burge, the University of Oklahoma’s economics department chair. “There is some sort of temporary measures that can kind of pair with those high energy prices, small tax rebates, credits for families that are low income, but have kids and we kind of know from the data that’s sort of a situation where you need to do the driving,” he said. According to the U.S. Energy Information Administration, consumption of natural gas peaks in the summer when demand for electricity is the highest, with a smaller peak in the winter months. Gas prices reaching record highs in every state have put vulnerable families in a hard place as the transition to summer begins, being the season of highest energy consumption. This makes traveling harder while also making everyday life more stringent. A briefing memo from the staff of the House Committee on Energy and Commerce said, “persistently high gasoline prices are a financial challenge for many Americans and disproportionately impact lower-earning Americans, who are more likely to spend a greater share of their annual income on gasoline. Nine oil companies, on the other hand, are making significant profits, with the six companies testifying at this hearing collectively generating more than \$76 billion in profit in 2021.” According to the Energy Information Agency, the price of gas is affected by many factors, the leading one being the price of crude oil, consisting of 61 percent of the cost of one gallon. The price of crude oil is affected by several factors, including global production levels, inventory balances, demand trends, and geopolitical events, such as Russia’s invasion of Ukraine. The remaining factors affecting the price are the costs of refinement (14%), distribution and marketing (11%), and taxes (14%). “While we are seeing prices level off, uncertainty still continues which creates volatility and I don’t believe we are out of the woods yet,” said Rick Muncrief, CEO of Devon Energy in a hearing with the Energy and Commerce Committee on April 6. “Shifting our operations, Devon operates on private, state, federal and Indian leases and must follow numerous stringent permitting processes before we can begin production.” Muncrief offered no further comments following the hearing despite the record-breaking prices. Efforts to tame the surge in energy prices have had little impact. In March, President Biden announced he would begin releasing 1 million barrels of oil per day for the next six months from the Strategic Petroleum Reserve, in an effort to bring down gas prices. “One of the things I’m starting to get a little bit worried about is for the first six or seven weeks of the Russian invasion people were talking about, we’ll just release some of our strategic oil reserves,” said Burke. “We have strategic petroleum reserves in our country and heading into the summer they were at pretty historically average levels. Now they’re at unprecedentedly low levels.”

With no end in sight to this energy crisis, Lankford wrote two letters to the President asking to restore America’s energy dominance. Among his fellow Republican colleagues, called on the Biden Administration to increase American oil production in order to alleviate the pain at the pump. “I think it’s probably going a little bit overboard to say that it’s all related to steps that the Biden administration took because clearly, a big part of this is the disruption in supply chain and all this stuff going on in Ukraine and the ongoing conflict,” said Burge. “I think that the truth probably lies somewhere in the middle.” Gaylord News reporter Katie Hallum in Norman contributed to this report. New alternatives in how to use electricity

If you listen carefully, you can hear a quiet transformation happening. Electric appliances and equipment are becoming more popular than ever among consumers.

Inside the home, consumers and home builders alike are turning to electric appliances to increase energy efficiency and savings. Whether a traditional electric stove or an induction stove top, both are significantly more efficient than a gas oven.

Conventional residential cooking tops typically use gas or resistance heating elements to transfer energy with efficiencies of approximately 32 percent and 75 percent respectively (according to ENERGY STAR®).

Electric induction stoves, which cook food without any flame, will reduce indoor air pollution and can bring water to a boil about twice as fast as a gas stove.

Robotic vacuums are also gaining in popularity. Fortune Business Insights attributes

the growth and popularity of robotic vacuums like Roomba to a larger market trend of smart home technology and automation (think Alexa directing a Roomba to vacuum).

More tools and equipment with small gas-powered motors are being replaced with electric ones including plug-in batteries. In the past few years, technology in battery storage has advanced significantly. Hand-held tools with plug-in batteries can hold a charge longer and offer the user the same versatility and similar functionality as gas-powered tools.

For DIYers and those in the building trades, national brands such as Makita, Ryobi and Milwaukee offer electric versions of their most popular products like drills, saws, sanders and other tools. In addition to standard offerings, consumers can now purchase a wider array of specialty tools with a plug-in.

A case in point is the increased use of electric-powered tools and equipment, with more national brands offering a wider selection including law mowers, leaf blowers, string

trimmers and snow blowers. The quality of zero- or low-emissions lawn equipment is also improving.

Electric equipment also requires less maintenance, and often the biggest task is keeping them charged. In addition, electric equipment is quieter so if you want to listen to music or your favorite podcast while performing outdoor work, you can; something which would not be possible with gas-powered equipment. On the horizon, autonomous lawn mowers (similar to the robotic vacuum cleaners) will be seen dotting outdoor spaces.

Another benefit of using electric appliances or equipment is by virtue of being plugged into the grid, the environmental performance of electric devices improves over time.

In essence, electricity is becoming cleaner through increases renewable energy generation, so equipment using electricity will have a diminishing environmental impact over time.

Quite a hat trick - improving efficiency, quality of life and helping the environment.

Getting ready for travel abroad

With summer just around the corner and many Oklahomans planning to go on vacations, now is a good time for review of the process for obtaining or renewing passports.

If you plan to travel abroad in the coming weeks and months, please use the information below pertinent to this process.

First, it is important to apply for your passport as soon as possible in case delays arise. Know that it routinely takes eight to 11 weeks to receive your passport.

However, for an extra fee of \$60, you can have the process expedited which can take five to seven weeks.

Processing times begin the day your application is received at a passport agency or center, not the day you mail your ap-

plication or apply.

Check your status often by tracking your application at passportstatus.state.gov and once this site updates that your passport has been mailed, keep an eye on your mailbox.

When planning for your trip, be aware that some countries require your passport to be valid more than six months beyond your scheduled trip so check your passport’s expiration date to verify the validity.

Visit and check travel.state.gov/destination for info on the country you plan to.

An adult passport is valid for 10 years while passports for minors are valid for five years. If you need to renew your passport, check travel.state.gov/content/travel/en/passports/have-passport/renew.html to see if you are eligible to renew by mail visit.

Next, no one is too young to need a passport. All children under 16 must apply for a passport in person with two parents or guardians using Form DS-11, which you can find here: travel.state.gov/content/travel/en/passports/need-passport/under-16.html.

While most applicants ages 16 and 17 must apply in person using Form DS-11, some may be eligible to renew their passport by mail using Form DS-82. Check eligibility at travel.state.gov/content/travel/en/passports/have-passport/renew.html.

It is critical to be aware of fraudulent websites and bad actors trying to steal your information. Only travel.state.gov sites are safe to use to when

2023 budget sent to governor’s desk

This week, the Fiscal Year 2023 budget was sent to the governor’s desk. It would be an understatement to say I was disappointed with how the \$9.7 billion was appropriated and frustrated with how much will eventually end up in savings instead of going towards helping Oklahomans.

By next year it’s being projected we’ll have about \$2.6 billion, the largest amount in savings we’ve ever had, and we’ve allowed it at a time when Oklahomans are facing so many crises.

Many agencies are in desperate need of budget increases and large investments so that they can better serve the needs of Oklahomans. Yet it seems like those needs have been put on the back burner as we try to lure large corporations, such as Panasonic, here to the tune of \$698 million and have abandoned the idea of exempting the state portion of the grocery tax.

The only relief Oklahomans will now see is in the form of a \$75 or \$150 check, which isn’t nearly enough to make a real difference to the ones who need it the most during record inflation.

Reasonable budget requests have also been denied. We failed to invest new dollars into the per pupil funding formula for Oklahoma students and ignored incentives for higher quality teaching, like investing in National Board Certified teachers.

This budget also failed to fully fund the \$25 million request by the Oklahoma Center for the Advancement of Science and Technology (OCAST), which was based on a reasonable and modest five-year strategy to

support Oklahoma innovation.

However, not all aspects of the budget are bad. It does include some very good investments like increasing our spending on public safety and law enforcement. This includes mental health support as well as better training for officers.

It also includes \$32.5 million to completely eliminate the state’s developmentally disabled waitlist. About 5,000 Oklahomans are on this list waiting for state services they desperately need - some for as many as 13 years.

The budget also gives a 25 percent appropriation increase for those who provide these critical services to families across the state. We believe this will entirely eliminate the list within just two years.

Under our state’s constitution, the regular legislative session must conclude by 5 p.m. on the last Friday in May. I can’t say I’ve been extremely pleased with the way this session has gone, but I’m always humbled by the opportunity to come here to the Capitol and represent all of you.

During this session, I’ve heard from many constituents, and I just want to take this opportunity to express my thanks for all the support and input over these last few months.

Despite scathing audit, federal agencies award \$1.5 million to Oklahoma nonprofit

It has been nearly a year since federal auditors revealed a pattern of improper spending at the Oklahoma Coalition Against Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault, jeopardizing critical aid for the state's abused women and children.

But those findings have not hindered the flow of public funds to the nonprofit, which supports domestic and sexual abuse victims and victim advocates with training, policy updates and financial aid.

Oklahoma reported a record number of domestic abuse incidents last year. Its rate of domestic violence against women is the nation's highest, according to National Coalition Against Domestic Violence data.

Under the leadership of Candida Manion, the state coalition mismanaged more than \$886,000 intended to support Oklahoma abuse victims, a June 2021 audit report showed. Public funds were spent on employee and board member vacations. Some money went unaccounted for, lacking invoices or signatures required under grant rules.

Despite an ongoing investigation into the mishandled money, federal agencies have awarded the nonprofit nearly \$1.5 million since the audit's release.

Two grants totaling more than \$500,000 were awarded by the Office on Violence Against Women, which provided the funds scrutinized in the audit. That office has yet to determine what, if any, ramifications the nonprofit will face for its indiscretions.

The Office on Violence Against Women could suspend or ban the Oklahoma Coalition Against Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault from receiving new grants. Though that seems unlikely given the nonprofit's

recent success.

The American Rescue Plan and Family Violence Prevention and Services provided nearly \$1 million.

Jeri Holmes, an attorney hired to assist the coalition with the audit, said the approval of those grants is a sign of confidence from federal agencies that any future penalties will not be detrimental to the nonprofit.

"One of the reasons why we feel comfortable moving forward is that we've gotten those additional grants," Holmes said. "They're moving forward so we're moving forward."



The Office on Violence Against Women could still require the nonprofit to repay some or all of the misused funds. Or it could forgive the full amount.

The U.S. Department of Justice could pursue criminal charges as it did in a recent case involving a similar nonprofit organization in Montana.

No charges or penalties have been handed down.

Early last year after firing Manion, who oversaw the coalition's budget as executive director, board members hired Holmes along with an interim director and chief financial officer to work with federal authorities.

Chief Financial Officer Sharon Sullivan provided thousands of invoices, receipts, training materials and other documents

found in unorganized boxes and electronic files to the Office on Violence Against Women.

Sullivan said during a May 12 board meeting that all but \$41,000 of the questioned money is now accounted for.

"The coalition already had a lot of the information," Sullivan said. "We just went through the office and filed everything so that we could find it."

The Office on Violence Against Women refused to comment citing the ongoing investigation, according to an email from spokeswoman Aryele Bradford. Nonprofit staff and board members said they're expecting the process to drag on for at least another year.

Meanwhile, the coalition is charging ahead.

Board members are preparing to launch a search for the organization's next executive director.

The board promoted ReJeania Tolliver to associate director. Tolliver is the only employee to work under Manion who remains at the nonprofit. Two new staff members were recently hired, including a bookkeeper who is responsible for tracking expenses for the new grants.

At least five of the 28 shelters and crisis centers that the coalition supports let their annual membership lapse since the audit report was published.

Training for victim advocates increased this year following the influx of grant money, Tolliver told board members at the recent meeting. The coalition hosted a retreat for advocates in Tulsa with sessions on self-care for those working with abuse victims. The coalition is providing financial support to Seminole County Family Resource Center after a tornado damaged the facility early this month displacing shelter residents and staff.

Successful calving begins now with sound spring breeding

Many cattle ranchers are turning bulls in with their cows and heifers this time of year, and Mark Johnson, beef cattle breeding specialist for Oklahoma State University Extension, has some tips for a successful breeding season.

"It's always a good idea to do breeding soundness evaluations on bulls prior to breeding season," Johnson said. "BSEs are a general rule of thumb and good management practice." Once bulls are determined

sound, ranchers should focus on bull-to-female ratios: yearling bulls should be able to cover a cow for about every month of their age.

At 2 years old, bulls should be able to breed around 25 females. From age 2 to 6, Johnson said bulls can successfully cover 25 to 35 cows in a breeding season.

"Cattle breeding season should be as short as possible," Johnson said. "A time frame of 45 days is better than 60, and 60 days is better than 90." A short breeding window

ensures calves are born within a tight range of time the following year.

As for when to expect the first calves of the season, it depends on the rancher's preference. Producers should turn in bulls about nine months before cows begin calving.

"Last year, we had a lot of people decide to start calving later than usual after that brutal stretch of cold in February," Johnson said. "If you want early January calves, bulls should be turned out the beginning of April."

Increase your perennial garden's beauty this spring

Give your perennials a boost this spring with a topdressing of compost, aged manure, or other organic matter.

It's a great way to revive tired gardens, improve a garden's overall health, and keep vibrant perennials healthy and blooming.

Research found topdressing your garden with compost every year or two provides most, if not all the nutrients that most perennials need. It feeds the soil, which in turn feeds your plants.

Let a soil test report and your plant's performance determine if additional fertilizer is needed. Spring is a great time to add this as well.

When purchasing compost, it should appear light and fluffy. Take a whiff, it should not have a strong smell of ammonia, rotting food or another off odor. It should have a rich earthy smell and not be covered in flies or maggots.

If jumping worms are a

problem in your area, ask your compost provider how they are managing the compost to avoid spreading this invasive pest.

Once you have the needed organic matter, you are ready to get started. Pull the mulch back if needed. Keep it handy, so you can put it back in place once you finish amending the soil.

Topdressing is the first step in the process. Simply spread a one- to two-inch layer of the compost or other organic matter over the soil surface. Be careful not to bury the crown of your plants.

You can leave the compost sitting on the soil surface or lightly mix it into the top inch with a hand cultivator.

The earthworms, ground beetles and other organisms will move it down into the soil and around the plant roots where it is needed.

The second step is especially helpful for those with heavy or compacted soils. Once the compost is in place, do a bit of vertical mulching.

Use an auger bit on your cordless drill. Simply drill holes into the soil between plants. This aerates the soil and pushes some of the compost into the soil further boosting your efforts.

Vertical mulching helps speed up the process a bit by getting the compost closer to the plant roots and soil organisms that will help incorporate it into the soil.

The openings created in the soil allow air, water and fertilizer to penetrate the soil surface and travel to the root zone.

Then be sure to return the mulch you removed from the garden or add mulch if needed. Maintaining an inch or two of organic mulch on the soil surface not only conserves moisture and suppresses weeds; it also continues to improve the soil.

Audit:

New financial policies aimed at increasing oversight have been added to the organization’s bylaws. The board added a finance committee and a designated treasurer who reviews all of the coalition’s spending and ensures proper documentation is kept.

Board members spent the majority of the meeting debating the potential risks and benefits of opening a credit card for employee use. Currently, staff is expected to bear the cost of hotel rooms, office supplies and other costs until the expenses are reviewed by the board and approved for reimbursement. Treasurer Mindy Stevenson fought the suggestion.

Staff was charged with researching what limits and

restrictions can be put on a credit card before bringing it to a vote at a later meeting.

“The problem that we’ve had in the past is that nobody’s verifying that information,” Stevenson said. “I don’t want any of that repeated.”

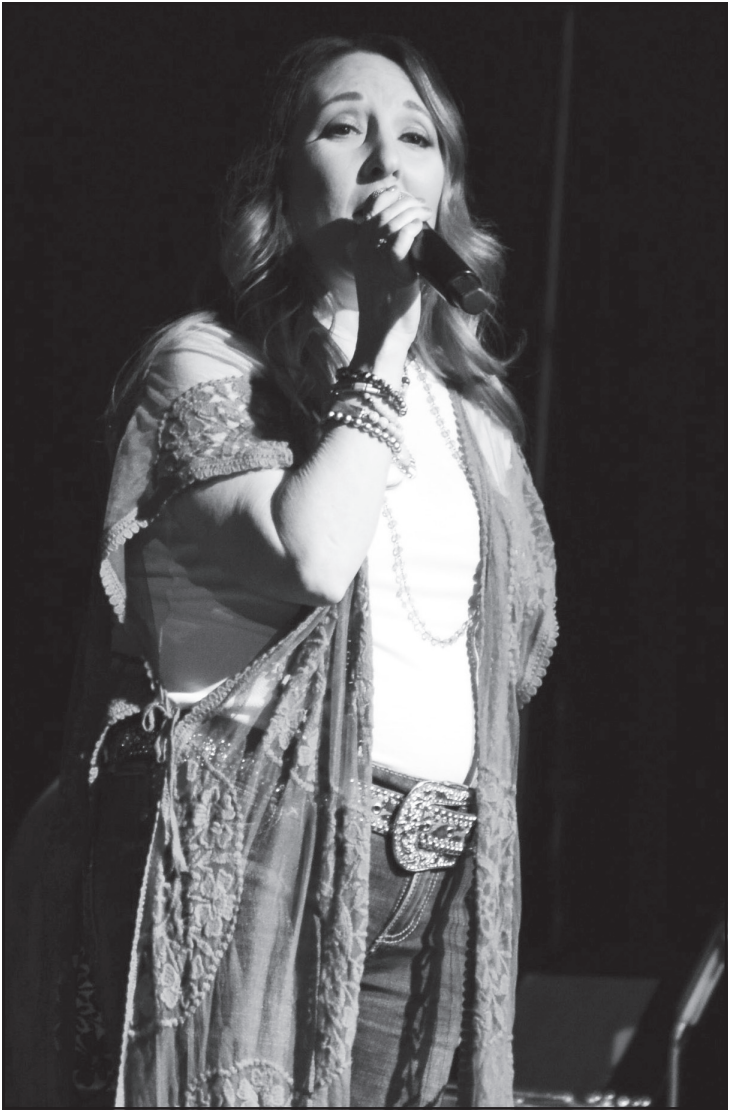

New state law will allow for more effective tobacco prevention

Officials at the Tobacco Settlement Endowment Trust (TSET) praised the signing of a new state law on Monday that will modify youth purchase, use, or possession (PUP) laws to hold the tobacco industry responsible for their efforts to addict children.

PUP laws were passed in the 1990s to reduce youth access to tobacco but the policies did not stop retailers from illegally selling tobacco products to children.

The new law will eliminate fines for youth caught with tobacco and instead require them to attend a course about tobacco addiction through the Alcoholic Beverage Laws Enforcement (ABLE) Commission. The new law also requires parents to be notified.

“Penalizing children is not effective in reducing youth tobacco use,” said Julie Bisbee, TSET executive director. “Interventions that provide young people with the tools they need to quit are much more effective. This new law restores the burden of responsibility to those who illegally sell tobacco products to children.

“I want to thank the legislature and Gov. Stitt for protecting Oklahoma’s youth from Big Tobacco,” she concluded.

Store clerks who sell tobacco to those under 21 could still face a \$100 fine for a first offense.

Nearly 75 percent of youth who tried to buy tobacco products reported they were not refused sale, according to the American Heart Association.

The tobacco industry spends \$137 million every year marketing their products in Oklahoma. About 28 percent of Oklahoma high school students have reported vaping at least once in the past 30 days, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention’s Youth Risk Behavior Surveillance System.

“With vaping flavors like

gummy bear, strawberry, chocolate and cotton candy, it’s clear that Big Tobacco is marketing to young people to replace their customer base,” said Michelle Stephens, chair of the TSET Board of Directors.

“Fining youth can have harmful unintended consequences. I want to thank state leaders for doing away with a counterproductive policy and I look forward to working on more effective strategies to protect youth from a lifetime of nicotine addiction,” she said.

A more effective youth prevention program should include routine education and compliance checks with retailers and support for young people who want to quit tobacco, she added.

In several counties, TSET Healthy Living Program grantees are educating local retailers and working with them to reduce and prevent the sale of tobacco and vaping products to youth under the age of 21.

That work is in coordination with the ABLE Commission, Oklahoma State Department of Health and the Oklahoma Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services.

Future efforts will engage local law enforcement to understand the number of violations and to help educate partners, stakeholders, policy makers, and the public about the important

role that retailers have in ensuring youth don’t illegally obtain tobacco.

TSET grantees are also working with local governments to update city ordinances to mirror the state laws that prohibits the sale of tobacco products to people under age 21.

Cities can also adopt ordinances that mirror state law in prohibiting tobacco or vape retailers within 300 feet of a playground, school or other facility being used primarily by persons under 21 years of age.

At the same time, TSET wants to help addicted youth quit. TSET provides cessation coaching through My Life, My Quit. The program offers teens 13-17 a variety of free tools and resources to help them quit. Each teen is helped by trained staff via text, phone or web-based coaching.

Teens can enroll online and learn more about the program at MyLifeMyQuit.com, or text 36072 for real-time coaching.

Tobacco Stops With Me, also a program of TSET, provides information to Oklahomans on how to protect their families and communities against the harms of tobacco and improve the health of all Oklahomans.

While the youth of the Cleveland County most assuredly had fun, they did so with significant success. After only two years in action, the Cleveland County 4-H Shooting Sports club, led by Coach Jonathan Kindel, made history by sweeping both the Air Pistol and Air Rifle Team awards at the 4-H State Contest.

Even more historical, Cleveland County can be proud in that a record 4 youth qualified for the National Contest. The Oklahoma team is poised to travel and compete in the 2022 4-H Shooting Sports National Championships from June 26-July 1, in Grand Island, Neb.

Whether it is the silent concentration of competing in Air Rifle/Pistol, the excitement of rapid precision of .22, or the slow, methodical loading and firing of black powder rifles that transport you back in time to the mountain man of old, youth of Cleveland County are highly encouraged to check out the program.

Coach Jonathan Kindel remarked, “It’s not just about shooting well. Safety is always the priority but beyond that, it is about developing young adults. According to statistics, 4-H youth are four-times more likely to make contributions to their community. Two-times more likely to be civically active.

“Two-times more likely to participate in STEM programs during out-of-school times. Two-times more likely to make healthier life choices.

“Moreover, 4-H girls are

three-times more likely to take part in science programs compared to girls in other out-of-school time activities. I have three teenage daughters and it was because of the reputation and success of 4-H that I became involved as a coach. It remains one of the best decisions I’ve ever made as a parent. We are also fortunate in Cleveland County to have several community leaders supporting us to help make the program possible”

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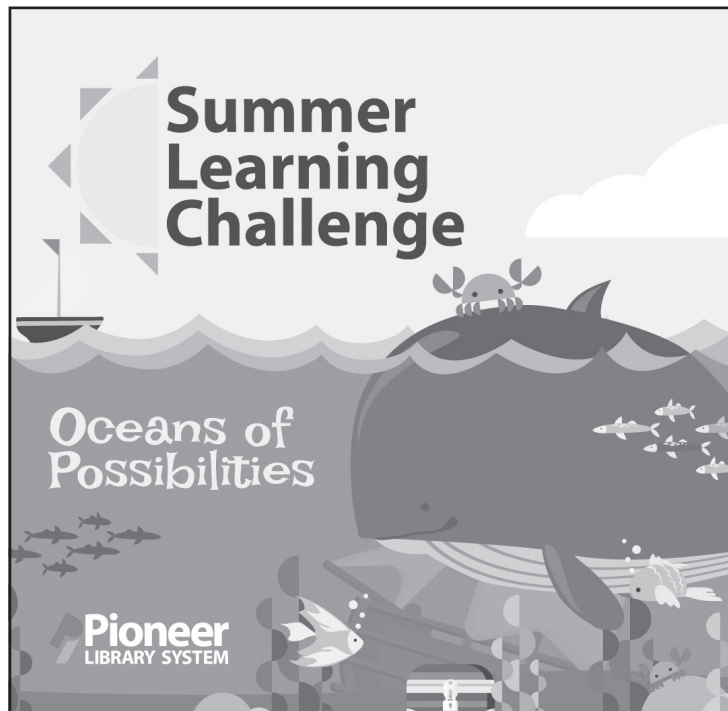

Cole becomes longest serving Native American in the House

Congressman Tom Cole (OK-04), a member of the Chickasaw Nation of Oklahoma, became the longest serving Native American in the U.S. House of Representatives April 22.

The previous record was also held by an Oklahoman and member of the Chickasaw Nation, former Congressman Charles David Carter, who served in the House for a total of 7,048 days.

"I am honored to reach the milestone of becoming the longest serving Native American in the history of the House," said Cole. "When I entered Congress, I knew tribal issues would be an area I would focus on a great deal in light of my personal heritage and having observed the unique role of tribes in my community."

"It is indeed a special heritage that I was brought up to appreciate and treasure, and I have always been inspired by numerous family members

who worked hard to preserve it and advance the interests of our tribe.

"But of course, I was most inspired by my late mother, Helen Cole, who not only taught me to know and understand what it meant to be tribal but also sparked my interest in politics."

"I am proud of my record as a champion for Indian Country. In addition to authoring, sponsoring and supporting numerous pieces of legislation, I have embraced my role as a resource for my colleagues, helping them understand tribal sovereignty, the federal government's trust responsibility and how we can and should work in a bipartisan way to solve some of the issues facing tribes."

"While numerous strides have been made, there is still more work to do. In the days ahead, I remain committed to furthering, highlighting and elevating these important issues," he concluded.

Cole has served as Co-Chair of the Congressional Native American Caucus since 2009. Throughout his current tenure in the House, he has sponsored 24 tribal bills and cosponsored more than 200 - including the Chickasaw National Recreation Area Land Exchange Act of 2004 (signed into law on October 30, 2004), the Stigler Act Amendments of 2018 (signed into law on December 31, 2018), the Indian Healthcare Improvement Act, the Indian Country Economic Development Act and the Native Language Immersion Student Achievement Act.

He has championed Carcieri Fix legislation since it was first introduced in 2009, and he has either sponsored or cosponsored it every subsequent Congress. Cole has also been a strong advocate for reauthorization of the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) and the inclusion of important provisions

relating to tribal authority to address violent crimes against Native women and children.

As a member of the House Appropriations Committee, Cole has championed incremental increases for the Indian Health Service (IHS). Since he was first appointed to the committee in 2009, IHS funding has nearly doubled, from \$3.58 billion in fiscal year 2009 to \$6.6 billion in fiscal year 2022.

In addition, during negotiations on the bipartisan Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act at the outset of the pandemic emergency, Cole was instrumental in ensuring the inclusion of several provisions recognizing Indian Country's important role as a partner in combating COVID-19.

In celebration of this milestone, several of Cole's colleagues from both sides of the aisle shared special congratulatory messages.

WHEREAS, Jack Walton McHughes, in 1944, was one of the sailors who participated in the burial at sea his fellow Oklahoma native, Loyce Edward Dean, who was a turret gunner on a torpedo bomber during the Battle of Manila, which is, to this day, the only known burial at sea of a sailor still in their aircraft in US Navy History; and

WHEREAS, upon returning from the War, Jack Walton McHughes married Wanda and they remained happily married for 65 years until her death in 2011;

WHEREAS, Jack and Wanda were blessed with three children, five grandchildren and thirteen great-grandchildren; and

WHEREAS, following his service in the US Navy, Jack Walton McHughes has enjoyed a successful career building bridges and roads in several parts of this State including the Twin Bridges of Twin Bridges State Park, owning and operating service stations in Norman, and devoting himself to helping his family and his in-laws when his help and caring was most needed; and

WHEREAS, Jack Walton McHughes has lived during two eventful centuries of this nation's history and has been a model and inspiration to his Country, his family and all who know him;

“Downtown Purcell was full when we moved here,” he said. “It’s all gone now. And that’s a shame.”

When the Tylers took possession of the store, only a few pieces of furniture remained from the Vaughn’s closing sale. Mike said they went to the United Supermarket and purchased rolls of butcher paper with which they covered the windows and door while they remodeled the store’s interior.

The front door was left slightly ajar for ventilation.

One day a lady poked her head in and entered, announcing her arrival with a cheery “Yoo hoo.”

She identified herself as Norma and said she was selling ads for the Maysville newspaper. She asked if the Tylers would be interested in running a grand opening ad.

Jack agreed and while the ad details were being ironed out, Norma kept eyeing a sofa the Vaughns hadn’t sold.

“It was ugly,” Mike said, de-

scribing the garish upholstery as “hay bales and wagon wheels.”

But beauty is in the eye of the beholder.

Before leaving the store, Norma asked, “I just love that sofa. Could I buy that before you open?”

As Jack wrote the invoice, he asked Norma her last name.

“Hope,” she replied.

“He almost started crying,” Mike said. “It was a confirmation we were doing what we were supposed to do.”

Proof positive, Mike believes, that the store was – and is – a “God thing.”

“The Lord has been very, very good to us,” he said.

It’s a fact of business that it is impossible to make everyone happy all of the time “no matter how hard you try,” Mike said.

“But from the beginning it hasn’t been because we haven’t tried,” he continued. “We’re a good meat and potatoes furniture store. We try to sell value; we try to sell ourselves.

“Dad treated everybody the same. If someone asked me what

is one thing I learned from my Dad it was to treat everyone the same. He was a gentle soul.”

The lesson is reiterated in granite on Jack’s marker at Hillside Cemetery in a verse of Scripture from Luke 6 – “Do unto others as you would have them do unto you”

Mike just hopes that the apple hasn’t fallen far from that tree.

Jack had four children from a previous marriage, but they were older and settled by the time he bought the furniture store.

As an “only child,” you might say Mike grew up in the furniture business.

Jack, Barbara and Mike were “jacks of all trades” at the store and also employed a “lot of good people” over the years.

“We considered them family,” Mike said.

Several of those workers served as pallbearers at Jack’s funeral in October 2012.

One day Mike was walking by Ted Haxel’s law office and was struck by the young woman who happened to be seated by the window.

He met Terenda and they married Feb. 25, 1995. They have two daughters – Matalyn, 24, and Annabell, 21.

“Mattie currently works at the store with us,” Terenda said.

She earned a bachelor’s degree from the University of Oklahoma and has applied to several universities in her quest to earn a master’s degree in biology.

Annabell just graduated from OU with a degree in music education. She will begin working for Moore Public Schools in the fall.

Terenda began working part-time for Haxel while in high school and spent the next 26 years in his law office.

“I never intended to work in the store,” she said. “It’s hard to work and live with someone. But

when his dad died, he needed help.”

Jack and Terenda are members of Emmanuel Baptist Church.

“I feel we are put here to serve other people,” she said, “and this store is the perfect opportunity.”

“Apples for apples, we are just as competitive as the big city stores,” Mike said. “We’re a very small family business and try to be fair and honest.”

The continuing success of a small-town furniture store at the dead end of Main Street might surprise some people in this age of Amazon, big box stores and mega retailers who count inventory in the millions of dollars.

Not Mike, however.

It was and still is a “God thing.”

Holy Land:

Jesus rode the donkey on Palm Sunday,” she said.

They also visited Hezekiah’s Tunnel, which was dug to bring water into the walled city in the event of an Assyrian attack.

More highlights followed.

From Jerusalem, the group traveled to the Dead Sea where they spent 2-1/2 days. Howsley took a very short camel ride.

“We got to float in the Dead Sea,” she said.

Next was one day in the Judean desert. They were warned of the region’s unforgiving heat, but their day in the desert was marked by mild temperatures and a cooling 40 mph wind – conditions Yoav assured them were unheard of in the harsh desert.

From there, the tour turned north to the Jordan River and the Sea of Galilee.

“We floated down the Jordan River and saw where Jesus was baptized,” she said.

They stayed in Tiberius for three days.

Other highlights included a

visit to Yad Vasehem, Israel’s Holocaust museum.

“That was a pivotal moment,” she said, adding the group spent roughly three hours there.

“We went to where King David was and toured some of Herod’s palaces,” she added.

Through it all, the feeling in the group was one of security.

At each stop, Harrison led the group in Scripture and brief devotionals.

“Every day we left the hotel by 7 or 7:30 a.m. and we weren’t back till after 6 p.m.,” she said.

The sites were a mixture of old and new testament.

Jerusalem itself takes in Muslim, Jewish and Christian sectors with each faith enforcing its own dress codes and rules of entry.

The Muslim sector is the most strict, as Bibles and Christian symbols may not be carried in.

Men and women are forbidden to touch and the dress code requires legs and elbows be covered.

In all sectors, reverence is the rule.

Waiting in line to enter, Howsley suddenly realized she had a small olive-wood cross in her pocket.

As she neared the checkpoint, she quickly removed the cross from her pocket and hid it in her bra.

“I carried contraband into the Muslim sector,” she said.

Although strictly forbidden, Harrison did lead the group in a Scripture reading and devotional while in the Muslim sector.

While in the sector, the group was able to visit the Western Wall, which Christians call the Wailing Wall – a visit Howsley called “amazing.”

The most holy Muslim site is Dome of the Rock, purportedly built atop the site of the holiest Jewish site, the Temple Mount, which was destroyed by Muslims.

Or maybe not. Yoav told the group that a Jewish man deliberately misled the Muslims about the Temple Mount’s true location, sparing the most holy Jewish site.

There were also visits to Christian churches and Jewish synagogues.

The only part of the trip that didn’t run like clockwork was the journey home.

Howsley expected to be back the evening of May 21. But the 24-hour flight turned into an 81-hour ordeal.

When the flight from Tel Aviv landed at New York’s JFK Airport, the group learned their flight out of JFK had been cancelled because of a flight staff shortage and computer failure.

The airline put them up in a hotel. The next day, some of the passengers were able to get a flight out of JFK – not to Tulsa, but to Washington, D.C.’s Reagan International Airport.

“A huge storm blew in,” she recalled. “Looking out the windows was like looking at one of our tornado skies.”

It appeared they were stuck for another night. Several of the passengers, including Howsley, set out on their own to find a hotel.

Even when the storms passed, there were no flights to Tulsa. Howsley and her roommate decided to fly into Dallas, where both had family.

Howsley was met at the airport by her daughter-in-law who drove her home.

And her two sons had already been at her house to retrieve her spare car key. They then drove to the Tulsa airport, picked up her car and drove it back to her home.

Even with the travel glitches at the end, Howsley said the junket is “definitely a trip I think anybody should take.”

The tour, she said, is worth the estimated \$6,000 cost.

In Howsley’s case, part of the cost was underwritten by her congregation.

“I know it will enhance my ministry,” she said, adding her denomination requires its ministers to complete 16 hours of continuing education every year.

It may not happen, but Howsley said she would love to make the trip again.

Harrison has another trip scheduled this fall and will take four groups back to Israel in 2023.

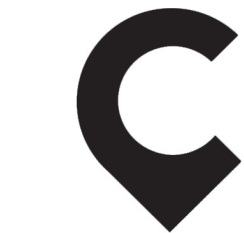
