Prussic acid poisoning in cattle

As the year progresses many producers look to move cattle to alternative pasture. Unfortunately, certain weather conditions, including drought or freezing, can set up some plants in the sorghum family, including Johnsongrass, to become toxic.

Even after limited grazing, deaths may be seen due to the ingestion of prussic acid, also known as hydrocyanic acid or cyanide. A classic call to the veterinarian is, “My cattle are dropping like flies.”

Prussic acid toxin is created

when the harmless hydrocyanic glycosides in plants are stressed and breakdown.

Once the hydrocyanic glycosides in the plants are damaged through actions like cattle chewing or a swather and crimper, they quickly convert to prussic acid.

Following ingestion, the prussic acid is released in the rumen and rapidly absorbed into the blood stream.

Once in the circulatory system, the toxin prevents cells from taking up oxygen. The blood therefore becomes saturated with oxygen leading to blood that appears bright cherry red.

The clinical signs most often seen include excitement, muscle tremors, increased respiration rate, excess salivation, staggering, convulsions, and collapse. Asphyxiation at the cellular level is the cause of death due to deprivation of oxygen.

When producers encounter animals displaying clinical signs of prussic acid toxicity, they should immediately remove all the animals that appear normal to a new pasture and contact their veterinarian.

The veterinarian will treat the sick animals with two drugs (sodium nitrite and sodium thiosulfate) that can reverse the toxicity. Treatment must be initiated quickly but can prove difficult due to the rapid progression of the toxin.

The drugs used to treat prussic acid toxicity can be difficult to obtain. It is advisable to contact your veterinarian before grazing potential toxic plants to make sure that your veterinarian will have availability to respond and the necessary drugs on hand to treat the cattle if a problem arises.

Cattlemen may want to take the following steps to prevent prussic acid toxicity:

- Never turn hungry cattle into a new pasture
- Take soil samples and fertilize accordingly
- Graze mature plants with 18 to 24 inches of height
- Wait until plants are cured

before grazing after frost (usually at least 7 days)

- Rotate pastures to keep cattle from consuming lush regrowth
- Place 1 or 2 cows in a pasture and observe for problems before turning in all the cattle
- Test plants for the presence of prussic acid. Care should be taken though as false negatives can be seen if the test is not performed correctly.

Two types of tests exist for determining prussic acid levels. The first is quantitative and involves submissions to a diagnostic lab, such as the Oklahoma Animal Disease Diagnostic Lab.

The second is a qualitative test which simply detects the presence of hydrocyanic acids and cyanide in fresh plant material. We do have access to these test supplies.

Producers should be cautious that there are multiple toxins that can cause cattle deaths.

It is recommended that appropriate veterinary diagnostics and testing be done to determine the ultimate cause of death.

Swimming Pools

Permits are required prior to installation of swimming pools. There is a \$19.50 fee for above-ground and \$29.50 fee for in-ground. No permit is required for children's blow-up pools. Outdoor swimming pools.

An outdoor swimming pool, including an in-ground, above-ground or on-ground pool, hot tub or spa, shall be surrounded by a barrier (fence) at which shall be at least 48 inches high.

According to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention, in 2009 children one to four years old have the highest drowning rates. Among children one to four years old who died from an unintentional injury, more than 30 percent died from drowning. Among children one to four years old, most drownings occurred in home swimming pools.

One factor that influences drowning risk is lack of barriers, such as fencing, which prevent children from gaining access to the pool area without a caregiver's awareness.

A four-sided isolation fence, separating the pool area from the house and yard, reduces a child's risk of drowning by 83 percent, compared to a three-sided property-line fencing.

Grant program tackles crime

Oklahoma Attorney General John O'Connor is encouraging local law enforcement agencies and county sheriff's departments to apply now for a 2023 Safe Oklahoma Grant.

The grants are available through the AG's office and are funded by an annual appropriation from the state legislature.

The grant program was established in 2012 and tackles violent crime in the state.

The money from the grant helps pay overtime costs for officers, technology upgrades, enhanced analytical capabilities and community partnership projects that focus on preventing violent crime.

All sheriff's and other local law enforcement agencies, including campus police, are eligible for the grant, which is funded for one year.

"Each year, the Safe Oklahoma Grant helps our law enforcement partners do their job better and reduce violent crime," O'Connor said. "My office is privileged to play a role in creating a safer environment in local communities across the state by facilitating applications and distributing this funding. I encourage all local law enforcement agencies

Whether you’re grilling burgers, camping, or having a picnic, everyone should always

remember to practice proper handwashing and use a food thermometer.
After observing that consumer behavior in test kitchens revealed that people are skipping basic food safety practices, USDA is concerned that consumers are not doing enough to reduce the risk of

foodborne illness.
“Our research shows that participants were not adequately washing their hands or using a food thermometer,” says USDA Deputy Under Secretary for Food Safety Sandra Eskin “Summer is a time to relax and enjoy delicious meals with friends and family but foodborne pathogens never rest. Following safe food handling practices during this and all other seasons can reduce the risk of you and your loved ones getting sick.”

Update from the Capitol

Last week, the U.S. Supreme Court overturned Roe v. Wade, putting this important matter back in the hands of the states where it belongs.

Since its passage in 1973, some 63 million babies have tragically had their basic rights taken away before they could even speak or act to defend themselves.

While this is a tremendous victory, our work to protect life is far from over. Oklahoma is well prepared and already has many laws in place to protect life at conception, but we must start thinking about how this federal court ruling will affect Oklahoma families and social services in the future and how we can better support families or the children who are unwanted by their birth parents.

I’m particularly interested

in how this will impact our state’s foster care and adoption systems and what we need to do to strengthen these to better protect Oklahoma’s children.

According to the State Department of Health, there were nearly 3,900 abortions performed in Oklahoma in 2020, which was a decline from previous years. These women and families will now need our help more than ever.

We must remember that these individuals are typically in crisis and don’t make the decision to end a pregnancy lightly, but are under extreme duress, facing issues like addiction, poverty, abuse, mental illness, or other difficulties that can make the thought of having a child seem completely overwhelming and impossible.

Parenthood is a blessing, but

it’s also extremely challenging emotionally, mentally, and financially even for those in safe, stable, and financially secure households.

Approximately 500 children are legally ready to be adopted in Oklahoma annually and tragically, hundreds age out of the foster care system during that same time period without a family, oftentimes, putting them on a bad trajectory in life. Nationwide, there are some 400,000 foster children of which around 117,000 are waiting to be adopted.

To truly be a pro-life state, our responsibility to protect life doesn’t end when a child is born but continues as we ensure our citizens are properly educated

Biden’s latest bad idea

Since President Joe Biden took office, gas prices have more than doubled due to his anti-American energy policies. These painful prices at the pump have undoubtedly put ex-cruciating stress on American families, forcing some workers to quit their jobs because they cannot afford the commute in their vehicles.

And what was the president’s proposal to fix this crisis of his own making? Last week, he asked Congress and individual states to suspend federal and state gas taxes for three months, just the latest in a slew of bad ideas.

If enacted, a “Gas Tax Holiday” would create more problems than it solves. By alleviating some costs, it could potentially drive up the demand for fuel. The increasing demand for something low in stock would lead to more soaring prices and further worsen the nation’s inflationary crisis.

The only way to lower prices

is to increase domestic production, which the president’s policies do not allow.

Just before this announcement, the American Petroleum Institute and American Fuel and Petrochemical Manufacturers sent a joint letter to President Biden stating that refineries are already operating at nearly maximum capacity to convert to renewable energy production and that this action would have no benefit without increasing crude oil production.

Moreover, it would raid the already overburdened Highway Trust Fund, which is financed by the federal gas tax, and slash critical infrastructure funding that pays for desperately needed highway construction and maintenance.

This only means Congress would eventually have to find another way to collect billions more from taxpayers for needed infrastructure funding.

Unfortunately, it is projected that this proposal would have no real impact, meaning it would not translate to real sav-

ings for the American people. Since the federal gas tax is only 18 cents per gallon, this would save car owners only approximately \$7 in gas tax savings and truck drivers approximately \$10 in savings.

As drivers pay an extra \$2,800 on fuel this year alone, this temporary “solution” from the president is a slap in the face to struggling Americans.

In fact, even members of President Biden’s own party see through this sham.

In 2008, while on the campaign trail, former President Barack Obama called a gas tax holiday a “gimmick” to save Americans half a tank of gas over the summer so lawmakers could “say that they did something.”

Even House Speaker Nancy Pelosi has called the idea of a gas tax holiday “showbiz,” and former White House economic advisor from the Obama Administration Jason Furman

Can’t justify hike

What if university leaders managed colleges like a business and treated students like valuable customers? It appears the board of regents at the University of Oklahoma may be taking that approach.

After former Indiana Gov. Mitch Daniels took the helm at Purdue University, officials froze tuition rates in 2013. They have not raised them since. Daniels’ leadership proves university officials can keep costs down and provide a quality education.

But it has been a different story at the University of Oklahoma, where OU President Joseph Harroz sought this week to increase student tuition by another 3 percent. That increase would have come on top of, and compounded, the impact of last year’s 2.75 percent tuition increase.

The requested tuition increase was not the result of financial hardship. Oklahoma colleges have experienced a significant increase in funding.

This year, the state appropriation to Oklahoma colleges and universities was increased by \$60.6 million to a total of \$873.4 million. Over a two-year span, state appropriations to Oklahoma colleges have surged \$103 million.

That means state appropriations to Oklahoma colleges are edging closer and closer to a billion, yet we’re supposed to believe OU can’t get by without a tuition increase as well.

And the increase in state appropriations is just one part of the larger financial picture. Oklahoma colleges have received significant federal funding for COVID response since 2020 and will likely get a notable share of federal funds from President Biden’s American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA).

Oklahoma colleges have received significant amounts of new funding from a variety of sources. One reason policy makers provide that funding is to keep universities from hiking tuition and pricing students out of an education. Yet OU leadership seemed intent to hike tuition anyway.

Rather than control costs, the university continues to fund many courses, programs or degrees that provide little real-world benefit. If you go through OU professors’ bios you’ll find they focus on everything from feminist/queer criminology to women in the James Bond franchise to courses on “zombie cultures and mutants.”

Fortunately, the OU Regents rejected Harroz’s plan and kept in-state tuition flat. The regents explicitly noted the challenges facing students and their families from inflation.

That was true leadership. The regents deserve not just public praise, but strong public support.

By rejecting the tuition increase, the regents showed they understand the need to keep college affordable. Hopefully, they will continue down that path as Daniels did in Indiana. And, along the way, they should also devote more resources to genuinely worthwhile degree programs.

Oklahomans need an affordable college education. But the state also needs more graduates in hard sciences and real-world degrees, not “woke” students who think one of life’s great mysteries is how to tell the difference between a man and a woman.

Happy 4th of July we can figure it out

America has always been a land of hard work and struggles but always with the hope and dream of success and prosperity.

On the 4th of July we celebrate our Declaration of Independence which was ratified by the Second Continental Congress on July 4, 1776. The Second Continental Congress declared that the thirteen colonies were no longer subject and subordinate to the monarch of England King George the III and were now united, free, and independent states.

The Congress voted to approve our independence on July 2 and adopted the Declaration of Independence two days later,

precautions will help keep your pet safe and your family from stressing out over a missing family member.

If you are not sure if your dog will stress out over the kabooms of fireworks, there are some steps you can take to make sure your holiday weekend is without incident. The animal shelter has a few pet kennels to loan out so you can kennel your pet during the evening hours when the firecracker bangs are at the worst.

Make sure pets have tags or a collar with contact information

on it in case they do jump the fence or bolt through the door. A collar with contact information written with a sharpie will help Animal Control contact you so your pet will not have to stay long at the shelter.

If you plan on being out of town during the holiday weekend and have a friend or family pet sitting with your fur kids, take time to talk about plans to keep your pets safe and secure. Preplanning during the Independence holiday will keep your pets safe and out of an already overcrowded shelter,

which can add to your dog's stress level, it will also keep you from getting a \$160 citation for “animal not to be at large.”

cans to follow these food safety tips to keep you and your family foodborne illness free this summer.

Wash Your Hands

Inadequate handwashing is a contributing factor to many illnesses, including foodborne illness. It is important to follow proper handwashing steps before, during, and after preparing food to prevent bacteria from transferring from your hands to your meal.

Recent USDA consumer research (January 2020-2021) showed that 56 percent of participants didn't attempt to wash their hands during meal preparation. This is a major drop in handwashing attempts from prior years' research. In year 3, this figure was 71 percent and in year 2 it was 74 percent.

In addition to low attempts at handwashing, roughly 95 percent of participants failed to wash their hands properly. The most common reason in the study for unsuccessful handwashing was failing to

rub hands with soap for at least 20 seconds, followed by not wetting hands with water as a first step.

There are five steps for proper handwashing: wet hands, lather with soap, scrub for 20 seconds, rinse, and dry.

Use a Food Thermometer

Don't forget to bring a food thermometer to your summer activities. Always use a food thermometer to check the internal temperature of your food to determine if it is safe to eat. Insert the thermometer into the thickest part of the meat, through the side, for the most accurate temperature reading.

In the study, only 55 percent of participants used a food thermometer to check the internal temperature of the hamburgers and sausages they were cooking. Use a food thermometer to ensure the following foods have reached their safe internal temperature:

- Beef, pork, lamb and veal steaks, chops and roasts: 145 F with a 3-minute rest

- Fish: 145 F
- Egg dishes: 160 F
- Ground meats (beef, pork, lamb and veal): 160 F
- All poultry (whole or ground): 165 F

These findings are part of a multi-year, mixed-method study that USDA's Food Safety and Inspection Service (FSIS) commissioned to evaluate various consumer food handling behaviors.

The study uses test kitchens, focus groups, and nationally representative surveys to better understand food safety practices and experiences with food recalls, foodborne illness, and FSIS food safety resources. More information about this study is available in an executive summary (PDF, 49 KB).

Dear Editor:

In July of 2015 Governor Mary Fallin closed the Southern Oklahoma Resource Center. Between the time when the decision was made to close its doors and the time when the doors were closed nineteen helpless people died as a result of this action.

As Grace Donaldson so poignantly pointed out in her letter to the editor in the Pauls Valley Daily Democrat the week following S.O.R.C.'s closing, they were people who had to wear adult diapers. They couldn't tell you what they needed much less what they wanted.

More deaths followed. The 20th person to die was another of S.O.R.C.'s former residents, a bedfast man who had been placed in the nursing home on the south side of town.

In 2018 I was asked to speak with a group of Democrat candidates at a rally in Shawnee. I told them about the residents who died as a result of S.O.R.C. being closed. I told them about the 20th man dying. Children were present at this event so I said that I would not give them any details about his death other than he was bedfast. If they wanted more details I would visit with them after I stepped down off the stage.

There was a woman sitting at the back of the room who spoke out loud and clear. “He was raped. His name was Richard and he was my brother.” She told of how their father, after learning about what had happened to him, brought him home and that's where he died.

Did any of the people who cry out that abortion is wrong shed tears for these people? No. The only people who shed tears were their family and friends.

In 2018 Pauls Valley was one of five towns in Oklahoma to lose their hospitals. Governor Fallin rejected the federal money offered as part of the Affordable Care Act. Hospital workers and local citizens tried desperately to keep it open.

On the day its doors were closed one lady, a long-time resident of Pauls Valley, called her daughter and asked her to take her to the emergency room. She was having chest pains. When they got to the emergency room they had just turned out the lights and locked the doors. The daughter raced her mother to the Purcell Municipal Hospital. They made it to the hospital but her mother died in the parking lot.

Did the people who cry that abortion is wrong shed tears for this lady? No. Only family and friends.

People cry out about their second ammendment rights, yet we had another school massacre at Uvalde, Texas. Did those people who cry out about their second ammendment rights shed tears for the children and teachers at Robb Elementary? No. Many of them searched for ways to defend their right to own guns. The only people who shed tears were those who lost their children, their family and friends.

Roe v. Wade was overturned this past week. Pro-life supporters are jubilant. In Oklahoma, women who are victims of rape and incest and women who must terminate their pregnancy to save their own lives no longer have a right to seek a doctor's assistance. Abortion is illegal.

We have been a nations for 246 years, now. Since we first became a nation people have toiled, been beaten and died to gain the rights and freedoms that we enjoy today. Yet, for the first time in our history we have witnessed a basic, fundamental right taken away from us - a woman's basic right to make decisions concerning their own bodies.

Women's rights are human rights. I stand by them and with them in their defense. I pray for those who shed tears.

Jumping worms are real and a threat to the garden

As gardeners spend time in their flower beds and landscapes, they might uncover some worms in the soil – and not just any worm, the invasive Asian jumping worm. Unlike native earthworms, this and other non-native earthworm species, can wreak havoc in the soil. And yes, they do jump.

Asian jumping worms are somewhat new to the United

States, said Scott Loss, associate professor with Oklahoma State University's Department of Natural Resource Ecology and Management.

“While no systematic surveys have been done, I have found them around the OSU campus in Stillwater, as well as a few spots in eastern Oklahoma,” Loss said. “Although not currently a significant concern in the state, these aren't your regular earthworms.

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July 4th is for fireworks, not foodborne illness

Pull out the grill and your red, white, and blue because the Fourth of July is here. This means gatherings, outdoor festivities, and good times with family and friends. As the meat sizzles on the grill, don't let food safety fizzle out of your memory.

"Wherever you go this summer, don't forget to bring your safe food handling practices along for the adventure," said U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Deputy Under Secretary for Food Safety Sandra Eskin. "As temperatures rise, the risk for foodborne illness does too. Always remember that whether you're grilling for the Fourth of July, camping, or boating, you should wash your hands before and during food prep."

Whether you're eating at home or outdoors at a park this Fourth of July, sanitation is key to combat foodborne illness. Be sure to wash your hands and sanitize your cooking area before preparing food.

Safe food handling practices also help to avoid cross-contamination.

Summertime brings additional unique challenges to food safety because of the warmer temperatures. Be sure to keep hot foods hot and cold foods cold this Fourth of July, and don't forget your food thermometer.

Clean and Sanitize

Always wash your hands with soap and warm water for at least 20 seconds before and after handling raw meat and poultry. A recent USDA study (PDF, 1.3 MB) showed that 56 percent of participants didn't attempt to wash their hands during meal preparation.

When preparing your Fourth of July meal, don't skip this step. Remember, hand sanitizer is not as effective as handwashing, but it's better than nothing. If you're out camping and have no access to running water, use hand sanitizer as a backup.

Wash surfaces and utensils with soap and warm water before cooking and after contact with raw meat and poultry.

After cleaning surfaces that raw meat and poultry have touched, apply a commercial or homemade sanitizing solution (1 tablespoon of liquid chlorine bleach per gallon of water). Use hand sanitizer that contains at least 60 percent alcohol.

Avoid Cross-Contamination

Cross-contamination is another risk to your summertime fun. Don't let it spoil your plans or your food. Cross-contamination can happen even when grilling or getting food prepared to grill.

In USDA's recent observational study, 32 percent of participants contaminated plates and cutting boards and 12 percent contaminated spice containers while preparing food.

Be sure to wash hands thoroughly after handling raw meat. Any utensils that contacted raw meat must also be cleaned. Use separate plates for taking raw meat to the grill and then pulling cooked meat off the grill.

USDA recommends using separate cutting boards; one for meat, and another for fruits and vegetables.

Keep Hot Foods Hot and Cold Foods Cold

Whether you're transporting food to go hiking, camping, to a barbeque, or a picnic, the rule stays the same: keep hot foods hot and cold foods cold. Food is in the "Danger Zone" when it is in the temperature range of 40 F and 140 F.

If in the "Danger Zone" for too long, bacteria can multiply to dangerous levels. Perishable foods (such as hamburgers, hotdogs, and chicken wings) should be discarded if left out longer than two hours, or one hour if outdoor or indoor temperatures in the area are above 90 F.

- Keep cold foods at a temperature of 40 F or below by keeping food nestled in ice, in a cooler with a cold source, or refrigerated until ready to serve.

- Keep hot foods at a temperature of 140 F or above by placing food on a grill, in a preheated oven, warming trays, chafing dishes or slow cookers.

The warmer the temperature, the sooner food needs to be refrigerated. Be sure to bring a cooler with ice to the next cookout to preserve any perishable foods.

Use a Food Thermometer

Many people use cues like grill marks, color, taste, and firmness to see if their food is fully cooked, but these tests come with great risk of getting food poisoning. Measuring the internal temperature of meat with a food thermometer is the safest way to see if your food is fully cooked.

Be sure that the thermometer reaches the thickest part of the meat, through the side, for the most accurate temperature reading.

USDA research showed that an alarmingly low number of participants in the control group, just 55 percent, relied on a food thermometer to determine if their food was safe to eat. This is a stark decline from the previous study where 77 percent used a food thermometer.

Kids in the kitchen improves eating habits

With summertime in full swing, many parents and caregivers find themselves often hearing, “I’m hungry, can I have a snack?”

Parents of older children who are able to stay home alone for several hours each day are concerned about the types of healthy snacks their children can safely prepare on their own.

Since good nutrition starts at a young age, parents are encouraged to get their children in the kitchen to help prepare snacks and simple meals.

“Getting kids in the kitchen early has proven to be one way to get today’s youth started down a path of healthy eating,” said Jenni Klufa, assistant state specialist for youth programs through Oklahoma State University Extension’s Community Nutrition Education Program. “Research shows that even picky eaters are more willing to explore different foods if they’ve helped shop for and prepare them.”

CNEP’s KIK It Up! program now features many healthy snack options online for youth. The recipes have easy-to-follow directions and are geared toward children ages 6 to 15.

The recipes are divided into age groups and correspond with age-appropriate kitchen skills. Most children should be able to prepare them on their own or with a little help from a parent, caregiver or older sibling.

One simple recipe that’s a healthy and refreshing snack in the summertime and easy for children to make is the Red, White and Blue Fruit Burrito.

Klufa said children as young as three years old can have a role in helping prepare foods.

Here are some appropriate tasks for children 3-5 years old:

- Wash fruits and vegetables in a sink with cool tap water.
 - Wipe the table.
 - Mix ingredients in easy-to-mix batters.
 - Brush cooking oil with a clean pastry brush on bread, vegetables and other foods.
 - Cut out cookies with fun shaped cookie cutters.
- Tasks for children 6-7 years old:
- Use a vegetable peeler to peel raw potatoes, mangoes and other fruits and vegetables.
 - Break eggs into a bowl and wash hands after handling the eggs.
 - Snap green beans.
 - Load the dishwasher.
 - Shuck corn and rinse before cooking.
 - Rinse and cut parsley or green onions with clean, blunt kitchen scissors.

Tasks for children 8-9 years old:

- Open cans with a can opener.
- Pound chicken on a cutting board.
- Beat eggs.
- Check temperature of meat with a food thermometer.
- Juice a lemon or orange.

Tasks for children 10-12 years old:

- Boil pasta.
 - Microwave foods.
 - Follow a recipe.
 - Bake foods in the oven.
 - Simmer ingredients on the stove.
 - Slice and chop vegetables.
- Pam Dennis has served as a nutrition education assistant for 16 years and currently works with children in Pottawatomie County.

“Sometimes parents hesitate to let kids help in the kitchen,” Dennis said. “It might be mess-

ier, but these kids are learning skills they’ll use for the rest of their life. When I’m working with a group of kids, they get really excited when they know we’ll be doing hands-on activities.”

Dennis has discovered that the students participating in her KIK It Up! class are more receptive to the foods they make themselves compared to foods she may bring in already prepared.

“This is where they take ownership of the foods they’re making and are much more willing to try new things,” she said. “We even make edible play-doh they can play with first, then eat later.”

Children can get some food perceptions from outside the family and develop preconceived ideas about certain foods. Lori Evans, NEA in Kay County, said one way she combats this during her lessons is by discussing some of the children’s favorite snacks and where they fit into the USDA’s MyPlate categories.

“This program helps introduce kids to new foods they’ve never tried,” Evans said. “We talk about their favorite snacks, and they think fruit chews are a good choice because they have the word fruit in them.”

Evans said kids love sharing with their families what they’re learning in the KIK It Up! program.

“It’s a lot of fun to watch even the shy kids get involved,” she said. “They get so excited to make their own snacks and try the new combinations of different food groups.”

Governor Anoatubby designates a “Decade of Chickasaw Language”

The decade spanning 2022-2032 is designated “Chikashshanompa’Ilanompoli’! (Let’s Speak Chickasaw!): A Decade of Chickasaw Language” thanks to a recent gubernatorial proclamation issued by Chickasaw Nation Governor Bill Anoatubby.

Governor Anoatubby’s proclamation mirrors a United Nations’ proclamation of 2022-2032 “International Decade of Indigenous Languages,” which invites Indigenous peoples, as guardians of their language, to initiate ideas for preserving this endangered facet of their cultural and social life.

The proclamation also draws attention to the need to preserve and promote Indigenous languages worldwide.

Governor Anoatubby’s proclamation recognizes how Chickasaw language is an essential connection to the past and the importance of continuing the Chickasaw language for future generations.

“Chikashshanompa’ (the Chickasaw language) is integral to our identity as Chikasha (Chickasaw) people and is the source of ancestral knowledge of our history and culture, and one of our most scarce, precious and valuable resources,” Governor Anoatubby said.

During a recent citizen update, Governor Anoatubby detailed efforts and opportunities to protect and share the Chickasaw language.

“Woven within our language

are the priceless fibers of our cultural identity,” he said. “These ancient Chickasaw words that connect us in body, mind and spirit, are the essential components in the practice and expression of Chickasaw culture.”

“When we speak our native tongue, we reaffirm our unique tribal sovereignty that is so important to us now and to Chickasaw generations to come. With fewer fluent Chickasaw speakers living today, we are more committed than ever to perpetuating and providing access to the Chickasaw language.”

Opportunities and resources include several programs and services dedicated to revitalizing the language among Chickasaw citizens of all ages, including: Rosetta Stone Chickasaw, the Chickasaw Language Basics App, Chickasaw Nation Culture and Humanities YouTube Channel, ChickasawDictionary.com and language clubs.


A new initiative, the Chikasha Academy Adult Immersion Program, in which a small group of Chickasaws are learning the language from fluent speakers, was launched this year.

Other opportunities include several partnerships with local schools in the Chickasaw Nation that provide language programs to students. Chickasaw language is also incorporated into many programs and


services, including the martial arts program and the AYA fitness app.

In both the proclamation and citizen update, Governor Anoatubby encouraged the Chickasaw people “to make use of the many resources available to learn, preserve and pass on the Chikashshanompa’ to ensure our language will remain a fundamental part of the Chickasaw Nation.”

say in those moments, but I just said “I dunno,” and continued to watch TV.

After a few minutes, I walked out of the TV room and went to play a game of ping pong; but the walls around those rooms were all glass, so he easily found me again, and said, “No, tell me, do y’think you could whup me?”

I shrugged again and very nonchalantly said, “Prob’ly could,” my tongue obviously engaging without consulting my brain. As soon as I had spoken, the boy grabbed me by the shirt, said “Let’s go,” and dragged me out behind the gym. We weren’t alone either, because you can’t keep the news of a good fight away from the crowd.

A dozen spectators gathered around before the fight started, many of them being friends of my big brothers Tim and Wayne. Once outside earshot of any adults, my newfound friend proceeded to beat the tar out of me. I don’t know any other way to say it. It was a pitiful sight.

I guess the first lesson is don’t get into a fight with a fella who you know is going to beat the tar out of you...neither back behind the gym or anywhere else.

But he made a mistake. During the whipping, he rared back and kicked me in the shin. That flat made me mad, for the first time. I didn’t mind getting beat up, but the kicking in the shin really hurt, and I started crying. I can’t explain what I did next. I went crazy, tearing into

him like a hound dog on a pork chop, swinging at anything I could see move.

It didn’t take long before the boy turned and took off running. I mean, running away and never planning on coming back, I guess. But he didn’t get far. The older boys grabbed him and put him through some added embarrassment by making him admit that he really was scared of me and didn’t want any more of what he just got, which may have been worse than the whipping itself.

It’s a funny thing, I never saw that boy again. I never got his name, never learned where he came from, and never knew why he did what he did. It was just a 15-minute acquaintance, and he was gone as quickly as he came.

species of non-native earthworms, primarily originating from Europe, are established throughout North America, including Oklahoma. These groups also have documented negative effects on the environment.

Most earthworms burrow in the soil, but jumping worms and other non-native species, such as those in the genus *Aporrectodea*, feed on or near the surface of the soil and may have negative effects on the soil and plant growth, said David Hillock, OSU Extension consumer horticulturist.

“They like to feast on leaf litter and are known for leaving castings (earthworm feces) behind,” Hillock said. “Mulch is another favorite food source. Be aware they can eat two to three times their body weight every day. Because of their eating patterns, jumping worms and other non-native species can cause an imbalance in soil nutrition, which can disrupt the natural ecosystem and home

landscapes.”

Removing the surface organic matter isn’t a good method of control because that poses a risk to other organisms by eliminating their food source. Hillock said removing leaf litter also decreases the habitat for ground-nesting birds and other species who find refuge there.

In addition, jumping worm activity can cause changes in the physical characteristics of soil, which can contribute to soil erosion and changes in water permeability. Soil infested with jumping worms resembles coffee grounds and deprives other plants of essential nutrients.

Right now, Hillock said education is the key. Jumping worms look similar to any other earthworm except for the lighter-colored band near the anterior end of the body and a more shiny/smooth appearance.

Unfortunately, there is not currently a viable method of control. Compounds available that might work against jumping worms would also kill other

beneficial earthworms.

The most important form of management is preventing the worms from establishing in the first place. This can be done in the following ways:

- When purchasing bulk mulch or compost, look for a reputable producer who has heat-treated the material.
- Check property for jumping worms using a mustard pour. Mix a gallon of water with 1/3 cup of ground yellow mustard seed and pour slowly into the soil. This will drive any worms to the surface where they can easily be removed. This mixture is safe for plants.
- Cocoons, which overwinter in the soil, are sensitive to heat and can be destroyed with clear plastic solarization. If establishing a new garden bed, cover moistened soil with a sheet of transparent polyethylene for two or three weeks until the soil temperature exceeds 104 degrees Fahrenheit for at least three days.
- If you discover a small

population of jumping worms, handpick and destroy them by placing in a sealed bag or container and freezing them, then throw away the sealed container.

- Don’t buy or use jumping worms for bait, vermicomposting or gardening. This can allow them to invade new areas. Note that some of these worms are marketed with native-sounding names, such as Texas jumpers or Alabama jumpers.

Consumers are advised to avoid purchasing those worms. The most widely used compost worm, commonly known as red wiggler, isn’t able to survive and establish self-sustaining populations if released into the wild, so this is the recommended one to use.

Loss said jumping worms and other non-native species are widely used for fishing bait.

“While we can’t realistically prevent use of these species for bait, we do recommend disposing of unused bait rather than dumping on the ground and establishing a new invasion.”

Preventing summer fish kills

The suddenness with which a low oxygen fish kill happens can leave pond owners in shock. Fish that were healthy and active one day are dead the next. A little effort put into preventing fish kills can be very worthwhile.

The first line of defense against summer fish kills is working to reduce factors which lead to low oxygen levels.

In summer, the most common cause of low oxygen involves the excessive growth and die-off of algae. It is normal and healthy for pond water to have a green color due to the presence of microscopic algae.

However, when excess phosphorous and other fertilizers

run-off into a pond, the growth of algae skyrockets, leading to die-off of algae. As the dead algae decays, it rapidly uses up the pond’s scarce supply of oxygen and the fish, especially the bigger fish, have a hard time getting enough oxygen to survive.

Continuous aeration systems are not recommended as the first line of defense against low oxygen problems. They have their place but can be costly and offer little to no benefit, if they are undersized for the pond you have.

To be effective, multiple units are usually needed, and must be correctly installed and maintained. All such systems require maintenance and eventually replacement. Calculate the cost of running electricity to the pond and the electricity

itself before committing to an aeration system.

An experienced aeration equipment provider is needed to insure proper installation and application.

Head off a summer fish kill by following these steps:

On a sunny day, lower a secchi disk or other white object into the pond and measure the depth at which it disappears. If it disappears at less than 12 inches, your pond is at a high risk.

If it disappears at between 12 and 18 inches, your pond is at intermediate risk. If it disappears at 18 or more inches or your pond is muddy, then you are at low risk. Repeat this check throughout the growing

season.

To reduce the risk of a fish kill, you should always be aware of any nutrients that might eventually wash down into the pond and do everything you can to reduce the amount of nutrients reaching the pond.

Phosphorus is generally the main culprit in causing large algae blooms and we can reduce the risk by trying to reduce phosphorous runoff from lawns, livestock and other sources.

If you absolutely cannot reduce excess phosphorous runoff into the pond, then explore the pros and cons of an aquatic dye, like Aquashade, to reduce algal abundance by reducing light levels.

Fish:

which fish may survive until the algal bloom is reestablished and can once again produce oxygen.

Check your pond at dawn for signs of fish mouthing or "piping" at the surface. This indicates that they are stressed by lack of oxygen. On an average day oxygen in a pond will be lowest at dawn.

A change in color of the pond and perhaps formation of a surface scum or film often indicates an algal die-off. If you experience either sign and

observe fish strongly piping at the surface, begin aerating and discuss the situation with a fisheries biologist.

In some cases, up to two weeks of continuous emergency aeration may be needed for algal populations to recover and once again produce oxygen.

Understanding how algal die-off fish kills happen, doing regular pond checks and being an active pond manager will greatly reduce your chance of a disastrous fish kill.

OMRF scientists pinpoint brain cells linked to drug abuse relapse

New findings from scientists at the Oklahoma Medical Research Foundation could clarify a lingering mystery about chemical changes in the brain that occur during stress-induced drug abuse relapse of methamphetamine and cocaine.

Research led by Mike Beckstead, Ph.D., verified his theory about the chemical involved with relapse and the type of brain cells that interact with this chemical. The findings redefine the role certain brain cells play in addiction.

"This may be a missing piece in understanding how increased dopamine activity leads to addictive behavior, particularly after a period of abstinence," said Beckstead, who holds OMRF's Hille Family Foundation Chair in Neurodegenerative Disease Research.

Dopamine is a naturally occurring brain chemical that sends messages between specific neurons. Scientists have known for two decades that dopamine neurons are a convergence point between stress and relapse.

Since that discovery, researchers have tried to identify how stress causes changes at the cellular level, with most studies focusing on a chemical receptor called CRF1.

"It was once believed that blocking CRF1 receptors in the brain could be used to reduce relapse in people with addiction, but those theories didn't pan out in humans," Beckstead said.

Beckstead went a different route in research with his wife and collaborator, Amanda Sharpe, Ph.D., an assistant

professor at the University of Oklahoma School of Pharmacy. While working in separate labs in San Antonio before Beckstead joined OMRF, the pair found that responsibility may lie with a different receptor in the brain, CRF2. "These receptors weren't only on the neurons but also on supporting cells called astrocytes," Beckstead said.

He described astrocytes as the filler of your brain, taking up as much as one-third of all brain matter. They encase synapses and keep neurons functioning properly.

Beckstead and Sharpe theorize that activation of CRF2 receptors on astrocytes may trigger stress-induced relapse rather than CRF1 receptors on neurons.

Other experts remain skeptical of their hypothesis, so the couple's most recent study visualized the changes through samples from research models. They partnered with OMRF scientist Bill Freeman, Ph.D., whose lab houses sophisticated technology to sort cells using magnets and fluorescent markers.

This technique allowed researchers to isolate astrocytes and visualize CRF2 multiplying as cocaine or methamphetamine was administered to the research models.

"Astrocytes were thought for a long time to be bystander cells. Now we know they participate in chemical transmission," Beckstead said. "More study is needed, but these findings may reveal these cells as new targets for treating certain populations of people with addiction."

Mead:

“He said it was not only about good grades but that they wanted well rounded applicants and not just taking science.”

To apply students were required to take a dental aptitude test and those were only offered in Norman.

Mead said the powers that be finally relented and said if he got 10 students to take it they could take it at Eastern.

Mead went to work recruiting his fellow classmates who had aspirations of studying medicine or law.

“I told them if they did poorly no one would ever know because it was a dental aptitude test. I didn’t have a car so there was no way I could get to Norman.”

He pulled it off and had enough kids to have the test given more conveniently located.

“It was a classic example of if you don’t ask you never know what can happen,” he said.

Out of the 300 who applied for dental school in his class 24 were chosen.

Mead recalled as graduation neared he and Ann, whom he dated in high school, thought about going back to Heaven.

“But there were two young graduates from Baylor a year earlier, one going to Heavner and the other to Poteau,” he said.

Mead traveled all over southeastern Oklahoma going to places like Idabel looking for a spot to go into practice.

“But we liked the Oklahoma City area and Dr. Shadid was retiring in Purcell. He was selling his practice so Bill Skaggs and I went in together to buy it.”

Skaggs had gone to Creighton University’s dental school and got out the same year as

Mead did at OU. They had two offices.

Skaggs only practiced here for two years before moving to Norman where he specialized in upper echelon patients doing cosmetic dentistry.

Mead bought out Skaggs and at that time was the only dentist in McClain County.

“That was before Blanchard (and Newcastle) blew up,” he said.

Now there are at least two dentists in Blanchard and Newcastle and six or seven dentists in Purcell. He estimated Norman has 60 dentists.

Shadid opened a practice in Norman and took some patients. Some also followed Skaggs so Mead was building his practice.

He said the most challenging part of his practice is dealing with patients and patient financing especially if a patient needs something that insurance won’t cover.

The most gratifying aspect of his practice is helping people.

“I had a lady who worked at the prison,” Mead said looking back. “She was sound and determined for me to pull all of her teeth and make dentures. She had been to dentists all her life and procedures would not work out. Nothing worked or nothing lasted.

“I finally convinced her that she could keep her teeth. I fixed her problem and made her some nice partials. When they retired they moved to a lake south of Forth Worth but she continued to drive up here for her dental work,” he said. “Then there are young teens who haven’t had proper care,” he continued. “You see some young ladies who hold their hand over their mouths or won’t smile. With proper care a flower blooms before your eyes and they can date.”

Same for boys he said. “It’s a whole different way of people being helped.”

Another thing he’s done in Purcell was getting fluoride

added to the Purcell drinking water.

“Now we don’t see as many kids with bummed out teeth,” he said.

Mead said he’s tried to help society as well.

It’s good when professional people, who are generally more educated and have seen some things maybe others haven’t, get involved in a community, he said.

“That way all the decisions are not made by the good ole’ boys and girls.

“Purcell has always been blessed in that regard,” Mead said.

“People served on the chamber or the hospital board all doing what they can. If everyone does a little bit it makes a community special.”

Mead summed up his career this way:

“I’m just a country boy who got very lucky, worked hard and picked a good goal,” he said.

“I couldn’t be much happier for how it turned out. I made a living for my family, made a lot of friends and got some good football tickets,” he said.

Going back and giving back at the dental school has also been gratifying for him.

“It’s been great going back to the dental school with my friends over the years,” he confirmed.

When he’s not crawling around in a patient’s mouth, Mead enjoys being outdoors doing yard work.

And he has three granddaughters who keep him busy as their only grandfather.

His daughter-in-law’s father and his son-in-law’s father both have passed away leaving Mead as their only grandfather.

“I feel a little pressure to be the best grandfather for those girls,” he admitted.

OMRF receives \$480,000 to study genetic drivers of lupus

The National Institutes of Health has awarded the Oklahoma Medical Research Foundation a new grant to better understand lupus.

OMRF scientist Swapan Nath, Ph.D., studies genetic variants, or mutations, thought to play a role in lupus, a disease in which the immune system becomes unbalanced and attacks the body's own tissues. Lupus can result in damage to the joints, skin, kidneys, heart and lungs.

The disease affects an estimated 1.5 million Americans, primarily striking women and disproportionately affecting African Americans, American Indians, Latinos and Asians. It is notoriously difficult to diagnose and treat because of how widely it varies from person to person.

Nath aims to understand and change that.

"Lupus has a strong genetic basis, but to better treat it, we have to identify the variants that drive the disease," said Nath, who holds the William H. and Rita Bell Chair in Biomedical Research at OMRF.

"Genetic variants correlate with neighboring variants. If you see one variant is associated with lupus, and another is on the same strand of DNA, the latter may also be associated with lupus. But which is a driver of lupus, and which plays no role at all?," he said.

With a new two-year, \$480,000 grant from the NIH's National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases, Nath plans to get closer to those answers.

Using earlier research in-

volving thousands of DNA samples, Nath's lab will now target 100 regions of DNA implicated in lupus. He wants to determine the statistical probability that variants in each area will lead to developing the disease. He'll then go deeper, aiming to identify the exact locations of the variants that alter a gene's function and how they do so.

"This will significantly advance our knowledge of lupus genetics and offer direction for future in-depth study of the biology of lupus," Nath said.

The end goal is to create a drug that targets specific mutations in a person's genetic makeup and prevents lupus before it develops.

"We're not there yet," said Nath, "but this will put us one step closer."

Tammi Coker travels to Iceland with QUO Student Travel

Tammi Coker, a recently retired Lexington teacher, just returned from Iceland with local area students on an educational program with QUO Student Travel.

The group met 29 others in Reykjavik where they began their eight-day adventure. The students started with a trip to Viking World to learn about traditional folklore and enjoy an authentic Icelandic breakfast; then went on a City Walk to see how traditional and modern culture co-exists.

They explored the Hallgrímskirkja Church and learned that 70 percent of their energy needs is geothermal power, took part in their Independence Day festivities in Austurvöllur Square and experienced the Golden Circle and Þingvellir National Park, many geysers, Gullfoss Waterfall: Iceland's Niagara Falls and Skogafoss, Seljalandsfoss and Gljúfrabúi Waterfalls.

The group took part in uncovering Lava Bread baked in an earth oven, ate at a green-

house tomato farm, white-water rafted the glacier river Hvita, sailed to the Westman Islands, visited puffins and beluga whales at a sanctuary and experienced volcanology and explored Eldfell Volcano and Eldheimar Volcano Museum.

They also went to an Icelandic Lava Experience and safely saw red-hot lava up close where they saw it flow, heard it sizzle and felt the intense heat; enjoyed the Fly Over Iceland Experience; went to the Wonders of Iceland and Northern Lights Planetarium Show and walked through a 100 meter long real Ice Cave and walked the black sand beach of Reynisfjara with its dramatic mountains and towering basalt column cliffs.

They all strapped on crampons and hiked three hours to the top of Solheimajokull Glacier and visited Icelandic horses at the Eldhestar horse farm where they learned about this unique breed.

The guides gave them an Icelandic Tasting of tradi-

tional foods from dried fish, sheep head jelly, to shark, as well as short language lessons. They hiked five miles in the Reykjadalur Valley to enjoy a favorite tradition of soaking in a hot river at the top of the mountain and experienced sheep, cows and horses along the paths.

The group hiked Fagradalsfjall Volcano and in Hveragerói, they learned about settler's innovative building techniques and planted Alaskan Willow Trees at a farm to help with the area's harsh wind conditions then ate in a historic turf-roofed longhouse.

They experienced the Summer Solstice, explored the geothermal area of Seltun with its colorful bubbling mud pots, mineral flows, smelly sulphur puddles, boiling geothermal pools and steaming hot springs and crossed the bridge between two continents where the tectonic plates of Europe

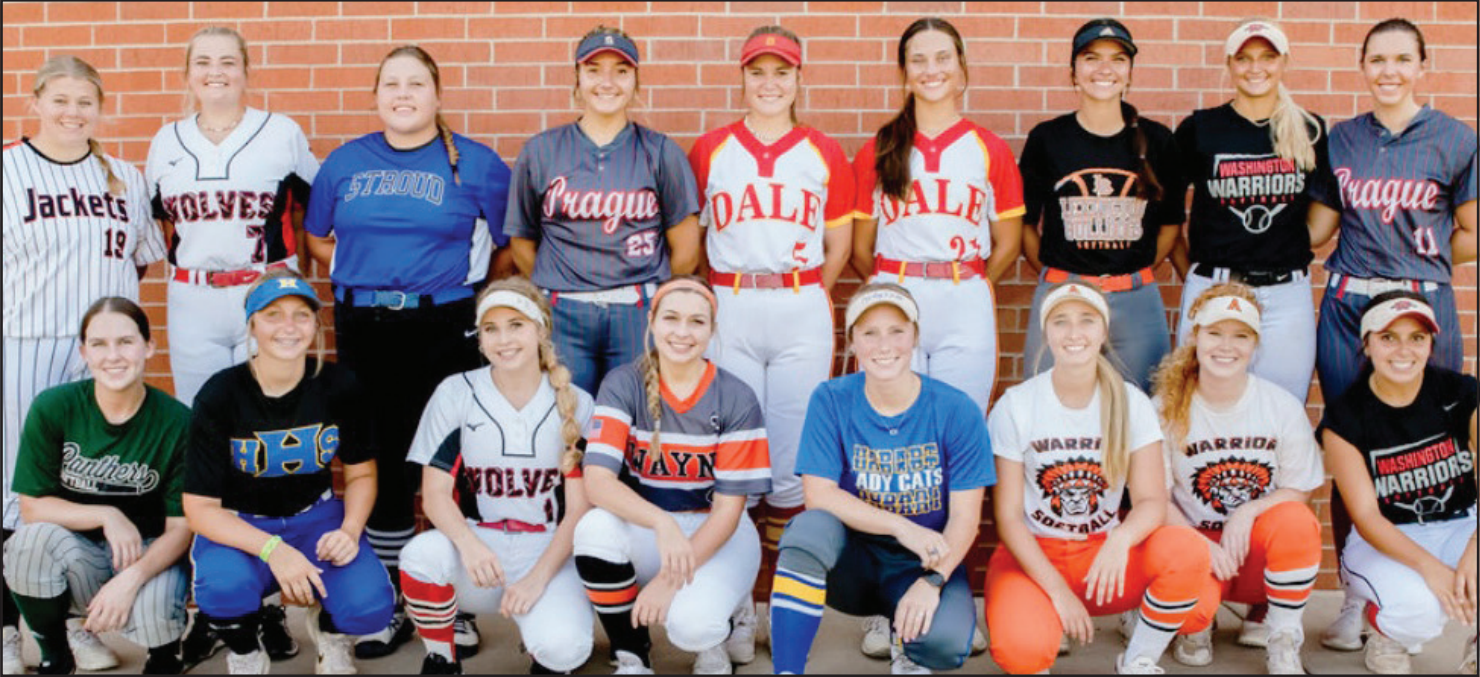
