Purcell was without water from 5 a.m. Saturday until around 9:20 a.m. Sunday due to a water main break. Low pressure continued after water was restored. But thanks to the ef-

forts of the Purcell Water Department water was restored Saturday morning and pressure was back to normal by Monday morning. The problem stemmed from not one but two water main breaks.

The main problem was a 12” line that busted at 2nd and Jackson around 8 p.m. Friday due in large part to the extreme heat that rocketed to at least 105 degrees Fahrenheit. That break was reported by a citizen to the city send-

ing superintendent Michael Minor and his entire nine member team plus a five member outsource team from Wee Construction to the scene. Please see **Break**, back page

Houses razed by infernos

Firefighters fight blazes and triple- digit heat

With the outside temperature registering 100 degrees Fahrenheit or more both last Wednesday (July 6) and Thursday afternoon, firefighters from Purcell and Lexington battled house fires on back-to-back days in Lexington.

Both days the fires were also attacked by Noble, Slaughterville and Cedar Country fire companies.

The Wednesday call came in at 1:40 p.m. of a house on fire at 411 E. Catalpa.

The house had recently been purchased by Dusty and Keri Buff and was being renovated, according to Lexington Fire Chief Max Punneo. The structure was empty at the time of the fire.

The couple was outside mowing when the fire broke out and went to a neighbor’s house to report the fire to the fire department.

Punneo believes it started in the attic of the house.

Crews battled not only the fire but the intense heat.

Wadley’s EMS had two vehicles at the scene and administered two units of

Hot topic

Dog days of summer can pack a deadly punch

The dog days of summer. As Oklahomans, they are a given in July and August. For many of us, they are a discomfort as we limit time spent outdoors to early morning or late evening. If we do venture out in between, we seek shade at every turn and slow our pace. Most people never think past reaching the next air-conditioned environment. They just don’t realize how quickly discomfort can turn deadly. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health shared the following information on heat-related dangers. Topping their list is heat

stock. This most serious heat-related illness occurs when the body can no longer control its temperature. As the body’s temperature rises rapidly, the sweating mechanism fails. Like a car with a broken water pump, the body is unable to cool itself down. In a case of heat stroke, the body’s temperature can rise to 106 degrees or higher in as few as 10 minutes. Heat stroke can cause permanent disability or death if the person does not receive emergency treatment, the agencies report. Symptoms of heat stroke are confusion, altered mental status and slurred speech. The victim may slip into a coma and seizures are possible. Skin

is hot and dry to the touch. If treatment is delayed, heat stroke can prove fatal. If you suspect someone is suffering from heat stroke, call 911 for emergency medical care. Stay with the worker until emergency medical services arrive and if possible, move them to a shaded, cool area. Remove outer clothing and cool them quickly. With cold water or, if possible, an ice bath, wet the skin and place cold wet cloths on the skin. Soak their clothing with cool water and circulate air around them to speed cooling. Place cold wet cloths or ice on the head, neck, armpits and groin.

Sunday Stars

Local library helping kids shine academically

The stars are out in broad daylight every Sunday at Purcell Public Library. No, not those stars. These are Sunday Stars—first through third grade students on a mission to improve their reading or math skills. They are meeting their goal through an enrichment program funded by a COVID-relief grant from the State Department of Education. The innovative Sunday Stars approach is a partnership between the Pioneer Library System and Purcell Public Schools, according to Ashley Welke, director of community engagement and learning for the library system. Welke said the Sunday Stars

program is funded through June 2024. “It’s a year-round program,” she continued. Other Sunday Stars programs are underway at the Pioneer libraries in Tecumseh and Noble. Welke said there’s been a steady increase in participation here since the program began in May. Progress can be measured a couple of different ways, Welke said. Parents sign a release so the schools can share testing results for the group as a whole. That serves as a benchmark against which group progress can be measured. The students meet from 1:30 to 4:30 p.m. on Sundays. Samantha Marion, a special education teacher at Purcell

Elementary School, is the lead instructor. Through observation, she can evaluate and monitor academic progress, as well as social and emotional learning. Assisting Marion are local high school students working as Teen Reading Ambassadors. Welke said Sunday Stars graduate when they age out of the program or when they reach grade level in reading or math. “Each week students participate in small group reading instruction and receive one-on-one time to develop and improve reading skills,” Welke said. “Students come together for the final hour to engage in hands-on STEAM activities with an emphasis on career exposure and math skills.”

Wayne man sentenced to seven years in federal prison

A Wayne man has been sentenced to 84 months in federal prison for a robbery in Purcell involving an Uzi-style airsoft gun. That’s the word from U.S. Attorney Robert J. Troester. Sean Robert Tyson, 32, was initially charged and sentenced in the District Court of McClain County but the conviction was dismissed based on the U.S. Supreme Court ruling in McGirt v. Oklahoma. In July of last year Tyson pleaded guilty to robbery in Indian Country. According to court records,

Tyson asked to borrow the victim’s phone while at Star Travel Plaza. When the call concluded, Tyson pointed what looked like a real Uzi firearm at the victim and a two-year-old child held by the victim, saying the phone now belonged to Tyson. He fled in a vehicle with the victim’s phone. At the sentencing Monday, U.S. District Court Judge Patrick Wyrick sentenced Tyson to serve seven years in federal prison. In support of his sentence Judge Wyrick cited, among

other things, the serious nature of the offense, Tyson’s criminal history and the impact of the robbery on the victim’s family. Judge Wyrick also ordered that upon release from prison, Tyson must serve three years of supervised release. Tyson has been in federal custody since his arrest May 28, 2021. Tyson is an admitted member of the Universal Aryan Brotherhood. The case was the result of an investigation by the FBI in Oklahoma City and the Purcell Police Department.

This month the Oklahoma Tax Commission paid back \$194,656,884 in sales taxes to municipalities along with \$31,042,126 in use taxes. The sales tax return was \$32,855,555 and \$5,541,952, respectively. The returns were based on sales from May 16-31 and estimated sales from June 1-15. Increase flower blossoming with a bit of deadheading

Keep your garden looking its best with a bit of deadheading. Removing faded flowers can promote repeat bloom on some plants, encourage fuller, more compact growth, and tidy up the garden. Use a bypass pruner or dead-heading snips to remove faded flowers. These tools have two sharp blades like scissors. This results in a clean cut that closes quickly, leaving your plant looking its best. The type of flower will influence how and where to make the cut. In general, remove the stem of faded blooms back to the first set of healthy leaves

or nearby flower buds. Deadhead flowers like salvia, veronica, and snapdragons by removing faded flowers to encourage more blooms. Make cuts below the faded flower and above a set of healthy leaves or new flower stems. Encourage additional blossoms and improve Shasta daisy's appearance by removing faded flowers. Prune back just above a set of healthy leaves. Cut the flowers of Armeria, coral bells and other flowers back to the base of the flower stems that arise from the foliage. This improves the appearance and encourages more blooms on some of this type of flowering perennial. Plants like daylilies and

balloon flowers require a bit different care for a tidier look. Remove the individual blooms as they fade. Once bloomed out, you can cut the flower stem back at the base. Allowing the faded flowers to hang on the stem until it is all bloomed out won't hurt the plant, it just detracts from the plant's overall beauty. Removing fading flowers of fuchsia and lantana will prevent the plants from going to seed and encourage more blooms. Remove any berries

that do form to keep these plants flowering. Some plants like impatiens, cuphea and calibrachoa are self-cleaning. Old blossoms fall off the plants as new flowers form, eliminating the need for deadheading. Deadhead heavy seeders like columbine to reduce the number of seedlings and contain the spread. Or allow some seeds to develop if you have space to

They felt no obligation to cover any of the additional expenses we incurred in Atlanta.

Budget Rent A Car made double money for an old Camry they rented me. The car was a take it or leave it. They said it was all they had available when I arrived.

Are there any answers? Sure. Stay home. Or, try to find flights that are direct if possible. This seems harder and harder.

Budget break down

Here in Oklahoma, one of the main topics of conversation is the weather, but I'd say transportation is right after that. People want to know when a road they rely on is going to be repaired, or how long before all the darn road construction is finally done.

In this week's Budget Break Down, we're looking at transportation funding in Oklahoma.

First of all, I want to say that Transportation Secretary Tim Gatz and the folks at the Oklahoma Department of Transportation (ODOT) do a great job.

We also need to acknowledge that like many other businesses, they're working under unusual circumstances due to ongoing supply chain issues. Currently, they're running behind on some 20 percent of their projects because of those supply chain problems.

There's a project in my own Senate District 8 that's been impacted by an asphalt plant that was shut down. It's just a reality that is impacting both public and private sectors right now, so it's important we take those factors into account.

When we look at funding for our roads in Oklahoma, including federal resources, we're talking about a little over \$1.7 billion. That's a lot of money, and I believe we're getting the most value we can for our dollars.

Looking at the state budget

Oklahoma as well. In our metro areas, like Oklahoma City and Tulsa, personal transportation options include buses and street cars.

In rural Oklahoma, we work through some of the community action agencies to provide transportation services. This year, we added \$5 million for such programs, for a total of \$10.75 million.

Those community action agencies are able to leverage that with federal funds to purchase busses and other vehicles to get people where they need to go such as doctors' appointments, work, and the grocery store for a small fare.

Transportation is an important core function of government, but as population and transportation needs increase and technology changes, we face additional challenges.

Today, we're largely funding transportation through fuel taxes – fossil fuels, to be exact. But as more electric vehicles hit the road, the question is going to be how we can continue to fund our transportation infrastructure in the future. Many of the vehicles that will soon be on our roadways include autonomous vehicles, like self-driving trucks that will add to the wear and tear of our roads.

We will meet those challenges and keep transportation in Oklahoma moving forward.

Oil, gas collections reach all-time high

Aided by record collections from oil and gas production, Gross Receipts to the Treasury in June and for the just-ended fiscal year show the state's economy continues to expand in spite of current inflationary pressure, State Treasurer Randy McDaniel announced today.

Collections during Fiscal Year 2022 (FY-22), which ended June 30, are \$16.46 billion, up by 15 percent from Fiscal Year 2021 (FY-21). For the first time in any 12-month period, oil and gas production taxes topped \$1.5 billion in FY-22.

June gross receipts of \$1.51 billion are down by 1.5 percent from the same month of last year, but the reduction is due to non-economic factors. The income tax filing deadline in 2021 was moved to June, so collections spiked during that month instead of in April. June 2022 oil and gas production taxes of \$171.2 million are the highest of any single month.

"Inflationary forces are a significant concern for consumers, but Oklahoma's macro economy is benefitting from current energy prices and low unemployment," Treasurer McDaniel said. "Economic activity remains strong as reflected in sales and use tax receipts."

Combined sales and use tax receipts of \$578.1 million in June are up by 10.3 percent from last year. During FY-22, those consumption taxes generated \$5.59 billion, an increase of 13.3 percent.

Due to last year's shift in tax filing deadlines, combined income tax receipts of \$541.2 million in June are down by 23.2 percent this month. For FY-22, income taxes generated \$5.78 billion, up by 8.6 percent.

The record high collections from oil and gas production in June are based on April production when crude oil averaged \$101.78 per barrel in Cushing and natural gas averaged \$6.60 per million BTU at Henry Hub.

As measured by the Consumer Price Index, the federal Bureau of Labor Statistics reports the annual inflation rate at 8.6 percent in May. The energy component of the index is up

34.6 percent over the year.

Other indicators

The Oklahoma unemployment rate in May was reported as 2.8 percent by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics. That is up from 2.7 percent in April. The U.S. jobless rate was listed as 3.6 percent in May, unchanged from April.

The monthly Oklahoma Business Conditions Index slumped in June. The index for the month was set at 63.7, down from 66.1 in May. The outlook remains positive as numbers above 50 indicate expected expansion during the next three to six months.

June collections

June 2022 collections compared to gross receipts from June 2021 show:

- Total monthly gross collections are \$1.51 billion, down \$23 million, or 1.5 percent.
- Gross income tax collections, a combination of individual and corporate income taxes, generated \$541.2 million, down by \$163.7 million, or 23.2 percent.
- Individual income tax collections are \$401.1 million, a decrease of \$118.4 million, or 22.8 percent.
- Corporate collections are \$140.1 million, down by \$45.4 million, or 24.5 percent.
- Combined sales and use tax collections, including remittances on behalf of cities and counties, total \$578.1 million – up by \$54.2 million – or 10.3 percent.
- Sales tax collections total \$495.2 million, an increase of \$41.9 million, or 9.3 percent.
- Use tax receipts, collected on out-of-state purchases including internet sales, generated \$82.9 million, an increase of \$12.2 million, or 17.3 percent.
- Gross production taxes on oil and natural gas total \$171.2 million, an increase of \$91.5 million, or 114.8 percent.
- Motor vehicle taxes produced \$81.1 million, down by \$4.8 million, or 5.6 percent.
- Other collections composed of some 60 different sources including taxes on fuel, tobacco, medical marijuana, and alcoholic beverages, produced \$140.6 million – down by \$102,960, or 0.1 percent.
- The medical marijuana tax

He will begin six challenging weeks of basic midshipman training as part of Plebe Summer.

Approximately 1,200 candidates are selected each year for the Academy's "plebe" or freshman class and each student is required to participate in Plebe Summer. Last year, the Naval Academy received over 16,000 applications for the Class of 2026.

During this time, plebes have no access to television, movies, the internet and music and also have restricted access to cell phones. They are only permitted to make three calls during the six weeks of Plebe Summer.

The pressure and rigor of Plebe Summer is carefully designed to help plebes prepare for their first academic year at the Naval Academy and the

four years of challenges that awaits them.

As the summer progresses, plebes rapidly assimilate basic skills in seamanship, navigation, damage control, sailing and handling yard patrol craft. They also learn infantry drill and how to shoot 9mm pistols and M-16 rifles.

Other daily training sessions involve moral, mental, physical and professional development and team-building skills. Activities include swimming, martial arts, basic rock climbing and obstacle, endurance and confidence courses designed to develop physical, mental and team-building skills. Forty hours are devoted to the instruction of infantry drill and five formal parades.

Founded in 1845, the U.S. Naval Academy today is a prestigious four-year service academy that prepares midshipmen morally, mentally and physically to be professional officers in the naval service.

More than 4,400 men and women representing every state in the U.S. and several foreign countries make up the student body, known as the Brigade of Midshipmen. Each year, approximately 1,200 young men and women are admitted to the Naval Academy's incoming class.

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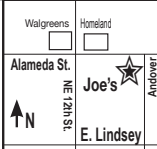

Heat:

Heat exhaustion is the body’s response to an excessive loss of water and salt, usually through profuse sweating.

The most likely victims include the elderly, those with high blood pressure and those working in a hot environment.

Symptoms include headache, nausea, dizziness, weakness, irritability, thirst, heavy sweating, elevated body temperature and decreased urine output.

Anyone suffering from heat exhaustion should be taken to a clinic or emergency room for medical evaluation and treatment or call 911.

Stay with the stricken person until help arrives. Remove them from the hot area and give them liquids. Removing unnecessary clothing, including shoes and socks. Cool them with cold compresses or have them wash their head, face and neck with cold water. Encourage them to take frequent sips of cool water.

Rhabdomyolysis (rhabdo) is a medical condition associated with heat stress and prolonged physical exertion.

Rhabdo causes the rapid breakdown, rupture and death of muscle, leading to the release of electrolytes and large proteins into the bloodstream.

This can cause irregular heart rhythms, seizures and kidney damage.

Symptoms to watch for are muscle cramps/pain, abnormally dark urine, weakness and exer-

cise intolerance.

Keep in mind, though, that victims may also be asymptomatic.

Suspected rhabdo sufferers should stop activity, and drink more liquids, preferably water, and seek immediate care at the nearest medical facility. It is also important to have a blood sample analyzed for creatine kinase.

Heat syncope refers to a fainting episode or dizziness that usually occurs when standing for too long or suddenly standing up after sitting or lying.

Factors that may contribute to heat syncope include dehydration and lack of acclimatization.

Symptoms are fainting (short duration), dizziness and lightheadedness.

First aid calls for sitting or lying down in a cool place and slowly drinking water, clear juice or a sports drink.

Heat cramps usually affect those who sweat a lot during strenuous activity. This depletes the body’s salt and moisture levels, which causes cramps.

Be warned, though, heat cramps may also be a symptom of heat exhaustion.

Symptoms of heat cramps include spasms in the abdomen, arms or legs.

A person with heat cramps should drink water and have a snack or a drink that replaces carbohydrates and electrolytes (such as sports drinks) every 15 to 20 minutes. They should avoid salt tablets.

Seek medical help if the victim has heart problems, is on a low-sodium diet or if the cramps don’t stop within an hour.

Next is heat rash, a skin irritation caused by excessive sweating during hot, humid weather.

Heat rash appears as red clusters or small blisters on the neck, upper chest, elbow creases, groin or under the breasts.

Skip the ointments and creams and apply powder to increase comfort.

Keep the rash area dry and, if possible, work in a cooler, less humid, environment.

Flower:

fill or want lots of seedlings to transplant to new garden beds.

Allow seedheads to develop on coneflowers, rudbeckias, and other plants that provide winter interest and food for the birds.

Remove flowers as they appear on coleus to promote more compact growth. Late blooming, flowerless varieties and self-branching coleus hybrids reduce or eliminate time spent on this task.

Consider skipping the deadheading of late blooming

perennials. This allows them to prepare for winter and form seedpods for a bit of winter interest.

Improve the appearance of leggy plants with long stems and few leaves with a bit of pruning. Cut back further into the leafy stem when deadheading to encourage fuller growth as well as more flowers.

Make deadheading part of your regular garden maintenance.

Investing time throughout the season will help keep your

garden looking its best.

Oklahoma now has title-holding law

OTC: It will save time, money

Oklahoma is now among more than 40 title-holding states in the nation.

The Oklahoma Tax Commission reported a new law requires all boat, motor and vehicle titles issued after July 1 that are subject to a lien will be sent to lienholders who will hold the title until the lien is satisfied.

Owners will still maintain valid registration which must be kept in the vehicle at all times and will prove ownership.

Once the lien is satisfied, the title may be released to the owner.

According to the OTC, this is an important piece in the imple-

mentation of the Electronic Lien and Title program which will allow for the electronic submission of lien documentation and electronic storage of Oklahoma titles by lienholders through third-party vendors.

The ELT program will make the titling process faster, more convenient and will save time and money.

Participation in the ELT program as a lienholder is optional. An approved vendor list will be made available at a later date.

The law does not force Oklahomans who already have lien-encumbered titles on their vehicles to turn them in.

However, if the title is lost

and a duplicate is requested, it will be sent to the lienholder.

Titles that were issued prior to July 1 but have not yet printed will be sent to the owner. Titles subject to a lien

that are issued July 1 and later will be sent to the lienholder.

Responsibility of Home Owner to Maintain Property

It is the responsibility of the home owner and or tenant to maintain their property or be subject to a \$260 fine. Violations are as follows:

1. Tall grass or weeds, junk, trash, debris, inoperable vehicles, and discharging grass clippings into the street.
2. You are responsible for maintaining your property from the edge of the road or curb to the center of the alley. The City will trim the large trees in the alley.
3. Bulk waste pick up is the last Monday of every month. Please do not set bulk waste out until that weekend before the last Monday. (No loose items, no items to exceed 75 pounds, no antifreeze, paint, or batteries, no hazardous materials. No refrigerant compressors. Limbs must be in three-foot bundles).
4. Brush set out to the curb will be picked up with a charge determined by the size. Brush pick up is free in May and October. You may also call and arrange for brush pick up.
5. It takes all of us working together to keep Purcell a home to be proud of.

Federal broadband discount still available for Oklahoma households

Thousands of Oklahomans are missing an opportunity to lower their monthly internet bills. The federal government’s Affordable Connectivity Program is available to help households pay for internet service, but few have signed up since the program’s debut in December 2021.

The \$14.2 billion Affordable Connectivity Program is a continuation of the Federal Communications Commission’s Emergency Broadband Benefit, which launched in April 2020 to help millions afford internet access during the pandemic.

“We were a top five participant in the precursor program, but now Oklahoma ranks about 20th in Affordable Connectivity Program registrations,” said Brian Whitacre, Oklahoma State University Extension rural development specialist. “Other states have put more effort and money into the digital equity movement, and we’re behind.”

Discount details and who qualifies

Whitacre’s research shows that of the total 1.5 million households in Oklahoma, only 175,000 are currently participating in the Affordable Connectivity Program. More than 400,000 additional households are eligible for the discount, including 273,000 with no active broadband subscription or cellular data plan. This translates to only a 35 percent participation rate among eligible households. Other states like Ohio, Louisiana and Kentucky have closer to 50 percent participation.

In the precursor program, residents were eligible if they made just barely over the poverty line, he said. Now, they can qualify if they make twice over the poverty line.

“With inflation the way it is right now, every cost matters,” Whitacre said. “If you’ve got a \$50 or \$80 internet bill, this

program can really help.”

Eligible households receive:

- Up to \$30 per month on internet service.

- Up to \$75 per month for households on qualifying tribal lands (nearly all of Oklahoma qualifies for this larger amount, even if the household is not tribal).

- A one-time discount of up to \$100 to purchase a laptop, desktop computer or tablet (with a co-payment of more than \$10 but less than \$50).

Most internet and broadband service providers participate in the Affordable Connectivity Program.

Whitacre’s rural development work in OSU Extension involves advocating for rural broadband access. He often speaks to community organizations across the state and provides information on the Affordable Connectivity Program. His target audiences include:

- Rural libraries and the Public Library Association.
- 4-H and Extension.
- Kiwanis Club and other community groups.
- Religious organizations.
- Public schools.

Eligible households must meet at least one of the following criteria:

- Has an income that is at or below 200 percent of the federal poverty guidelines.

- Participates in certain assistance programs, such as SNAP, Medicaid, Federal Public Housing Assistance, SSI, WIC or Lifeline.

- Participates in tribal specific programs, such as Bureau of Indian Affairs General Assistance, Tribal TANF or Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations.

- Is approved to receive benefits under the free and reduced-price school lunch program or the school breakfast program, including through the USDA Community Eligibility Provision in the 2019-2020, 2020-2021, or 2021-2022 school year.

- Received a Federal Pell Grant during the current award year.

- Meets the eligibility criteria for a participating provider’s existing low-income program.

How to sign up for a discount

For those personally registering for the program or helping others complete the process, please note the following required steps and personal information.

- Visit acpbenefit.org.
- Scroll down the page and click Apply Now.

- Provide legal name as well as a social security, tribal ID or driver’s license/military ID, passport, taxpayer or other government ID number.

- Provide address and indicate if you qualify through a dependent or on your own

- Create an account and apply for ACP.

- Confirm personal information and provide a digital signature.

- Contact a service provider and indicate participation in the Affordable Connectivity Program for a discount.

Whitacre’s rural connectivity research shows signing up for broadband internet access increases business activity, reduces unemployment levels and boosts entrepreneurship in rural areas.

By 2026, the goal is for 90 percent of all Oklahomans to have in-home access compared to today’s rate of about 80 percent.

“The amount of federal money behind broadband internet right now should connect most of the country with good, quality internet within the next five to 10 years everywhere,” Whitacre said. “An internet connection is important, but it’s only effective if people take advantage of it.”

Identification of poison ivy is key in preventing exposures

An expert in disguise, poison ivy may often be mistaken for a weed growing along your back fence, near a pathway at your local park, or deep in the woods. Knowing what poison ivy looks like is key to preventing exposures.

According to Scott Schaeffer, managing director of the Oklahoma Center for Poison and Drug Information (OCPDI), “Poison ivy may look different depending on the time of year. The plant has three leaflets that are all on the same stem, but in early spring it may look like a small shrub and then later begin to make a vine. During summer months, the leaves are green, but they turn red in the fall and have white berries.”

An exposure starts with itching, then a red rash, and then blisters. These symptoms of poison ivy, poison oak, and poison sumac can emerge any time from a few hours to several days after exposure to the plant oil, called urushiol.

This oil is found in the sap of these poisonous plants. The oil sticks to pets, garden tools, toys, and anything else it touches. The oil can remain on a surface for years, causing problems for people who

encounter it.

Because the plant oil can attach to skin within minutes, immediate action is best if you know you have been exposed. Washing may not stop the rash if more than 15 minutes have passed, but it can help stop further spreading.

Contact with or breathing the smoke from burning poison ivy can cause a reaction. Do not burn poison ivy plants.

If you have been exposed to poison ivy:

- Wash exposed area with cool water and a grease-cutting dishwashing soap. Regular bar soap does not remove the oil and can spread the oil to other parts of the body.
- Wash clothes with regular laundry soap. With alcohol and water, wipe off shoes, tools and anything else that may have been in contact with the oil. Be sure to wear gloves or cover your hands while performing this task and then discard the hand coverings.
- Blisters and itching will often occur within 48 hours of an exposure. For those rare people who react after their very first exposure, the rash usually appears after seven to 10 days. Because the blisters

do not contain the oil, they are not contagious.

- Antihistamine creams do not help control itching and can make the rash worse.

Contact the Poison Center if you have questions or concerns about an exposure to poison ivy. See a doctor if you:

- You have a temperature over 100 degrees Fahrenheit.
- The rash spreads to your eyes, mouth, genital area or covers more than one-fourth of your skin area.
- The rash is not improving within a few weeks.
- The rash is widespread and severe.
- You have difficulty breathing.

Pharmacists and registered nurses at the poison center are available 24 hours a day, seven days a week at (800) 222-1222. Please do not email the poison center or a member of the poison center staff, as poisoning emergencies are not managed through email.

IV fluids to each firefighter, both Punneo and Purcell Fire Chief Greg Cypert reported.

“Wadley’s was there for hydration and rehab,” Punneo said. “We really appreciated them.”

Punneo estimated the house to be an \$80,000 complete loss.

“We came in around 8 p.m. and finished around 11 a.m. Saturday,” Minor said.

Police:

are the driving force behind the slow down, according to police chief Bobby Elmore.

“Some who left were high activity officers,” Elmore said, adding the department has hired five replacements.

One of those is out of training, two are presently in field training and two have started 16 weeks of pre-certification training at the Basic Police Officer Certification Academy at Metro Technology Center.

New hires who aren’t already CLEET certified must complete the BPOCA.

Upon graduation and with certification in hand, they have four months field training with a Purcell officer.

“We are back to fully staffed, but not to where they can be out on their own,” Elmore said.

The four months of local field training with an officer is a crucial element in readying

officers to hit the streets solo.

“They are not prepared to be on their own right out of the academy,” Elmore said.

Under the terms of the recently approved 2022-23 contract with the Fraternal Order of Police, the department pays \$18.60 per hour to non-certified probationary officers.

The state average for certified police officers is \$17 per hour.

Once certified, that wage increases to \$20.65 per hour.

At the conclusion of six months probationary status, the pay for Patrolman 1 is \$22.66 per hour.

After two years, there are step increases for Patrolman 2, Master Patrolman, Corporal, Sergeant, Lieutenant and Patrol Captain.

The pay is one of three key elements to keeping officers motivated, Elmore believes, along with overall morale and

a good administration.

“If you are not happy with the people you work for, you’re not going to hang around,” he explained. “Purcell has nice equipment, good pay, insurance.”

Still, officers can be lured away by larger departments which can pay more and offer specialized assignments.

“Here, what you are is what you are,” Elmore said.

However, city manager Dale Bunn added Purcell offers training in crisis intervention and “knowing how to talk down a situation.”

Fielding an officer with that training is a staple on every shift, he added.

Elmore said the department casts a wide net when recruiting, utilizing social media such as Facebook, Twitter and Instagram.

In addition, he has visited the academies in person to introduce cadets to what Purcell has to offer.

“The last round, we went to Moore-Norman (Technology Center) and spoke to the students,” he said. “That’s how we got the two we just hired.”

Elmore said the activity numbers will climb as the new hires complete all of their training.

Until then with inflation being what it is, there’s a hidden blessing for the department’s budget.

In the first six months of 2022, the police drove just 7,575 miles and issued only 183 citations.

During the same period in 2019, the mileage total was 107,803 miles and police issued 938 citations.

Granted, the pandemic in 2020 and 2021 may have set a few brakes on police travel.


But officers still racked up 96,107 and 94,265 miles, respectively, in the first half of those years.



July 17, 2022 is the sixteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time. During Ordinary Time, the Gospel focuses on the teachings and miracles of Christ during his time on earth.

The Gospel reading, Luke 10:38-42, concerns sisters Martha and Mary. Jesus was visiting and Mary was sitting at Jesus' feet while Martha was preparing food for Jesus and his companions. Exasperated, Martha asks Jesus if he has not noticed that she, Martha, is working herself half to death while Mary is just sitting there.

She tells Jesus, "Please tell her to help me." 41 But the Lord answered, 'Martha, Martha,' he said, 'you worry and fret about so many things, 42 and yet few are needed, indeed only one. It is Mary who has chosen the better part, and it is not to be taken from her.'

Are you like Martha? Sometimes the busyness of getting everything done just so seems overwhelming. When my children are coming to visit, I clean the house like the Queen of England is coming. The truth is the kids are coming to see us and not the house. If they can get in the door and sit down, does it really matter that I did not dust and vacuum every speck?

I suspect Martha was ticking off in her head everything that needed doing. Jesus and his disciples were at least 13 people and Martha wanted to be sure everyone had plenty to eat. Perhaps she wanted to assure all had water to wash up from their walking. Maybe she needed to bake bread and dessert. Were there enough clean dishes? She worked herself into a state and then told Jesus what to do! "Tell my sister to help me!"

The very idea. Jesus is the son of God. You do not tell him what to do. Yet sometimes we do. In our prayers, we say, "get me that promotion, make all my children beautiful/handsome, have my daughter marry a rich guy, get me more money, get me a bigger house, get me more power, and on and on." We overlook "thy will be done." Would Jesus say to us, "you worry and fret about so many things"?

The truth is that Martha could have joined Mary at Jesus' feet. At some point, but not that very minute, a meal and accommodations needed to be prepared but Mary and some of the disciples could have worked with Martha. Did it really matter that much what happened right then? True, they could not dash out for a

meal, but Martha let herself miss an opportunity to learn from Jesus because of her anxiety.

Here are a few things we need to remember. Mowing the grass is important but it can wait until after church. The house may need cleaning but spending time talking to our kids about what is troubling them should come first. Preparing a nice meal for our spouse is good but greeting them with a smile can refresh their soul first.

We cannot know what God has in store for us, but I feel certain he would rather hear us ask, "please help me to be the very best person I can be" instead of gimme this and gimme that.

Eye has not seen, and ear has not heard what God has ready for those who love him.

Headed to Yellowstone, Again

Well, my friends, we are doing it again. By the time this column gets to you, my friend Todd Perrin and I will be deep in the wilderness of Yellowstone. As I've prepared my mind, I went back to something I wrote in the aftermath of last year's debacle, and I found this selection. It is appropriate for today, I think...

Someone, someday, will ask this question, I am sure: "As you and your friend walked out of that Yellowstone wilderness, what one lesson above all the others did you carry out with you?"

The lessons are many, and we have only just begun, but here is one such lesson: Whatever you do, and wherever you go, seek with all that is in you that rare peace, a peace that flows like a river stream. That will be the lesson I will want to leave with my own children and grandchildren, perhaps above any.

The Lord provided us a deep look into such peace on our journey. But the peace He shared was more than an abstract idea. It goes far deeper, literally. As you readers know (because many came along step by step as we have retraced the

precarious moments from those six days), the most powerful symbol that emerged from that vast wilderness was the ever-flowing waters of the Snake River.

Ah, I can see the river, now in my mind, carving its signature into that wilderness to give a place of peace amidst all the unknowns pressing from every side. (Ah, can't wait to see that again!)

That river took us to one of the greatest ironies of the journey: Peace came on the most confusing of mornings, the morning Wednesday, July 14, when all doubt about being lost was lifted. We were twenty miles deep into the wilderness, and there was no trail to be found, just an endless expanse of mysterious, unexplored forest.

In the early dawning of that morning, we gathered our backpacks, leaving one backpack behind out of desperation, that we traveled east until we ran into a swamp-like area, then turned back west, having no other alternative. A half of a mile west took us back to the river that we had crossed the evening before.

And we stood there that

morning on one of the many rocky islands that separated the river into separate tributaries, it was almost as if this were the beginning of our journey, not the fourth long, hard day. My friend Todd and I stood in that place, feeling as calm as the little prayer we shared before he went on ahead trying to find a trail, and hope.

It was crossing over into the river once again, with nowhere else to go, that we experienced the most peaceful hour of all. To me, though the reasons are more complex than I can even realize, the best explanation I can give is that it is in just such a place that you realize that you are with God, in His presence, and none other. There is no other communication and no means of contact with anyone in this world.

"The only GPS we'll have," I told my good brother Charles Usery four days earlier at worship in Riverton, Wyo., "will be with the Lord."

I remember his reply well. In his humble, down-home way, he answered with a chuckle, "Well, that's all you need."

Registered voters who moved to McClain County from another county or state must complete a new voter registration application to be eligible to vote in McClain County.

a 21-0966 Intent to File that gives the veteran one year to file a Fully Developed Claim for Benefits and if approved the payment start date is when the Intent to File was done.

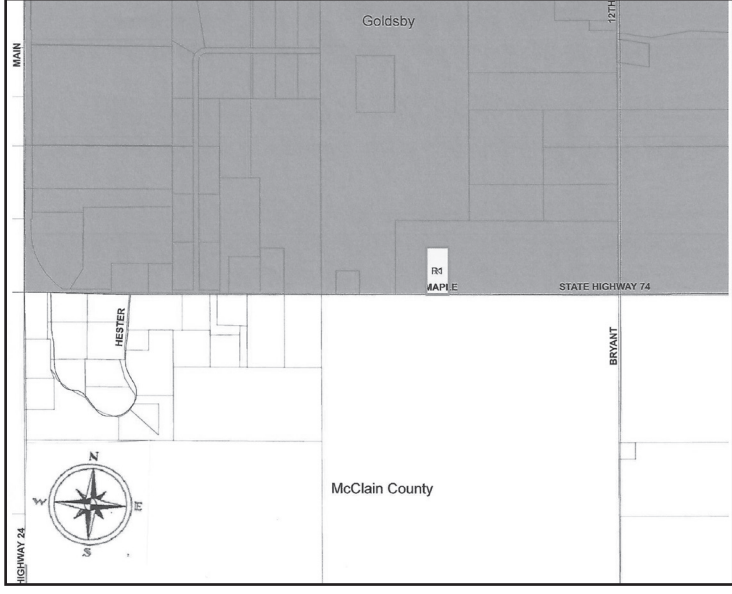
