It required all nine members of the Purcell Water Department plus five members of the Wee Construction Company to repair a 12" water main break at 2nd and Jackson streets overnight Friday and into Saturday morning. The break shut down Purcell's water for over four hours.

Purcell was without water from 5 a.m. Saturday until around 9:20 a.m. Sunday due to a water main break. Low pressure continued after water was restored. But thanks to the ef-

forts of the Purcell Water Department water was restored Saturday morning and pressure was back to normal by Monday morning.

The problem stemmed from not one but two water main breaks.

The main problem was a 12" line that busted at 2nd and Jackson around 8 p.m. Friday due in large part to the extreme heat that rocketed to at least 105 degrees Fahrenheit.

That break was reported by a citizen to the city send-

ing superintendent Michael Minor and his entire nine member team plus a five member outsource team from Wee Construction to the scene.

Increase flower blossoming with a bit of deadheading

Keep your garden looking its best with a bit of deadheading. Allen, Kentucky, mental illness erupts into pure hell

Allen, Kentucky, is a place that holds fond memories for me. When I was only 16 years old, Allen Baptist Church invited me to speak for a weekend youth event. I had the opportunity to meet and work with over a hundred people from the Allen community.

Lasting friendships were made with some of the finest people on earth. To this day, the kindness and fellowship bestowed on me by that group of people were instrumental in my life's direction.

Sadly, even the finest communities and dearest people on earth can experience pure hell. Mental illness erupted as Floyd County police officers were shot dead in Allen last week. According to news reports they were trying to serve a warrant to a man accused of domestic nearly three hours before susviolence.

Floyd County Sheriff John

Four other people were injured at the scene in Allen, a small town of 166 people located just outside of Prestonsburg.

The officers who died in the shooting late on Thursday have been named as Capt. Ralph Frasure, Deputy William Petry and dog handler Jacob Chaffins. K9 Drago, one of the dogs that Mr. Chaffins handled, also died.

Capt. Frasure had been with the Prestonsburg, Kentucky, Police Department for 39 years. The department said he had served "with honor and glory up until the last second,"

The men ran into a barrage of gunfire from a rifle when they went to the house on Main Street shortly before 6.

The shooting continued for pect Lance Storz was taken into custody, having surrendered

He has been charged with two counts of murdering a police officer, five counts of attempted murder of a police officer, one count of attempted murder and one count of first-degree assault on a service animal.

The families and friends of the slain police officers and the wounded officers have been forever changed. The community of Allen will forever be scarred by one of the worst events to ever occur in the state of Kentucky.

Gun violence is not limited to age. An assault rifle in the hands of any mentally deranged person results in tragedy.

Police officers have a scary job. It's no wonder they are nervous and seem sometimes quick to pull their weapons. Floyd county officers walked into a situation and were totally



NEWS FROM CAPITOL HILL A monumental decision

Recently, the United States Supreme Court issued its highly anticipated decision on the Dobbs v. Jackson case. In this decision made in a 6-3 vote, the justices ruled that abortion is not a constitutional right and thus not a federal issue.

This means that the laws made surrounding abortion will go back to each of America's 50 unique states and their voters. Not only is this a monumental win for states' rights, but also the rights of unborn children.

I am hopeful that this decision will mark a turning point in our nation's treatment of the unborn. In fact, before Dobbs, the U.S. was just one of only seven countries worldwide, including North Korea and China, to allow elective abortion after 20 weeks of pregnancy.

And many European countries, including Germany, France, Italy, Spain and Switzerland, have placed restrictions on elective abortions after 14 weeks of gestation.

When becoming a physician, doctors take an oath to "do no harm." However, after just 15 weeks of pregnancy, the only form of abortion is dismemberment. This gruesome and devastating procedure tears a

baby apart limb by limb.

Because of medical and scientific advancements since the Roe v. Wade decision, the policy quickly became outdated. Since then, we have understood the humanity of unborn children better.

Because of modern science, we know that at just 15 weeks, an unborn baby can feel pain, has fully formed fingers and toes, has a fully developed heart pumping 26 quarts of blood per day and much more.

Finally, because of critical medical advancements, the viability of born babies has moved up significantly since 1973 and continues to do so.

Roe v. Wade was an unfortunate instance of judicial activism with no constitutional basis and imposed a one-sizefits-all federal abortion policy. The Dobbs decision will allow Americans to have a discussion and come to a consensus through their elected officials instead of unelected judges and bureaucrats.

Unfortunately, Democrats are seeking to overturn the effect of the ruling and to inhibit states from advancing their policies that reflect their values with respect to life.

June gross receipts of \$1.51 billion are down by 1.5 percent from the same month of last year, but the reduction is due to non-economic factors. The income tax filing deadline in 2021 was moved to June, so collections spiked during that month instead of in April. June 2022 oil and gas production taxes of \$171.2 million are the highest of any single month.

"Inflationary forces are a significant concern for consumers, but Oklahoma's macro economy is benefitting from current energy prices and low unemployment," Treasurer McDaniel said. "Economic activity remains strong as reflected in sales and use tax receipts."

Combined sales and use tax receipts of \$578.1 million in June are up by 10.3 percent from last year. During FY-22, those consumption taxes generated \$5.59 billion, an increase of 13.3 percent.

Due to last year's shift in tax filing deadlines, combined income tax receipts of \$541.2 million in June are down by 23.2 percent this month. For FY-22, income taxes generated \$5.78 billion, up by 8.6 percent.

The record high collections from oil and gas production in June are based on April production when crude oil averaged \$101.78 per barrel in Cushing and natural gas averaged \$6.60 As measured by the Con-

sumer Price Index, the federal Bureau of Labor Statistics reports the annual inflation rate at 8.6 percent in May. The energy component of the index is up

Heat:

Heat exhaustion is the body's response to an excessive loss of water and salt, usually through profuse sweating.

The most likely victims include the elderly, those with high blood pressure and those working in a hot environment.

Symptoms include headache, nausea, dizziness, weakness, irritability, thirst, heavy sweating, elevated body temperature and decreased urine output.

Anyone suffering from heat exhaustion should be taken to a clinic or emergency room for medical evaluation and treatment or call 911

Stay with the stricken person until help arrives. Remove them from the hot area and give them liquids. Removing unnecessary clothing, including shoes and lying down in a cool place and socks. Cool them with cold compresses or have them wash their head, face and neck with cold water. Encourage them to take frequent sips of cool water.

Rhabdomyolysis (rhabdo) is a medical condition associated with heat stress and prolonged physical exertion.

Rhabdo causes the rapid breakdown, rupture and death of muscle, leading to the release of electrolytes and large proteins arms or legs. into the bloodstream.

Keepin mind, though, that victims may also be asymptomatic.

Suspected rhabdo sufferers should stop activity, and drink more liquids, preferably water, and seek immediate care at the nearest medical facility. It is also important to have a blood sample analyzed for creatine kinase.

Heat syncope refers to a fainting episode or dizziness that usually occurs when standing for too long or suddenly standing up after sitting or lying.

Factors that may contribute to heat syncope include dehydration and lack of acclimatization.

Symptoms are fainting (short duration), dizziness and lightheadedness.

First aid calls for sitting or slowly drinking water, clear juice or a sports drink.

Heat cramps usually affect those who sweat a lot during strenuous activity. This depletes the body's salt and moisture levels, which causes cramps.

Be warned, though, heat cramps may also be a symptom of heat exhaustion.

Symptoms of heat cramps include spasms in th abdomen,

Seek medical help if the victim has heart problems, is on a lowsodium diet or if the cramps don't stop within an hour.

Next is heat rash, a skin irritation caused by excessive sweating during hot, humid weather. Heat rash appears as red clusters or small blisters on the neck, upperchest, elbow creases, groin or under the breasts.

fill or want lots of seedlings to perennials. This allows them garden looking its best. to prepare for winter and form seedpods for a bit of winter interest.

Oklahoma now has title-holding law

OTC: It will save time, money

The Oklahoma Tax Commission reported a new law requires all boat, motor and vehicle titles issued after July 1 that are subject to a lien will be sent to lienholders who will hold the title until the lien is satisfied.

1. Tall grass or weeds, junk, trash, debris, inoperable vehicles, and discharging grass clippings into the street.

2. You are responsible for maintaining your property from the edge of the road or curb to the center of the alley. The City will trim the large trees in the alley.

3. Bulk waste pick up is the last Monday of every month. Please do not set bulk waste out until that weekend before the last Monday. (No loose items, no items to exceed 75 pounds, no antifreeze, paint, or batteries, no hazardous materials. No refrigerant compressors. Limbs must be in three-foot bundles).

4. Brush set out to the curb will be picked up with a charge determined by the size. Brush pick up is free in May and October. You may also call and arrange for brush pick up.

OSU EXTENSION News Federal broadband discount still available for Oklahoma households

Thousands of Oklahomans are missing an opportunity to lower their monthly internet bills. The federal government's Affordable Connectivity Program is available to help households pay for internet service, but few have signed up since the program's debut in December 2021.

The \$14.2 billion Affordable Connectivity Program is a continuation of the Federal Communications Commission's Emergency Broadband Benefit, which launched in April 2020 to help millions afford internet access during the pandemic.

"We were a top five participant in the precursor program, but now Oklahoma ranks about 20th in Affordable Connectivity Program registrations," said Brian Whitacre, Oklahoma State University Extension rural development specialist. "Other states have put more effort and money into the digital equity movement, and we're behind."

Whitacre's research shows that of the total 1.5 million households in Oklahoma, only 175,000 are currently participating in the Affordable Connectivity Program. More than 400,000 additional households are eligible for the discount, including 273,000 with no active broadband subscription or cellular data plan. This translates to only a 35 percent participation rate among eligible households. Other states like Ohio, Louisiana and Kentucky have closer to 50 percent participation.

Identification of poison ivy is key in preventing exposures

An expert in disguise, poison encounter it.

ivy may often be mistaken for a weed growing along your back fence, near a pathway at your local park, or deep in the woods. Knowing what poison ivy looks like is key to preventing exposures.

According to Scott Schaeffer, managing director of the Oklahoma Center for Poison and Drug Information (OCPDI), "Poison ivy may look different depending on the time of year. The plant has three leaflets that are all on the same stem, but in early spring it may look like a small shrub and then later begin to make a vine. During summer months, the leaves are green, but they turn red in the fall and have white berries."

An exposure starts with itching, then a red rash, and then blisters. These symptoms of poison ivy, poison oak, and poison sumac can emerge any time from a few hours to several days after exposure to the plant oil, called urushiol.

This oil is found in the sap

Because the plant oil can attach to skin within minutes, immediate action is best if you know you have been exposed. Washing may not stop the rash if more than 15 minutes have passed, but it can help stop further spreading.

Contact with or breathing the smoke from burning poison ivy can cause a reaction. Do not burn poison ivy plants.

If you have been exposed to poison ivy:

• Wash exposed area with cool water and a grease-cutting dishwashing soap. Regular bar soap does not remove the oil and can spread the oil to other parts of the body.

• Wash clothes with regular laundry soap. With alcohol and water, wipe off shoes, tools and anything else that may have been in contact with the oil. Be sure to wear gloves or cover your hands while performing this task and then discard the hand coverings.

• The rash is not improving within a few weeks.

• You have difficulty breathing. Pharmacists and registered nurses at the poison center are available 24 hours a day, seven days a week at (800) 222-1222. Please do not email the poison center or a member of the poison center staff, as poisoning emergencies are not managed through email.



Still, officers can be lured

"Here, what you are is what you are," Elmore said.

However, city manager Dale Bunn added Purcell offers training in crisis intervention and "knowing how to talk down a situation."

Fielding an officer with that training is a staple on every shift, he added.

Elmore said the department casts a wide net when recruiting, utilizing social media such as Facebook, Twitter and Instagram.

In addition, he has visited the academies in person to introduce cadets to what Purcell has to offer.

"The last round, we went to Moore-Norman (Technology Center) and spoke to the students," he said. "That's how we got the two we just hired."

Elmore said the activity numbers will climb as the new hires complete all of their training.

Until then with inflation being what it is, there's a hidden blessing for the department's budget.

In the first six months of 2022, the police drove just 7,575 miles and issued only 183 citations.

During the same period in 2019, the mileage total was 107,803 miles and police issued 938 citations.

Granted, the pandemic in 2020 and 2021 may have set a few brakes on police travel.

But officers still racked up 96,107 and 94,265 miles, respectively, in the first half of those years.

July 17, 2022 is the sixteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time. During Ordinary Time, the Gospel focuses on the teachings and miracles of Christ during his time on earth.

The Gospel reading, Luke 10:38-42, concerns sisters Martha and Mary. Jesus was visiting and Mary was sitting at Jesus' feet while Martha was preparing food for Jesus and his companions. Exasperated, Martha asks Jesus if he has not noticed that she, Martha, is working herself half to death while Mary is just sitting there.

She tells Jesus, "Please tell her to help me." 41 But the Lord answered, 'Martha, Martha,'he said, 'you worry and fret about so many things, 42 and yet few are needed, indeed only one. It is Mary who has chosen the better part, and it is not to be taken from her.'

Are you like Martha? Sometimes the busyness of getting everything done just so seems overwhelming. When my children are coming to visit, I clean the house like the Queen of England is coming. The truth is the kids are coming to see us and not the house. If they can get in the door and sit down, does it really matter that I did not dust and vacuum every speck?

I suspect Martha was ticking off in her head everything that needed doing. Jesus and his disciples were at least 13 people and Martha wanted to be sure everyone had plenty to eat. 
That river took us to one


