Service is back to normal after two huge main breaks

Back in business

After several nights of running pumps on Purcell's 15 water wells, tanks have been replenished after the water main breaks of a week ago.

Water service is back to normal.

Purcell City Manager Dale Bunn has announced Purcell Public Works Customers can resume normal water use thanks to their cooperation last week in cutting back water use during the refilling of tanks

after a pair of major water main breaks.

"Following two consecutive water main breaks a week ago, one of which was prolonged because it was in a naturally wet area of Walnut Creek, the considerate customers who understood a short-term deprivation would probably avoid mandatory restrictions from be-

ing applied, we are grateful to them," Bunn said.

Purcell's Splash Pad reopened Monday after storage tanks were returned to normal levels.

Bunn estimated the city lost a million gallons of water with the two breaks.

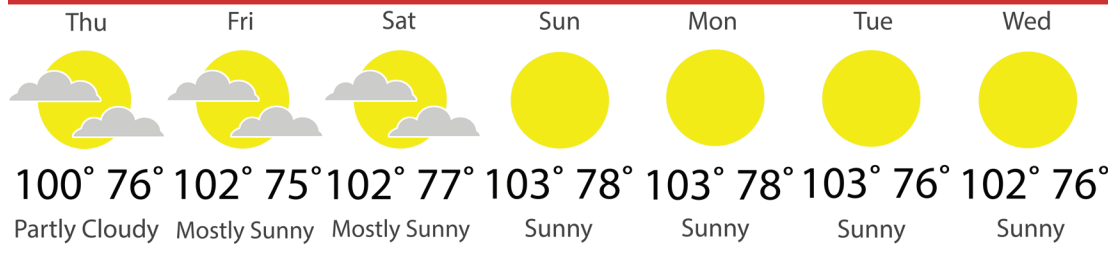

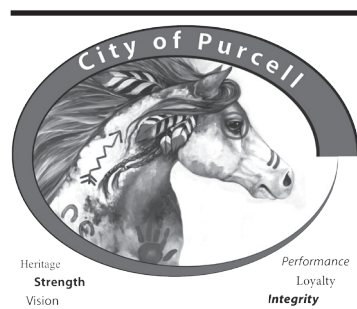
Rulings favored state in 15 cases

On June 30 the U.S. Supreme Court issued its final opinions for the 2021-22 term – a year in which Oklahoma Attorney General John O'Connor said the state enjoyed overwhelming success protecting Oklahomans and their constitutional rights.

SCOTUS issued 66 formal opinions this term. O'Connor's office participated in 21 of the 66 cases, winning 15.

Among the wins were a ruling that Oklahoma may prosecute non-Indian offenders in eastern Oklahoma. Another struck down the Environmental Protection Agency's attempt to radically restructure the nation's power grids, action that would have harmed the oil and gas industry. And the third prevented the Occupational Safety and Health Administration's implementation of a vaccine mandate affecting 84 million American workers.

Oklahoma contributed to victories in an additional 12 cases as an amicus ("friend of the court"), providing arguments and legal authorities. This included the historic overturning of Roe v.

Waiver program ending for schools

NEWS FROM CAPITOL HILL

Realizing America's National Defense Needs

Last week, the U.S. House of Representatives passed its version of the National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) for fiscal year 2023.

Indeed, authorizing and then appropriating funding for our national defense is of the greatest importance to our nation and to the world, and I am proud of the consensus reached and bipartisan cooperation that marked the authorization process in the House.

While President Biden's first two budgets demonstrate that he wants to continue the chronic underfunding of the Obama-Biden years, the House NDAA rejects such a misguided approach and sets the stage to adequately fund our defense needs.

It calls for spending \$850 billion on defense in fiscal year 2023, which represents a 7 percent increase over the previous year and a \$37 billion increase over the president's budget request. This increase would also support ongoing missions at the Fourth District's Tinker Air Force Base in Midwest City

and Fort Sill in Lawton.

The bill also includes a surely deserved 4.6 percent pay raise for our service members and authorizes funding to provide additional support to offset the inflation caused by the Biden Administration's disastrous economic policies.

Furthermore, it ensures that we would have funding to build 13 new battle fleet ships and would only retire 12 ships, thus continuing progress toward the goal of a 350-ship strong Navy. It also provides appropriate investments in modern technologies and new weapons systems, which would improve our warfighting capabilities into the 21st century.

At a time when we are witnessing continued strife on the international stage, it is more important than ever that Congress speaks with a unified voice when setting defense policy and funding priorities.

From Russia's invasion of Ukraine, the Taliban's takeover of Afghanistan and communist China's ongoing aggression in Asia and the Pacific Rim, America's adversaries are becoming emboldened. It is the

responsibility of Congress to act to set appropriate defense policies to ensure these aggressive actors are countered and deterred and our allies receive the support they need.

This NDAA keeps the United States on track to counter our adversaries and their threats.

Indeed, this year's House version of the NDAA exemplifies what we can accomplish when both parties put partisan differences aside and work across the aisle together. For 61 years, the NDAA has become law with broad bipartisan and bicameral support, which is a true testament to what we can achieve when we focus on our shared goals as a nation and realize the needs of our national defense.

It's worth noting that the House Armed Services Committee reported the bill passed in the House with only a single vote against it, which demonstrates the kind of consensus and the resulting bipartisan product possible because of a process that ensured all voices were heard and all ideas were

Big Tech steamrolling America's newspapers

Google and Facebook have enormous economic and political power in society—especially over the news industry. Many ask if they have played a role in the misinformation that erodes our free press and plagues our democracy.

Google and Facebook have a duopoly of the distribution of digital news content, which drives people to their platforms where they make money.

The platforms hoard critical data and use clever tactics, like reframing stories in rich previews, to keep users on their sites—siphoning off the advertising revenue that small and local publishers need and weakening their ability to be rewarded for their own content.

Google and Facebook generated \$4 million in U.S. advertising revenue every 15 minutes during the first quarter of 2022. That amount could fund hundreds of local journalists in every state in the country.

It's no wonder that, despite record news consumption, local newspapers across the country

have seen diminished revenues—leading many to lay off journalists or go out of business.

Local newspapers simply can't compete with these national platforms, Google and Facebook. The imbalance of power between these platforms and local newspapers—let alone any single local paper—is so vast that newspapers cannot negotiate the exploitation of news.

But antitrust laws shield Google and Facebook from the possibility of news publishers working together to demand better terms.

No company should have this much control over the news. Congress must take action to curb undue influence of Big Tech on the news media industry—and the Journalism Competition and Preservation Act (JCPA) aims to do just that.

The JCPA is specifically designed to address Google's and Facebook's anticompetitive practices. The proposed legislation would provide a temporary, limited antitrust safe harbor for small and local news publishers to collectively negotiate with Facebook and Google for fair compensation for the use of their content.

Brittney Griner - Let's all stay out of Russia

Brittney Griner is an American basketball star on trial in a courtroom outside of Moscow. She is a prisoner of Russia and is facing a possible prison sentence on drug charges.

Griner recently pled guilty after Russian authorities accused her of having a vape cartridge with hashish oil in her luggage at an airport near Moscow on February 17, 2022.

The guilty plea could potentially accelerate her case's conclusion, clearing a path for either a deal with the United States to free her or, perhaps, a request for clemency.

The harshest outcome could be a 10-year sentence in a Russian penal colony despite the contention by Griner's lawyers that she packed the smoking cartridges by mistake.

Brittney Griner is an American professional basketball player for the Phoenix Mercury of the Women's National Basketball Association, WNBA. She played College basketball for the Baylor Lady Bears in Waco Texas.

She is the only NCAA bas-

ketball player to both score 2,000 points and block 500 shots. In 2012, the three-time All American was named the AP Player of the Year and the Most Outstanding Player of the Final Four.

In 2009, Griner was named the nation's No. 1 high school women's basketball player by Rivals.com. In 2013, Griner signed an endorsement deal with Nike. She is 6 ft 9 inches tall and wears a men's U.S. size 17 shoe.

Griner was on the United States women's Olympic team in 2016, and led them to victory at the Rio Olympics. In 2020, Griner protested the Star-Spangled Banner and stated she wouldn't be on the court while the national anthem was played during game openers.

In 2021, Griner was named to the United States women's national team for the 2020 Olympics where she won her second gold medal. (Wikipedia)

Griner is one of 11 women to receive an Olympic gold medal, an NCAA championship, a FIBA World Cup gold medal and a WNBA championship.

In February 2022, Griner was detained by Russian Customs after cartridges containing hashish was found in her luggage. She had been entering Russia to play with the Russia Premier League during the WNBA offseason. Her trial began on July 1, and she pled guilty to the charges.

Paul Whelan is another American citizen currently held as a prisoner in Russia. On June 15, 2020 he received a 16-year prison sentence with the possibility of time in a labor camp. He is described as a corporate security director.

There is conversation that a prisoner swap could be a possibility for freeing Griner and Whelan. Most Americans are not excited about releasing a dangerous criminal.

However, we are prayerful that something will be worked out for Griner and Whelan's release.

I would hope all Americans might consider staying out of Russia. The prospects of any financial reward or seeing new geography are not worth the consequences.

Convention Center. Our Legislature hosted members from 14 other states and worked together to share policy concerns and solutions for issues facing this region of the country.

I also was blessed by the story of Oklahoma's own, Kelli Masters, who was the first professional female sports agent to sign a first round NFL pick in 2010. It was surprising how similar my story of running for office mirrored the challenges she faced in her male-dominated profession.

She has truly paved the way for women across our country. My only hope is I can also inspire women to reach every goal they set in life, no matter what barriers they face.

Among our meetings, we learned how other state legislators are tackling various issues common in Oklahoma. Hopefully, we can implement some of those policies here.

I was selected to represent Oklahoma, along with some of my legislative colleagues, on the Health and Public Safety Committee, where we discussed issues such as the mental health of first responders, substance abuse, and long-term care.

My husband was the co-coordinator of the SLC Youth Program and enjoyed working with volunteers from across Oklahoma to show the out-of-state kids all our beautiful city has to offer.

Students new to the district must bring a birth certificate and a current immunization record in addition to a current proof of residence.

A current utility bill with parent or guardian's name and physical address is the most efficient way to establish residence.

Lease agreements or housing contracts are also acceptable. General mail will not be accepted as proof of residence. Parent or guardian will also be required to provide a copy of a photo ID or driver license.

Children who will be 4 years of age prior to September 1, 2022 are eligible for enrollment in pre-k.

Students who will be 5 before Sept. 1, 2022 are eligible for enrollment in kindergarten.

Open House will be held on Monday, August 8, from 5-7 p.m.

Classes will begin Thursday, August 11, at 8 a.m.

By addressing Google's and Facebook's monopoly power and ensuring more subscription and advertising dollars flow back to publishers, the JCPA not only protects and promotes quality news, but also encourages competition.

In today's partisan political climate, it is rare for Democrats and Republicans to agree on anything – but the JCPA is one important exception.

Members of Congress on both sides of the aisle agree: we need to pass the JCPA to ensure that publishers – especially small and local publishers – are treated fairly and can serve their communities.

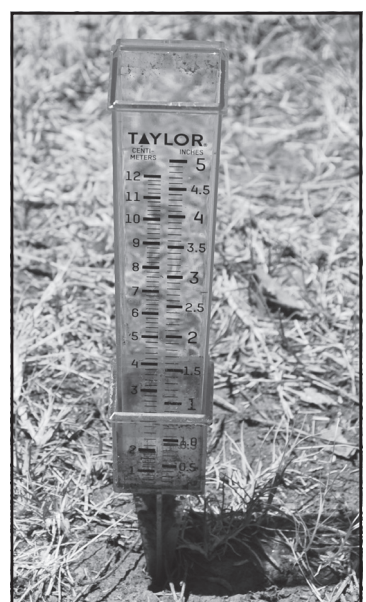

Burn Permit Regulations within the City Limits

- You must obtain a burn permit before you burn within the city limits.
- The site must be inspected by someone from the fire department before a permit will be issued.
- You are only allowed to burn brush – No trash, lumber, tires, or any other materials.
- Burn piles must remain small. Away from any structures, not under power lines or around any other hazards.
- Weather conditions will be taken into consideration before permit will be issued.
- The fire department has the right to deny the permit if they determine it will not be safe.
- All fires must be attended to at all times.
- If fire gets out of control, you can be held liable for any damages that occur and can be billed accordingly.

Vision, determination sparked Chickasaw Cultural Center

More than 883,000 people from around the world have visited the Chickasaw Cultural Center since it first opened July 24, 2010.

The vision for the Chickasaw Cultural Center was put in motion many decades ago as a group of like-minded people worked toward one mission: Plan a cultural home for Chickasaw people and share the rich culture, language, history, traditions and the arts of the tribe with the world.

As early as 1963, the **Daily Ardmoreite**, a newspaper in Ardmore, published a front-page article suggesting it was time for a cultural center for Chickasaw people, Chickasaw Nation Governor Bill Anoatubby said during the 2010 opening of the Chickasaw Cultural Center, in Sulphur.

“A place where there would be a village, a place where people can go and learn more about the great Chickasaw people,” Governor Anoatubby said.

The 184-acre campus of the Chickasaw Cultural Center is a reflection of those initial goals. It took a unified effort among the Chickasaw Nation, National Park Service, the local community and a literal act of Congress to make the center a reality.

Built on the determination and vision of the Chickasaw people, each aspect, from water features to the architecture, was integrated into the center because of its cultural significance.

In the late 1970s, establishing a cultural hub was a priority. A 1979 issue of the Chickasaw Times noted a key project for planning department staff was “to work with the newly formed cultural committee in locating funding for a Chickasaw Cultural Center. Key attraction for the proposed center will be a museum reflecting the rich heritage of the Chickasaw people.”

Eventually, a space above a gym on the Chickasaw Nation Headquarters campus in Ada was reserved as a temporary cultural center, but the consistent urging from the Chickasaw people for a dedicated place to celebrate and share the Chickasaw story kept the project alive.

Following Governor Anoatubby’s 1987 election, development of a cultural center remained a top priority as long-term goals of economic development and self-sufficiency, including the preservation of Chickasaw culture, history and language, were established.

“It has always been one of Governor Anoatubby’s goals to build a Chickasaw Nation tourism program, especially in the Sulphur area. The Cultural Center was part of the plan from the beginning,” Jeannie Barbour, Chickasaw Nation

Director of Creative Development, said.

“My role was to attend the community meetings and take note of what people wanted to see in a cultural center,” she said.

“We handed out index cards and asked attendees to write down what they thought would be an important part of a cultural center. Everyone was invited whether Chickasaw or not.”

Ms. Barbour recalls the most requested features included a living village, a museum with interactive exhibits, an event venue, a water feature and a place for traditional food preparation.

“Above all, they wanted to show that Chickasaws were a living, breathing people, not just a dusty exhibit behind a glass case,” Ms. Barbour, a Chickasaw citizen, said.

A long-range initiative to build a place combining Chickasaw history and culture with tourism opportunities was launched in 1988.

Traveling to Washington, D.C., Governor Anoatubby secured Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) funding for a feasibility study with the goal of building a cultural center in the Sulphur area, Ms. Barbour said.

The original idea was modified a bit during this time when discussion of a theme park was explored.

A Price Waterhouse study to determine the feasibility of a First American/Chickasaw theme park in the Arbuckle Mountains was conducted. Responses from Chickasaw citizens, local community partners, and Chickasaw National Recreation Area (CNRA) and National Park Service (NPS) staff were included in the feasibility study.

But the results indicated the population of Oklahoma’s third smallest county was not robust enough to support and sustain a theme park, said Lona Barrick, executive officer, Chickasaw Nation cultural tourism.

Ms. Barrick served as general manager of the Chickasaw Motor Inn, Sulphur, in the late 80s and early 90s, where many strategic planning meetings

for the cultural center were conducted. The Chickasaw Motor Inn, purchased by the Chickasaw Nation in 1972, was the tribe’s first business.

During the numerous meetings Chickasaw citizens, tribal legislators, Governor Anoatubby’s staff, tribal enterprises, economic development and national park officials attended and were able to share their vision of a cultural center, she said.

“But the emphasis was in hearing and learning what was important to Chickasaw citizens. When Chickasaw citizens were asked about the purpose of a cultural center, or what they would like to accomplish, the response was, ‘We want to tell our story,’ and ‘We want a place where all Chickasaws can come and learn about our history and culture,’ as well as ‘We want a place to share our story with everyone, with the world,’” Ms. Barrick said.

Progress was made in December 1989 when a collaboration was inked between the Chickasaw Nation and the National Park Service to develop a tribal cultural center in the area.

The project’s focus was refined and narrowed when the Chickasaw Historical Society (CHS) was established by tribal law in 1994, and a Chickasaw Cultural committee was formed under the umbrella of the Chickasaw Foundation. Governor Anoatubby appointed members to this new committee, who were confirmed by the tribal legislature.

A major development in the project occurred in October 2000, when more than 1,200 Chickasaw citizens responded to a survey, which solicited comments and suggestions regarding a Chickasaw Cultural Center. Art and music, food and medicine, exhibits featuring prominent Chickasaw people and a living village with traditional dwellings were all mentioned by survey respondents.

Chickasaws participated in subsequent planning meetings and shared their ideas about

Chickasaw Nation Dance Troupe keeps the community stomp dancing this summer

The Chickasaw Nation Dance Troupe is offering stomp dance classes at various locations this summer for the whole family. Participants can learn the cultural tradition of stomp dancing from cultural specialists of the Chickasaw Nation Department of Cultural Resources.

“We have been doing these classes for years, but they had to go on hold for a couple of years due to COVID-19. But the first class we had this summer had around 30 people, and the second one had 50, so they are picking up fast,” said Jesse Lindsey, cultural resources activities manager.

Stomp dancing is essential to Chickasaw culture. This tradition is kept at special events, including celebrations like the Three Sisters Celebration and Chikasha Ittafama (Chickasaw Reunion).

“Governor Anoatubby wanted us to teach these classes,” Lindsey said. “Stomp dancing is very important to the Chickasaw Nation, so we have to teach our young ones, make sure they get it down and keep it going.”

The classes are for all levels

of dancers. Some participants have been going to the classes since they started, but many are new to stomp dancing.

“We have kids as young as two or three who get up to dance with us, even if they are holding their mother’s hand. And then there are some kids who grew up taking these classes every year,” Lindsey said.

The dance troupe dances at the Chickasaw Cultural Center in Sulphur, Oklahoma, regularly. They also represent the Chickasaw Nation at various events and ceremonies, including the Gallup Intertribal Indian Ceremonial, among many others.

“The youth are always ready to help us out,” Lindsey said. “We recently had a few go to the Artesian Hotel in Sulphur for the Artesian Arts Festival this summer. We are proud of the youth for coming so far.”

As part of Chickasaw matrilineal culture, women keep the rhythm of the song with shakers on their legs. They use turtle shell, deer toe or even milk can shakers.

The men traditionally sing

in a call-and-response format during the dance.

“We always start the young girls with two cans, and they add more as they get bigger. The boys start singing with us when they get old enough, too,” Lindsey said.

There are many different types of stomp dances with unique techniques.

Social dances often have animal-themed names, like the snake dance and the raccoon dance.

The snake dance, for example, has dancers hold hands while they curve around like a snake. This is one of the oldest-known Chickasaw dances and has been passed on for many generations. It is a social dance, representing friendship.

Upcoming classes are open to the public at no cost and will be offered July 26 at the Ardmore Chickasaw Nation Community Center and July 28 at the Ada Chickasaw Nation Community Center. All classes will be from 6-8 p.m.

Glance-N-Go app the best tool for aphid infestation

Summertime equals aphid season for Oklahoma producers, but Oklahoma State University Ag Research and Extension specialists are here to help.

Although many of today’s crop varieties are resistant to sugarcane aphids, it’s still important to keep an eye out for these little green sorghum lovers. Tom Royer, OSU integrated pest management coordinator, said the best way to combat aphids is to use the Glance-N-Go app developed by OSU scientists several years ago.

It helps producers determine if a grain sorghum field needs to be treated with insecticide from an infestation of aphids by sampling two leaves from each of three select plants at a sample location.

“It’s backed by research,” Royer said of the app. “It’s simple system to use, and it saves a lot of time with sampling. We only want fields to be treated if they need to be, and we want to save a scout or

producer time.”

Producers enter into the app the estimated cost to treat the field for aphid infestation and the price they hope to get for their crop. Then they collect samples of the crop until the app tells them whether they should treat or not treat for aphid infestation.

“You’re not counting aphids; you’re determining whether a particular plant has on its two leaves 50 or more aphids. If it’s 50 or more, it’s infested,”

Royer said.

The Glance-N-Go app is available to download for free on the Apple and Google Play stores.

Aphids aren’t the only problem in Oklahoma crops this summer with some new insect visitors arriving on the scene.

“We’re always concerned about grain sorghum pests, but I’ve also seen some issues

how to implement these ideas into a facility.

A newly formed Chickasaw Foundation Board of Trustees Cultural Center Advisory Committee, comprised of Chickasaw citizens, national park officials and community leaders, met for the first time Dec. 7, 2000, at Chickasaw National Recreation Area.

Working together, land near Rock Creek in the Chickasaw National Recreation Area was identified as the preferred building site for the Chickasaw Cultural Center.

In what was referred to as a "land swap," the National Park Service agreed to donate the tract of land in exchange for a tract of land owned by the city of Sulphur. The city donated the tract to the Chickasaw Nation, which conveyed the land to the National Park Service. Because of the boundaries of the national recreation area would be revised, the land swap had to be approved by the U. S. House of Represent-

tatives.

Ground was broken Sept. 30, 2004, just two days after the U.S. House passed the Chickasaw National Recreation Area Land Exchange Act of 2004, authorizing the land exchange among the Chickasaw Nation, the city of Sulphur and the National Park Service.

Today, the Chickasaw Cultural Center is a thriving campus that remains dedicated to the wishes set forth many years ago by Chickasaw citizens, Valorie Walters, under secretary, Chickasaw Nation culture and humanities, said.

"The cultural center is a special and beautiful place that provides opportunities for our citizens and others to embrace and share our unique culture through various avenues," she said.

Aphid:

in soybean fields this year," Royer said.

Many pests, such as grasshoppers, love hot weather, so other new pests have popped up recently. Head worms and aphids have been reported since 2014, said Royer, but added to the mix this year are false chinch bugs in soybean fields. He said the new pest was primarily a problem for producers who did not exercise weed control before planting.

"Those are things that need to be watched, so you need to get out into your crops and pay attention to what's going on," Royer said. "False chinch bugs tend to congregate in spotty crowds."

Young soybean seedlings are at risk when large numbers of chinch bugs are attacking the plants. Producers can often spot-spray the insect swarms with an insecticide, such as bifenthrin. When they become adults, chinch bugs will likely fly away.

"I've even heard about roly-polies getting into soybeans, and that's a new one on me," Royer said. "Someone called

me this year and said they had issues with those bugs coming in and taking out some of their stands."

Once soybean plants have matured, roly-polies cannot affect the crop, but they can damage the plants as seedlings by chewing on them. Royer said since they are an uncommon problem, there is not much research-based information on how to control them, but current weather conditions will likely

kill many of these bugs because they do not do well in hot, dry conditions.

"If a problem is significant and persistent, products containing lambda-cyhalothrin, bifenthrin, zeta-cypermethrin or some combination of those products should work," Royer said. "I would suggest using as much water carrier as possible and perhaps apply in the evening to prolong the life of the insecticide."

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Managing garden pests with pollinators

Every garden season is filled with beautiful and tasty surprises along with a few challenges. One challenge gardeners face each year is managing insect pests while keeping the pollinators safe.

Fortunately, only a very small percent of insects in our landscapes are harmful. The rest help pollinate plants, feed upon or parasitize bad insects, or help decompose plant debris.

Proper identification of the plant-damaging culprit is the first step in managing problems. Often the insect that is most visible is not the one causing the damage.

You can find lots of helpful information and images online. Look for websites hosted by your local University, extension service or botanical garden. They often provide timely tips on pests in your area.

Once identified, you will need to decide if control is needed. Some insect damage is just cosmetic meaning the plant's health and longevity are not adversely affected it just looks bad.

In these cases, control is for us not the health of our plants. Consider tolerating the damage and masking it with nearby plantings or garden art.

In other cases, the damage is done, and the insect is no longer present. Revenge spraying may make you feel better but does nothing to fix the problem.

Make a note on next year's calendar to watch for and manage the pest if you feel control

is really needed. Finding pest problems early makes hand removal easier and may be all that is needed.

Often when we see the damage on our plants, control will not help. Many galls, unusual growths on plants, are caused by insect feeding. When we see the gall, the insect is either safely living inside the gall or it has fled to complete another stage of its life.

At that point, control will not work and in most cases, this is a cosmetic issue and control is not needed.

Work with nature to help manage pest problems. By tolerating some damage, you provide the food that attracts nature's pest controllers to the garden. Watch for aphid eating lady beetles and green lacewings that eat hundreds of these pests each day.

Invite songbirds to your landscape with seed and berry producing plants and a clean, fresh source of water. Ninety-six percent of terrestrial birds feed their young insects.

And then there are those non-stinging, parasitizing wasps that lay their eggs in other insects. When the eggs hatch the young feed on the host. Avoid pesticides and provide water and shelter to attract and support insect eating toads and frogs.

Enlist help from the youngsters in your life. Try the pluck, drop, and stomp method. Teach your young gardeners to identify problem insects, pick them off the plants by hand, drop them

to the ground and stomp. What a great way to teach kids about nature and help them burn off some of their excess energy.

Handpicking or knocking insects like Japanese beetles into a can of soapy water is a great way to manage small populations of pests.

A fellow horticulturist uses a small hand vacuum to capture Japanese beetles. Just be sure to empty the insect filled vacuum contents into a can of soapy water before storing.

If you decide you need to lend nature a hand managing garden pests, look for more ecofriendly options. Barriers of floating row covers—fabrics that allow air, light, and water through—can keep cabbage worms, onion maggots, Japanese beetles, and some other insects from laying their eggs on their favorite plants.

Cover the plants with the fabric at planting, anchor the edges and leave enough slack for plants to grow. No construction is needed.

Covering squash plants at planting until flowering begins can help reduce the risk of squash bugs and squash vine borers.

Covering cucumbers at planting until 10 days after flowering begins helps reduce the risk of cucumber beetles infecting these plants with the bacteria that causes wilt. The row covers also prevent birds from dining on the seeds and seedlings.

Cover late plantings of susceptible plants as needed this season. Then make a note on

next year's calendar to enlist this method for controlling these types of pests for your first planting next year.

Enlist the help of the naturally occurring soil bacteria *Bacillus thuringiensis* (Bt) to protect plants from certain pests. Different strains of this bacteria control different insects.

Bt kurstaki only kills true caterpillars. Using this on members of the cabbage family won't harm other butterflies since these plants only attract the cabbage worm moths. Bt galleriae will control Japanese and other beetles.

Use a strong blast of water to dislodge mites and aphids. These pests suck plant juices and secrete a clear sticky substance called honeydew.

Extensive feeding can cause distorted growth, speckling, yellowing, and browning of the leaves.

If more control is needed, look for help from one of the organic contact insecticides like Summit Year-Round Spray Oil, a lightweight horticulture oil. These products kill the insects they contact but leave no residue on the plants that can harm beneficial insects that visit the plants later.

Whenever using any product, even natural and organic, be sure to read and follow label directions. This will ensure the best control and least negative impact on beneficial insects and the environment.

 WHEREAS, the Mayor of the Town of Goldsby has determined from evidence presented to him by the Public Works Director of the municipal water system that the Municipal Water System will become unable to supply the commercial and domestic need of the users thereof, including adequate fire protection; if usage continues at present volumes; and

WHEREAS, it appears that continued usage at present volumes creates an immediate threat to public health or safety; and

WHEREAS, it appears that the immediate threat to public health and safety can be mitigated by reasonable temporary restrictions on the use of water from the municipal water system;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Glenn Berglan, Mayor of the Town of Goldsby, Oklahoma, do hereby:

1. Proclaim and declare that an emergency exists whereby the municipal water system is unable to supply the commercial and domestic need of the users thereof, including adequate fire protection; if usage continues at present volumes.

2. Proclaim and declare that the emergency so reduces the availability of water and water pressure as to create an immediate threat to public health and safety if usage continues at present volumes.

3. Call upon all customers and users of the municipal water system to reduce water usage by following sound water conservation measures and practices.

4. Order that, except as specifically allowed in Section 4.f. and 4.g. below, use of water from the municipal water system shall be restricted by prohibiting the following uses not essential to public health and safety:
 a. Watering lawns or grounds by use of any water from the municipal water system;
 b. Outdoor landscape watering or irrigation by use of any water from the municipal water system; provided that this prohibition does

not apply to containerized plants and commercial plant stock in trade;

c. Hosing or washing sidewalks, driveways, parking areas, other paved surfaces by use of any water from the municipal water system;

d. Hosing or washing down the exteriors of buildings by use of any water from the municipal water system;

e. Filling or refilling a swimming pool, pond or fountain by use of any water from the municipal water system;

f. On even numbered calendar days between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. and again between the hours of 7:00 p.m. and 11:00 p.m. the foregoing prohibitions do not apply to properties having a street address ending in an even number, and

g. On odd numbered calendar days between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. and again between the hours of 7:00 p.m. and 11:00 p.m. the foregoing prohibitions do not apply to properties having a street address ending in an odd number.

5. Order that this proclamation be posted in ten (10) prominent public places within the Town of Goldsby and that telephonic notice of this proclamation be given through the municipal emergency and non-emergency mass notification call out system.

6. Proclaim that the foregoing orders shall be in full force and effect immediately upon the posting of notice and implementation of telephonic notice through the municipal emergency and non-emergency mass notification call out system.

7. Order that this Proclamation be published in a newspaper of general circulation.

8. Proclaim that the Code Compliance Officer of the Town is hereby authorized and directed to enforce this Proclamation.

9. Give notice that each violation of Goldsby's Water Shortages ordinance is an offense punishable by fine as set forth in the Water Shortages ordinance.

Leo Leonard Witzke

Leo Leonard Witzke passed peacefully, without fear or pain, July 15, 2022, at his home in Purcell, with his wife by his side, at the age of 86 years 3 months 23 days. Leo blew into this world on March 23, 1936, in the middle of a giant dust storm. He was born at home in Bessie, Oklahoma, to Leonard and Miriam (Kiehn) Witzke. He was the fifth of what would ultimately be six children in the family. When Leo was about four years old, the family moved to Turpin, Oklahoma, where Leo attended school. He was the starting center on Turpin's first ever (6 man) football team. He was a member of the State Runner-Up Turpin High School Basketball team. Following graduation from Turpin High School in 1954, he attended a semester at SWOSU in Weatherford.

On August 27, 1955, Leo married Isabel Neese. Since he was not yet "of age", his mother had to stand up for him, a fact that Isabel never let him live down. Leo was inducted into the United States Army, where he was trained as a Chemical Weapons Specialist. He spent time in Utah, New Mexico, and Germany. His security clearance prevented him from ever telling too many stories, although he let tales slip of accidentally gassing herds of goats at White Sands Missile Range during missile tests. Also, his bare skin corroded metal watch bands, and his body stopped watches, his whole life.

After his honorable discharge, he soon became employed by the United States Postal Service. Leo was a letter carrier in Liberal, Kan., for 34 years, and carried mail in all parts of town, almost exclusively on foot, walking 15 miles a day, carrying a 50 lb. mail bag. He was universally loved and respected by his patrons, no matter what "side" of town he served. Leo was always sure to check in on his elderly patrons; shared coffee or a cool drink and conversation; always carried extra stamps for the shut-ins; would go on his "off" days to check for packages or letters his patrons were expecting; and was rumored to punt overly aggressive ankle biting dogs across the yard, when the need arose. In the early days of his Postal Service career, Leo also worked at least one, usually two, part-time jobs to support his family; but he always found time to be a little league coach.

After the passing of Isabel in December 1969, he met Patricia Ann (Newby) Barbee. Following a 28-day whirlwind long-distance romance, Leo and Patricia married on June 12, 1970. A family of seven souls was instantly born. The family ultimately moved to a 25 acre spread outside of Liberal. Leo proudly watched all his children grow up and pursue their own lives and interests. He and Patricia adamantly supported whatever activities, sports or other adventures in which his children participated.

In 1991, Leo retired from the Post Office, at the same time Patricia graduated from Nursing School with her RN Degree. They moved to Purcell, where Leo began a career as part-time grocery sacker at United Food Store, and full-time gentleman golfer. He and Patricia faithfully attended churches in the Purcell area; with Landmark Church in Purcell being their church home for the past many years. Leo was a man of deep and devout faith; but he practiced that faith quietly and without fanfare. He had a deep place in his heart for those who were down on their luck, or who needed help. Leo took to heart Christ's admonition: "Truly, I say to you, as you did it to one of the least of these my brothers, you did it to me."

He was forever picking up hitch-hikers; feeding, giving drink, and giving rides to those he found walking down the street; stopped to help stranded motorists; stopped to help people sitting by the side of the street or in the park who just "looked like" they were in distress; worked in food pantries; took meals to people living under bridges in OKC; quietly provided Christmas presents and meals to families who had none; and helped persons or families in the community as he could. Leo never asked if anyone was "legal"; did not ask their politics, lifestyle or religion; did not judge them by their skin color or clothing.

He asked the simple, but singularly most important question one human being can ever ask another: "How may I serve you?" Leo did not talk about it, did not brag about it, and never expected anything in return. Only God, Leo, and those he helped truly know how many souls he touched throughout his life. He simply fulfilled his mission to love, respect, and treat with dignity, EVERY human being. He had faith that all else would sort itself out. Leo lived a full, rich life. He bowled a perfect 300 game and hit numerous holes-in-one in golf. Leo and Patricia camped often, and he chased golfers all around Oak Tree Golf Course at a PGA event, seeking autographs like a kid at a rock concert. Leo was always game to be, or do, silly things at family gatherings and church. He fiercely loved each and every one of his children, their spouses, his grandchildren, and his great grandchildren. Determining the value of a bale of hay

As we roll into the summer months, many livestock producers are heavily involved in producing next winter's hay. Many are finding that hay production is only a fraction of normal yields. This is very concerning to most and many are facing the fact they may need to purchase some hay.

Determining the value of a bale of hay is sometimes tricky. Not all hay or hay bales are created equal. There are different sizes of hay bales, different density of hay bales, and different protein and TDN values.

Then there is supply and demand. It is hard to sell a product for X amount when your neighbor is selling a similar product much cheaper and/or a lot of your neighbors are selling similar products. Below are some considerations when determining the value of a bale of hay.

Supply and Demand

Many pastures may not be making as much as they normally make due to dry weather and high fertilizer costs, which means most of our neighbors in

close proximity to us are not going to have an excess amount of quality hay locally, and many of the states around us are facing similar situations, only serving to compound the problem, not to mention the high cost of fuel and transportation.

Bale Size and Density

It goes without saying larger and/or heavier bales should be worth more than smaller and/or lighter bales. But most hay bales are not weighed and are sold strictly on size of the bale. The smart decision is to always try to buy the hay on a ton basis. This is a way to ensure that the size of the bale is not as big a factor.

The biggest factor with larger round bales is that many transporters do not like to haul them stacked two wide on top because it takes longer straps and is harder to see around and may possibly be too tall.

Large square bales are much easier to haul and are easier to feed when only a portion of the bale is being fed. The disadvantage of large square bales is they must be stored in a barn to keep them from molding.

Small square bales can

be very labor intensive and typically cost more per ton of forage.

Bale Quality

Although a majority of the hay purchased is done so without any type of quality analysis, it is important to note that hay with higher levels of protein and energy (TDN) should be valued more. Collecting a forage analysis is the best solution to determine the quality of the forage, especially if it is being shipped a great distance.

The big problem with this is that when hay is scarce, it is a sellers' market, so the hay may not be there by the time the forage sample returns.

If you have the chance to personally see the hay before you buy it, inspect the hay for weeds, foreign material, seed heads of forage grasses, and signs of mold. All of these will help to give you an insight to the quality of the forage that is in the bale.

When pricing, hay producers should consider four factors, bale size, quality, price, and market availability. Any one or all three could greatly affect the value of a bale of hay.

Phlox adds color and pollinator appeal to the garden all season long

Fill your gardens with color from spring through summer and even into fall with a variety of pollinator-friendly phlox. The beauty, diversity, and usefulness in the garden of this group of plants had the National Garden Bureau declare 2022 Year of the Phlox.

Start out the growing season with creeping phlox (Phlox subulata). This low growing phlox is perfect for rock gardens, as a groundcover or planted at the front of a perennial garden.

Grow it in full sun with well-drained soil in zones three to nine. Once the flowers fade, shear the plants back halfway to encourage attractive new growth that will last all season long.

Woodland phlox (Phlox divaricata) is native to Midwestern woods and fields and hardy in zones three to eight. The periwinkle blue flowers add some welcome color to shady spots in spring.

Grow it in moist rich soil and watch for hummingbirds and butterflies that visit the blooms.

The Garden Club of America named Blue Moon woodland phlox its Plant of the Year, awarding it with the 2022 Montine McDaniel Freeman Horticulture Award. This award is given to native underutilized plants with superior ecological and ornamental attributes. Their goal is to increase the

use of these plants in gardens. Blue Moon is mildew resistant, long blooming and like the species is an early source of pollen for native bees, swallowtail butterflies and nectar for the hummingbirds.

Downy or prairie phlox (Phlox pilosa) is another North American native phlox that can be found in prairies and is hardy in zones three to nine. The pale pink to purple-pink blossoms appear in spring.

Grow it in full sun with moist to well-drained loam or sandy soils. Like other phlox, it attracts and supports butterflies and hummingbirds.

Marsh phlox (Phlox globberima) is native to wet prairies and open woodlands and thrives in moist soil and even damp clay. The intense magenta flowers appear June to July and are a hummingbird magnet. Grow this phlox in zones four to eight.

The North American native tall garden phlox has long been popular with gardeners. It blooms mid-season, adding color and height to any garden bed or mixed border.

The perfectly round flower clusters top each stem and come in a variety of colors from white to pink, purple, salmon and more. Grow these in full sun with moist, rich well-drained soil.

The flowers of many tall phlox varieties are fragrant, attract pollinators and make great cut flowers. Remove faded flowers and provide sufficient moisture and nutrients to

encourage more blooms.

The Fashionably Early series of tall phlox bloom early and for a long period with rebloom in fall. Grow tall phlox in full sun, provide sufficient space and avoid overhead watering to reduce the risk of powdery mildew.

Select mildew resistant varieties like LUMINARY™, Opening Act, Sweet Summer and Super Ka-pow to reduce the risk of this disease.

Consider adding a variety of phlox plants to your garden this season or next. You and the pollinators will appreciate the long season of beautiful flowers, pollen, and nectar.

Bunn said the ground shifts when it gets dry and that coupled with cooling water lines causes the breaks.

"The lines are not exceptionally old," the city manager said.

"We will be shifting home service lines over to newer mains and will be retiring the line under Washington," he said.

All 15 of the city's wells are running full time.

"We need to drill more wells," he confirmed, "but it costs between \$500,000 and \$750,000 to drill a well," Bunn said.

He said residents in Purcell consume right at a million gallons of water a day.

"We consume anywhere from 350,000 to 380,000 millions gallons a year," he confirmed. "I don't know if you can mitigate the water line issues but you can minimize them."

"Water Superintendent Mi-

"If you had a gun in the West, you got to live another day. You could eat and feed your family. You could protect yourself and your family," he said. "I wish they (firearms of the time) could talk."

Richard grew up at Lindsay and graduated from Lindsay High School.

All through high school and college, Richard worked for Tommy Owen, a local rancher. After high school, he attended Murray State College at Tishomingo for two years.

Then he transferred to OSU, earning a degree in agriculture education.

His first job after college was vo-ag teacher at Yale. He stayed there seven years before coming home.

"I always knew I wanted to move to the Goldsby/Washington/Purcell area," he said, adding he thought surely the vo-ag job at Purcell High School would come open.

In 1993, he went to an 11-day auctioneering school in Kansas City, Mo., where he was taught how to "chant."

That's what auctioneers call their distinctive spiel.

As a new auctioneer, he sold "everything from an oil rig to a box of rocks."

"I cut my teeth on estate auctions," he said.

He is a broker and sells real estate through his auction company.

In 2000, he and Stephanie moved to his auction lot at the

intersection of State Highways 74 and 74B. A few years ago, they settled in a new home southeast of there.

"It's home to me," Richard said of the area.

Really, he will auction anything that a client wants on the block and that includes everything from classic cars to glassware to gold and silver coins.

Once he auctioned more than 2,000 smoking pipes. Another time, he was called to liquidate inventory of a golf store that closed.

In 2011, he noticed that no one in Oklahoma was auctioning guns.

"I went that way," he explained, adding he holds a Class 1 federal firearms license.

The rest, as they say, is history.

"Mainly now I auction real estate and guns," he said.

An auction, he said, is the "best way to determine fair market value."

Richard conducts online auctions every other month and averages a half-dozen live auctions per month.

He is presently booked well into December.

Back in the day, he would run 200 guns a month through his auctions.

The number now far exceeds that. In addition, he sells thousands of rounds of ammunition.

Richard said the most unusual firearm he auctioned was a 19th century Egyptian musket. It was, in his opinion, an exceedingly ugly, cumbersome firearm.

The most expensive was a Vietnam-era fully automatic Colt M-16 A2 that fetched \$21,500.

Asked his favorite rifle, Richard said, "Any Winchester."

And his favorite pistol? The Colt Dragoon, which Samuel Colt manufactured for the Texas Rangers. The hefty pistol was in production for about three years in the mid-1800s.

His auction schedule takes him across all of Oklahoma except for the northeast.

Richard also helps local organizations, donating his services.

He's often been the voice of the pie auction at the McClain County Free Fair and has stepped up to the microphone to assist the Purcell Hope Center south of Goldsby. He also has helped school organizations and the Heart of Oklahoma Chamber of Commerce.

When he's not auctioneering, Richard is active in Goldsby Baptist Church, where he's taught adult Sunday School for 18 years.

He returned recently from a 10-day mission trip to the Philippines.

Richard's home office reflects his love of the Old West and his skill as a bow hunter.

Dominating the room is the massive mounted head of a bull bison.

No, he didn't get it with his bow. It was strictly his skill as a negotiator that put it on that wall.

Richard was arranging to sell several items for a customer when he spotted the bison head.

He offered to discount his commission in exchange for the piece.

"I don't think I can do that," the man replied.

He relented when Richard quoted him a commission price nearly double the going rate.

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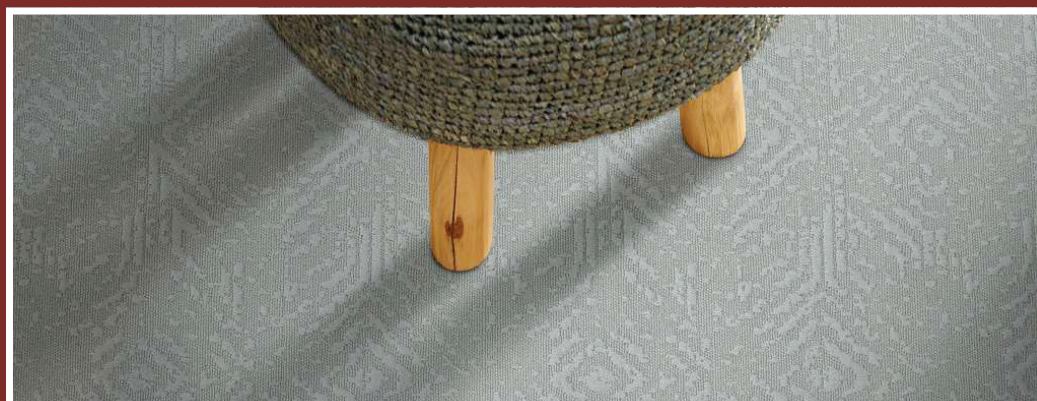

OMRF receives \$3 million for anti-aging study, seeks volunteers

The National Institutes of Health has awarded the Oklahoma Medical Research Foundation \$3 million to continue the study of the anti-aging abilities of a diabetes drug.

The five-year grant will allow OMRF physiologist Benjamin Miller, Ph.D., to continue his investigation of the ability of metformin, the world's most prescribed diabetes drug, to slow the biological process of aging.

Aging is a leading risk factor for many diseases, but people can lessen the impacts of aging with appropriate diet and exercise. Because many people find dietary changes

and exercise challenging, there are ongoing searches for medications that may mimic those effects.

"We know exercise slows the aging process, but this drug could be an alternative for otherwise healthy people who don't get much movement," Miller said.

The study will observe metformin's impact on animal models with different fitness levels. Investigators designed the study after surprising results that also led to an ongoing OMRF clinical trial of metformin in humans.

National School Lunch Program

Washington, Purcell, Wayne, Dibble, Lexington and Wanette Public Schools have announced their policy for free and reduced-price meals for children served under the National School Lunch Program and School Breakfast Program.

Local school officials have adopted income criteria and household size for determining eligibility.

Children from households whose income is at or below the qualifying levels are eligible for free or reduced-price meals. Application forms are being sent to all homes with a letter to parents or guardians.

To apply for free or reduced-price meals, households should fill out the application and return it to the school. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school.

The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and may be verified at any time during the school year by school or other program officials. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

For school officials to determine eligibility, households receiving food stamps, "Temporary Assistance for Needy Families" (TANF), or "Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations" (FDPIR) must list the child's name, his/her food stamp or TANF or FDPIR case number, and the

signature of an adult household member.

If you do not list a food stamp or TANF or FDPIR case number for all the children you are applying for, then the application must have the children's names, the names of all household members, the amount of income each person received last month and where it came from, the signature of an adult household member, and that adult's social security number or the word "none" if the adult does not have a social security number.

In certain cases, foster children are eligible for free and reduced-price meals or free milk regardless of the child's income. If you have foster children living with you and wish to apply for such meals or milk for them, contact the school.

Under the provisions of the policy, a school official will review applications and determine eligibility.

Parents or guardians wishing to make a formal appeal may make a request either orally or in writing to the school for a hearing to appeal the decision. The school's policy statement contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

The household of a child currently certified to receive food stamps, TANF or FDPIR benefits will be notified of the child's eligibility and that the child will be provided free

This past Wednesday we spent examining four more songs in our book so that we might know more clearly about the songs we sometimes sing.

In doing this we are trying to put into good practice the Scriptures injunction to 'sing with understanding' (1 Cor. 14:15) and to ascertain whether or not the songs qualify as a 'psalm, hymn or spiritual song' (Eph. 5:19). This coming week we should be back to our regular Bible study in 2 Thessalonians 2.

In our study series on Life and Death (Sunday mornings at 9:45) we have moved out of a section describing the general Bible discussions of those subjects to considering more specific areas like murder, suicide, etc.

I am resolved no longer to linger, charmed by the world's delight; Things that are higher, things that are nobler, these have allured my sight. (I Am

Resolved, Hartsough, verse 1). The Sunday morning sermon took its shape from the figures of "charmed" and "allured."

We discussed what these two words meant and noticed how they were used in the song, and then we discovered from the Bible how the world charms us through things like sensuality, pleasure, greed, power, and even laziness.

Then we saw that there are some better things which can, and should, attract our attention: an opportunity to serve the greater cause of the gospel; an opportunity to be a better person; the grand capacity of forgiveness; strength to live a different and pure life not ruled by sinful desire with heaven as a firm hope in the end.

Sunday evening Keith Shackleford presented a lesson detailing the use of the word "hallowed" beginning with a reading of the Lord's Prayer (Mt. 6). In this lesson we saw the English word 'hallowed'

is used sparingly through the Bible, but the Hebrew and Greek words from which it is translated are together used hundreds of times.

So, the lesson focused on the use of that English word throughout the scriptures. We learned that it refers to something that has been set apart from other things to be treated with great and/or unique respect. In the end, the point was made that the phrase "hallowed be thy name" means that God has declared His name holy (for there is no other God), and that we affirm our agreement with His distinction by honoring His name with reverence, awe and obedience.

July 24, 2022 is the seventeenth Sunday in Ordinary Time. During Ordinary Time, the Gospel focuses on the teachings and miracles of Christ during his time on earth.

The Gospel reading is Luke 11:1-13. I Jesus was praying in a certain place, and when he had finished, one of his disciples said to him, "Lord, teach us to pray just as John taught his disciples." 2 He said to them, "When you pray, say: 'Father, hallowed be your name, your kingdom come. 3 Give us each day our daily bread 4 and forgive us our sins for we ourselves forgive everyone in debt to us, and do not subject us to the final test.'"

The version of the Lord's prayer with which we are more familiar is in Matthew. In Luke, after Jesus tells the disciples what to pray, he tells them a story of a man who goes to his friend's house at midnight and asks for bread.

Initially the friend says, "Do not bother me. The household is all in bed. I cannot get up to give you anything." Then Jesus says that if the man does not give his friend some food, he will eventually do so because of the man's persistence.

Jesus is encouraging the dis-

ciples and us to continue asking for what we need even when the request is not granted at first. Ask and you will receive, seek and you will find, and knock and the door will be opened are all ways of saying that we must be ready to ask for help.

Jesus explains further that a father will not give his son a snake when he asks for a fish or a scorpion when he asks for an egg. Then he says, "13 If you then, who are wicked, know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will the Father in heaven give the Holy Spirit to those who ask him?"

Father Tommy Lane's homilies are a source of great help to me. "And then we come to that difficult question: "Why is prayer not answered sometimes, especially when we think we are praying for something good?"

One way I look at that is that while we pray and continue to wait for the answer we would like, we are gradually growing to accept that the answer might not be what we would wish. In other words, our prayer is also working on our own souls, making us a little more ready to continue to carry our cross. Sometimes prayer is answered

in a different way."

I share with you my experiences only to help you ponder on your own. In my early twenties, I prayed fervently that God would give me a baby. A few weeks after my 25th birthday, I had surgery intended to repair problem areas only to end up with a hysterectomy. ("Thanks, God, for that wonderful answer.")

Nearly six months later to the day at the very same hospital, a three-day old baby boy was placed in my arms. I tell him every year on his birthday, "The best present I ever received was when God gave you to me." With humblest reverence, I say, "Thank you God for giving me your precious Son and my precious son."

But, for now, I'm just reflecting on the vastness of the Yellowstone we spent a week absorbing and of God's nature and some of the scenes only the Lord could shape with His powerful hand.

All such moments remind me of my favorite song, one you and I will visit this week to remind us all of something we need to remember, wherever we are, in the vastness of Yellowstone or the quiet of your room. It may be the greatest song ever written — 'How Great Thou Art.'

If it's not the greatest, it's on that top shelf with the best of the best. The writer of 'How Great Thou Art' understood something about God's glory and

majesty. He had experienced wonders in God's handiwork that made him stop right where he was and give God the glory.

You might think he stood and looked out over the Grand Canyon — ah, from high up there you can sing 'Then sings my soul my Savior God to thee' with vigor, can't you! — or up high on the Smoky Mountains looking deep down into the foothills with the fall leaves shifting from color to color and the cool running Pigeon River churning confidently through it.

Carl Bobert, the Swedish preacher who penned these words in 1886, likely never saw either of those wonders, although he would have plenty of his own to admire in the beautiful landscapes of Sweden.

Many scenes there display the glories of God and would cause him to sing, and write: 'O Lord my God, when I in awe-

some wonder consider all the worlds thy hands have made. I see the stars, I hear the rolling thunder, Thy pow'r throughout the universe displayed.'

The wonder we have of God, as with the song poet here, seems to come in stages. First we wonder at God's greatness, marveling of Him in our mind, then we see all that He has made and hear the pow'r of the rolling thunder, our thoughts, our eyes, our ears all taking in God's glory.

But there's something still missing, some sense we possess that we have not yet engaged in our wonder and worship of God, but the writer will not leave it that way for long. As we come to the resounding chorus, he takes the wonder of his soul to new heights, writing, "Then sings my soul, my Savior

benefits unless the household notifies the school that it chooses to decline benefits.

In accordance with federal law and United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) policy, these institutions are prohibited from discriminating on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, age or disability.

Voters can submit a request using the OK Voter Portal at oklahoma.gov/elections/ovp. Request forms are also available at oklahoma.gov/elections and at the County Election Board office in the McClain County Courthouse.

I want to express my appreciation to each of our volunteers

who helped to make this event happen. We will do our best to help every person who registered to receive the VA benefits they are eligible for.

As our reputation continues to grow in the veteran community there are veterans from many places in the world who travel thousands of miles for assistance with their VA claims. Last week during our intake event I asked a veteran where he was from, he said that he had traveled from Guam to meet with us. I also talked with several veterans who were from Florida and Georgia and other states.

We believe that the reason we have been so successful helping veterans and surviving spouses receive VA benefits is by using our evidence-based claims system. Years ago, the VA designed a Disability Benefits Questionnaire (DBQ) for to use when evaluating veterans' disabilities. We use the same type of DBQ for the veterans to take to their medical provider for an evaluation of their condition.

Last week someone stole the catalytic converters off our van that we use to transport veterans to their VA appointments. We will have it repaired soon so that we can continue that mission. It was parked at our building at 1233 West Lindsay in Norman when it happened. It doesn't seem right that someone would steal from the men and women who have served our country. Hopefully we will be able to have it repaired soon.

We encourage our readers to consider becoming a volunteer to help us to make a difference in the lives of veterans and their families. Volunteers can work remotely from anywhere they live or at our Norman location at 1233 West Lindsay Street.

rectly in order to be counted," Haley said.

Voters exempt from having an absentee ballot affidavit notarized include those who are physically incapacitated and those who care for physically incapacitated individuals who cannot be left alone. Those voters must have their absentee ballot affidavit witnessed by two people.

Any registered voter eligible to vote in the election may vote by absentee ballot without stating a reason, Haley said.

However absentee voters can activate certain special conditions in the following circumstances:

- Voters who are physically handicapped or who care for physically handicapped persons who cannot be left unattended. These individuals may apply only by mail, fax or email.

Military personnel and residents living overseas, along with their spouses and dependents are also eligible for certain allowances. Military personnel should contact Voting Service Officers in their units for absentee application forms. Residents living overseas may obtain absentee voting applications from any United States military installation or United

States Embassy or Consulate. Military personnel and overseas citizens who are already registered voters in Oklahoma may apply for absentee ballots using the OK Voter Portal at oklahoma.gov/elections/ovp. Those who need to complete a new Voter Registration Application should apply through the Federal Voting Assistance Program at FVAP.gov.

The county election board is open weekdays from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

Intern:

with a firsthand view of what it takes to be highly-effective ambassadors and real-world problem solvers.

Upon graduation, many typical college students realize that employers place a great deal of emphasis on work experience.

Many graduating students have little to no work history, specifically in their degree area. The Chickasaw Nation's internship program gives each participating student the opportunity to gain knowledge in their field while in college, allowing them to have work experience when searching for a job after graduation.

"Students are placed in internships relative to their field of study. They are able to conduct meaningful projects that give them real-life work experience," Hamilton said.

The internships are designed to help train students to address challenges that arise while

working. The experience allows participants to work firsthand with tribal, private business and governmental leadership.

The tribe selects and funds participants in the hope they will gain the understanding needed to become effective leaders in their desired fields.

The internship program is conducted at different times throughout the year. The Chickasaw Nation determines internship locations. Cultural enhancement staff works with the student and employer to determine internship timelines and specifics.

Once selected, students are prepared for their internship by participating in an orientation. Students discuss internship program guidelines, tour Chickasaw Nation facilities and learn Chickasaw history and language.

"We provide our students a cultural aspect of our history and culture through virtual and in-

person presentations, language classes and cultural make and takes," Hamilton said.

Students who participate in the Chickasaw Nation Internship Program are also given the opportunity to participate in numerous career development trainings and hear from Chickasaw Nation professionals.

After completing orientation, students travel to their designated internship sites to begin employment. The Chickasaw Nation provides each student with biweekly pay, one round-trip airline ticket to the intern site and housing accommodations.

The Chickasaw Nation receives many requests from students to come to Oklahoma to work with the tribe. Many students do not live within the Chickasaw Nation jurisdictional boundaries and previously have not been able to visit tribal headquarters.

In 2009, the Chickasaw Nation built six internship-housing units

to better accommodate the students. Each housing unit consists of two bedrooms and bathrooms with a shared kitchen, living and laundry room. Housing units provide recreational activities, as well as a storm shelter.

To qualify for the internship program, applicants must be a Chickasaw citizen, complete an application and submit all documentation to the Chickasaw Nation Internship program coordinator.

Applicants must be between the ages of 18 and 25 and be a full-time Chickasaw college student enrolled as a sophomore, junior, senior or graduate student at the time of application.

Unpaid internship opportunities may be available for students who do not meet these qualifications.

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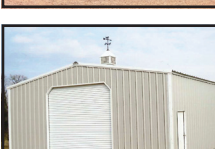
