Vince and Kimberly Fulks are flatlanders bred and born.

He is 53 and coaches the Paoli Pugs in football. She is 50 and a breast cancer survivor.

At home on the plains, neither is a mountain climber.

Or weren't until this summer when they scaled all 19,340 feet of Mount Kilimanjaro in Tanzania.

It all started early in 2020. "Justin and Nicolle Carr came up with this crazy idea and we invited ourselves," Vince said.

Soon, Ted and Lori Cox invited themselves, as well. They began condition-

ing themselves for the mountain.

Their training consisted of "just a lot of walking" and trips to the Ouchita Mountains in southeast Oklahoma where Vince grew up.

"My family is from southeast Oklahoma and that helped me to know how to walk up steep slopes,"

he said.

There were also two trips to Pikes Peak in Colorado to acclimate themselves to high altitude, although Pikes Peak's elevation — 14,115 feet — doesn't really compare to Kilimanjaro's 19,340 feet.

No tax increase

Dibble's \$15.45 bond issue on ballot

On the August 23 ballot for voters living in the Dibble Public Schools district is a \$15.45 million bond issue that won't raise property taxes.

How is that possible?

Superintendent Chad Clanton said the proposal will continue the district's existing bond structure. The new bonds will be repaid over 15 years.

"Not increasing taxes was really important to the board and our patrons," he added.

The board called for the bond election at a special meeting on June 2.

Since then, Clanton said the public feedback has been "really positive."

The challenge, he explained, is getting the people to go vote. Like all

bond issues, the proposition needs at least 60 percent of the vote to pass.

Clanton said the district will use the proceeds for the first phase of constructing a new high school.

A large portion of the existing high school was built in the 1930s.

"There are three roofs on it now," he added.

To facilitate construction, the district plans to demolish the old elementary school and weight room, which Clanton described as "buildings we use, but can survive without them."

The superintendent said Dibble Public Schools enrollment is at capacity in all sites and is definitely growing with more housing

Michael Thompson, a 1980 graduate of Purcell High School, will be in the 2023 Alumni Hall of Fame class at Oklahoma State University.

Major General Thompson is a former Adjutant General of Oklahoma, serving from 2017 to 2021.

Overnight Thursday night and into Friday, storms will increase in coverage, bringing the greatest chance of rain we have seen since early June. These storms will continue into Saturday, which will likely be our first day with a high in the 80s in over a month. Storm coverage

will decrease into Sunday, as remaining showers and storms will slide out throughout the day, before our heat dome returns to start off next week. Unfortunately the rainy pattern is fairly temporary, however we will take what we can get considering our current and worsening drought situation.

Indian land crimes

Non-Indians can be prosecuted

Oklahoma Attorney General John O'Connor sent written guidance to Oklahoma law enforcement and district attorneys following the United States Supreme Court decision in Oklahoma v. Castro-Huerta.

That decision that recognized Oklahoma can prosecute non-Indians who commit crimes against Indians in land that has been held to be Indian country.

"Oklahoma law enforcement is dedicated to the protection of our citizens and has already been implementing some of the advised changes," O'Connor said. "As always, our office stands ready to help any agency if additional assistance is needed to locate victims and pursue charges in cases that were not pursued by any law enforcement agency over the past two years."

The AG's memorandum is a working document and will periodically be updated after further consultation with law enforcement.

On June 29, 2022, in the Castro-Huerta decision, the Supreme Court held Oklahoma has jurisdiction over all non-Indian criminal defendants within its borders, including any land that constitutes Indian country.

In the case, Castro, a Mexican national, was convicted by an Oklahoma jury of abusing his five-year-old Indian stepdaughter.

Castro argued that, because his victim was Indian, Oklahoma could not prosecute him.

The Indian nations agreed with Castro in a brief filed with the Supreme Court. In rejecting this argument, the Supreme Court observed that Castro "would require this Court to treat Indian victims as second-class citizens. We decline to do so."

Beating the heat

State prisons use several methods

From the moment the sun comes up, the Oklahoma Department of Corrections is doing everything imaginable to keep staff and inmates safe from relentless summer heat.

One of the first steps is keeping an especially close watch over at-risk inmate populations. Staff identify those inmates more suscepti-ble to heat-related incidents, including those 55 years and older, the chronically ill or those on mental health medication.

Officers also do frequent wellness and temperature checks in all areas to ensure the temperature in each unit is safe for the inmates.

“We have procedures in place where medical does a follow up every four hours,” Joseph Harp Warden Luke Pettigrew said. “And we have security staff going around as well. Checking on them and making ice available for them as well.”

The agency maintains a Heat-Contingency Plan for all of its facilities with en-gagement of the plan begin-ning well in advance of any anticipated summer heat.

That plan includes adding cooling equipment to areas that lack air conditioning.

Modifications to the plan are made as conditions war-rant. Already this summer, 22 portable air conditioning units and dozens of industrial fans have been deployed at facilities across the state.

“A couple nights ago it was pretty warm,” one inmate said. “But they came through with some fans. The coolers have definitely helped out. When they brought them in it brought the temperatures down a little bit.”

Several facilities have also installed misting hoses in pavilions and other high traffic areas. Misting stations can cool air temperatures up to 30 degrees.

“It’s better. A whole lot better. Definitely an ‘A’ for effort,” another inmate said. “This is nice. Mist-ers are always good.”

Other inmates agree.

“It feels pretty good,” one Joseph Harp Correctional Center inmate said. “Espe-cially when it’s hot like this.”

During the heatwave, fa-cilities are limiting outside work hours to avoid overex-posure and heat exhaustion. Everyone is reminded to stay hydrated, and multiple areas with cold water are readily accessible to all staff and inmates.

Due to ODOC’s proactive approach, along with a litany of safety precautions, there have been no heat-related illnesses reported during this summer’s heat wave.

The various scenarios of rejection can come from various levels of life. Children can reject parents. Parents reject children.

People are rejected because of their politics, sexual orientation, skin color, background, and much more.

Can you think of a hurtful instance in your life when you felt rejected by a group, church, community, employer, friend,

loved one or other? If that has ever happened to you then you haven’t forgotten how it made you feel.

You were disappointed, hurt, probably angry, and maybe even bewildered by the rejection. You may have even been surprised by the rejection. Or, maybe you saw it coming but tried to hold on to the position or the relationship.

expanded Medicaid to some 200,000 additional people.

I also question the study’s objectivity as it appears to be left slanting and tracked which states were blue or red, and found that blue states are better for women. Oklahoma is one of the most conservative states in the nation and our laws and way of life reflect the conservative values of the majority.

For this reason, I feel they have intentionally put more emphasis on minor factors like voting percentages rather than actual social-economic issues. Therefore, I want to conduct my own study, so we can hear from experts at our state agencies, business community and non-profits to get the real statistics and find real solutions.

We’ll be looking at health-

care access and outcomes, employment opportunities, income levels, crime rates, poverty levels, birth rates, and more.

If you care about women’s issues, I hope you’ll join me in this important discussion as we try to find policy solutions that will improve the lives of all Oklahoma women.

Dale K. Graham Veterans Foundation

We try to keep the veterans who we represent informed about any new VA rules that could impact their VA disabilities. One of the big issues that we are going to see is the change in ratings for sleep apnea. Currently, if a CPAP machine is required a veterans rating would be 50 percent. When the new regulation is finalized a veteran that receives service connection of sleep apnea requiring a machine will be rated at 0 percent. My thoughts on this subject are if you are service connected

for that condition now, do not re-evaluate or open any type of other sleep apnea claims.

Another condition affected by upcoming changes is service connection for tinnitus. It is going to be more difficult to service-connect. As we receive more information on these changes, we will update our website and add to our newsletter.

Another disability that the VA is changing the criteria on is PTSD and other types of mental conditions. From what I have read, these changes should not affect a veteran's new rating decisions negatively. If you are not service connected considered for any of the conditions listed in this article, we suggest making an appointment or stop by to start a claim for these conditions before VA changes the rules.

July 31, 2022 is the eighteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time. During Ordinary Time, the Gospel focuses on the teachings and miracles of Christ during his time on earth.

The Gospel reading is Luke 13:12-21. Someone in the crowd said to Jesus, “Teacher, tell my brother to share the inheritance with me.” Jesus said, “Take care to guard against all greed, for though one may be rich, one’s life does not consist of possessions.”

As Jesus did many times in his ministry, he told a parable, a simple story used to illustrate a moral or spiritual lesson. Jesus told of a rich man whose land had produced such a bountiful harvest that his barns would not hold it.

The man said to himself, “I will tear down my barns and build bigger ones. I will have so many good things stored up that I can eat, drink, and be merry.”

But God said to him, “You

fool, this night your life will be demanded of you; and the things you have prepared, to whom will they belong?” Thus will it be for all who store up treasure for themselves but are not rich in what matters to God.”

The point of the parable is simple: keep your priorities straight. We typically place great value on our stuff. Sometimes in the interest of getting more stuff, we focus solely on more, more, more.

Yes, we must provide for our families, for our children and their future, for the grandchildren, and for our retirement, but we can get so caught up in making money that money and the things we can buy easily can become an end for our life instead of a means to draw us closer to God.

So what do we do? We work too hard. We don’t have enough time for our families. We get ulcers and early heart attacks.

And we have more things than the next guy. And we think we have won. But we have lost.

For in the long run, the quality of our lives is inferior to the quality of the lives of those who concentrate on that which really matters (Msgr Joseph Pelligrino).

As the sensei on the TV show Kung Fu used to say, “Choose wisely, grasshopper.”

Last Wednesday we studied down to 2 Thessalonians 2:7. Evidently, someone came along after Paul and had begun disturbing these people with falsehoods. This section was written to encourage these new Christians that Jesus would not return before an apostasy took place. That Jesus will return is a certainty and so we are warned to be prepared for it.

Sunday morning, we further examined the Scriptures on the subject of murder. One of the most interesting things which was pointed out was that since God created people and every soul belongs to Him, if someone has murdered the murderer has harmed something which belongs to God – what a dangerous position to be in!

The Sunday morning sermon was based on 1 Peter 3:8-12 and in particular the state-

ment in verse 10, “He that will love life...” Keith Shackleford pointed out that the general context of 1 Peter was written to encourage those Christians who were under the pressures of persecution. They needed some practical, everyday advice for living as a Christian in a wicked and harmful society.

So he taught them to practice self-control against selfish lusts (v. 10); to learn to hate evil and love good (v. 11) and to pursue things of peace (v. 11). Keith then addressed the significance of this quote from Psalm 34 by looking at that Psalm and its context.

Sunday evening, we learned about the word “debt” in the New Testament. Paul famously wrote “I am a debtor” in Romans 1:14. This lesson discussed the elemental principles of debt (creditors and debtors)

and showed that debt is something we are obligated to pay.

Because we have sinned, we owe the sin-debt of our guilt. Fortunately, Jesus paid our debt by dying for us, and He asks us to love and serve Him in return. Several other sections were brought out in the sermon which described the debts we owe, to whom and why.

Included in this was a debt in the gospel (to preach it), a debt to the Lord to live spiritually pleasing lives, and a debt of love to all mankind.

Lexington man facing charges

DA drops misdemeanors, files felonies

A 59-year-old Lexington man is in the Cleveland County Detention Center in lieu of a \$7,500 bond after he was charged with three felonies stemming from the alleged abuse of his wife.

Prosecutors initially charged Thomas R. Vickery with misdemeanor counts of disrupting an emergency telephone call and domestic abuse/assault and battery following his June 16 arrest.

He was released on his own recognizance and ordered to have no contact with his wife.

However, those charges were dismissed as more details came to light and the district attorney's office filed the three felonies on July 18.

Those charges are abuse by caretaker, verbal abuse by caretaker and disrupting an emergency telephone call.

In addition to no contact with the victim, Vickery is prohibited from having a weapon. A preliminary hearing con-

ference is scheduled for 9 a.m. Tuesday.

Vickery was determined to be indigent and an attorney was appointed to represent him.

Cleveland County deputies went to Vickery's home last month after the sheriff's office received a hang up on a 911 call.

They found Vickery's wife confined to a bed covered in feces.

Renaissance Architecture LLC in Oklahoma City is the architect for the project.

Also included in Phase 1 are new athletic lights.

and experienced vertigo and had to be assisted down to a lower camp. It took her awhile to recover.

“I’d say after about 30 minutes I knew where I was,” she said.

Kilimanjaro is 1/2 mile higher than the highest peak in the lower 48 states, Ted said.

“Mount Whitney is 14,505 feet,” Ted reported.

On summit day some of the hikers left at 11 p.m. and others that are a little faster left for the top at midnight.

Ted reported it took him 10 hours to reach the summit and four hours to descend.

“Going down is just as hard on your body,” Ted said. “I may have lost 18 pounds but it wasn’t for lack of food. There was plenty of it and it was good. It was just hiking so many hours for eight days.”

The Coxes reported there are three routes up to the mountain. They took the longer one.

“The longer route helps you acclimate,” Lori said. “The longer you go, the better chance for success. At 17,000 feet it just hit me. No one else got altitude sickness.”

On their way to the mountain they had to scale the Baranco Wall, all 843 feet of it.

“I didn’t know I like doing that,” Lori said with a big grin. “There was a narrow gap to go through called the Kissing Wall because you are so close to the rock you can kiss it.”

Lori called the climb up the giant wall “Cool. I loved it.”

The excursion with their co-hikers, porters, guides and cooks totaled 32 people in their group.

“The porters were amazing to watch,” Ted said. “They carry all your stuff like tents, chairs, cooking supplies basically everything you need to live on the mountain for seven days.”

Plus, they have their own backpacks. They would carry about 40 pounds of gear on their heads, the couple reported.

After the hikers would leave a base camp (there are seven on the route) the porters would stay and pack up all the tents and gear.

“They would race past us while we were hiking to set up the next camp,” Ted said. “It was great getting to know them and things about their families and about their lives.”

“The porters would wake us up about 6 a.m. serving hot tea or coffee,” Ted said. “About 6:30 they would bring a bowl of warm water for ‘washy-washy’. That was it on the mountain because there are no showers.”

By 7-7:30 the hikers would be treated to a hot breakfast and then take off walking on the next expedition around 8 a.m.

The hikers would gather up their things like sleeping bags

and air mattresses and the like so the porters could carry them to the next camp.

The three guides in the group spoke English pretty well, Ted said.

“The senior porters and staff could speak enough English to carry on a conversation. Some of them spoke about as much English as I did Swahili,” he said with a laugh.

There were multiple groups like theirs on the mountain at the same time they were.

Before starting their hike in the rainforest, they stayed a night in a hotel in Arusha, a city of about 900,000.

The trip to Africa was a story in itself.

The group flew from Oklahoma City to Dallas and then from Dallas 15 hours to Doha, Qatar.

Doha is directly across the Arabian Sea from Iran, Cox said. From Doha they flew to the Kilimanjaro airport, a flight of about five hours.

Kilimangaro is eight hours ahead of Central Time, they said.

Lori said they watched a lot of movies during all the flights.

After the mountain climb, the group went on a three day safari in the Serengeti, sleeping in tents just outside one of the country’s national parks.

“The coolest thing about the safari is something I really didn’t realize,” Lori said. “It was just how close you got to the animals.

“The animals would just walk right in front of our Land Cruiser. We saw leopards, giraffes, wildebeests, warthogs, hippos, crocodiles and ostriches,” she said. “One thing we didn’t see was a rhino because the Black Rhinoceroses are almost extinct.”

Lori said at one point they looked over and there were four

lionesses just a few feet away from the vehicle.

The group spotted a huge Blue Spitting Cobra slithering across the trail right in front of them.

They all started taking videos and photos until it turned around and fanned out its hood.

“We all scrambled back to safety,” Lori said.

Once again they couple bragged on the food. Just like on the mountain, the food on the safari was top shelf.

Ted said they would have eggs, bacon, sausage, French Toast and a selection of over 40 different bananas.

For lunch and dinner, meat and soups were the main fare.

“Every day there was something cool and new,” Lori said of the trip through the Serengeti.

Ted said the Tanzanian economy is terrible.

“A laborer makes from \$5 to \$7 a day and a gallon of gasoline costs five dollars, basically a day’s wages,” Cox said.

Lori said you either work on a farm or on the mountain.

“Those are about the only two jobs there are,” she said. “On our trip we really got a taste of what it’s like in Tanzania. We saw real people. We didn’t want to just be a tourist.”

They both agreed the mountain climb was one of the hardest things they’ve ever done.

“We were the first group for the company that were basically flat landers with no elevation,” Lori said. “Had I known what it was going to be like going up and down and up and down I would have trained differently.”

Ted said the day he summited he hiked for 18 hours while the others hiked 13-14 hours.

“They want you to summit early (right around sunrise) and then descend because otherwise it gets too hot,” Ted said.

Kilimanjaro:

In Colorado, they concentrated their training on the Devil’s Playground and its seven-mile trail rising 4,300 feet to the Pikes Peak summit.

Kimberly bought Vince a mask that he could adjust to duplicate Kilimanjaro’s elevation.

“I ran with the mask on to see if I could compensate for the lack of oxygen,” he said.

A six-mile hike at home took roughly an hour. Six miles on Kilimanjaro was all day.

“We would walk five or six miles a day,” Kimberly added. “It’s very easy to do six or seven miles in Oklahoma compared to two miles on the mountain.”

The couples carefully researched guide companies – no one is allowed on the mountain without permits and a licensed guide company.

Eventually, they settled on Ramblin’ Travel. The company is owned by Bobby Fuller, a mountain climber and guide here in the States.

The company is run by natives in Tanzania.

The Oklahomans left June 20 for their three-week adventure. Vince estimated the cost for himself and Kimberly between \$16 and \$20,000.

They also booked a safari on the side.

“They tricked me by telling me we could fish in Lake Victoria,” he said.

The lake was “absolutely beautiful” and worth the side trip, even if the fishing wasn’t as expected.

From guides and porters to a chef and waiter, the native staff on Kilimanjaro was “phenomenal,” Vince said.

“They treat you like family,” he explained. “We let them into our world and they let us into theirs.”

On the mountain they were

confronted with five climate zones – rain forest, heath land, moorland, alpine desert and arctic.

They would spend eight days reaching the summit, Uhuru Peak.

The peak is one of seven summits of the world – the highest mountains on each of the earth’s seven continents.

Every day (or night) they hiked high and then low to their camp.

Vince said the only time the height was an issue was on one of the walls.

The rest of the time it was just a matter of putting one foot in front of the other.

“We had to have permits and guides at all times,” he continued. “I’m really glad we picked who we picked. Our guide was Brown and he wanted to know everything about you medically.”

Kimberly said the Oklahoma group was unlike his usual clientele.

“We were very different from the others,” she said.

The climbers’ diet had to be carefully monitored and protein intake was limited as they gained elevation.

“The mental prep is a lot of it,” Kimberly said.

She face planted on rocks early on the climb, but at each stage hid her pain and presented herself as fit to continue.

The guide had the power to send anyone he deemed unfit to continue back down the mountain.

She hid, as well, the pain in her back where surgeon’s removed a muscle during her 2017 treatment for breast cancer.

There was a ranger station at each campsite. The rangers are there to keep an eye on porters who weren’t supposed to carry

more than 30 pounds.

In a group of six, not everyone could hike at the same speed.

Kimberly was slowest in the group and left camp before the others, who would catch up to her on each leg.

As they gained elevation, the day’s hikes got underway in the middle of the night when the ground was frozen.

Footing became treacherous when the sun thawed the ground.

Above the clouds, the warmth of the day was instantaneous as soon as the sun’s rays reached the ground.

On the eighth day, Vince and Kimberly reached the summit at Stella Point.

They continued to walk another hour, covering 500 feet to Uhuru Peak.

They were told they would cry on reaching Uhuru Peak. So did their native staff, sharing their joy.

The memory still brings tears to Kimberly.

“The summit was more of my own journey by myself,” Kimberly said. “There’s emotion that comes with it. It’s very spiritual, the most incredible experience I ever had in my life. I talked to God a lot and don’t remember much of walking by myself.”

Vince was the most physically fit of the group and the only one to reach Uhuru Peak carrying a backpack.

“It was an amazing experience,” he said. “The mountain is an amazing deal.”

That said, all mountains from this day forward are “safe from me.”

Kimberly agrees, for good reason.

“After eight days, my back said ‘No more.’ It’s something I don’t want to do again.”

A: Oklahoma has the best election system in the nation. The Oklahoma State Election Board partners with numerous state and federal agencies to keep state and county election officials briefed on current threat environments, remedy vulnerabilities and monitors malevolent activities. Oklahoma uses an audit able and

verifiable, paper ballot-based voting system.

Voting devices cannot be connected to the internet and have built-in security features. Ballots are secured and a strict chain of custody is maintained through the certification of the election. Every step of the election process – from the precinct level to the state level – is protected by an intricate security plan.

Q: What is something most people don’t know about you?

A: Before COVID, I sang and did ventriloquism at two nursing homes and one assisted living center in Chickasha and the Veteran’s Center in Norman each month with my brother.

Prayerfully, we will be allowed to do it again soon. I love mission trips, Vacation Bible School, doing mock elections with kids and look forward to doing them again because apparently God’s not finished with me yet.

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Federal auditors want Oklahoma to return at least \$650,000 of Governor’s COVID-19 relief funds

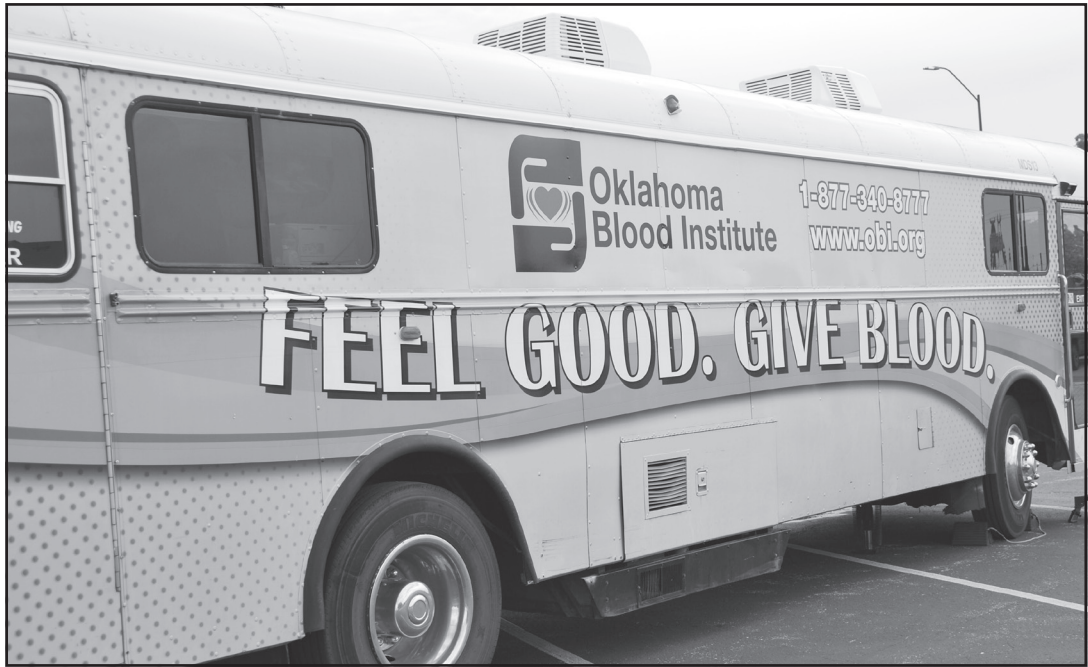

4-H Roundup: Steadfast in tradition while offering new opportunities

State 4-H Roundup has long been steeped in tradition for the delegates who make their way to Oklahoma State University for the three-day event. For more than a century, club members have been attending workshops, campaigning for state office and recognizing the achievements of their peers.

While tradition is important, the 101st State 4-H Roundup planning committee has a few new tricks up their sleeves for 4-H’ers who will be on the OSU campus July 27-29. This year’s theme is 4-H – A Universe of Endless Possibilities.

“We’re glad we’re back to a 100 percent on-campus event this year. While we adapted and had a virtual event in 2020 and a hybrid event in 2021, there’s nothing better than being back to State 4-H Roundup in person on the OSU campus,” said Steve Beck, state 4-H program leader.

“We’re thankful we had the capability to continue with Roundup the last couple of years, but there’s nothing like experiencing this event in person. The energy and enthusiasm are contagious and just add to the great experience. The new additions to this year’s lineup of events will be a lot of fun for everyone,” Beck continued.

New on this year’s Roundup schedule will be a traffic safety program for teens. The goal of Oklahoma Challenge is to increase teen traffic safety in

Oklahoma, said Nele Rogers, Oklahoma Challenge associate director. Oklahoma Challenge is funded by the Oklahoma State Highway Office.

“Car crashes are the number one cause of death for people ages 16 to 24,” Rogers said. “There are several reasons for this, including novice drivers, lower rates of seatbelt use, more likely to speed and distracted driving. About 45 percent of teen fatalities in traffic accidents aren’t wearing seatbelts.”

Part of this educational opportunity will be Think Fast Interactive, a national, high-energy game show-type activity.

Rogers said there will be a host, the contestants will have clickers and they’ll compete to earn points for prizes all while learning about safe driving.

Oklahoma Challenge isn’t just for teens who are driving; it also includes working with passengers.

“We work with pre-drivers in Oklahoma Challenge and help them become assertive passengers. They’re the co-pilot and are in charge of the music, the GPS and other things that can cause a distraction for the driver. Everyone attending 4-H Roundup can benefit from Oklahoma Challenge. Our goal is to empower youth to become more safe and responsible drivers. We’re happy to be able to offer this at 4-H Roundup.”

Former Bryan County 4-H’er Bailey Rae will be on hand to teach a Master Class

workshop for participants in this year’s 4-H Has Talent vocal contest.

Finishing in the top nine in season 19 of the television program The Voice, Bailey Rae will share tips about performing and how to put your best foot forward on stage.

Bailey Rae, who was a 2017 state 4-H record book winner in the health and fitness project and a 2018 Key Club inductee, was named the 2021 winner of the Young Artist of the Year from the Texas Country Music awards.

“We’re very grateful for Bailey Rae and the example she is showing Oklahoma 4-H members that they can achieve their dreams while still living in Oklahoma,” said Cathleen Taylor, state leadership and civic engagement specialist with the state 4-H office. “She will also perform a short concert while at 4-H Roundup.”

Duds to Dazzle is a new contest this year that will give 4-H’ers an opportunity to demonstrate their knowledge and skills learned in the clothing and textiles project.

“This contest gives participants an opportunity to upcycle a textile that no longer meets its original purpose,” said Cathy Allen, 4-H curriculum coordinator at the state 4-H office. “Someone could, for example, take an old jean jacket and upcycle it into a vest. It’s a great way for club members to use their creativity and make something unused into useable and stylish products.”

Protect horses by scouting alfalfa for blister beetles

Oklahoma producers, especially those in the northeastern part of the state, should watch out for blister beetles in their alfalfa this summer.

If a horse eats a blister beetle when snacking on alfalfa hay, the consequences can be deadly.

“The one we really need to worry about is the striped blister beetle,” said Kelly Seuhs, Oklahoma State University Extension alfalfa specialist. “They have the highest concentration of cantharidin, which is a blistering agent produced by the beetle as a defense mechanism.”

If a horse consumes blister beetles in high enough quantities, it may exhibit the following symptoms:

- Sores or blisters on the tongue and in the mouth
- Colic
- Straining
- Increased temperature
- Depression
- Increased heart and respiratory rates
- Dehydration
- Sweating
- Diarrhea
- Bloody feces
- Frequent urination

Seuhs said ruminant livestock, such as cattle and goats, can also be affected by

blister beetles but generally not as severely as horses.

Scouting alfalfa along field borders for beetles before the hay is baled can save a horse’s life. Seuhs said the insects are notorious for swarming and are known to congregate. They’re most active in the summer, and when a swarm is present, the ground will appear to move.

“We’ve received reports of hay meadows and grass pastures that are infested, even areas around barns where people keep livestock,” he said. “They’re attracted to the flowering structures of certain weeds, so if you can control the weeds, the better the chance of reducing beetles in your area.”

Hay most often becomes contaminated with blister beetles when the insects are crushed in alfalfa from the swather. Beetles are killed by the crimper rollers and become trapped in the hay.

The remains of blister beetles may be concentrated in a small portion of the hay from a field. Beetles are also killed and trapped when forage is driven on before the beetles have had time to escape.

If left alone, the vast majority of blister beetles leave alfalfa shortly after cutting. Cutting without using crimpers and avoiding wheel traffic

on freshly cut alfalfa are two of the best ways to avoid problems.

OSU Extension’s fact sheet on blister beetles advises alfalfa producers take the following measures to avoid blister beetles in hay:

- Spray entire fields with a short residual insecticide just before harvesting. Spray the fence rows and field borders as well; or
- Inspect fields shortly before cutting and spray only the infested areas if any are found.

Seuhs said treating fields for grasshoppers as early as possible in the spring can help reduce beetle numbers.

Blister beetles feed on grasshopper eggs laid in the cracks and crevices of the ground as a nutrient source for the winter. The size of a grasshopper population can be a sign of next season’s blister beetle infestation.

While there is no way to completely eliminate the possibility of blister beetles in alfalfa, the best approach to management is to take all possible precautions to reduce the likelihood that they are present.

“Character development efforts have been shown to encourage healthy behavior and decision-making across the board, preparing children and teens to stand strong in the face of outside pressure for risky behaviors and negative health behaviors,” said Julie Bisbee, executive director of TSET. “Today’s youth face more challenges than ever, and investing in Oklahoma’s children helps put us on a path to ensure a strong start.”

Oklahoma ranks among the lowest on nearly every measure of child well-being: 42nd in health, 33rd in economic well-being, 45th in education, and 41st for positive family and community supports.

The state also ranks fifth in the nation for children impacted by Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs), with 20 percent of Oklahoma children under the age of 17 having experienced two or more ACEs, such as family violence, divorce, parental

Audit:

Auditors pinpointed questionable expenditures like arcade games, Christmas trees, smart watches, sofas, televisions and refrigerators totaling \$652,720.

The extraneous items made up more than 10 percent of all purchases. The \$5.5 million is the total of purchases the auditors did not analyze and could contain unauthorized items.

The tally of noneducational items families purchased with program funds was higher than previously reported in a joint investigation The Frontier and Oklahoma Watch published in May.

Auditors also found Oklahoma failed to follow federal guidelines for four of Stitt’s five educational relief programs, the report shows.

State officials gave the Florida-based company ClassWallet a no-bid contract to administer the Bridge the Gap Digital Wallet program and distribute grants to families.

The auditors also found poor record keeping for another relief program managed by ClassWallet called Stay in School. The program distributed tuition grants for up to \$6,500 to students already attending private schools during the pandemic.

Oklahoma could not provide supporting documentation that students who received grants were actually enrolled and registered at private schools, according to the audit.

Kate Vesper, a spokeswoman for the governor, said Tuesday that the state started an internal audit of Oklahoma’s educational relief funds several months ago.

“Governor Stitt has called for more audits than any other governor in our state’s history and is proactive in monitoring and ensuring appropriate use of Oklahoma taxpayer dollars,” she said. “His commitment to transparency and accountability is no different here.”

But the state has refused to release a review of the program by a private contractor.

Oklahoma responded by placing blame on ClassWallet, saying the company assured

there would be no fraud. But the state said it would take steps to improve its monitoring of federal grants.

According to the audit, Oklahoma said that it was working in a “high-pressure environment” due to the effects of COVID and that it acted in good faith to “ensure funds associated with Bridge the Gap initiative were properly expended when it contracted with ClassWallet.”

But the auditors say the state cannot just pass blame to ClassWallet.

Oklahoma did not say it would return the funds or review for any other unallowable Bridge the Gap expenditures, auditors wrote.

“As the recipient of the GEER grant funds, Oklahoma was responsible for ensuring that its grant funds were used properly,” auditors said.

The Frontier and Oklahoma Watch reported in May the state had returned \$2.9 million in unused educational relief funds to the U.S. Department of Education. The audit revealed the funds were returned to the U.S. Department of Education and reallocated in May 2021 to the Oklahoma Department of Education to be distributed to public schools for summer school programs.

Oklahoma Did Not Utilize Classwallet’s Monitoring Capabilities

State officials claim it was ClassWallet’s responsibility to oversee the relief money and have threatened to sue the company.

Secretary of Education Ryan Walters, who is now a candidate for state superintendent, claimed during a debate in June that he discovered that ClassWallet hadn’t upheld its end of the contract and that he’s working to hold the company accountable.

But emails show that Walters worked to secure ClassWallet the state contract even before Stitt named him Secretary of Education in September of 2020.

Under the contract, ClassWallet gave the state access to

a system to view reports and summaries of purchases, but it wasn’t until February 2021 — a month after the program ended — that the former director of statewide operations for Oklahoma accessed the information, and they only did so once, the audit said.

The auditors found that “Oklahoma did not use all available controls in ClassWallet’s digital wallet system” to monitor how grant money was spent.

Walters granted “blanket approval” to purchases made from pre-approved vendors on the ClassWallet platform, which included Office Depot and, for a short time, Home Depot. Walters was executive director of the nonprofit organization Every Kid Counts Oklahoma and not a state official when he approved the purchases.

Oklahoma’s ‘Stay In School’ Program Also Lacked Proper Oversight

For the Stay in School program, auditors were unable to verify eligibility for eight of 10 randomly selected students.

Students who attended eligible private schools could receive tuition assistance through the program. But ClassWallet subcontracted the eligibility verification to a separate company that automatically deletes emails after 90 days.

Auditors recommend Oklahoma review the eligibility of all participants, or at least a larger sample.

In December 2020, Stitt issued a report about the Stay in School program, citing it as evidence that private schools aren’t just for the wealthy.

“Gov. Kevin Stitt’s Stay in School Fund program proves the strong desire of Oklahoma parents from all income levels and all locations for school choice, proves the state can provide needy families a quality education for an average of as little as \$5,132 per child, and proves that private schools across Oklahoma will gladly accept children from the lower rungs of the economic ladder.”

Parents who received grants said they were grateful for the

financial assistance during the pandemic. One parent said that without the grant money, her daughter would have had to leave her parochial school in Oklahoma City for her last year of junior high.

“Her mental health suffered a lot during the pandemic. That has been the case for so many kids and the comeback has been slow. She missed out on...many cherished events. I cannot imagine what she would have gone through had she had to leave her school, too,” the parent wrote. She asked not to be named out of concern for her daughter’s privacy.

For Stay in School, Bridge the Gap Digital Wallet, and two other educational relief programs, called Learn Anywhere Oklahoma and Skills to Rebuild, the state couldn’t show auditors evidence that relief money went to organizations “most significantly impacted by the coronavirus or deemed essential for carrying out emergency educational services,” as required by the program.

The one program that did meet federal guidelines was an incentive grant program managed by the state Department of Education. Stitt used \$8 million to match the department’s \$8 million, for a total of \$16 million distributed for internet connectivity, mental health support, and other initiatives.
