



Why most Oklahoma state legislative races are uncontested

Oklahoma Watch

Nearly 70 percent of Oklahoma's state legislative elections will be decided without a single vote cast in November. only 31 of 101 House races

Those uncontested, novoters-required races span the state — from Bartlesville to Edmond to west Lawton. where a former Oklahoma inspired more than 100 active Sooners football player named Larry Bush lost the closest state House race in 2018.

That November, nearly 75 percent of House and Senate races statewide included candidates from at least two parties.

Four years later, 182 Republicans filed to run for legislative seats and only 58 Democrats. After three unsuccessful campaigns, Bush was not among them.

"Campaigning takes a toll on your livelihood and your family, every aspect of your life," Bush said last month form his Lawton insurance office, surrounded by family photos and an OU helmet he wore as a defensive back for the Gary Gibbs and Howard Schnellenberger Sooners of the 1990s.

"You're putting everything out there and a lot of people can't do that."

When Bush started his first campaign in 2016, House District 62 showed signs of transitioning from red to purple. Half of its population identifies as Black, Hispanic or mixed race. Democrat Joe Dorman's 2014 gubernatorial bid came up nine votes shy there.

Bush lost but ran again two years later, this time facing a 23-year-old city employee and former OU student government association president named Daniel Pae. In public forums, Bush vowed to support teacher pay raises and criminal justice reform efforts. Pae took similar stances while proposing legislation to support veterans and small businesses.

Bolstered by donations from Republican leadership, including a \$2,000 contribution from House Speaker Charles Mc-Call, Pae approached election

day with the fundraising edge. pandemic and predicted a 2022 Bush relied mostly on personal contributions of less than \$500.

Pae won by 42 votes.

Oklahoma voters will decide and seven of 24 Senate on November 8, a far cry from those 2018 midterms, when the statewide teacher walkout



and retired teachers, support staff and school board members to file for state legislative seats.

Though many of those contests were Republican landslides, a handful of GOPleaning districts were won by margins of six percent or less, including:

• in Muskogee, where Republican Chris Sneed defeated Jack Reavis with 53 percent of votes in House District 14;

• in Sequoyah County, where Republican Jim Olsen defeated Tom Stites with 52.8 percent of votes in House District 2;

• and in western Oklahoma, where Republican Todd Russ defeated Dennis Dugger with 52.7 percent of votes in House District 55.

The opposite happened. Oklahoma now ranks among the nation's least competitive states for legislative races.

Ballotpedia, a nonprofit digital encyclopedia that compiles election information, provided Oklahoma Watch with data from 39 of 44 states that have legislative races on the ballot this year. Only Alabama has a higher percentage of seats without major party competition.

Without competitive local races, voters are more likely to become disengaged or feel alienated, studies have found. The same can happen to lawmakers who aren't making their case to voters. A 2011 Georgetown University study found state legislators who run unopposed are less effective and engaged with constituents. Larry Bush said he fears some

members of his community, many already skeptical that their vote matters, will continue to lose faith in the democratic process if the seat remains uncompetitive. "Once people get used to not

voting, it becomes a habit that affects not only this election but the next election cycle," he said. "Having more candidates out there certainly helps the cause and helps our party, so it's discouraging." Pae, who serves in the House

Disturbing stats

Number of Christians in U.S. shrinking

A recently released study suggests the number of Christians in the United States is diminishing quickly and being replaced by those who do not identify with any religion.

A new report by Pew Research Center and the General Social Survey found a surge of adults leaving Christianity to become atheist, agnostic or "nothing in particular." It predicted if the number of Christians under 30 abandoning their faith accelerates beyond the current pace, adherents of the historically dominant religion of the U.S. could become a minority by 2045.

Noting how approximately 90 percent of Americans identified as Christians in the early 1990s, the study observed that number, which includes children, had fallen to only 64 percent by 2020.

The number of people in the U.S. who identify as religiously

rocketed from 16 percent in 2007 to 29 percent in 2020, the research showed.

Other religions such as Judaism, Islam, Hinduism and Buddhism, accounted for approximately six percent in

The study presented four hypothetical scenarios by which the U.S. religious landscape could change in the coming decades. In one scenario, reunaffiliated, meanwhile, sky-searchers analyzed the poten-

tial impact of young Christian adults abandoning their faith and switching affiliation without limitation.

The other three scenarios hypothesize other types of increasing religious disaffiliation, but "they all show Christians continuing to shrink as a share of the U.S. population, even under the counter factual assumption that all switching came to a complete stop in 2020."

All four scenarios project swelling ranks among the religiously unaffiliated, or "nones," throughout the next half century. The only scenario that projects Christians maintaining a majority in the U.S. through 2070 is if no one changes their religious affiliation after 2020.

Oklahomans encouraged to register to vote

Given that National Voter Registration Day was Tuesday, September 20, I want to encourage everyone to take the steps to let their voices be heard. Ours is a government by the people, and for the people so voting is one of our greatest rights as American citizens.

You can fill out a Voter Registration Application using the Oklahoma Election Board's OK Voter Portal at https:// okvoterportal.okelections.us/ Home/RegWizard. Applications are also available at your County Election Board, most tag agencies, post offices, and libraries. Unfortunately, regardless of

whether you print a copy offline or pick one up at the above locations, you'll still need to sign and mail or hand-deliver your application to your County Election Board to complete the process. The only way to avoid this is when you are getting or renewing your license, the tag agency will take care of submitting your information.

Since Oklahoma's system isn't completely digitized, it's unfortunately still very inconvenient for a lot of Oklahomans. Applicants must have access to a printer or transportation to get to one of the above locations to get their form. They also must buy a stamp and envelope to mail it.

These barriers are keeping many Oklahomans from participating and being heard in the election process. This is why I've worked so hard to help train volunteers on how to make these forms available along with envelopes and stamps.

If anyone is interested in helping register voters, they can contact my office at (405) 521-5553 or Mary.Boren@ oksenate.gov.

Voting is especially important for women. We've seen a large increase in the number of female voters, which is no doubt a result of Oklahoma passing the most punitive antiabortion laws in the nation and the Supreme Court overturning Roe v. Wade, as well as state policies targeting our public schools.

For many mothers, public schools are an invaluable resource. When my three children were in school, I was highly involved. This helped me feel confident that my kids were safe and were learning how to be lifelong learners and good people.

My own family's economic security relied upon the success of the school and the positive influence of teachers. To protect the resource that public schools provide for women and all Oklahomans, it is critical that we encourage everyone to make sure they are ready to vote on November 8.

Work at the Capitol is focused on learning from interim studies, which will be getting underway soon. These are an important part of the legislative process, even though they happen while we are not in session. These studies allow us to tackle complex issues that we may not have time to cover during session.



announcement. It is important for product that the U.S. Food and Drug Administration considers to be in violation of the laws it administers and against which the agency would initiate legal action (seizure) if the company did not recall the product.

However, a product withdrawal is a removal or correction, which involves a minor non-food safety issue that would not be subject to legal action by the FDA, or which involves no violation. Examples include a normal stock rotation or product quality defects.

What are the FDA classes of recall?

The FDA has three very different and distinct classes of recall: Class I, II and III. In almost every case, the FDA will determine the classification of the recall.

AClass I Recall is for an emergency involving the removal from the market of product in which the consequences, immediate or long range, are life threatening and involve a direct cause-effect relationship. This calls for a full-scale public warning; either by the FDA or by the XYZ Company and 100 percent of the product is recovered from The accident occurred at 6:31 the market.





Locked in a tight race for the eastern Oklahoma House seat vacated by John Bennett, Democrat Tom Stites made an unusual request of his Republican opponent Jim Olsen.

"In the spirit of fun and sportsmanship, I invite you to grab your gun and meet me somewhere to shoot targets," Stites, who describes himself as pro-gun and anti-abortion, said in an August 2018 video posted to his campaign Facebook page. "We can find who is the most skilled and experienced with these awesome firearms."

Olsen declined the highly-publicized challenge and Stites' opposition funded ads connecting him to high-profile Democrats unpopular in eastern Oklahoma.

On Sept. 17, 2018, Olsen's campaign spent \$660 on a billboard advertisement, campaign finance records show. On Oct. 16, one day after a dark money group donated \$2,500, Olsen spent \$8,000 on mail advertisements.

"They put me and Hillary Clinton and Nancy Pelosion abig billboard in one of the main areas of the county, even though I never

Olsen, who won with 53 percent of votes, since has gone unopposed through two election cycles. The 62-year Roland legislator recently sponsored two so-called election security bills and a measure to retroactively legalize conversion therapy on LGBTQ individuals.







Recall that a parable is a usually short fictitious story that illustrates a moral attitude or a religious principle. This parable has three areas of concern. First is blindness. Lazarus was in the rich man's presence, but the rich man did not "see" him. The first time he really saw Lazarus was after death.

The second area of concern is isolation. Sometimes we are so concerned with our possessions that we wall ourselves off from others. The rich man had many possessions, but he isolated himself in his wealth.

The final concern is faithlessness. "The one true need that we have in life is the need for purpose, for meaning for our existence. Purpose and meaning can only be found in God. But to possess God means that we must look beyond all that is mundane. Sometimes we fight this call to love. It is too demanding for us. So, what do we do? We hide behind our stuff. 


