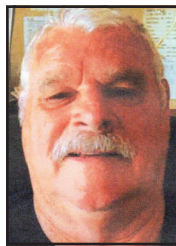

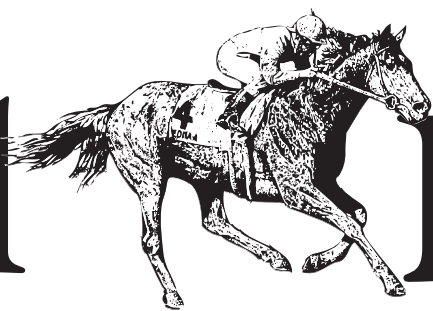
## Juvenile struck, killed in Dibble

Absentee applicants

Deadline October 24 for general election

Voters in McClain County who want absentee ballots mailed to them for the November 8 General Election should apply now, County Election Board Secretary Karen Haley said today.

Absentee ballots are available to any registered voter, provided they are eligible to vote in the election requested. No excuse is needed to vote by absentee ballot.

The deadline for requesting an absentee ballot is 5 p.m. October 24.

Voters can submit a request using the OK Voter Portal at [oklahoma.gov/elections/ovp](http://oklahoma.gov/elections/ovp). Request forms are also available at [oklahoma.gov/elections](http://oklahoma.gov/elections) and at the County Election Board office located in the

McClain County Courthouse.

Haley reminds voters to allow time for an absentee ballot to be received, completed and returned by mail to the County Election Board.

“With some exceptions, all absentee ballots must be notarized before being returned. Voters should give themselves plenty of time to make sure all steps have been followed and that the ballot is returned correctly in order to be counted,” Haley said.

Voters exempt from having an absentee ballot affidavit notarized include those who are physically incapacitated and those who care for physically incapacitated individuals who cannot be left alone.

Those voters must have

their absentee ballot affidavit witnessed by two people.

Military personnel and residents living overseas, along with their spouses and dependents are also eligible for certain allowances. They should contact Voting Service Officers in their units for absentee application forms. Residents living overseas may obtain absentee voting applications from any United States military installation or United States Embassy or Consulate.

Military personnel and overseas citizens who are already registered voters in Oklahoma

High and dry

High temperatures and lack of moisture bad combination

A very stubborn pattern is taking hold across Oklahoma here as we head into the fall season as high temperatures continue to remain above their seasonal average. One thing that is starting to “feel” like fall here in the Sooner State is the fact that morning lows are finally near their seasonal average, helping us stay cool

throughout the majority of the day. Lots of sunshine present as we round out this week with Thursday and Friday expected to remain in the low 80s. Headed into this weekend, sunshine remains with temperatures in the mid 80s for Saturday and Sunday, with some very spotty cloud cover possible Sunday. Next week, temperatures re-

Here’s the reason why recreational marijuana isn’t on the November ballot

Backers of an initiative petition to legalize recreational marijuana in Oklahoma became unwitting guinea pigs in a new process that was meant to speed up and automate the state’s antiquated signature verification system, but a series of delays compounded to keep it off the November general election ballot.

State Question 820 will now appear on a special statewide election in 2023 or go before voters in 2024, depending on what Gov. Kevin Stitt or his successor decides. Without any action by the governor, it would appear on the November 2024 ballot.

Oklahoma’s voter-led initia-

tive petition process is among the hardest in the nation, with multiple chances to challenge the wording of the petition, voter signatures and the summary that appears on the ballot.

SQ 820 faced all of those challenges, but couldn’t surmount a longer-than-expected delay by a first-time vendor for the secretary of state’s office. Western Petition Systems LLC, an affiliated company of longtime political pollster Bill Shapard, was hired to verify signatures and check voter registration under a law passed in 2020 at the outset of the coronavirus pandemic.

Missing the November 2022 ballot will deprive voters for the first time in nearly a century the opportunity to vote on a state question in a general election

year. The Oklahoma Supreme Court made it official this week as it denied a request by the Yes on 820 campaign to put SQ 820 on the ballot. The court said there wasn’t enough time to be able to make an upcoming deadline for mailing overseas and absentee ballots.

SQ 820 would legalize recreational marijuana for adults 21 and over and decriminalize marijuana possession and use. It would make no changes to Oklahoma’s existing medical marijuana program, which voters approved under SQ 788 in 2018.

Path to Election

Backers of SQ 820 thought they were well positioned to make the November ballot. They filed the initiative petition in January. The effort survived a challenge in the spring to the summary of the proposition used on signature-gathering sheets. The campaign then had 90 days to collect signatures. Organizers managed to collect more than 164,000 signatures in just 60 days, well above the threshold of 94,911 required for a statewide initiative petition. On July 5, the campaign delivered 118 boxes to the secretary of state’s office.

Campaign organizers were surprised to hear the boxes of signatures would be sent to Western Petition Systems. The 2020 law changing that part of the initiative petition process was among just a few policy-related bills to make it through the Legislature in a coronavirus-shortened legislative session. Few people knew an outside vendor would be hired to do the job.

The secretary of state’s office told the Yes on 820 campaign it would take two or three weeks to verify the signatures, a timeline close to several recent initiative petitions submitted for signature verification. The

Cole named Distinguished Congressional Champion

The American Association for Cancer Research (AACR) recognized Congressman Tom Cole (OK-04) with the Distinguished Congressional Champion Award for Extraordinary Support of Medical Research.

Cole was selected as a recipient of this award for his leadership and role in boosting funding for the National Institutes of Health (NIH) to support biomedical research.

During Cole's tenure as the top Republican of the House Appropriations Subcommittee on Labor, Health and Human

Services, Education, and Related Agencies, the NIH budget has increased by 49 percent since fiscal year 2015.

"Cancer is a terrible disease that tragically affects almost every American family in some form," said Cole. "I have long supported the NIH's mission to not only improve treatments for patients, but ultimately find a cure and save lives through biomedical research."

"This is something I have been proud to champion, and I am encouraged that this important issue is met with bipartisan

consensus year after year. I was honored to accept this award and remain committed to building on this progress in the fight against cancer," Cole concluded.

First steps taken to address long standing orphaned well problem

Oklahoma is set to receive a federal grant to begin addressing an orphaned well problem that has plagued the state for decades. Since the discovery of oil in the late 1800s, an estimated 500,000 oil and gas wells have been drilled statewide.

The Department of the Interior said Oklahoma will receive \$25 million to plug an estimated 1,196 orphaned oil and gas wells as part of the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law passed in November 2021. That's less than 10 percent of the 17,865 uncapped wells across the state, according to a 2021 report by the Interstate Oil and Gas Compact Commission.

Matt Skinner, director of public information for the

Oklahoma Corporation Commission, said this is the first round of funding.

"This is just the first shot of money into the program. We intend to continue our applications as more money becomes available."

The grant is phase one of a \$4.7 billion investment from the federal government to plug orphaned wells across the country.

Oklahoma representatives have sought to mediate this issue through congressional legislation. Frank Lucas and Stephanie Bice introduced the Abandoned Well Remediation Research and Development Act in July of 2021 which would improve data collection of well locations, and advance plugging/environmental remediation efforts.

Lucas laid out the challenges and solutions the legislation would tackle.

"In Oklahoma, we have thousands of abandoned wells with an average cost of \$40k to \$70k to properly close. For some sites, the costs could rise to nearly \$1 million. This legislation will help us identify new materials and advanced techniques to find and manage abandoned wells, which will help our environment and our energy sector."

The bill was ordered to be amended in January of this year and remains stuck in congress.

In a news release about the grants, the energy department said Oklahoma plans to give priority to "wells that pose the greatest threat to health and human safety, the environment and personal property."

With the federal funding, the OCC will look broadly at its database of abandoned wells and tackle individual cases based on the categories they fall into. "Purging wells" fall into the category of highest priority as they are wells that are actively leaking salt water, oil and gas into nearby water and soil.

## Update from the Capitol

This week, we’ll finalize work on appropriating the state’s more than \$1.8 billion in federal American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds through a special session.

The Joint Committee on Pandemic Relief Funding has worked this past year with citizens, businesses, nonprofits, schools, and state agencies to decide how best to utilize this money to help our state and citizens recover from the hardships and issues caused or worsened by the pandemic.

In total, we’ll be voting on 45 projects that account for just over \$1.1 billion of our total federal funds. These will help address some of the greatest issues facing our state and will ultimately strengthen our economy, grow our workforce, and help improve our citizens’ quality of life.

The committee has requested

that nearly \$500 million go towards supporting critical infrastructure upgrades, especially in rural Oklahoma, like broadband, water projects and public safety.

The committee has set a goal to provide internet access to every Oklahoma household in the next five years. We remain near the bottom nationwide for connectivity—a fact that became painfully clear during the pandemic.

This funding would also provide much-needed water/waste water projects and create a statewide coordinated emergency response network. Citizens and businesses need access to clean, safe water, so there are projects to update old systems, run new lines and provide public/private grants for communities to make needed improvements.

Given our state is no stranger

to natural disasters, ensuring our public safety agencies are properly connected is also imperative so they can respond quickly and efficiently in times of need.

We’ll also be voting on more than \$280 million of projects focused on food insecurity and improved health and protective services. Nearly half of Oklahoma’s 77 counties are considered food deserts, meaning citizens must drive more than 10 miles to the nearest grocery store.

Organizations like Oasis Fresh Market and Food on the Move will receive funding to expand their efforts to get fresh foods to all Oklahomans. Money would go to services to better protect victims of abuse, domestic violence, and human

### Inflation Nation

#### Congressman Tom Cole

President Joe Biden recently joined “60 Minutes” and once again showed how out of touch he is with the realities facing the American people. As Americans continue to pay the highest prices on food and other necessities in 40 years, it is simply inconceivable that Democrats and the president continue to spend our nation further into a recession and raise taxes on the American people.

The latest symptom of our nation’s dire economic condition was on display last week with the Federal Reserve’s decision to raise interest rates for the fifth time this year. While this repetitive action should serve as a warning sign to change course with their irresponsible spending and misguided economic policies, the Biden Administration and the Democrats in Congress continue to plow ahead surprisingly unconcerned.

Instead of acknowledging the fact that inflation is getting worse under their watch, they are celebrating their misnamed “Inflation Reduction Act” and falsely claiming inflation is under control.

Not only has their misguided legislation had little to no impact on inflation, but it has increased taxes on the American people. This includes a natural gas tax that charges a fee for onshore and offshore petroleum and natural gas producers and processors.

Earlier this month the U.S. Bureau of Labor and Statistics reported that the Consumer Price Index (CPI) increased 0.1 percent in August and 8.3 percent in the past year. Not only is that rate higher than economists expected, but it is also higher than last month. Indeed, the irresponsible spending advanced by Democrats has ignited the worst inflation in more than 40 years.

On top of the reckless spending advanced in August, the Biden Administration announced the intention to forgive hundreds of billions of dollars of student loan debt. Both these actions have only added more fuel to the raging fire of inflation.

Finally, not only have Americans essentially worked for one free month the past year because of inflation, but a recent study from the Senate

# Newspaper reporting and content have never been more relevant

We all have stories of readers desperately seeking reliable information about COVID-19 during the pandemic and turning to us to deliver accurate national and state health departments’ evolving assessments as well as local reporting on treatment options in our communities.

We at NNA see it in our daily government affairs work with members of Congress, who almost uniformly admire their local community papers regardless of how they might feel about the national press.

We see it in the example of the civic leaders in Mineral Wells, Texas, who were so distraught over the closing of their newspaper that they reached out to Jeremy Gulban and his Cherry Road group to open one. That he did, as he has in other communities.

And these examples of relevance are borne out by the hard numbers. In March, the National Newspapers Association and NNA Foundation commissioned a survey of readers from across the country, conducted by the highly regarded Susquehanna Polling and Research team. The results confirmed our daily experiences.

The study found local newspapers as the most trusted source when it comes to learning about candidates for public office. On a 10-point scale (with 10 being the “highest”), local newspapers are rated a 7.38, higher than TV stations (6.45), radio (5.58), political mailings (4.63) or social media platforms (2.65).

And our trustworthiness is growing. Compare this year’s results to our 2019 study, when on the issue of trustworthiness,

community newspapers represented a more trusted news source (5.77 on a 10-point scale) than other news sources, rating higher than national network TV news (5.13), cable TV news shows (4.60) and all others. Social media sources like Twitter or Facebook were rated lowest, at 2.92.

The study confirms there is a strong correlation between those who read community newspapers and those who cast ballots in elections. A combined 96 percent of readers of local newspapers say they plan to vote this November—either “very” or “somewhat” likely.

“It seems to us,” Jim Lee, president, Susquehanna Polling and Research, Inc., said, “that voters are increasingly hungry for a higher level of professional integrity when it comes to journalism (both local and national) in today’s age of constant cable TV news and partisan leaning news media outlets.”

TV stations (70%) and local newspapers (68%) are most often relied on as news sources to make decisions about elections compared to much lower scores for direct mailings from candidates or political parties (44%), radio stations (40%) or social media platforms (19%).

A combined 77 percent of respondents say they read a newspaper that covers their local community (a nice increase from a 65 percent average, 2017-2019), consumed via printed edition and online edition, as well as these additional online options that were not in previous surveys: Facebook, YouTube, TikTok or other social media platform.

Local newspapers also continue to receive high metrics on things like “[it] informs me”

(93% agree), “[it] provides valuable local shopping and advertising information (81% agree), and “my household relies on [it] for local news (83%).

The trust quotient is easy to understand. While some readers may think they get news from social media, who knows the source of that news? But readers know where their local newspaper is and how to ask questions or challenge the editor’s news judgment when they disagree.

The difficulty, as most in the industry realize, is not in the relevance of our content, but in our revenue models.

Most local newspapers are experimenting with technology to enhance our readers’ experience and provide new ways for our advertisers to reach our still-strong audience, including newsletters, video, e-editions, and social media publishing, both for our own publications as well as our advertisers.

But the reliance upon the revenue from the print newspaper remains the backbone of the newsroom. Too many have written the obituary of the print newspaper when, instead, they should be supporting its mission.

Readers can help with their subscriptions and contribution. More critically, Congress can help by creating a level playing field for newspapers through the Journalism Competition and Preservation Act. It also can ensure that the valuable federal advertising dollar reaches America’s smaller communities through local newspapers.

Americans believe in and rely upon community newspapers. Are we in a crisis of revenue, yes, most certainly. But relevance? We have that hands down.

## Garvin:

Funds could also be appropriated to support community health centers, expand mobile dental services, and assist non-profits that helped youth during the pandemic.

Another \$223 million has been recommended to support the expansion of mobile telemedicine in rural Oklahoma while also protecting rural hospitals. Significant investments would go towards expanding nursing and other healthcare workforce programs to get 2,500 new healthcare professionals on the job within the next five years.

Other projects we’ll be considering include pharmaceutical drug development and research for some of the state’s most prevalent health conditions and diseases like cancer, diabetes, and obesity, as well as improved health and educational services for youth.

Lastly, we’ll look over nearly \$178 million in projects to address some of our greatest workforce needs. These will include various training programs for broadband, trucking, digital fabrication, manufacturing, and other growing fields.

The committee also wants to invest in educational programs to encourage students to go into high-demand careers like drone technology, aerospace engineering, and cybersecurity. Funding would also go to expand child care services and opportunities statewide to help get parents back into the workforce.

new process also included cross-referencing several data points, like name, address and ZIP code, with voter registration rolls.

Under its \$300,000 per year contract, Western Petition Systems is supposed to conduct a timed test run of its equipment and signature verification process under the supervision of the secretary of state’s office.

According to the contract, “The (test run) will be used to test the entire process and (Western Petition Systems) shall continually look for ways to improve the scanning, data point collection, recording and transcribing of the initiative petitions.”

But in response to an open-records request by Oklahoma Watch, the secretary of state’s office said it had no documentation of the test run.

“We were pleased with the mock test run and with how the software performed,” the secretary of state’s office said in a written statement. “There was nothing noticed during the test run that raised any flags.”

Michelle Tilley, campaign director with Yes on 820, said in a legal filing the campaign had observers at the Oklahoma City offices of Western Petition Systems throughout the seven-week verification. Tilley said she noted several problems with the vendor’s verification system.

“The text generated by the Western Petition Systems computer program, based on its scans of the signature pages, was nearly always wildly inaccurate,” Tilley said in an August 22 declaration filed with the Oklahoma Supreme Court. “This inaccuracy required individuals to laboriously look at physical signature sheets and enter nearly all names, addresses, birth dates, collection dates and other data by hand into the computer program.”

Aside from the \$300,000 per year contract with Western Petition Systems, the secretary of state’s office spent more than \$58,000 on temporary workers who were hired to verify signatures at Shapard’s offices for SQ 820, according to invoices obtained under state open

country’s dismal economy, Americans are not fooled as unaffordable prices force them to dip into their hard-earned savings and retirement.

One thing is clear though: the American people deserve better from their elected leaders.

10-business-day window for challenges could still file for rehearings before the court next week.

In denying the SQ 820 campaign’s bid to get on the November ballot, the court said there wasn’t enough time to get ballots to overseas voters.

The state election board said it had a functional deadline of August 29 to get ballots printed, proofed and election return databases set up for all 77 counties in Oklahoma. Ballots have to be sent to overseas voters by September 24.

“The statutory process cannot guarantee the availability of a particular election, as there are many factors to be considered – not the least of which is the verification and count of signatures and the opportunity for protest,” Chief Justice Richard Darby wrote in the majority opinion.

“Petitioners diligently prepared SQ 820 for submission on the November 2022 general election ballot. Any delays to the process were caused by the Secretary of State’s ‘learning curve’ associated with the use of the new software and by the filing of four statutorily allowed protests.”

### Political games?

The delay at the signature-verification stage led to speculation that politics played a role in keeping SQ 820 off the November ballot. The politics of marijuana legalization don’t fit neatly into partisan boxes. SQ 788, the medical marijuana initiative, passed with 57 percent of the vote in 2018 and had support from Democrats, Republicans, independents and Libertarians. Rural voters in the western part of state weren’t as supportive, leading to several attempts by some rural lawmakers to change the initiative petition process.

In his state of the state speech this year, Stitt said he didn’t think voters were fully aware of the consequences of the medical marijuana state question. Unlike some other states that have legalized medical marijuana, Oklahoma does not

1 pint chili beans

Wells:

The federal government expects the funding to assist environmental justice communities, which have been disproportionately affected by orphaned wells and tend to have lower income levels.

Uncapped wells can pose serious threats to the environment and residents of nearby communities. The Department of the Interior lists methane leakage from the wells as a serious contributor to climate change. Methane is 25 times as potent as carbon dioxide at trapping heat in the atmosphere.

Catalin Teodoriu, a professor at the University of Oklahoma’s Mewbourne School of Petroleum Engineering, says the primary environmental risk involves the release of uncontrolled fluids into the near vicinity. Such fluids can include anything from remaining oil and gas in the well’s reservoir to saltwater leaking from an unsealed zone.

While the wells present obvious environmental threats, plugging them can be a complicated and expensive

process, costing anywhere from \$25,000 to hundreds of thousands of dollars.

“Anybody who’s in the business has to plug their wells. And then if we have to come in and plug them, we get the money from them. We will take them to court if needed.”

Penalties assessed against the owners of unplugged wells fall under the jurisdiction of the Oklahoma Corporation Commission, which oversees the oil and gas industry in the state.

Under Title 165, made effective by the commission in October 2021, any operator who fails to comply with the requirements for plugging and closure of a well can be fined up to \$500.

To operate a well in the state, the OCC requires proof of financial net worth of at least \$50,000 and a surety to the commission in the amount of \$25,000 as an insurance policy that an operator will be capable of plugging a well once it is taken out of service.

Skinner said Oklahoma’s number of unplugged wells is

high for a number of reasons.

One is a change in plugging standards. Today, wells must be plugged with at least 10 feet of cement or other material approved by the pollution abatement department. From the early 1900s through the 1950s, operators plugged wells with certain types of “drilling mud,” a clear violation of today’s standards. While technically plugged, the wells are included in the orphaned well count for a simple reason.

Additionally, accurate records of wells were not kept throughout Oklahoma’s long drilling history. Wells, some of which were drilled over 100 years ago, often do not have the proper documentation of plugging or ownership. If there is no paperwork reflecting a well has been properly plugged, the corporation commission assumes it hasn’t.

“It’s not a matter of it (the well) is going to purge, but when,” Skinner said, referring to when a well begins to leak salt/drill water, oil or gas.

OMRF receives \$2.2 million to study heart health issues

Unlike your skeletal muscles, your heart doesn’t fatigue, and it requires a constant energy supply. Usually that energy source is fat, but if fat isn’t available, the heart settles for

glucose.

This energy-selection process, known as metabolic flexibility, sometimes becomes impossible due to diabetes or aging. Oklahoma Medical Research Foundation scientist Kenneth Humphries, Ph.D., recently received two National Institutes of Health grants total-

require any medical conditions to get a patient card. Doctors do not prescribe any uses for cannabis and can only recommend that the patient qualifies. Almost 10 percent of the state’s population has a medical marijuana patient card, according to the Oklahoma Medical Marijuana Authority.

“When Oklahomans voted for medical marijuana, they were sold a bill of goods,” Stitt said in the February speech.

“The state question was misleading, and it has tied our hands as we regulate the industry.”

The rapid pace of the medical marijuana industry has

Citizen-led legislation

Oklahoma’s initiative petition process is the toughest in the country among the states that allow such voter-driven initiatives, said Andy Moore, chief executive officer of Let’s Fix This and campaign manager for a recent state question effort to establish an independent redistricting commission for Oklahoma. That campaign was abandoned during the first few months of the coronavirus pandemic in 2020.

Moore said Oklahoma voters have the right under the state’s constitution to put initiative petitions on the ballot. But the state has the shortest time period to collect signatures. Other states with similar signature thresholds give more time, he said.

“A typical campaign is going to cost millions of dollars just to get the word out and collect signatures if it has any chance of success,” Moore said. “I think that is antithetical to what the framers of our state wanted. They wanted to give people the power to put a law on the ballot for people to vote. We know that process is very popular with voters.”

Between the constitutional requirements and state law for initiative petitions, Moore said, the process is not designed for efficiency. Several proposals from lawmakers this year would have made it even harder, including thresholds for petition votes by county and prohibitions on spending by out-of-state groups. None were successful.

“The process is not designed with the public in mind,” Moore said. “The process is designed to throw out signatures. It gives no trust to the public. It gives no trust to campaigns. I think it assumes the worst.”

come with growing pains. Thousands of dispensaries popped up across the state and grow operations in rural areas are competing with existing agricultural interests for water, land and electricity. Earlier this year, state lawmakers approved a moratorium on new business licenses.

Stitt spokeswoman Kate Vesper countered rumors on social media that the governor had interfered with the process for getting SQ 820 on the ballot. The secretary of state is a gubernatorial appointee.

“The suggestion that the governor attempted to interfere with the statutorily required duties of the secretary of state’s office is not only inaccurate but just absolutely absurd,” Vesper said.

Stitt told The Associated Press he’d prefer a federal solution to the patchwork efforts of states on marijuana policy.

“Do I wish that the feds would pass legalized marijuana? Yes. I think that would solve a lot of issues from all these different states,” Stitt said during a recent interview with the AP. “But in our state, just trying to protect our state right now, I don’t think it would be good for Oklahoma.”

Vesper said she had nothing to add on Stitt’s comments to the AP. There are ongoing conversations between the governor’s office and the Legislature as to when SQ 820 will be put on the ballot, she said.

# Beef Quality Assurance Certification Training to be held

Cattle producers will have the opportunity to become Beef Quality Assurance Certified on Thursday, October 20, at a training held by the Cleveland, Garvin, and McClain County Extension Offices and the Oklahoma Beef Council.

This training will be in conjunction with the kickoff of the Master Cattlemen’s Class. The training will begin at 6 p.m. at the Health Seminar Center at the Mid-America Technology Center located at 27438 State Highway 59 in Wayne.

There will also be a meal provided. To RSVP, call the McClain County Extension Office at 405-527-2174.

The certification and meeting are free of charge and open to the public.

### Follow BQA Guidelines When Culling Cows

October and November are typical months for calf weaning, pregnancy checking of cows, and cow culling. On very rare occasions, excessive residues of pharmaceutical products have been found in carcass tissues of cull beef cows.

Violations of drug residue regulations can result in expensive fines (or even worse, jail time) for the rancher and a “black-eye” for the entire beef industry. It is vital that cow-calf producers have a close working relationship with a large animal veterinarian in their area. If a cow has an infection or disease that must be treated, her owner should closely follow the veterinarian’s directions, and also read the label of the product used.

Most of these medications will require that the producer keep the treated animal for the label-directed withdrawal time. The Beef Quality Assurance Manual contains the following discussion of medication withdrawal times.

“A withdrawal time may be indicated on the label of certain medications. This is the period of time that must pass between the last treatment and the time

the animal will be slaughtered or milk used for human consumption.

“Forexample, if a medication with a 14-day withdrawal period was last given on August 1, the withdrawal would be completed on August 15 and that would be the earliest the animal could be harvested for human consumption. All federally approved drugs will include the required withdrawal time for that drug on the product label or package insert.

“These withdrawal times can range from zero to as many as 60 days or more. It is the producer’s responsibility to be aware of withdrawal times of any drugs used in their operation. Unacceptable levels of drug residues detected in edible tissues collected at harvest may result in trace back, quarantine, and potential fines or jail time.

“Substantial economic losses may result for the individual producer as well as negative publicity for the entire beef industry...”

Producers are responsible for residue problems and should follow these four rules:

1. Do not market animals for food until the withdrawal time listed on the label or as prescribed by the veterinarian has elapsed.

2. Use only medications approved for cattle and exactly as the label directs or as prescribed by your veterinarian.

3. If ever in doubt, rely on the veterinarian-client-patient relationship you have established with your veterinarian.

4. Keep well organized, detailed records of pharmaceutical products given to individually identified animals. Include in the record, the date of administration, route of administration, dosage given, lot or serial number of product given, person delivering the product, and label or prescription listing of withdrawal dates.

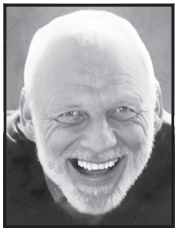

## Applying drought lessons 10 years later

The effects of drought are devastating, but agricultural data collected during such challenging times is a valuable teaching tool.

Oklahoma State University Extension specialists have some retrospective on the historic drought that swept through the plains a decade ago and are learning how it can benefit producers in today's similar climate.

#### Cattle and livestock

OSU Extension livestock marketing specialist Derrell Peel offered the following take-aways on drought response:

- Abusing pastures, especially native range, slows recovery when the drought is over and may impact productivity for years.
- Pasture and grazing management is even more critical during drought, not only to maintain forage resources, but also to avoid problems with prussic acid, nitrates and toxic plant consumption by cattle.
- Keeping more cows than ranchers can reasonably manage leads to delayed losses in reproductive performance and extends drought costs beyond the dry years.
- Bringing in hay from multiple locations can lead to weed issues in pastures.
- When cattle numbers decline, the market will respond with dramatic and volatile price signals that prompt producer action.
- The 2011-2014 drought

resulted in record high breeding animal and feeder cattle prices followed by a dramatic price crash.

Dave Lalman, OSU Extension beef cattle specialist, said even though cattle numbers dropped significantly in Oklahoma and Texas during the last drought, liquidation improved the overall quality of the national cow herd.

"The drought led to aggressive culling, resulting in more rapid progress in some traits, such as temperament, udder structure and productivity," Lalman said. "At the same time, severe drought conditions stimulated widespread interest in creating a cow herd that is a better match to local ranch conditions."

Those conditions, in terms of precipitation, have been well above average since about 1983. From the consumer perspective, cattle are a lot better than they were 30 years ago.

"The industry had successfully selected for cattle with increased growth, carcass weight and marbling, but it wasn't as focused on matching cattle to their forage resources. The 2011 drought changed all that," he said.

Keeping cows that can adapt to their environment, particularly a dry climate, is important in tough years, Lalman said. Other takeaways from the last severe drought period include:

- For a commercial cow/calf operation, purchasing seedstock that excel in fertility and fleshing ability without

requiring a lot of expensive supplemental feed is critical.

"I don't care how much genetic potential their calves have for growth, carcass yield or marbling, if a cow doesn't raise a calf, you don't have a carcass to sell," Lalman said.

- A cow herd developed with the fundamental principles of moderate mature size, moderate genetic potential for milk production, good fleshing ability on grass and good feet has a much higher probability of thriving in tough environments and through drought periods.

- Reduce the stocking rate and work to develop a grazing system less reliant on purchased or harvested hay. In 1980, Oklahoma produced about three-fourths ton of hay for every beef cow.

Today, the state produces two-and-a-half tons of hay for every beef cow. The system exposes cow/calf producers to more risk and forces excessive destocking when it doesn't rain.

"I think 2011 and 2012 made an impression that will last," Lalman said.

#### Wheat varieties

Brett Carver, OSU regents professor and wheat genetics chair, said it's a survival of the fittest as he and the OSU Wheat Improvement Team sift through thousands of wheat genetic lines every year to develop new varieties. OSU research showed the germplasm Showdown stood out during its formative years when drought was a major factor.

## To graze or grain? Producers gear up for wheat planting season

Drought conditions are still a major factor right now as producers strategize when and how much wheat to sow over the next few weeks.

A current lack of subsoil moisture limits wheat's potential to sprout and germinate, and some farmers may decide to "dust in" wheat. The Oklahoma State University Extension fact sheet on planting dual purpose wheat explains dusting it in as a technique that plants seeds in shallow soil (less than 1 inch) in the hopes of rainfall later this fall.

Greg Hartman, agriculture and 4-H educator for Oklahoma State University Extension in Washita and Beckham counties, said in addition to the heat and dry climate, grasshoppers and armyworms are still present and could damage tender wheat seedlings.

However, ranchers in desperate need of fall grazing pastures may already have some wheat in the ground.

"Everybody is getting anxious (to plant) as the days get shorter," he said. "A lot of people think Sept. 15 is the optimal time to plant according to old timers, but it's been proven by OSU researchers that whether you plant on August 20 or September 15, it's all about on the same pace come

November 15."

Only 15-20 percent of the wheat planted in Hartman's area of western Oklahoma will be harvested for grain. The rest is used as a forage source for cattle. Hartman encourages producers to ask their county OSU Extension office for assistance in conducting a soil test before planting.

Residual nitrogen and other minerals are common this year in soil results because of drought conditions.

Josh Bushong, OSU Extension area agronomist for the west district, explained on a recent episode of the Extension Experience podcast that nitrogen and residue management affect forage yields in wheat pastures.

"If you have a lot of residue from the previous wheat crop or failed summer crop, you're going to have a harder time getting pasture established," he said. "While the crop residue has benefits such as soil water retention, it can make it more difficult to get proper seed to soil contact for good seed germination. Focus on fallowed or tilled fields for fall pasture, and for those other fields (with residual nitrogen tied up in the crop residue), delay planting until October and target just a grain crop instead of forage and grain."

Bushong said producers

planting wheat for fall pasture should make available at least 60 pounds of nitrogen per acre (between soil residual and applied fertilizer) to ensure at least a ton of forage production. For a grain-only crop, he recommends no more than 40 pounds.

"If you're turning cattle out to fall pasture, the biggest thing is early establishment," Bushong said. "The quicker we can get that plant up and growing, the more biomass we're going to produce in the fall."

For farmers sowing dual-purpose wheat, 90 to 120 pounds of seed per acre is the normal rate. Bushong said producers should calculate their seeding rates based on forage needs and expected stocking rates of a pasture.

The rising costs of fuel, fertilizer and other materials are also a variable this fall. Kim Anderson, OSU Extension grain marketing specialist, said wheat prices have leveled out and show little volatility right now, but international pressures, such as the war in Ukraine and the building conflict between China and Taiwan, could quickly move market prices in either direction.

"We could see \$6 bushel per acre wheat or \$14 bushel per acre wheat (next year), but the market is telling us right now that we're going to see \$8 per acre," Anderson said.

health. Humphries will examine a complication of diabetes called diabetic cardiomyopathy through a four-year, \$1.7 million grant from the National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute. “What’s troubling is that cardiomyopathy can occur even in people who are doing a great job of managing their diabetes,” Humphries said. Separately, a new, two-year, \$480,700 grant from the National Institute on Aging is funding Humphries’ research into age-related changes in heart metabolism. Humphries will work with fellow OMRF scientists Ben-

jamin Miller, Ph.D., and Mike Kinter, Ph.D., to explore why mitochondria, often called the powerhouse of the cell, decline with age, leading to a loss of heart function. Their research will focus on a particular enzyme that decreases as we age. “Competition for these kinds of federal dollars is intense. To be awarded two grants in close proximity is an impressive feat,” said Holly Van Remmen, Ph.D., chair of OMRF’s Aging and Metabolism Research Program. “Dr. Humphries is making significant progress toward treatments for health problems that impact millions of Americans.”

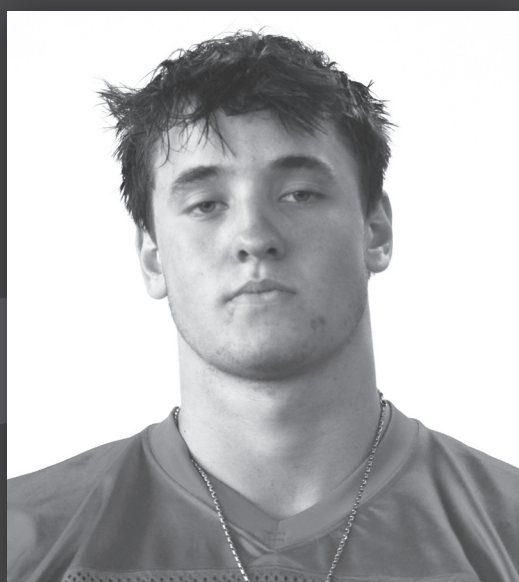

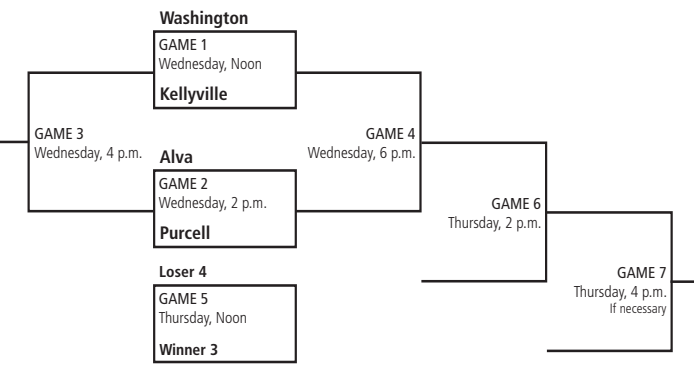

## Our Lady of Victory Catholic Church

October 2, 2022 is the twenty-seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time. During Ordinary Time, the Gospel focuses on the teachings and miracles of Christ during his time on earth.

As mentioned before, I was not raised in the Catholic faith. In fact, I was almost 39 years old before joining. The many teachings of the Christian faith were presented differently in my childhood church. Works of mercy were actions I knew were important, but they were not so concisely presented.

Occasionally, by sharing these differences in presentation, perhaps those unfamiliar with the Catholic faith will come to understand there is much more similarity than difference among those of us who are Christian.

What are the seven corporal works of Mercy? To feed the hungry, to give drink to the thirsty, to clothe the naked, to give shelter to travelers, to visit the sick, to visit the imprisoned and to bury the dead.

What are the seven spiritual works of Mercy? Counsel the

doubtful. Instruct the ignorant. Admonish the sinner. Comfort the sorrowful. Forgive all injuries. Bear wrongs patiently. Pray for the living and the dead.

In an article written by Ron Rolheiser, "Bury the Dead," he outlines several important points. In past cultures sometimes people, especially the really poor, were left unburied, to be eaten by vultures and the worms. That is still true today in some war-torn countries. Watch the news any night and you see how many people, still, do not receive the dignity of burial.

The counsel, bury the dead, is first and foremost about this, no human being should be deprived of the dignity of having his or her body properly returned to the earth, be that through burial, cremation, or some other culturally sanctioned (sanctioned, as in sacred) practice.

In our Western world, however, for the main part, this happens, our dead are buried with reverence. In fact, this is one of our strengths, culturally

and morally. We are horrified at the thought that in past ages, and in some present cultures, bodies are violated after death, stuck on posts to decay publicly, thrown into open graves, or simply left to vultures. We take moral offense at this. Rightly so.

So where should we be challenged?

Simply put, for us the challenge is to be more attentive to deaths within our communities, both by attending more funerals and by using those funerals (and wakes) to let the spirit of whoever we are burying bless us.

We should stop avoiding funerals. We have a great strength as a culture in that we treat our dead with reverence. We want our dead buried, with proper respect and dignity, but, mostly, we do not want to be there when that happens. More and more, we are going to fewer funerals.

Rolheiser says, "I am old

Steven Brownfield spoke on Sunday evening taking Acts 12 as a text. He made the point that although the story appears to be about Peter's narrow escape from prison and seemingly certain execution, the story really was about king Herod

Agrippa. The chapter both begins and ends with Herod as the central figure.

Herod ingratiated himself to his citizens by killing James with the intent to kill Peter, but God provided a miraculous escape. At the end of the chapter Herod gave a speech which was lauded as being god-like in delivery. The moral of the story is this: pride goes before a fall, Proverbs 16:18.

God won both rounds against Herod, and God's winning ways continued as the text revealed that "the word of God grew and multiplied."
