



## Burn ban lifted by county commissioners

McClain County Commissioners voted to lift the burn ban at their regular meeting at the McClain County Courthouse.

In their meeting Monday morning, the three commissioners, Terry Daniel, Wilson Lyles and Glen Murray voted not to extend the burn ban.

At their meeting October 17 commissioners approved their \$10,116,347 budget.

They approved a \$100 per month pay increase for all full-time county employees and \$200 per month to the sheriff's field deputies beginning with the January 2023 payroll.

A total of 1.65" was recorded in that 24 hour window in Purcell. According to the Oklahoma Mesonet, 1.57"

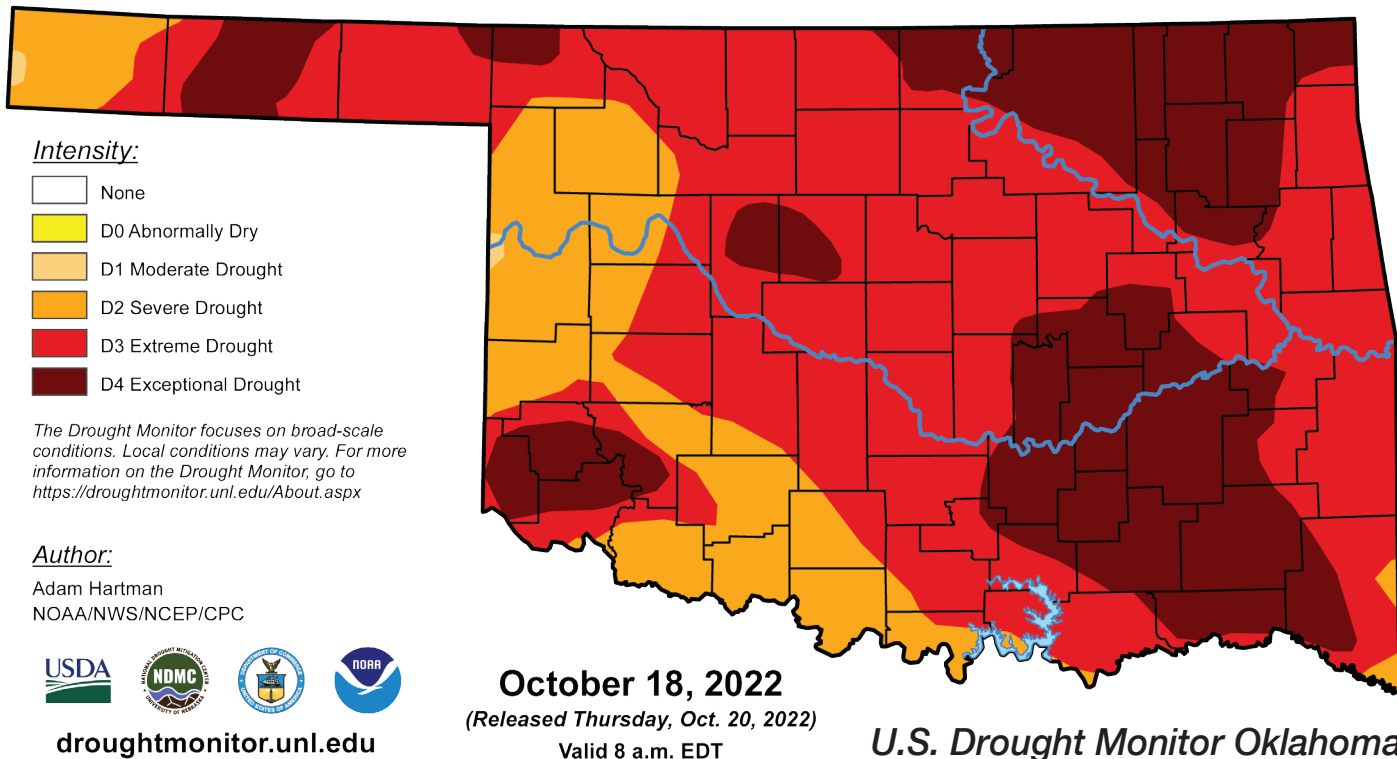
was recorded in Washington and 2.07" in Byars.

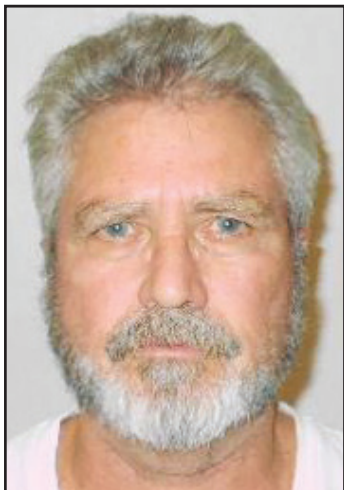
## Guilty

Blackwood draws 4-year prison term

A Byars man is back behind bars after a McClain County jury returned a guilty verdict October 19 in his trial for first degree manslaughter.

James S. Blackwood, 64,



James Blackwood

was booked into the McClain County Detention Centers shortly after midnight October 20.

He had been free on \$100,000 bond since the charge was filed on July 26, 2019.

The jury trial included seven days of testimony before Associate District Judge Charles Gray.

Jurors sentenced Blackwood to four years, the minimum prison term under Oklahoma law. Formal sentencing by Judge Gray will be 11 a.m. November 16.

# Fall care of perennials

As you transition your gardens from fall to winter, you may be contemplating a bit of garden clean up. Before reaching for the pruners and rakes, consider all the benefits and beauty of leaving healthy perennials stand for winter.

The seed heads of many

perennials like coneflower, rudbeckias, liatris and bee balm attract seed-eating songbirds like finches, sparrow, chickadees, juncos, and jays to the winter garden. These winged visitors add motion and color to the winter garden. Best of all, you don't need to refill and clean this natural food source.

Many of these plants provide homes for beneficial insects, including native bees and other pollinators. A variety of these insects overwinter in or near the stems of perennials.

Native plants have evolved with many of these insects, birds and wildlife and most provide homes and food for native insects, songbirds, and wildlife. Purple coneflower, liatris, rudbeckias, sunflowers, asters, goldenrod, yucca, and Joe Pye weed are just a few of these native plants you might be growing.

Enjoy the winter foliage of evergreen and semi-evergreen perennials by leaving them intact in the garden. Watch for and avoid disturbing the green leaves at the base of perennials like yarrow, Shasta daisy, and globe thistle.

Leave borderline hardy perennials intact to improve their chances of surviving a harsher-than-normal winter. The stems capture any snow and helps retain any additional winter mulch, both providing needed root insulation.

Remove any diseased or insect-pest-infested plants. Removing this from the garden in fall reduces the risk of these problems occurring next year. Discard do not compost this material as most compost piles do not heat up to high enough temperatures to kill them. Contact your local municipality for disposal options.

Remove hosta leaves once the fall color fades and leaves die to reduce the risk of leaf nematodes overwintering in the crown of the plants. It also eliminates a winter home for slugs and their eggs.

Wait for several hard frosts when cutting back perennials in the fall. In milder climates, wait for leaves to brown and dry completely. This ensures the plant has stored all the energy it produced in the roots for healthy growth next spring.

Use sharp bypass pruners to make a clean cut through the stem. Disinfect tools by dipping in rubbing alcohol or spraying with a disinfect spray to prevent the spread of disease.

Rake leaves into the garden over the soil surface around the plants instead of to the curb. Fall leaves make great mulch that moderates soil temperature, suppresses weeds, conserves moisture, and improves the soil as they break down. Plus, they are free.

Wait to finish removing perennials until spring temperatures regularly hover in the 50's. This allows overwintering insects a chance to leave their winter homes. It also provides songbirds much needed food in spring before many of our plants begin producing seeds and berries.

Take caution, read labels when feeding failed crops

Oklahoma ranchers are getting creative with alternative feedstuffs this fall because the drought has drastically reduced normal hay yields.

"It's been an unusual year, and all summer crops have potential to be failed out," said Todd Baughman, Oklahoma State University Extension specialist for row crop weeds. "Producers should make sure they're clear with their insurance companies and have the ability to turn that crop into a forage or feed value."

Some producers are choosing to bale up failed summer crops, such as soybeans or cotton. However, not everything that can be swept into windrows and fed as hay is safe for livestock to eat. Individual producers and hay customers should research the chemicals applied to crops before converting a field to feed or forage.

Baughman said most failed crops this year received herbicide treatments but contain lower amounts of fungicides or insecticides.

"The biggest issue is each individual label is different in regard to what you can or can't do from a feed or forage or hay standpoint," he said. "Even within that specific label, it may vary between crops. For instance, there may be a seven-day restriction on corn or grain sorghum or a 30-day restriction or you can't even feed cotton or soybeans."

Baughman said there are two key things to remember when reading labels:

- The specific pesticide label of the product applied must be

checked and not just a label with a similar active ingredient. For example, if a generic form of glyphosate was applied rather than Roundup®, producers must refer to the label of the specific glyphosate formulation and not the Roundup® label.

- Products, such as atrazine and 2,4-D, have individual labels, but if a pre-mix of two products was applied, that could change the feeding restrictions. Therefore, the actual premix label should be consulted.

"The most important thing is consulting the label," Baughman said. "If there is no mention of forage or hay on the label for a particular crop, then it is an off-label use."

Failed cotton can help extend the grazing season, replace hay and provide additional revenue for an operation. Dave Lalman, OSU Extension beef cattle specialist, and Marty New, west district area livestock specialist, said the seed, lint, boll and leaf components of

the cotton plant are a nutritional feed source, but cattle will not consume much of the stalk unless the field is first overgrazed.

"Leaf material will decline rapidly once the bottom leaves begin to yellow," New said. "Most cotton fields will provide additional grazeable forage in the form of grass or forbs around field edges, fences and waterways."

The leaf, boll, lint and seed should average around 15 to 20 percent protein and around 55 to 60 percent total digestible nutrients, which is the equivalent to energy common in average-quality grass hay, Lalman said.

The OSU Extension specialists said research indicates each acre of a poor cotton crop could provide 20 days of grazing per cow while an acre from a good crop might provide around 41 days of grazing per cow.

"Cattle will graze the more

## OTA comes to Purcell

It costs four cents a mile to travel on Oklahoma Turnpikes while the national average is seven cents.

That's the word from Oklahoma Turnpike Authority Deputy Director Joe Echelle.

Echelle spoke to the Purcell Rotary Club last week and talked about the proposed turnpike that is drawn up to meet I-35 just north of Purcell.

He was accompanied by Bryce Boyer, the public information officer for Oklahoma Transportation.

Echelle said OTA receives zero state appropriations, bringing in only revenue from tolls.

"Forty percent of toll revenue comes from out of state motorists," Echelle said.

In 2021 OTA brought in \$135 million.

Approximately 38 percent of the tolls are paid by commercial carriers, Echelle told Rotarians and guests last Wednesday at Trinity United Methodist Church.

Echelle talked about safety

enhancements on the turnpike system such as concrete barriers, cable barriers and cashless tolling.

An example of the safety of cashless tolling is it cuts down on traffic at the toll booths.

Echelle said you have a person going 80 m.p.h. with a pike pass and you have another driver pulled over digging for change and it can cause problems.

"We've had fatality accidents at toll gates," Echelle said.

Echelle explained if a property owner files a lawsuit,

Oklahoma Law allows OTA to go straight to the Oklahoma Supreme Court for a ruling.

Talking about all the publicity around the turnpike expansion east of Norman, Echelle said there has been a lot of inaccurate reporting.

He said newspapers will pull one sentence out of a long answer and television stations call for a quote and say their deadline is 4:30 p.m. when they call at 4:15 p.m.

He indicated it has made things difficult for the OTA.

"Property acquisition is the most serious thing we do," Echelle confirmed.

The Deputy Director listed the order or priority for the upcoming projects.

Number one is the Newcastle to I-35 turnpike. Second is I-35 to the Kickapoo turnpike and third is the Tri-City connector, which runs southwest of Will Rogers.

Fourth in priority is Indian Hills to SH 9 and fifth is the Highway 9 south turnpike to I-35 near Purcell.

## Update from the Capitol

On Monday, the Senate Rules Committee heard from a panel of state leaders and female business owners about issues facing Oklahoma women and what we can do to help improve their lives. My bipartisan study brought in experts to look at the issues and problems facing women so we can introduce policies to address them.

Our first speaker was Jenna Worthen, a mom of three, CEO of the James Martin Company and the creator of the online community, Women Who Work, for women to share their struggles and successes as they manage their families and careers.

She shared how Oklahoma women are paid less than men – 74 cents to \$1, which is the largest gap nationally – and have less career mobility, including promotions and other opportunities. Four in

10 Oklahoma women are the bread winners for their family and 73 percent have children, so the fact that they make less and don't have the same career opportunities as men is hurting families and our state.

Given that women make up just over half of Oklahoma's population and a large percentage of the workforce, Worthen noted that without them, companies can't survive, so supporting them and meeting their needs is crucial to our economy.

StitchCrew and VEST founder, Erika Lucas, shared that less than six percent of CEOs are women and less than three percent of venture capitalists invest in female businesses. Women are burned out in the workforce – they make less, they have less opportunities and then they have the added responsibilities and stress of caring for their children. So-

ciety must change and better meet the needs of this particular workforce because companies can't survive without them.

Commerce Executive Director Brent Kisling said that Oklahoma needs about 38,000 more employees to meet all the open jobs and needs of our state's workforce. The agency has started numerous programs to try to fill this gap and give the business community the tools they need to encourage people back into the workforce.

Oklahoma is working to better align state services with school curriculums, as well as investing in marketing to attract workers to our state.

A lot of Oklahoma's workforce problems stem from the fact that we're way above the national average for the number

### A long, cold winter ahead

As temperatures begin to drop across the United States, Americans are becoming increasingly worried about affording to heat their homes in part due to the Biden Administration's war on American energy.

Because of President Joe Biden and congressional Democrats' disastrous progressive energy initiatives, hardworking Americans are facing record-high prices at the pump and could potentially empty their pockets, even more, to keep their families warm this winter. Unfortunately, the president and Democrats continue to push policies that only worsen our nation's energy crisis and threaten to leave Americans out in the cold.

With home heating costs at a 25-year high, Americans

will pay between \$1,300 and \$2,400 to heat their homes this winter according to the Energy Information Administration.

And because wages are not keeping up with inflation, Americans are already struggling to make ends meet and pay their bills.

Although Oklahoma and other states are in a position to export petroleum and help curb some of the pain at home and in European energy markets, President Biden continues to make the wrong decisions when it comes to energy.

Because of the Biden Administration, our nation is in a vulnerable position and is forced to rely on other countries that do not have our best interests in mind for our energy needs. Last month, G7 countries released a plan to cap the price of Russian oil to limit Putin's resources for his unjustified invasion of

Ukraine.

In retaliation, the Organization of the Petroleum Exporting Countries Plus (OPEC+), including its Russian-led allies, decided to drive up the already skyrocketing global energy costs by cutting output by 2 million barrels of oil per day, the largest cut since 2020. In an attempt to curb this price influx, President Biden instructed the U.S. Strategic Petroleum Reserve (SPR) to release another 10 to 15 million barrels of crude oil.

Not only will this have little impact on energy prices and is not a long-term solution, but it also drains our emergency reserves even more.

Currently, the SPR inventory is at its lowest since 1984, and there are still 14 million

#### 2022 Midterm Elections

With the midterms approaching, it is finally time for the American people to voice their opinion of the Biden presidency, or so we are being told. This is a common story. Every four years with midterm elections we are bombarded with how this one election is the touchstone of America's approval of the president.

I have two statements about the midterm elections. First, I predict the Democrats will probably lose seats. Secondly, if they do, that does not mean doom for Democrats in 2024. How do I know this? Because I study history.

To understand my statements, we have to go back, and Franklin Roosevelt seems as good a place as any to start. 1932 was a historical election. Up to that point, Republicans had dominated the White House since Lincoln, but 1932 ushered in Roosevelt and a Democratic dominance to 1968.

The year was also in the heart of the Great Depression and quickly FDR became beloved for his New Deal policies to relieve the nation's suffering. It should be no surprise that in the 1934 midterm elections the Democrats picked up nine seats in the House and nine in the Senate. FDR then cruised to an easy win in the 1936 presidential election, 523-8 in the Electoral College.

What may be more surprising is that was the last midterm election win for the Democrats for some time, even though FDR retained his popularity and won two more presidential elections. In the 1938 midterm elections, the Democrats lost 72 seats in the House and seven in the Senate, yet FDR won the 1940 election 449 to 82. In the 1942 midterm elections, the Democrats lost 45 seats in the House and eight in the Senate, with FDR still winning the 1944 presidential election 432 to 99.

For the rest of the story, because of size restraints, we will only look at midterm elections before a successful presidential reelection. The next full two-term president was Eisenhower. During his first midterms, his party lost two seats in the Senate and 18 in the House, yet he won reelection in 1956, 457 to 73. Both Kennedy and Johnson were basically one-term presidents. Nixon became president in 1968 and, for his first midterm election, his party did pick up two Senate seats but lost 12 in the House, yet he destroyed his competition 520-17 in his reelection bid in 1972.

Ford and Carter were both one-term presidents, with the next two-termer being Ronald Reagan. Reagan was extremely popular in the 1980s, but during his first midterm election, he lost 27 seats in the House but picked up one in the Senate. Yet even with the House losses, he crushed his opponent in the 1984 presidential election, 525 to 13.

George H.W. Bush was a one-termer, followed by the very popular two-term President Bill Clinton. No matter how popular he was, in his first midterm election his party lost a staggering 54 seats in the House and eight in the Senate. Even with this blow, he still won his reelection in 1996, 379-159.

George W. Bush was the exception to all of his fellow two-term presidents. In his first midterm election, he picked up two seats in the Senate and eight in the House. He went on to win reelection in 2004, 286 to 251.

The last two-termer was Obama. In his first midterms, he lost six seats in both the Senate and the House, yet his party's defeat did not stop him from winning in 2012, 332 to 206.

What we learn from history is that the party controlling the White House loses seats in the midterm. If this election follows suit, Democrats can expect the same. Secondly, every president who won reelection since 1936 has lost party seats in their midterm, except for W.

Does this mean that if Democrats lose seats this November that Biden will win reelection? Of course not. Yet it also means that midterm elections hold no bearing on presidential reelections. National issues are important in midterms and Biden will have some influence on these elections, but it also means that local and state issues carry weight.

So consider the issues, examine the candidates, and please vote. It is an important election because all elections are. However, after the elections are over, just turn off your TVs and Internet feeds when you start to hear about what this will mean for the Democrats in two years.

# Halloween - Will the real trick or treat be November 8?

Halloween is coming but the real trick or treat may be November 8, the midterm election. November 8 may feel more like Halloween this year than the traditional October date.

Who knows what will happen. Georgia, Nevada and Pennsylvania all have Senate races that could tilt the balance of Congressional power depending on who is elected. All three races are going down to the wire. In probably each state it will most likely be the next day before a winner is determined – if not longer.

The 2022 midterm election is shaping up to be one for the history books.

According to a new analysis from pollster Echelon Insights, an estimated 125.6 million Americans are expected to turn out in November’s midterm contests. Such a figure would shatter the record set in 2018’s midterms, which saw 53.4 percent of the eligible voting-age population cast their ballots, according to the Census Bureau.

Already voters are starting to come out in full force: As of Tuesday, October 18, at least 2.8 million people already cast their ballots in the midterms, according to the United States Elections Project. That includes the more than 131,000 Georgia

voters who cast their ballots early on the first day of early voting on Monday, October 17, handily beating the previous first-day record for a midterm of 72,000, per state election official Gabriel Sterling. (Spectrum News NY)

Issues are driving Americans to the polls. Pewresearch.org found the following to be priority concerns of registered Americans. The numbers with each issue represent a percent of primary concern of those surveyed

Economy. 79, Healthcare 68, Supreme court appointments 64, The coronavirus outbreak 62, Violent crime 59, Foreign policy 57, Gun policy 55, Race and ethnic inequality 52, Immigration 52, Economic inequality 49, Climate change 42, Abortion 40.

Of course, you could conduct a poll in your community and the level of interest on any of these issues would probably be in a slightly different order. In almost every scenario the economy and inflation are paramount with voters.

Inflation has knocked on every American’s door and has not been satisfied by a treat. Inflation at the rate of 8.2 percent, has been one hungry monster that has devoured American paychecks and pushed seniors back into the workforce. Avail-

able part time jobs are now being sought by seniors who need the money.

A recent poll shows a dead heat between Sen. Catherine Cortez Masto (D-Nev.) and Republican candidate Adam Laxalt in the Nevada Senate race. In Pennsylvania, it’s Lt. Governor John Fetterman and R. Mehmet Oz who are now very close.

In Georgia the Senate race has Raphael Warnock leading Herschel Walker but the Governor race between Governor Brian Kemp and Stacey Abrams remains close according to a Quinnipiac University Georgia poll.

Save some of your leftover Halloween candy for November 8. Have a bowl of popcorn for a real evening of trick or treat.

of people who retired during the pandemic, who are ill or disabled, formerly incarcerated and not looking for employment, or who have responsibilities at home preventing them from working, like lack of child care or caring for an elderly or disabled parent.

I’ll share more about the study next week but some of the most common recommendations included companies increasing pay for women and providing more schedule flexibility, career opportunities, equal pay, paid maternity leave, and compensation to cover child care costs.

The state must also improve access to affordable child care – many parts of Oklahoma are considered child care deserts. Other suggestions included improving overall medical and preventative care for women, prenatal care, access to domestic violence services and affordable housing for women trying to escape their abusers.

elists are all First Americans. Even though they have things in common, we try to choose panelists who represent different areas of the career field.”

palatable and high-nutritional value plant components first,” New said. “For this reason, the grazing period can be extended by strip grazing or rotational grazing. To make the most efficient use of crop residue, no more than one week’s worth of grazing area should be offered for each grazing period.”

When feeding failed cotton, producers should also consider the possibility of gossypol toxicity. Gossypol is a natural toxin present in the cotton plant that protects it from insects.


“Ruminants with fully functional rumens can detoxify gossypol because the ruminal microorganisms bind the toxin so it can be absorbed,” Lalman said. “Non-ruminants and pre-ruminant calves (less

than four months of age) are unable to tolerate gossypol. It is not recommended to graze

cotton residue with breeding bulls within 60 to 90 days of the breeding season.”

## Recycling day

### Collection event for #6 styrofoam

Styrofoam is bad news for the environment, so much so that some places have banned it altogether.

But it's also possible to recycle much of what winds up in a landfill.

On Saturday from 11 a.m. to noon, Foam Recycling in Central Oklahoma will have a collection truck at Purcell Public Library to accept donations of used, clean #6 polystyrene.

That is the product that can be recycled through a procedure called densifying.

Containers, cups and bowls will be among items accepted. All must be clean, i.e., no paper labels or tape attached.

Dirty foam that contains

food scraps cannot be put into the densifier as it will contaminate the clean foam, making it worthless for recycling.

You can tell if the product is the #6 foam by bending it. The #6 will snap or break. If the foam bends, it is #4, a plastic unsuitable for recycling through densifying.

You can also look for #6 in the recycle triangle on the foam container.

Expanded polystyrene or styrofoam was created by Dow Chemical Corp.

It is a known carcinogen if eaten, burned or left to leach into the soil at a landfill.

It does not decompose and will remain intact in the landfill for 500 years.

## Backyard poultry at risk of deadly disease

Backyard poultry owners should take careful biosecurity measures this fall to protect their animals from highly pathogenic avian influenza. HPAI is a strain of the flu that is extremely infectious and most often fatal to all poultry.

Within the past few weeks, the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food and Forestry has confirmed HPAI in backyard chickens in Tulsa and Creek counties. It has also been detected in wild waterfowl near Oklahoma City.

Earlier this spring, HPAI cases were reported on a commercial poultry operation in eastern Oklahoma.

**HPAI Signs and Symptoms**

- Coughing and sneezing;
- Difficulty breathing;
- Extreme depression;
- Lack of energy;
- Decrease in feed or water intake;

- Swelling or purple discoloration of head, eyelids, comb, wattle and legs;
- Decrease in egg production;
- Sudden, unexplained death;
- Quietness among the flock.

If poultry owners suspect HPAI, they should immediately contact one of the following:

- Local county Extension educator: find your county;
- Oklahoma Animal Disease Diagnostic Laboratory, 405-744-6623;
- ODAFF State Veterinarian, Rod Hall, 405-522-6141;
- Your local veterinarian.

**Methods of prevention**

- Restrict visitor access to birds;
- Prevent contact with wild birds (especially waterfowl);
- Refrain from visiting other poultry operation locations;
- Set aside clothing and footwear to wear only when working with birds;
- Disinfect footwear before entering a barn or coop;

- Wash hands with soap and water before and after handling birds;
- Reduce availability of food, water and any potential nesting areas for wild birds;
- Fix holes in roofs, screens and walls of poultry barns or coops;
- Do not share equipment with other bird owners;
- Birds that have been near other poultry should be quarantined from the rest of the flock for at least 14 days.

Officials with Oklahoma State University Extension and ODAFF said the risk of HPAI transmission to humans and other animals is low. If contact with the disease is suspected, the Oklahoma State Department of Health Acute Disease Service can help monitor for symptoms and arrange for testing and treatment.

## NEWS from the City of Purcell

### Abandonment of Refrigerators and Iceboxes in Places Accessible to Children

Any person, firm, or corporation who abandons or discards in any place accessible to children any refrigerator, icebox, or ice chest of a capacity of one and one-half (1½) cubic feet or more which has an attached lid or door which may be opened or fastened shut by means of an attached latch or who, being the owner, lessee, or manager of such place, knowingly permits such abandoned or discarded refrigerator, icebox, or ice chest to remain in such condition shall be deemed negligent as a matter of law and shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

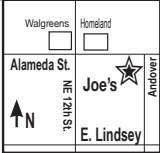

The owner said they found a woman identified as Driver

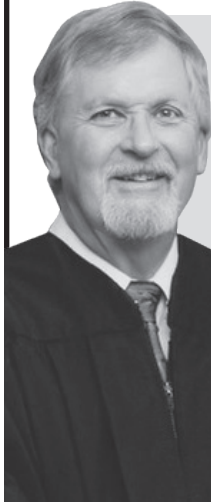
inside their home when they returned to the residence.

they found three adults and two children ages 6 months and 4 years in a vehicle with rear end damage and a shattered back window.

The occupants said they were pulling into Southway Mobile Home Park when their vehicle was rammed from behind by a yellow Dodge Ram pickup. They reported the pickup began pushing their vehicle until it would no longer move. They identified the pickup as belonging to Ochoa-Aleman and reported the suspect had a

long-standing dispute with one of the men. According to the affidavit, Ochoa-Aleman left the area, reportedly returning later to fire several shots into the vehicle. On the morning of October 17, police went to the mobile home park where a resident reported a bullet hole in his van. Police also located two more bullet holes in the mobile home. Police obtained a search warrant for Ochoa-Aleman’s home and vehicles.

The warrant was executed by Purcell police, OSBI, the McClain County Sheriff’s Department and District 21 Task Force. Authorities recovered a loaded 9mm semi-automatic pistol hidden under the hood of a vehicle parked next to the pickup. They also recovered spent shell casings. Family members at the scene said Ochoa-Aleman may be in Piedras Negras, Mexico, or Oklahoma City, according to the affidavit.

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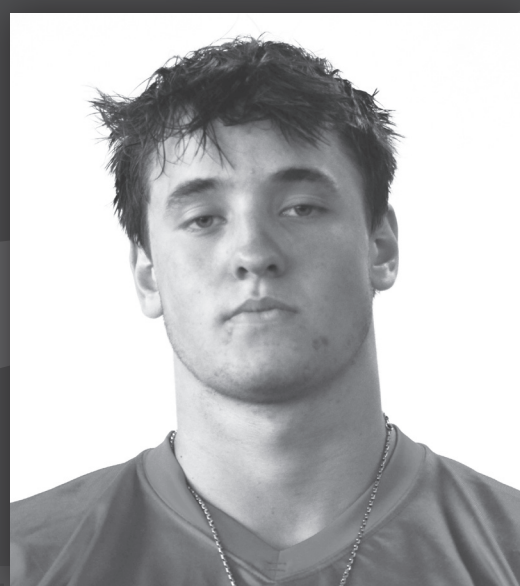

## Dale K. Graham Veterans Foundation

We have been reviewing the additional presumptive conditions that the VA has made on Veterans presumptive conditions that were caused by Agent Orange and veterans who were exposed to chemicals from burn pits in the Gulf Wars.

The diseases are presumptive to Agent Orange exposure are A1 amloidosis, bladder cancer, and chronic B cell leukemia, chloracne, diabetes type 2, hypertension, Hodgkins disease, hypothyroidism, ischemic heart disease, MGUS, multiple myeloma, non-Hodgkin’s lymphoma, Parkinsonism, Parkinson’s disease, peripheral neuropathy (early onset), porphyria cutanea tarda, prostate cancer, respiratory cancers, and soft tissue sarcomas.

Anyone who served where Agent Orange was used and were diagnosed with one or more of these conditions may be eligible to receive VA benefits. The spouse or dependents of a deceased veteran who was exposed to that burn chemical and one of the presumptive conditions is listed on the veterans death certificate as a primary or a contributing factor to their death could file a claim for VA benefits.

For veterans who were exposed to the smoke and chemi-

cals of burn pits while serving in some of the Gulf War countries the following diseases are now presumptive to their service. Also brain cancer, gastrointestinal cancers, cloblastoma, head cancer, kidney cancer, lymphatic cancer, lymphoma, melanoma, neck cancer, pancreatic cancer, reproductive cancer, squamous cell carcinoma of larynx and trachea, adenosqrcinoma of trachea, large cell carcinoma of lung, salivary gland tumor of lung, sarcomatoid carcinoma of lung, typical and atypical carcinoid of lung, respiratory (breathing related) asthma diagnosed after service, chronic bronchitis, chronic COPD, chronic rhinitis, chronic sinusitis, constrictive bronchiolitis, emphysema, granulomatous disease, interstitial disease, primary fibrosis and sarcoidosis.

These conditions are presumptive for the service members who served in the locations listed in the air born hazards and burn pit registry. It looks to me like there are going to be many more veterans who are eligible to receive benefits caused by the illnesses that were caused the burn pit hazards.

The VA must have been working overtime! Twenty-five veterans we represent were awarded a 100 percent rating for their service-connected disabilities last week. These men and women will be eligible for many other benefits from our State Government and from the VA.

Seventy-three veterans received disability ratings from 10-90 percent for their service-connected disabilities. This group will also be eligible to receive other VA and state benefits based on their ratings.

October 30, 2022 is the thirty-first Sunday in Ordinary Time. During Ordinary Time, the Gospel focuses on the teachings and miracles of Christ during his time on earth.

In the Gospel reading, Luke 19:1-10, Jesus is travelling through Jericho. A short man, Zacchaeus, had climbed a sycamore tree so he could catch a glimpse of Jesus.

When Jesus reached the spot, he looked up and spoke to him saying, "Zacchaeus, come down. Hurry, because I am to stay at your house today." Others who observed this were appalled because Zacchaeus was a senior tax collector, and they knew he taxed people more than was appropriate and kept the excess for himself. They gossiped that Jesus "has gone to stay at a sinner's house."

Zacchaeus told Jesus he was giving away half his property and, if he had cheated anyone, he would repay him four times the amount. Then Jesus said, "Today salvation has come to this house, because this man too is a son of Abraham; for the Son of man has come to seek

out and save what was lost.'

For those of us who started attending church before we could walk, the story about Zacchaeus was a favorite. The song lyrics started: "Zacchaeus was a wee little man/ And a wee little man was he/ He climbed up in a sycamore tree/ For the Lord he wanted to see." Though we did not know what choreography was, we performed it well while pretending to climb a tree and then searching for Jesus.

Jesus taught using parables, but this is a real event. However, like parables, there are several important parallels. First, all of us have felt like Zacchaeus. He felt excluded because he was too short to see above the heads of the crowd. (This state of being too short is clearly one of the characteristics little children understand.)

Second, he was disliked by people who did not even know him because he was a tax collector and "everyone knows they are no good." He would have been picked last when teams were being chosen. Third, Jesus turned the whole scenario around by telling Zacchaeus,

"Let's do lunch." Jesus can turn our whole scenario around as well.

And, finally, Jesus, the Son of man, came to seek out and save what was lost. He said, "Today salvation has come to this house." And just like for Zacchaeus, Jesus brings salvation to our house.

On Tuesday, November 1, we will celebrate the Solemnity of All Saints at 5 p.m. (English) and 7 p.m. (Spanish). On Wednesday, November 2, we will celebrate All Souls at 5 p.m. (English) and 7 p.m. (Spanish).
