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

Tribes seek to lead way on opoid abuse treatment

The story of Choctaw citizen Clayton Clark's opioid addiction begins with a compressed disc, and pirouettes into a tale of devastation and loss.

After sustaining a back injury from moving furniture, Clark was on bed rest for a month. He relied on painkillers he was prescribed to get him through

tion bottle ran dry, so did the life he knew.

"A day goes by and you're going through withdrawals, you're trying to find more so you don't get sick," Clark says of his experience.

At the peak of his addiction, Clark was taking thirty 10-mg hydrocodone pills a day risking complete liver failure just to

the day. But once the prescrip- keep up with the tolerance his body had developed over time.

After five years of active addiction, Clayton applied for a spot at a local inpatient rehabilitation center. In the four months it took for a bed to become available, he lost custody of his kids, contact with his family and the roof over his head. He was living in a homeless shelter when he got the call that would ultimately save his life and give his children their father back.

"If it wasn't for the recovery center, I would be dead today," the 34-year-old Clark says of his time at Choctaw Nation Recovery Center in Talihina, Oklahoma.

About \$12 million has been awarded to 14 tribes across Oklahoma to keep those resources Clark needed flowing. Three of the state's largest tribes, the Choctaw, Cherokee, and Chickasaw nations, will each receive \$1.9 million.

The money is part of the \$1.5 billion the U.S Department of Health and Human Services, through the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration, recently awarded to support states, tribes, and territories' efforts to

address the opioid crisis Clark, who says the triumph of his story is equal parts white-knuckled determination, and the power of accessible resources, just celebrated his 36th month clean. He now works as an addiction support specialist at a crisis center similar to the one that helped him.

"Addiction and mental health have a way of making you feel like nobody can understand what you're going through. If it wasn't for the support of the tribe and their help getting me through the recovery process with these programs, I would still think I was alone in the world," Clark said.



The Count, aka John Ferguson, was a blood sucking vampire who often had WKY-TV's Danny Williams in precarious situations.



John Fetterman, President Roosevelt and disability in public office

One of the greatest Presidents of all time was Franklin D. Roosevelt. He served from 1933 to 1945. He led this country and saw us through some of our toughest years. Many say he stands as the greatest President of all time. Ironically, he had a difficult time standing.

Franklin D. Roosevelt, was our 32nd President but he began experiencing symptoms of a paralytic illness in 1921 when he was 39 years old. His main symptoms were fever; symmetric, ascending paralysis; facial paralysis; bowel and bladder dysfunction; numbness and hyperesthesia; and a descending pattern of recovery.

He was diagnosed with poliomyelitis and underwent years of therapy, including hydrotherapy at Warm Springs, Georgia. Roosevelt remained paralyzed from the waist down and relied on a wheelchair and leg braces for mobility, which he took efforts to conceal in

In 1938, he founded the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, leading to the development of polio vaccines. Although historical accounts continue to refer to Roosevelt's case as polio, the diagnosis has been questioned in the context of current medical science, with a competing diagnosis of Guillain-Barré syndrome proposed by some

Sounding alarm on education

Oklahoma's 2022 National outcomes have plummeted, states, and are at levels below nearly all states.

Oklahoma's NAEP score for fourth-grade reading was on a strong upswing and was actually above the national average in 2015, State Superintendent of Public Instruction Joy Hofmeister's first year in office. It's been downhill ever since. Today, only three states do worse.

Sadly, most outcomes were already bad prior to this year's results. Allison D. Garrett, chancellor for the Oklahoma State System of Higher Education, recently told lawmakers that "14 percent of our highschool graduates are coming from high school ready to study at the college level in all four areas—which means 86 percent of them are not."

When the State Chamber of Oklahoma polled business leaders, 60 percent cited workforce challenges as the number one issue challenging their business survival. Similarly, state Sen. Adam Pugh, R-Edmond, has said companies have declined to move to Oklahoma due to the lack of an educated

workforce.

Two excuses have been of-Assessment of Education fered. Excuse one: Oklahoma Progress (NAEP) test results has a high rate of children with funds. He explained that the have fallen far faster than most homa doesn't spend as much per-pupil as many states.

But states that normally rank below or alongside Oklahoma for per-pupil spending did better than Oklahoma on NAEP's fourth grade reading test: Mississippi (217), Arizona (215), Idaho (215) and Utah (221).

And it's not as if Oklahoma doesn't spend money on education. Oklahoma has spent a combined \$50 billion on schools throughout Hofmeister's tenure, and state spending has increased significantly since 2018. But NAEP scores are now worse than they were when Oklahoma spent less.

Adverse experiences do impact children's learning, but every state serves children with ACEs. Are we really supposed to believe children in Oklahoma consistently have much worse lives than children in Mississippi, etc.? Also, charter schools and private schools in Oklahoma and elsewhere specifically recruit and accept students' long-term outcomes Public Affairs.

One recent study adjusted show Oklahoma's academic adverse childhood experiences states' 2022 NAEP scores based (ACEs). Excuse two: Okla- on student demographics, including poverty. That usually boosts high-poverty states like Oklahoma. But Oklahoma still ranked in the bottom tier. In fact, several states with higher rates of child poverty had higher NAEP scores than Oklahoma even without adjusting for demographics.

Hofmeister's policies encouraging inappropriate local COVID responses played a role in this year's poor results. Every state faced COVID. Not every state experienced the decline Oklahoma did. In fact, Oklahoma's results were worse, and fell far faster, than nearly all states. And the decline in Oklahoma began before COVID.

Oklahoma's poor academic results are not a product of spending or due to Oklahoma children being somehow uniquely unsuited for education. The bad results are the product of bad policy choices. It's time to sound the alarm.



Is That the Old Ship of Zion? (Part 3)

leaves and cooler weather telling us what time of year it is. It's a great time, for sure.

In our last visit, we climbed aboard that "Old Ship of Zion," examining the deck of the church of our Lord. Zion, of course, stands as a great emblem of the city of David of the Old Testament and now reminds us of the church of the New Testament. As the apostle writes so beautifully, "But ye are come unto Mount Zion, and unto the city of the living God, the heavenly Jerusalem, and to an innumerable company of angels" (Hebrew 12:22.)

Long before Paul writes in Hebrews, Isaiah foretells of the coming of this great Zion, the Lord's church, in the early paragraphs of his prophecy: In short, he announces, the day will come when the "mountain of the Lord's house shall be established" up high on a mountain, and there – there in this place called Zion – the gospel shall trumpet forth for the first time.

How many gospel preachers

Welcome, friends, to the church! Sometimes men forget 'front porch," with the autumn such scriptures and prophecies and look back to the nineteenth century, to noble men such as Barton Stone or Alexander Campbell, and say, "There it is. There is where the church of Christ started."

But the church of our Lord does not start there, by any means. The church's establishment and existence are cemented in heaven long before its borders expanded to Europe or to America. Inspired writers such as Isaiah and Jeremiah anticipate her coming throughout their Old Testament prophesies. "Out of Zion shall go forth the law," says Isaiah, and he adds that God's Word shall proceed from Jerusalem!

Indeed, "out of Zion"! - Not America or Europe, but beautiful, beautiful Zion! At Zion the church of our Lord would go on to be established some six hundred years after Isaiah and Jeremiah write. The apostle Peter stands up over in the second chapter of Acts and delivers the first gospel message after Jesus ascends to heaven. His and teachers have opened up message is not a man-made that scripture to discuss the one but was a sermon written beauty and history of the Lord's from the very pen of the Lord.

Shortly before Pentecost, the Lord lays out a clear sermon outline for Peter: I want you to preach "repentance and remission of sins ... in (mv) name among all nations, beginning at Jerusalem" (Luke 24:47).

Peter is completely loyal to that command, preaching that sermon with as much vigor as he had ever before mustered, right there in the city the psalmist once called Zion. When his sermon about the death, burial, and resurrection of Jesus comes to a climatic end, the audience cries out, "Men and brethren, what shall we do?"

Peter does not drop the ball at this pivotal moment the way he had done before. But led by the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, he answers boldly,

"Repent and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost" (Acts 2:38).

What happens next reminds us of the powerful vision Isaiah sees in Isaiah 2. Isaiah sees "all nations...flow unto"this Zion. And sure enough, on the great



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
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
