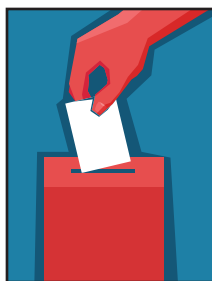

Tribes seek to lead way on opoid abuse treatment

The story of Choctaw citizen Clayton Clark’s opioid addiction begins with a compressed disc, and pirouettes into a tale of devastation and loss.

After sustaining a back injury from moving furniture, Clark was on bed rest for a month. He relied on painkillers he was prescribed to get him through

the day. But once the prescription bottle ran dry, so did the life he knew.

“A day goes by and you’re going through withdrawals, you’re trying to find more so you don’t get sick,” Clark says of his experience.

At the peak of his addiction, Clark was taking thirty 10-mg hydrocodone pills a day risking complete liver failure just to

keep up with the tolerance his body had developed over time.

After five years of active addiction, Clayton applied for a spot at a local inpatient rehabilitation center. In the four months it took for a bed to become available, he lost custody of his kids, contact with his family and the roof over his head. He was living in a homeless shelter when he got the call that would ultimately save his life and give his children their father back.

“If it wasn’t for the recovery center, I would be dead today,” the 34-year-old Clark says of his time at Choctaw Nation Recovery Center in Talihina, Oklahoma.

About \$12 million has been awarded to 14 tribes across Oklahoma to keep those resources Clark needed flowing. Three of the state’s largest tribes, the Choctaw, Cherokee, and Chickasaw nations, will each receive \$1.9 million.

The money is part of the \$1.5 billion the U.S Department of Health and Human Services, through the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration, recently awarded to support states, tribes, and territories’ efforts to address the opioid crisis.

Clark, who says the triumph of his story is equal parts white-knuckled determination, and the power of accessible resources, just celebrated his 36th month clean. He now works as an addiction support specialist at a crisis center similar to the one that helped him.

“Addiction and mental health have a way of making you feel like nobody can understand what you’re going through. If it wasn’t for the support of the tribe and their help getting me through the recovery process with these programs, I would still think I was alone in the world,” Clark said.

The opioid crisis has crept its way into the homes in every

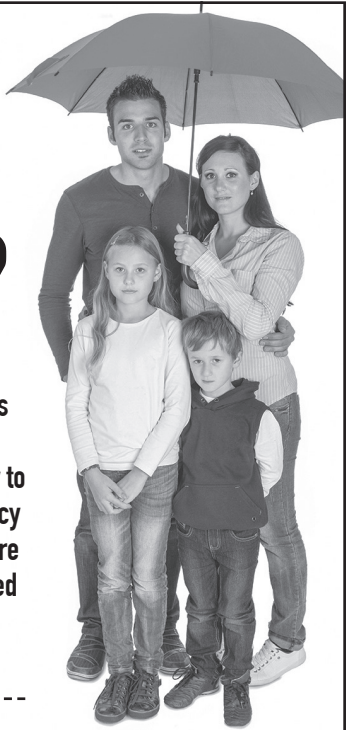

Fall has arrived and we have been blessed with days of milder temperatures and beautiful weather. Taking the proper steps to winterize your home now will make you more comfortable and can pay dividends by reducing your winter electric bills.

A few energy saving tips include:

- Opening our curtains and/or blinds during the day to allow sunlight to warm your home. Closing window coverings at night will provide an added layer of insulation.

- Eliminate air leaks and drafts. Caulking and weather stripping around doors and windows can greatly reduce heat loss and prevent chilly air from entering the home.

At the beginning of the month, I eagerly participated in the U.S. Department of Energy's Tribal Clean Energy Summit hosted by U.S. Secretary of Energy Jennifer Granholm and Office of Indian Energy Director Wahleah Johns.

This nation-to-nation discussion explored how tribes can harness clean energy to enhance energy sovereignty, address climate resilience, and build stronger economies. As a



Over 65 percent of Mingee’s staff are female. She’s working to bridge the pay gap between men and women. She noted that the main problems she sees for women in the workforce is lack of funding to start their own businesses, lack of mentorship to help them see they can accomplish greater things, and a lack of sufficient child care.

Like many women, Lauren went through a divorce when she was younger and worked 18-hour days to provide for her daughter. She acquired incredible debt trying to start her company but couldn’t get loans because of her divorce and venture capitalists only invest around two percent of their wealth in women.

This forced her to have to depend on loan sharks, which is highly discouraged as they can charge as high as 300-400 percent interest on their loans. Fortunately, her business was

extremely successful, and she was able to pay off her loans, and is determined to help other women have an easier road to financial freedom and business success than she had.

She wants people to be able to follow and fulfill their dreams in Oklahoma but noted that we’re limiting the talents of our most talented citizens (aka women).

Lauren reemphasized the fact that working mothers hold one-fourth of the jobs in our state and it’s crucial that we meet their needs because without them, our economy will fail. Many of these are single women caught in a vicious cycle of financial struggle.

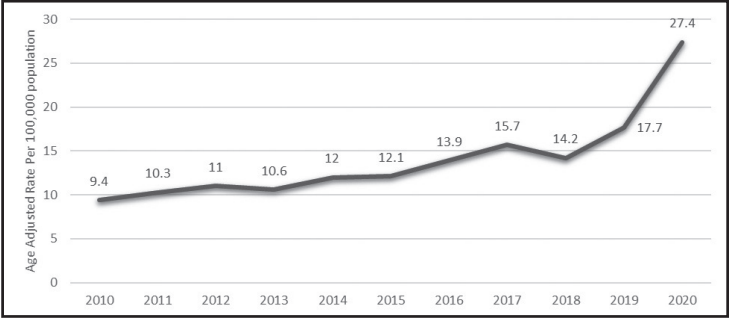
There shouldn’t be wait lists for child care, and businesses should cover some or all of the cost of child care, which can range from \$150-\$300 a child per week. Her company reimburses their staff for these

expenses, and she feels other businesses need to follow suit before these talented employees leave the workforce for good.

I loved her point that people will work more if you invest more in them—such a simple yet powerful concept. Oklahoma must provide opportunities for women regardless of their economic or social standing. Basically, they just need more chances and opportunities because “when women suffer, all of Oklahoma suffers.”

This was a powerful presentation, and one I hope Oklahoma’s business community took to heart.

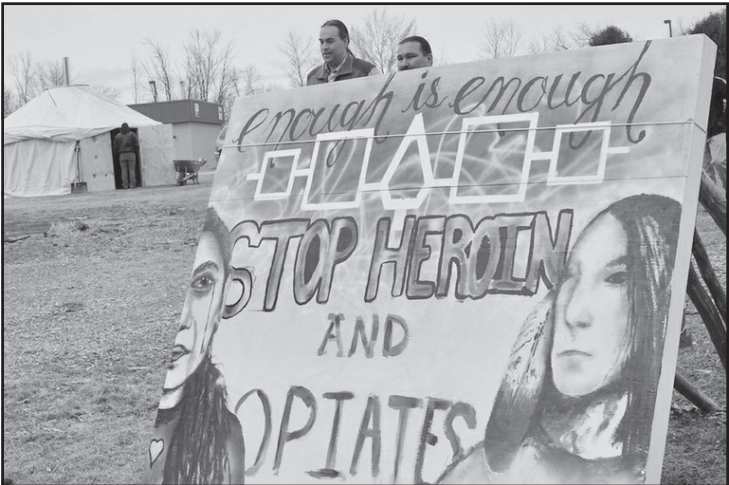

corner of the U.S., but the rate at which tribal communities are battling the epidemic is unparalleled.

American Indians and Alaska Natives had the second-highest rate of opioid overdose out of all U.S. racial and ethnic groups in both 2017 and 2020, the most recent year for which statistics are available. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reported the overdose death rates for those groups increased 39 percent compared with 2019.

“As the opioid epidemic has disproportionately affected Native Americans, the additional support and healing for tribal members facing addiction is critical to the Choctaw Nation,” said Jessie Roberts, assistant director of behavioral health at the Choctaw Nation of Oklahoma.

“We have used this Tribal Opioid Recovery Grant to reconnect our people with the cultural and traditional aspects of healing and recovery,” Roberts said.

Roberts says services the grant will allow the tribe to offer include prevention and education programs, sober living/transitional housing assistance, judicial services including assessments and individual therapy, as well as Peer Recovery Support Specialists for both individual and group meetings, incorporating drum circles which infuse culture into the recovery process.

According to the National Indian Health Board, tribes were not included in the 2017 State Targeted Response to the Opioid Epidemic grants,

despite being the second-most-affected group in the nation at the time.

Cherokee Nation reported 18 deaths, 79 non-fatal drug overdoses and 576 treatment admissions within the tribe’s reservation boundaries during 2020 alone. Statewide about 6,000 people have died since 2000, according to state officials.

In the fall of 2021, Cherokee Nation led the way for what would turn out to be a series of historical lawsuits against America’s largest pharmaceutical distributors for their role in the opioid crisis and its effect on tribal communities across the country. The tribe reached the first settlement for \$75 million, and a collective of more than 400 tribes followed suit, reaching a settlement of \$590 million early this year.

The tribe plans to use its settlement money to build drug treatment facilities and other opioid remediation, addiction prevention and treatment programs.

“Cherokee Nation, like much of the state of Oklahoma, continues to see a higher rate of overdoses of fentanyl and methamphetamines,” said Chuck Hoskin Jr., the tribe’s principal chief.

“These dollars will be essential to helping our tribal citizens with treatment, especially through medicated assisted treatment and more recovery support opportunities,” he said.

Bryan Warner, the Cherokee’s deputy chief, said the funding will allow the tribe to expand treatment recovery support and harm-reduction services into more counties

within the Cherokee Nation Reservation, including Salina and Nowata.

“These funds will continue to help our Cherokee citizens who need treatment and support by offering more tools to help, training more providers on trauma-informed continuum care for tribal citizens with substance use disorders and better educating the community on destigmatizing substance misuse in order to create a recovery-oriented system of care,” said Juli Skinner, senior director of Cherokee Nation Behavioral Health.

Tribal recipients in Oklahoma of the funding include: Chickasaw Nation, \$1.9 million; Quapaw Tribe, \$172,000; Wyandotte Nation, \$250,000; Choctaw Nation, \$1.9 million; Southern Plains Tribal Health Board Foundation, \$825,000; Comanche Nation, \$949,000; Cherokee Nation, \$1.9 million; Muscogee Creek Nation, \$823,000; Wichita and Affiliated Tribes, \$825,000; Modoc Tribe of Oklahoma, \$500,000; Citizen Potawatomi Nation, \$825,000; Iowa Tribe of Oklahoma, \$250,000; Absentee Shawnee Tribe of Oklahoma, \$475,000; Keetoowah Economic Development Authority, \$500,000; Ponca Tribe of Oklahoma, \$250,000; Kiowa Tribe of Oklahoma, \$465,000

In addition, \$16 million was awarded to Oklahoma Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse.

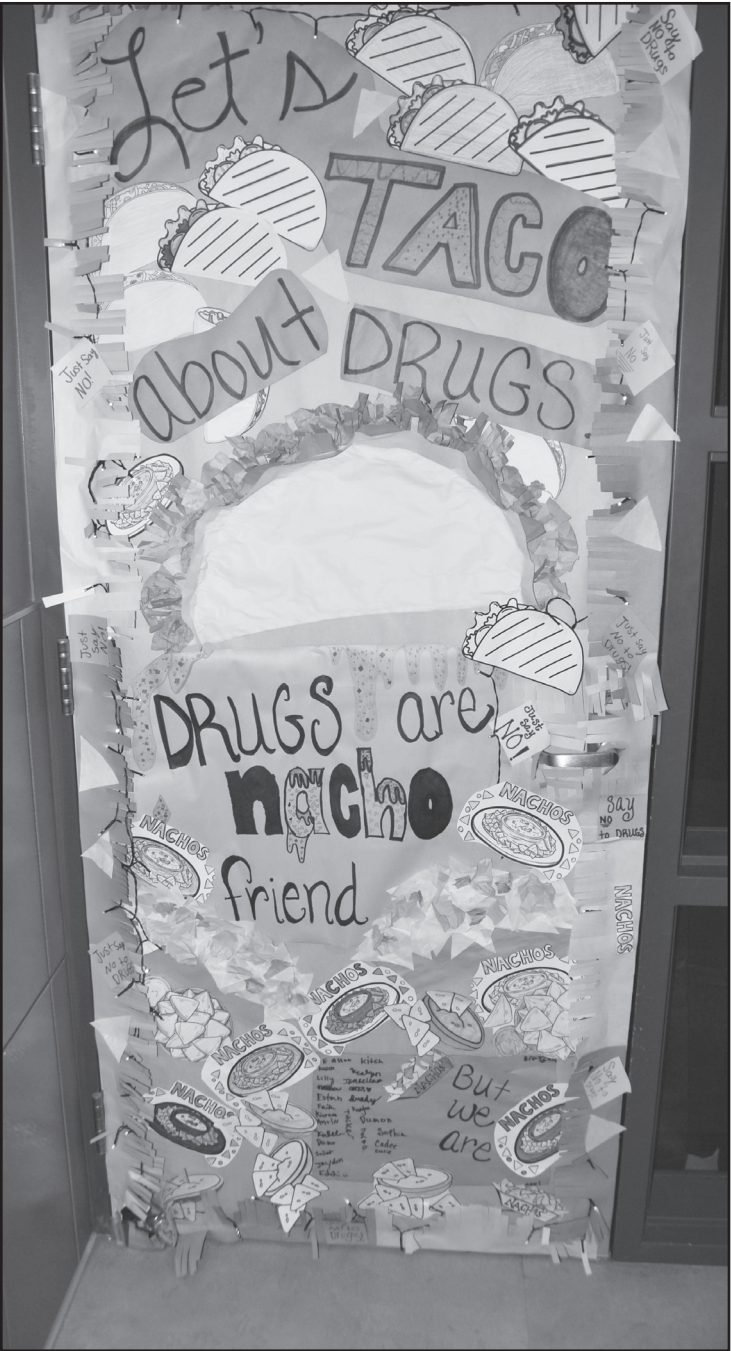

How slim? Their win was a scant 0.15 of a point better than the runner-up in the Oklahoma Bandmasters Association-sponsored event.

And right on the heels of that achievement the band traveled to Orlando, Fla., for a Bands of America regional marching band competition, bringing home the Music Caption Award for having the highest score in their class.

Headly stuff, indeed.

Seven OBA judges scored the bands competing at Putnam North High School in four categories – individual and ensemble music, individual and ensemble visual, general effect/music and general effect/visual.

Washington scored 67.4 out of a possible 100 points to win the Class 2A state championship. Runner-up was Morris with a score of 67.25.

There were challenges and a few stumbling blocks from the start, according to the band’s director Jordan Ford.

“Our assistant director moved the week before school started in August, putting us in a bind,” he said.

However, he didn’t have to look far to find a solution.

Cody Sirk, a music education graduate student at the University of Oklahoma, was teaching saxophone lessons at Washington.

Would he be interested in taking on the assistant director’s mantle? He would.

The two set about creating a new show for the band.

The theme they selected was Monsters and the show built on the “Monsters Inc.,” movie.

Neither man specializes in choreography – “but we both can teach it,” Ford said – so they hired out that job.

“It’s worked very well for us,” Ford said.

With a theme in place and the staffing issue solved, the men faced one of their biggest challenges – helping the band members to believe in

themselves.

When Sirk came on, he said the students’ feelings were negative regarding their ability to enter and win contests.

Then the band competed at Mustang, winning the Class A championship there.

It was a game changer and brought the band’s thinking around to “Why not us?”

“There were some really tough days,” Ford admitted.

“We tried to get the students to buy into that mindset,” Sirk said. “That’s what drove them so hard to attain these goals.”

Planning the Orlando trip started long before their contest wins.

It’s no simple matter to book travel arrangements for 59 band members, all their instruments and equipment and 23 parent chaperones.

They made the 24-hour trip on charter buses, with an overnight stop each way. Twenty-eight bands were entered in the Orlando Regional Championship. The line-up included 19 from Florida, three from Georgia, two from South Carolina and one each from North Carolina, Mississippi, Texas and Oklahoma.

Ford admits he wouldn’t have chosen to take an out-of-state trip on the heels of the state championship.

“It was tough,” he said. “It made for a long and hard season.”

The pride both men have in the marching band and its achievements is plain to see.

And both lay that success to the band’s “why not us?” attitude.

“I wish I could single all of them out,” Ford said. “So many deserve to be recognized,”

In lieu of that, here are the statistics. The Washington band roster includes two drum majors, three flutes, five clarinets, nine saxophones, seven trumpets, four trombones, four mellophones, three baritones, two tubas, 11 front ensemble,

five drumline and four color guards.

Preliminary work on next year’s show will begin with visual basics and fundamental marching skills in May.

“We will be graduating a lot of seniors this year,” Ford said. “There’s no telling what the band is going to look like next year.”

Granted, he and Sirk have their eyes on some of the program’s younger student musicians

Sirk, too, will graduate in May and is still considering his options and the possibility of remaining at Washington.

“I really do enjoy the band program here,” he said, adding he will weigh his options and what is best for his family.

The band program has 132 students in grades six through 12.

The ensembles are Marching Band, Jazz Band, High School Concert Band, 7th & 8th Grade Concert Band and Beginning Band.

Ford said there is also a non-competitive Basketball Pep Band.

It makes for a busy schedule for both men.

Ford has been at Washington since 2015. He is from Owasso and in his high school days marched with the Pride of Owasso.

Sirk is from Altus where he was also in the marching band.

“Both,” Sirk said, “are very well known and respected band programs.”

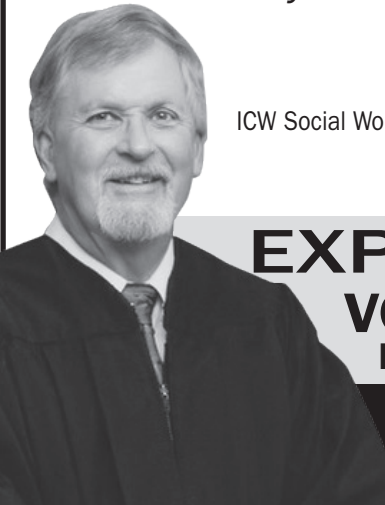

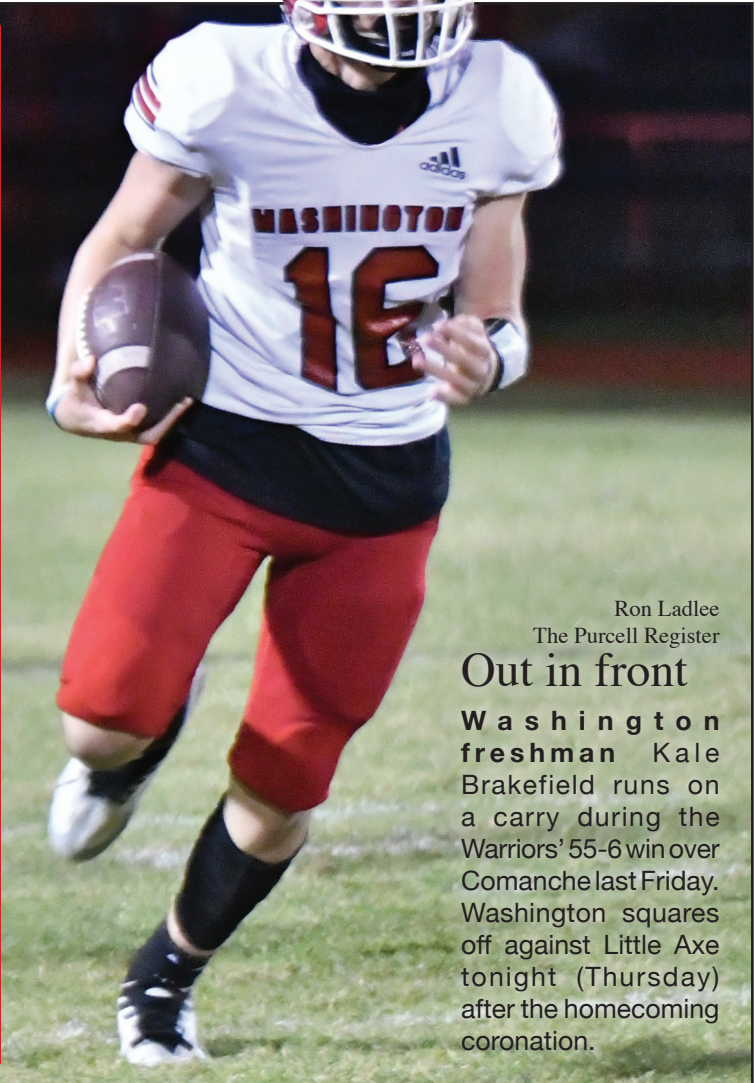

“I can’t say enough about the play of Hayden and Naithen,” Beller said. “After a slow start defensively they did a great job of setting the tone and shutting down the interior and the Comanche rushing attack.”

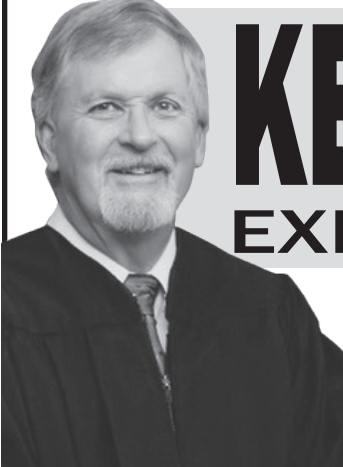

Is That the Old Ship of Zion? (Part 3)

Welcome, friends, to the “front porch,” with the autumn leaves and cooler weather telling us what time of year it is. It’s a great time, for sure.

In our last visit, we climbed aboard that “Old Ship of Zion,” examining the deck of the church of our Lord. Zion, of course, stands as a great emblem of the city of David of the Old Testament and now reminds us of the church of the New Testament. As the apostle writes so beautifully, “But ye are come unto Mount Zion, and unto the city of the living God, the heavenly Jerusalem, and to an innumerable company of angels” (Hebrew 12:22.)

Long before Paul writes in Hebrews, Isaiah foretells of the coming of this great Zion, the Lord’s church, in the early paragraphs of his prophecy: In short, he announces, the day will come when the “mountain of the Lord’s house shall be established” up high on a mountain, and there – there in this place called Zion – the gospel shall trumpet forth for the first time.

How many gospel preachers and teachers have opened up that scripture to discuss the beauty and history of the Lord’s

church! Sometimes men forget such scriptures and prophecies and look back to the nineteenth century, to noble men such as Barton Stone or Alexander Campbell, and say, “There it is. There is where the church of Christ started.”

But the church of our Lord does not start there, by any means. The church’s establishment and existence are cemented in heaven long before its borders expanded to Europe or to America. Inspired writers such as Isaiah and Jeremiah anticipate her coming throughout their Old Testament prophesies. “Out of Zion shall go forth the law,” says Isaiah, and he adds that God’s Word shall proceed from Jerusalem!

Indeed, “out of Zion”! – Not America or Europe, but beautiful, beautiful Zion! At Zion the church of our Lord would go on to be established some six hundred years after Isaiah and Jeremiah write. The apostle Peter stands up over in the second chapter of Acts and delivers the first gospel message after Jesus ascends to heaven. His message is not a man-made one but was a sermon written from the very pen of the Lord.

Shortly before Pentecost, the Lord lays out a clear sermon outline for Peter: I want you to preach “repentance and remission of sins ... in (my) name among all nations, beginning at Jerusalem” (Luke 24:47).

Peter is completely loyal to that command, preaching that sermon with as much vigor as he had ever before mustered, right there in the city the psalmist once called Zion. When his sermon about the death, burial, and resurrection of Jesus comes to a climatic end, the audience cries out, “Men and brethren, what shall we do?”

Peter does not drop the ball at this pivotal moment the way he had done before. But led by the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, he answers boldly,

“Repent and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost” (Acts 2:38).

What happens next reminds us of the powerful vision Isaiah sees in Isaiah 2. Isaiah sees “all nations ... flow unto” this Zion. And sure enough, on the great

November 6, 2022 is the thirty-second Sunday in Ordinary Time. During Ordinary Time, the Gospel focuses on the teachings and miracles of Christ during his time on earth.

The Gospel reading is Luke 20:27-38. The Sadducees were questioning Jesus about a hypothetical woman. This woman was married but her husband died. The Sadducees said that following laws given by Moses, she was to marry her husband’s brother. He dies and then they go through a litany of improbabilities wherein the woman has married seven brothers. They asked Jesus who would be her husband in heaven.

This conversation between the Sadducees and Jesus bears much similarity to a parent’s dialogue with a two or three-year-old child. Neither the Sadducees nor the child really give a hoot about the topic. The child will say “why” after every answer. The Sadducees ask after every answer, but “what about this.”

Jesus’ response to the Sadducees reflects that they are underinformed about the topic. When I was working, one boss would grow exasperated and exclaim, “Anyone with an IQ above 10 would know...” One can imagine that Jesus must have felt that way sometimes.

Those of us who are not brain surgeons or rocket scientists know that there are many top-

ics, both religious and secular, about which we have limited knowledge. We do not need to know everything about God.

Saint Paul, in Second Thessalonians 2:16-3:5, gave this comfort: “Brothers and sisters: May our Lord Jesus Christ himself and God our Father, who has loved us and given us everlasting encouragement and good hope through his grace, encourage your hearts and strengthen them in every good deed and word.”

Tithes: tithes are not the same as offerings. Tithes are 10 percent of your income and is a way of giving thanks for all the blessings we are receiving. All our income and everything we have comes from God. So a tithe is given back to God in gratitude for what we’ve been given.
Anything in addition to the tithe is an offering, also known as the Seed. Unlike the required amount like the 10 percent tithe, offerings are free will with the amount given up to you.
You may have heard of The First Fruits. These are usually done once a year (traditionally, after the first harvest) for every new blessing you receive. Biblically, the house of God should receive the full amount of your first salary that you get from your new job. An increase in salary should also be given, in gratefulness for the blessings you received from God. However, many of us give a percentage of these amounts,

as a special offering.
Alms-giving is given for humankind, unlike the three types of giving above which are given to God. Compassion and sympathy will lead us to help the less fortunate and the needy. Alms may be given in many ways. Some help by working in soup kitchens or in clothing closets, or we can donate food, clothes, even cash.
Although many of us participate in alms-giving, we may be doing it the wrong way. In the Bible it says we should give alms in secret in order to protect the dignity of those who are in crisis and need help. Many may be helping or giving, but they may also be bragging about doing so. All of us can help the needy, but only a few can help others with the purest of intentions. Let your heart be pure when doing such selfless acts and God will shower more blessings upon you.
St. Ignatius gave us this prayer: Lord Jesus, teach me to

be generous. Teach me to serve as you deserve, to give and not to count the cost, to fight and not to heed the wounds, to labor and not to seek to rest, to give of myself and not ask for a reward, except the reward of knowing that I am doing your will.

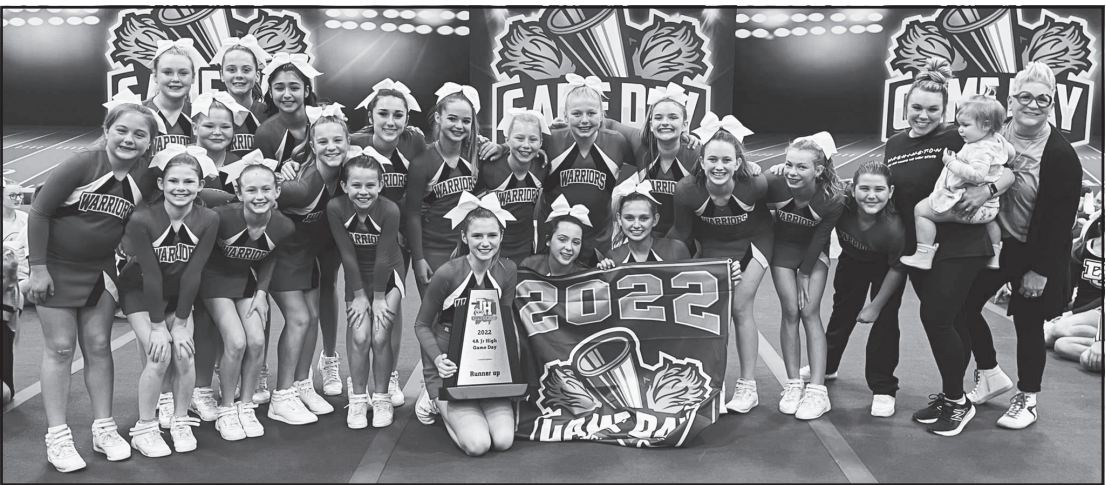

The one thing that I did not know at the start of our mission was how much we could change the lives of veterans and their families.

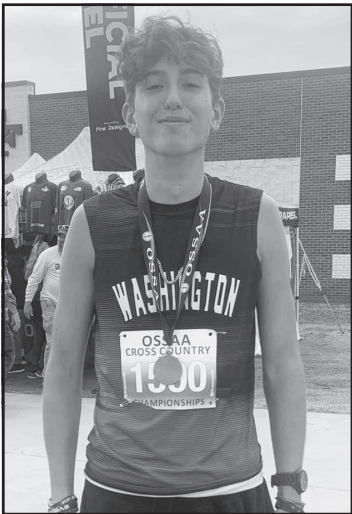

If no appeal is timely filed, this decision will become final for the Department of the Interior at the expiration of the appeal period. No extension of time may be granted for filing a notice of appeal.
