Veterans Day began in 1919 when President Wilson proclaimed November 11 as the first Armistice Day, intended as a day to honor those who served in World War I.

After World War II had required the greatest number of troops in American history and with the urging of veterans service organizations the 83rd Congressional Congress changed Armistice Day to Veterans Day.

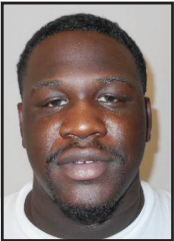

Free seminar on open meetings, records laws Nov. 14 in OKC

The Oklahoma Attorney General’s Office will partner with the Oklahoma Press Association to host a seminar on Oklahoma’s open meeting and open records laws in Oklahoma City November 14.

The seminar will be held from 1 to 4 p.m. in the Business Conference Center Auditorium at Metro Technology Center, 1900 Springlake Dr. Attendance is free, open to the public and requires no pre-registration.

It is the last of five seminars to be presented this year. Prior seminars were held in Enid, Tulsa, McAlester and Lawton.

The vast majority of Oklahomans who hold positions on

public bodies do so with a spirit of community service and work hard to follow the law, Attorney General John M. O’Connor said. “Our seminars are designed to encourage compliance and promote openness through education.”

Thomas R. Schneider, Deputy General Counsel to the Attorney General of Oklahoma, and Niki S. Batt, Deputy Attorney General, will answer questions concerning the state’s open meeting and records laws and inform elected or appointed officials about their responsibility under the acts. They will also discuss requirements on access to public records and the conduct of public

meetings.

Continuing education credits are available for attendance. Attorneys will receive three CLE credit hours. New school board members can get three credit hours from the Oklahoma State Department of Education, and new technology center board members can earn three credit hours from the State Department of Career and Technology Education. Law enforcement officials are eligible to receive three credit hours from the Council on Law Enforcement Education and Training.

Educators hone creativity at 2022 Oklahoma Fall Arts Institute

Jon Corea, art teacher at Purcell High School, was among the nearly 300 Oklahoma educators who earned professional development hours and joined

taught by nationally renowned artists in the literary, visual and performing arts.

The workshops were held in October at Quartz Mountain State Park & Lodge in southwestern Oklahoma. Attendees included teachers from more than 170 schools who each earned 18 hours in continuing education credits.

Conducted by the Oklahoma Arts Institute, OFAI allows teachers and artists to sharpen their skills, or learn new ones altogether, in an immersing environment with innovators in their fields. The program supplements the organization’s flagship Oklahoma Summer Arts Institute for high school

students, held each summer since 1977.

“Quartz Mountain has been home to the Oklahoma Fall Arts Institute since its inception in 1983,” said Rob Ward, the OAI’s president and chief executive officer. “It’s a magical place that has provided a wonderful backdrop for learning. Oklahoma’s teachers are able to take skills and techniques they learn here and share them with their students, so the impact is felt statewide.”

Oklahoma public school educators attend OFAI on full scholarship, with tuition discounts for those who teach at private schools. Unlike other workshops, all meals and lodging are included in tuition.

Removing or reducing the financial burden allows participants to focus on growing in their artform and to develop strategies for integrating workshop techniques into the classroom.

Throughout the all-inclusive, four-day workshop retreat, participants also enjoy extracurricular activities and electives, such as yoga, screen printing, guided stargazing and more.

OFAI workshops are geared to a variety of interests and teaching backgrounds. This year, participants chose from classes in storytelling, photography, poetry, drawing, printmaking, painting, musical theatre, ceramics and more.

Workshops especially designed for educators included “Visual Thinking Strategies,” an approach to art-based discussion; “Fall Flutter Book,” visual arts and bookbinding; and “Musical Theatre: From Choosing a Production to Curtain Call.”

“OFAI is an environment where participants can take risks and try new things,” Ward said. “If they approached their workshop with an open mind and a spirit of exploration, the challenging experience no doubt expanded their technique, knowledge and artistic vision while renewing their

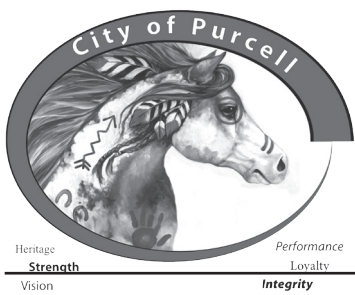

Section R319 Site Address

R319.1 Address numbers. Buildings shall have approved address numbers, building numbers or approved building identification placed in a position that is plainly legible and visible from the street or road fronting the property. These numbers shall contrast with their background. Address numbers shall be Arabic numbers or alphabetical letters. Numbers shall be a minimum of four inches (102mm). Where access is by means of a private road and the building address cannot be viewed from the public way, a monument, pole or other sign or means should be used to identify the structure. This will allow emergency crews to locate the house number.

Finck:

the way the Democratic Party threw him under the bus.

The party picked the least controversial candidate they could find, and it turned out to be possibly the worst American president, James Buchanan. As there was no Whig party to speak of, two other parties ran candidates. The Know Nothings, trying to get Whig votes, dug up and ran the corpse of Filmore, while the brand-new Republican party ran John C. Freemont. The Republicans had enough Whigs in the party to nominate a military hero. No surprise Buchanan won, being from really the only major party in the race although he would go on to do nothing but watch the nation crumble into Civil War.

Then, of course, there is the 1860 election, where again neither major party ran the same candidate. Democrats ran Stephen Douglas, while the Republicans took a shot at a newcomer and nominated Abraham Lincoln. Lincoln ended the run of new candi-

dates when in 1864 he ran and won a second term. It's hard to imagine the turnover in the presidents as it was between 1836 and 1860, yet we can understand the back-and-forth. We have seen the presidency switch parties after each president since George H.W. Bush in 1988.

What we can learn from this is that, if the pattern holds and if Biden decides not to run, the Republicans will take over. We can also see this as a warning. The years between 1836 and 1860 are some of the most turbulent years in our history. It was during those years that things were becoming so divisive that it led to Civil War.

can't say whether it was poor leadership that led to war or that even the best of our presidents could not have held us together during those years. However, I am leaning on the side of poor leadership. That means it's up to us now to choose leaders who can properly steer our ship of state and honestly try to unite us instead of playing politics.

I am not saying that this is easy. Clearly, the last two presidents have failed, and I have no idea what candidate can truly bridge the divide. All I know is I hope we can find one soon and not suffer the same fate as they did the last time we saw this trend.

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Deer causes injury accident

Deer pose a threat to motorists and that proved to be the case in a one vehicle accident Thursday south of Rosedale.

The Oklahoma Highway Patrol reported Talena Sharp, 40, of Byars was transported by Wadleys EMS to OU Medical Center where she was admitted in fair condition.

She was driving a 2001 Chevrolet Malibu when a deer ran into the roadway causing Sharp to take evasive action.

Seventeen hundred engraved bricks comprise The Walk of Honor at Goldsby's Veterans Memorial. Among those are the names of 36 killed in action, 26 wounded in action, a Medal of Honor recipient, one prisoner of war, two missing in action, 28 Bronze Star recipients, three Distinguished Service Cross recipients, three Silver Star recipients, one Distinguished Flying Cross recipient, three World War II bomber crew members, one World War balloon pilot and three Union Army veterans.

What it means

A visit to Goldsby's Walk of Honor

Harold Harvell has a passion for honoring all veterans, particularly those with ties to the Goldsby area. He looks after the town's veterans memorial and hundreds of bricks, each one engraved with the name of a veteran. Space in the memorial is limited. Approximately 1,700 bricks are in place. There is room for 400 more. The cost is \$30 to engrave and set a new brick. For Harvell, it is, literally, a labor of love. He recalls the time a few years ago when this happened: A World War II veteran in his late 80s stopped by the

memorial when some daily maintenance was underway. He asked if one of the workers would like to see his engraved brick. "Certainly!" the worker replied. The old veteran pointed out his brick and said, "This is the proudest thing that has happened to me." He told the workers he would be back often. His departure created a little emotion among the workers. "He'd never had anyone acknowledge his time in service," Harvell said. "That's what this (memorial) is all about."

OSU Extension offers tips to cut cost of Thanksgiving meal

Getting roasted turkey, mashed potatoes and gravy, stuffing, green bean casserole and pie on the table this Thanksgiving is going to cost consumers more than it did in 2021. Rodney Holcomb, Oklahoma State University Extension food economics specialist, said consumers can expect to pay

35-45 percent more for their turkey this year, which typically is the centerpiece of most Thanksgiving tables. "Bird flu has impacted the availability of turkey, which has also impacted the egg and poultry industry as a whole. While there isn't necessarily a shortage, we're not going to see the excess supply and after-holiday sales we've seen in the past," Holcomb said. "It's a good idea to go ahead and clear out some freezer space and purchase your turkey as soon as possible to help ensure you get the size you need. Consumers might also want to go ahead and pick up their Christmas turkey now if that's what is on the menu," he said. Holcomb said something

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

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

else that is affecting the availability of turkey is the demand for turkey meat. People are consuming more turkey year-round in products like lunch meat, turkey bacon and turkey sausage and as substitutes for red meat.

having to liquidate their herds.

The challenge can be that for some families, Thanksgiving tradition is strong, and it simply isn't the holiday without specific foods. If that's the case, be prepared to take a bigger bite out of the budget to accommodate for those foods.

"It can be difficult to break away from tradition because 'we always have this food for Thanksgiving,'" Holcomb said. "Instead of making a large turkey the star of the show, consider a smaller turkey and pull in a brisket or ham. Another option is to make the meal a potluck. This will help ease the cost of the meal for the host family."

Cutting down the amount of food prepared can help cut the budget, too. Leftovers are nice to have around for a couple of days, but if cost is a factor, preparing less food will save money.

Get healthy and save money with meal planning

Some days, it can be a scramble to get a healthy dinner on the table due to sports practices, dance lessons, club meetings and other activities. Dinner time can be hectic without a plan.

Jessica Riffin, Oklahoma State University Extension educator and Lincoln County Extension director, said meal planning is a good way to serve healthy meals and save money on the grocery budget.

"With a meal plan, you determine the menu for the week and make a shopping list. When shopping, buy only what's needed for those planned meals," she said. "You save money with less impulse shopping and also save time by not making extraneous trips to the store throughout the week."

Riffin suggests meal planning for your family's biggest meal of the day, which for most people is the evening meal. Without a plan, it can be easy to fall into the habit of pizza delivery or drive-thru meals, which typically aren't as healthy and are more expensive.

Riffin said she plans an entire month of meals at a time, but someone just starting out

could start with two or three meals a week and work up from there. Print off a blank calendar page to keep track of the planned meals.

"The great thing about meal planning is it's catered to the specific needs of your family," she said. "Look at your calendar and determine what nights you or your children have activities. Activities can influence what kind of meal to plan for that evening. Do you need something quick so you can make it to the ballgame? A slow-cooker meal could be an option. You can even put a drive-through meal or pizza delivery on your calendar. The point is you've planned for it."

Consider theme nights to ease the planning process, such as soup night, sheet-pan dinners, slow-cooker meals, breakfast for dinner, grilling night, etc. Riffin said if possible, cook a bigger meal on the weekend and plan to repurpose the leftovers another night during the week. Be sure to plan side dishes along with the main course.

"Try oven roasted vegetables for a different taste. A little olive oil and seasonings can change up the flavor and may entice picky eaters to give it a try," she said. "Sometimes,

it takes several exposures before a child develops a taste for a particular food. Frozen vegetables are just as healthy as fresh, and the quality is good all year long. However, do take advantage of fresh in-season fruits and vegetables."

Vegetables can be served in a variety of ways, such as steamed, roasted, raw, in a stir fry or with a sauce. Each cooking method changes the flavor and texture. Someone may not like raw broccoli but can't get enough of it roasted.

Get the family involved in choosing recipes, shopping for ingredients and cooking the meals, said Riffin. These are good life skills for everyone to have. Look at online recipe sites for new ideas. Be sure to read through each recipe to ensure it fits your health goals and lifestyle.

"Another great tool to help with meal planning is the USDA's MyPlate website. It offers guidance for all age groups as well as healthy recipes on a budget and helps with setting personal goals for healthy eating," Riffin said. "Consumers can also sign up to receive tips, recipes and more through email that can be incorporated into your meal plan."

Tobacco Helpline to offer free nicotine replacement therapy

Oklahomans who want to quit tobacco can now get additional support from the Oklahoma Tobacco Helpline, a program of the Tobacco Settlement Endowment Trust (TSET).

Now, through November 30, Oklahomans who register for the Helpline's All Access plan will get at least eight weeks of additional nicotine patches, gum or lozenges.

The plan also includes five calls with a quit coach. Typically, registrants are offered two weeks of nicotine replacement therapy (NRT) when they register for coaching calls.

"After an effective run that inspired more Oklahomans to use the Helpline earlier this year, the Oklahoma Tobacco Helpline is offering additional nicotine replacement therapy benefits at no cost," said Ariel Anglin, TSET Healthy Living Program Coordinator serving McClain County. "When coupled with the quit coach support, this represents a great opportunity for people to successfully quit tobacco."

The opportunity to receive

additional nicotine replacement therapy was successful in helping to increase registration to the Oklahoma Tobacco Helpline by 30 percent from April 15 to June 30, compared to the previous year.

During the same time period, there was a 140 percent increase in the number of Sooner-Care members registering for Helpline services. The Helpline also reached more first-time callers during this promotion compared to the same time in 2021.

Studies have shown that quit rates are highest for those who use at least eight weeks of NRT.

By building a plan to quit with the Helpline and fighting cravings with the NRT options provided, Oklahomans can double their chances of successfully quitting tobacco.

Responsibility of Home Owner to Maintain Property

It is the responsibility of the home owner and or tenant to maintain their property or be subject to a \$260 fine. Violations are as follows:

1. Tall grass or weeds, junk, trash, debris, inoperable vehicles, and discharging grass clippings into the street.
 2. You are responsible for maintaining your property from the edge of the road or curb to the center of the alley. The City will trim the large trees in the alley.
 3. Bulk waste pick up is the last Monday of every month. Please do not set bulk waste out until that weekend before the last Monday. (No loose items, no items to exceed 75 pounds, no antifreeze, paint, or batteries, no hazardous materials. No refrigerant compressors. Limbs must be in three-foot bundles).
 4. Brush set out to the curb will be picked up with a charge determined by the size. Brush pick up is free in May and October. You may also call and arrange for brush pick up.
 5. It takes all of us working together to keep Purcell a home to be proud of.

A: I grew up in El Reno where my folks had a small farm. Graduated from El Reno High School in 1947 and since my four brothers were all in World War II, I immediately enlisted in the Army Air Corps (later named U.S. Air Force).

After a year of Radio Operator School, I was assigned as a crew member on a large four-engine transport aircraft. Our crew was fortunate to be assigned on missions that included most of the countries of the world and above the Arctic Circle.

The Korean War became very critical and the need for combat troops was urgent. Our assignment was to transport

are a "great source of nitrogen."

Heaven has English angora rabbits which she shaves every three to four months.

She then spins the hair into yarn. A skein of the yarn won first place at the Oklahoma State Fair.

Neither was what you might call a horticulturist or even a moderately avid gardener.

So what might seem at first glance an impulsive spur-of-the-moment decision on Heaven's part was in fact backed by hours of painstaking online research.

In short, she'd done her homework and done it well.

The couple were given the land by his parents and Heaven always wanted a purpose for the property.

"So I decided we were going to grow flowers," she said.

Joe was open-minded. After all, their vegetable garden did very well, as did the wild blackberries.

"My main goal was to support my wife and her dreams," Joe said.

Heaven's research settled on four varieties of sunflowers.

After preparing the seedbed and making rows, they spent hours every day carefully planting 5,000 seeds one by one.

"It was fun," she said. "Everything came together."

Including some uninvited interlopers.

It wasn't a plague of Biblical proportions, but hungry grasshoppers and rabbits devoured a fair share of the young plants.

Joe concocted a homemade pesticide using garlic, cayenne pepper and apple cider vinegar.

That seemed to solve the grasshopper problem.

Sheer volume of sunflower plants handled the bunny incursion.

For next year, they hope to keep the rabbits at bay with ultrasonic transmitters.

They learned that sunflower cultivation takes a lot of water. As the plants grew, so did the water bill.

Heaven and Joe spent most of their daylight hours in the small flower field weeding, watering and watching the hundreds of bees drawn to the flowers as they bloomed.

Depending on the variety, some bloom in 45 days and others take 90 days.

They planted in blocks so

troops from stateside to Korea via Alaska, Aleutian Islands and Tokyo.

Our aircraft was then converted to Medical Air Evac, including 26 stretchers for those severely wounded heroes and two flight nurses. All hospitals were filled to capacity in Japan and the only alternatives were hospitals in Hawaii.

Many of the wounded had body casts requiring all our flight crew to lift the stretchers onto the aircraft.

In 1951, I married my wife, Shirley, at the Air Force Chapel. I was discharged from the USAF and returned to Oklahoma.

Q: What did you do for a living before you retired?

A: After Korea, I obtained employment with Tinker AFB, worked the night shift and attended Oklahoma City Univer-

the plants could support each other. Their tallest variety was four to five feet, but no staking was required.

So fascinating did they find the bees that adding beekeeper to their resumes is on for 2023.

They harvested the blooms before they were fully open, cutting a long stem and stripping away the leaves. Freshly harvested flowers were placed in a bucket of water before being made into bouquets.

The sunflowers ranged from 3- to 7-inch diameter and were sold in two sizes of bouquets.

One thing they ran into that neither expected was the number of people who think the flowers in their bouquets are fake.

They put back 10 percent from the flower sales to purchase a hive and bees. And they harvested a fair amount of sunflower seeds as feed for Heaven's English angora rabbits.

Faced with finding a purpose for thousands of sunflowers, Heaven met with Savannah Pyle, who owns Savvy Parke in downtown Purcell.

She agreed to sell all the sunflower bouquets Heaven and Joe could furnish.

The partnership worked so well that the couple realized a small profit from their first crop. It was enough to pay the water bill, pay their investors double what was invested and have cash remaining to purchase next year's seeds.

Weatherford came to play on both sides of the ball leading the

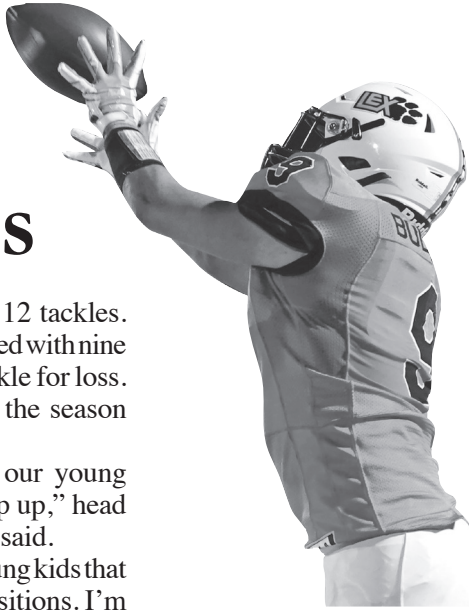
tackling chart with 12 tackles. EanCaywood finished with nine tackles with one tackle for loss.

The Washington Bridge will be named in honor of Jerry Michael Chitwood this Saturday morning. Chitwood was a Vietnam War Era casualty on May 24, 1968. He served with honor in the United States Army.

Staff Sergeant Jerry Michael Chitwood was born on July 15, 1947, and lived his life in Washington, Oklahoma. He served with the 198th Light Infantry Brigade, 1st Battalion, 6th Infantry, A Company. He was drafted into the Army. Entered the service via Selective Service. Served during the Vietnam War. He began his tour on October 6, 1967.

Chitwood had the rank of Staff Sergeant. His military occupation or specialty was Light Weapons Infantry. Service number assignment was 54663951. Attached to 198th Light Infantry Brigade, 1st Battalion, 6th Infantry, A Company. His honors include:

- Purple Heart
 - Combat Infantryman Badge
 - Marksmanship Badge
 - National Defense Service Medal
 - Vietnam Campaign Medal
 - Vietnam Service Medal
 - Army Presidential Unit Citation
 - Vietnam Gallantry Cross

- Chitwood was killed in action during the Vietnam War in South Vietnam, Quang Tin province.

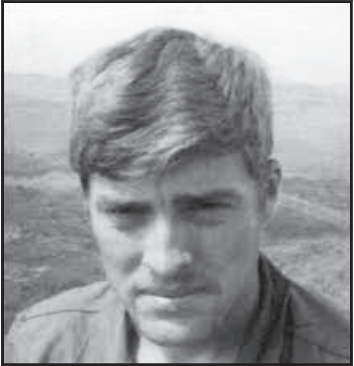

Also this year, a State policy is in place that may keep teams from going to or advancing in the playoffs, based on spectator behavior and repetitive incidents.

The Washington Public Schools Board of Education has also adopted a new policy concerning spectator behavior.

Happy Veterans Day! Thank you to all of you who have served. Veterans Day is the day set aside to thank and honor all who have served, living or deceased, but in particular the living veterans among us. If you see or know a veteran, please thank them for their service.

During the last two weeks the Department of Veterans Affairs has awarded over 40 veterans assisted by our group of volunteers, a 100 percent rating for their service-connected disabilities. Fifty-eight veterans were approved for disability ratings from 10-90 percent.

We were averaging just over 10 of that total disability rating each week until now. I don't know if VA has been working overtime to process the applications for benefits or if they have added more employees.

During the last 25 years we have assisted tens of thousands of veterans and surviving spouses to obtain VA benefits. We are very proud to have provided this assistance that enabled them to receive benefits for their injuries.

I believe the reason we are successful helping veterans and surviving spouse's benefits is because of our evidence based claims process. Many years ago when I first filed for VA benefits I asked one of the National veterans' organizations for assistance filing a claim for an injury. They did file for service-connection of an injury using only my service medical records as evidence which was then denied.

After reading that original rating decision detailing why my claim was denied I then obtained new medical evidence of a disability along with a Nexus linking my current condition to my original injury in the military. Today as the VA has improved their way of granting or denying veterans applications for benefits, we have also improved the way veterans provide evidence that supports their claims for service-connection of a disability.

The VA has incorporated and uses Disability Benefits Questionnaires that are used to evaluate veteran's disabilities. As an evidenced based Veterans Foundation, we also encourage veterans to use DBQ's that are completed by a medical provider as evidence to support their claims for VA benefits.

Each of you reading this column are invited to become a part of what we do as a volunteer with our organization. Since we were able to set up a digital program our volunteers have the option to work from home or to come into our Vet-

erans Foundation at 1233 West Lindsay in Norman.

The readings for this Sunday are about beginnings and endings. The first reading, Malachi 3:19-20, says, “For look, the Day is coming, glowing like a furnace. All the proud and all the evildoers will be stubble, and the Day, when it comes, will set them ablaze, leaving them neither root nor branch. Psalm 98 describes the approach of the Lord. “For he is coming to judge the earth, he will judge the world with saving justice and the nations with fairness.”

In the second reading, 2 Thessalonians 3:7-12, St. Paul encourages Christ’s followers to pull their own weight, “We urged you when we were with you not to let anyone eat who refused to work.” In preparation for the Lord’s return, “we urge and call on people to go

on quietly working and earning the food that they eat.”

I will give you the right words when you need them.”

Certainly, we all need to be attentive to challenges of all types. However, attention is not a summons to anxiety or fear. Jesus presented himself as a sign of hope, calm in the storm. He provides wisdom in the face of judgment, love in the face of hatred, perseverance in the face of persecution, and protection

in the face of adversity. Jesus is our bedrock of hope, no matter what is ending and beginning in our lives.

As Christ’s representatives, we should assist our sisters and brothers as they face the storms of life. We can provide shelter when needed and pitch in to help rebuild when loss occurs. Our faith does not promise a life of calm in the storm but hope that by caring and supporting each other, we can weather any storm.

Give the gift of preserving the garden’s harvest

Give a gift that helps your favorite gardeners enjoy the flavors of their garden well past the end of the growing season. Both new and experienced gardeners often spend their gardening budget on plants and seeds, leaving little or none to invest in food preservation equipment and supplies.

Prepare your favorite gardener for the next harvest season with some food preservation supplies and equipment.

Canning jars, freezer containers, spice cubes and airtight bottles for canning, freezing, and storing dehydrated herbs and vegetables are always welcome gifts.

These supplies come in handy throughout the harvest season and are often in short supply when food preservation is at its peak.

Most gardeners grow their own fresh herbs and drying is the easiest way to preserve the harvest. Simply gather stems, secure with a rubber band, and suspend in a warm, dry location.

As the stems dry and shrink, the rubber band does as well, keeping the stems secure. Use a spring clothespin to secure the herb bundles to wires or other support. Create your own drying set up or invest in one of the commercial herb drying racks.

If space is limited, your gift recipient will appreciate a system like the Stack-it Herb Drying Rack (gardeners.com) that allows them to dry lots of herbs in a very small footprint. The drying system you purchase or create should provide the needed space for the harvest and allow sufficient air circulation for fast drying.

Herbs with high moisture content like basil, oregano, lemon balm and mints will mold if not dried quickly. If this has been a problem in the past, try placing a small bunch in a paper bag with holes in the side and stems outside the bag. Hang these from a drying rack or speed up the process by using a microwave or food dehydrator.

Many gardeners grow onions, garlic, and potatoes for long-term storage. All three of these vegetables prefer cool, dark storage locations with good air circulation.

Separate potatoes from onions that give off pungent gases that can taint the potatoes’ flavor.

Avoid plastic bags that retain moisture and can shorten these vegetables storage life. Breathable potato and onion storage baskets have been used by gardeners for centuries.

Boost the style and space savings with the Stackable Bamboo Harvest Storage Basket with Lid. Just stack as needed and place on the rolling base for easy storage and accessibility.

Help your gift recipient turn their harvest into something delicious. Fermentation is a relatively easy preservation technique that has been used for thousands of years. Preserve some of your cucumbers as pickles, cabbage as sauerkraut, and berries as preserves with fermentation.

For most projects you just need the fruit or vegetables, water, salt, and spices. The desired ingredients are placed in a covered vessel like a Stoneware Pickling Crock. Weights are used to keep the fruit and vegetables submerged in water throughout the fermentation process.

Consider smaller fermentation kits for those with limited space. A three-liter glass jar with an air-lock lid and ceramic weights will allow you to ferment small quantities of vegetables.

Reduce the workload and

boost the enjoyment for those making tomato juice, sauces, and soups. Hand crank and electric tomato presses, strainers and sauce makers allow gardeners to separate the skins and seeds from the tomato meat for quicker and easier processing.

Giving a gift that helps preserve flavors from the recipient’s garden will be useful and remembered for seasons to come.
