What to do with all these leaves?

Fall is upon us, and it is time to begin thinking about what you will do with all those leaves that have been falling from the trees. Just bagging them and letting them go to the landfill is a waste of our tax dollars and a valuable garden resource. Instead of bagging them and hauling off to the dump this year, consider these

suggestions.

Use as a Mulch – An easy way to get rid of leaves is to simply rake them into landscape beds as a nice winter mulch. Some say that leaves may suffocate your plants but use your good judgment.

Small leaves generally will not offer any threat, but huge leaves, such as sycamore, might. This leaf litter has also been proven to provide im-

portant habitat for beneficial insects that need a place to hibernate through the winter.

Compost Them – If you have too many leaves to rake into your garden beds you can compost the rest. Place them in the compost pile along with other garden plant material.

Gains go big in November

This month the Oklahoma Tax Commission disbursed \$193,017,494 in sales tax collections to cities and towns, marking an increase of \$12,961,918 from the

\$180,055,576 distributed a year ago. The use tax disbursement to cities and towns was \$30,846,416.

Counties shared in a \$33,440,085 sales tax disburse-

ment and a \$5,836,501 use tax disbursement.

The returns were based on sales from September 16-30 and estimated sales from October 1-15.

Leaves:

compost bin to accomplish this process. A big hole dug in the back corner of the yard, or some other inconspicuous place works nicely. Fill the hole with lots of leaves and other garden plant material.

Mow 'Em – This method can be used after you have raked the majority into landscape or wooded areas around your property. Simply mow over them as often as necessary before they build up too deep. The chopped leaves return valuable organic matter and nutrients to the soil.

If you use a mower with a bag attachment you can capture the chopped leaves and then distribute them as needed. They work well as an excellent mulch, compost fodder, or can be worked into your vegetable garden.

Leaf Power – If you have tons of leaves, you may consider buying or renting a vacuum-shredder. This is more effective than just blowing them around with a blower.

Vacuum-shredders suck up the leaves, chop them, and then collect them into a bag. Use as described above.

Remember, however, that shredders, blowers, and choppers work well only when the leaves are nice and dry. If they're too wet, they'll just clog.


Back to Nature – If you own a wooded area or large property where you can dispose of leaves, go for it. However, remember that too many leaves can suffocate existing plants, so spread them out a bit.

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Billions spent on the election while Americans struggle

Total cost of 2022 state and federal midterm elections may have exceeded \$16 billion according to an OpenSecrets analysis.

Federal candidates and political committees spent over \$8 billion while state candidates, party committees, and ballot measure committees spent close to \$8 billion.

Here are the five most expensive Senate races this year according to OpenSecrets. This includes both general election and primary candidates together with the outside groups supporting them, such as the national parties and Super PACs:

- Pennsylvania: \$373.6 million
- Georgia: \$271.4 million (Georgia's is growing)
- Arizona: \$234.6 million
- Wisconsin: \$205.8 million
- Ohio: \$202.1 million

Pennsylvania's crucial U.S. Senate race has been the most expensive in the country this year — and it wasn't even close. Georgia may end up close to \$300 million.

Who in Georgia is happy about this? The television stations. If you own a television station during a highly contested election season, in a lucrative market, you'll never have to work again when the election is over.

Democrat John Fetterman, Republican Mehmet Oz and their political allies have spent a combined \$312 million on a race that ended up

not even close. According to OpenSecrets, a nonpartisan group who tracks money in politics, money poured into Pennsylvania for Fetterman as he had over \$15 million dollars more to work with than Oz.

Many are wondering how Fetterman, a recuperating sick man with the worst debate performance ever on national television, beat Oz? The answer is not a simple sentence. The bottom line was they didn't want Oz.

Oz was seen as an outsider. Someone who moved to the state to further his career in politics. He is well-known. That should have helped but it didn't help him that much. He was well-known for being rich, famous and still relatively good looking for an old guy.

Fetterman on the other hand is the local state guy. He doesn't look so good. They know who he is whether that is good or bad. He has been very sick and trying to rehabilitate. A lot of people feel sorry for him and didn't see him as a rich, affluent personality but rather a down to earth guy they can relate to.

People often cheer for the underdog. If you post something on social media saying you are sick, bad off, down and out you'll get many more "likes" or responses than if you post you have just received a career advance and a \$50,000 bonus.

Rand Paul of Kentucky raised \$26,410,677 and reportedly spent \$20 million. I

hope he will use the remaining \$6 million to rebuild homes in East, Kentucky, recently devastated by flooding. Or, even West, Kentucky, that is still trying to rebuild from tornadoes that flattened that part of the state.

The money spent on this election and all national elections is insane. People all over America can't afford to go the grocery store, fill up the gas tank or take care of their children's school needs.

Yet politicians, interest groups, political parties, and Political Action Committees are raising and spending mega millions trying to keep or gain a political seat. You can't do anything about it either. We have so very little to say about anything in our country.

We have to depend on the people spending millions to get their seat. If the seat is worth millions to them and the special interest groups then do you really think they care about we think?

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PHS grad Tyra Shackleford awes judges at prestigious art market

It's good to be first, and Chickasaw master weaver Tyra Shackleford is bringing home important first-place finishes in art shows of national importance.

Shackleford attended Purcell High School, graduating in 2004.

Shackleford's "Twin Turkeys" won first place in her division at the prestigious Southwestern Association for Indian Arts (SWAIA) on its 100th anniversary this earlier this year.

The hand-woven art features a design inspired by ancient Mississippian shell carvings, the Ada artist said.

"The design speaks to our place in the world," she said. "Mississippians had this belief of three worlds. The world we live in, the underworld and the upper world."

The massive piece created with soy-silk yarn took more than 130 hours to complete. Shackleford used Excel to de-

sign the pattern and plot each placement of the 300-string work of art, which was a massive task.

"Twin Turkeys" won Best of Show at this June's Artesian Arts Festival in Sulphur.

The large, framed woven piece is the result of the acclaimed artist wanting to step out of her comfort zone with the "sprang" technique, which is an ancient lace-making art form first introduced to her by Chickasaw weaver Margaret Roach Wheeler.

Ms. Shackleford further researched this technique and taught herself.

"You don't see anyone using this technique and creating 2D art with it, so I wanted to do something different and use the weaving technique to create 2D art and reach a broader audience," she said.

Shackleford is a master fabric weaver whose work is in museums, premier First American arts festivals and in numerous private collections.

"The Lady" is a masterpiece created by Shackleford that is part of the permanent collec-

tion of the Eiteljorg Museum of American Indians and Western Art, located in Indianapolis, Indiana.

Shackleford created it using an interlinking sprang technique. The title refers to the Lady of Cofitachequi, a powerful Muskogean-speaking female leader whom conquistador and colonizer Hernando de Soto encountered in 1540.

"The Lady" was inspired by Lady Cofitachequi but also represents the enduring spirit and resilience of all Chickasaw women, the artist said. In total, Shackleford has three handmade pieces in the private, permanent collections of three prestigious museums which include Eiteljorg, Great Plains Art Museum in Lincoln, Nebraska, and the Smithsonian National Museum of the American Indian, located in Washington, D.C.

Shackleford's passion lies in preserving weaving techniques that date back thousands of years, prior to European influence. She takes inspiration from her cultural background and uses her art to share Chickasaw culture with the world.

Chickasaw Nation Recycling Day to be held on November 18th

The Chickasaw Nation is hosting its annual Recycling Day from 10 a.m.-3 p.m. on Friday, November 18, at the Chickasaw Nation Community Center, 700 N. Mississippi, in Ada.

The event is open to the public at no charge.

Items accepted include electronic waste, such as non-working and unwanted electronics, tires, Styrofoam, cardboard, aluminum, tin cans, paper and plastic labeled #1 and #2. There is a five-box limit on paper.

The Chickasaw Nation is offering the event in conjunction with America Recycling Day, the only nationally recognized day dedicated to promoting recycling.

Benefits of recycling are

Finck:

towards the storyline and takes on a political tone. I do not have issues with political undertones in works of art. I assign novels each semester to my history classes with the caveat that any great piece of literature worth reading has a message or moral for the reader. My issue is that, in our current environment of political correctness, all the messages from songs, TV, movies, and Broadway have messages from only one side. *Hadestown* is no different.

In one of the most intense songs of the show, Hades is in his realm, singing to the people under his control. The song is a call-and-response song, in which Hades sings, "Why do we build this wall," and is answered by the chorus "We build the wall to keep us free." Hades then asks, "How does the wall keep us free?" and they answer, "The wall keeps out the enemy." Hades asks "Why are they the enemy?" and the answer is "Because they want what we have got." In the production I watched, Hades was played by a tall dark-haired man with an absolutely amazing baritone voice, but he might as well be played by a blond with slightly orange skin and a tie too long.

While the play does seem to take the standard Broadway

liberal side, what is interesting is it was written in 2006, years before anyone other than the Simpsons could have predicted the Trump presidency or his signature slogan of "Build That Wall." Also, it is interesting that if Hades is serving as the antagonist, then his convincing of Eurydice to come to Hadestown as her only option for survival can be seen as critical of big government.

Recognizing she is starving because she can't find food in the winter, Hades tries to convince Eurydice to leave her love by singing:

"Hey, little songbird, let me guess:

He's some kind of poet and he's penniless?

Give him your hand, he'll give you his hand-to-mouth

He'll write you a poem when the power's out

Hey, why not fly south for the winter?

Hey, little songbird, look all around you

See how the vipers and vultures surround you

They'll take you down, they'll pick you clean

If you stick around such a desperate scene

See, people get mean when the chips are down"

Hades convinces Eurydice that she will only be safe in Hadestown where he can take care of her. Of course, once

she decides to leave the world, she is imprisoned like the rest who came to see Hadestown as their only protection. Big Government becomes her prison.

My advice is this: no matter your political leaning, see the show. Know that there are some political messages, but don't let that distract you from a stunning musical. Turn off your political brain and focus on the other messages – rekindling relationships that have struggled, or the power of love and beauty.

I thought Hades' internal struggle of mercy verses control is timeless both in politics and relationships and definitely in parenting. Then there is the final message of trust. How much do we trust those we love, especially with our own human weaknesses.

Yes, it does seem as if the right always has to be the ones giving in to the left for art, but to let that stand in your way of this show would be unfortunate enough to be a Greek tragedy.

A Hughes County recycled tire garden project has been recognized as a finalist for the Keep Oklahoma Beautiful Environmental Excellence award. The program focuses on teaching Choctaw Nation youth and adults to grow and market culturally relevant crops.

KOB has recognized and rewarded Oklahomans for their environmental efforts for 32 years.

The recycled tire garden project was part of a Federally Recognized Tribes Extension Program grant through the U.S. Department of Agriculture that installed tire gardens in various parts of Hughes County to provide education on growing produce, said Shelley Mitchell, Oklahoma State University Extension associate specialist for youth programs, and served as principal investigator on the grant. The program also included educational elements and improvements to greenhouses and school gardens throughout the Choctaw Nation.

“The tire gardens were designed by horticulture consultant Steve Upson to use old tires for something good and keep them out of the landfill,” Mitchell said. “We worked with Scott Robison, community health director at the Wewoka Indian Health Center, who chose the sites for the gardens.”

Gardens were built at Holdenville Elementary School, Holdenville Indian Community Center, Wetumka Public Schools, the Wetumka Indian Community Center and Muscogee Nation Nutrition Center. Students painted the tire gar-

dens and will manage them at the school sites. Tribal elders will manage the gardens at the nutrition and community centers.

Robison said the gardens will serve as a place to grow culturally relevant crops.

“Gardening is a way of life for our people. Eating food from the earth is a symbol of strength, health and wellness,” he said. “Today, our Native people are one of the unhealthiest populations. We’ve gotten away from our natural way of life. Through these gardens, we’re trying to teach our kids

that gardening is very native to our culture.”

He said the gardens provide an additional learning opportunity for youth because many are not exposed to gardening at home. The students will be able to learn more about where their food comes from and understand that living from the land was a natural way of life for their ancestors.

In addition to gardening skills, Robison said the recycled tire project includes plans to incorporate nutritional education, cooking demonstrations, recipes and more.

“Overall, we want our youth to understand what it means to have a healthy lifestyle, which includes eating fresh fruits and vegetables,” Robison said. “Gardening is a good form of exercise, which is good for both our students and our elders.”

Students in Wetumka Public Schools put their tire gardens to use by growing radishes and are currently cultivating different lettuces.

“Our horticulture class partnered with our fifth and sixth

Red Cross offers tips to prepare for weather

Well, it’s that time of season again! Freezing temperatures are forecasted across the Kansas and Oklahoma Region this weekend.

The Red Cross encourages people to take a few minutes to prepare for the conditions. So, here are a few quick tips and reminders for you:

- Have an emergency plan in place. Know who your support network will be in case you need help or a place to stay.

- Drain outside faucets so they don’t freeze and burst. Insulate them as best you can.

- Make sure you have plenty of heating fuel, be it propane, wood, or other.

- Check your smoke alarms and be sure they are working properly. If you don’t have any, the Red Cross can install them for free. Visit redcross.org to find information.

- Keep your phones charged and have a backup power source ready in case the power goes out.

- Keep your vehicle fueled. You never know if you may have to evacuate your home or could get stranded on the road. You want to be able to stay warm until help arrives.

- Make sure a roadside emergency kit is in your car and has everything you need in case you get stranded: blankets, gloves, flares, water, snacks.

- Remember your pets. Give them extra blankets or something to keep them warm. They

withstand the cold about like we do. Bring them indoors if you have to. Check on outdoor animals and see that they have water and food that isn’t frozen.

- Check on your senior adult neighbors. Make sure they have everything they need to shelter in place if needed.

- Have a go bag ready with all the essentials in case you must leave your home because you’ve lost power or heat. You should have bottled water, snacks, a flashlight, extra clothes, medications and emergency info, including insurance rep and utility numbers, medical and doctor info.

- Go through that preparedness bag and replace anything outdated or perishable.

- Have proof of residency on hand. Update your driver’s license with the correct address or have a copy of a current utility bill. These are things you will need in the event you need disaster relief assistance or if you need to get back into your neighborhood after a disaster occurs.

“Preparedness builds resiliency within your home and your community, and it lessens the impact of a disaster on your household. So, please do what you can to stay prepared,” said Linda Medford, Regional Preparedness Programs Manager for the Red Cross of Kansas and Oklahoma. “Start small with a plan of action and a go bag, and build on it as you can.”



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NEWS from the City of Purcell

§ 106-405 Junk Vehicle on Private Property Prohibited.
No person in charge or control of any property within the city, whether as owner, tenant, occupant, lessee, or otherwise, shall allow any partially dismantled, non-operating, wrecked, junked, or unlicensed vehicle to remain on such property longer than seven days and no person shall leave any such vehicle on any property within the city for a longer time than seven days.

This section shall not apply with regard to a vehicle in an enclosed building, a vehicle on the premises of a business enterprise operated in a lawful place and manner when necessary to the operation of such business enterprise, or a vehicle in an appropriate storage place or depository maintained in a lawful place and manner by the city.

me ... but pick a green boll and chunk it at little brother and he’d tell Mama and I’d get a whipping.” Oh, the injustice! In 1976, David started working as a mechanic in Oklahoma City. He later found work as a mechanic in Norman, staying there until 1992. That year he hired on as a mechanic for McClain County District 2.

On December 31, David will retire from his present position – road foreman for the district. He’s worked for three county commissioners – the late Lloyd Tucker, the late Marvin Lyles and Wilson Lyles. “They were all very good to me,” he said. He even served as interim District 2 county commissioner for eight months when Tucker died.

Retirement won’t weigh heavy on his shoulders. “I’ve got lots of things to do,” he said. Some local farmers have asked him to drive a truck during harvest. But he’s saving the majority of his free time for his hobby – bringing old cars back to life as street rods. His pride and joy is a 1949 three-quarter ton GMC pickup which was purchased new from Jody Sparlin.

When he bought the truck from his father-in-law, there were 77,000 miles on the odometer. He is the fourth owner. Top speed for the truck was about 50 miles per hour. He’s given it a new purpose and an automatic transmission among other options. “It used to be a standard, but it ain’t no more,” he said. He’s also set the body on a Camaro frame. He will spend some of his newly freed time helping his brother restore a 1959 Chevrolet Apache pickup with suicide doors.

He loves car shows “when they are close” and parades. Especially parades where he and his red GMC street rod can be participants. He’s not one content to remain on the sidelines with the spectators while the parade passes by.

Ten years ago, David joined Masonic Lodge 406 in Washington. About five years later, he became a Shriner at the India Shrine Temple in Oklahoma City.

“They’re a good group of men,” he said of the Shriners. He’s impressed by the creativeness behind the various parade units within the Shrine.

There are everything from old classic cars to go-karts and there’s also a clown unit whose members make balloon animals for the kids. The Shriners were in Washington’s Christmas parade in 2021 and will be back this year, David said.

Retirement will have its bittersweet side, too. David will miss the people most. “I’ve enjoyed working with the old farmers and people like that,” he said. “It’s sad to see the farms go and (Washington) turning into a bedroom community.”

“My closest neighbor when I was growing up was a quarter-mile away.” Today, David’s son, Aaron, lives on the farm that’s been in the family closing on 98 years. Aaron and his wife, Colleen, raise corn, soybeans and hay on the farm that is three miles north of the Washington feed store on Ladd Road.

David and Sharon, meanwhile, live not far away on a quarter-section of land he bought in March 1965. The couple, married for 46 years, met in school and both have roots deepset in the community.

“I just moved her a mile from where we were raised,” David said. They also have a daughter, Miranda Allen, a stay-at-home mom to their granddaughter Lanay Allen. Miranda is married to George Allen.

In 1979, David and Sharon built their present home. Retirement means David will hold down the home front while Sharon works for Edward Jones in Pauls Valley. He intends to remain active in the McClain County Cattlemen’s Association where he serves on the board.

And he will continue to be a huge supporter of FFA and 4-H, which he describes as “pretty good kids.” He’ll think of his fellow county workers whenever he drives the backroads that are paved now. All were dirt when he started 30 years ago.

He need look no further than rooftops and Washington Public Schools to note the sea change in his home town. Total enrollment was 300 in all grades when David graduated. Now it’s more than 1,000. David is ready for the next chapter and thankful for the last three decades. “The county has been very, very good to me,” he said.

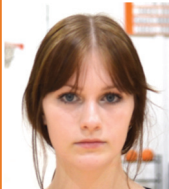

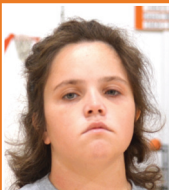

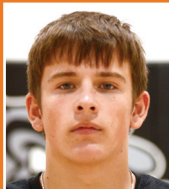

Chickasaw citizens who wish

to hunt within the Chickasaw Nation reservation may apply at no cost for a Chickasaw Nation hunting and fishing license at Chickasaw.net/Hunting.

Applicants may be asked to provide proof of citizenship, a form of ID and proof of hunter safety certification.

All Oklahoma residents with valid state-issued hunting and fishing licenses are eligible to hunt and fish within the Chickasaw Nation reservation in accordance with all appli-

cable laws.

Chickasaw Nation hunting and fishing licenses are only valid within Chickasaw Nation reservation boundaries. Oklahoma Department of Wildlife Conservation Hunting & Fishing Licenses are required for hunting and fishing elsewhere in Oklahoma.

November 20, 2022 is the thirty-fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time. During Ordinary Time, the Gospel focuses on the teachings and miracles of Christ during his time on earth.

In the Catholic Church, liturgical years are designated A, B, or C. In the A year, the gospel readings are usually from Matthew. In the B year, they are from Mark, and in the C year, they are from Luke. Gospel readings from John are interspersed through all three liturgical years.

The last Sunday of the liturgical year is the Feast of Christ the King. November 20 will mark the end of year C. Next week, on November 27, 2022, we will begin the new liturgical year, a year A, with the first Sunday in Advent.

The Feast of Christ the King is a relatively new feast beginning in 1925. Pope Pius XI established the feast in recognition that Christ is the King of the Universe. Secularism was on the rise and dangerous dictatorships were happening in Europe and beyond. One of the effects the Pope prayed for was that the faithful would gain

strength and courage from the celebration of the feast, as we are reminded that Christ must reign in our hearts, minds, wills, and bodies.

In the Gospel reading, Luke 23:35-43, people were watching as Jesus was crucified. The leaders and the soldiers jeered at him saying things like ‘He saved others, let him save himself if he is the Christ of God, the Chosen One,’ and ‘If you are the king of the Jews, save yourself.’ One of the criminals hanging there abused him: ‘Are you not the Christ? Save yourself and us as well.’ The other criminal spoke up and rebuked him. ‘Have you no fear of God at all? You got the same sentence as he did, but we deserved it: we are paying for what we did. But this man has done nothing wrong.’ Then he said, ‘Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom.’ Jesus answered him, ‘In truth I tell you, today you will be with me in paradise.’

What a wonderful reading to end the liturgical year. We begin the year with Advent, the anticipation of our Savior. We end the year with the criminal

hanging next to Jesus recognizing him as King.

Jesus was not the King the people expected. They certainly did not think he would die between two criminals. Yet even one of the criminals recognized the kingship of Jesus. The crowd watching the crucifixion included people just like us. Non-believers jeered and mocked. We also know that believers like Mary, Mary Magdalene and some disciples were there grieving as they watched Jesus die. The choice remains today – let us choose Jesus.

How Big is God?

I have long wanted to write a sermon, perhaps a book, bearing this title. We were able to explore this theme in Lexington recently (just before the snow came); and I’m glad to have you along as we share some of those thoughts here on the ‘front porch.’

In the beginning, I stumbled across a Biblical account that I would not have expected to be the backdrop for this great theme. But it served the purpose well, and I grew to appreciate the scene more and more as I examined it closely. I appreciated the scene just as I appreciated the great theme that began the journey.

The scene where we landed was in the 21st chapter of the gospel of John. It is what I would call that ‘anticlimactic’ chapter. If you were not familiar with John’s gospel, you would probably not guess the scene that we have before us.

You likely would think of the scenes in the 20th chapter: the appearance of Mary Magdalene at the tomb of Jesus and her meeting the angel or Mary’s running to Peter and John to retrieve them to the tomb (and John’s outrunning of Peter there but Peter’s having the courage to go into that blessed tomb). You would next think, no doubt, of Jesus’ appearances that wrap up that great 20th chapter: His appearance first to Mary Magdalene then to the disciples as they meet to discuss matters up in that upper room, the gathering where all of the eleven are there, except the one.

And you would think of that last scene in the gospel, eight days later, or the next Lord’s Day, when the missing disciple, our own ‘doubting’ Thomas, comes with the disciples and gets his auspicious opportunity to come face to face with the risen Savior with the nail prints

in his hands and the scar from the spear in his side.

By the way, I suppose I never thought before that this scene also illustrates that when Jesus arises from the grave that he arises in the body with which He is buried. It was a bodily resurrection, and Thomas the doubter has the opportunity to see the risen Savior face to face. That small truth, thought not small at all, would come in handy in the years to come as men from all ranks begin to doubt the actual resurrection of the Lord.

It is true that any of these scenes would make noble backdrops for an examination of a theme as big as ‘How big is God?’

But that is not where we landed. We came to the 21st chapter where John tells a

ber Luke 6:38: “Give, and it will be given to you. A good measure, pressed down, shaken together and running over, will be poured into your lap. For with the measure you use, it will be measured to you.”

story as simple as you or me telling about the events we had in a hard day’s work cleaning brush and debris from the yard after a late night storm. That, precisely, is the type of tale John tells. He tells how seven disciples find themselves in a familiar place out on the Sea of Galilee one night and fisticuffs with stubborn fish all night long. At Peter’s determination that he wants to go fishing, the other six follow him faithfully to the rocky waves at the reef of this great sea.

The night of fishing is not successful, as they toil casting their nets all night without catching any fish at all. Near morning, a shadowy figure appears on the shore of the sea; and He calls out to those seven men out there working some hundred yards from shore. He says, “Children, have you caught anything tonight?” They all answer “no,” undoubtedly with a hint of frustration.

The figure on the shore hollers back out and instructs them to cast the net on the other side of the boat, on the right side, and when they obey Him they draw a netful of fish. The net is full, but it does not break as they pull the 153 fish to shore, a number John includes in his narrative, for whatever reasons. If nothing else, it is an intriguing detail the apostle adds to the narrative.

The disciples still do not recognize that shadowy figure who is calling out to them in the twilight of the morning, except for one. Oh, no, it is not the one of chapter 20. It is not Thomas. The one disciple who identifies their early-morning friend is the writer of this gospel, John, the disciple whom Jesus loved.

When John realizes who is standing there on the shore of that blessed sea, he hollers out to the rest of his fishermen friends, “It is the Lord,” he exclaims, and the others’ blind eyes are opened to the great truth and all make their way to shore to see the Master, with Peter’s surpassing them all by diving into the water to swim to the Lord so he can beat them all.

But it is John’s declaration, “It is the Lord,” that grabs our attention. It is in that statement that we can build a case to answer the question of the ages, “Just how big IS God?” We’re anxious to examine this scene and others to find out.

One more thing we need to establish from the outset, one great truth: If you and I are not seeing the Lord in everything, then our God is not nearly, nearly big enough to us.

Keep that thought close to the vest, and we’ll proceed into the amazing opening scenes of the 21st chapter of John.
