"Angels felt compassion for the girl, and after she placed the flowers at the nativity on Christmas Eve they transformed the weeds into beautiful red flowers. Cover the drainage hole with a coffee filter or piece of paper towel. This prevents the potting mix from leaking out the drainage holes after planting. Use a well-drained cacti and succulent potting mix.

Grow this plant in a sunny window along with your other cacti and succulents. South and unobstructed east or westfacing windows are usually the best. Set it under artificial lights if a brightly lit location is not available.

Water thoroughly whenever the top third of the soil is dry. Avoid applying water over the center of the plant where it can collect between the leaves and lead to rot. Pour off excess water that collects in the saucer.

Prevent early death of your plant by avoiding waterlogged soil. Watering too often or allowing the pot to sit in excess water can lead to root rot and the death of the plant. You will need to water less often in winter when days are shorter, light intensity is lower and plant growth is limited.

Keep plants away from cold drafts and temperatures below 50 degrees Fahrenheit that can damage the plants. Northern gardeners may need to move the plants back a bit from the window in winter as outside temperatures drop.

Clean leaves occasionally with a damp rag. This removes any dust that may collect on the leaves and helps reduce the risk of insect pests such as mealy

Demand is high, but financial support for Oklahoma's unpaid caregivers is scarce

That uncertain future arrived two years later while celebrating her mother Maybelle's 80th birthday in Las Vegas.

Johnson spent six weeks in the waiting rooms of a Nevada hospital as Maybelle recovered from a stroke. They returned on a costly medical flight that forced Johnson to open a \$14,000 line of credit on her northeast Oklahoma City home. Maybelle returned to a stack of medical bills her insurance didn't cover.

The ordeal thrust Johnson into the world of caregiving, where life savings and endless days can be spent helping loved ones live.

There's no way to say for certain how many Oklahomans share Johnson's circumstances. The current best estimate of 530,000 family caregivers is five years old and comes from the state AARP. That organization, which focuses on issues affecting those over the age of 50, valued the unpaid work of state caregivers at \$5.8 billion I used to make, and I live very in 2017 — cost savings for the state that advocates say justifies public support.

In September, a federal caregiving advisory council recommended easing family caregivers' tax burden based on the amount they spend on care. Twenty-five states and Washington D.C. have some form of tax break for caregivers. The only existing resources in Oklahoma target caregivers of children.

Ameasure that advocates call a modest first step for caregivers of aging Oklahomans died in the state Senate last session after passing the House by a vote of 84-2.

Johnson returned to work briefly when her 401K ran dry, cobbling together a schedule of discounted and free care through state agencies and nonprofits. She retired at age 62 when their main at-home nurse resigned.

She spends her days preparing Maybelle's food, changing and turning her to avoid bed sores. A hired assistant helps with Maybelle's baths. A state program offering families al-



ternatives to nursing home care reimburses Johnson for some of the work, and she also gets paid through Social Security.

"I'm kind of at a third of what simply now," Johnson said.

One in five Americans is expected to reach age 65 or older by 2040. According to a Blue Cross Blue Shield report, Oklahoma has a higher caregiver demand than most states because of an older average population and greater health disparities.

State data shows 2,417 caregivers received services such as nutrition education, legal assistance and congregate meals in 2022 through the state Department of Human Services. Many caregivers burn out because they are unaware of the services that are available, said Blair Schoeb, CEO of the Johnson said she would use Areawide Aging Agency in Oklahoma City.

Johnson said she depleted her retirement savings so quickly because she didn't know about more affordable care options. As she realized others in her community face similar chal-

business that helps clients age at home instead of in a longterm care facility.

She's developing a business model called A Link to Connect through classes at the University of Central Oklahoma and training through Progress OKC, a nonprofit organization supporting under-resourced communities.

"A lot of it is just easing the mind because it can be overwhelming if you're saying, 'How can I do this on my own?" Johnson said. "Or 'How can I do this when they need so much help?' And there are resources out there that you could think about first."

Financial support is among the greatest needs, according to a 2016 DHS caregiver survey. An income tax credit for caregivers had strong support among Oklahoma voters 50 years and older surveyed by

Two Republican state lawmakers took aim at that need in March by introducing the Caring for Caregivers Act, which would reduce the tax burden for eligible purchases related to care. The bill targets those taking care of a family member over 62 who needs help with at least two everyday activities.

In response to Oklahoma's continued teacher shortage, lawmakers passed a measure that no longer requires educators to have a college degree to teach permanently in public schools.

All a prospective educator needs now is a high school diploma and "distinguished qualifications" in their field to make them eligible to teach full time in K-12 classrooms.

Those people don't have to work toward a teaching certificate or take college classes, and legislators gave local districts latitude to determine what meets the "distinguished qualifications" threshold.

Supporters claim the law will make it easier for doctors, lawyers, and other trained professionals to enter the teacher pipeline, but critics say those are not the people applying to teach. Public school watchdogs say they are hearing of superintendents and school boards so desperate that they are hiring people with high school diplomas."

Oklahoma elected officials want your teachers to get hired with just a high school diploma. Let me repeat, just a high school diploma! How will these kids compete on the world stage? No doctor or lawyer will come to work in a school for teacher pay.

News from Capitol Hill

Democrats dragging their feet

As we near the end of the year, it reminds us of the need for and importance of finishing important legislative work in both chambers of Congress. In fact, there are still several necessary items left to complete, and lawmakers must remaining work.

First, Congress needs to provide full-year funding, or not result in legislation getting appropriations, for the federal government.

Annual appropriations support government programs that touch nearly every aspect of our daily lives and various facets of the economy – including national defense, transportation and infrastructure, operation of national parks, law and immigration enforcement, health similar activities to keep the government functioning.

Although Democrats controlling the House Appropriations Committee have completed their version of all 12 of the appropriations bills by straight party-line votes, unfortunately, Democrats controlling the Senate have been dragging their feet and not holding up their

end of the bargain. In fact, Senate appropriators have failed to pass a single appropriations bill out of com-

this legislation can be negotiated and finally enacted without their completing that important work in advance, it will take both time and increased, cooperative negotiation between the two chambers.

Currently, the federal government is operating and funded by a short-term "continuing resolution." Unfortunately, instead of making good use of the precious time left to finish this vital work of funding the government and authorizing the necessary funding for our national defense, Democrats in both chambers have continued to kick the can further down the road by focusing on messaging bills. This is a disservice to the American people and ultimately puts many livelihoods and our shared national security at risk.

The clock is ticking, and lawmakers must race to finish work on these pressing legislative items before the end of the year. While I remain committed to completing this process, I hope Democrats, who still control both chambers of Congress and the executive branch, can buckle down and work with Republicans to finish this work. Indeed, while the U.S. is amidst a recession, this is the wrong time to play such games.



OMRF experts urge caution as RSV cases rise

a toll on young children and older adults has returned this fall with a vengeance.

Surges in respiratory syncytial virus, or RSV, typically parallels flu season, running from late fall into the spring, but this year's outbreak started earlier than normal. This month, the Oklahoma State Department of Health reported rising case numbers and hospitalizations for RSV in many parts of the state. The figures mirror national trends.

"We saw a dramatic reduction in RSV during the pandemic due to the precautions we took to curb the spread of the coronavirus," said Scofield, an immunologist. "Infants and

A seasonal virus that takes young children whose immune systems had never been exposed to the virus were in a protective bubble. Now that bubble has burst."

RSV typically causes a mild cold. But among children younger than 5, RSV is responsible annually for 100-300 deaths and up to 80,000 hospitalizations in the U.S., according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. The virus is even deadlier among older adults. A 2022 National Institutes of Health study estimated more than 6,000 people 65 years and older die each year from RSV complications.

OMRF scientist Susan Kovats, Ph.D., studies RSV. She noted that before the pandemic, almost all children contracted the virus by age 2. Kovats said that because so many children avoided exposure to it in 2020 and 2021, the virus appears to be "playing catch-up" in pediatric populations.

Kovats is working to understand why RSV impacts children more frequently than adults and why it hits some infants so hard. The work is setting the stage for better treatments and will aid in vaccine design for the condition.

"Our early indications are that neonatal cells are less likely to make the proteins that stop a virus from replicating in the body," Kovats said. "In

Chickasaw students currently enrolled in the Wind Tech I Training program at High Plains Technology Center in Woodward, Oklahoma, are also eligible.

"Oklahoma has benefited tremendously from the increase in clean energy careers, and we want to be sure those opportunities are extended to every Chickasaw student who wants to pursue them," Mr. Stutzman said.

According to information provided by Enel, for more than 20 years the company has been a renewable energy leader and innovator in the United States and Canada. Enel's goal is to help companies and communities create value in sustainability. It has created jobs in Oklahoma's sustainable energy market for more than a decade and continues to invest heavily in wind turbines.

"Enel operates several wind farms on land leased from private landowners in the Chickasaw Nation," Mr. Stutzman said. "At all of our operating projects, we look for ways to invest in the long-term sustainability of our host communities. If unauthorized charges call your credit card company and dispute those charges. If individual or business, do not use P2P apps like Cash App, Zelle, and Venmo to make purchases.P2Papps do not have the same consumer protections as a credit card.

• Monitor the shipping process. Always get tracking numbers for items you buy online, so you can make sure they have been shipped and can follow the delivery process. Packages that are stacked up outside your door can make you a target for porch poachers.

If you plan to be out of town but expect deliveries, consider having your mail held at the post office until you get back or ask a neighbor to collect them for you. Be cautious if you receive an unsolicited text message with a strange web link that indicates a package can't be delivered. If you never signed up for a tracking request for a specific package, don't click the link! This is likely a scam.

• Spot and avoid government impersonators. This type of scam often starts with a call, email, or text from someone who says they're with the IRS, and toast, applesauce, juice, carrots, dinner roll, fruit, milk. Social Security Administration, milk. or Medicare – but sometimes they give a fake agency name, like the non-existent National Sweepstakes Bureau. 



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

As our organization is VA Accredited, we are replacing the old VA 21-22A POA forms that listed Dale Graham as your representative. A new VA 21-22 POA is required for our organization to be able access your VA claims folder to assist with your claims for VA benefits. Please log into dkgvf.org to fill out your intake forms for us to be able to assist you.

Almost every single day a surviving spouse or other family member will visit us wanting to file for DIC VA benefits when the veteran dies. Many of them will not have any information about the VA benefits that the veteran may have been receiv-

To alleviate this problem, we are encouraging all veterans to log into our dkgvf.org portal to fill out our intake forms and upload their DD-214 and VA rating decisions. As most of us older veterans need a little help to do this, we have volunteers in our Computer Lab Monday thru Friday who are available from 9 a.m. to 12 noon to assist them. It is very important for all veterans to register and upload this information.

Please remember your survivthe years we have seen many surviving spouses who were denied VA benefits who may veteran's information would had been available.

On Jan. 1, 2023, the Department of Veterans Affairs will open enrollment for Veterans Affairs Life Insurance, the first new VA life insurance program for Veterans in more than 50 years, extending VALife access to millions of Veterans.

VALife will provide up to \$40,000 of whole life insurance for all veterans, age 80 or under, with service-connected disabilities rated from 0-100 percent. Acceptance in the program is guaranteed, and no medical underwriting is required.

It will also allow veterans to complete their application online, receive instant decisions, and perform self-service functions, including electronic payments and beneficiary updates.

VALife will increase Veteran access to life insurance in sev-

There is no time limit to apply: VA's existing life insurance program for service-disabled Veterans, Service-Disabled Veterans Insurance, required most Veterans to apply for insurance within 2 years of receiving their disability rating. VALife has no such time constraint for Veterans aged 80 and under.

There is no health requirement to apply: Under S-DVI, Veterans had to be in good health except for service-connected conditions. VALife has no medical evaluation tied to it.
