He's the current catcher for the Warriors. He wants to study sports management and Kinesiology. His favorite class is Aerospace Engineering taught by Shane Labeth. Both said they pray a lot about their situation and both went to Hearts for

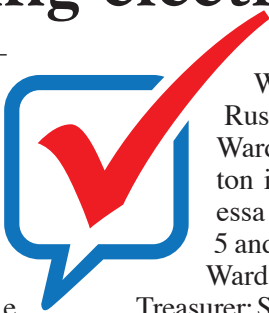
Hearing for Audiology and Speech Services for years. “The extensive speech therapy was our saving grace,” mom, Taysha Springer said. Kane went to the special speech class until his seventh grade year. Ganon finished just last semester.

“I struggled with the consonant ‘s’,” Kane said. When Kane was first diagnosed Ryan and Taysha Springer were told he would need to learn sign language and probably never be able to attend public school. “My parents said, “No way,” Kane said. They first suspected something when Kane would not turn around when they called out his name. “We were getting a lot of ‘huhs’ and he was not speaking many clear words,” Taysha said. “They think he read lips from age 2-3. He went in for a sedated ABR test and was determined to have severe to profound hearing loss. That began our new normal.

Requesting emergency ballot

Registered voters who become physically incapacitated after 5 p.m. Monday, February 20, and cannot make it to the polls, still have an opportunity to cast their ballot.

McClain County Election

Board Secretary Karen Haley reports state law permits voters who become emergency incapacitated may vote under special provisions. Haley said emergency incapacitation is something most voters don’t

think about.

“Voting is our constitutional right, but life happens,” Mrs. Haley said. “Injury, illness, or even childbirth can prevent a voter from being able to go to the polls. That’s why it’s important to make sure voters know their rights in the event of an emergency.”

If you or someone you know becomes physically incapacitated after 5 p.m. by February 20, contact your county election board as soon as possible. Haley says election board officials will work with you to make sure you have all of the necessary information to cast your ballot. Forms and information can also be found on the Oklahoma State Election Board website at oklahoma.gov/elections.

The McClain County Election Board is located at 121 N 2nd, Purcell and is open from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. Election Board officials can be reached at 405-527-3121 or by email at mcclaincounty@elections.ok.gov.

McCall reiterated his position from last session that a voucher bill will not come out of the House of Representatives saying, "vouchers would be detrimental to rural schools."

Most of the legislators I visited with said they think public funds should remain in support of public schools.

One publisher took public school support one step further by raising the question why can't more private funds be used to support public schools.

It is an interesting idea and food for thought.

Update from the Capitol

From constituent and caucus meetings to chairing my first General Government Committee meeting, the first week of session was a blur.

I had several bills approved in committee, including three in Business and Commerce, one in Public Safety, three in Insurance, two in General Government, and two in Health and Human Services.

Senate Bill 368 would codify a woman's right to preventative birth control. There is a misconception that this would allow for abortion-inducing medications and surgical abortions, but that is untrue.

This simply states that Oklahomans have the right to any medication or surgery, such as having one's tubes tied or a vasectomy, oral contraception, or surgical insertion of intrauterine devices (IUDs), to prevent pregnancy.

I want to assure physicians they won't be punished for providing prevention options and couples who aren't ready for a child that they'll have

access to birth control.

As I mentioned last week, SB 87 and SB 91 would increase the amount teachers and state employees are paid if they choose not to use the state provided insurance. A McClain County sheriff's deputy requested SB 501 to create fines for smoking in a vehicle with minors.

I've been working on SB 437, 439 and 645 since last session and they passed committee unanimously. I've dedicated a lot of time to understanding marijuana issues and have worked with the Oklahoma Medical Marijuana Authority (OMMA) and industry leaders to put forward commonsense solutions to several major issues.

SB 439 would stop the easy access minors currently have to marijuana, while ensuring minors who truly need medical marijuana for diagnoses, like seizures, will continue to have it.

Another measure that passed committee is the Women's Bill

of Rights, SB 408, to provide clarity and uniformity by categorizing males and females by their biological sex, rather than by the gender they identify as to provide accurate scientific data for patients.

There are misconceptions on this bill as some say it's discriminatory against certain groups, but there are treatments for specific diagnoses, like cancer, that have different recommendations and outcomes when based on biological sex. We must collect and record data that will accurately depict health outcomes for all Oklahomans.

When I was first elected, some told me to run just one or two bills my first year to get my feet wet. I've never been one to shy away from hard work, so I did the exact opposite. I'm only promised four years to do good work so as I enter my third session as your Senator, I want to continue to work hard

A speech of deflections

Last week, President Joe Biden delivered his State of the Union address to a joint session of Congress amid our nation's mounting and worsening crises.

Unfortunately, instead of addressing runaway inflation, the overrun southern border and the increasingly aggressive and emboldened Communist China, he used his speech to deflect from these issues that matter most to Americans.

In two years under Democratic control of the presidency and Congress, our nation's economy has been unable to fully recover from the coronavirus pandemic.

Democrats and President Biden's out-of-control spending, Green New Deal policies and high-tax plans have caused prices on just about everything to skyrocket, and Americans are severely struggling financially. While Americans pay

more than double the amount for a carton of eggs, inflation is undoubtedly the most important issue.

I was disappointed the president proposed more spending and policies that would not help ease this crisis but would even make matters worse.

While I hope the president will come to the table and work with Republicans this Congress on spending reforms that adequately address America's debt ceiling and ever-growing national debt, I am appalled by the president's false claim that Republicans would allow Social Security and Medicare benefits to sunset.

To be clear, no Republican wants these programs, which millions of American seniors rely upon, to end. However, we understand that reforms must be made to save the program and ensure its solvency for future generations.

In fact, the president's deputy

press secretary dismissed the idea of a commission, like the one proposed in my Bipartisan Social Security Commission Act, to find solutions to save Social Security, calling it a "death panel." The Social Security Trustees have only told us repeatedly the program will soon become insolvent.

If the president is really interested in preserving benefits, as we all are, then he needs to act with Congress to ensure the program's solvency.

Otherwise, the very cuts he fears will happen, and they will be steep. Refraining from entertaining a conversation about the issues facing the programs shows he is not actually serious about leading or preserving these benefits.

The president also offered no solutions to his self-made historic humanitarian and national

House completes first week of Session

Our new legislative session began on Monday, February 6, and we hit the ground running with Governor Stitt's State of the State Address. Senators joined us in the House chamber to hear his speech, and we also hosted statewide officials, tribal leaders and members of the Oklahoma Supreme Court.

In the governor's annual speech, he outlines his policy priorities and budget request. While the governor can ask lawmakers to focus on certain areas, the power to pass bills and appropriate taxpayer dollars ultimately lies with the Legislature.

The first step in passing a bill is to pass it through committee. Committees are comprised of a select group of members who hear bills on certain topics. A bill must receive a majority

pass vote from the committee members before it can be heard on the House floor by all 101 representatives.

While committees normally meet at the same time every week, there were not many meetings held this week as we're still getting our schedules and agendas organized.

To prepare for meetings, the committee chair will meet with legislators who have a bill or bills assigned to the committee. They'll overview the legislation together and decide together when to hear the bill, as sometimes the author wants to make changes to the measure before it's heard for the first time.

Committees will pick up in

Your Views We must do better

To the Editor:

Oklahoma has a fractured system of 512 public schools, 25 charter schools, about 207 private schools, 23,000 students home schooled and EPIC virtual instruction in every county. A mess. Include the 15 mills that 59 Career Tech schools are taking from many districts and the issues are compounded.

Now Governor Stitt and State Superintendent Walters are requesting a commitment for funding more schools under the guise of school choice. Really, more schools? Schools cost (teachers, classrooms, gyms, utilities) and how are we to afford the required facilities and teachers with more new schools?

The Administration should be aware that school choice is often not relevant or feasible in rural areas.

According to recent test scores, many students in Tulsa and Oklahoma City can barely read or write. Their parents are often focused on economic survival, not school choice. A significant number of children are basically illiterate. How are we to provide a charter/private school for them? I would hypothesize that 95% of Oklahomans cannot define a charter school. Not once have I heard the Governor or the State Superintendent inquire about ways and means (or present a comprehensive plan) to improve the public schools in an attempt to remove Oklahoma from the national rating of number 45.

Is the plan to abandon the present system of public school funding and evolve another process? Do the majority of Oklahomans want their children in charter/private schools? We need to be talking to our legislators ASAP.

I would recommend that the governor concentrate on supporting public schools and do the following: (1) initiate an analysis of how we prepare school administrators (leadership and change comes from this group not the school boards); (2) think outside the box and overhaul classroom discipline as many teachers leave because of disruptive students and classroom chaos; (3) cancel the four day week; (4) develop a school merit program to financially reward an entire staff/faculty for achieving overall excellence; and, (5) consolidate many districts. There is much more to do, but this is a start.

Public education in Oklahoma is rated at the bottom nationally because of the lack of leadership from the State Superintendent's office and the lack of commitment of many parents to their children's education. Public education must be top priority. Oklahoma must find a fearless leader for public education to take charge and pioneer a new path to overcome the present sorry state of affairs within our families and schools. Oklahoma must do better.

Gov. Stitt says he and president agree on certain energy issues

Oklahoma Gov. Kevin Stitt said he reached common ground with President Biden on energy issues during the governor’s visit to the White House.

Governors from across the country gathered for the 115th winter meetings of the National Governors Association, held February 9-11 in Washington, D.C. Stitt was one of four chosen to ask a question of President Joe Biden when the governors met with him at the White House on Friday.

“We talked about kind of an all-of-the-above energy approach. I was asking the president ‘let’s take our foot off the brake and allow more innovation,’” said Stitt, who spoke with Gaylord News on Saturday.

“Let’s let the free market flourish and to meet the needs of Americans. I think Oklahoma has a great energy story to tell, we are one of only four states that 50 percent of our energy comes from renewables so we can all be really proud

of that.”

According to the U.S. Energy Information Administration, in the year 2021 wind made up 41 percent of Oklahoma’s total electricity net generation, which surpassed natural gas’ share for the first time. The state ranked third in the United States in total electricity net generation from wind.

“We are a huge oil and gas state, but what people don’t realize is we are also a huge wind state and we are a net-exporter, we produce more energy than we consume and therefore it’s led to a reliable, affordable energy grid that’s really the envy of the country and the envy of the world right here in Oklahoma,” Stitt said.

Stitt says he looks forward to discussing issues surrounding energy and finding common ground with the president.

“We are kind of all on the same page because as the nation’s governors, we are trying to make sure that we are providing better services for our citizens. That means lower electricity cost and lower cost

at the fuel pump.”

Stitt, a Republican, and the Democratic president have not seen eye-to-eye on many issues, but Stitt said he and Biden agreed on lowering the costs of electricity and fuel.

“The president agreed with us and told me we need to work on those things.”

Stitt said he came away with a positive outlook for the future.

“It’s exciting when you can sit down and talk with one another and it’s not so political with this side versus this side or shirts versus skins, let’s just sit down and focus on making the U.S. the strongest country in the world,” Stitt said.

“I want to make Oklahoma a top 10 state in everything we do. I told the president it’s one team, one fight, we are all in this together and to make the lives of the American citizens better,” Stitt said.

Mead donates dental care at Oklahoma Mission of Mercy

The Oklahoma Mission of Mercy recently announced the success of its 12th annual dental clinic in Shawnee, where Oklahoma Dental Association members and Purcell resident Dr. Glenn Mead was among the dental professionals who volunteered their time and skills to treat patients in need of dental care.

Volunteers at the free two-day dental clinic provided \$1 million in donated dental care to individuals of all ages, including cleanings, fillings, extractions and oral health education. In total, volunteers served 765 patients, averaging \$1,307.19 in donated dental care per patient.

"Thanks to the dedication of dental professionals, general volunteers and sponsors, the 12th annual Oklahoma Mission of Mercy was a tremendous success," said Dr. Robert Herman, Oklahoma Dental Association president and OkMOM 2023 co-chair. "It's incredible to see the dental community come together to provide hundreds of Oklahomans with critical oral health care and help make a difference in the lives of these patients."

It took 888 volunteers to make this year's Oklahoma Mission of Mercy a success. The event is the single-largest free clinic in the state where dental professionals unite to provide treatment to patients who are uninsured, underinsured or would not normally have access to dental care.

"We treated patients in serious pain, patients who hadn't smiled in months and patients without education or resources for long-term dental care," said Dr. Brandon Loeser, a Shawnee-based dentist and OkMOM 2023 co-chair. "The Oklahoma Mission of Mercy helped alleviate many of these needs, advancing dental health and providing resources for continual, long-term care for hundreds of patients."

Comprehensive and routine dental care is not a reality for many across the state due to numerous barriers such as geographical, financial and

educational obstacles. For Oklahomans who lack access to dental care and oral health education, Oklahoma Mission of Mercy can be a life-changing event.

"More than a million Oklahomans don't have dental insurance, severely limiting their ability to access oral health care," said John Gladden, Delta Dental of Oklahoma president and CEO. "The Oklahoma Mission of Mercy helps to address a widespread need, bringing together thousands of dental professionals and volunteers to aid those who need it most."

Since 2010, volunteers at the Oklahoma Mission of Mercy have treated 18,146 patients, totaling more than \$15 million in donated dental services. Hosted in a different city across the state each year, the 2024 Oklahoma Mission of Mercy will be held in Lawton.

"All Oklahomans deserve and need access to dental care," said Oklahoma Dental Foundation Executive Director John Wilguess. "With the help of our sponsors, volunteers and the city of Shawnee, the Oklahoma Mission of Mercy brought vital dental care to those in our community who need it the most, and we look forward to helping even more of our neighbors at next year's event."

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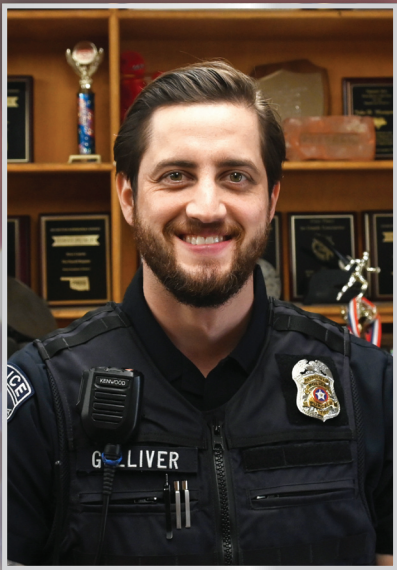

Norman’s American Legion Post closing for renovations

Purcell-area veterans who need assistance with obtaining benefits are encouraged to attend the American Legion Post 88’s walk-in clinic on Monday, February 20, from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. at 710 E. Main St. in Norman, as the building will be closed for renovations beginning Monday, February 27.

The Post is expected to reopen within a week to 10 days after the closure, said Senior Veterans’ Services Officer Carl Ellison.

Anyone who needs immediate assistance with survivor benefits while the building is closed may call Ellison directly at 405-823-0910.

Once renovations are complete, the Post will resume its regular schedule of assisting veterans and their dependents with obtaining benefits each Monday from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.

The Post provides VA-accredited officers who are available to help with applying and processing claims for financial compensation, pension and death benefits, temporary financial assistance and additional government programs, Ellison said. All services are provided free of charge, and walk-ins are welcome.

Extensive renovations to the approximately 90-year-old Post building are being funded by a \$330,000 American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) grant received from Cleveland County.

Long-term, the goal is to expand the veterans’ assistance program to more than one day per week, Ellison said.

Norman’s Post remained open throughout the pandemic, and has obtained millions of dollars in benefits for vets and their dependents over the past three years, a factor which was significant in obtaining the ARPA funds.

“This grant is a game-changer for us,” Ellison said. “On behalf of the American Legion and the hundreds of veterans, service members and families we are able to serve each year, we are grateful for the ongoing support from our county leaders and the Norman community.”

Grow tasty and nutritious leafy greens indoors

Boost the flavor and nutritional value of winter meals by growing a container of greens indoors. Plant, tend and harvest greens for garden-fresh flavor now and throughout the year.

Green leafy vegetables are healthy sources of carbohydrates, typically rich in fiber and nutrients, while also being low in fat and calories.

Many of these vegetables can help reduce the risk of stroke, anemia, high blood pressure, certain cancers, and diabetes. They also help improve the health of your gut, heart, bone, and skin while boosting your body's immunity.

To create your own indoor garden of greens, all you need are seeds, a container, potting mix, and a sunny window or artificial lights.

Select a container or planter with drainage holes or reduce maintenance with the help of self-watering containers like the Viva Round or Square self-watering planters. Their water reservoirs reduce watering frequency.

Fill the container with a quality potting mix that is well-drained and retains moisture. Plant seeds as recommended on the seed packet.

You can grow each type of green in its own container or mix them up for an attractive display in larger planters like



the Tartu Elevated Rectangular Planter (gardeners.com).

Water thoroughly and often enough to keep the soil moist while waiting for the seeds to sprout. Reduce the need for frequent watering by covering newly planted containers with a plastic sheet or dome. Once sprouts appear, remove the plastic and begin watering thoroughly when the top inch of soil begins to dry.

Boost productivity and increase planting space with the help of artificial lights. You will find a variety of setups for any space in your home.

Counter and tabletop light stands like the Micro Grow Light Garden can be conveniently located in the kitchen or dining room. Stand-alone light shelves provide more growing

space within a small footprint. Furniture-grade light stands make them easy to use in any room in the house.

Grow greens you and your family like to use in your favorite recipes and salads. Green or red leaf lettuce is easy to grow indoors and its mild flavor is most appealing to children and picky eaters.

Spinach is another popular and easy-to-grow leafy green vegetable used fresh in salads and smoothies or added to soups and sauces. It contains many vitamins and nutrients, including iron, folic acid, and calcium.

Kale is considered a superfood. This nutrient-dense vegetable is packed with vitamins, minerals, and antioxidants. If the flavor is a bit too intense for you, try the baby leaf types

that are milder in flavor, or try braising kale for a milder flavor and more tender texture.

Add a bit of peppery flavor to salads, soups, pastas, and other dishes with arugula. Add a spicier flavor with mustard greens. Sauté mustard greens or add them to your favorite Southern, Asian, Indian or savory dish.

Include color and flavor in your winter meals with beet greens. The leafy part of this vegetable is often overlooked but is the most nutritious part of the plant. Use these the same way you would spinach or kale.

You can purchase beet varieties selected for growing the best greens to harvest from baby to full size.

Make it more fun by getting others involved. Hand family members and guests a plate and kitchen shears so they can harvest and help prepare the meal.

Drummond says veterans panel appointments not allowed by law

Attorney General Gentner Drummond said today that while there are significant statutory deficiencies with recent appointments to the Oklahoma Veterans Commission, he is confident that state legislators will resolve the matter this legislative session by stripping the Governor of his autonomy over the panel.

At issue are efforts by Gov. Stitt to remove and replace three commission members.

State law requires that the commission consist of nine members, including a representative from six specified veterans' groups.

Stitt has not followed the lawfully ascribed process, claiming the veterans groups were ineligible to submit nominees because they had not complied with an audit requirement.

"This entire episode has been nothing short of a spectacle. It is unfortunate that the Governor has not followed the proper appointment process, and it is equally unfortunate that the executive director of the state Department of Veterans Affairs is acting irresponsibly and not in the best interests of veterans. It is wholly unacceptable that Oklahoma's honorable veterans have been left without a functional commission."

Drummond said the statute indicates an audit is only required every three years,

upon or in anticipation of the expiration of a commissioner's term. If a member is removed in a year prior to the statutory expiration of his or her term—as has been the case here—then the nominee must be selected from lists provided by the affected veterans' organizations.

Drummond added that state law precludes current commission members from being immediately removed because their successors were not properly appointed—nor have they

been confirmed.

"As a combat veteran, I am deeply troubled that the proposed commission appointments have been made contrary to law," he said. "However, I am encouraged that our state Legislature appears poised to resolve this matter. As such, I believe it is prudent to resist litigation by this office, let the legislative process run its course and ultimately ensure the integrity of the Veterans Commission."

GOP study committee chairman warns against “mandatory cuts” to trust funds

Oklahoma Rep. Kevin Hern on Wednesday called for a bipartisan commission on Social Security and Medicare following sparring over the two trust fund programs between the president and GOP lawmakers at Tuesday's State of the Union address.

President Joe Biden met with resounding disapproval from Republicans when he said some GOP lawmakers wanted to sunset Social Security and Medicare. Biden then went off script, proposing an informal agreement to protect the trust funds.

"So folks, as we all apparently agree, Social Security and Medicare is off the books now, right?" Biden said, which prompted a standing ovation on both sides. "We got unanimity."

Hern, chairman of the House Republican Study Committee, said trust fund insolvency threatens cuts to Social Security and Medicare.

"Anybody and everybody that's not in politics that understand the trust funds—the Medicare trust fund and the Social Security trust fund—will tell you that Medicare will have mandatory cuts across the board in four years, and Social Security will in eight," Hern said.

The Congressional Research Service found that Social Security trust funds will have been depleted by 2035. It also reported that the Old-Age

and Survivors Insurance and the Disability Insurance trust funds will have been depleted by 2034.

Biden was referencing a proposal from Sen. Rick Scott (R-Florida) that would require all federal legislation—including Social Security and Medicare—expire every five years.

"If a law is worth keeping, Congress can pass it again," Scott reiterated after Tuesday's State of the Union address.

Hern (R-Tulsa) said he remains opposed to cutting Social Security and Medicare benefits for seniors, but said something needs to be done to prevent trust fund insolvency.

"We need to sit down—in a bipartisan way—have a commission on Social Security," Hern said. "That's the easier one to look at and structurally fix for the future, so it's guaranteed we will have that for our seniors."

The last time Congress had a commission on Social Security was under George W. Bush in 2001.

Oklahoma Rep. Tom Cole (R-Moore) said a spokesperson for the White House dismissed on Tuesday the idea of a Social Security commission.

"The only reason the White House would dismiss a commission to reform and find solutions to save Social Security is that it must be afraid the commission would recommend something the president does not like," Cole said.

Cole's first action in the current session of Congress

was to introduce legislation that would establish a Social Security commission.

At Cole's first town hall of the new Congress, an Oklahoman from Ninnekah asked if Congress was going to stop Social Security insolvency.

"We're not in any immediate danger, but the sooner you take care of it the better off you are," Cole said in answer to the question.

Cole also said Medicare is in a more immediate jeopardy.

"We would still continue to provide the services, but you would have a huge cut in what we pay [medical] providers," Cole said. "A lot of them would simply quit taking care of Medicare patients—we can't have that."

Cole reiterated that he doesn't favor cutting benefits for Social Security or Medicare, citing that they are popular programs that Americans put their money into.

Hern and Cole both want to deal with the issue in a bipartisan manner, but believe the president is not on the same page.

"To not even entertain a conversation about the issues facing the programs shows he is not really serious about leading or preserving Social Security," Cole said.

Despite being down and struggling offensively, the Bulldogs regained the lead in the fourth quarter and pulled out the three point win.

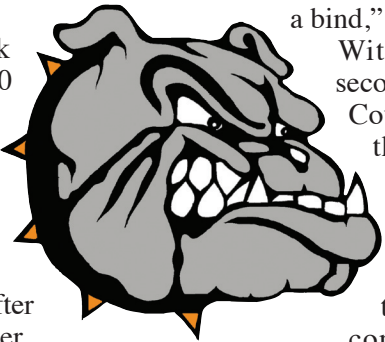
“We kept chipping away. The guys didn’t give up and they played like they wanted it more,” head coach Jackson Embry said.

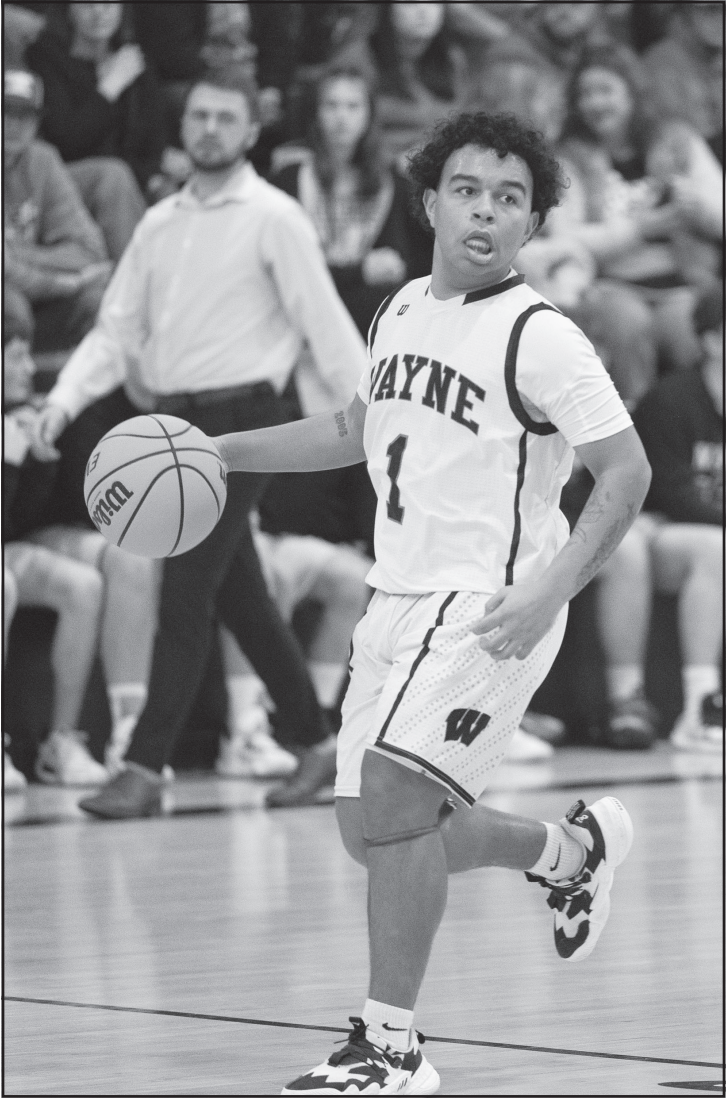

“Rylee shows up for us. She’s good at knowing where everyone is supposed to be. And Abby has had good games shooting the basketball,” Couch said.

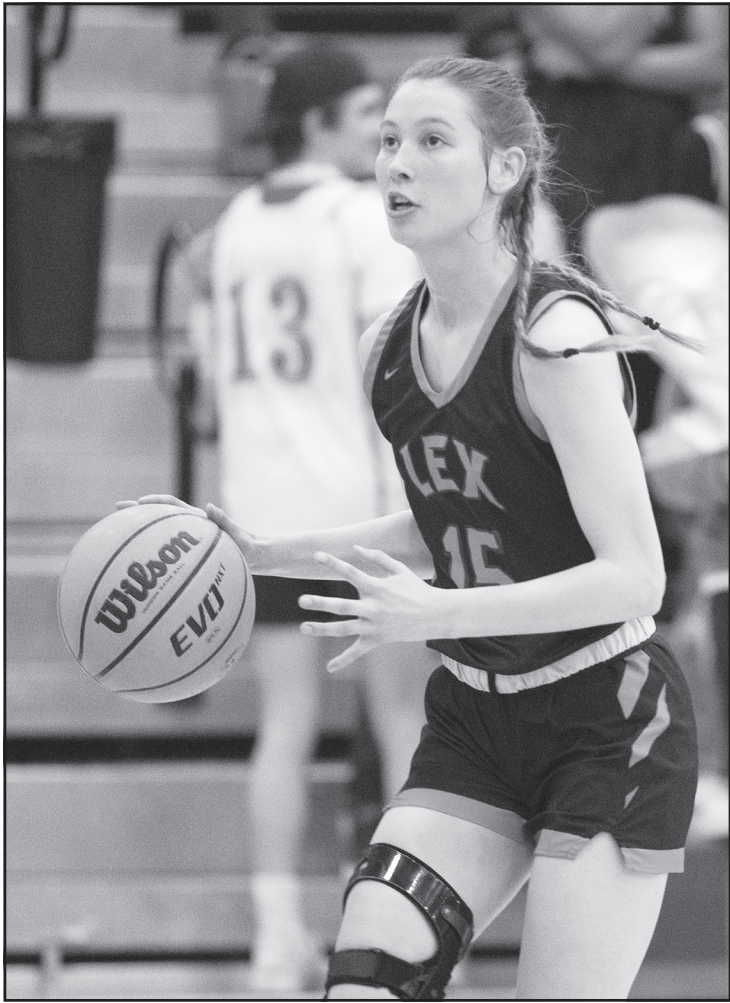

February 19, 2023 is the seventh Sunday of ordinary time. As a reminder, ordinary time is any time in the year that is not a special season such as Advent, Christmas, Lent, and Easter. Think of it like life; some days are special and some are ordinary.

February 22, 2023 marks the beginning of Lent. There will be three services on Ash Wednesday, February 22. The noon service will be in English. Then there will be a service at 5 p.m. in English and a service at 7 p.m. in Spanish.

Beginning on February 24, there will be a Friday Lenten Mass at 6 p.m. followed by Stations of the Cross at 6:30 p.m. in the Sanctuary. After the service, a Soup Supper will be served in the Parish Hall at 7 p.m. The Friday Lenten Mass, Stations of the Cross, and the Soup Supper will also occur on March 3, March 10, March 17 and March 24.

You may recall that the readings complement each other. Leviticus 19:1-2, 17-18, says, “You will not exact vengeance on or bear any sort of grudge against others but will love your neighbor as yourself.” This is yet another occasion when the Bible tells us to do the opposite of normal behavior.

In part of the responsorial Psalm, Psalms 103:8, 10, says,

“Yahweh is tenderness and pity, slow to anger and rich in faithful love; he does not treat us as our sins deserve, nor repay us as befits our offenses.” Again, instead of judging us for our sinful behavior, God is tender to us.

The second reading, 1 Corinthians 3:16-23, says the person who thinks he is wise by worldly standards is actually foolish in the wisdom of God. Again, another opposite of what we might think. Finally, in the Gospel reading Matthew 5:38-48, Jesus says the philosophy of “an eye for an eye” is incorrect. We should offer no resistance to the wicked but instead turn the other cheek.

What reward is there in loving those who love us? He says we should love our enemy as God loves us all. This is evidenced by God sending sun and rain to the bad as well as to the good.

All this backward instruction reminded me of a tape I was listening to on a hike. A man and five children were on the subway. The man was zoned out. The children were loud, wiggling, and generally annoying. The other passengers talked among themselves about how the man was oblivious to the poor behavior of his children.

Finally after suffering

through this commotion for what seemed like an hour, one of the other passengers approached the father. He touched the father’s arm, startling him “Are you ill or something? Your kids are kind of acting up.” The man replied, “Oh, I have just come from the hospital where my wife just died. She was the center of our home and I was just thinking about how I was going to tell the children. I don’t know how we will survive. I am lost.” (I had to stop walking until my tears cleared up.)

In the same way that God sees our hearts as well as our actions, we need to go the extra mile to be understanding and kind to others. Like God, we need to be ‘slow to anger and rich in faithful love.’

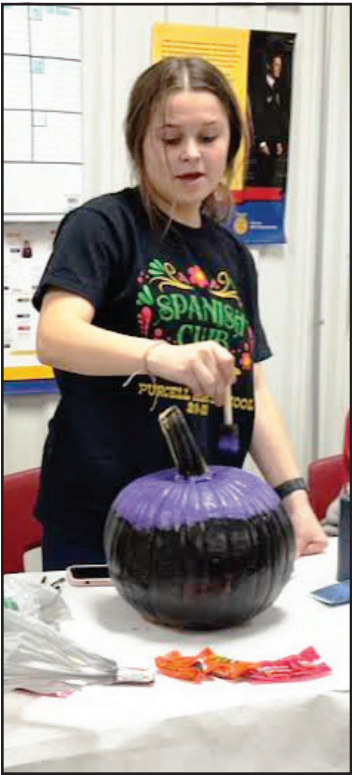

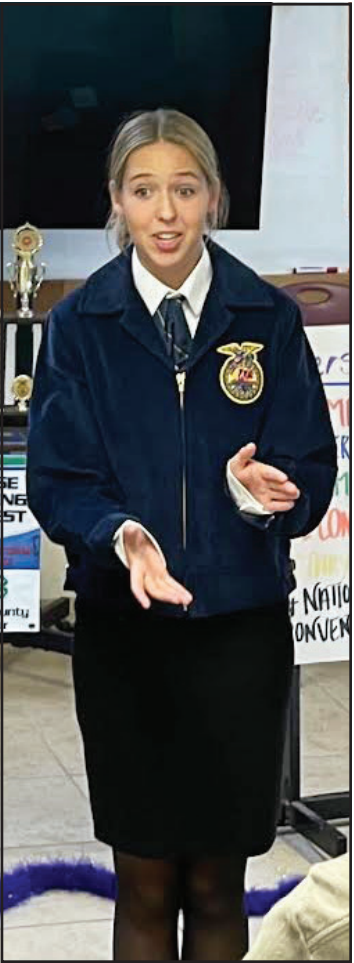
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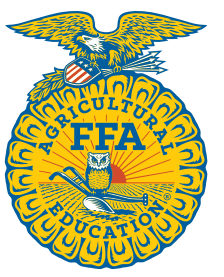

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Charles Christopher Palmer appointed Chickasaw Lighthorse chief of police

ADA, Okla. - Chickasaw Nation Governor Bill Anoatubby appointed Charles Christopher Palmer Chickasaw Lighthorse Police Department chief of police to fill the leadership vacancy created when former chief Michael K. Manning recently retired.

"Chief Palmer has the education, training, and experience needed to continue the record of effective leadership of the Chickasaw Lighthorse Police," Governor Anoatubby said. "During his career he has served in a variety of roles, allowing him to gain keen insight into the history, operations, and goals of the department. He is well prepared to lead the department as it works to protect public safety,

enhance individual security and effectively administer justice."

Palmer's 17-year career in law enforcement began in October 2005, a year after the department itself was reestablished in the modern era.

"I told Governor Anoatubby I was a 22-year-old kid when I started with this department, so the Chickasaw Nation is the only thing I've ever known," Palmer said. "As this department has grown, I've grown. I've matured with this department and with the Chickasaw Nation."

In 2005, Palmer was a college student working in a convenience store to pay school expenses when the direction of his life took a leap forward toward the

goal he always had in mind. Jason O'Neil, then Lighthorse police chief, walked in and suggested he apply for an open position on the force.

"I knew I always wanted to get into law enforcement but didn't really know where I was going to start," Palmer said. "No one had really heard of the Chickasaw Lighthorse Police Department and I didn't know what it was, but just by God's timing I was able to get on with the department."

Palmer is a graduate of the Federal Law Enforcement Training Center, Indian Police Academy, and maintains an Advanced Law Enforcement Certification from the Oklahoma Council on Law Enforcement

Education and Training. He earned a Bachelor of Arts degree with a major in criminal justice as well as a master's in human resources from East Central University.

He is expecting to complete his doctorate in education with a concentration in organizational leadership and conflict resolution in 2025.

Palmer's 17 years have provided a wide array of law enforcement experiences. After a couple of years as a patrolman, he became a K-9 handler before taking advantage of an opportunity to transition to a child support investigator.

"One of the functions of that job was investigating locations of individuals," he said. "It really honed my investigative skills in tracking individuals down, which helped when I transferred to our criminal investigations division in 2013."

A few years later yet another new opportunity opened with the creation of Lighthorse's Professional Standards Division. There, he was charged with the responsibility of ensuring all policies and procedures were followed and training requirements were met, in addition to overseeing internal affairs investigations.

"I spent about a year-and-a-half in that role and was then promoted to captain over our investigation division where I supervised the caseload over our criminal investigators and their case management. I also continued advising our training department and our evidence department as well," he said.

In 2020, a n

administrative services division was created to better align the organization and ensure personnel in the field are fully equipped to carry out their duties.

"The public doesn't really know what goes on behind the scenes to make a department function," he said. "(The job entailed) ensuring our officers had proper equipment and vehicles they could drive and that our communications center was up and operating efficiently. When I was transferred into that role, I assumed responsibility for, and took over, all behind-the-scenes functions, which included our evidence, property, fleet, records, training and communications division."

Palmer said while he has goals for the department, previous leadership has already set the stage for continued success.

"The department is headed in a great direction. It's one of those things where, stepping in to lead this department, I don't have to come in and make a bunch of changes because the organization is really in great shape.

"We have great leadership and have always had great leadership. That's one of the fortunate things about working for the Chickasaw Nation. They put great leaders in place, and I've had great leaders as mentors over the years. Just to name a few, Jason O'Neil, Mike McCoy, (current Lighthorse Police Commissioner) Randy Wesley, (and) Mike Manning, our previous chief, all have provided great mentorship for me over the years."

Training, education,

building community relationships and taking advantage of the latest technological advances are high priorities.

"We really highlight our staff and encourage them to seek additional training and leadership. We encourage all our officers to get as much education and training as they can. The more we can place highly trained and educated officers in our communities, the stronger our communities become.

"Some of our goals are just to continue on the path we've been for the past 18 years and advancing our law enforcement capabilities through building our community partnerships and increasing our technology to operate at the highest capacity possible.

"We want the most advanced technology that's available, because it makes better officers, which in turn makes a safer community for us to live in as we strive to serve all citizens of the Chickasaw Nation."

Palmer said that includes non-First American residents too. "If they're a resident of the communities we serve, we're going to provide a law enforcement service to them," he said.

"I was very surprised and very shocked but very honored to step into this role when Governor Anoatubby appointed me. I'm excited to move into this position and excited for the future of this department. I've gotten some great feedback from our staff here. There's a lot of excitement going on in the department and what the future is going to hold for us."

Career development opportunities available for young Chickasaws

Alexis Walker appreciates the benefits of Toksali SMART because she is a graduate of the program.

"The Toksali SMART Program is beneficial for our youth," said Walker, Toksali SMART curriculum design manager. "It provides the opportunity (for participants) to see careers in a different way. It also builds life and wellness skills that they may not be receiving in public schools."

The Toksali SMART (Successful Mindsets with Attitude and Readiness for Tomorrow) Program was developed by the Chickasaw Nation to train teenagers and young adults on what to expect while in the workforce. The program — formerly known as the Summer Youth Program — gives Chickasaw youth the opportunity to gain valuable work experience and leadership skills.

Toksali, the Chickasaw word meaning "to work," is a summer program that offers workforce training, mentoring and entrepreneurial experience to Chickasaws ages 14-21.

The program strives to help Chickasaw youth develop productive work patterns and behaviors in real-world environments. Throughout its inception, the Toksali program has collaborated with many businesses and organizations within the Chickasaw Nation.

These collaborations give Chickasaw youth the ability to explore career opportunities and develop employment skills that align with their future goals and interests, while also strengthening the community workforce.

Experiences within the program may include virtual pre-employment training, job shadowing, mentoring, leadership opportunities, on-the-job training and more. In addition to the hands-on

opportunities, participants also learn many skills in a virtual training environment.

"I really like the online course because it taught me about banking systems and how financing and budgeting works," Toksali SMART participant Caylee Parry said. "They also covered things like how much you should exercise each day. I feel like the courses are informative."

Topics of study within the Toksali program include

learning the Chickasaw Nation's core values, being introduced to the Chickasaw language and other cultural experiences, attending wellness and nutrition seminars and learning about customer service and leadership skills.

"The Chickasaw Nation benefits from the Toksali SMART Program because it builds future leaders and employees," Walker said. "We see many of these students

come back to work for the tribe. I am a product of the Toksali SMART Program myself."

Program participants are divided into three categories based on age. Level I (Chaffa) is designed for students ages 14 and 15. They experience 100% virtual pre-employment training. They have the most flexible schedule of the groups. Level II (Toklo) is for students ages 16 and 17. Level III (Tochchi'na) is designed for 18 through 21-year-olds to explore their career interests. They participate at on-the-job training sites and follow the dress code appropriate for their position. They also complete a virtual training curriculum that is incorporated into their work schedule.

"The advantages of the virtual program is that we are able to offer our younger students a better way to go about learning pre-employment skills," Walker said. "This is better than putting them on a job site with no skills."
