EF2 TORNADO hits David J. Perry Airport

Hangars damaged or destroyed with 15 planes damaged

The National Weather Service confirmed to **The Purcell Register** it was an EF2 tornado that damaged

the David J. Perry Airport at Goldsby Sunday night and then moved into the eastern sides of Norman doing extensive damage.

The NWS spokesman

said the tornado passed right by their building after it formed just southwest of the Goldsby Airport about 9:15 p.m.

Goldsby Mayor Glenn

Berglan reported the twister knocked over two 18-wheel trucks and overturned a couple of recreational vehicles at Floyd's RV, 912 N. Adkins Hill Road.

The NWS also said one power line in Goldsby was taken out by the storm.

Coalition getting three-prong support

Pair found guilty of murder

Sentenced to life without parole

The first degree murder trial of Debbie Azelea Senft and Zachary Tyler Mussett, a mother and son, ended with a guilty verdict last week in McClain County District Court.

The six man, six woman jury sentenced the Texarkana, Texas, pair to life without parole for the murder of Michael McGuffee north of Blanchard in October of 2021.

The pair got 35 years for a first degree arson charge against them.

After the crime the pair fled to Wyoming where they were arrested prior to being extradited back to McClain

County.

The first degree murder trial against Joshua Allen Finkbeiner before District Judge Leah Edwards is ongoing.

Finkbeiner is accused along with Daniel Vasquez and Stacy Harjo of strangling Shaliyah Toombs in April of 2018.

Toombs was pregnant at the time so Finkbeiner is also accused of killing an unborn child.

Prosecutors are seeking the death penalty in the case which is expected to take between five and seven weeks.

After storms calmer weather

We saw strong and even severe thunderstorms push through the area earlier this week, before giving way to calmer skies and above-average temperatures. Temperatures will remain seasonable for this time of year heading into the day on Thursday, with a 70 percent chance of showers and

What to know about SQ 820 and legalizing recreational marijuana in Oklahoma

Legalize it! Reefer Madness! Outside of the typical cliches on marijuana use, Oklahoma voters will decide next week if the state will join 22 others in the march to legalize the adult use of cannabis under State Question 820.

Supporters want voters to approve an initiative that combines legal adult-use cannabis with criminal justice reforms to address past low-level convictions on marijuana-related offenses.

Opponents said full legalization sends the wrong message to children and the state hasn’t done enough to deal with unintended consequences from the passage of medical marijuana in 2018.

The election will be March 7, with early voting on Thursday and Friday. It’s the first time a state question has been before voters outside of a regular primary or general election since State Question 723 in September 2005.

With no other statewide race on the ballot, it’s unknown how many voters will show up to the polls to vote on SQ 820.

Oklahoma voters approved medical marijuana under State Question 788. That was in the June 2018 election that also featured contested primaries for governor in the Republican, Democratic and Libertarian parties.

SQ 788 attracted the most votes in that primary, with almost 893,000 voters weighing in on medical marijuana. Data from the state Election Board show that almost 20,000 voters just voted on SQ 788 and no other gubernatorial race.

Medical marijuana passed with 57 percent of the vote in 2018 and attracted voters from across the political spectrum. The initiative was less popular in many rural western and southern counties, and it faced opposition from law enforce-

ment and some medical groups.

This year, backers of SQ 820 are hoping voters will approve a legal consumer market with tradeoffs: Higher taxes than those in the medical market but no patient registration requirements with the government. That would appeal to Oklahomans with a small-government mindset and attract visitors from states without access to legal cannabis. An economic impact report put out by supporters shows an estimated \$87 million in additional annual tax revenue through 2028 if SQ 820 passes.

Michelle Tilley, campaign director with Yes on 820, said passage will spur more economic activity and free up law enforcement to chase higher-level drug crimes.

“We have given the state Legislature the power to make it

those aspects of criminal justice reform, even as they’ve campaigned against other efforts in the past.

“Why do you want to link that with a substance that creates so much havoc, especially with children,” Tulsa County District Attorney Steve Kunzweiler said at a League of Women Voters forum in Tulsa in February.

The following was compiled by Oklahoma Watch from interviews, research and public statements by supporters and opponents.

Would the passage of SQ 820 affect the existing medical marijuana program approved by voters in June 2018?

No. Only the Legislature can make changes to the medical program. Dozens of bills affecting that program are up for consideration in this year’s session.

How have recent statewide elections for adult-use cannabis fared?

Recent elections in other states have been mixed. In November, voters passed adult-use cannabis in Maryland and Missouri; voters in North Dakota and South Dakota rejected it.

Who would regulate the adult-use market for cannabis if SQ 820 passes?

The Oklahoma Medical Marijuana Authority became a standalone agency November 1 and would be responsible for regulating businesses operating in the recreational market. There have been discussions among industry groups about asking the Legislature to change the agency’s name if SQ 820 were to pass.

The state question initially limits recreational business licenses to current medical marijuana business license holders in operation for at least a year before the effective date of SQ 820. That prohibition on new businesses would last for two years. Commercial license and renewal fees for the adult-use market could not exceed

Voter application deadline nearing For the Board of Education Election

Friday, March 10, is the last day to apply for voter registration in order to be eligible to vote in the April 4 Board of Education General/Statutory Municipal General Elections McClain County Election Board Secretary Karen Haley said.

Haley said persons who are United States Citizens, residents of Oklahoma and at least 17 ½ years old are eligible to apply for voter registration. However, you must be at least 18 years old to vote.

Applications must be re-

ceived by the county election board or postmarked no later than midnight March 10. Applications postmarked after that time will be accepted, but will not be processed until after the April 4 Board of Education General/Statutory Municipal General Election.

Applicants will be notified in writing when their application has been processed. Approved voters will receive a Voter Identification Card in

the mail. Some may receive a letter that explains the reason or reasons the application was not approved. Haley said those who do not receive a response within 30 days of submitting their application should contact the election board office immediately.

The McClain County Election Board reminds voters that

How long would OMMA have to put rules and regulations from SQ 820 into effect?

It would have until September 3, which is 90 days after the effective date of the law on June 5.

What are the personal-use protections under SQ 820?

Individuals 21 and older can have one ounce (28 grams) or less of marijuana, 8 grams or less of marijuana concentrate and/or 8 grams of marijuana in infused or edible products. They can also grow up to six mature marijuana plants and six marijuana seedlings at home, but only if they are out of public sight.

What does one ounce of marijuana look like?

You can’t really tell without using a scale, because it depends on the density of the flower. Generally, you can fill a plastic sandwich bag to the top and it comes close to an ounce of marijuana.

Marijuana concentrate can take several forms, including liquid, chunks or goo.

What would SQ 820 do to address past marijuana-related crimes?

The ballot initiative sets up a process for older marijuana convictions to be reversed, resentenced or dismissed. Courts must approve such expungements unless there’s a risk to public safety.

Backers of SQ 820 said marijuana enforcement efforts for decades have disproportionately affected Black and Latino communities, as well as rural white communities.

Between 50,000 and 100,000 Oklahomans have past marijuana convictions that affect their ability to rent or buy housing, apply for jobs or get student loans. They said the unemployment rate for Oklahomans who have past convictions is five times the state average.

What are the penalties for violating the personal-use provisions under SQ 820?

A civil fine of \$250 or lower would be levied for having plants in view of the public. Smoking or vaping marijuana in a public place where it’s prohibited would carry a civil fine of \$25 or lower.

Law enforcement could not detain or arrest people for smoking or vaping in a public place. Landlords could not bar tenants from using or possessing marijuana, although they can prohibit smoking marijuana.

Adults 21 and older who possess, produce or transport no more than twice the limits of personal use products could face civil fines of \$200 or less and forfeiture of the product. Eight hours of drug education or counseling could take the place of the fine.

What are the punishments for underage age use or possession of cannabis under SQ 820?

A civil fine of \$100 or lower and confiscation of the mari-



juana. The fine could be waived if the person completes four hours of drug education or counseling.

What ID requirements are there for adult-use purchases of cannabis?

Customers would only need to show identification to verify that they are 21 or older. Retailers could not keep personally-identifiable information about any adult-use purchase for more than 60 days without the consumer’s permission.

How would adult-use cannabis sales be taxed?

Essentially, excise taxes would be double those on medical marijuana products. A state excise tax of 15 percent would be in addition to state and local sales taxes, which in most places would total around 10 percent depending on the local government sales tax rate. (Medical marijuana has a seven percent excise tax in addition to state and local sales taxes.)

Where would the tax revenue from adult-use sales go?

Sales tax revenue would go to the state and local governments. Money from the excise tax would first go to OMMA for administrative and regulatory costs.

Any excess would be split among public school grants for programs for at-risk students and after-school enrichment activities (30 percent); the state’s general revenue fund (30 percent); drug-treatment grants (20 percent); local governments (10 percent);

and state courts (10 percent).

How much money has been raised to support or oppose SQ 820?

There are no limits on campaign contributions or spending for state questions.

Yes on 820-Oklahomans for Sensible Marijuana Laws had \$3.23 million in contributions in its year-end report through December 31. Organizers said most of that was spent on getting the initiative through the petition process and to a statewide ballot.

The group said it has spent \$790,000 in 2023 on TV commercials, digital ads, canvassing materials and mailers, according to campaign reports filed Monday.

Protect Our Kids No 820 filed its organizational papers on January 31. Its most recent report indicates contributions of about \$200,000, according to campaign officials.

Which groups are supporting SQ 820?

Philanthropic groups that have funded criminal justice reform efforts have donated or endorsed the SQ 820 campaign, including the Charles and Lynn Schusterman Family Foundation, ACLU Oklahoma and Oklahomans for Criminal Justice Reform.

Others include Norml, the national group that backs reforming marijuana laws, United Food and Commercial Workers Local 1000 and Stu-

dents for Sensible Drug Policy. Several business groups active in the medical marijuana industry, including the Oklahoma Cannabis Industry Association and local dispensary chains, have endorsed the effort, too.

Which groups are opposed to SQ 820?

Several groups affiliated with law enforcement, business groups and churches have come out against SQ 820, including the Oklahoma Sheriffs Association, Oklahoma District Attorneys Association, Oklahoma Association of Chiefs of Police, State Chamber of Oklahoma, Oklahoma Farm Bureau, Greater Oklahoma City Chamber of Commerce, Oklahoma Cattlemen’s Association and Oklahoma Faith Leaders.

National medical groups, including the American Medical Association, the American Society of Addiction Medicine and the American Academy of Pediatrics, have issued public policy statements in opposition to commercial, adult-use cannabis markets at the state level.

Update from the Capitol

Last session, the Legislature passed a bill restricting how municipalities could penalize underage tobacco usage after studies found education was a stronger deterrent than strict penalties.

As can happen in the legislative process, we tried it, and it didn't work. Communities abided by this policy change the last several months, and it became apparent that education simply isn't enough to stop underage use.

I've had numerous judges, district attorneys, communities and county officials urge me to give municipalities back their power to address underage tobacco use as they see fit, so I filed SB 215.

This would reauthorize them to enact ordinances prohibiting and penalizing conduct relat-

ing to the purchase, receipt, or possession of tobacco or vapor products by those under 21. The bill was unanimously approved in the General Government Committee Thursday and will now go before the full Senate.

We have a major problem in our state when it comes to underage tobacco use and educating parents and youth about the dangers of tobacco is critical. I want to encourage everyone to visit www.StopsWithMe.com, which is TSET's statewide campaign to educate people to help prevent use statewide and improve the health of all Oklahomans.

There's a misconception that tobacco only affects those who use it, but secondhand smoke kills nearly 50,000 nonsmokers annually. It's also impacting taxpayers who don't

use tobacco – Oklahoma's annual healthcare costs related to smoking is \$1.62 billion.

The portion covered by our state Medicaid program, which we all pay for through taxes, is \$264 million. Oklahomans' tax burden from smoking-caused government expenditures is estimated at \$1,165 per household. I don't know about you, but my family could definitely use that money for something else.

Smoking causes our business-community \$2.1 billion in productivity losses from users increased medical issues, taking smoke breaks, etc., but the worst issue is the lives lost. In Oklahoma, 7,500 adults die every year from smoking.

The cost of canceling student debt

President Joe Biden and Democrats' inflationary spending spree and high-tax proposals have certainly left Americans in financially challenging times. Meanwhile, they continue to push the mass cancellation of student debt, which would undoubtedly make our nation's inflationary crisis worse.

Unfortunately, the president's continual pause on federal student loan payments during the pandemic, turned now to an outright bailout, disproportionately benefits a few at the expense of many.

This week, the U.S. Supreme Court will hear oral arguments on President Biden's student debt forgiveness plan to forgive up to \$10,000 in federally borrowed student loans per person, or up to \$20,000 if a person also received Pell Grants. The Supreme Court's decision will determine the legality of this executive action and whether it exceeds President Biden's authority.

The so-called cancellation of student loans is an egregious bailout for a relatively well-to-do group. While the White House argues this will benefit only those earning less than \$75,000 per year, student debt cancellation is an unquestionably regressive policy proposal.

When compared to Americans who have no student loans, student loan borrowers are more financially well-off, whether measured by income or by wealth. Nearly one-third of student loan debt is held by the wealthiest quartile of Americans.

Moreover, a recent study from the Committee for a Responsible Federal Budget found that 57 percent to 65 percent of the student loan debt cancellation will benefit those in the top half of the income spectrum. The nonpartisan organization also argued that this policy will lead to more inflation and drive up higher education costs.

Additionally, the cancellation of these loans is fundamentally

unfair. It will occur at the expense of Americans who have worked hard, repaid their debts or chosen not to go to college at all. In a country that has always rewarded hard work and personal responsibility, this move is, quite simply, unprecedented.

It is also unfair to those Americans whose student loan debt would not be forgiven because it is privately held versus held by the federal government. Moreover, it is unfair to the 87 percent of Americans who do not hold federal student loan debt and will foot the bill, which the nonpartisan Congressional Budget Office (CBO) has calculated will cost taxpayers a massive \$400 billion.

As Democrat lawmakers continue to push for mass student debt forgiveness, I'm proud to reintroduce the Can't Cancel Your Own Debt Act to disqualify members of Congress from participating in federal programs enacted during

Education problems

What Earthquake Insurance Covers

Earthquake insurance cov-

ers the cost of rebuilding your home or replacing your belongings if they're damaged during an earthquake.

If your home is so damaged that you can't live there, your policy might also pay for temporary living expenses while your home is being repaired.

What Earthquake Insurance Does Not Cover

It doesn't cover damage caused by a disaster that's caused by an earthquake. This type of loss is called indirect damage. For example, earthquake insurance will not pay to repair the damage if you live near a lake that floods your home after an earthquake. However, you'll get some financial help if you have flood insurance.

their tenure to cancel student loans – whether established by executive order, agency action or an Act of Congress.

It would also bar members of Congress from any service- or employment-based student loan cancellation for time served as a Member of Congress. This legislation would ensure lawmakers cannot use their position of power to benefit themselves while earning six figures annually paid for on the American taxpayers' dime.

While I understand the high costs of attending a university can be daunting, seeking scholarships, grants and work-study programs can make this more affordable.

During my time leading the House Appropriations Committee's panel for education spending, I was proud to invest in such programs and offerings. However, the government cannot be responsible for all the debts of Americans, and if student loans are forgiven, I wonder what would be next such as home mortgages, car loans and much more.

This administration's proposal is not only costly, but unfair to the millions of Americans who do not have student loans or who have already repaid their debts.

This move will ultimately drive our country deeper into a recession in the days and months ahead and could permanently damage the American psyche for generations to come.

House passes monumental education bills

The House approved historic education funding this week to invest an additional \$500 million into our K-12 schools, give our hardworking teachers a \$2500 pay raise, and provide a tax credit for students who attend private schools or are homeschooled.

House Bill 2775 includes a \$500 million increase in funding for public schools throughout the state that will fund \$2,500 minimum pay raises for every classroom teacher; \$50 million to be distributed to schools receiving below-average funding from annual local tax revenue; and \$300 million to be distributed to public school districts on a per-pupil basis.

House Bill 1935 creates the Oklahoma Parental Choice Tax Credit Act, which would allow a \$5,000 annual tax credit for parents of eligible students who attend private schools and a \$2,500 credit for parents of students who are homeschooled.

The bills were presented on the floor by Rep. Rhonda Baker, the chair of the House Education Committee, and she did a masterful job of answering everybody's questions during the hours-long session.

This education plan is a win-win for Oklahoma kids, parents, teachers and schools because they address all of the issues that have been at the forefront of the education discussion in the last six years.

The bills are extremely thoughtful in how they approach these monumental reforms, and there are many guardrails in place to prevent fraud and abuse.

Through these sister bills, every school will receive more money next year than last year and every teacher will receive a \$2,500 pay raise, but the bills must both pass the Senate before being signed by the governor. My understanding is that there is

some hesitation in the Senate to advance these bills because of the hefty price tag, but I believe that every dollar invested in education helps move our whole state forward.

If both bills are signed into law, then public school districts in House District 42 will receive an additional \$12.7 million every year! This money can make a huge difference for our students and teachers.

We always need to be doing more for education, but we should do what we can now to move the needle. With these bills now moving to the Senate, education funding has increased by 52 percent since 2018.

Of course, we're only a few weeks into the legislative session, so there are many other education bills that we will consider in the coming weeks, and I'll keep you updated on those this spring.

This week, the House also celebrated FFA Day! It was so heartening to see the halls of the Capitol filled with the blue and gold jackets.

I got to visit with FFA students from Wayne, Purcell, Washington and Dibble throughout the day and hear about their valuable experience in FFA. FFA has had a huge impact on many of my loved ones.

Committees have until Thursday, March 2 to pass bills onto the House floor, so next week will be jam-packed.

Garvin:

If we don't get it under control, an estimated 88,000 Oklahoma kids, who are now under 18, will ultimately die prematurely from smoking. Nearly 9 out of 10 smokers first tried cigarettes by 18 and 99 percent tried by 26.

Around 1,300 Oklahoma minors become new daily smokers each year, and 25 percent of high schoolers report vaping in the last 30 days. These statistics are why I'll continue to fight for

tobacco reforms.

We have a generation who was taught cigarettes were bad, and they understand that, but then e-cigarettes and vapes were invented, offering teens cool-looking, flavored options that are falsely advertised as "safe alternatives."

This is our new fight as vapes are small and easy to hide; many are made to look like flash drives, which all students need and use, so parents and school staff struggle

Mulready sets the record straight on prescriptions

The Oklahoma Insurance Department (OID) has become aware of inaccurate and misleading communications affecting Oklahoma consumers. Several large employers have sent letters to their employees with erroneous information regarding changes to their CVS/Caremark prescription program.

One of the most troubling inaccuracies is the claim that the law in Oklahoma no longer allows for 90-day prescriptions. The law (HB2632, creating the Patient’s Right to Pharmacy Choice Act) in Oklahoma does allow for the filling of 90-day supply prescriptions.

However, it is against the law to incentivize patients to fill prescriptions through mail order rather than their pharmacy of choice.

Furthermore, some letters claimed that the Oklahoma Insurance Commissioner would begin enforcing HB2632 on Feb. 23, 2023. The Oklahoma Insurance Department has been enforcing this law since September 2020.

Oklahoma Insurance Commissioner Glen Mulready

stated, “It is concerning that these misrepresentations are being spread to employees in Oklahoma. The facts are that as part of a legal settlement with CVS/Caremark, letters were supposed to be sent out to consumers explaining their options for prescriptions and instead of clarifying, the letters that were sent have only spread more misinformation to the citizens of this great state.”

The Oklahoma Insurance Department has issued \$3.5 million in fines to pharmacy benefit managers and overseen \$700,000 in reimbursements to local pharmacies since enforcement of this law began on Sept. 1, 2020.

OID is committed to ensuring the people of Oklahoma have access to accurate information regarding their healthcare needs.

We urge Oklahoma employers to verify the accuracy of their communications before sending them to their employees.

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

Special election Tuesday

Polls open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Tuesday, March 7, for the Special Election.

McClain County Election Board Secretary Karen Haley offered these important tips to voters—especially those who will be casting a ballot for the first time.

- Mark your ballot using the example posted at your polling place and inside your ballot booth. If you make a mistake, do not try to correct it. Instead, take your ballot to the precinct officials. They will destroy the ballot and issue a new one.

- You do not need to make a selection for each issue on the ballot in order for your ballot to be counted. The voting device will cast votes only for those issues which you have marked.

- Ballots can be read by the voting device regardless of how you insert the ballot into the system. If the system detects too many markings for a single office or question, an error code will appear. The voter can choose to submit the ballot as it is or request a new ballot.

- If you need assistance or would like to use the audio-assisted ballot system, let a precinct official know. You do not have to show proof of a disability to use the audio-assisted ballot system.

- Be sure to bring an approved form of identification. Federal and state issued photo IDs, passports and tribal-issued, photo IDs are accepted. You may also use the voter identification card you were mailed when you registered.

If you forget your voter ID or your name is not found in the Precinct Registry, you may still cast a provisional ballot by signing an affidavit.

A provisional ballot is sealed in a special envelope and counted after Election Day, once the voter’s information has been verified by the county election board. Election results cannot be certified until all provisional ballots have been researched, verified, and counted.

Haley said election officials are there to assist voters and ensure all procedures are followed on Election Day. If you

believe a law has been violated, contact precinct or county election officials immediately. Do not wait until you leave the polling location.

Voting activity is generally slowest during the mid-morning and mid-afternoon, but lines and wait times can vary from precinct to precinct. All voters who want to cast a ballot should be in line no later than 7 p.m.

“Anyone who is in line by 7 p.m. on Tuesday and eligible to vote, will be allowed to vote,” Haley said.

A list of polling locations was in the February 23 issue of **The Purcell Register** or can be located on the State Election Board’s OK Voter Portal at oklahoma.gov/elections/ovp.

The McClain County Election Board is located in the McClain County Courthouse at 121 N. 2nd Ave. in Purcell and is open weekdays from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

Election Day laws, reminders

Voters in McClain County are reminded to keep the integrity of the election system in mind, when going to the polls next week.

While ballot “selfies” or taking photographs of a marked ballot are legal, voters may not share or distribute the image through social media or by any other means while inside the election enclosure. Voters must wait until they leave their polling place before posting or sharing the picture with anyone.

Improper use of the photo could result in a violation of the law. Voters may not use the image to coerce, influence, or intimidate another voter.

McClain County Election Board Secretary Karen Haley says voters should be aware that violating the law has consequences.

“While some offenses may seem minor, unlawful activity on Election Day constitutes a serious crime and could result in a misdemeanor or in some cases, a felony conviction. We want all voters to be aware of their actions and be respectful of the rights of others.”

Haley said it is illegal to disclose how you voted with anyone while inside the election enclosure. In addition, you may not remove a ballot from the polling place.

Keep in mind that election-

eering is prohibited within 300 feet of any ballot box while an election is in progress. This includes wearing or bringing visible campaign related paraphernalia into the election enclosure.

Haley notes that no one except election officials and voters waiting to vote are allowed within 50 feet of any ballot box on Election Day. Certain exceptions are made for media and those assisting disabled voters.

Voters are reminded that consuming alcohol of any kind or quantity within one-half mile of a polling place on Election Day is prohibited.

The polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. on March 7.





Tips and tricks for beginning gardeners

Growing vegetables sounds like fun, and who doesn’t like pretty flowers in the landscape – but where does a beginning gardener start to cultivate a green thumb?

David Hillock, Oklahoma State University Extension consumer horticulturist, said there are things novice gardeners need to keep in mind before turning over the first shovelful of soil or filling the first pot.

“Location is a key part of successful gardening. Most plants need at least six hours of continuous sunlight to perform at their best,” Hillock said. “Good soil is also a must. Have a soil test done to see what nutrients may need to be added to the soil.”

Natural light isn’t the only thing to consider when picking a location. Make sure the garden spot is close to an irrigation source because dragging a hose all over the yard quickly becomes tiresome. Also, keep the garden location close to the house.

“The easier the access, the more likely you’ll be to take care of gardening chores, such as watering and pulling weeds,” he said.

Hillock cautions new gardeners to take a reasonable approach.

“It’s a good idea to start small in the beginning,” he said. “It’s perfectly fine to start with just a container or two of herbs or a small bed with a zucchini mound and a tomato plant. It can be easy to get overwhelmed with too big of a space in the beginning. Only grow things your family will eat.”

Casey Hentges, host of OSU Agriculture’s “Oklahoma Gar-

dening” television show, offers tips on five easy vegetables for beginning gardeners to grow or the top five herbs.

Laura Payne, OSU Extension horticulture specialist in Payne County, cautions new gardeners about spending a lot of money on tools and other supplies in their inaugural year of gardening.

“Anytime I start something new, I always feel like I need to have all the tools now,” Payne said. “Don’t invest a lot of money on pots, tools and gadgets right away. Start with just a few basic tools and go from there. Consider starting with a trowel, a small pair of loppers or shears and a pair of gardening gloves. Gardeners may even be able to upcycle some things from around the house. Spend some time and determine if gardening is a hobby you’re going to enjoy. If so, then invest in more equipment.”

It’s important for gardeners to know what USDA Plant Hardiness Zone they live in. Growing zones/planting zones help gardeners determine what flowers, plants or vegetables grow in a specific region. Oklahoma growing zones range from 6a in the northwest part of the state to 8a in the southeast corner.

“When going to the local nursery or garden store, check the plant tags to ensure your choices are designed to grow well in your area,” Hillock said. “The tags also provide vital information on proper planting techniques, along with light and irrigation requirements.”

Gardening is one of the most popular leisure activities, and following these tips will help beginning gardeners get started without being overwhelmed.

STATE QUESTION ANALYSIS

One question will appear on the March 7, 2023, Special Election Ballot. This initiative petition was placed on the ballot by gathering signatures from citizens. The question is reprinted here as it will appear on the ballot followed by a brief summary.

STATE QUESTION 820

Legalizing recreational use of marijuana for persons 21 or older.

INITIATIVE PETITION 434

STATE QUESTION 820

This measure creates a state law legalizing recreational use marijuana for persons 21 or older. Marijuana use and possession remain crimes under federal law. The export of marijuana from Oklahoma is prohibited. The law will have a fiscal impact on the State. The Oklahoma Tax Commission will collect a 15% excise tax on recreational use sales, above applicable sales taxes. Excise tax revenues will fund implementation of the law, with any surplus revenues going to public school programs to address substance abuse and improve student retention (30%), the General Revenue fund (30%), drug addiction treatment programs (20%), courts (10%), and local governments (10%). The law limits certain marijuana-related conduct and establishes quantity limits, safety standards, restrictions, and penalties for violations. A local government may prohibit or restrict recreational marijuana use on the property of the local government and regulate the time, place and manner of the operation of the marijuana businesses within its boundaries. However, a local government may not limit the number of, or completely prohibit, such businesses. Persons who occupy, own, or control private property may prohibit or regulate marijuana-related conduct except that a lease agreement may not prohibit a tenant from lawfully possessing and consuming marijuana by means other than smoking. The law does not affect an employer's ability to restrict employee marijuana use. For the first two years, marijuana business licenses are available only to existing licensees in operation one year or more. The law does not affect the rights of medical marijuana patients or licensees. The law requires resentencing, reversing, modifying and expunging certain prior marijuana-related judgments and sentences unless the State proves an unreasonable risk to a person. The Oklahoma Medical Marijuana Authority is authorized to administer and enforce the law.

SHALL THE PROPOSAL BE APPROVED?

FOR THE PROPOSAL — YES

A "YES" vote is a vote in favor of this measure.

A "NO" vote is a vote against this measure.

SUMMARY: After collecting more than 160,000 signatures, State Question 820 will appear on a Special Election ballot March 7, 2023. Supporters had hoped to have the question on the November 2022 General Election ballot but were stymied by the signature verification process. All voters are being asked to allow adults, 21 years of age and older, to legally purchase and consume cannabis from licensed dispensaries. Marijuana use and possession remains illegal under federal law.

Since the approval of medical marijuana by voters in 2018, Oklahomans with marijuana licenses are currently able to purchase cannabis products from licensed dispensaries. To date, more than 360,000 Oklahomans, or more than 9 percent of the state's population, have licenses to purchase cannabis from the hundreds of dispensaries that have opened in the state.

The state law allows local governments to impose restrictions on the location of dispensaries but it may not limit or prohibit such businesses.

Just like medical marijuana regulation, the Oklahoma Medical Marijuana Authority would be in charge of business regulation. A yes vote on March 7 would allow Oklahoma adults to possess up to one ounce of marijuana, six plants and six seedlings.

The 15 percent tax on marijuana sales is in addition to state and local sales taxes.

It is believed to be one of the first times in U.S. history where a marijuana issue is the only question on the ballot. Twenty one states and the District of Columbia have legalized the purchase and consumption of marijuana for recreational purposes.

The Warriors followed the Chandler win with a 61-45 win over KIPP Tulsa in the Regional finals.


Preslee Johnson gave the Warriors 18 points and led all scorers.

It was pointed out that our invitation to Jesus is very similar: we are invited to sit, listen, and decide whether or not we will follow Him.

On Sunday evening, Steve Adams presented a sermon which focused on a word found in the reading of 2 Timothy 4:1-4. The word "sound" (as in 'sound doctrine') was the subject of the lesson. Splinters and Planks

For this week's "front porch" visit, we come to one of life's true realizations: Sometimes when our life-boat is torn to pieces, we have to cling to "Splinters and Planks." Please read on.

As the years pass, the more I understand how our Lord feels when He turns around one day and sees, as John records, that "many of his disciples went back, and walked no more with him" (John 6:66). That moment must have deflated the Lord, because He immediately turns to His disciples with that classic response of disappointment: "Will you also go away?" (v. 67).

A very similar feeling comes over us today, doesn't it, when we, to use the metaphor, look from the deck of the ship out over life's churning waters: Too many good people, great friends and loved ones, who once sailed on that blessed old ship of Zion are no longer on board. Somewhere along the way, when life's storms blew in, they fell overboard amidst the strong, swirling gales.

We originally wrote these thoughts back in 2008, inspired after we had listened late one night to an eloquent and spirited preacher tell one of the Apostle Paul's stories. Sometimes you can tell early on in listening to someone when he has a special lesson; so, quickly, you grab your notepad and listen intently.

So is it this night. The fiery

preacher relates the grand old story of the apostle Paul's long-awaited voyage to Rome. Paul had long desired to go to Rome to preach the gospel, and the Lord had promised he would go. But the sailing would not be easy. I suppose it never is.

A contrary wind is there to greet the ship, and the sailors finally have to throw everything of value overboard. Nothing is more valuable than their lives. Still, the ship bound for Rome appears to be destined for the bottom of the ocean; so the sailors panic and prepare to jump – just as it is with many wind-tossed souls today, in line with our previous metaphor.

But the apostle Paul hollers out a life-saving command, similar to what he had done some years ago to a flailing jailer a moment away from entering unprepared into eternity (Acts 16:28).

"Stay on the ship!" he says: Don't jump! (Acts 27:31).

Oh, that was about as sound of advice as these men would ever hear!

Today we want to sound out the same alarm, offer the same plea: Let's stay on that old ship of Zion. Get in – and stay in – the grand old church that Jesus purchased graciously with His own precious, life-giving blood (Acts 20:28; 1 Peter 1:18-19). There's not a safer place to be than in that old ship. Don't jump overboard. There's safety on this well-traveled, battered vessel. There's blessing, for-

giveness, and hope.

Things may seem better for the moment in the world's smooth, satisfying waters, but they're not. There's a deadly drop somewhere up ahead. But the God who rescued us from those hypnotizing waters in the beginning and made a way to get us onto Old Zion will make a way to get the ship to shore.

The ship that Paul and over 200 others sail on finally gives way to the boisterous wind and waves, and the ship is torn apart. They are close enough to shore that some could swim in, for God had promised that none would perish who stayed on board. What a promise that is! The rest hold on the best they can, "some on boards, and some on broken pieces of the ship," and they make their way safely to shore (verse 44).

Our late-night, old-fashioned preacher described that scene eloquently, saying, "They made it to shore on splinters and planks."

Ah, isn't that the way it is with us. Sometimes we have to cling to a splinter of faith. That's all we may have, but – with God's help – that's enough. Sometimes all we can do is hold on to what we have. It may not be much, just a splinter here and a splinter there.

But God is always true to His promise. No, He didn't say Paul and those sailors would make



Dale K. Graham Veterans Foundation

One of the main reasons I write this weekly column is to keep veterans and surviving spouses up to date with the changes the VA makes that could affect them. Lately I have been discussing the PACT Act changes and what it can do for the lives of veterans and their families.

The PACT Act is a new law that expands VA health care and benefits for veterans exposed to burn pits, Agent Orange, and other toxic substances. The PACT Act adds to the list of health conditions

that we assume (or “presume”) are caused by exposure to these substances. This law helps us provide generations of Veterans and their survivors with the care and benefits they’ve earned and deserve.

To get a VA disability rating, your disability must connect to your military service. For many health conditions, you need to prove that your service caused your condition. We here at the Dale K. Graham Veterans Foundation are here to help you do that.

If you served in any of these locations and time periods, the VA has determined that you had exposure to burn pits or other toxins. This is called having a presumption of exposure.

On or after September 11, 2001, in any of these locations: Afghanistan, Djibouti, Egypt, Jordan, Lebanon, Syria, Uzbekistan or Yemen or the airspace above any of these locations.

On or after August 2, 1990, in any of these locations: Bahrain, Iraq, Kuwait, Oman, Qatar, Saudi Arabia, Somalia, The United Arab Emirates (UAE) or the airspace above any of these locations.

These cancers are now presumptive: Brain cancer, Gastrointestinal cancer of any type, Glioblastoma, Head cancer of any type, Kidney cancer, Lymphatic cancer of any type, Lymphoma of any type, Melanoma, Neck cancer of any type, Pancreatic cancer, Reproductive cancer of any type or Respiratory (breathing-related) cancer of any type.

These illnesses are now presumptive: Asthma that was diagnosed after service, Chronic bronchitis, Chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD), Chronic rhinitis, Chronic sinusitis, Constrictive bronchiolitis or obliterative bronchiolitis, Emphysema, Granulomatous disease, Interstitial lung disease (ILD), Pleuritis, Pulmonary fibrosis or Sarcoidosis.

Last week 12 veterans received a 100 percent disability rating for their service connected disabilities. We had 46 veterans who received ratings from 10-90 percent. Each of
