

AG issues formal opinion on SBE

Oklahoma law does not give a formal opinion issued on powers by its own authority." the State Board of Education April 4. (SBE) the ability to make

"It is well settled that an administrative rules without agency may only exercise the proper direction from the state powers expressly given by Legislature, Attorney General statute," the opinion states. "An Gentner Drummond ruled in agency cannot expand those

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Drummond commented on the opinion, saying the content of the rules are irrelevant to the issue of whether proper authority exists to issue them.

"Whether I agree or disagree with any particular rule in question is irrelevant if the Board does not have the proper authority to issue those rules," he said. "The Legislature is vested with policymaking authority. I will not allow any state agency, board or commission to usurp the Legislature's rightful role, even if they have the best of intentions."

While the opinion notes that the Legislature may delegate some rulemaking authority to the SBE, relying solely on the Board's general powers and du-



OALP accepting applications for Class XXI

For more than 40 years, the Oklahoma Agricultural Leadership Program has enhanced knowledge and leadership skills for Oklahomans involved in agriculture.

"OALP helps potential leaders develop a better understanding of the various systems of economics and government," said Edmond Bonjour, OALP director since 2010. "Class members increase and use their knowledge and skills to solve problems and to explore opportunities for Oklahoma agriculture."

OALP is comprised of up to 30 professionals from across the state who are engaged in production agriculture, agribusiness or some other agricultural sector. Applicants must be at least 25 years old and are chosen for the program based on their potential to be important agricultural leaders in Oklahoma.

Applications are available on the OALP website and all application materials are due by May 1. Interviews will take place in June, and the first seminar will occur in August. OALPClass XXI graduation is slated for April 2025.

"Every new class brings a sense of excitement to the program. Each participant has a different perspective about agriculture, which enriches the leadership development that we provide," Bonjour said.

The 20-month program consists of 10 three-day seminars and study tours within Oklahoma, one three-day seminar in northern Oklahoma and Kansas, a seven-day seminar in Pennsylvania and Washington, D.C., and a two-week international experience near the end of the program. OALP Class XX just returned from Israel.

Seminars within the state are geared toward wind energy, dryland farming, animal pro-

cessing and feedlots in northwest Oklahoma; cotton, irrigation and vegetable production in the southwest; fish farming, sod farms and both the poultry and forestry industries in the southeast part of the state; and soybeans, mushroom farming and water navigation systems in northeast Oklahoma.

During the Kansas trip, the class will visit a John Deere training facility, a flour mill, Cargill and an oil refinery. The Pennsylvania visit will allow class members to learn more about agriculture in Amish communities, and a stop in Hershey, Pennsylvania, will teach the group about various

agricultural products that go into chocolate production. The OALP class also meets with the Oklahoma congressional delegation while visiting Washington, D.C.

Ron Hays, Oklahoma Agrinet, was a member of the inaugural OALP class and has served as the OALP Advisory Council chair. He has observed how the program has changed and adapted over the years to meet the needs of class mem-

Legislature debates education funding

Earlier in the week, the Sen- education package sent to the ate amended the House's education package we approved in mid-February.

The House version included a \$2,500 across the board pay raise for teachers and a \$300 million funding increase for public schools, with a cap of \$2 million per school district. The Senate's amendments

removed the cap for school districts but instead of distributing money to school districts individually, it deposits the \$300 million into the state funding formula.

This means that 32 public school districts receiving a combined \$8.8 million in the House plan would receive no new funding under the Senate withstand severe weather. plan, including two school districts I represent.

Most of the school districts that would still receive funding in the Senate's version receive significantly less funding. With the Senate's changes, 492 of the 517 school districts would receive less funding than under the House's package.

For example, Blanchard PS would receive \$2.126 million under the House's proposal, but only \$1.44 million under the Senate's plan. That additional \$684,000 would make a huge difference to Blanchard PS students, teachers, administrators and parents!

The House's education plan also deposits \$4.35 million more into our public schools than the Senate's amended version. Discussions are continuing as to what the final

Governor's desk may look like, and I'll provide updates as talks progress. It's been a very exciting few

weeks at the Capitol, and I've had a few high school students serving as pages who got a front row seat to their government This week, Eli Connor, a

The House has begun scheduling committee meetings for the next few weeks and, as chair of the House Public Health Committee, it's my responsibility to organize our agendas and decide which health-related bills are heard

Additionally, I've agreed to author several Senate bills, and I'm working with other committee chairs to get them heard in upcoming meetings. Bills have to pass committee before they can be heard by the full House.

Lowering energy costs

Congressman Tom Cole

On his first day in office, President Joe Biden rescinded the permit for the Keystone XL pipeline, and followed that up by suspending new oil and gas leasing and drilling on federal lands and waters. Americans have unfortunately felt the effects of these actions through record-high energy prices.

In response, however, House Republicans last week advanced H.R. 1, the Lower Energy Costs Act, which if signed into law, would end this sad state of affairs by increasing domestic energy production, reforming and streamlining the permitting process for energy infrastructure, reversing the Biden Administration's antienergy policies and boosting the production and processing of critical minerals.

Although the Biden Administration continues its attempt to persuade the American people that Green New Deal-style policies are the best direction for the country, the numbers do not lie, and they show Americans are struggling.

No one should have to choose between putting food on the table or fuel in their car.

Unfortunately, because of the these minerals, we can produce

in 2021, American energy prices spiked 29.3 percent according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, and a further 7.3 percent in 2022.

This was most heavily felt through gasoline prices, which jumped nearly 50 percent in 2021. By reforming the broken permitting process, requiring the Department of the Interior to resume lease sales on federal lands and waters and increasing domestic energy production, the Lower Energy Costs Act would significantly drive down the high energy prices that have crushed Americans for two years.

This legislation would also allow for the increased production of critical minerals that would benefit the United States' national security and economic development. Since 2019, the United States has been import-reliant for 31 of 35 critical minerals and had no domestic production for 14 of those minerals. And today, our country is

dependent on the Chinese Communist Party for more than 50 percent of its supply for 25 different minerals. By cutting red tape preventing the mining of

president's disastrous actions, our own essential medical and military supplies, and end our dependency on other countries for these critical products.

Finally, the Biden Administration has depleted our Strategic Petroleum Reserve to the lowest levels since 1984. By producing our own energy here at home and using the resources readily available to us, we can end our dependence on countries that do not have our best interests in mind such as China, Russia or Iran for energy.

This is by no means unachievable. Before the Biden Administration began, the United States had become a net exporter of energy.

By rolling back the Biden Administration's disastrous anti-North American energy agenda, we can unleash our energy resources here at home, lower energy costs and ensure the U.S. is not reliant on our adversaries for energy sources.

Over the past two years we have learned that an all of the above energy policy is certainly the best route for the American people and our national security, and I was proud to support the Lower Energy Costs Act that would set us on the track to restore our energy

Update from the Capitol

The Senate and House have throughout the approved bond, now begun the legislative process over but with bills from the opposite chamber. Around 480 House bills were sent to us for consideration in our committees.

I'm serving as the principal Senate author for 24 House bills, some of which were heard this week.

Three of the measures, approved Monday by the Senate Business and Commerce Committee, are part of the ongoing effort to reform the medical marijuana industry. HB 1349 would create a nine-member Oklahoma Medical Marijuana Authority (OMMA) Board to focus on rulemaking.

HB 1350 would create a OMMA temporary licensing program for commercial growers, processors, dispensaries, transporters, and other businesses. Temporary licenses, valid for 180 days, could be purchased for a nonrefundable \$1,000 fee. These could be extended by OMMA for an additional 90-day period, not to exceed 18 months. Each extension would cost an additional \$1,000.

HB 1734 would require dispensaries or anywhere marijuana or THC products are sold to display signage, reading, "Warning: ingesting the products while pregnant is not healthy for the development of an unborn child." We want to ensure that expectant mothers realize that while THC may be safe for them to personally ingest, these chemicals can be dangerous for unborn babies and can cause serious health problems for them.

This week, I'll also be presenting HB 1424 creating a voluntary Education Employee Assistance Program within the Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services to help school district employees with mental health, problem resolution, medical referrals, drug and alcohol addiction, or other personal problems.

HB 1445 would require school districts that have issued a bond proposal to post the following information on their website 30 days prior to the bond vote – a copy of the bond proposal, including each project to be funded; each project description; and each project's estimated cost.







We get the point: We just need to make the right decision, regardless of the cost.
