Deshmukh's research will tween Sjögren's and oxidative stress. This phenomenon oc-The disease may affect up to curs when there are too many unstable molecules called "free radicals" in the body and not enough antioxidants to get rid of them.

As these free radicals increase, they cause cellular damage to other molecules and proteins they interact with.

Although Sjögren's involves multiple glands, this study will focus on the salivary glands.

"We know that oxidative stress increases as we age," Deshmukh said. "We want to understand whether that stress contributes to damage to the salivary glands, or if the damage to the glands is causing oxidative stress, or a cycle of both."

Ultimately, Deshmukh said, disease.

"People with Sjögren's may develop symptoms in nearly every organ, including joints, lungs and central nervous system, so Dr. Deshmukh's research ultimately could have implications well beyond the salivary glands," said OMRF Vice President of Clinical Affairs Judith James, M.D., Ph.D. "If his hypothesis is correct, our next step would be to evaluate the effects of antioxidants in reducing Sjögren's symptoms."





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



Oklahoma and federal education experts say shortage goes beyond lack of teachers

As a teacher shortage crisis worsens in the U.S. three years after the beginning of the CO-VID-19 pandemic, national and state education leaders said a structural disruption is creating shortages in the system.

Oklahoma and several other states are facing a teacher shortage exacerbated by the pandemic, causing many teachers to get laid off or leave the profession due to mental health issues or low compensation. And the shortage is not only of teachers but of the education workforce as a whole.

Katherine Bishop, president of the Oklahoma Education Association, said there are not enough support professionals and administrators in Oklahoma schools.

"We have to make sure we have the resources that educators need in their classrooms, in their buildings," Bishop said. "We have a shortage in every

area, not just teachers. If kids can't get to school safely on the bus, that's an issue." According to the National

Center for Education Statistics, more than half of public schools in the U.S. reported being understaffed at the start of the 2022-2023 school year, and 69 percent reported one of the main challenges was to get teachers to apply for open Please see **Teachers**, page 7A

positions.

Bishop said she thinks there is an infrastructure issue across Oklahoma that needs to be looked at more carefully by state leaders.

"Public education is a core service, just like health, public roads and public safety," Bishop said. "It's in the Constitution that we will provide free public education for our

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House unanimously approves income qualifier increase for additional homestead exemption

For the second time in three to keep pace with these cost-ofyears, the Oklahoma House of living adjustments and ensures Representatives has approved an increase to the income qualifier for an additional homestead exemption to aid Oklahomans Security Income (SSI) program living on a fixed income.

House Bill 1926, authored 5.9 percent in 2022 and an 8.7 by Rep. Lonnie Sims, R-Jenks, increases the income qualifier for the additional homestead exemption from \$25,000 to \$30,000.

Sims said many seniors living on fixed incomes are losing this benefit because the increases to Social Security have pushed them over the income qualifier.

"Unfortunately, due to the rise transfers to the Senate for conof inflation we've seen in the past few years, Oklahoma's seniors on a fixed income are now facing the same concerns and no longer qualify for the additional homestead exemption," Sims said.

"House Bill 1926 raises the income qualifier accordingly

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

I didn't particularly like being John D. but figured when I got to elementary school I could drop it.


Not so fast. In my first grade class there were two other Johns, one of which popped off, "They call him John D."

Knocking on doors is as American as apple pie. Politicians, salespersons, clergy, Girl Scouts, federal census workers, and the list goes on of persons and professions who have depended on knocking

When I was a child, I sold **Grit** newspapers. I needed to knock on a lot of doors to sell 20 papers which made me a cool \$1.

Serving churches for years I have probably knocked on over a thousand plus doors to invite people to church. I'm so glad no one shot me.

The recent shooting of a 16-year-old teenager in Kansas City, mistakenly knocking on the wrong door, is beyond insane. The teenage boy was at the wrong house to pick up his brothers who were a block

Who shoots through a door without reason unless the individual is crazy or on drugs or perhaps both?

The problem is, we do have a severe mental illness epidemic in America and a drug crisis. Throw in America's growing gun violence issues and thererequest a substantial payment foreknocking on strange doors becomes a scary scenario.

I admit hearing someone knock on the door at dinner time is a bit aggravating. Usually for me, it's a high school band member selling mulch to raise money for the band. Or, it's someone raising money for

another school project.

You can't be irritated with a 15-year-old kid who is out trying to raise money for his school. Unless, you are crazy or on drugs. Then anything might tick you off. By all means, don't be this person.

For the most part, more and more industrious people are relying on social media to try to gain new business. It's true you can reach more people more efficiently via Internet advertising, social media and other media sources than by taking all day to knock on a few doors. If people want it, they will respond to your advertising.

People have rightfully withdrawn from knocking on doors because they are paranoid of disturbing someone's favorite television program, meal or nap. This is never a good environment for making a sale or making a friend.

Maybe the day of selling magazine subscriptions, brushes, vacuum cleaners, and stuff like that door-to-door is in the past. Do any ministers ever knock on your door and invite you to church?

If someone does knock on your door, don't immediately invite them into your house. They should have a picture identification badge for you to see. They also should talk to you about a future appointment



OMRF study finds possible link between diet and MS

sis symptoms could be as close as the kitchen, scientists at the Oklahoma Medical Research Foundation have discovered. In experiments covering

four years, scientists Scott Plafker, Ph.D., and Katarzyna Zyla-Jackson, Ph.D., found that a high-fat, low-carb and fiber-enriched diet prevented the onset of MS symptoms in mouse models of the disease. The same diet also reduced symptoms in mice already showing signs of the disease.

The findings support Plafker's hypothesis that a diet of ultra-processed foods contributes to autoimmune diseases like MS.

"Genetic changes happen very slowly – just a little bit per generation – so that can't account for the increased incidence in autoimmune diseases we've seen over the last several decades," Plafker said. "Beyond improved diagnostics, that leaves environmental factors as a primary driver of this increase, and at least for MS, we believe dietary changes may be a leading culprit."

MS affects nearly 1 million Americans. It occurs when the body's immune system attacks the insulating layer that protects nerves in the brain and spinal cord. The resulting inflammation can cause vision issues, muscle spasms, tremors and paralysis. In its most common form, the disease includes periods of stability and relapse. In OMRF's study, Plafker

and Zyla-Jackson found that in mice, a ketogenic – or "keto" – diet protected against the losses of vision and motor function that typically accompany the

"A keto diet can't simply

replace medications that are already working well for MS, but our study indicates that it appears to be a helpful supplement for those medications," said Zyla-Jackson, a registered dietician. Gabriel Pardo, M.D., and his

team at OMRF's MS Center of Excellence care for more than 3,000 people with MS from Oklahoma and surrounding states. Pardo said that based on the research from Plafker's lab, he would discuss incorporating a keto diet with many of his patients.

"Diet is a crucial consideration for people with MS, and this discovery gives us more clarity in how we can approach this very challenging disease," said Pardo, a neurologist and neuro-ophthalmologist. "There's no universal treatment yet, but what Drs. Plafker and Zyla-Jackson have discovered could prove beneficial in managing symptoms and possibly even preventing relapses."

Plafker and Zyla-Jackson are now conducting experiments to determine why the keto diet reduces or prevents MS symptoms.

One focus is the microbiome, which is composed of trillions of microbes and which scientists increasingly suspect to be a key player in numerous medical conditions.

"A keto diet can be hard to stick to, especially in the beginning, because it's such a shift from the fast and ultraprocessed foods that many Americans have become accustomed to," Plafker said. "Understanding what makes it so impactful in MS may open drates and replaces them with the door to developing supplements or therapies that mimic

Maureen Tracey-Mooney, a senior advisor at the U.S. Department of Education's Office of Planning, Evaluation and Policy Development, said the department is "laser-focused" on the teacher shortage crisis and has found a few root causes.

Tracey-Mooney said the Department of Education is expanding the number of registered apprenticeship programs for teachers. She said those programs would allow teachers in training to "earn while they learn" by taking classes for education preparation and getting in-the-classroom experience with a veteran teacher.

She said programs such as and the "Grow your Own" teacher program as well as the National Partnership for Students' Success — a partnership with AmeriCorps and Johns Hopkins University to get an additional 250,000 tutors and mentors to support students - have been key in about." helping to address the education shortage.

Bishop said OEA is appreciative of the recent education bills passed in Oklahoma, but the state needs to continue doing more to allocate funds to salaries and resources for schools.

OMRF scientist identifies genetic cause of rare disease

neurological disorder first surfaced, an Oklahoma Medical Research Foundation scientist has determined its cause thanks to tiny flies.

Scientist Wan Hee Yoon, Ph.D., used Drosophila, the common fruit fly, to pinpoint a genetic mutation that more recently caused severe developmental and metabolic issues in four children of Middle Eastern descent.

"This discovery was made possible by the Human Genome Project, which gives us the computational ability to unravel genetic mutations," Yoon said. "Previously, it would have been impossible to identify this mutation as the cause with any certainty."

Scientists first reported on the disorder in 1982 after studying showed normal gait and speech development, but by age 5, a progressive neurological disorder had stolen their language and motor skills.

Scientists ultimately associated their symptoms – and those of children in a few subsequent studies – with a deficiency of an enzyme produced by the gene OGDH.

The most recent study involved four unrelated children. Severe abnormalities first appeared during infancy for all four, ranging from an abnormally small brain to decreased muscle tone to acid buildup caused by kidney failure. One child died before their first birthday.

Using cutting-edge genetic sequencing technology, Yoon and his colleagues determined that each patient had recessive mutations in the OGDH gene, which strongly suggested the disease's cause. Fruit flies helped him prove it.

The findings were published in the journal Genetics in *Medicine*. Two former OMRF scientists, Madison Chilian and Helga Progri, played key roles in the research.

The research was supported by National Institutes of Health grants 5R01 NS121298-02 and 5 P20 GM103636-09, with additional funding from the Presbyterian Health Foundation and the Oklahoma Center for Adult Stem Cell Research, a program of the Oklahoma Tobacco Settlement Endowment Trust.

This enables veterans and surviving spouses to be eligible for VA

Federal judge pauses Biden's WOTUS in 26 states pending high court decision

Oklahoma has joined over half of the country in halting a Biden administration rule that would expand federal envination's water bodies, throwing the state's farmers and ranchers in a legal twilight zone.

The nation has been waffling over how to define the term "waters of the United States." Act since the Obama administration. The newest rule—which went into effect less than a month ago-extends the federal government's jurisdiction previous rule.

A district court decision in North Dakota stopped the rule from taking effect in 24 additional states—who's attorneys general all signed on to this lawsuit. The rule was previously paused in Idaho and Texas bringing the total to 26 states.

These 26 states are operating or WOTUS, in the Clean Water under Trump's rule which states that the federal government is responsible for regulating navigable waters and the rest is for state and local regulation.

The other 24 states began and replaces Donald Trump's enforcing President Joe Biden's rule, which utilizes a test that determines jurisdiction on a case-by-case basis. This method is dubbed the "significant nexus test" and is applicable to any water body on private property. The test looks to see if a water body originates from navigable waters putting it under federal jurisdiction.

"[The ruling] recognizes that a Supreme Court is mulling a case one-size-fits-all mentality is not the best," Kelsey said. "What works for water management in Idabel, which is in the extreme southeast part of the state, is not the same for Guymon, which is way up in the panhandle."

Oklahoma Rep. Frank Lucas (R-Cheyenne) praised the North Dakota ruling.

"America's farmers, ranchers, and landowners deserve a WOTUS definition that is fair and provides regulatory clarity and certainty to agriculture and tainty hinders landowners from businesses," Lucas said in a



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
