"It is essential to recognize the importance of mental health as a component of our overall health and well-being," Renfrow said. "It's just as important as physical health. Chikasha Anokfilli 'thinking Chickasaw' is a mental health initiative visioned by (Chickasaw Nation) Governor Bill Anoatubby in 2019. Chikasha Anokfilli was developed and proclaimed to support and promote mental health and wellness."

Emphasizing prevention and early intervention, the Chikasha Anokfilli initiative seamlessly integrates mental health into the Chickasaw Nation's overall health services.

### **Responsibility of Home Owner to Maintain Property** It is the responsibility of the home owner and or tenant to

maintain their property or be subject to a \$260 fine. Violations are as follows:

1. Tall grass or weeds, junk, trash, debris, inoperable vehicles, and discharging grass clippings into the street.

2. You are responsible for maintaining your property from the edge of the road or curb to the center of the alley. The City will trim the large trees in the alley.

3. Bulk waste pick up is the last Monday of every month. Please do not set bulk waste out until that weekend before the last Monday. (No loose items, no items to exceed 75 pounds, no antifreeze, paint, or batteries, no hazardous materials. No refrigerant compressors. Limbs must be in three-foot bundles).

4. Brush set out to the curb will be picked up with a charge determined by the size. Brush pick up is free in May and October. You may also call and arrange for brush pick up.

## Keeping FEMA informed

If you have new contact of my application? information or have received an insurance settlement, it is important to let FEMA know. FEMA may be trying to reach you regarding your application.

Important: Update your contact and personal information

Make sure FEMA knows how to contact you and share information that may affect your application. For example:

Has your phone number changed, or did you leave your home? Inaccurate phone numbers and addresses may lead to missed calls and correspondence.

Have you changed your bank or account number? That could delay a direct deposit from FEMA.

Have you received a settlement or letter of denial from your insurance? Provide the information to FEMA immediately, as these events could change your eligibility.

What if I find damage I did not know about previously?

Property damage will be evaluated by a FEMA inspector.

If you notice additional damage to your property following your FEMA inspection, contact FEMA.

If you cannot be present at your home during an inspection, you can authorize someone else to meet the inspector on your behalf by providing written consent for a third party to represent you.

Where do I update my information and check on the status

You can also visit a Disaster Recovery Center in your area and speak to a FEMA representative in person to update the information fema.gov/DRC.

If you don't understand something when applying online, you can click "Help for this page" on the top left side of the form for more information.



I'm not a baseball coach or manager, but if I was, my players would not take on 3-0.


To me it's the dumbest unwritten rule in all of coaching.

## Veterans battling addiction

This Memorial Day, millions of American families will take time to honor the memory of the men and women who lost their lives fighting in one of the nation's wars. It can be a challenging day for veterans and their families.

It can be particularly challenging for veterans who made it home but are now battling a substance use disorder or mental illness. Too many veterans struggle with drug addiction.

In Oklahoma there are over 290,000 veterans, most of whom are wartime vets. According to the National Survey on Drug Use and Health, over 3.9 million veterans nationally have a substance use disorder or mental illness.

suicidally among veterans ages 18 and older. Suicidal thoughts and behaviors are also common among veterans ages 18 to 49. "Early intervention saves lives, and it works. Yet, too many

Additionally, substance use disorders significantly increase

veterans fall through the cracks and lose their life because of overdose or suicide," said Michael Leach of Addicted.org. Numerous causative factors lead to substance use within the

veteran community. Many veterans struggle to adjust to civilian life. They may experience financial hardships, difficulty finding employment or accessing benefits. Veterans also struggle with mental and emotional health prob-

lems because of past service. This could also be compounded with physical injury or chronic pain leading to pain medication use. Untreated trauma alone can lead to drug and alcohol abuse to

cope with unwanted feelings. There are also barriers when accessing treatment, such as cost and gaps in health insurance. Stigma regarding mental health and addiction is still prominent. Veterans living in rural areas have limited access to help. Communities often experience

inadequate funding. Besides the standard help provided by the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs and the VA Facility locator, other support

The Oklahoma Department of Veterans Affairs provides resources and services to veterans;

Helpful hotlines include the Veteran Crisis Line, 1-800-273-

8255, and the Lifeline for Vets, 1-888-777-4443; SAMHSA has a treatment facility locator where veterans can find specific resources for substance use treatment.

Families also play a significant role when supporting their loved ones. It's ok to express concern about their drug and alcohol use. Speak to them openly and honestly about their substance

use. Help them find treatment. Be patient and show compassion. Communities and families that come together make a significant difference. There is help available and substance use and mental disorders are treatable.

## Aiming to end a crisis

For far too long, dangerous predators have disproportionately targeted indigenous women and girls, and violence against Native Americans and Alaska Natives far exceeds national averages. In fact, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, Native women and girls experience a murder rate 10 times higher than the national average.

The impact of missing and murdered indigenous women and girls has on tribal communities is certainly vast, as many have sadly lost mothers, daughters, nieces, aunts, siblings and friends.

Throughout May, during Missing and Murdered Indigenous Peoples Awareness Month, we are somberly reminded of the urgent need to end this terrible crisis.

According to the National Missing and Unidentified Persons Systems (NamUs), Oklahoma is listed as the duced by Congressman Ruben second state of most missing Native Americans at 86. This of this year, appoints tribal fa-

Poor data collection, recordkeeping and access to other resources ties the hands of law enforcement when investigating these cases. To strengthen data collection, I am proud to co-lead the Bridging Agency Data Gaps and Ensuring Safety (BADGES) for Native Communities Act.

The Savanna's Act aims to improve data collection of missing and murdered indigenous peoples, clarify the responsibilities of tribal, federal, state and local law enforcement agencies responding to cases and provide tribal governments with resources and information to assist in their response.

The Not Invisible Act created a joint commission composed of tribal leaders, law enforcement, federal partners and survivors to identify and combat violent crime within tribal lands. Today, this commission is up and running,

## Remembering Americans who lost their lives for America

Mark Edward Vanderheid was born in Tonawanda, New York, on February 11, 1949. Four months after his 20th birthday, and only six months after he arrived in South Vietnam in 1968, Vanderheid, a U.S. Marine Corps Lance Corporal, lay dead on the Quang Tri battle field; mortar shell fragments had torn his body open.

Young Mark was one of Killed in Vietman the 40,934 American military personnel killed in action. Other fatalities included those who perished from wounds, suicides, homicides, accidents and illnesses. Their bodies never recovered, another 91 are presumed dead.

Aiding combatants, eight female nurses lost their lives. Among the enemy, an estimated 1.1 million North Vietnamese and Viet Cong fighters were killed; 250,000 South Vietnamese soldiers died, and more than 2 million innocent civilians were killed.

In all, 58,222 Americans died during a futile war that began in 1959 when the first U.S. soldiers were killed during a guerrilla raid on their quarters near Saigon; the war ended ignominiously in 1975. U.S. forces never had a chance.

President Lyndon Johnson and Secretary of Defense Robert McNamara, the powers that escalated the war, had no exit strategy, and knew that Americans back home would be unwilling to make a sustainable commitment to victory.

Such a pledge would mean higher taxes to support Johnson's guns and butter economy, thousands more lost lives and more domestic turmoil.

In 1997, during a meeting with McNamara, Vietnamese General Vo Nguyen Giap told his foe that the U.S. could never have won. The Vietnamese, Giap said, were willing to fight for 100 years.

Their too-late awakening was cold comfort to Lillian and Edward Vanderheid, Mark's parents, as well as to the other families whose loved ones, while defending a misguided, and ultimately failed cause, died too young.

Mark's body was returned to Tonawanda in July, and he was buried with military services at Elmlawn Cemetery.

On December 19, 1968, the Tonawanda News published a letter from the Vanderheid family in which they shared memories of their hero son, and expressed gratitude for the two memorials that had recently been dedicated to Mark, one an award given in his name to the most spirited Tonawanda High School varsity football player.

The other memorial, Lillian and Edward wrote, is the Payne Avenue Christian Church's "beautiful stained-glass window."

Grieving Lillian and Edward remembered how Mark loved to play sports and teach other young boys how to play. He coached Little League and also umpired games.

Lillian thought back to one day when Mark was home on leave and said, "Mom, someone has to help those people over there. Those kids have never known anything but war. If I can do even a small part to help them to someday just be kids and enjoy a childhood like I did, to be able to throw baseballs and footballs instead of hand grenades, I'll have done my part."

Lance Corporal Vanderheid did more than his part, and deserved to live a full, rewarding life. The Kennedy, Johnson, Nixon Vietnam war-obsessed White Houses stole from Mark, and from other thousands, that basic privilege.

Mark's name is on the Vietnam Veteran's Memorial in Washington, D.C., panel W54, line 8. His biography appeared in Gary Bedingfield's "Baseball's Greatest Sacrifice," dedicated to the 500 players who died in service to America.

Native American artists say they continue to struggle with the theft of their work, and tribal leaders are urging Congress to strengthen the Indian Arts and Crafts Act.

IACA was passed in 1990 to prohibit any advertisement and all sales of counterfeit Indian arts and crafts. Choctaw Nation artist D.G. Smalling says the IACA must adapt to the new ways of buying and selling art through online sales.

"We have just a very different kind of engagement with intellectual property now," Smalling said. "This is why my principal attorney is an expert in intellectual property. It is to defend what I create and to defend what is mine."

## OMRF study finds potential target for successful ovarian cancer treatment

An Oklahoma Medical Rehas discovered that an overactive gene appears to play a role in the development of ovarian cancer and that it can be targeted to kill the cancer cells the gene is connected to.

The gene, SDHA, produces an enzyme called SDH that causes ovarian tumor cells to grow and migrate. OMRF scientist Magdalena Bieniasz, Ph.D., found that in research models, about 20 percent of ovarian tumors have large quantities of that enzyme.

"What this means is that in females, the tumors have a high metabolism and develop fast," said Bieniasz, who joined OMRF in 2014 from the Huntsman Cancer Institute.

She called the gene a "double-edged sword," because while it promotes growth in ovarian tumors, tumors with high levels of SDH seem to respond more favorably to chemotherapy than those with low levels of SDH.

About 20,000 U.S. women search Foundation scientist are diagnosed with ovarian cancer annually, according to the American Cancer Society. Because women frequently overlook the early symptoms of ovarian cancer, patients are often not diagnosed until it has spread throughout the pelvis and abdomen.

As a result, the five-year survival rate following diagnosis is about 50 percent – far below the survival rate for most other cancer types. Among women, it is the fifth-leading cause of cancerrelated death.

Previous research found a connection between a deficiency of SDH and rare cancer types as well as neurodevelopmental disorders. However, scientists had not yet studied the link between too much of the enzyme and ovarian cancer, Bieniasz said.

Bieniasz used a library of compounds and found that several, including a plantbased compound, that could improve killing ovarian

cancer cells with high levels of SDH by disrupting their energy production.

"This tells us that targeting this gene could be part of an effective treatment in certain ovarian tumors,' said Bieniasz, whose lab is in OMRF's Aging and Metabolism Research Program. "The next phase of this work is to optimize targeting the gene in ovarian tumors while minimizing effects on other

OMRF scientist Benjamin Miller, Ph.D., who chairs the program, said both discoveries advanced existing knowledge about ovarian cancer.

"These are important findings not only for the genetic connection Dr. Bieniasz has found but also for this very early indication regarding one piece of a potential therapy," Miller said. "These insights reveal more about how ovarian cancer cells use energy and suggest new ways to target their metabolism for more effective treatment options."



## OMRF experts say hope is on the horizon for RSV

Foundation scientists say.

The FDA this month approved a vaccine to prevent respiratory syncytial virus, better known as RSV, in people aged 60 and older. The vaccine is made by the British pharmaceutical company GlaxoSmith-Kline (GSK).

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention is expected to follow the FDA's approval, clearing the way for RSV vaccines for older adults to be available in the U.S. this fall. Drugmakers Pfizer and Moderna are also in the late stages of developing RSV vaccines, including one for pregnant women.

"This is a major step, and even more progress against this virus appears to be on the horizon," said OMRF physicianscientist Hal Scofield, M.D. "RSV annually kills thousands of seniors in the U.S. and has recently played a big part in stressing global health care systems, so this first vaccine approval is welcome news."

RSV typically produces a cold-like illness, but it can

Scofield said the virus is "woefully underdiagnosed" in adults.

The CDC estimates that RSV leads to more than 60,000 hospitalizations and over 6,000 deaths among adults 65 years and older annually. According to GSK, in a clinical trial of 25,000 adults, its vaccine was more than 94% effective in preventing severe RSV.


GSK's shot involves technology dating to the 1980s. Called a recombinant subunit vaccine, it is used in numerous immunizations, including those for hepatitis B and whooping cough.

OMRF scientist Susan Kovats, Ph.D., studies RSV. She is working to understand why the virus impacts children more frequently, with more than 2 million outpatient visits for children under age 5 annually, but generally hits older adults harder. The work is setting the stage for better treatments and will aid in vaccine design.

"There seems to be a correlation between virus load and age," she said. "The preliminary data in our models of older adults shows that the older you are, the harder it is to eliminate the virus."

Scofield and Kovats said the approval of the first vaccine for RSV is good news, as long as those eligible take advantage.

"Time will tell how widespread uptake of the vaccine will be," said Scofield, "But for older adults most at risk of a bad outcome from RSV, I hope that getting vaccinated when it becomes available will be an easy decision."

## Spray calibration is a must

With some warm weather, the weeds in the pastures are already off to a good start. Also, with the price of fertilizer you must ask yourself "do you want to fertilize the weeds?"

If you do your own weed spraying, how much liquid do you apply per acre? How much chemical do you put out per acre? Are you following the recommended rate listed on the label? Are you controlling the weeds as cost effectively as results you want?

Studies show that only one in four sprayers actually apply the amount of chemical that the operator had intended. The other three either over or under apply by at least 33 percent.

Over application can result in (1) unnecessary chemical cost, (2) risk of crop damage, (3) environmental risk, and (4) applicator safety, while under application can result in failure to achieve desired control and the risk of developed tolerance or immunity by target weeds.

To achieve the proper application rate, you must have the right tank mixture of the chemical. This cannot be done with-

water your sprayer applies per within the recommended range. acre. Nozzle flow rate, ground If you are using a boom type speed and effective spray width all affect the amount of water applied per acre.

Many producers generally assume that the easiest way to change sprayer output is to change pressure. Changes in pressure must be increased 4 times to double output, but if speed is changed, even one mile and hour, chemicals can be over-applied and costs can be increased by 33 percent.

Before calibrating the spraypossible? Are you getting the er, you should service the entire unit. Clean all lines and strainers, making sure that the strainers are in good condition and are the correct size and type for the chemicals that are to be applied. Inspect all hoses for signs of aging, damage, corroded fittings, or leaks.

Check the pressure gauges to determine if they are working properly The actual accuracy of the gauge is not as important as is its ability to give the same reading each time the same pressure is produced. Check that all the nozzles are the same size and that they are not worn or damaged.

output and pattern by filling the tank with clean water and out knowing exactly how much operate the sprayer at a pressure would be a big help.

sprayer, make sure all the tips are putting out the same amount of liquid during a certain period of time. Tips that over or under apply by as much as 20 percent should be replaced.

An effective way to determine spraying pattern is to operate the sprayer at the appropriate height over a warm dry surface, like a paved road or gravel driveway, and observe the drying pattern. If the pattern is not uniform, some strips will dry slower than other.

If the tank capacity is not specifically listed on the side of the tank, then the tank capacity should be found. A tank thought to hold 200 gallons, but which actually holds 250 gallons, results in a built in 25 percent calibration error.

"A person's well-being is multi-faceted and requires all these pillars to function in harmony for a person to function at their best and flourish," Renfrow said. "Each pillar is influenced or affected by the others."

These pillars include social/ cultural wellness, psychological wellness, spiritual wellness and biological wellness. Each pillar is comprised of multiple factors. By addressing the needs of each, when combined, they create a well-balanced and healthy whole.



## StreetScape:

Street began this Monday as crews started drilling-up concrete along the sidewalks.

"The priority is making [the sidewalks] Americans with Disabilities Act compliant. That's the main reason that federal funds were made available," said Purcell's City Manager Dale Bunn.

"I think it's going to be beautiful and a good thing overall," Tharp said.

Bunnsharedthis outlook, stating, "Anywhere a StreetScape like this has happened, it has improved business in the downtown areas affected. It varies, but there's a substantial increase," he said.

Bunn stated that the city of Purcell hopes to finish construction by November 1st, but sometime mid-November is more likely.





Wheels move you from birth to death. A basinet probably rolled you to your mother's arms, after a special bed wheeled her to the delivery room where you were welcomed to the world. Then there were baby stroller trips.

Kids Robin Read and Libby Smart chatted about that while riding their bikes with friends they were visiting in Pryor Creek, Oklahoma, relishing the pleasure of using just foot-powered wheels to anywhere in town on a beautiful day.

"Wheels were invented over 5,500 years ago in Mesopotamia, but the Greeks needed 20 centuries before discovering that wheels could move goods and people in wheel-and-axle carts, powered only by walking," Libby said. "Before that, archeologists think, wheels just helped make pottery."

Robin suddenly slowed down exclaiming, "Look at that—cool, not ancient."


'That' was a super-modern electric bicycle a millionaire might ride. It had enough gadgets, gizmos, lights and trim to nearly hide the seat, pedals and chains. But the police officer and his vehicle moved silently.

"The local newspaper said new Police Chief Jeremy Cantrell just bought three of the bikes using about \$11,000 donated by the town's largest furniture store, a major restaurant, and a family partnership.

"They can see and respond to a burglary or car theft, silent and invisible so the thief can't flee, and is arrested, which solves a neighborhood problem. If officers have to move fast to an emergency, they use a complete light, siren, etc. package activated by just a finger," he said.






Welcome to the "front the cradle. porch." We have been studying as of late in John's epistles and encourage all to spend time in the great apostles' writing. John's letters are unique in a number of ways.

It is likely that John writes his letters later in the first century, as late as the 80s or even early 90s. As such, John would be the only NT writer who writes to two generations: those who are there at the inauguration of the Lord's church and the subsequent persecution that follows for several decades; and also to a new

Persecution at this time is not as big of an issue as the false teaching that is now in full swing, specifically the Gnostics who are "in the know." They have eclipsed the sound teaching of the "apostles' doctrine" of Acts 2:42 with "newfangled" ideas, as we say.

But there's something else of note here: John's theme is not that of being converted unto Christ through obedience of the gospel. His theme is the continued walk with Christ, and, in particular, the continual cleansing of our sins day by generation who are exposed day -- no, not that we walk in to the churches of Christ from sin but that when we "swerve"

we do not have to despair.

As one said, "We are to walk daily from pardon to pardon, from purification to purification." John says it this way: "My little children, these things write I unto you, that ye sin not. And if any man sin, we have an advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the righteous" (1 John 2:1).

With Jesus as our "Advocate," we can be renewed day by day. With that, we can have great spiritual confidence.
