Garvin praises Senate passage of paid maternity leave for state employees

The Senate approved Senate Bill 16X during special session Wednesday to provide six weeks of paid maternity leave for Oklahoma’s full-time state employees following the birth or adoption of a child. Sen. Jessica Garvin, R-Duncan, introduced the reform at the beginning of the 2023 session and praised her Senate colleagues for supporting the pro-family policy. “Women are leaving the workforce at alarming rates across the country, and this is just one more incentive to help recruit and retain highly qualified employees to state agencies, so we can improve government efficiency,” Garvin said. “State employees are drastically underpaid compared

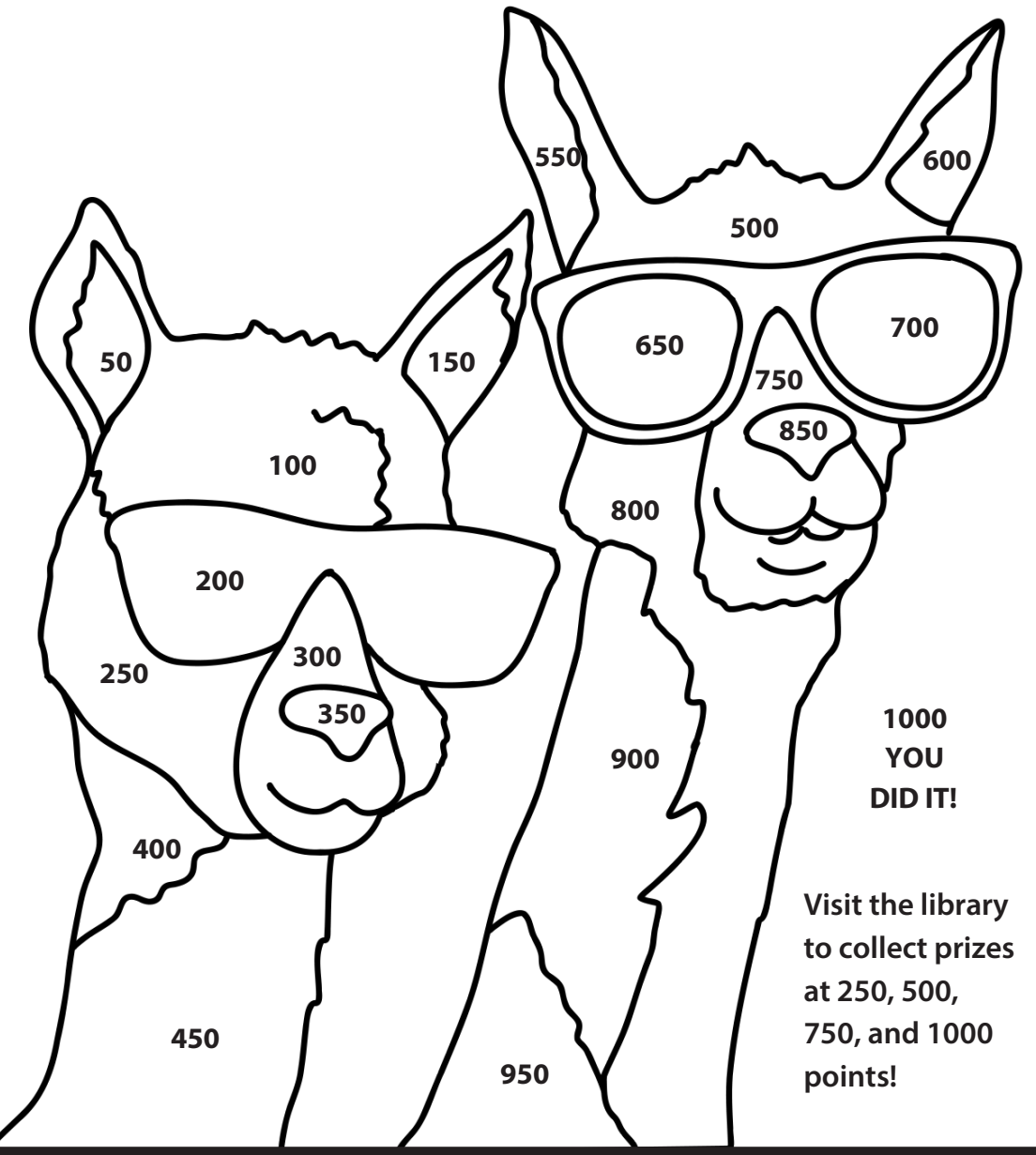
to the private sector. I know there are a lot of private sector employees who are already receiving this benefit, so this will help the state be more competitive,” she said. The benefit would be available to state employees who have been on the job for at least two years. Employees would not be required to use their accrued leave for the initial six-week period but could request to use such leave for any additional time off needed up to the 12 weeks provided under the federal Family and Medical Leave Act (FMLA). Oklahoma currently has nearly 31,500 state employees, and over 59 percent are women and more than 40 percent of

the state’s workforce are of the age to have children. Employee turnover costs Oklahoma an estimated \$110 million a year, and a majority of those leaving are women. “As a Republican, we always talk about being pro-life, and this is part of that. We’ve got to support families during and after birth,” Garvin said. “We need to surround them and provide all the support and assistance we can, especially for women who suffer from things like postpartum depression. “Those six weeks at home with the baby are imperative to the long-term health of the child and mom, and I’m extremely

Oklahoma delegation applauds Court ruling restricting powers of the EPA

The Supreme Court ruled Thursday that the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) does not have authority over certain bodies of water.

In a 5 - 4 ruling that continued a conservative leaning court's narrowing of environmental regulations, the court settled a long-standing case that Oklahoma delegates were hoping would overturn some Biden administration policies regarding the so-called Waters of the United States.

The Supreme Court's opinion on the case came from associate justice Samuel Alito. He said that although the Clean Waters Act has been a success, it still needs some work.

"Before its enactment in 1972, many of the Nation's rivers, lakes, and streams were severely polluted, and existing federal legislation had proved to be inadequate," Alito wrote in a decision that all justices arrived at in three concurring opinions.

"Today, many formerly fetid

bodies of water are safe for the use and enjoyment of the people of this country. There is, however, an unfortunate footnote to this success story: the outer boundaries of the Act's geographical reach have been uncertain from the start."

The Michael and Chantell Sackett family bought land in Idaho south of the Canadian border near Priest Lake back in 2004. They broke ground with a plan to build a home on the property but the EPA stepped in a few months later telling them to stop construction.

They failed to complete assessments to obtain Clean Water Act permits and proceeded construction.

The EPA told the Sacketts they had violated the Clean Water Act of 1972 and were required to stop construction immediately or face fines and penalties. Instead, the Sacketts decided they wanted to push back against the EPA.

Rep. Kevin Hern (R-Tulsa) said he's pleased with the court's ruling going in favor of the Idaho family.

"This was an important decision limiting federal government overreach for private property owners, including

farmers and ranchers simply trying to manage their land," Hern said in an emailed statement to Gaylord News. "We must not allow the Biden Administration to usurp authority over things outside their jurisdiction - a principle evident in the Court's decision today."

The White House wasted little time in expressing its displeasure at the decision.

During the White House's daily Press Briefing, Press Secretary Karine Jean-Pierre said the White House does not agree with the decision.

"The court's decision aims to take our country backward," said Press Secretary Karine Jean-Pierre during the White House's daily briefing. "It will jeopardize the sources of clean drinking water for farmers, businesses, and millions of Americans."

But Rep. Frank Lucas (R-Cheyenne) said the ruling is a win for rural American

Default Democrats

Congressman Tom Cole

For several weeks, House Speaker Kevin McCarthy and House Republicans have made numerous calls to negotiate a reasonable and responsible deal to raise the debt ceiling and avoid a catastrophic default.

Unfortunately, President Joe Biden has not budged on his position and refuses to come to the table to find a solution agreeable to both sides. Without a solution to address the debt limit and with just a few days left until the U.S. Treasury runs out of money, the president and Democrats have no one to blame but themselves for leading the nation into this crisis.

First, we should remember what got us into this mess in the first place. Since January 2021 when President Biden assumed office, he and House Democrats increased the 10-year spending trajectory by \$10 trillion by enacting their partisan \$2 trillion American Rescue Plan and another \$500 billion in spending in their falsely named Inflation Reduction Act.

In addition, President Biden’s unprecedented number of executive orders during

his term, including his costly student loan forgiveness plan, have totaled more than \$1.5 trillion.

While Republicans warned Democrats and the president that this level of spending is unsustainable, they insisted and went ahead anyway. Now, we are reaching our debt limit at a much faster pace than expected.

I certainly understand the need to raise the debt limit. Indeed, a default would be catastrophic to the U.S. economy and individual Americans. It would result in additional increased interest rates for borrowers, the possible inability for the government to pay businesses and workers it is in contract with and would be a direct hit to individual American investments.

However, this raise must be paired with commonsense reforms to slow spending in the years to come.

Instead of working with Republicans to address this nearing crisis, President Biden has instead proposed raising taxes on Americans and American businesses by roughly \$3 trillion. This includes implementing a new \$31 billion tax hike on American energy producers, a \$230 billion tax

on small businesses and a \$20 billion increase in capital gains taxes.

In addition, he has also proposed \$200 billion in new government price controls on prescription drugs, which would result in significantly fewer life-saving drugs for deadly diseases, including those for cancers and Alzheimer’s.

Raising taxes on Americans when we already have the highest tax revenue in American history is wrong. It is not an issue of revenue, but rather spending.

Republicans are proposing commonsense solutions to put our country on a more fiscally stable track by limiting certain areas of federal discretionary spending and rescinding unspent COVID-19 relief money.

For several years now, Republicans have warned Democrats that their reckless and inflationary spending would lead to economic calamity.

Now, in the wake of a default that would severely harm our economy for decades to come, President Biden continues to ignore pleas to negotiate a fair solution and is instead digging his heels in even deeper to his disastrous agenda that got us into this mess in the first place.

Legislators comment on passage of marijuana guardrails

In the final days of the legislative session, the Senate and House passed additional reforms to Oklahoma’s medical marijuana industry through Senate Bills 437 and 813.

Sen. Jessica Garvin, R-Duncan, and her House authors released the following statements May 26.

If signed by the governor, SB 437 would go into effect immediately while SB 813 would become effective June 1.

“These bills are the result of months of collaboration with the House, industry professionals, and patients, as well as research of other states’ medical marijuana industries to see what has and hasn’t worked.

This is an industry that has helped many Oklahomans and boosted local economies, but there are still areas that need attention. I urge the governor to sign these critical reforms into law.

“These bills will help improve quality assurance testing, limit access to minor patients, better ensure individuals have an actual medical necessity, and that recommending physicians receive proper education on this treatment. We’re going to create a registry of qualified recommending physicians to ensure patients are seen by

Oklahoma doctors, not out-of-state or international physicians just trying to make an easy buck. This will close the loophole that has allowed so many illegal foreign actors to purchase Oklahoma land and shut down more of the black market. In order for this industry to be truly beneficial to patients and businesses, we must strengthen our regulations, and I want to thank everyone who worked with me to ensure a higher quality, more secure industry for all Oklahomans.”

Rep. John Pfeiffer, R-Oklahoma, is the principal House author of SB 437.

“These measures will help us protect the safety of Oklahomans and our resources through enhanced regulation of the medical marijuana industry.”

Rep. T.J. Marti, R-Tulsa, is the principal House author of SB 831.

“Establishing compliance testing in medical marijuana businesses is crucial for safeguarding consumer well-being and product safety. By further regulating the medical marijuana industry, we can create a transparent and accountable framework that promotes ethical business practices and discourages illegal activities.”

and Oklahoman ranchers and farmers.

“Today’s unanimous decision by the Supreme Court to define wetlands regulated by the Clean Water Act takes a step towards clarity, regulatory certainty, and allowing landowners to continue to be their own responsible steward of their land,” Lucas said. “Now that the Court has ruled in conflict with the Administration’s rule, the Biden Administration must immediately rescind its burdensome proposed rule.”

Sen. Markwayne Mullin (R-Westville) said the ‘waters of the United States’ (WOTUS) rule has been troublesome from the start.

“The Obama-era WOTUS rule has been a headache for Oklahoma farmers, ranchers, and landowners, which seeks to unlawfully regulate every creak, stream, and pond in America,” Mullin said in an emailed statement.

Oklahoma Farm Bureau President Rodd Moesel said

that it’s encouraging to see limits on the EPA’s reach on waters of the United States.

“Farmers and ranchers are the original stewards of the land, and they have a generations-long commitment to the responsible use of our natural resources, including water,” Moesel said.

“Oklahoma agriculture producers need to be regarded as trusted partners in ensuring environmental quality, and we hope today’s ruling is the first step to creating a national framework that will consider our industry’s commitment to responsible water use and water quality to empower our farmers and ranchers to continue raising food, fiber, and fuel,” he said.

The Oklahoma delegation was unified in efforts to overturn the Biden Administration’s efforts to expand the federal government’s jurisdiction over bodies of ‘water in the United States’ (WOTUS) since the House passed a resolution to block

Biden’s new rule. Every Oklahoman in Congress ended up voting for that resolution.

Oklahoma and 25 other states blocked the new water rules back in April. The majority-Republican House and Congress wanted to keep the definition of federal waters the same as it was under former President Donald Trump: bodies of water that are navigable.

Earlier this year, Sen. James Lankford (R-Oklahoma City) released a statement on the topic of the Clean Waters Act saying that it’s not about clean water, but about federal government control.

“We can protect our water without giving near total control of our land to the Washington bureaucracy,” he said.

Although Oklahoma’s delegation agreed with the decision helps private landowners, the EPA indicated its disappointment.

“The Biden-Harris Administration has worked to establish a durable definition of ‘waters of the United States’ that safeguards our nation’s waters, strengthens economic opportunity, and protects people’s health while providing the clarity and certainty that farmers, ranchers, and landowners deserve,” EPA Administrator Michael S. Regan said in a statement.

“A common sense and science-based definition of ‘waters of the United States’ is essential to building on that progress and fulfilling our responsibility to preserve our nation’s waters,” he added.

Illegal pot grows are causing worries in ‘Toke-lahoma’

Despite its late entry into the world of legal cannabis, Oklahoma’s hands-off manner of managing the new industry has sparked a boom and earned the state the nickname “Toke-lahoma.”

The lack of regulation has led to foreign entities and investors flooding into Oklahoma, offering Oklahomans four, five, up to eight times the value for their land. The majority of the growers are from Mexico and China, but generally come from across the globe.

Mark Woodward, spokesman for the Oklahoma Bureau of Narcotics, said his agency has received reports of cannabis farms siphoning part of their harvests to out-of-state buyers,

which is illegal under federal law. But given the sheer number of grow sites, Woodward said the state is “not equipped in the slightest” to fully investigate the matter.

Sam Tabachnik, writing for the **Denver Post**, said Oklahoma, which is politically red, became almost overnight the fastest-growing marijuana producing state in the nation.

Legal grows in Oklahoma are normally regulated for their water and electric use as well as plants and inventory. Illegal grow operations, on the other hand, are unmonitored and thus plant and use resources as they please.

Rural land is preferred for the illegal operations, as property is cheaper and out of the pub-

lic eye. And with community banks being cornerstones of the small towns in Oklahoma, bankers are having to deal with the issue.

“We have had to be more diligent, as there has been an increase in customers trying to start marijuana grows with their bank accounts,” said Amada Alvidrez, regional retail manager at Equity Bank in Guymon.

“Some customers will try to deposit large sums of cash with no paper trail or explanation as to the origin. Equity Bank has seen the effects of the increase in growers in the area,” Alvidrez said.

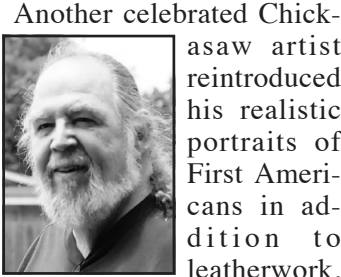

and historic depiction of what a Chickasaw warrior would carry into battle.

“I took my time carving this one,” he said with a broad smile. “I have many hours tied up in it, and I’m pleased the Chickasaw Nation has it and will display it for others to enjoy.”



Another celebrated Chickasaw artist reintroduced his realistic portraits of First Americans in addition to leatherwork, jewelry, keychains, and gorgets to his already expansive paintings and “spirit” art.

Lance Straughn’s “Healer” was his premiere piece at the Artesian Arts Festival. The problem for festivalgoers was it sold at the artists reception the night before the festival opening, but the new owner allowed it to be displayed at his booth.

The painting depicts an elder Chickasaw medicine woman holding a tortoise shell shaker.

“I have always admired First Americans who keep alive natural healing and healthy living,” Straughn said when explaining the inspiration to create the painting.

“There probably aren’t as many healers today as when I was a child,” he said. “But

the healing arts are not lost. There are tribal members who are still practicing and learning while passing it down to younger generations.”

Another Straughn attention-getter was a sculpture of a Chickasaw warrior, bow and arrow at the ready with a wide stance and even balance. “A Shot from the Bluffs” kept with traditional Straughn sculpting themes of warriors, busts of individuals and his love for animals Chickasaws would have encountered since the dawn of time.

“I am pleased with how it turned out,” he said as patrons quizzed him about it. “I will tell you that getting the sculptures bronzed these days is financially just out of sight. It is so expensive,” he lamented.

Straughn resurrected one of his best portraits to showcase realism since he began creating “spirit” art a few years ago, which is more surreal and

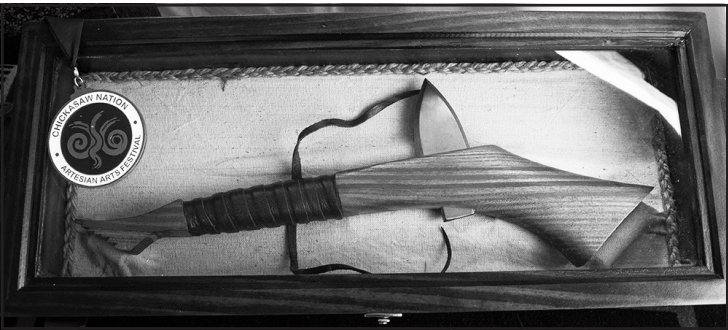
expressionistic. Two Straughn paintings – “Night Run” and “Bear Clan Guardian” – are in the permanent collection of the Interior Museum in Washington, D.C. The museum is managed by the United States Department of the Interior and contains more than 1,500 pieces of fine art.

The painting of Cherokee film star Wes Studi was inspired by his role as “Toughest Pawnee” in the 1990 megahit “Dances with Wolves.”

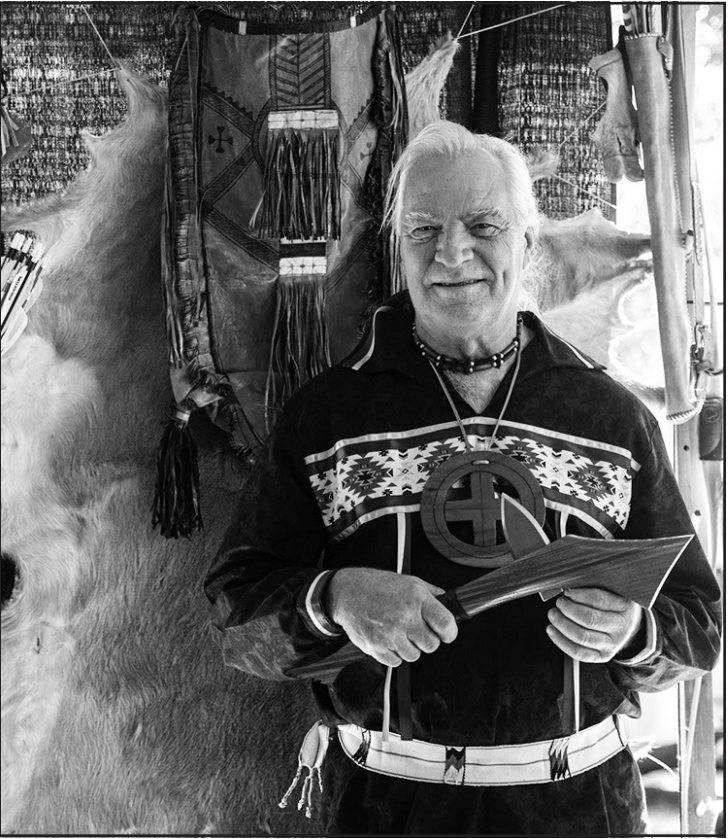
Straughn finished the Studi portrait a few years ago but displayed it along with more recent “spirit” art and paintings inspired by New Mexico.

After decades of fine-tuning sculpting and painting techniques, Straughn completely abandoned traditional art for a time to explore “spirit” art.

He cannot fully explain it. “I paint what I feel. Perhaps I paint from a force that inspires my brushstrokes and color options,” he said of the process.



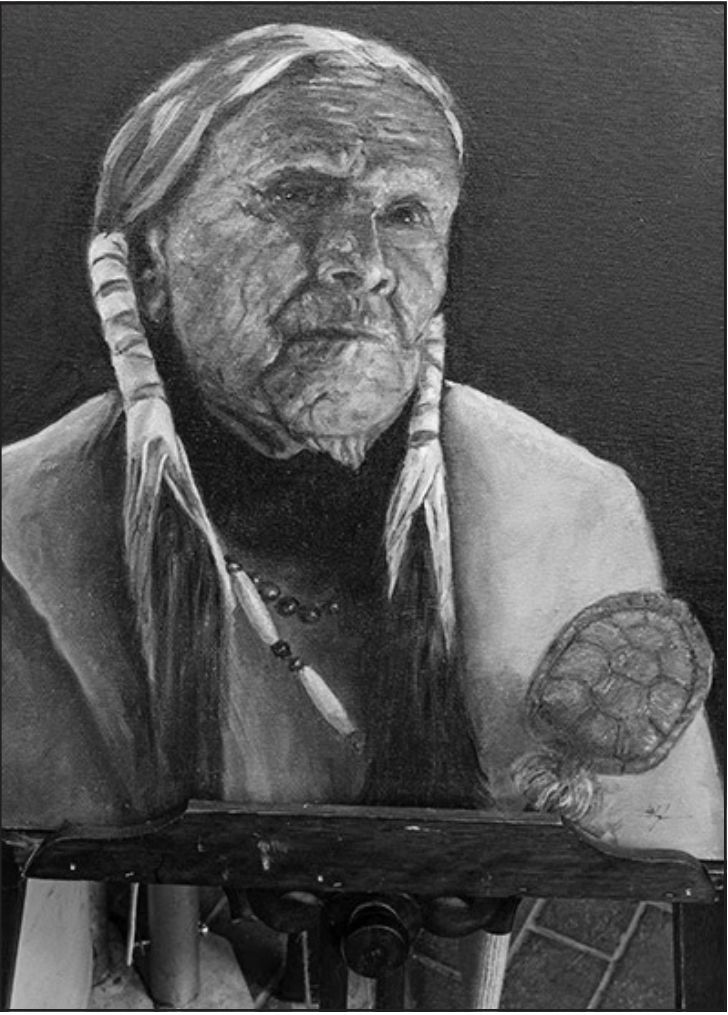

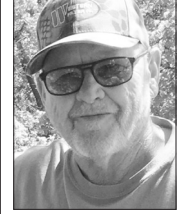

Weather response legislation on the way from Oklahoma delegation

With their home state of Oklahoma hit by dozens of tornadoes already in 2023, Rep. Frank Lucas (R-Cheyenne) and Rep. Stephanie Bice (R-Oklahoma City) have been pushing for weather-response related legislation.

Lucas helped pass the Weather Research and Forecasting Innovation Act of 2017, which authorized the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) to improve its weather forecasting and alerts. It also allowed NOAA to retrieve data from the private sector.

With multiple programs created by the WEATHER Act set to expire at the end of the 2023 Fiscal Year, Lucas is pushing hard for the Weather Act's reauthorization.

"At this point in time, we are still taking stakeholder input," Lucas said in an interview with Gaylord News. "We're working with our Democrat friends on the other side. We're jelling around the bullet points on that list right now, but I will say it's one of my highest priorities."

Meanwhile, Bice has reintroduced her own bill: The NOAA Weather Radio Modernization Act. This bill would direct NOAA to update outdated technology in its radio systems. When she reintroduced this bill back in March, Bice spoke highly of her legislation.

"Oklahomans are no stranger to severe weather, which is why the NOAA weather radio system is essential to keeping those in every part of our state and across the nation safe," Rep. Bice said via press release. "My legislation would modernize this

lifesaving service and ensure every citizen has reliable and effective access."

Bice's legislation passed through the House earlier this month, and Bice hopes that her colleagues in the Senate will approve her bill quickly.

"As the world becomes more digitized, we must ensure that older systems which safeguard life and property don't get left behind," Bice said. "I am grateful that the House passed this critical legislation, which seeks to provide every citizen with reliable and effective access to this lifesaving service. I hope my colleagues in the Senate will swiftly adopt this measure."

Oklahoma has already experienced 48 tornadoes this year, with F3 tornadoes passing just south of Norman through McClain and Pottawatomie on April 19. President Biden declared a major disaster and approved federal aid on April 24.

Updating the radio systems that NOAA uses would hopefully aid response efforts, particularly for areas of the state with poor cell phone service.

Bice and Lucas aren't the only members of Congress trying to pass weather legislation involving natural disasters. Another member of Congress from a state in Tornado Alley has put

forward his own bill involving NOAA and response to natural disasters: Sen. Roger Wicker (R-Miss).

Wicker wrote the Tornado Observation Research Notification and Deployment to Operations (TORNADO) Act and it covers similar ground as Bice's legislation.

Both bills call on NOAA to update how the organization will respond to disasters, with the TORNADO Act focusing more on data collection and forecasting.

"I introduced the TORNADO Act to help protect against future loss of life and property," Wicker said via press release. "Improved forecasting is the best way to give residents more time to seek shelter. I appreciate my colleagues for seeing the value in this legislation, and I look forward to earning the support of the rest of the Senate."

Wicker's TORNADO Act was cosponsored by members of both parties and passed through the House Commerce, Science and Transportation Committee.

Legal grow operations can cause their own types of problems.

Companies have been drawn to Oklahoma by the freedom to operate, but some are finding that the lack of regulation is affecting those who attempt to do things properly.

Investigators say evidence points to out-of-staters, including some from Colorado where regulation is stricter, coming to Oklahoma to run unregulated marijuana businesses.

Oklahoma has no cap on how many plants one operation can cultivate, and no limit on how many grows or dispensaries the state can handle. Colorado caps growers at a certain number of plants based on the number of medical marijuana card holders in the surrounding area.

According to the Marijuana Policy Project, nearly 376,000 Oklahomans hold medical marijuana cards – about 10 percent of the state's population and by far the largest percentage nationwide. Such demand necessitates large-scale cultivation. Just three years after legalization, the state has seven times more growers than Colorado and twice as many dispensaries, even though Colorado legalized the use of medical and recreational marijuana in 2012.

A grow license in Oklahoma costs just \$2,500, but state legislators recently passed a bill that will require growers to pay a \$50,000 security deposit.

Only 40 dispensaries are allowed in nearby Arkansas for its 78,425 medical marijuana card holders. Nearly a decade after medical marijuana was legalized in Connecticut, there are only four cannabis manufacturers and 18 dispensaries for the 41,292 active card holders.

Arkansas requires a licensing fee of \$100,000, along with \$500,000 performance or surety bonds that require growers to show proof of completing certain activities such as the creation of processing facilities and testing laboratories. An application costs \$10,000 in New York, with a \$200,000 registration fee.

Oklahoma decided to let

the market be more unencumbered. As a result, the state is now home to nearly 12,600 marijuana business licenses, including more than 8,600 growers and upwards of 2,300 dispensaries. That is more than double Colorado's number of recreational and medical retailers, and Oklahoma has 1.8 million fewer people.

Oklahoma County has 94 grows (one facility per 8,471 residents) while less populated counties such as Sequoyah and Carter have more than 200 operations, or one facility per 250 residents.

Some growers employ workers from impoverished regions of Mexico and China, who live and work in destitute, unsanitary conditions for below-average wages. Many send money home to their families.

Meanwhile, land prices are going for five times their value, with eager growers paying cash.

Late last month, after a fire at a facility in Logan County injured two people, state narcotics agents seized 4,000 to 5,000 pounds of marijuana product, according to The Oklahoman. Officials said it was an illegal factory operation.

With more than 200 dispensaries in Sequoyah County alone, the youth population has not been immune. Ray Watts, a Sequoyah County commissioner, said children as young as 12 have been caught at school with marijuana.

"It's been surreal," Watts said. "We're now having to use drug dogs in the elementary schools, something I never thought I would see."

In the past month, marijuana arrests in Sequoyah County for ages 12 and older increased 30 percent and are 76 percent higher than the national average.

The environment has been substantially impacted by the excess of illegal marijuana growers.

"It's detrimental to the community," Oklahoma Bankers Association President Adrian Beverage said. "The health and environmental risks are also present."

The OBA is working with the state legislature in hopes of finding a solution.

"The OBA is working to partner with environmentalist groups and lawmakers to craft legislation to put an end to these safety risks," Beverage said.

Cannabis crops consume heavy power loads for lighting, temperature, monitoring and hydration controls, which strains power grids. A typical cannabis plant consumes six gallons of water per day throughout the growing season. According to the bankers who deal with the aftermath of these failed grows, this has caused a water shortage in rural counties and severely impacted the environment.


As marijuana is still a Schedule I drug, it is difficult for banks to efficiently and legally accept payments from known dispensaries, even if it is considered "medical."

The American Bar Association says marijuana-related businesses may feel as if their revenues bear a mark of condemnation, as many have struggled to find a bank prepared to offer basic financial services.

Marijuana's peculiar legal status as a nationally forbidden controlled substance that is lawful in an increasing number of states is putting banks across the nation in a difficult spot. Many are cautious of potentially breaching federal anti-money laundering and other regulations by transacting the earnings of federally illegal marijuana enterprises, restricting the access of marijuana-related businesses.

"It is still considered illegal in a lot of aspects for us," Beverage said. "We're trying to work with the dispensaries and lawmakers, but it has proven difficult with the increase of illegal activity and violent crimes surrounding this business."

captain himself, “As a deputy, I’ve done everything that you can possibly do.”

“I was a field deputy, then I moved up to detective, then I was a school resource officer. I was promoted to lieutenant where I was in charge of the field deputies. I was the SWAT team commander for 13 years and now I’m the reserve captain,” Capt. Graham said.

However, in 2007, the captain took a leap and went into education and the result was anything but what he expected.

“It’s awesome to be a part of these young peoples’ lives. The people who graduate my class, all of them won’t be police officers, but they’re awesome,” he explained.

“We’ve got students going to the military, going to college, doing both, so being a part of these young peoples’ lives and giving them goals and plans to reach those goals is awesome,” he said.

The captain’s son, Sergeant Marcus Graham, is also a deputy in McClain County and said his dad’s passion for law enforcement is a big reason why he followed in his footsteps. “If my dad wasn’t a deputy, I probably wouldn’t be because I wouldn’t have been exposed to it,” Sgt. Graham said. “I’ve been involved in law enforcement for 45 years so I’ve seen quite a bit of it,” said McClain County Sheriff Landy Offerloer. “I think it’s pretty cool. \$2,728,900 in low-interest loans for businesses of all sizes, private nonprofits, homeowners and renters to assist in their recovery from the storms.

Businesses and residents may also be eligible for SBA disaster assistance to help repair or replace personal vehicles damaged or destroyed by the severe storms. Leased vehicles are also eligible for assistance to cover the uncompensated repair costs and deductibles. SBA disaster loans cover

losses not fully compensated by insurance or other resources. Survivors should not wait for an insurance settlement before submitting an SBA loan application. There is no cost to apply for an SBA disaster loan. If declined you may be referred back to FEMA for additional grant assistance.

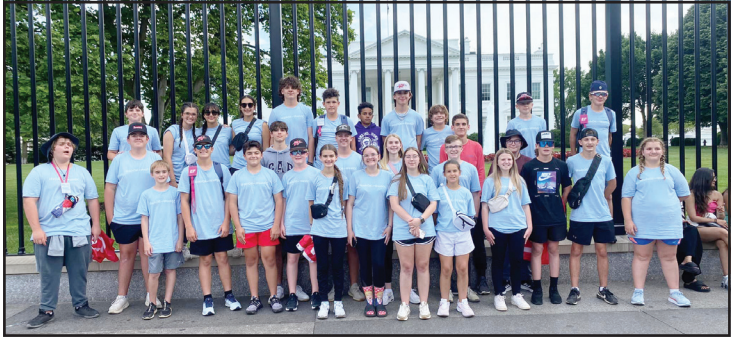

This past Sunday was Memorial Day, when we honor all those who have given their lives in defense of our country through the years since 1776. The Christian message that we attach to this day is the quote from John.

Why do we celebrate Pentecost? In Acts 2, it describes that Jesus’ followers were gathered together for the Feast of the Harvest (Pentecost). In Exodus 32:22, the Israelites were to “celebrate the Festival of Weeks with the firstfruits of the wheat harvest and the Festival of Ingathering at the turn of the year.” The Holy Spirit “invaded” the whole house where the followers were sitting during this celebration.
