Crews were filling in some holes they've dug with chat to provide drainage capabilities in the future. Pouring concrete will begin on Friday on both ends of the project on Main Street.

Main StreetScape update

Officials with Rudy Construction held their second weekly meeting about the Main StreetScape project at Purcell City Hall on Tuesday. They announced the following:

• On Friday they will begin pour-

ing curb and gutter concrete from both the east end of the project and from the west end of the project. Estimates are they can pour 300 feet per day.

• In about two weeks they will begin tearing out and pouring concrete up to the thresh hold of buildings. Businesses will not have access to their front doors for a three-day period. Project administrators said they will give businesses 48 hours of notice before their front is inaccessible.

• They said after the sidewalk is taken out they will pour the new sidewalk very early in the morning with 24 hours needed for it to dry before it can support traffic.

FEMA may bridge insurance gaps

Oklahoma residents affected by the April 19-20 severe weather, straightline winds and tornadoes are urged to file with their insurance company before registering for assistance from FEMA.

If your home is uninsured or underinsured, FEMA may be able to help you fill in some gaps in your recovery. FEMA cannot duplicate any benefit you may receive from your insurance.

FEMA does not cover an insurance deductible as a disaster-related cost, but may help you with uninsured or underinsured necessary expenses or serious needs.

When applying for assistance, you should tell FEMA about any insurance proceeds or any denials. You should also provide your insurance policy number or the agent and/or the company name. If you are unable to locate important documents, FEMA specialists will help you identify other ways to verify information.

There were no public comments at either budget approvals Monday night for Purcell Municipal Hospital or the City of Purcell.

The hearings were called for by Mayor Graham Fishburn at the Community Room of the Purcell Police Service Build-

Both were held prior to the city council's regular June monthly meeting.

A complete breakdown of the city's 2023-2024 fiscal year budget is in another story in this week's Purcell Register.

The hospital is projected in the coming fiscal year to take in \$9,325,047 in revenue and have expenses estimated at \$10,200,148. Non-operating revenue is estimated to be \$131,549 while the net is estimated to

be a negative \$743,552, according to hospital officials.

During the meeting PMH CEO Chris Wright addressed the council requesting a loan of \$400,000. It breaks down to \$100,000 each month from June through September to

allow the hospital to meet financial obligations during l e a n revenue times. h e

city had previously already loaned the hospital \$600,000.

Wright said the \$1 million will be repaid with proceeds from the sale of the old PMH facility.

During an executive session contracts were discussed for city manager Dale Bunn and city treasurer Victor Lohn.

Council approves \$34 million budget

After a public hearing Monday at the community room of the Purcell Police Services Building, Purcell's City Council approved a \$34,180,321 budget for fiscal year 2023-2024.

The move came during the council's regular June monthly meeting at the Community Room.

The budget includes nearly \$2.5 million for the police department. The total for the police department is \$2,472,438 while the budget for the fire department came in at \$1,606,301.

The council approved a budget of \$1,535,191 for





Update from the Capitol

The 2023 legislative session is complete, and we accomplished so much thanks to historic revenues and fiscal prudence in recent years that have left the state with record savings and one-time funds.

While it wasn't the smoothest session, we ended up passing a nearly \$13 billion state budget that will support our 60+ state agencies and the many vital services they provide for Oklahomans.

As always, education was the main focus with the Department of Education getting almost \$4 billion, which is a nearly 25 percent funding increase over the current fiscal year. We approved tiered teacher salary increases, ranging from \$3,000 to \$6,000 based on their years of experience.

Superintendent gets a failing grade

The total incompetence of Ryan Walters as State Superintendent of Public Instruction can best be summed up by school superintendents from around Oklahoma.

Macomb Superintendent Matt Riggs said, "What he has done through his entire approach to public life, from what I've seen, is create dragons for himself to slay."

Riggs said those dragons – leftist indoctrination, pornography and pushing terrorist teachers' unions - simply don't exist in a place like Macomb and probably most Oklahoma towns. "We have real problems but I don't see a point in bringing

those issues to Walters," Riggs said. Anadarko Superintendent Jerry McCormick said he hopes

Walters can turn his focus from the politics du jour to leading the people he serves. McCormick previously worked with Walters at McAlester

Public Schools.

"I like Ryan. I still consider him a friend. But the issue we have, I believe with him, is his lack of experience in the role of leadership. He's never been a principal. He's never been an administrator. He's never been in charge," McCormick said.

Walters claims to have met with every superintendent either in person or via Zoom.

However, a recent survey tells a different story. According to results, 190 superintendents of the 509 school

districts in the state responded to the survey, with 42 saying they had met Walters in a large group and 16 in a small group. A total of 150 respondents reported zero minutes with Walters. Moreover, respondents said a Zoom meeting earlier this

year was about 15 minutes long and superintendents were not allowed to speak.

No questions in a chat box were addressed.

A similar Zoom meeting was held in May with the same ormat but was even shorter than the first one and the chat box was disabled.

Walters' continued silence lets superintendents know they are on their own.

Keeping the commitment to fiscal responsibility

Congressman Tom Cole

The Fiscal Responsibility Act, which was just signed into law, will do just what it is named to do – restore fiscal sanity in Washington.

With Democrats in control of the presidency and the Senate, this bill is not only a good compromise, but also a great first step to get the government back on track and away from the out-of-control and inflationary spending Democrats and President Joe Biden have steamrolled through the past two and a half years.

Since taking office, President Biden and congressional Democrats have increased the 10-year spending trajectory by \$10 trillion, causing the United States to reach the statutory debt ceiling more quickly than expected.

Even after that, President Biden and Democrats refused any constraints to spending more and more money. Their needless delays to come to the table and work out a sensible and responsible deal to raise

our country in a vulnerable position.

However, by passing the Fiscal Responsibility Act, House Republicans are keeping the promise to the American people of cutting spending year-over-

This legislation lifts the debt ceiling through Jan. 1, 2025, while putting in place a series of fiscal reforms that will save taxpayers money. For the first time in history, we are pairing a debt ceiling increase with a year-over-year decrease in spending.

Spending less in fiscal year 2024 than in fiscal year 2023 is something that has never happened before and will be accomplished while preserving funding for our national defense and ensuring veterans get the care they need and deserve.

In addition, this legislation includes a provision that enacts the first-ever mechanism to limit new spending resulting from the executive branch's regulatory processes.

Largest education budget in state history

This year's education budget is the largest in state history. 43.9 percent of our budget is going to K-12 education and higher education.

K-12 education was appropriated \$3.97 billion in total for the next fiscal year. This is an increase of about \$1 billion, making it a 24.8 percent increase over Fiscal Year 2023.

Through our education package, which was signed into law last week, we increased annual appropriations to public schools by \$625 million. Of that money, \$500 million will go toward longevity-based pay raises and six weeks paid maternity leave for teachers, while the remaining \$125 million will and upgrades.

Our other funding increases to the State Dept. of Education included \$45 million for new textbooks and instructional materials and \$250,000 to equip all schools with inhalers.

Additionally, we invested \$1.4 million into school security, as well as an additional \$150 million in one-time monies for a school safety pilot program. We also sent \$10 million in onetime monies to a literacy program to help teachers learn best practices for teaching reading, as well as provide resources for students struggling or who may have a learning disability like dyslexia.

Wildlife expert say people do more harm than good for 'abandoned' deer fawns

• Oklahoma law prohibits without a wildlife rehabilita-

Experts advise that if you come across a fawn that is iniured, truly in trouble or causing a problem, contact your local game warden or call a wildlife

rehabilitator. A county-by-county list of wildlife rehabilitators and a statewide directory of game wardens are both available at the Oklahoma Department of Wildlife website at wildlifedepartment.com.

Since we passed our budget and ARPA bills in our concurrent special session, this gives us the opportunity to come back briefly in June to override any vetoes on those bills that we feel are necessary.

One bill we approved during session makes a major change to the medical marijuana industry.

Senate Bill 437 helps curb over-issuance of medical marijuana to minors. As a healthcare worker, I fully supported this bill because we still don't know the long-term effects of marijuana on brain

development.

The bill states that, for medical marijuana applicants under the age of 18, the two recommending physicians not be located at the same physical address.

It also says that at least one of the physicians confirms the minor has been under their routine care for at least a year. For minor patients seen by that physician only via telemedicine, they must have been a patient of that physician for at least five years.

SB437 also requires any physician recommending the use of and McClain Counties.





After marrying Joseph Monroe Henry on July 22, 1954, Shirley traveled with her husband around the United States during his 24 years

of service in the U.S. Army and Air Force. She stayed stateside with her daughters during most of Joe's multiple overseas deployments, including extended "temporary duty" assignments in Greenland and Thailand and during Joe's service in the Korean and Vietnam Conflicts.

In 1967, she joined Joe at Incirlik Air Base in Turkey in 1967 after traveling alone with her two young daughters to that country. Shirley and Joe settled in Bethel, Oklahoma, in 1973 after his retirement from the Air Force. They later moved to Shawnee, Oklahoma, where they both resided at 2321 North Broadway Street until Joe passed away in 2009. Shirley then moved to Virginia, where she resided with her daughters, Katherine and Karen Henry, her son-in-law William Welch, and her granddaughters Joanna and Julia Welch.

She finally located them at Saint Joseph's Hospital, and then checked on his daughter after connecting the caller with the treating physician. He wrote that "my anxieties over my child's welfare were eased through the efforts of this wonderful lady."

Shirley retired as a customer service representative in the Shawnee, Oklahoma, office on July 4, 1992 after 20 years of service with Southwestern Bell. She was a lifetime member of the Telephone Pioneers of America. While working, she attended Wayne Community College in Goldsboro, North Carolina.

She was a member of the Church of Christ, with her fondest memories of the Lakeview Church of Christ in Bethel and the Northridge Church of Christ in Shawnee, Oklahoma, where she was a member for more than 25 years. Both Shirley and Joe served as leaders of Girl Scout Cadet Troop 16 in the Coast Guard Counsel of North Carolina.

Shirley adored her granddaughters, who loved their Nana so much. She played a fierce game of Yahtzee, enjoyed watching the cardinals and goldfinches through her living room window, and shared many hours of conversation with family and friends. She greeted everyone with a warm smile, and continued to be kind and gracious throughout her life.

Shirley is survived by her daughters, son-in-law, and granddaughters; and by two sisters, Louise and Margaret; nieces, nephews, and cousins, and many more family members. Her older sister, Geri, and her younger brother, Don, predeceased her.

A service honoring Shirley's memory will be held at Arlington National Cemetery at a later date, where Shirley will be buried with her beloved husband during a private ceremony. How to manage insects and diseases in your own garden

long way in minimizing insect and disease problems in the garden. Enlist a holistic approach known as Plant Health Care to manage your ornamental and edible gardens. It starts with proper plant selection and care and ends with using the most eco-friendly controls when problems do occur.

Start by selecting plants suited to the growing conditions. Match your plants to the light, soil, and other growing conditions in your yard. You'll have healthier plants that require less ongoing care and are less prone to pests, helping to increase your gardening success.

Look for and purchase the most pest-resistant plants available. Garden phlox and bee balm are frequently attacked by powdery mildew. Purchase mildew-resistant varieties like Backlight with white flowers, Glamour Girl with hot coral pink blossoms, and the Ka-Pow series that comes in a variety of colors.

Look for mildew-resistant bee balm varieties like the Sugar Buzz series in shades of lavender, pink and red, and the compact Balmy series to reduce the risk of this disease.

Provide proper care through-

system better able to absorb help with diagnosing and treat-A bit of prevention goes a needed nutrients and water. Apply water directly to the soil and early in the morning to reduce the risk of disease and water loss to evaporation.

Mulch the soil surface with shredded leaves and evergreen needles to conserve moisture, the soil. This one task provides many benefits to you and your plants.

Avoid over-fertilization. Excess nitrogen promotes lush succulent growth that is more susceptible to insects and disease and may interfere with flowering and fruiting.

Check plants regularly and throughout the season for any signs of insects and disease. Look on the upper and lower surface of the leaves and along the stems. It is much easier to treat a small population of insects or pluck off a few diseased leaves than trying to control large pest populations.

Properly identify the pest. Most insects, over 97 percent, are good guys that pollinate our plants, eat insect pests, and help compost plant waste. Knowing the good from the bad and the harmful from those that are just annoying can save you time, money, and frustration.

And if control is needed, look for eco-friendly options. A thorough cleanup is often enough to reduce insect and disease problems to a tolerable level. Spraying plants with a strong blast of water suppress weeds, and improve to dislodge aphids and mites, knocking problem insects into a can of soapy water, or removing spotted leaves may be all that's needed.

> Use barriers like floating row covers to prevent damage from cabbage worms and bean beetles. University research has found that with proper timing these products can also help reduce the risk of squash vine borer, squash bugs, and cucumber bacterial wilt.

> If you opt for chemical control, look for an organic or the most eco-friendly product labeled for managing disease or insect pests. As always, read and follow label directions for the best and safest results.

> Enlisting a holistic approach allows you to work with nature to grow a beautiful and productive garden.

Roughly 1.2 million people in the U.S. live with the virus. Worldwide, the United Nations estimates that nearly 40 million people have HIV. More than half are female, and almost 5% are children. Left untreated, HIV typically leads to AIDS, which is almost always fatal.

Ahamed's lab at OMRF studies TGF beta 1, a protein that can be generated by blood platelets at levels almost 100 times higher than by other cell types in the body.

This contributes to several disorders, including cardiac

we will test all the HIV drugs available on the market – alone and in combination."

Ahamed hopes to discover a way to inhibit the TGF beta 1 release and cardiac fibrosis in people with HIV.

"Science has produced tremendous improvements in HIV therapies over the past three decades," OMRF Vice President of Research Courtney Griffin, Ph.D., said. "If Dr. Ahamed's hypothesis proves correct, it could lead to yet another major advancement for millions of people living with HIV."




Abandonment of Refrigerators and Iceboxes in Places Accessible to Children

Any person, firm, or corporation who abandons or discards in any place accessible to children any refrigerator, icebox, or ice chest of a capacity of 1-1/2 cubic feet or more which has an attached lid or door which may be opened or fastened shut by means of an attached latch, or who, being the owner, lessee, or manager of such place, knowingly permits such abandoned or discarded refrigerator, icebox, or ice chest to remain in such condition shall be deemed negligent as a matter of law and shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.





They evaluate most conditions using a VA Disability Benefits Questioner. Our organization uses the same type of VA Disabilities as evidence that supports a veterans claim for service connection of a disability or for an increased evaluation.
