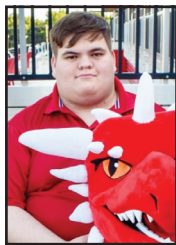

Deadly accident

The Oklahoma Highway Patrol reports a 20-year-old Wayne man was killed in a one vehicle accident in Payne June 17.

The OHP said Jason Layne Hoskins died when his 2019 Chevrolet Trax veered off the roadway striking a fence and overturning one complete time coming to rest on its passenger side.

Investigating Trooper Cummings said the accident occurred between midnight and 7:45 a.m. on 120th Street 150 feet east of Eastern Avenue.

Hoskins sustained injuries both internal and external to his trunk, Cummings said.

Assisting Cummings of the Cleveland/McClain County detachment of Troop A were LT Gottschalk, Trooper Davis of the Oklahoma County detachment of Troop A, as well as the McClain County Sheriff's Office, Wadley's EMS and the Payne Fire Department.

The accident remains under investigation.

June 23 deadline for filing

For assistance from FEMA after April 19 storm

Swimming Pools

Permits are required prior to installation of swimming pools. There is a \$19.50 fee for above-ground, \$15 for the city and \$4.50 for the state, and \$29.50 fee for in-ground, \$25 for the city and \$4.50 for the state. No permit is required for children's blow-up pools.

An outdoor swimming pool, including an in-ground, above-ground or on-ground pool, hot tub or spa, shall be surrounded by a barrier (fence) at which shall be at least 48 inches high.

According to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention, in 2009 children one to four years old have the highest drowning rates. Among children one to four years old who died from an unintentional injury, more than 30 percent died from drowning. Among children one to four years old, most drownings occurred

FSA accepting nominations for farmers and ranchers to serve on local county committees

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is now accepting nominations for county committee members for elections that will occur later this year.

Additionally, USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) is unveiling a new GIS tool to make it easier for producers to participate in the nomination and election processes for county committee members, who make important decisions on how federal farm programs are administered locally.

All nomination forms for the 2023 election must be post-marked or received in the local FSA office by Aug. 1, 2023.

"Producers serving on FSA county committees play a critical role in the day-to-day operations of the agency, and they serve as the eyes and ears for the producers who elected them," said FSA Administrator Zach Ducheneaux. "In order for county committees to be both effective and equitable

in their decision-making at the local level, they must reflect the full diversity of American agriculture.

"I am excited that we have another opportunity through this year's nominations and elections cycle to make our committees more inclusive, and in turn, better equipped to best serve all our customers. I encourage you to consider serving the farmers, ranchers and producers in your community on your local FSA county committee, and I thank you in advance for your public service," he said.

Elections will occur in certain Local Administrative Areas (LAA) for members. LAAs are elective areas for FSA committees in a single county or multi-county jurisdiction and they may include LAAs that are focused on an urban or suburban area.

Customers can locate their LAA through a new GIS locator tool available at fsa.usda.gov/elections.

"Based on feedback from stakeholders, including the USDA Equity Commission, we are unveiling this new tool to make it easier for producers to effectively participate in the process," Ducheneaux added.

Agricultural producers may be nominated for candidacy for the county committee if they:

- Participate or cooperate in a USDA program; and
- Reside in the LAA that is up for election this year.

A cooperating producer is someone who has provided information about their farming or ranching operation to FSA, even if they have not applied or received program benefits.

Individuals may nominate themselves or others and qualifying organizations may also nominate candidates.

USDA encourages minority producers, women and beginning farmers or ranchers to nominate, vote and hold office.

Cleveland County RWSG & SWMD No. 1 receives \$1,000,000 grant for water system improvements

The Cleveland County Rural Water, Sewer, Gas, and Solid Waste Management District No. 1 (District) received approval for \$1,000,000 in funding Tuesday from the Oklahoma Water Resources Board (OWRB) to improve the district's water infrastructure. Construction of upgrades and improvements to the water system will be financed by the Oklahoma American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) grant program along with \$245,433 in Cleveland County American Rescue Plan Act funds. The district will use these proceeds for projects to include the installation of water main loops, to construct a new water storage facility, install a new water well and repair the exist-

ing well, install approximately 12 miles of water main, and add approximately 170 water meters for new customers. These improvements will provide consistent water pressure to a section of current rate payers and expand water service to several small communities to the north of the district. Joe Freeman, chief of the OWRB's Financial Assistance Division, calculated that the district's customers will save an estimated \$1,529,300 compared to traditional financing. The ARPA grant program is administered by the OWRB with funding from the U.S. Department of the Treasury and appropriated through Senate Bill 13 and Senate Bill 429

for the Water and Wastewater American Rescue Plan Act grants program. This OWRB program has been structured to provide communities and other eligible entities financial resources necessary to address water and wastewater infrastructure needs within their systems. Since 1983 the Water Resources Board has approved over \$6.4 billion in loans and grants for water and wastewater infrastructure improvements throughout Oklahoma. "We are grateful to State Senator Jessica Garvin and State Representative Cynthia Roe for their continued support of our financial assistance programs," said Julie Cunningham, Executive Director of the OWRB.

OMRF discovery could lead to easier diagnosis of autoimmune disease

A discovery at the Oklahoma Medical Research Foundation is paving a path toward a more accurate and less intrusive diagnosis of Sjögren's disease, an autoimmune disorder affecting up to 4 million Americans. Currently, at least 30 percent of people suspected to have Sjögren's disease undergo a diagnostic lip biopsy because they lack a telltale biomarker found through a blood test, said OMRF scientist Darise Farris, Ph.D. "That biomarker has traditionally played a primary role in diagnosing the disease,"

Farris said. "Over time, we've determined that many people with Sjögren's don't test positive for it. This study confirmed that different biomarkers exist for many of those patients." In Sjögren's, immune cells mistakenly attack and destroy healthy cells in the glands that produce tears and saliva. Dry mouth and eyes are the most noticeable symptoms, but Sjögren's also can affect the blood vessels, lungs, liver, pancreas and brain. The disease occurs in all races and ethnicities but most commonly affects women over age 50.

Farris, who directs OMRF's Sjögren's Research Clinic, led a proof-of-concept study involving 126 volunteers diagnosed with Sjögren's, about half of whom lacked the previously known blood marker. In the blood samples of 65 participants without that known biomarker, the OMRF researchers found more than 12 new protein targets connected to this autoimmune disease. "What this suggests is that it is possible to discover new biomarkers for Sjögren's," Farris said. "It also suggests that we may ultimately be able to prevent thousands of people from undergoing a lip biopsy." "We're still trying to understand the essential nature of Sjögren's," said OMRF

in home swimming pools. One factor that influences drowning risk is lack of barriers, such as fencing, which prevent children from gaining access to the pool area without a caregiver's awareness. A four-sided isolation fence, separating the pool area from the house and yard, reduces a child's risk of drowning by 83 percent, compared to a three-sided property-line fencing.

dedicated members of the agricultural community serve on FSA county committees. The committees are made up of three to 11 members who serve three-year terms. Committee members are vital to how FSA carries out disaster programs, as well as conservation, commodity and price support programs, county office employment and other agricultural issues. Producers should contact their local FSA office today to register and find out how to get involved in their county's election, including if their LAA is up for election this year. To be considered, a producer must be registered and sign an FSA-669A nomination form. Urban farmers should use an FSA-669-A-3 for urban county committees. These forms and other information about FSA

county committee elections are available at fsa.usda.gov/elections. Election ballots will be mailed to eligible voters beginning Nov. 6, 2023.

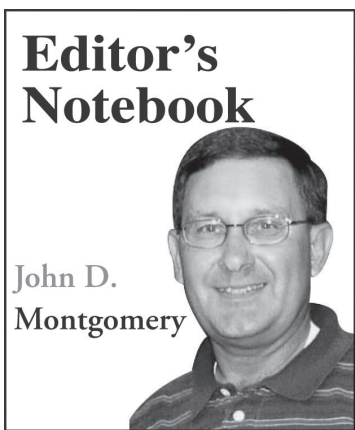

Update from the Capitol

Another area that saw incredible investment this session was public safety to better support our law enforcement agencies, courts, and victims. Together, our 14 public safety and judiciary agencies received nearly \$980 million.

The Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation (OSBI) received a 41 percent increase to their budget for expanded operations and staff, modernize their criminal history software, and create the Alauna Raffield Scholarship Fund to help cover the cost of OSBI trainings for law enforcement officers.

Among other critical needs, this will be used to increase funding by \$1 million for their Internet Crimes Against Children Unit (ICAC). This is one of 61 regional task forces nationwide that was started in 2006 to respond to the increasing number of children and teenagers using the internet and their exposure to predators and child pornography.

Oklahoma's ICAC Task Force is made up of OSBI agents and over 50 local, state,

and federal law enforcement affiliated agencies and prosecutorial entities statewide. This collaboration ensures all law enforcement agencies have the resources they need to develop effective and sustainable responses to online child victimization and child pornography.

The Alcoholic Beverage Laws Enforcement Commission received a substantial revenue boost as well to cover much-needed software updates and create a program to collect and store confiscated alcohol from local police departments, which will greatly help those departments.

The district courts received a 13 percent budget increase to better serve the public. Just over \$1.9 million will increase daily jury duty pay to \$50, giving Oklahoma the highest rate in the nation for this important public service.

Around \$4.6 million will be invested to create the new statewide Family Representation and Advocacy Program to provide better legal representa-

tion for children and parents in the child welfare system. This will help get children out of state custody more quickly.

Parents who lose custody of their children have the right to an attorney and this program will ensure the state has more well-trained lawyers to get through these cases faster, as well as provide more investigators and expert witnesses. Funds will also go to increase court reporter pay, increase staff for Oklahoma and Cleveland Counties, and cover judicial training programs.

The District Attorneys Council (DAC) is in line to get \$3.5 million to further expand their victim services. DAC provides training and support for the 27 elected District Attorneys around the state, along with their staff. They work to seek justice, promote public safety, and ensure the voices of crime victims are heard.

Finally, the Council on Law Enforcement Education and

Reining in regulation

While back in the Fourth District of Oklahoma, one of the top concerns I hear from constituents is the crushing weight of increasing overreach, overregulation and red tape from the federal government, which does not allow families and small businesses to flourish and succeed.

Unfortunately, the Biden Administration has not taken note, and while forcing its progressive policies on the nation, President Joe Biden and Democrats have instead abused regulatory power and have produced egregious regulation after regulation.

The Constitution clearly articulates that Congress holds lawmaking power. However, President Biden and his administration have circumvented Congress over and over again.

In fact, President Biden finalized regulations adding more than \$200 billion in new regulatory costs in his first year as president, which was more than quadruple the costs added during President Barack Obama's first year, and more than \$1 trillion in new regula-

tions in 2022.

To reassert the legislative authority of Congress, last week House Republicans passed the Regulations from the Executive in Need of Scrutiny (REINS) Act of 2023. In an era of expanding government regulations, this legislation puts the American people first by requiring congressional approval for major and costly regulations, offering a necessary check on the regulatory state.

This legislation would define a "major rule" as any federal rule or regulation that may result in an annual effect on the economy of \$100 million or more, a major increase in costs or prices for consumers, individual industries, government industries, government agencies or geographic regions or significant adverse effects on competition, employment, investment, productivity, innovation or the ability of U.S.-based enterprises to compete with foreign-based enterprises.

Excessive and burdensome regulations hinder economic growth and innovation. The REINS Act recognizes the detrimental impact of regulatory overreach and offers a busi-

ness- and economy-friendly solution. By subjecting major regulations from unelected officials to congressional approval, this bill gives the power back to the American people and those they elect.

Members of Congress will be able to evaluate the potential economic consequences and ensure that proposed regulations strike the right balance between protecting public interests and promoting economic growth.

An overregulated United States is bad for families, businesses and the economy, and federal agencies currently wield significant power to shape policy without sufficient public scrutiny.

The American people who foot the bill while complying with these excessive regulatory burdens deserve congressional debate and consideration – not an unnamed bureaucrat in an agency office unilaterally passing on unfunded mandates.

The REINS Act is a crucial step towards reining in excessive regulations, promoting economic growth, protecting individual liberties and ensuring the American people are heard in the regulatory process.

Don't vote for a number

Are President Joe Biden and former President Donald Trump too old to be President of the United States?

The answer to this question varies and depends on your perspective.

This perspective hinges on your expectations of America's President. Should he or she be able to run up steps? What about walking down the steps from Airforce One without looking down? This is a good trick.

We have to be careful about hanging a number on the maximum age to serve as President. Eighty may be too old, but maybe it's not.

I heard Billy Graham preach when he was 80 and he came on the stage talking and preaching like a dynamo. There was nothing inarticulate or incoherent about him.

There are millions of eighty-year-old plus people in this nation who live very active lives and have a lot to contribute to our country.

However, we have to be realistic there are millions of 80-year-old Americans who are barely alive, their health is terrible. Many cannot care for themselves let alone care for a nation.

Furthermore, there are also millions of Americans between 36 and 70 who are not mentally or physically healthy enough to hold down the world's number one job.

Each individual must be evaluated by each American. We have to look at all of the candidates circumspectly. Do they have the experience? Do they have the knowledge and skills? Are they articulate?

Does the candidate demonstrate leadership skills that we need to lead this country forward to better times? Will the candidate be a strong presence on the world stage and be a peacemaker and leader?

Seventy million Americans do not want a President who is going to cut Social Security or Medicare benefits. Millions of Americans over 50 do not want the Social Security retirement age raised from 67 to 70. No one in this age bracket is going to support a candidate who infers either of the changes.

The full benefits age should never have been raised from 65 to 67. Millions of Americans will pay into Social Security all their lives but never make it to age 67 and thus never collect a penny.

Of course, these people can collect a smaller amount if they

want to retire at 62 and live on much less money. This is not a viable option for many.

Don't vote for someone just because they are young and vigorous. Youth is attractive and often charismatic but youth sometimes make mistakes.

Don't vote for someone just because they are 80. Hopefully they are wise and very experienced but may be on the verge of becoming too frail.

Look at the whole person. Age is a number. Look at what he or she is able to bring to the job and potentially do to help and lead our nation.

It's a big decision and don't make it all about a number.

Medical marijuana regulation

Our regular legislative session wrapped up at the end of May, and I want to highlight a few of the big policy bills that became law this year, with a particular focus on medical marijuana this week.

House Bill 2095 modifies several components of law regarding medical marijuana licensing, regulations enforcement and business operations. The licenses of any medical marijuana business licensee found to have intentionally not paid the tax on retail medical marijuana sales are to be revoked, and the revoked party is prohibited from being able to receive any other type of medical marijuana business license issued by the Oklahoma Medical Marijuana Authority (OMMA).

Additionally, no more than one medical marijuana commercial grower license may be issued for any one property, and the measure caps 1,000 active medical marijuana commercial grower licenses in circulation.

OMMA is authorized to enter into agreements with other state agencies to enforce laws regulating medical marijuana. OMMA and other entities that receive a complaint concerning noncompliance by a medical marijuana research licensee or a medical marijuana education facility licensee, may conduct unannounced, on-site inspections beyond the required biannual inspections.

The authority is also required to refer all complaints alleging criminal activity to appropriate state or local law enforcement.

Lastly, the measure extends the moratorium on processing and issuing new medical mari-

juana business licenses to 2026.

House Bill 2281 prohibits the use of a "straw person" or "straw party" to purchase, or conspire to purchase any license or registration required to distribute, possess, prescribe, or manufacture any controlled dangerous substance on behalf of any other person.

Senate Bill 813 sets the initial, nonrefundable fee for a medical marijuana processor license, as well as all submissions of grower applications, renewal processor applications, and renewal dispensary applications at \$2,500.

OMMA is authorized to operate a quality assurance laboratory for the purpose of conducting compliance testing of medical marijuana businesses, and requires the lab be used to provide recommendations for:

- All equipment and standards to be utilized by licensed medical marijuana testing laboratories;
- Standardized operating procedures when extracting and testing medical marijuana products;
- Samples taken from medical marijuana licensed businesses;
- The utilization of secret shoppers; and
- Analysis of any compounds that are not among the targeted analytes and are unknown, unidentified, tentatively identified, or known and injurious to human health if consumed.

In our special session, we approved Senate Bill 18X, which establishes the Medical Marijuana Tax Fund with all monies accruing in the fund to be appropriated at the discre-

tion of the Legislature to fund substance abuse programs and common education, including but not limited to funding Redbud School Grants.

Although our regular legislative session has wrapped up, work continues. Last week, I attended a Women in Government conference in Annapolis, Maryland, where we heard from policy experts and visited with other female legislators from across the country.

It was one of the most informative legislative conferences I've ever attended and a great opportunity to hear about new policies and ideas from other states to inspire us here in Oklahoma.

As part of the conference, we got to tour the Maryland State Capitol, which is the country's oldest capitol still in use today. We stood in the original room where President George Washington delivered his resignation speech and saw his handwritten speech notes as well.

While in Annapolis, I traveled briefly to Washington, D.C. to meet with Sen. Markwayne Mullin. Unfortunately, Sen. James Lankford wasn't available, but I did get to visit with his wife, Cindy, for a while.

Mazeroski on his World Series winning homer - "Dad would have loved it"

The Pittsburgh Steelers have won six Super Bowls, and the Pittsburgh Penguins, five Stanley Cups. But no matter what the future may hold, for sheer ecstasy among Pittsburgh fans, nothing will ever top the October 13, 1960, 3:36 p.m. thrills.

At that instant, the Pittsburgh Pirates' Bill Mazeroski took his place in the batter's box against the New York Yankees' fifth hurler of the day, Ralph Terry.

The World Series had been back-and-forth, and the seventh game, a see-saw contest, knotted at 9-9. Terry's first delivery was high and away, but his second offering, "a high fat one," as Maz recalled, came in right down the middle. Maz knocked it over the left field fence.

Yogi Berra turned to watch it sail away, and a resigned Mickey Mantle, who had drifted over from center field, jogged slowly toward the dugout. The mighty Yankees, heavy betting favorites featuring a roster studded with future Hall of Famers, lost the game 10-9 and the series 4-3.

After the game, in an interview with Associated Press reporter Ross Grimsley, Maz said: "Dad would have loved it — I only wish he could have been here today."

In 1958, Maz's father, Louis, died from lung cancer. As Maz spoke, his eyes filled with tears, in part from the joy of bringing the Pirates their first World Series title in 35 years and partly from memories of Louis who had always hoped to play big league baseball.

The Cleveland Indians were ready to sign Louis who scouts labeled an outstanding prospect. But when Louis lost a foot in a coal mining accident, he put his hopes and ambitions into developing his only son's skills.

From his early childhood, Maz remembered tossing a baseball around and swinging a bat under his father's watchful eyes. Maz told Grimsley that his Dad was resolute that he become a major league ballplayer, and Louis worked

with Maz to achieve the goal.

Sacrifices Louis made on behalf of his son paid off. By the time Maz reached the Pirates' top minor league franchise, the Hollywood Stars, every Pacific Coast League manager recognized the young second baseman as a can't-miss prospect.

All agreed that they had never seen an infielder more skilled at turning the double play. The consensus among seasoned veterans who have seen them come and go for decades is that Maz is baseball's best-ever fielding second baseman. The Pirates' second sacker who followed Maz, Dave Cash, said his predecessor rarely made an error and never made a bad play.

Maz won eight Gold Glove Awards, was named to 10 All-Star teams, and turned more double plays than any second baseman before or since.

Post-scripts to Maz's electrifying homer: in 1962, Ralph Terry redeemed himself. He won 23 games and got the final out in the Yankees' World Series seventh game win over the San Francisco Giants. With two runners in scoring position, and two outs in the bottom of the ninth, Terry got Willie McCovey to line out to second to preserve the Yankees 1-0 win.

Across the victorious Yankees' clubhouse, Joe DiMaggio shouted to Terry, the series MVP: "Hey Ralph, you can forget about that ninth inning in Pittsburgh now." After his retirement, Terry competed in 106 PGA tournaments and had five top-ten finishes.

In 2001, the Cooperstown

Hall of Fame inducted Maz. His two-minute, tear-filled speech is memorable for its rambling, choked-up delivery. Maz, long on skill and short on talk, thanked everyone in the Cooperstown 20,000-strong audience who made the trip to "listen to all this crap."

Every year since 1993, on October 13, the Pirates faithful make a pilgrimage to the long-ago Forbes Field location where a portion of the brick center-field wall still stands, sacred ground to Bucco fans. The game is rebroadcast; the gathered throng reacts excitedly as if fans were hearing the unfolding innings for the first time.

The Pirates are the only MLB team to hold an annual celebration for past World Series champions. On September 5, 2010, on Maz's 74th birthday, the Pirates unveiled a 12-foot-tall statue of him outside of PNC Park, depicting the player circling the bases after hitting his momentous home run.

With his father's guiding hand, Maz reached unimaginable heights from his humble childhood in Wheeling, West Virginia, where he grew up in a one-room shack without electricity and indoor plumbing. Maz, looking back on his early hard life, attributed his success to his father's determination.

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Make gardening with kids enjoyable

Gardening is good for the mind, body, and spirit. It is also good for the youngsters in our lives. Research shows gardening helps relieve stress, improve focus, positively impacts mood and psychological well-being, builds a sense of confidence, and more.

Look for creative ways to get children involved in gardening. Tap into other interests or skills like art, reading, writing, insects, math, and computers if you need to persuade reluctant participants into growing plants.

Include lots of colors and unique plants that kids will love. Crested celosia resembles brains, making it a good choice for the zombie fans in the group. Eyeball plant (*Acemella oleracea*), balloon plant (*Gomphocarpus physocarpus*) with its hairy inflated seedpods, snake plant, and kangaroo paws (*Anigozanthos favidus*) are a few to consider.

Gardeners of all ages will appreciate the popcorn plant (*Senna didymobotrya*) with its buttered popcorn-scented leaves or bat-faced cuphea and the hummingbirds it will attract.

Consider adding features that make the garden a fun space to visit. There is a reason bean teepees, sunflower houses, and tunnels in the garden have remained popular with kids of all ages for decades. Or grow a garden shaped like a slice of pizza planted with all the key ingredients or a salsa garden. Everyone will benefit when using freshly harvested ingredients to create these dishes.

A pot or flat of grass makes a nice field for superheroes and a lawn for dolls. A bare patch of soil is perfect for digging, driving cars and trucks, or sculpting hills and valleys. All these build skills that can be applied to future gardening efforts.

Plant some salad radishes that are ready to harvest in 25 to 30 days. This will help keep the kids interested in the garden when waiting for the tomatoes, beans, and other vegetables to ripen. Call it harvesting when

you are thinning the radish planting. Use these greens as a snack or in a salad. Harvesting and eating is more fun for all of us than just thinning the excess plants.

Use rainy days to create plant labels from paint sticks or stones. Paint individual words on some of the stones and place them in the garden. Let children leave messages for each other or write poetry. Or repurpose pickle jars into garden treasure jars. Have children decorate the jars. Then you fill the jars with messages or treasures before hiding them in the garden.

Explore ways to reuse and recycle landscape trimmings. Put twigs to use creating small-scale wattle fences for a fairy, gnome, or zombie garden. This is great practice for building a larger-scale wattle fence for the garden.

Go on a bug hunt to see who is living in your garden, yard, or neighborhood. Look for good bugs like lady beetles that eat

plant-damaging aphids and bees that pollinate our flowers. Then log what you find in a backyard journal.

Gentle guidance, realistic expectations, and age-appropriate activities will help get kids excited about gardening. The gardens they create and the plants they grow are often amazing but more importantly, it is the experience of growing together that makes it worthwhile.

Elizabeth Perigo Cantrell

Funeral services for Elizabeth Perigo Cantrell, 99, of Purcell were held Saturday, June 17, 2023 at Trinity United Methodist Church in Purcell. Interment was at Hillside Cemetery in Purcell under the direction of the Wilson-Little Funeral Home in Purcell.

Mrs. Cantrell passed away Thursday June 15, 2023 surrounded by her family.

She was born September 15, 1923 in Paris Texas. She was the eighth of 11 children born to William and Elizabeth Beaver. Her family farmed southwest of Wayne, Okla.

When Elizabeth was 12 years of age, the family moved to Dallas, Texas. There she attended Wilmer Hutchins High School, where she met a young man named Alvie William Perigo. They were married May 30, 1938 in Pauls Valley, Okla. They had four children, Bobby, Carol, Nancy and Sherri, who were all born in Dallas, Texas.

Elizabeth and Alvie “Bud” both worked in the garment industry. They decided one day, that they would try the manufacturing aspect of the business themselves. So, in 1961 the company was founded and named Sherri Classics Inc. The street where the factory was located still has the name “Sherri Classics Blvd.” They hired a young designer JoAnn Weigel, who had just graduated from the Women’s University in Denton, Texas. She was the only designer at this time. Later, they found one of their employees had designing skills. She was Virginia Millsap Schell.

Samples were made and taken to Dallas, Texas, where the buying offices were located for Sears and JC Penney Company. They sold lots of different styles and they were shipped to all of the Penney’s stores in the United States. They traveled to New York, South and North Carolina to purchase fabrics.

Alvie “Bud” Perigo passed October 28, 1971 after a short illness. Elizabeth and her children with their spouses continued the family business until 1973 when she retired. She was named Businesswoman of the Year in 1972 by the Purcell Chamber of Commerce. They were long-time members of Trinity United Methodist Church in Purcell, Okla.

The toll-free telephone lines operate from 6 a.m. to 10 p.m. CDT seven days a week. If you use video relay service (VRS), captioned telephone service or others, give FEMA your number for that service.

The June 23 deadline also applies to applications for low-interest disaster loans from the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA).

SBA is the federal government’s primary source of money for the long-term rebuilding of disaster-damaged private property.

SBA helps businesses of all sizes, private nonprofit organizations, homeowners and renters fund repairs or

rebuilding efforts and cover the cost of replacing lost or disaster-damaged personal property.

FEMA’s Housing Assistance and Other Needs Assistance grants for medical, dental, and funeral expenses do not require individuals to apply for an SBA loan.

However, applicants referred to SBA must complete and submit an SBA loan application to be considered for additional forms of disaster assistance.

The South Central district had one injury and only six lost days, which is the best performance of any division in the past year. Total accidents, accident severity and lost work days are all taken into consideration in determining the award winner.

Wildflowers have created stunning color on Oklahoma’s roadways

Wildflowers have created stunning color on Oklahoma’s roadways, turnpikes and toll roads this spring.

Roadways are spectacular with Indian Paintbrush, Gaillardia, Plains Coreopsis, Showy Primrose, and other native plants creating beautiful splashes of color.

Color Oklahoma with Wildflowers is a committee of the Oklahoma Native Plant Society, and it can help bring these beautiful native flowers to your cities or towns. Color Oklahoma offers matching grants for cities/municipalities, organizations or groups to plant wildflower seeds across Oklahoma.

“Application forms are

available on our website, www.ColorOklahoma.com,” according to Color Oklahoma chairman, Monica Bartling.

“An important note is the organizations don’t plant the seeds, but they provide the matching funds to purchase the wildflower seeds. The Oklahoma Department of Transportation (ODOT) or Oklahoma Turnpike Authority (TPA) plants the flowers each fall on roadways they maintain. Color Oklahoma purchases the native wildflower seeds for the planting and works with the local entity that matches the grant to determine the number of seeds needed and the best planting area for a successful

planting.”

Grant applications for the 2023 fall planting cycle are due to Color Oklahoma by July 31, 2023, and grants will be awarded in August for Fall 2023 planting cycles.

“The Color Oklahoma team is eager to work with you on your application and can walk you through each step of the process,” Bartling stated. “For instance, you may not have access to info on the number of acres in your proposed planting area or how many seeds you should purchase for the site.

June 25, 2023 is the twelfth Sunday in Ordinary Time. Matthew 10:26-33 is the Gospel reading.

Here are verses 26 and 27: ‘So do not be afraid of them. Everything now covered up will be uncovered, and everything now hidden will be made clear. What I say to you in the dark, tell in the daylight; what you hear in whispers, proclaim from the housetops.’

Jesus and his disciples had plenty of reasons to be fearful. But in America today, it is unlikely any of us will be tortured or killed for our belief in God. However, we are still fearful.

As Msgr. Joseph Pelligrino put it: “we should respect God, reverence God, and be infinitely more concerned with fulfilling the Law of God than with the way others might respond to our Christianity. There are many times that we fear what others are saying or thinking about us.

Front-Porch Gospel: Show me a man’s treasure!

Good week to all! Welcome to the “front porch.”

It is one of those scriptures that make you stop and think: “Where your treasure is,” says the Lord, “there will your heart be also.”

That powerful thought took on greater meaning a quarter of a century ago when I heard Mr. Georgie Hogland – an eloquent Lubbock, Texas preacher – tell the story of when his daughter Kathy was in an old red-brick hospital in Lubbock. That red-brick building took on more significance than any other similar building in Lubbock for one simple reason: His daughter was in that building—that is, his treasure was there.

As he spoke that Sunday morning, I remembered our own story.

In 1985 – when my son Mal was five – he had to have surgery on his palate. I remember distinctly how happy and gleeful he was the morning of the surgery, not fully understanding the impact of what was about to happen – not only of the surgery but the aftermath of having his little arms in restraints so he would not disturb the stitches, and having to eat out of a dropper or a straw for a time. He had no idea of that.

That was part of the reason when the white-clad nurses wheeled him to surgery that morning, I went to the nearest secluded place I could find, to be alone. You understand.

The next day – Mal still in the hospital – I had to leave for

Tribal win: Native children to stay with Native families, Supreme Court rules

A preference for Native American families adopting Native children was preserved after the Supreme Court on Thursday upheld a landmark Indigenous law.

In a decisive 7-2 ruling involving a Fort Worth family the court upheld terms of the Indian Child Welfare Act, commonly known as ICWA, adopted by Congress in 1978 with only Justices Clarence Thomas and Samuel Alito dissenting.

Justice Amy Coney Barrett delivered the opinion of the court with John G. Roberts, Jr., Sonia Sotomayor, Elena Kagan, Neil Gorsuch, Brett Kavanaugh, and Kentaji Brown Jackson joining Barrett on the majority side.

Gorsuch said the ruling secures the right for Indian families to raise their families as they please and Indian children to grow in their culture.

“Often, Native American tribes have come to this Court seeking justice only to leave with bowed heads and empty hands. But that is not because this court has no justice to offer them,” Gorsuch said in the 133 page ruling.

“Our Constitution reserves for the Tribes a place – an enduring place – in the structure of American life. It promises them sovereignty for as long as they wish to keep it,” he wrote.

Vice President Kamala Harris said she has seen firsthand how essential this law is.

“For centuries, Native children were torn away from their families and their communities. These acts were not only violations of the basic human rights of those children and their families but also an attack on the very existence of Tribal Nations,” Harris said. “President Biden and I will continue to fight to protect Native families, children and communities. And we will continue to stand with Tribal Nations in defense of Tribal sovereignty.”

Alito criticized the Supreme Court majority for violating one of the most basic laws of logic that Congress’ power over Indian Affairs is “plenary” but not “absolute.”

But Oklahoma Rep. Tom Cole (R, Moore) and Rep. Sharice Davids (D, Kansas), the co-chairs of the Congressional Native American Caucus, said the Supreme Court made the right decision.

“This landmark decision rightly upholds protections for Native children and reaffirms the sovereignty rights of tribal governments,” the two said in a joint statement. “We applaud the Supreme Court in rejecting those challenges and standing with Native American children and their right to remain in their own cultures.”

Cherokee Nation Principal Chief Chuck Hoskin, Jr. said it was a major victory for not only the Cherokee Nation, but many tribes across the United States.

“We hope this decision will lay to rest the political attacks aimed at diminishing tribal sovereignty and creating instability through Indian law that have persisted for too long,” Hoskin said.

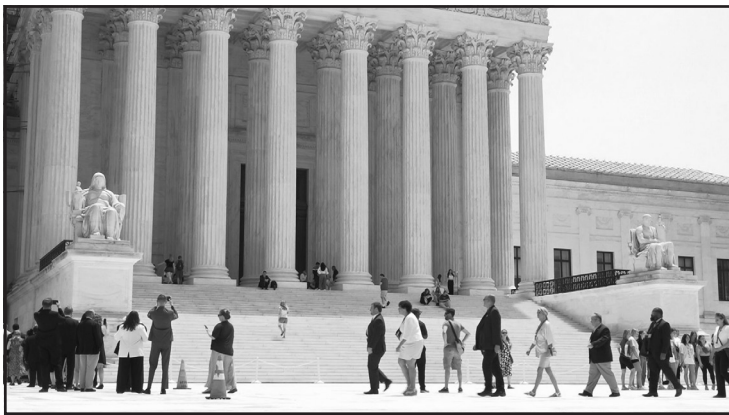
“The Court once again demonstrated that it understands the legitimacy of ICWA and what it means for tribes, families, and children. ... the justices have landed on the right side of history,” he said.

Choctaw Nation Chief Gary Batton joined Hoskin and said he is glad the Supreme Court recognized the benefits of ICWA allowing the law to stand.

The case was filed after a 10 month old Navajo child was placed with Chad and Jennifer Brackeen of Fort Worth.

The child, whose mother was Navajo and father was Cherokee, fell under the definition of an “Indian child” with the child being “a member of an Indian tribe” or “the biological child of a member of an Indian tribe.”

New Mexico’s Navajo Nation protested the Brackeen

adoption and found tribal members in New Mexico for the child but the Brackeens fought the tribe in state court urging the court to keep the child with the only parents the child knew.

After the court ruled against the Brackeens, Texas Department of Family and Protective Services almost took the child, but the Brackeens obtained an emergency stay of the transfer. Eventually, the Navajo family the Navajo Nation had found in New Mexico withdrew and the Brackeens were allowed to adopt the boy. But their efforts to adopt the boy’s sister could now be in doubt because of the court’s ruling.

The family told ABC News Thursday that it was “crushed” by the ruling.

Deb Haaland, the Secretary of the Department of Interior, released a statement less than two hours after the case was decided. She said it is a welcome affirmation to what people on both sides of the political aisle have been doing for four decades.

“For nearly two centuries, federal policies promoted the forced removal of Indian children from their families and communities through boarding schools, foster care, and adoption. Those policies were a targeted attack on the existence of Tribes, and they

inflicted trauma on children, families and communities that people continue to feel today,” Haaland said.

“Congress passed the Indian Child Welfare Act in 1978 to put an end to those policies. The Act ensured that the United States’ new policy would be to meet its legal and moral obligation to protect Indian children and families, and safeguard the future of Indian Tribes,” she said.

Senate majority leader Chuck Schumer (D – NY) said tribal sovereignty was affirmed with the ruling.

“The Supreme Court upheld the Constitutional right of tribal sovereignty. For hundreds of years, indigenous communities have fought for their very existence, and today is nothing short of a momentous day that ensures that indigenous children maintain a connection to their culture,” Schumer said.

As an example, while shopping at our local Home Depot Store last week the items I wanted to purchase are now behind steel cages under lock and key. All of us have watched the news showing the smash and grab behavior of people in California cities and thought that won't happen here. Looks like all of us are going to suffer from the behavior of those who believe they are entitled to a paycheck without working for it.

Some branches of our military were only able to meet 75 percent of their recruitment goals during 2022 which shows there is a problem with our society in general.

The number of veterans and their families who are having financial difficulties continues to increase as the cost of living does. We are working to assist as many of them as possible in a timely manner. We are training new volunteers daily who will help us to meet the needs of the men and women who have served in our military. As always, we encourage you to consider being a volunteer at our organization helping us to improve the lives of veterans and their families.

As our system is digital, volunteers have the option to work from home or at our location using our computers. Please consider helping us to help our veterans and their families.

We are starting to have more veterans and surviving spouses who are going to be eligible for VA benefits based on the New Pact Act that added presumptive exposure to Agent Orange for Veterans who served in the following countries during the Vietnam Era.

Veterans who served in parts of Thailand, Laos, Cambodia, Johnson Island and Guam are on the list. When the Pact Act was approved in January 2023 there will be tens of thousands

more veterans who are now eligible for service connection of any of the presumptive diseases caused by Agent Orange exposure.

Some of the presumptive conditions are Bladder Cancer, Hypertension, Hodgkin's Disease, a type of cancer that affects the Liver, Chronic Lymph Cell Leukemia, Multiple myeloma, prostate Cancer, Respiratory Cancer including Lung cancer, AL amyloidosis, Chloracne, Diabetes Type 2, Hypothyroidism, Ischemic heart disease, Parkinson's disease, Parkinsonism and MGUS with several other diseases.

Veterans who are diagnosed with any of those and served in Vietnam or one of the new presumptive locations should be eligible for VA benefits. Surviving spouses of veterans who served in one of those locations and any of those conditions are listed as the primary or a contributing condition on their death certificate should also be eligible for VA DIC benefits.

For those of you who know of a veteran or their surviving spouse who may qualify for benefits based on the Pact Act, please contact us.

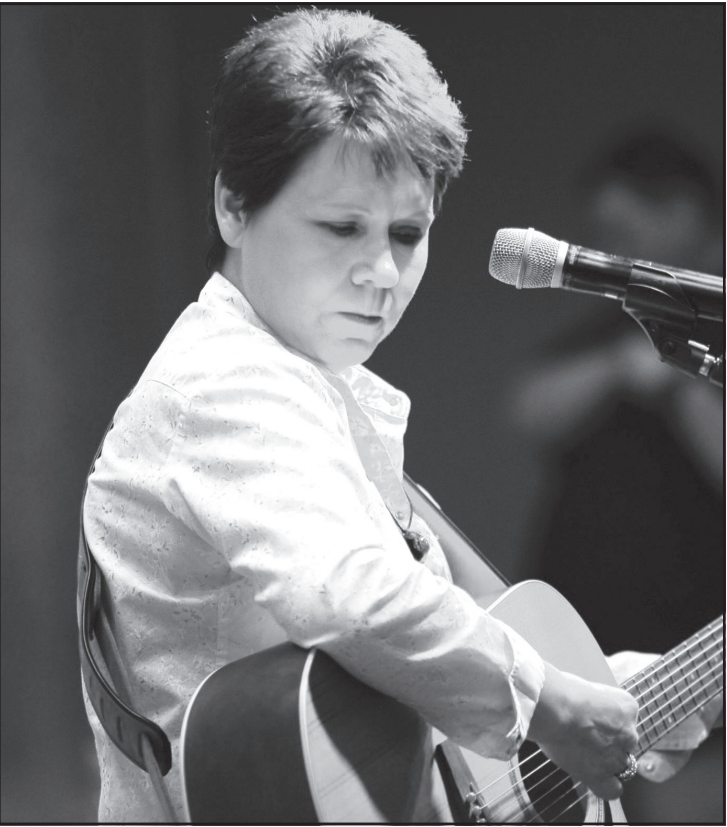
