Update from the Capitol

We have less than two months in February or March, which until the 2024 legislative session late April. gets underway. This last Friday was the deadline to have our bill requests in, which are the issues we'd like to have researched – not all of these will end up getting filed due to duplication or various other reasons but it's an important starting point. We have until mid-January to decide

if we want to file them. More than 70 bills have already been filed, including a few of mine. One creates a penalty for willfully or recklessly submitting a false complaint against a childcare facility and the other increases the penalty for illegally carrying a firearm on school property. I'll go over these more in the coming weeks.

Besides bills, we're also working on the budget. This is a process that starts in the summer. This past week, budget hearings with the largest agencies began. nomic development efforts. The Appropriations Subcom-

typically doesn't happen until The full committee will then

create a budget proposal in March off those smaller budgets and put it into a Senate resolution that will be voted on by the full body. Once that is approved, our appropriations chair and vice chair will begin negotiations with their House counterparts.

Overall, this should help us reach a budget agreement earlier in session, so we're not racing the clock in the final days leading up to our constitutionally required adjournment date.

While supporting our allies and partners in thwarting aggression is very important to the United States' own safety, we would be remiss not to also secure our own southern border and address the national security threats this crisis presents. Because of the Biden Administration's open border policies, we have seen record influxes of migrants, illegal and dangerous drugs and bad actors across the southern border.

In fact, last week the highest total migrant encounters for a single day ever was recorded at more than 12,000. Additionally, fiscal year 2023 set another record for migrant encounters at the southern border at nearly 2.5 million. This outpaced fiscal year 2022 by almost 97,000 encounters, showing this crisis is continuing to worsen.

These problems were not border as those seeking to anywhere near this level during the last administration. As you may recall, on President Joe Biden's first day in office he halted construction of the border wall and later ended the Migrant Protection Protocols or "remain in Mexico" program and restarted the dangerous "catch and release" program. These misguided policies were clearly viewed as an invitation for migrants to swarm the border.

Over the last two years, the world has grown increasingly dangerous from the Taliban arising to retake Afghanistan, war in Ukraine and Israel, increased tension from China in the Western Pacific and an aggressive Iran backing terror on U.S. facilities and personnel in the Middle East.

With open borders, terrorists and bad actors have certainly taken advantage of this crisis. Last month alone, 12 individuals whose names appear on the terrorist watchlist were stopped at ports of entry at the U.S.-Mexico border.

And now, there has even been a significant uptick in the flow of migrants at the U.S.-Canada

unlawfully enter our country realize that border has security flaws as well.

The United States has a duty in situations like these to support our allies and partners in Israel, Ukraine and the Western Pacific. We learned these lessons in World War II when we also faced a rise in Europe of authoritarian, hegemonic actors who decided unilaterally to ignore and even change and eliminate state borders to their own liking and whims.

Aggression and terrorism will spread and gain power if left unchecked. We cannot allow it to stand. We also cannot neglect the crisis on our own continent.

If Democrats in the Senate and the White House want to get serious about assisting those abroad in this dire time of need, which I strongly support, they should also acknowledge that our own border crisis must be addressed.

As these negotiations continue, Republicans in both chambers will continue to hold Democrats' feet to the fire when it comes to much needed and long overdue border security.

Don't Forget to Water this Winter

Lack of adequate soil moisture is often a major cause of winter damage. Dry soil coupled with strong winter winds can cause havoc on a plant.

pore spaces, moisture is pulled The fee to enroll is \$50 per from plant roots to form ice crystals resulting in desiccated roots, thus what some would refer to as "winter kill."

Of course some common sense needs to be practiced at this time of year; do not allow the sprinklers to come on during a hard freeze.

Ice forming on some plants could result in some serious damage and you could create a hazardous situation for you, pedestrians or even passing vehicles.

Too much water can also result on problems during the winter. Cold wet soils can lead to rotting roots. Soils with more than ample moisture may also encourage winter weeds to germinate and flourish. Water only every two to three weeks and apply only enough water to moisten the top six or so inches of soil. Our Lady of Victory Catholic Church **By Stella Bledsoe**

December 17, 2023 is the third Sunday in Advent. Remember that Advent is the liturgical season in which we wait with joyful anticipation for the coming of Christ.

We call this third Sunday of Advent "Gaudete Sunday" because especially on this Sunday we reflect upon Christian joy.

We get the title "Gaudete" from the Latin word for "rejoice," which is the word St. Paul uses in his letter to the Thessalonians when says "Rejoice always... this is God's will for you."

Sometimes people think joy and happiness are the same thing. A concise explanation of the difference is found at www. psychologies.co.uk/joy-vshappiness. Joy vs Happiness.

Joy and happiness are wonderful feelings to experience but are very different. Joy is more consistent and is cultivated internally.

It comes when you make peace with who you are, why you are, and how you are, whereas happiness tends to be externally triggered and is based on other people, things, places, thoughts and events.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF PURCELL AMENDING CHAP-TER 18 (BUSINESSES) AS FOL-LOWS: AMENDING ARTICLE 18-2 (OCCUPATIONAL LICENSES) BY ADDING: SEC 18-38 (SHORT-TERM RENTALS) TO INCLUDE DEFINITIONS, PERMITTED USES AND CODE REQUIREMENTS; REPEALING ALL OTHER CON-FLICTING PROVISIONS; AND PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY

COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PUR-CELL, OKLAHOMA:

SECTION I: AMENDMENTS. Chapter 18 (Businesses), Article 18-2 (Occupational Licenses), is amended by adding Section 18-38 (Short-Term Rentals) and Section 18-38 shall hereafter read in its entirety as follows:

Sec 18-38 Short-Term Rentals A. Purpose and Intent.

A. The City of Purcell hereby authorizes and regulates short term rental use of a dwelling which is the host's property for guest lodging for remuneration for less than thirty (30) consecutive calendar nights and establishes short term rental license requirements and limitations. The purpose and intent of this Article is to provide reasonable and necessary regulations for the use of a dwelling which is the host's primary residence for short term rental to:

1. Ensure the safety, welfare, and convenience of renters, owners, and neighboring property owners throughout the City of Purcell;

2. Allow property owners the right to use their property as they choose while protecting neighbors from nuisance situations;

3. Help maintain the City's residential housing stock;4. Protect neighborhood char-

acter and ensure short term rental use is compatible with surrounding residential uses;

5. Ensure the collection of Lodging Tax as provided in Chapter 98, Article 98-4 of the Purcell Municipal Code as amended from time to time.

B. A short-term rental license is a permission to operate a shortterm rental for transient lodging in accordance with this Article. A short-term rental license may be terminated or revoked if the standards of this Article are not met or the dwelling is sold or otherwise transferred as defined in this Article.

B. Definitions.

The words and terms in this Article shall have the following meanings unless the context clearly indicates otherwise.

A. Code Compliance Officer means the City of Purcell Code Compliance Officer or his/her designee.

B. Dwelling means any building or structure, or portion thereof, which is used or designed entirely or in part for residential purposes and includes, without implied limitation, residence, living quarters, house, home, flat, condominium, and any other building or portion thereof however denominated used or designed for residential purposes.

C. Host means the person(s) who is the owner of record of a dwelling, and responsible for dwelling or portion ottering thereof, for short term rental for transient lodging either through a hosting platform or individually and holds the license to operate the short-term rental. D. Hosting Platform means a marketplace, in whatever form or format, which facilitates shortterm rentals through advertising, matchmaking, or any other means, using any medium of facilitation. and from which the operator of the hosting platform derives revenue, including booking fees or advertising revenue, from providing or maintaining the marketplace. E. Short-Term Rental (STR) means the over-night rental of a portion of or an entire dwelling to a person or group of people for transient lodging for periods of less than thirty (30) consecutive calendar nights.

telephone number of the host as well as two (2) pieces of attached documentation showing that the subject property is owned by the applicant. The application shall identify the number of rooms of the short-term rental dwelling that will be used for the accommodation of quests for consideration and shall identify the use of each such room (e.g. bedroom, bathroom). The address and phone number (if applicable) of the dwelling to be used as the short-term rental must also be included on the application. Only the owner of the property may obtain a license. The property may not be sub-leased as a short-term rental.

B. Representative information: The host shall provide the name, permanent address, email address, and telephone number (if different from his/her own), of a local representative (which can be a person or company) who can be contacted twenty-four (24) hours a day regarding the use of the dwelling or complaints related to the short-term rental. For the purposes of this requirement, local means the representative's address is within a 60-minute travel time of the subject property and the representative is able to manage the short-term rental, respond to reported issues, contact the tenant/occupant regarding complaints received, and/or be physically present at the shortterm rental to address complaints within sixty (60) minutes from the time of notification.

C. Renewal requirement: Acknowledgement initialed by the host acknowledging that, to renew the license being applied for, the host must submit a complete updated application for renewal form and any applicable fees not less than thirty (30) days before the expiration date of the shortterm rental license and that if the licensed host fails for any reason to submit a complete updated application/renewal form and any applicable fees not less than thirty (30) days before the short-term rental license expires, the application/renewal form if later submitted will be placed on the first come, first served waiting list with all other first come, first served applicants in the order received.

D. Acknowledgement of local rules: Acknowledge that upon both booking and arrival, the host must provide the short-term rental guest either a physical or electronic copy of the City's Noise Ordinance and Short-Term Rental Ordinance, including highlighted parking and occupancy requirements.

E. Acknowledgement of occupancy and parking limits: The number of rooms that will be rented and occupancy limits for the shortterm rental must be acknowledged by the host. The number of off-site parking spots to be used for the short-term rental must also be provided as well as acknowledgement of the parking regulations in this article.

F. Advertisement: If the host is planning to advertise, the listing numbers or URL/website addresses of where the short-term rental is advertised must be provided.

G. Certificate of Occupancy: The host must pay for, obtain, and pass a health and safety inspection from the Code Compliance Office, and receive a Certificate of Occupancy, and said Certificate of Occupancy shall be attached to the host's short-term rental application.

application is incomplete or does not comply with the City's Short-Term rental regulations or any regulation, ordinance or law applicable to the welling or property; 3. The host refuses or fails to

3. The host refuses or fails to comply with the regulations or requirements as defined herein;

4. The host made a false statement or misrepresentation on the short-term rental license application;

5. The building inspection report identifies an unsafe condition and the identified deficiencies have not been corrected prior to issuance of a short-term rental license.

6. The short-term rental property has outstanding administrative penalties, or the host or owner owes past-due Lodging Taxes for prior short-term rental use, or the property under present ownership has previously been used for short-term rental use without a short-term rental license.

E. Transferability, Cap, and Proximity.

Each short-term rental license shall be non-transferable to any other person or location. No short-term rental license shall be assignable and shall not be transferred upon sale or other transfer of ownership of the property.

F. Short-Term Rental License Renewal.

Short-term rental licenses shall be valid until the 31st day of December of the year in which the license was assigned.

G. Lodging Tax.

A. A lodging tax shall be collected for short-term rentals and paid to the City of Purcell, pursuant to Chapter 98, Article 98-4 20-03 of the Purcell Code of Ordinances.

B. Collection and remittance of the lodging tax is the responsibility of the host. If a hosting platform is used, and the City has a voluntary collection agreement, or equivalent, with that hosting platform, lodging tax may be collected and remitted directly to the City by the hosting platform.

C. The host must maintain records of lodging tax paid, even if paid by a hosting platform, for three (3) years.

H. Short Term Rental Code Compliance.

A. It is the host's responsibility to assure and the host shall assure that the short term rental facility is and remains in substantial compliance with all applicable codes regarding fire, building and safety, health and safety, and other relevant regulations, ordinances and laws. The host must provide all renters with facilities for sleeping, bathing, and toileting within a permanent dwelling that is suitable for human occupancy. Rental of sleeping space in or on balconies, porches, tents, sheds, vehicles, trailers, garages, outdoor areas, or other uninhabitable spaces is prohibited.

B. During any and all calendar months that the dwelling is available for or occupied for short term rental use, the property shall have weekly solid waste collection service with assisted pick up provided by the solid waste provider, if available, or by the host when a solid waste collection service is not engaged and performing the service.

C. The host is responsible for ensuring the property does not become a nuisance due to any short-term rental occupant activities. banners, flags, pennants, ribbons, streamers, balloons, and other objects and materials advertising or offering to rent the short-term rental property and any other method of outdoor advertising for such purposes are prohibited. C. Short-term rental to unaccompanied minors is prohibited.

D. Activities that exceed the noise regulations or constitute a nuisance as defined in the City of Purcell Municipal Code of Ordinances, Article 34-2, or Article 70-3, Section 70-76 are prohibited.

L. Violations. A. In addition to complaints related to nuisance and noise and other violations of the Purcell Municipal Code of Ordinances, each of the following constitutes a violation of this Article:

1. Material misstatement(s) or providing of false information in the application or renewal process.

2. Any change that occurs in any material fact upon which the short-term rental license was issued where the change was not reported to the City by the host within fourteen (14) days after the date of the change.

3. Representing a dwelling as available for use, occupancy, or rent as a short-term rental without a valid license issued under this Article, or making a short-term rental available for use, occupancy, or rent without first obtaining a shortterm rental license.

4. Advertising or renting a shortterm rental that does not comply with the standards of this Article. 5. Failure to self-report or re-

5. Failure to self-report of remit applicable Lodging Tax on a monthly basis to the City. 6. Complaints which have been independently verified by City of

Purcell staff regarding limits on short term rental use, such as, but not limited to:

i. Exceeding allowable occupancy;

ii. Nuisance at the short-term rental property during short term rental use arising from or in connection with the short-term rental use;

iii. Nuisance at the short-term rental property during other time periods whether or not arising from or in connection with the short-term rental use;

iv. Failure to dispose of solid waste.

v. Failure to properly store waste and refuse bins.

vi. Failure to follow and comply with parking regulations. vii. Any other incident or conduct which is grounds for issuance of

a citation or complaint under the ordinances or regulations of the City of Purcell. 7. Advertising, offering, operating, renting, or otherwise making available, or allowing any other person, business, firm, or corporation to make available for occupancy or use a short-term rental without a valid short term rental license including, without limitation, doing any of the foregoing, after the expiration or revocation of a license, or when an application for license or renewal of license

is pending. 8. The short-term rental owner, host, site manager, guest or any occupant of a short-term rental unit engages in disorderly conduct at that site or violates any provision of the Purcell Code of Ordinances or any statute or regulation pertaining to noise, or disorderly conduct.

failure to comply and is subject to revocation of anylicense. Each day upon which a violation continues shall constitute a separate offense. In addition to all other remedies for the enforcement of this Article and its provisions, the City may institute any proper action in a court of competent jurisdiction to prevent, enjoin, restrain, abate, or otherwise to correct any violations of this Article.

2. In addition to penalties, any violation may also be considered to be a public nuisance and subject to abatement.

B. Revocation.

1. The following actions are grounds for immediate revocation of a short-term rental license by the Code Compliance Officer:

i. The short-term rental facility is not in substantial compliance with all applicable codes regarding fire, building and safety, health and safety, and other relevant regulations, ordinances and laws including, without implied limitation, non-working smoke alarms; or

ii. Exceeding allowable occupancy: or

iii. Nuisance at the short-term rental property during short term rental use arising from or in connection with the short-term rental use; or

iv. The occurrence of two (2) or more other violations within any 12-month period resulting in a plea of guilty or no contest, conviction, fine or deferred fine or sentence; or

v. The discovery of material misstatements or providing of false information in the application or renewal process; or

vi. Failure to self-report or remit monthly Lodging Tax to the City.

2. Notice of Decision/Appeal/ Stay. If the short-term rental license is revoked as provided in this section, the Code Compliance Officer shall give written notice of revocation by U.S. Mail addressed to the host at the host's address provided in the application stating the basis for the decision. The notice shall include information about the right to appeal the decision and the procedure for filing an appeal. C. Appeal of short-term rental

license determinations.

1. The host may file an appeal of a decision denying an application or renewal application for a short-term rental license or a decision to revoke a short-term rental license by filing a written notice of appeal with the City Clerk within ten (10) days of the mailing date of the decision and paying the applicable fees. Commencement of an appeal shall not stay the effect of revocation, denial of license or denial of renewal of license, and no owner of any dwelling within the jurisdiction of the City of Purcell directly or through a hosting platform shall make available for occupancy or use any portion of or an entire dwelling for any shortterm rental during the pendency of the appeal.

2. The City Manager shall appoint a Hearing Officer who shall be an employee of the City to hear and decide the appeal. The Hearing Officer shall be responsible for determining the appeal of a decision denying an application or renewal application for a short-term rental license or for the revocation

a short-term rental license. 3. Within forty-five (45) days of Article for a period of three (3) years after each period of short-term rental, including, but not limited to, records showing payment of Lodging Tax by the host or a hosting platform on behalf of a host. Upon reasonable notice, the host shall provide any such documentation to the City of Purcell.

Q. Administrative Policies; Remedies Not Exclusive.

The Code Compliance Officer or such Officer's designee, or the City Manager or such Manager's designee, shall have the authority to develop administrative policies and procedures to implement the intent of this Article. The remedies provided in this Article are in addition to, and not in lieu of, all other legal remedies, criminal and civil, which may be pursued by the City, to address any violation of this code or other public nuisance. SECTION II: SEVERABILITY.

If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, or phrase of these Ordinances are, for any reason, held to be unconstitutional, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of these

Ordinances. SECTION III: REPEALER.

All other Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

C. Annual Short-Term Rental License Required.

No owner of any dwelling within the jurisdiction of the city of Purcell may advertise, offer, operate, rent or otherwise make available or allow or suffer any other person, business, firm, or corporation to make available for occupancy or use any portion of or the entire dwelling for any period of less than thirty consecutive calendar days without a short-term rental license. "Advertise" or "offer" includes advertisement or offer through any media, whether written, electronic, web-based digital, mobile, or otherwise.

D. Short-Term Rental License Application Process.

A short-term rental license application provided by the City is required to be completed and submitted in order to obtain a short-term rental license. A host may apply for both a hosted and un-hosted license at the dwelling. A non-refundable application fee in the amount of \$250 shall be payable to the city of Purcell at the time the application for license or license renewal is submitted. The application shall comply with all terms, conditions, and requirements contained herein, including the following:

A. Host/address information: The application shall include the name, address, email address, and

H. The application for any property that is part of a homeowners' or condominium owners' association (HOA) must have an attached letter of approval from the HOA authorizing use of the premises as a short-term rental.

I. Signed affidavit affirming that smoke alarms are installed and operable and that fire extinguisher(s) are available to the occupant of the short-term rental in readily accessible locations.

J. All required fees must be paid. Registration of a short-term rental shall be on a calendar year basis. Fees shall be prorated for any approved license on a quarterly basis.

K. Any other information which the Code Compliance Officer may require to properly administer the short-term rental license.

L. Upon application for a shortterm rental license, the dwelling and property for which the shortterm rental license is sought shall be subject to inspection by the City for compliance with this Article and all other regulations, ordinances and laws applicable to the dwelling or property. The Code Compliance Officer or such Officer's authorized designee may conduct a site visit upon application for a short-term rental license to confirm the number of bedrooms (as defined by the International Building Code) and other rooms stated on the application and the number, location, and availability of on-site parking spaces. The site visit will be coordinated with the host and be conducted during the City's normal business hours, and with reasonable notice.

M. The Code Compliance Officer may delay or deny issuance of a short-term rental license or renewal at his/her discretion, including, but not limited to, the following grounds:

1. The short-term rental unit does not meet the definition of a dwelling unit or is deemed to be uninhabitable;

2. The short-term rental license

I. Parking.

In areas where the City does not allow overnight on street parking for residents, all short-term rental parking must remain on the short-term rental property or site. Parking areas shall not be located in the front yard unless approved by the City Codes Office. In areas where the City allows overnight on-street parking for residents, short term rental parking is limited to the use of no more than two (2) on-street parking spaces on the subject property's frontage. No additional on street parking shall be permitted for short term rental use.

J. Occupancy Regulations.

The maximum number of overnight occupants (aged eighteen (18) or older) allowed within a short-term rental unit shall be two (2) persons per sleeping room. The maximum number of daytime (non-overnight) occupants shall be one and a half (1) times the maximum number of occupants allowed to stay overnight at the unit. The City has sole discretion to determine the final occupancy limit to be permitted at the shortterm rental site.

K. Specific Prohibitions.

A. A short-term rental license shall not be issued for any property which is:

a. Public housing made available by, through or under any public housing agency or authority for low-income families, people who are elderly, people with disabilities, or other persons meeting eligibility requirements for the program;

b. Privately owned, subsidized housing units in which landlords or owners are paid by the government to offer reduced rents to low income tenants;

c. Housing Choice Voucher Program units;

d. Other government subsidized housing units such as affordable housing made available through governmental programs, grants, assistance, or subsidy.

B. Billboards, signs, wall signs,

B. Additionally, it shall be a violation of this Article for any person to perform, or order the performance of, any act which is contrary to the provisions of this Article, or to fail to perform any act which is required by the provisions of this Article. In the case of a continuing violation, each twenty-four-hour period in which the violation exists shall constitute a separate violation.

M. Enforcement.

The Code Compliance Officer is hereby authorized and directed to enforce all provisions of this Article. He shall appear for and on behalf of the City in all matters regarding the interpretation and application of this Article and shall resist and oppose any deviations from the provisions of this Article. Upon presentation of proper credentials, the Code Compliance Officer or his authorized representative may enter at reasonable times the public areas of any building, structure or premises in the City to perform any duty imposed upon him by this Article. Upon presentation of a warrant, the Code Compliance Officer or his authorized representative may enter at reasonable times any area of any building, structure, or premises in the City to perform any duty imposed upon him by this Article.

N. Application of Other Laws.

If any of the provisions of this Article are inconsistent with the provisions of any other law or laws, presently existing or enacted in the future, of the City of Purcell in that the requirements regarding short-term rentals of the respective provisions differ, the provision containing the more restrictive requirements will apply.

O. Penalties; Revocations; Appeals; Discontinuance of License. A. Penalties.

1. Any person, firm, corporation, or association of persons who shall violate any provision of this article or fails to comply with any requirements hereof, shall be guilty of an offense and, upon conviction thereof, shall be punished as provided in Article 1, Section 1-12 for each violation or

receiving the notice of appeal, the City Clerk shall schedule a hearing on the appeal before the Hearing Officer and shall give written notice to the appellant of the time and place of the hearing. The Code Compliance Officer may establish administrative procedures to implement the appeal procedures provided in this section, including any required forms.

4. The Hearing Officer shall have authority to determine all questions raised by such appeal; provided, however, that no such determination shall conflict with any substantive provision of this Article. The Hearing Officer shall determine whether the decision from which the appeal is taken was based on credible evidence of grounds for denial of an application or renewal application for a short-term rental license or a decision to revoke a short-term rental license. A decision of the Hearing Officer shall be based on the evidence received at the hearing or, in writing, no later than thirty (30) days after the close of the hearing. The Hearing Officer's decision shall be final on the date of mailing the decision to the appellant. The Hearing Officer's decision is the final decision of the City. Judicial review of the final decision of the City shall be as provided by the Purcell Municipal Code of Ordinances and the laws of the State of Oklahoma.

D. Discontinuance of a short-term rental license.

1. Revocation. After a shortterm rental license has been revoked, the property may not be used or occupied as a shortterm rental unless a subsequent license is granted, and those whose license has been revoked shall not be eligible to reapply for a short-term rental license for the same property, or other property, for a period of five (5) years.

2. Expiration. If a short-term rental license expires, the dwelling unit may not be used or occupied as a short-term rental until such time as a subsequent license has been granted for that property.

P. Records of Compliance. The host shall retain records documenting compliance with this
