

Tax cuts, tribal relations dominate Stitt's State of the State Address

Oklahoma Gov. Kevin Stitt implored lawmakers to send him tax cuts and said the continuing fallout from the McGirt decision's effect on tribal-state relations risks state unity, an assertion that left representatives of many of the state's tribes sitting stone-faced in the gallery.

Stitt, in his sixth State of the State speech at the Oklahoma Capitol, struck a hopeful tone about the state's future. He evoked President Ronald Reagan several times during the 41-minute speech, saying people are looking to Oklahoma as an example of Pilgrim John Withrop's "shining city on a hill."

The governor, who took office in 2019 and was reelected in 2022, touted the state's recent economic performance and said lawmakers can help push the state toward continued prosperity if they share his goal of putting the state on a path to no income tax. He said he would sign any tax cut that reached his desk.

"The Oklahoma Standard is alive and well, and we are thriving as a state," Stitt said. "But we can't let our success make us complacent and forget what made the Oklahoma Dream possible: free enterprise and individual liberties. Not more government programs."

Stitt, who championed a new government program that provides income tax credits for private schools, said public schools should also explore

workforce needs of the state's business community.

He asked lawmakers to give public charter schools more flexibility to employ old school buildings for new uses.

"Let's put some of these vacant school facilities to use and get more high-performing charter schools up and running, especially in areas with failing public schools," Stitt said. 'More schools, more innovation, more freedom."

Stitt called for consolidation among the state's colleges and universities and said the state



had to stop subsidizing institutions with low enrollment and low graduation rates.

Stitt said he negotiated new compacts with the Chickasaw, Apache, Citizen Potawatomi and Wyandotte tribal govern-

ments over the past few weeks. But he said work was still needed on taxes, agriculture, energy and water following the U.S. Supreme Court's McGirt decision in 2020.

The McGirt decision was limited to criminal jurisdiction.

"Three years after McGirt, we are still operating under a confusing and conflicting patchwork of jurisdiction across our state," Stitt said. "It is imperative that we clarify our law enforcement relationships immediately."

Chuck Hoskin Jr., the principal chief of the Cherokee Nation, said after the speech he was disappointed with Stitt's continued, divisive rhetoric over the McGirt decision.

"The picture he's painted is one of confusion, and we don't see it," Hoskin said. "We see cooperation every day. If anyone's looking for a perfect, flaw-free criminal justice system, they're not going to find it. But I think we've got a lot of people that are working every day to make sure our system works."

Hoskin said it was misguided to compare Arizona and the At one point, Stitt contrasted Navajo Reservation with the post-McGirt landscape in set of federal legal principles over tribal sovereignty remains the same.

"Because of the passage of time and historical forces, certainly the Cherokee Nation reservation may have different facets than the Navajo Reservation, but that doesn't change the law," Hoskin said. "We don't change fundamental legal principles based on ZIP code. We look at what legal rights are at stake and apply the law."

Stitt has called several special sessions to cut taxes, the most recent in January, to no avail. His executive budget proposal, released Monday, calls for mostly flat spending



Newsom for president?

As of today, Washington D.C.'s conventional wisdom holds that the Democrats prefer a 2024 candidate other than President Joe Biden but feel that the incumbent has earned the right to run. Nonsense!

Under no circumstances will the power-hungry Democrats let Biden, unwilling to engage primary debate challengers, and refusing to campaign in the time-honored fashion, again become the party's standard

Seven months remain until Chicago hosts the Democratic National Convention, an eternity in politics, and doubly so if party leaders and donors perceive that presumptive GOP nominee Donald Trump continues his upswing while Biden drops even further in

national polling. Influential Democrats and deep-pocketed party supporters could lean hard on Biden to withdraw gracefully with their promise that on his way out, they would hail him as a modern-day FDR. If Biden resists, Democrats could play hardball, a technique the party is familiar with.

Since there are no secrets in Washington, everyone who's anyone knows about Biden and his family's nefarious dealings. Threaten to leak internal dope on the Biden family to the Republican-led Judiciary and Oversight committees and Biden might change his mind. The scenario may appear improbable but it's not impossible.

Should Biden exit, voluntarily or otherwise, that would solve only half of the Democrats problems. The other half would be to choose a viable replacement.

Many of the names floated don't resonate with the general public - Vice-President Kamala Harris, Michigan Governor Gretchen Whitmer, and Energy Secretary and former Michigan governor Jennifer Granholm.

All have net negative polling. Still available is California Governor Gavin Newsom, anxiously waiting in the wings, fingers crossed, ready to pounce

should the opportunity present

itself.But if Newsom is tapped,

a vexing hurdle remains - the governor would need to script a platform that will connect nationally, a tough task given his abysmal governance record. Typically, a stumping candidate highlights his suc-

cesses. Not only does Newsom have no tangible, tout-worthy achievements, his failures and misjudgments are colossal. The elitist, multimillion net worth governor will never shake his Napa Valley French Laundry birthday party fiasco.

During the COVID-19 pandemic when Newsom shutdown Orange County beaches, he dined maskless with lobbyists. The incident, which showed Newsom's disregard for his constituents, will haunt

The dinner is a small potatoes blotch compared to California's exploding homelessness, widespread poverty, soaring housing prices, rotten public education system that ranks 44th nationwide, rampant smash-and-grab crime, and dramatic cost of living spikes.

Although California's bullet train fiasco has dropped from the national news, the story reflects another costly Newsom blunder.

Four years ago, when Newsom unveiled his scaled-down concept for the bullet train, he proposed constructing a 171mile starter line in the Central Valley that would begin operating in 2030 and cost \$22.8 billion.

Today, the projected costs are \$35 billion, and exceed by \$10 billion future committed funding. Adding to the bullet train's woes: an official estimate of future ridership has dropped by 25 percent, and the operating schedule has been pushed further into the future. Waste, waste, and more waste on a project that Californians

didn't want, and few would benefit from.

Newsom's gravest miscalculation is, during a sustained southern border illegal alien invasion, his immigration advocacy. California's official government website prominently includes a section captioned "California for All" which reads as follows: "every person can achieve a better life regardless of where they start out," an open invitation to illegal immigrants.

Newsom is out of step with public opinion. At a time when the nation is coping with an estimated eight million aliens released into the interior since Biden's inauguration and coming from more than 150 nations, Newsom as of January 1, will provide all low-income illegal aliens, regardless of age, with Medi-Cal, the state's Medicaid

As many as 764,000 illegal aliens could be added to Medi-Cal, costing California taxpayers an extra \$3.1 billion annually. The rub is that pursuant to the Illegal Immigration Reform and Immigrant Responsibility Act of 1996, illegal aliens are generally barred from receiving federally funded means-tested

public benefits like Medicaid. Therefore, the burdensome cost falls solely on California's residents, a foolish, inexplicable decision since the state is sinking under a \$68 billion deficit.

Deservedly, California is synonymous with failure. Residents are fleeing for more hospitable states. Newsom would have to be a magician to sell his California as a model for the other 49 states.

If Democrats examine Newsom's résumé and conclude he's not electable, then they may be stuck, like it or not, with an equally unelectable Biden.



State of the State Address

Gov. Kevin Stitt gave his sixth State of the State speech at the $to\ make\ school$ Capitol on February 5.

compared to fiscal year 2024.

"With record savings and surpluses, I'm asking, 'If not now, when?" Stitt said Monday. "In the 1990s, we were at seven percentincometax.SoI'm renewing my call. Let's get Oklahoma back on the path to zero."

But Democrats, and some Republicans, don't see cutting income taxes as a realistic prospect, especially since many still in office had to manage downturns and revenue failures just a few years ago. House Minority Leader Cyndi Munson, D-Oklahoma City, said she remembers dealing with deficits totaling \$1.5 billion in the first three years after she was first elected in 2016.

"There's no way we can cut income taxes and continue to invest in Oklahoma," Munson said in a press conference following Stitt's speech. "He talked about flat budgets and calling on agencies to submit budget requests that are flat. A flat budget is a cut. There's something called inflation. There's something called fixed costs."

Other Democrats noted the absence of any discussion of childcare from Stitt's State of the State speech. They said quality and affordable childcare, including higher pay for childcare workers, would help both workforce and economic development.

Stitt's references to criminal justice reforms were among the few moments that drew applause from Democratic lawmakers in the chamber. He said the state needs to limit fines, fees and court costs to only what's needed for restitution. He also asked lawmakers to fix civil asset forfeiture, an effort in the past that has run into opposition from many in law

enforcement. "We've worked hard here to make sure we are prosecuting crimes and rehabilitating those with substance abuse and mental health struggles, and we are focusing on eliminating barriers for those who have served their time," Stitt said.

Senate President Pro Tempore Greg Treat, R-Oklahoma City, said he's staying open to the possibility of an income tax cut but wants to wait until the latest revenue estimates are released later this month. Treat repeated his call for the elimination of the state's 4.5 percent sales tax on groceries.

"Oklahoma is one of the few states that still has a state tax on it," Treat said in a press conference Monday afternoon. "It's where the majority of middleincome families are hit the hardest. Oklahoma is unfortunately in the top 10 in a bad way in the average cost of groceries on a per-

Garvin bill to empower boards safety decisions

Legislation to give local school boards more leniency in deciding how best to protect their districts will be up for consideration before the Senate Education Committee this month.

Senate Bill 1767 by Sen. Jessica Garvin, R-Duncan, would authorize district boards of education to establish qualifications for additional individuals to carry firearms on public and private school property, along with the currently allowed school personnel and others outlined in law.

"This bill is a top priority for me this session to increase the level of security on school campuses and at school events. Our schools know how best to protect their students and they need the freedom to determine who they want to entrust to carry out that important task," Garvin said.

"Paired with my Senate Bill 1254 to increase the penalties for individuals illegally carrying on campuses, we will be able to arm more law-abiding citizens to protect our students, while holding those with criminal intent responsible for their devious plans to harm Oklahoma's children," she concluded.

Garvin worked with the Oklahoma Rifle Association (ORA) in drafting SB 1767. ORA President Mark Vaughan said his organization strongly supports the measure.

"Senator Garvin is committed to protecting our students and our schools. We know that the only way to combat bad people with bad intentions is through increasing security by putting firearms in the hands of responsible gun owners," Vaughan said. "As the state's only association who focuses solely on protecting the Second Amendment, we have been honored to provide her input on this bill and look forward

Gopher control meeting March 7

The McClain County OSU Extension Office will host a meeting dealing with gopher control options.

The meeting will be held at the

McClain County Extension Office, located at 1721 Hardcastle Blvd, on March 7, 2024, and will begin at 6 p.m.

The speaker will be Nicholas Waters, Owner/Operator at Gentlemen Gopher Removal. This meeting is free and open to the public.

Any persons with disabilities who require alternative means of communication, program information, or reasonable accommodation need to contact the McClain County Extension Office at 405-527-2174 at least two weeks prior to the event.

Controlling Gophers

Pocket Gophers are stocky, short-legged, medium-sized digging machines. There has been a sizeable amount of activity that has been noticed during the last couple of years.

These rodents should not be confused with moles, though they often construct similar tunnels.

Gophers usually live in rangegrasses, seeds, leaves, tubers, and bulbs.

The characteristic fan-shaped mound, which may be 18 to 24 inches in diameter and 6 to 8 inches high are at the end of short lateral tunnels that branch off of the main runway. One Pocket Gopher may make as many as 200 soil mounds per year.

Pocket Gophers are active

seldom found above the ground, the tunnel and to make a hole though they may come out of through which the bait is intheir tunnels at night and on cloudy days. Most gophers are solitary animals with individual burrows in the same field that may form colonies.

Pocket Gophers are not currently protected by federal or state law, so controlling them is an option. Gopher populations can be reduced or eliminated over a considerable area with persistent control efforts.

Control efforts are best conducted when gophers are most active near the surface, usually in the spring or fall. New activity is usually indicated by fresh mounds of soil.

Control methods include poisoning, trapping, flooding, gassing, encouraging natural enemies, and exclusion. Over large and heavily infested areas, poisoning is the most economical control method.

Gophers not controlled by poisoning will throw up fresh mounds and these individual can be trapped. On small areas, such as lawns or where there are stinctively cover open burrows only a few gophers, trapping is to keep out enemies. the most practical method.

The second baiting method uses a tractor-drawn machine called a burrow builder. This machine makes artificial burrows and automatically drops toxic baits into them.

Materials used for poisoning gophers are dangerous to man and to other animals so extreme caution should be used when handling, storing, or applying them. All labels on toxicants should be read and followed closely.

Special traps are required for trapping gophers. Small spring traps of varying sizes are widely used. Two traps of appropriate size should be placed in the main runway, one set in each direction.

Using a stout garden trowel or a lightweight shovel, find the freshest mound and follow a lateral from the mound to the main runway. Gophers will in-





The types of trees available are Shortleaf Pine and Shumard and Pin Oak.

Shortleaf Pines are one of the most widely distributed southern yellow pine trees. It is a large tree with a broad, open crown. The needles are in bunches of three and are three to five inches long.

Shortleaf pines grow on average to be 50 to 100 feet tall and are the hardiest and most adaptable of the southern pines.

Shumard Oak is a pyramidal tree which grows to 50 to 90 feet tall. This oak variety will become more open at maturity. The leaves are up to seven inches long with two to four pairs of pointed lobes. During the fall the leaves will change to a scarlet color.

Shumard Oaks are a relatively fast, growing tree and are drought resistant. Shumard Oaks are great shade trees and will produce acorns.

Pin Oaks have a distinctive branching pattern compared to other oaks. This oak is another fast-growing tree and offers dense shade and is tolerant to many soil conditions. Pin Oaks will produce acorns and grow to be 60 to 70 feet tall.

The Cooperative requests members not to plant trees any closer than 30 feet from the electric power lines. This will allow the trees to mature without requiring trimming or

Don't let the bed bugs bite: What to know

Agricultural Communications

For as long as humans have been around, so have bed bugs. Unlike traditional pests, bed bugs cannot be blamed on pets or lack of cleanliness. Bed bugs can affect people of any race, age or social class around the world. Because humans are the primary food source for bed bugs, hotels and homes are ideal spaces for the creepy crawlers to infiltrate.

Bed bugs have become a major concern in global tourist destinations such as Paris, France, where the 2024 Summer Olympics will be held later this year.

In a nationwide survey compiled by the mattress review company Mattress Clarity in 2023, Oklahoma City was the ninth worst city for bed bugs, based on service requests.

When it comes to bed bug infestations, higher-density populations have the potential

necessarily more susceptible to infestations, it just means there are more people to report them.

How to remediate bed bugs

While they are a nuisance, bed bugs do not transmit diseases to humans. Bites can cause allergic reactions in some people, but others never show a physical

The most effective solution for bed bug removal is calling a trusted pest control specialist. These experts are equipped to not only assess the situation within your home, but also provide the most efficient remedy.

bugs. Dense populations aren't heat at around 120-130 degrees Fahrenheit has proven the best method for treating infested

Although tedious and expen-

sive, heat is the most effective regimen because it kills all life stages of the bed bug, said Kevin Shelton, Oklahoma State University Extension entomology and plant pathology associate specialist.

Bed bugs can adapt the rate they mature based on temperature and food resources available at a given time. They can stretch their maturation period out to upwards of five to six months, Shelton said.

Quick tips when bed bugs are suspected

Identification is the biggest hindrance when it comes to bed bugs. It is important to remember that if you wake up in bed with a bite, it does not mean it came from a bed bug.

For furniture or mattresses that have been infested, cover them in plastic bags and set them outside in the summer heat to kill

Vacuuming the bugs into a sealed bag and disposing is also a quick way to remove infestations from homes.

When staying in a hotel, do not set luggage down on the floor or bed until inspecting the area. The bathtub is a safe place to store luggage initially because bed bugs cannot climb the surface. If there is evidence of bed bugs, request a new room from management.

Used furniture is an easy way to potentially introduce bed bugs into environments, and Shelton advises residents to be cautious when picking up furniture from thrift stores and other alternatives.


to helping advocate for its passage."

Currently, only specific school personnel authorized by local school boards, along with law enforcement and others specifically outlined in law, can legally carry on school property.

It is against both state and federal law for anyone else to carry a firearm on their person into a school facility even if an individual has a handgun license.

Citizens with a valid handgun license may have a handgun in their locked vehicle on school property if it is stored and hidden from view when the vehicle is unattended.

Weapons used for hunting may also be kept in a vehicle if properly displayed or stored as required by law if the driver is only transporting a student to and from school and the vehicle is not left unattended.





Of all the miles - and all the moments we shared, friend with friend, two with a common love for nature and the writing of it - this one moment stands out above the rest. It was a moment that will be sealed, as Jim Croce would sing, like precious time in a bottle.

Roy had written his book The Day Old Faithful Stopped. I think this moment was the moment time stopped, stopped right in its tracks.

others, as Roy and I were the only two "charter members."

This hike would include one of my Red Oak, Texas, church friends Steve Johnson and three of Roy's friends from their church in Galey where he worked and worshipped: Ricardo Rodriguez is the "old man" of that group at 38-years of age, Daniel Sampson barely a man at 21, and the 15-year-old Hershel Sanders the youngest member ever of our group.




