I-35 lanes to be narrowed

Drivers urged to use caution while work continues

North and southbound I-35 will be intermittently narrowed between Moore and Pauls Valley from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. through Friday.

The measure is part of a wrong-way detection system installation project.

Drivers should expect shoulder closures and intermittent lane closures and use extra caution in the area. The proj-

ect will install wrong-way detection systems along the southern I-35 corridor between Cleveland County and the Oklahoma-Texas state line and is scheduled to be completed in late fall 2024.

This project marks the fourth Oklahoma corridor to have wrongway detection systems installed.

Eastern I-40 was com-

pleted in 2022. Northern I-35 was completed in 2023 and western I-40 is scheduled to be completed in 2024.

The more than \$4 million project was awarded by the Transportation Commission to Action Safety Supply Co., LLC. in November 2023.

Sammie Rude Compton is an Oklahoma Native who shares a story as big as the western sky in her book The Cowboy Ike Rude Riding into the Wind.


The book is a biography of her father, Ike Rude.

Biden throttles American-made energy

Congressman Tom Cole

President Biden has progressives alongside the likes of dictators from Russia and Iran to Communist China celebrating. The White House has given them a "Green New Deal" gift by announcing a moratorium on pending and new application permits for liquefied natural gas (LNG) export terminals across the country.

The move directly targets American-made energy. It will sacrifice jobs, economic growth, and energy security here at home, while also punishing our allies abroad.

Devoid of reality, the policy won't help tackle climate change. In fact, this targeting of LNG will likely make greenhouse emissions worse.

This is a point sorely missed

influencers, and billionaire donors pushing this effort.

While the administration won't admit it, we can support both productivity and sustainability for the future. Natural gas is a critical component of that objective.

The United States is the top producer and exporter of natural gas in the world, and Oklahoma proudly supports that supply. We are the fifthlargest natural gas producing state in the country, with millions of residents, nearly 350,000 jobs, and billions of dollars of economic impact bolstered by the industry in our communities alone.

The economic and developmental gains aren't the only advantages. The growing use of U.S. natural gas has brought

by the climate activists, TikTok our carbon dioxide (CO2) emissions to generational lows, according to the U.S. Energy Information Administration. From 2005 to 2019, natural gas accounted for more than 60 percent of C02 emissions reductions from the U.S. power

Edna and Casey Stengel: 50 years in love

When Casey Stengel, a New York Giants' star outfielder, first laid his eyes on Edna May Lawson, he immediately fell in love. Edna, a lanky 26-year-old California woman who knew nothing about baseball, would later recall that once she met Casey, "there was never anyone else."

Van Meusel, the wife of Stengel's Giants' slugging teammate Irish Meusel, set their vacationing California neighbor Edna up with Casey.

In Edna's unfinished 1958 memoir which Marty Appel included in his biography Casey Stengel: Baseball's Greatest Character, she wrote that Van urged her to date Stengel, "who was a lot of fun, a big spender, and the life of the party." Van told Edna that "You two will get along great.'

Van and Edna went to a Giants game where Casey said he spotted his wife-to-be from his outfield position. As soon as the game ended, Casey rushed to Van and Edna's box seats for a formal introduction.

As Edna fondly remembered the day that would change her life forever, she described Casey as a fashion plate, one of the best dressed men she had ever seen. Stengel, grinning expansively, and wearing an expensive brown suit, doffed his straw hat to young Edna. Hatless, Casey revealed his blond, slicked-back hair.

Edna wrote that the 32-year-old outfielder"wasn'thandsome,but he had a quick grin, laughing eyes, and sharp features. Something clicked." From that moment forward, Edna and Casey would be together for 51 years.

Edna had no way to know that her love for and devotion to Stengel would lead her through 33 excitement-filled years that included visiting American cities from coast-to-coast, a honeymoon trip to Europe and the Orient, and to the peak of the baseball world, the World Series champion New York Yankees.

On their first date Casey, dressed to the teeth, hosted a large group of baseball friends to an evening of dinner and dancing. Edna's takeaway: "Casey was a lavish spender, a jolly host, and a marvelous dancer. And my how he could talk! I was impressed."

But Edna, despite her attraction to Casey, didn't encourage him. She clung to her fantasy that a wealthy, handsome man would sweep her off her feet. Casey persisted. Edna, looking back, realized that a tongue-tied Stengel wanted to propose, but his sentences were jumbled — -early Stengelese.

Although never romantic, a smitten Casey was determined to marry Edna. The future Mrs. Stengel wrote that Casey never formally proposed, and never said "Edna, I love you. Let's get

Instead, alone in a friend's house drinking coffee, Stengel blurted out: "Well, do you want to be married in a church or where? Should I become a Catholic or what?" Edna dodged answering, but a few days later, Casey went to a local jeweler to buy a wedding band; the couple wed in a small Catholic Church ceremony.

Days later, Casey presented Edna with a huge three-carat diamond. As Casey told the press, Edna was "the best catch I ever

Marriage agreed with Stengel. In his first game after their wedding, Stengel's Boston Bees played a doubleheader against the Chicago Cubs. The Bees swept the twin bill and Stengel went four for seven with two doubles, guzzjoe@yahoo.com.

a home run, and four RBIs.

Further proof that Casey wasn't a traditional romantic evolved over their decades together. Between their 1924 wedding day and 1958, the last year Edna worked on her autobiography, Casey gave her two gifts, a gold fountain pen and a single orchid, but never a Christmas, birthday or anniversary present. What Stengel did give Edna, she said, was "his love and affection."

Edna's father built the couple a nine-room house in Glendale where they lived for 51 years. In 1974 Edna, diagnosed with Alzheimer's Disease, moved into a nursing home. Casey, no longer driving, walked two and a half miles to visit his bride almost every day until he lost his mobility.

Casey couldn't take his annual trips to spring training, Cooperstown or the Old-Timers games that he had so treasured. At age 85, Stengel was failing. Doctors decided on exploratory surgery and found inoperable cancer. Casey died soon thereafter.

Edna's niece, Lynn Rossi, was at Casey's bedside when he passed. Rossi said she was sure that as Casey drew his final breaths, Edna was in thoughts. Edna died three years later and is buried alongside Casey in Glendale.

In 1976, honoring Casey's memory, the Yankees dedicated a plaque in the stadium's Monument Park which reads: "Brightened baseball for over 50 years; with spirit of eternal youth; Yankee manager 1949–1960 winning 10 pennants and seven world championships including a record5 consecutive, 1949–1953."



Byers Scientific noted, "The relationship between 'skunky' beer and cannabis should probably not be surprising since the 'skunky' beer odor comes from hops, which are in the same plant family (Cannabaceae) as cannabis and hemp."

Courtship in the air

Skunks belong to the mustelid family, which includes weasels, minks, badgers, and otters, all of which possess similar musk glands, but none as odiferous as the skunks, which can cause nausea and temporary blindness in attackers.

While Warner Bros. Looney Tunes characterized their Pepe Le Pew as a French Casanova with a plant-wilting aroma trailing off his tail, females are the most odiferous ones this time of year.

Pepe plays his role, however, as pest control experts report that the smell in the air (or possibly under your house or in your barn) often results from females repelling unwanted

Skunks do not hibernate in winter but will find a dry, underground location and often snooze through the coldest days. The Oklahoma Department of Wildlife Conservation reports that males will stay in the same den as the females with whom they mate, but they will mate with multiple females.

Avoid bumps in the night Skunks are primarily nocturnal but often roam in the hours immediately before and after sunrise and sunset.

They are more active during mating season and more likely to wander, and most of Oklahoma, including urban areas, is skunk country. Watching out along the highways and environmental issues. Learn even in your backyard is wise. more at okecology.org.

Skunks don't look for something to spray; most will posture first to offer a warning. Their glands hold fluid enough for five or six shots and can spray up to 12 feet, so give them plenty of space.

Avoid trouble with skunks at home by keeping your dog on a leash, especially in the evening, and giving a fair warning (shouting works) to anything in your backyard before you step out into the dark.

Leftovers, pet food, and greasy barbecues might attract skunks, so a clean yard is safer.

Unfortunately, drivers face a challenge, as the skunk's black-and-white fur matches the colors of a blacktop road. Their tiny eyes reflect with a deep amber eyeshine in headlights, so if you are lucky enough to spot those little narrow-set peepers, slow down or suffer the lasting effects.

Thanks to Krebaum

Paul Krebaum, a chemist for the Molex Corporation in Lisle, Illinois, is widely heralded for developing a simple home recipe odor remover that works on skunk spray in 1993.

The ingredients are simple, but they always come with a warning to use the mix immediately because it quickly loses its effectiveness and to never mix or store it in a closed container because the chemical reaction creates expanding gasses that will pop a top-or

The mixture reacts with the thiols in skunk scents, rendering them inert.

Here is that recipe, courtesy of the University of Nebraska-Lincoln Extension: 1 quart of 3 percent hydrogen peroxide (fresh bottle), cup of baking soda (sodium bicarbonate), and 1-2 teaspoons of liquid dish soap.

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



similar to that of the COVID tax relief bill.

By the year 2025, the tax credit would be raised to \$2,000 per child, though not all of it would be refundable, according to the Congressional Research Service.

Opponents said the bill is "just a welfare expansion" and that the guidelines based on parental income exclude extremely lowpoverty families.

"I support the business deduction and depreciation changes in this bill. Unfortunately, the low-income individual welfare benefit expansions (available to illegal aliens) that were added to obtain President Biden's and Senate Democrats' support made this a bad deal," Brecheen said.

"This bill also weakens work requirements and according to the Joint Committee on Taxation will generate \$155 billion in new deficits over the next 20 months, exacerbating our inflation crisis," Breechen said.

According to the Annie E. Casey Foundation, a data center and philanthropy focused on strengthening families and building stronger communities, 20 percent of American families are low-income working families.

Oklahoma delegation urges FAA to keep training in state

Oklahoma's entire congressional delegation, in a move led by Sen. James Lankford, joined on a letter sent to the Federal Aviation Administration Tuesday in support of the Mike Monroney Aeronautical Center in Oklahoma City. The letter came a day after the FAA installed a new air traffic control tower training system at an airport in Austin, Texas.

Established in 1946 as a centralized training and logistics facility, the Mike Monroney Aeronautical Center is home to the FAA Academy, which provides aviation-related training to students from across the country and the world.

"Centralized and standardized training is key to maintaining safety in the national airspace system, and the quality of training that occurs at the Academy cannot be replaced," the letter to FAAAdministrator Mike Whitaker read.

"We oppose any effort to duplicate elsewhere any training that occurs only at the FAA Academy at the Mike Monroney Aeronautical Center."

Facing a shortage of certified air traffic controllers, the National Airspace System Safety Review Team released a report in November detailing a "bottleneck" at the academy with 30 percent of air traffic control students failing to pass certification.

The report recommended the Mike Monroney Aeronautical Center increase hours of opera-

Community Service

In this type of alternative sentence, a judge orders a criminal offender to perform work on behalf of the community in exchange for a complete or partial reduction of fines and/ or incarceration.

Court ordered community service often accompanies some other form of alternative sentence such as suspended sentences, probation, fines, deferred adjudication or pretrial diversion.

The theory behind court ordered community service is that mandating minor offenders to perform community service offers more benefit to society than incarceration of those offenders.

The community benefits from the work that the offender performs and avoids the cost of incarceration while the offender benefits from a lesser sentence and, it is hoped, is rehabilitated, educated and enriched through the work they perform.

•Determine whether deposits and invested funds are secured by pledged collateral.

"All information included in the bank reconciliations, the investment ledger, the subsidiary ledgers, and the general ledger is the representation of the County Treasurer.

"Our county treasurer statutory engagement was limited to the procedures performed above and was less in scope than an audit performed in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards.

"Based on our procedures performed, there were no exceptions noted," Byrd's letter said.





In a way that midafternoon moment on Monday, July 10, was a funny scene, because, over our shoulders, we knew that the boys were getting restless and wondering what was taking us so long.

But that was our moment, and, somehow, it seemed that both of us knew it. Sometimes you just soak in the moment as if somehow you know that you may never have it again.

Ah, friends, there was so much to discuss: the love of wives and children and grandchildren – nothing surpasses that – but there's a special love, too, between friends who can step away from the hustle and bustle of life and share all its

years in life. We would travel again together, stopping when needed, soaking in more than the others, perhaps, because we knew that we would have fewer opportunities to enjoy such

It is true, Mr. Frost: Roy and I had miles to go before we slept, and they were all good miles. My friend's journey ended earlier on the trail than mine has, and it ended long before I or any of his friends and loved ones would ever have imagined.

But it did not end without his soaking in the most of life he could nor without impacting every soul who stood beside him on that trail.

As for me, even though life's hiking journeys ended far too soon than any of us wanted, he and I will long stand on that Absaroka trail overlooking the grandest moments of our lives – just Roy, and me, and the Lord.

We will never have far to go to re-capture that special moment. Like Old Faithful herself, time had stopped that day, just for two old friends.

Topdress cool season forages

Tired of feeding hay? Wish those cows were harvesting their own dinners? If so, there is something you can do on both accounts, spring fertilization of cool season forage crops.

If you are fortunate enough to fescue, wheat, rye or are planning on seeding spring oats, you can make a large and cost-effective difference in the amount of late winter through spring grazing calf at side. you have with a simple application of nitrogen (N) fertilizer.

This means, when observing a correct stocking rate, that having Cool season forages respond and supplementation would no effectively to N fertility applied longer be required! Think about the savings in this practice.

If \$44 per acre in fertilizer cost an additional ton of production startles you, you are not alone. for each 60 pounds of actual N However, by calculating our estimated cost per cow per day, OSU typically recommends an it is clear we are cutting our daily application of 60-75 pounds per maintenance costs to one quarter acre which is 130-160 pounds of the cost of hay and supplement.

This does not take into account the efficiency of utilization for these feedstuffs.

There will be some losses of both fed hay and grazed forage which drive costs up slightly. According to research a cow is 65 percent efficient at rotationally grazing high quality forage, so we would expect one ton of forage to provide this 1,200 pound cow with 45 days of grazing.

Even with grazing losses, \$44/ tonover45 days=\$0.98/cow/day which is still one-third the cost of hay and feed with no waste, and that rarely happens!

With proper fertility and adequate soil moisture expect yields of three-five tons/acre with annual ryegrass, two-three tons/ acre with fescue, one-two tons/ acre with cereal rye and two-three tons with fall seeded wheat or spring seeded oats.

That is a lot of cow grazing days and proves it is still cheaper

We also received rating decisions showing that 121 veterans received disability ratings from 10-90 percent. This group of veterans will receive an annual combined amount of \$2,000,498 per year. There were two surviving spouses of disabled veterans who were approved for DIC benefits based on their veteran's service-connected disabilities. Their combined annual benefit will be nearly \$39,000 per year.
