"The US Congress proposes bills and passes laws that deal with immigration and border security." National Geographic. org Oct. 11, 2023. The Legislative branch passes laws not the Executive branch.

The last immigration/border security law passed by Congress was the Immigration and Control Act, S1200, in 1986.

June 27, 2013 S744 Border/Immigration Modernization Act passed the US senate 68-32

- Key parts of the bill:
- \$46.3 billion for border security
- Double the number of border agents
- Double the miles of border fencing
- E Verify immigrant employment system
- 13 year pathway for citizenship

The 113th Congress led by the Republicans and Speaker Boehner would not consider the bill and allow a vote on the bill thus killing it. History will repeat itself about 10 years later.

Feb. 4, 2024 nbc news The agreement by Sens. Lankford R, Okla., Murphy D, Conn., Sinema I, Ariz., would be the most aggressive border security/immigration bill in decades if passed by Congress. Republican Speaker of the House Johnson said the bill will be dead on arrival and will not be brought to the floor for a vote if it passes the Senate. Thus killing it after several months of work by the bipartisan committee. We need a new law to address the immigration concerns and an updated law for increased border security.

Apparently the majority of the House of Representatives who should bring forth new legislation in Congress really aren't concerned on immigration laws or border security. Not in 2013 or in 2023. Tom Cole has been in Congress since 2003. Come on Mr. Cole. Work together and get something done. Both major parties can and should get something done now. Quit playing politics and blaming each other. The problem can only be solved if Congress works together like Senator Lankford tried to do

## NEWS FROM CAPITOL HILL Combatting the Biden Administration's inflation crisis

#### **Congressman Tom Cole**

Throughout the past three years in office, President Biden has embarked on spending spree after spending spree.

First, just two months after inauguration, he signed the \$1.9 trillion American Rescue Plan Act, initiating a spike in prices on consumers just days after the bill was signed into law.

Then, in November of 2021, he ran up the federal credit card again by signing the \$1.2 trillion "infrastructure" legislation into law, which had fewer than one of every four dollars for what most Americans would consider to be actual infrastructure.

Additionally, that same month, the White House signed a massive social spending bill, including \$369 billion for radical climate initiatives, \$80 billion to hire more IRS agents, and \$64 billion to expand among others, into law, the savings are down 79.3 percent. issues of today.

President himself has made it very clear-lowering spending, and in turn lowering inflation, is not a matter of concern for this administration.

In fact, since President Biden took office, inflation has increased 17.9 percent overall. Not to mention, the recent "hotter-than-expected" Consumer Price Index (CPI) report, showing that inflation rose again this past January, indicates this administration has no plans to change course and ease the economic pain.

Consequently, the American people have experienced higher prices, lower real wages and tighter budgets.

As a matter of fact, since President Biden took office, food prices have gone up on the consumer by nearly 20 percent, electricity prices have risen on the ratepayers by 28.6 percent, prices at the gas pump have increased 37.8 percent, wasteful Obamacare subsidies. mortgage rates have reached a Through signing these bills, two-decade high, and monthly

In total, Americans are spending over \$1,000 more a month than they were three years ago. The numbers do not lie – President Biden's economic policies are truly crushing American families.

This is why we must pass a full year appropriations deal, which will allow us to reverse some of this excessive spending and reallocate the funding from far-Left, Green New Deal initiatives to important issues like the border, national security, made-in-America energy, and veterans.

As a fiscal conservative and Vice Chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, it is not lost on me the duty I have to ensure that the taxpayer dollar is being spent wisely.

I am committed to passing a full year appropriations deal that not only combats the Biden Administration's inflationary policies, but also allots necessary government funding towards addressing the real

## Does Oklahoma have free, fair elections?

I was invited to observe "live ballot testing" of the upcoming Presidential Preferential Primary Election at the McClain they are registered and listed County Election Board.

I was invited because I am an officer of one of the three political parties. I learned a few things that I want to share with you.

• Every voting machine in the state of Oklahoma is the same.

• The voting machines are stored in locked, secure areas of each county.

• The machines are checked out and returned by an appointed official of each precinct on the day of the election.

• There is absolutely no connection to the internet with the machines.

zero out all activity from that machine.

• When registered voters come to vote, they check in with a poll worker who makes sure in the polling book.

• The voter signs a form and is given the ballot or ballots they are eligible to vote that day.

• Each ballot has a bar code that is unique, so it could never be cast twice.

• Once the voter has marked his/her ballot, he/she scans it into the voting machine. The ballot can be put in either direction since the machine reads both sides.

• If the voter marks the ballot incorrectly, the machine rejects it, and the voter can spoil that ballot and receive another bal-

## Satchel Paige and Trujillo, the **Dominican Dictator**

In 1937, the Dominican Republic's President Rafael Trujillo, a one-time cattle rustler, forger, blackmailer and then-dictator, decided that, in the name of national unity and to demonstrate his absolute power, he would create Hispaniola's best baseball team.

Trujillo, who preferred polo and sailing to baseball, turned over the Dragones de Ciudad Trujillo's daily operations to Dr. Jose Aybar, a dentist. Aybar, fearful that failure to please Trujillo could lead to his untimely and permanent disappearance, reached out to the Pittsburgh Crawfords and Homestead Grays, teams which had many black American stars still unfairly banned from Major League Baseball.

In his book, Satchel: the Life and Times of an American Legend, author Larry Tye provided the details about Satchel's decades-long baseball excellence.

Signing the Crawfords Leroy "Satchel" Paige was Aybar's goal, and the tooth doctor left for New Orleans where the Crawfords were in spring training. Other Dominican teams also pursued Paige.

In desperation, Aybar ordered his limo driver to block Paige's vehicle. The agent, allegedly brandishing a pistol, offered the pitcher \$30,000, or the equivalent of \$675,000 in today's money, the total to include six of his Crawfords' teammates.

Paige recalled that Aybar told him "You may take what you feel is your share." Abyar's offer represented more money for a month's pitching than Satchel earned in a year of barnstorming.

Rounding up other players proved unexpectedly challenging. Most Crawfords objected to Paige getting the largest cut, and others resisted betraying Crawfords' and Grays' owners Gus Greenlee and Cumberland Posey. ## Voter registration deadline approaches

last day to apply for voter reg- online using the OK Voter Portal istration in order to be eligible at oklahoma.gov/elections/ovp to vote in the April 2 Board of Education General election, McClain County Election Board Secretary Karen Haley said today.

Haley said that persons who are United States Citizens, residents of Oklahoma, and at least 17-1/2 years old are eligible to apply for voter registration. However, you must be at least 18 years old to vote.

Applications must be received by the County Election Board or postmarked no later than midnight, March 8, 2024. Applications postmarked after that time will be accepted, but will not be processed until after the April 2 election.

Applications may also be submitted to any motor vehicle agency that is also an official voter registration agency by the submission deadline.

Applicants will be notified in writing when their application has been processed. Approved voters will receive a Voter Identification Card in the mail. Some may receive a letter that explains the reason or reasons the application was not approved.

Haley said those who do not receive a response within 30 days of submitting their application should contact the County Election Board office immediately. The McClain County Election Board reminds voters that applications must be approved by the County Election Board Secretary in order to vote. Registered voters who have moved to McClain County from a different county or state will need to complete a new Voter Registration Application in order to be eligible for elections in McClain County.

Friday, March 8, 2024 is the address, you may make changes or complete a Voter Registration Application.

## Maria Martinez wins Chickasaw Nation Butterfly Art Contest

Loud is not a word usually associated with butterfly, but it inspired the winner of this year's Butterfly Art Contest. Maria Martinez of Wayne was deemed the winner for

her creation. "I just wanted things to be

very loud, that's the word that inspired me," said Maria.

"I wanted to include Chickasaw Nation symbols into my design. The bottom of the wings has the sun symbols and the spiral. I wanted to have brighter colors, because they're really bold, and I feel like it's a good representation of women.

"Purple, it's symbolic of Prize winning art femininity. Red is the symbol of courage, which is also important, and yellow represents hope. There's a serenity and gracefulness which reminds me of women specifically," she said.

In addition, the design's colors serve a dual purpose.

"The colors also tie in with the sun and spiral symbols, because the spirals were how we planted our food. The red also represents the red dirt of Oklahoma, the blues represent water and sky, and the yellow represents the sun."

A bean design dotting the tips of the wings represents one of the three sisters, a traditional Chickasaw planting technique using corn, beans and squash, she said.

She sketched the design on

The Chickasaw Nation hosts the Butterfly Art Contest each year, where female Chickasaw citizens, ages 14 to 18, create unique butterfly art pieces for consideration to serve as the artwork for the annual Dynamic Women of the Chickasaw Nation Conference. This conference salutes the valuable contributions, talents and skills of Chickasaw women.

The winning butterfly design also represents the Chikasha Ihoo Empowerment Series, a quarterly event that highlights the accomplishments and perspectives of Chickasaw women.

The first 2024 session will be conducted at 2 p.m. Tuesday, March 26, at the Chickasaw Cultural Center in Sulphur.

Maria has been creating art for most of her life, participating in the Chickasaw Arts Academy as a young student and perfecting her skills in traditional and Advanced Placement (AP) art courses at Norman (Oklahoma) High School.

For those of you who have Menu may change at the been thinking about filing a claim for VA benefits simply call 1-800-827-1000 and tell the VA Agent you would like to start a claim. This will give you one year to file a Fully Developed Claim. We do things a little differently than most other service organizations do when helping a veteran to file for VA benefits. Most other organizations use only their military service records as evidence to file for VA benefits. We on the other hand review each veteran's military medical records to see what kind of injuries or illnesses they sustained during their service.

Then we suggest that they obtain evidence from a medical provider of their choice using a VA Disability Benefits Questionnaire (DBQ) that evaluates their condition. A DBQ will sometimes have a Nexus that establishes their disability to
