District 8 approved for \$1M for infrastructure

The McClain County Rural Water District No. 8 received approval for \$1,000,000 in funding Tuesday from the Oklahoma Water Resources Board (OWRB) to improve the district's water infrastructure.

Construction of upgrades and improvements to the water system will be financed by the Oklahoma American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) grant program along with \$860,375 in McClain County ARPA funds.

The district operates a water treatment plant and the towns of Byars, Maysville, and Wayne are interested in purchasing water from the District.

These proceeds will be used to drill a new water well with



PLS to celebrate solar eclipse

Celebrations for the upcoming solar eclipse are underway at the Pioneer Library System, with events happening throughout its service area now through April 8, the day of the eclipse.

"Folks who register and attend these eclipse-focused programs will be able to receive a free pair of certified solar eclipse glasses," said Norman Public Library East Branch Manager Kelsey Williamson.

To prepare for the event, residents can attend one of PLS's astronomy events, intended for all ages, leading up to April 8. These include eclipse art programs, meditation under the stars, DIY eclipse viewer programs, and a stargazing night with OU's Lunar Sooners, happening Friday, April 5, at the Tecumseh Public Library.

Astronomy students will be speaking at the Tecumseh event to talk about the eclipse and other topics relating to astronomy.

The April 8 total solar eclipse will cross North America, passing over Mexico, the United States, and Canada. Weather permitting, the first location in continental North America that will experience totality is Mexico's Pacific coast at around 11:07 a.m. PDT.

The path of the eclipse continues from Mexico, entering

Arkansas, Missouri, Illinois, Kentucky, Indiana, Ohio, Pennsylvania, New York, Vermont, New Hampshire, and Maine. Small parts of Tennessee and Michigan will also experience the total solar eclipse.

The eclipse's path will continue into Canada in Southern Ontario before exiting continental North America on the Atlantic coast of Newfoundland, Canada, at 5:16 p.m. NDT.

While locals who want to experience full totality may wish to visit Southeastern Oklahoma, the view will still be impressive

> "We'll be hosting a watch party during the eclipse in the afternoon, and most of those run from 1-2 p.m. since that is the peak time for maximum viewing in the area," Williamson said.

Gifted Washington athlete Jacie Stephens Cochran's water broke when she was about to deliver her son, Jaxon.



its second major deadline week of this session with a lengthy, 13-hour floor hearing, in which we advanced numerous bills to the House. March 14 was the deadline for bills to be heard in their chamber of origin, meaning Senate bills that advanced from committee had to pass off the Senate floor last week than 100 bills last week, sending some of our best policy proposals to the House.

I was surprised and honored last week when the Conservative Political Action Conference, commonly known as CPAC, gave me a Conservative Achievement award for my voting record. I was one of a handful of Oklahoma lawmakers to be recognized for my commitment evidence becomes available.

Last week, the Senate cleared to supporting the state's deeply held Republican values.

My three bills to boost state retirement and pension benefits for retired police officers, firefighters and Oklahoma Highway Patrol troopers all unanimously passed the full Senate last week. One of my most unusual bills this year has to do with Santa Claus. Yes, you read that right. The Office of Juvenile Affairs asked me to introduce legislalegislative process. At its core, this bill is simply streamlining state government and getting rid of an unnecessary commission. The necessity of strong national security

At a time when we are facing so many challenges and threats, the need for strong national security is as important as ever. Yet, the Biden Administration's displays of weakness both at home and abroad have put our nation's national security

In 2021, the President assumed office with an aggressive pro-illegal immigration agenda, resulting in recordbreaking illegal border crossings, an unprecedented fentanyl epidemic, and an influx of bad Afghanistan. actors pouring across our border, including hundreds of individuals whose names appear on the terrorist watch list and

thousands of "special interest

Iraq, Pakistan, Afghanistan, global stage. and Yemen.

This is a serious threat to our national security, as it sends a message of weakness to the rest of the world.

Howell, a Chickasaw citizen from Central High, Okla., is widely known as an authority in her field. She is considered a subject matter expert for both the Oklahoma Department of Career and Technology Education and Oklahoma State University Fire Service Training Program.

Howell's decades of community service began as a volunteer with the local Red Cross, teaching safety classes and swimming lessons. She accepted a position as a first responder at Kirk's Emergency Service in 1988 and later became a Central High volunteer firefighter, where she served for 20 years, retiring in 2022.

Only nine percent of U.S. firefighters are women, according to the U.S. Fire Administration (USFA) and five percent of all career firefighters are

Howell began teaching EMT training in 1992 and in 2000, she was instrumental in developing the EMT and firefighter course that is currently taught in Oklahoma technology centers. Howell's first responder program at Great Plains Technolwas the first in the state and

The instruction and courses she developed are used to train numerous firefighters and instructors across the state.

Her influence extends well beyond her classroom, ensuring firefighters and EMTs from departments across the state are prepared to save lives and property through the curriculum she develops.

The Damascus Road

Having been a hobo for a in an instant.

few years, I have walked many dusty roads. At various times in my life, I have encountered people and, yes angels, who have altered my life course or enhanced my life choices. From time to time I suspect we all find ourselves on that road and meeting those people and experiences that change

It happened to Saul on a dusty road on a hot afternoon, "I found myself traveling along the ancient Damascus Road. The sun beat down mercilessly, casting long shadows across the barren landscape. I was lost in thought, grappling with the turmoil in my heart. Little did I know that this journey would change my life forever.

our lives.

As I walked, my mind replayed the events that had led me to this point. I was Saul, once a fervent persecutor of the followers of Jesus. My mission was to stamp out this new movement that threatened the traditions I held so dear. But then, everything changed

A blinding light enveloped me, brighter than the noonday sun. I stumbled and fell to the ground, trembling with fear and confusion. "Who are you, Lord?" I cried out, my voice filled with both awe and terror.

A gentle yet powerful voice responded, "I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting. Now get up and go into the city, and you will be told what you must do." My heart raced as I struggled

to comprehend what was happening. Jesus, the one whom I had vehemently opposed, was speaking to me directly. His words pierced through my doubts and fears, filling me with a sense of purpose I had never known.

Slowly, I rose to my feet, my eyes still adjusting to the brilliance of the light. With each step, I felt a weight lifting off my shoulders, replaced by an overwhelming sense of peace. The road ahead was unknown, but I knew I was no longer alone."

Matthew 7:13 Jesus relates
