



ometimes it's hard for Katie White and Megan Montenaro to believe that Callicoon Hills is only just approaching its one yearanniversary.

"It's been super exciting and we've created something really special that I have a hard time going home a lot," White, Callicoon Hills' Food & Beverage Director, said.

"We're expanding on the spaces here. How can we continue to grow and not disrupt what we've done?" Montenaro, Callicoon Hills' General Manager, explained. "It's very inspiring to work here."

Since reopening last summer, Callicoon Hills has opened its doors to visitors, locals, community organizations and special events alike. From hosting private weddings (and booking even more nuptials through 2023) to working with the Farmhouse Project for their Makers' Market in September there certainly has been a lot to keep them busy. They've hosted both Delaware Valley Opera Company and the Callicoon Center Band in the Haypress Barn across the street from their main building, and opened their doors to locals escaping frozen pipes at home this past winter. And they're just getting started as their first year comes to a close.

"The property has such an amazingly rich history. There has always been some sort of lodging here since the 1800s," Montenaro said. The hotel

sits on 22 acres with a variety of accommodations for guests that has changed with the times. With over 60 guest rooms spread out between the original Boarding House, Pool House and Ridge Rooms, Callicoon Hills continues to boast that it's "the friendly resort for nice people."

"The level of service is there and we keep raising the bar," Montenaro said. "And the team does an excellent job of delivering on people's expectations."

Whether it's recommending a local hiking spot to a visitor from out of town, hosting yoga classes, or welcoming locals for Bingo and game nights, the staff at Callicoon Hills is working hard to make things welcoming for all. They're currently planning an expansion on their programming for guests and locals for the summer including a new Cat Skills series with wilderness safety and survival programs, and even more fun programming that Montenaro and White deem a "Grown Up Summer Camp."

"You might learn something new and you'll definitely have fun," Montenaro said.

In addition to events and guest experiences, Callicoon Hills also offers delectable bites at the Conover Club with local ties that, according to White, "just make sense."

"We have a wonderful chef, JP Medina, who is beyond talented, and we're really lucky to have

him," White explained. The Conover Club menu is as local as possible and focuses on common sense farm-to-table dining. They include a write up of all the local suppliers in their menu, and meals are even linked to the establishment's history as a 1950s and 60s resort by being served on the original plates from that time period.

Like the hotel's ever expanding programming, the Conover Club has expanded with a Brunch menu, a Beer Garden experience this past fall, and they even created a globetrotting winter supper club to be able to play with a new menu every week.

"We want people to come here to celebrate for special occasions," Montenaro said of the Conover Club and the hotel. The goal is to not only provide a place that out of town guests visit for a chance to slow down and relax, but to also be a welcoming place for locals who want to go out for dinner or have a staycation. "It's so nice to be that place for our community."

Instead they wanted the name to reflect their family ties to the area. Boyle's family owns one of the oldest houses in Cochecton, and there is an old foundation on the property that has been converted into an outdoor grill where the family gathers for their big family meals. And that seemed to invoke exactly how he and wife Jessica want guests to feel when they stop by for a bite.

"Jessica and I searched for a while to find our own restaurant," Boyle says. The goal was to open a mom & pop, old world inspired trattoria. "It just seemed to be a perfect fit...everything we wanted fell into place."

Boyle started cooking professionally in Williamsburg, Brooklyn 10 years ago before a fortuitous cab ride led him to apply to a culinary program in Italy. His wife Jessica also has a background in the service industry and has worked in all aspects including as a bartender.

"[In Italy,] I ended up training with Michelin Star Chef Angelo Sabatelli," Boyle explains. After returning to the states and working odd jobs at

different restaurants all with the goal to eventually own his own restaurant. When the 2020 Covid pandemic slowed everything down, the Boyles found and eventually purchased the Stone Arch Inn in September 2021.

Since then they've been working on conceptual planning and logistics to open the restaurant while also renovating their living quarters upstairs.

"The menu is ever changing slightly to keep myself and others interested," Boyle says. Guests can expect bistro fare inspired by New American, Italian and French cuisine with a homemade vibe. From homemade breads like the ever popular sourdough, bar snacks like wings and fried crispy Brussel sprouts, and main dishes like generous personal pizzas, steaks and handmade burgers, the Old Foundation is sure to have a dish for everyone's taste buds.

"We're planning for what's coming in the summer," Boyle says. With 2 acres of land attached to the establishment they have the opportunity to expand with some outdoor dining options as well as a grill station – there are also plans to open an attached liquor store. Until then, the restaurant is open Fridays and Saturdays from 5-10 with more hours coming soon.

In the near future, The Old Foundation is hosting a big St. Patrick's Day party right after the Jeffersonville St. Patrick's Day parade from two o'clock on. Boyle's band The Irish Mutts will be playing and providing entertainment.

"I just want people to feel like they've come to a nice family dinner," Boyle says. Stop by for dinner and enjoy a craft cocktail like the "Kiss Me Goodnight." The history of this location is prevalent in the decor above the bar. Stop by to enjoy dinner, drinks, and music, or just catch up with friends in the authentic old world style of the restaurant. 




