Being prepared for the return to school

Returning to school is an exciting time for students, teachers, and staff. Opening day for students in Sullivan County will be on Sept. 6, Sept. 7, or Sept. 8, depending on the school district.

As parents plan for the new school year, they should check their mail periodically, as districts typically mail back-to-school informational packets before the start of the school year. It is also essential to make sure your school district has your current phone, cellphone, and email address. Correct contact information allows the district to communicate information, changes, and events with parents and guardians. Bookmarking the school's website and following them on social media is also helpful in obtaining quick access to the district's

latest information. School districts also encourage parents to schedule their child(ren)'s physicals early, as it may be challenging to get an appointment before the beginning of the new school year. Parents can also contact the Sullivan County Public Health Nursing Service at (845) 292-5910 to inquire about vaccine clinics if they do not have a pediatrician.

At this time, there are no mandates regarding COVID-19, but it is extremely important for everyone to remain vigilant in our efforts to reduce the spread of COVID. Many cold, flu, and COVID-19 symptoms overlap – **if your child is not feeling well or has a fever, runny nose, sore throat, coughing, or general fatigue, please do NOT send them to school.** If your child has symptoms, please get them tested and contact your school nurse. If your child does test positive for COVID-19, they must isolate for five (5) days. If your child tests positive but is symptom-free, they can return to school on day six (6) but must wear a mask for five (5) additional days. According to Sullivan County Public Health Services, those that test negative but are symptomatic must also wear a mask for the remaining five days once they return.

If they test positive and are still symptomatic on day 6, they should isolate at home until significant symptom resolution.

• They can end isolation after 5 full days if they are fever-free for 24 hours without the use of fever-reducing medication and other symptoms have improved.

• They should continue to wear a well-fitting mask around others at home and in public for 5 additional days (day 6 through day 10) after the end of their 5-day isolation period. If they are unable to wear a mask when around others, they should continue to isolate for 10 days.

The following tips will help families prepare for the 2022-2023 school year and eliminate unnecessary stress for parents and students.

1. Start bedtime routines early to help your child return to school sleeping patterns.

2. Remove mobile devices from bedrooms, so your child falls asleep at a reasonable time.

3. Talk with your child(ren) about what they can look forward to when

school begins and review pertinent back-to-school informational items.

4. Use a calendar – your child will be better prepared if they can visually see when school starts, extracurricular activities are scheduled, and view important dates throughout the school year.

5. Pick a date to do your back-toschool shopping. When children choose their clothes, school supplies, backpack, or lunchbox, it increases their excitement about returning to school and using the new items.

6. Talk about homework and your expectations – set your guidelines so your child understands when and where you want them to do their homework and what you expect from them during school.

7. Refresh your rules for screen time – what is allowed and when.

8. Encourage your child to prepare for school the night before by laying out clothes and packing their backpack.

9. Establish a backup transportation plan in case your child misses the bus.

10. Plan for after-school childcare or supervision.

Being prepared will help your child head off to school feeling excited and ready to learn.

comeback year, many of us will have to modify how we parent.

Kids will still need compassion at the root of how we address all their "big feelings," our guidance in finding healthy ways to express emotions they might not fully understand, and a sense of comfort in knowing we support them. Children also need discipline.

Over the past two years, to mitigate the trauma they've experienced, many of us have made allowances for behaviors we otherwise wouldn't tolerate.

Parents and educators are very much aware of their own flaws, as it's easy to recall the times we've been too impatient, too critical, or too harsh with children.

Over the past two years, to mitigate the trauma they've experienced many of us have made allowances for behaviors we otherwise wouldn't tolerate. The word discipline for many suggests a punitive action inflicted by one person onto another. The origin of the word, however, is closely related to the word disciple; a follower who learns from a leader.

A disciplinarian can be thought of as a teacher or mentor, and discipline as the set of attitudes and behaviors that a mentor hopes a follower will want to acquire. When we describe a self-disciplined person, we are talking about someone who regulates his or her own behavior.

Compassion is a great practice that makes discipline a healthy tool for

teaching adolescents what appropriate behaviors are and how to act accordingly. Compassionate discipline can be a step towards helping students achieve the comeback year.





Talk to your children about school bus safety







It can be a precarious time for children and drivers as they adjust to back-to-school schedules.

School bus drivers are tasked with the vital responsibility of protecting children on their way to and from school. School bus drivers are the most highly trained, tested, and scrutinized drivers on the road, ensuring students are transported to school on time and return home safely every school day.


