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


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


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
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Bolt-action rifles are touted as the most reliable rifle action available.



This is my first deer rifle. I hunted deer throughout New York with it for several years.

t does not matter at what age, owning ones first rifle is an exhilarating experience. It is an event the brain records with the smallest details for future recall.

For instance, in 1963 my dad bought me my first rifle. I can still distinctly recall the entire experience. The rifle was a Marlin EST 1870 - Model 336, R.C. Cal. .30-30, gold trigger in a lever action. We bought it at E. J. Korvettes, a New York-based department store, located in Bay Parkway off the Belt Parkway highway, a few miles north of Coney Island, New York.

From the second I took the rifle out of the box at home, I forgot about girls. Well, not really, but somewhat. I vividly recall holding the rifle for what seemed like hours smelling its newness, feeling its stoutness, and repeatedly working its lever action. I was mesmerized. The rifle was really mine. I remember thinking, "this rifle will open the door for me to become a deer hunter," and that is exactly what it did.

Before my first deer hunt, I equipped the Marlin with a Weaver scope and bought a couple of boxes of Remington .30-30 130 grain Core-Lokt Round Nose cartridges.

For my first few years of deer hunting, my .30-30, (which I nicknamed Deadeye Dan), and I hunted whitetails from the southern tip of Orange County, New York throughout most of the northern zones of the Adirondack Mountains. See what I mean about remembering the smallest details of buying your first rifle?

For a few years I hunted with Deadeye Danthrough the 20,000+ acres in Sterling Forest in southern Orange County, New York to the tens of thousands of acres owned by International Paper Company in the tiny hamlet of Childwold, New York. Childwold is located on the western side of the town of Piercefield and 15 miles north of Tupper Lake.

In a newly-fallen two-inch snowfall, I found a large, flat rock that overlooked a bog. I placed my "Hot-Seat" on the rock and sat on it (you have to be at least 60 years old to know what the original Hot-Seat was). Today, a similar product

is called a "ThermASeat-Heat-a-Seat" which is not as noisy or clumsy as the old Hot-Seat.

My hunting tactic was simplistic. I would wait for an unsuspecting buck to pass by my stand. As Lady Luck would have it, a couple of hours later, I saw a

buck approaching from the bog.

It was a six-point with a wide, high sweep to its antlers. The buck was easy to see in the snow as it

slowly meandered its way through the thick woods that paralleled my rock stand. It was no more than 100 yards away. I placed the crosshairs on the buck's shoulder and fired. At the report of the shot it took a few steps and dropped.

On the several hour drive back to Brooklyn, where

I was born and raised, I realized that although I

enjoyed hunting with Deadeye Dan, I had to admit

I did not put much forethought into buying my first

rifle. While the rifle was an excellent choice for the type of New York forest terrain I hunted, it had its limitations.

I wanted to expand my big game hunting to

include game including mule deer, elk, moose,



caribou, and antelope. To achieve that goal, I needed a rifle to match the game and types of terrain I would hunt throughout the West and Canada.

As I drove, I ruminated about magazine articles I read, written by the legendary Jack O'Connor, a well-known outdoor journalist of the time. In his big game hunting stories, O'Connor often wrote about his passion for the Winchester .270 bolt-

In almost all of his articles he regularly mentioned that a bolt-action is "the most reliable rifle action" there is, and the .270 is "the most versatile rifle caliber" as well.

action rifle.


The following day I took O'Connor's advice and bought a 1964 Model 70-.270 bolt-action Win., at Fred's Sporting Goods Store on 8th Avenue in Brooklyn.

It was to be the rifle that would broaden the types

of big game I wanted to hunt. Once I owned the rifle, I made a commitment to learn more about the intricacies and vernacular of rifles, several types of CONTINUED ON PAGE 12

ammunition, and optics.

Over the next 35 years (or so) as I hunted throughout the country, my .270 and I were inseparable. She was to become known to me as Ol' Betsy and it was my favorite big game rifle during that period.

Ol' Betsy was my "go-to" firearm for hunting whitetails, mule deer, elk, moose, bear, antelope, and caribou. Only the types of ammunition changed for the game hunted.

Sometime around 2003, I bought a new rifle: a Kimber 8400 .270 Winchester Short Magnum (WSM) Classic. The WSM is 130 fps faster than the .270 Win. with muzzle velocities of 3,100 and 2,970 fps, respectively.

Making The Right Choice

Herein lies the crux of this article. Before choosing a rifle, whether it is your first firearm or an additional rifle, choose a caliber and action for where you will hunt most with it. Think long and primary style of hunting and for the possibility that you may expand the big game animals you hunt. Considerations are numerous and some include

hard about what will work best for you and your

the rifle's caliber, action, weight, available bullet types, its fit and even its finish. For instance if you hunt mostly long-range open

areas, like farm fields found in upstate New York, choose a flat-shooting caliber that offers more room for error in range judgement. If you hunt in thick woods and other heavy cover, bullet drop is not a

crucial element. You can choose a heavier cartridge to acquire more efficient downrange bullet mass. As O'Connor wrote in the 60s and 70s, the best rifle caliber for deer and other big game is the .270 Win. Other popular calibers include 7 mm Remington

hunting every species of deer from whitetails to moose is the .308. However, if you are a die-in-the-wool northeast deer hunter, a .30-30 or a .35 caliber rifle is another

excellent choice, particularly when hunting in heavy

Magnum, .30-06 Springfield, 6.5 Creedmoor, .243

Winchester and my second favorite caliber for

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cover.

Here are some important points to consider when buying a rifle.

The Fit

First and foremost is what is known as the "fit." You must make sure the rifle fits you. Gun Fit is the ability to ensure that the firearm is tailored to the shooter. It is difficult to shoot a firearm that is too long, short, or heavy. A firearm that is not fitted to the shooter will increase the recoil which ends up causing poor accuracy.

The easiest way to tell if a rifle fits you is to shoulder it quickly. The butt of the stock should fall into place in to the crease of your shoulder and your cheek should make comfortable contact with the stock. Your eye must also fall in line with the sights. If these few elements (and others) are answered as yes, the rifle should fit you.

The Action

A rifle's action should definitely match your hunting style. For reliability it is nearly impossible to **CONTINUED ON PAGE 14**

The Ammunition The success of any hunt begins by selecting the

appropriate bullets. The fact is no one cartridge is designed to be ideal for all types of big game. Penetration, expansion, weight retention and range have to be assessed and selected based on

the type of game hunted and the location of where it is hunted.

Over the last few years ammo availability has become a major issue due to the shortage of ammunition types. So today, it is wise to choose

a caliber that is popular enough to have reliable

availability of ammo no matter where you hunt.

Anymore, it is often difficult to locate different cartridges. For instance, my second most favorite rifle is a Kimber 84M .338 Fed Montana, which is an extremely light firearm weighing in at just over 5 pounds. Cartridges for this rifle include 180-,


185-, and 210-grain bullets. Finding the 180-grain

The Firearm's Finish

Choosing a rifle's finish may seem a frivolous

point, but it isn't. If you hunt in areas with consistent damp, wet, snowy, or frigid weather it may be wise to consider a synthetic stock and a waterproof finish, particularly on the bare metal.



The Optics An often-over-looked factor is matching the best

rifle scope you can afford to your hunting style and locations. A rifle scope is a crucial part to seeing and impacting game super accurately, particularly when shooting at long distances on western game.

So choosing the best scope option you can afford is a critical point – even if it means having to save up for an extra year before outfitting it with an inexpensive scope. Some top choices include Swarovski, Tract Optics, Leupold, Zeiss, Trijicon, and Vortex.

Venison Chili Stuffed Bell Peppers

This is a twist on the classic stuffed green peppers. Ready-made venison chili (also known as leftover chili) comes in handy when preparing this scrumptious recipe.

Serves: 6

Prep Time: 10 minutes Cooking Time: 45 minutes

Ingredients:

6 large green or red bell peppers

1 pound venison chili, slightly drained if watery (leftover chili is ideal for this recipe)

2 cups cooked white rice

2 cups tomato sauce

½ pound cheddar cheese, grated

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F.

Remove the tops of the peppers and seed. Parboil the peppers in a pot of boiling water for about 3 to 5 minutes. Drain and rinse with cool water to stop the

Mix the cooked white rice in with the venison chili. Divide the chili mixture into 6 parts and fill each pepper. Pour tomato sauce on the bottom of a 13-by-9-by-2-inch glass baking dish. Place the stuffed

peppers in the glass baking dish on top of the tomato sauce and bake for about 40 minutes. During the last 10 minutes, top the peppers with cheese. Serve while

Venison Steak with Caper-Mustard Sauce

Serves: 4

Prep time: 10 minutes

Cooking Time: 20 minutes

Ingredients:

1 cup all-purpose flour

½ tsp. salt

½ tsp. pepper

4 boneless venison steaks or cutlets (about 6 oz. each), well-trimmed

2 tbsp. canola oil

1 medium onion, finely chopped

1 shallot, minced

2 tbsp. red wine vinegar 1/4 c. low sodium beef broth

¹/₄ c. nonfat plain yogurt (room temperature)

2 tbsp. drained and rinsed capers

1 tbsp. whole grain mustard


2 tbsp. chopped fresh parsley

Place flour in a large plastic food-storage bag: add salt and pepper and shake well to mix. Pat steaks dry, and dredge steaks in seasoned flour.

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In a heavy-bottomed skillet, heat oil over mediumhigh heat until hot but not smoking. Add steaks and cook for about 2 minutes on each side for mediumrare, or as desired. Transfer steaks to a platter; set aside and keep warm.

Add onion, shallot, and vinegar to same skillet. Sauté until vinegar has cooked away. Lower heat to medium and add broth, then yogurt. Before adding the yogurt, mix in a small amount of the warm seasoned broth to the yogurt to raise the temperature of the yogurt before it is added to the rest of the mixture in the pan. Simmer until the mixture is reduced by half; do not allow it to boil.

Remove the skillet from heat. Stir in the capers and mustard. Blend together thoroughly, then pour over steaks. Sprinkle with parsley and serve warm.

Salmon Croquettes

If you are fortunate to fish New York's famed Salmon River and land a succulent salmon this fall, here's a neat way to use any cooked leftovers. Although I like to make these tasty tidbits as a lunch meal in camp, they make delightful holiday starters as well.

Serves: 2 or 3

Cooking time: Less than 15 minutes

Ingredients:

2 eggs

2 cups flaked leftover cooked salmon

1 tbsp. minced parsley

1 tbsp. finely chopped onion

 $1\ c.\ crushed\ cracker\ crumbs\ or\ breadcrumbs$

¼ c. vegetable oil, approx.

In a mixing bowl, lightly beat the eggs. Add salmon, parsley and onion and mix gently but thoroughly. Form into cylindrical or round croquettes. Roll in cracker crumbs to coat entirely. Heat about ¼-inch of cooking oil in large skillet or Dutch over mediumhigh heat. Panfry the croquettes for about 3 minutes, turning occasionally until evenly browned on all sides. Serve warm.

Position Dutch oven over small bed of coals; place additional hot coals on top of the lid. Bake for 1 hour, replenishing coals as necessary. Check after the hour and add water if necessary to prevent burning. Re-cover and back for 30 to 60 minutes longer or until the roast is tender; replenish coals as necessary. Remove roast from Dutch oven and let sit for 10 to 15 minutes before

For Camp or Home Cooking in an Oven: Heat oven to 325F. Prepare roasr as noted above, placing into Dutch oven or casserole. Bake for 2 to 2 ½ hours, checking occasionally and adding water as necessary. If using a meat thermometer, remove when the center of the roast is at 125F for rare or 130 to 135F for medium-rare. As the roast sits, it will continue to cook and the temperature will rise another 5 degrees or so.

Venison Sausage Omelet Delight

Yields: 2 omelets Prep Time: 15 minutes

Cooking Time: 15 minutes

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I often prepare this filling breakfast recipe during the cold snowy winter months. It really hits the spot after a morning of shoveling and plowing the snow.





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INGREDIENTS

1/3 lb. bulk venison sausage
4 tbsp. butter (2 and 1 and 1)
1/3 c. fresh mushrooms, chopped
2 tbsp. onion, minced
4 eggs (2 and 2)
2 tbsp. milk (1 and 1)
Salt and pepper, to taste
1/4 c. aged cheddar cheese, shredded





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In a small skillet, sauté the sausage until it is browned. Remove the sausage and set aside.

Melt the 2 tbsp. butter in the skillet and sauté the mushrooms and onions over medium heat. Sauté until much of the juice from the mushrooms has been cooked out, about 5 to 7 minutes. Set the mushroom/onion mixture aside and keep warm.

In a small bowl, combine 2 eggs, 1 tbsp. of milk, and salt and pepper to taste. Beat gently with a fork until just blended. Melt 1 tsp. of the butter in an omelet pan over medium heat (when the heat is too high, the egg toughens too quickly). When the butter begins to sizzle, add the egg mixture and tilt the pan to spread the eggs over the bottom. As soon as the eggs set on the bottom, pull the cooked egg from the edge of the pan with a rubber spatula and tilt the pan to let the liquid egg flow underneath to cook. Set the pan back on the range top to continue cooking, repeat the process if necessary.

of the Sprinkle half cooked venison half of the mushroom/ sausage, onion mixture, and half of the cheese over one half of the omelet. Tilt the pan to one side and fold over the "empty" half of the omelet with a rubber spatula. Cover the omelet pan with a lid (or piece of foil) for 20 to 30 seconds to make sure all the cheese has melted. Remove, plate, and serve with hot biscuits and butter.

Cook the second omelet following the same procedures as the first.



The Fall Line:

Skiing tips for parents and kids

kiing is a life sport. Once you have the skills and confidence, it opens up a whole new world and a way to explore that world from many angles. Skiing is a sport that you can enjoy alone, as a family, with friends or as part of a team. It is never too late to get on skis; but starting younger or with your children is a great beginning. Ski programs impart confidence, team building, and decision-making to young skier which help them because competent adults.

Skiing with Children

As we approach ski season, parents with small children often ask me, "When is a good time to get my child on skis?" Age 3 is a great time to introduce kids to skiing. If you are a parent who skis, get a ski harness with a mini backpack for your little one. The harness allows you to ski behind your child because it

has leashes that permit you to help your child practice turns and control speed. You can also use the leashes to help slow or stop your child. The backpack also has a little handle to lift little ones onto the chairlift, which can be high for growing legs.

Using the ski harness allowed Ian to progress quickly; learning balance he was able to ski on his own and use a snow plow (pizza) in under two weeks. Although Ian was skiing on his own, we had him wear the back pack so we could use the handle to help him on the chairlift; or if we needed the leashes.

After using the harness, you can play "follow the leader" or have your little one trace your tracks to help them initiate turns. The key here is making it fun while teaching them to make turns on the slope.

Ski lessons are a great way to start the ski season for skiers of all levels beginner, intermediate, or advanced. Lessons review the key fundamen-CONTINUED ON PAGE 27

tals of skiing, which are balance and athletic stance, direct pressure toward the outside ski, and how to create an edge angle through a combination of inclination and angulation.

separation of upper and lower body where the legs move laterally (across the hill) to produce pressure on the outside ski while the upper body (above the waist line) remains relaxed and faces downhill.

I also advocate enrolling your son or daughter, particularly if they ski on high school alpine race teams, in a week-long mountain or race program during the winter holiday break. These

allow the skier to master all terrain, including black and double black diamonds, in a proficient and confident manner.

The only major difference between a mountain and race program is that the latter introduces training environments that challenge the skier to exhibit a variety skills through the use of brushes, gates, and slalom poles. Several ski hills in the area offer these programs. Early fall is the time to inquire about these programs as they fill

Find Your Fall-Line

The cornerstone of "great" skiing is pressure in the fall line. The fall line refers to an area on a slope that runs straight down the hill where gravitational forces are the greatest. When working with skiers, I help them visualize the fall line by rolling a tennis ball down the hill. Next, I tell

them to enter the fall line by getting their skis

parallel to the line (ski tips facing down the hill)

created by the tennis ball and then exit the fall line, using the fundamentals I explained above, and reenter the fall line. The purpose of this exercise is to have the skier use gravity to their advantage. Two-time U.S. Olympic Gold Medalist, Ted Ligety, refers to this application as "running downhill." The picture below illustrates this con-

cept in action.


Notice how the ski tips are facing straight down the hill (i.e., in the fall line) and both skiers are pressuring the outside ski into the fall line with the upper body facing down the hill. These body movements are producing high edge angles on the skis allowing them to initiate a clean turn. This position is not static; it is held only for a split second. Both skiers exit the fall line once they pass the gate and they repeat the same movement for the next turn.

Making skiers aware of the fall line allows them to "feel" the pressure, and acceleration, of the skis as they move across the hill when they come out of the fall line. Once they feel this sensation their skiing is taken to a different level.

Ski season is on its way, and it is a short season,

so "seize the moment." Think snow!


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
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Marino's Outdoor World enters 100th year

long-standing staple of the town of Hancock, Marino's Outdoor World of Hancock in Delaware County, keeps family tradition alive as it entered into its 100th year of supplying the residents of Hancock and beyond with outdoorsmen products and more.

Originally, the store operated as only a fine clothing store. It was opened in 1922 by Dominic J. Marino, an Italian merchant who immigrated to the United States at 17 years old, and whose early expertise in tailoring allowed him to start the business.

Before opening the store, Dominic entered into an apprenticeship at a tailor shop in New York City. In August of 1922, he purchased the store, which has since relocated to its present station, 95 E Front Street, Hancock, and officially opened later that same year.

Since then, the Marino family has continued on with owning and oper-

ating the store.

When Dominic passed away in his late 80s, the store transferred hands to his grandson, Donald in the mid-1980s. Following tradition, the store

stayed in the family.

In 1990, Donald's brother, John, and father, Donald Joseph, were brought on board to help with the store.

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
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


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Still keeping watch over the store is a portrait of Dominic J. Marino, founder and original owner of what is now Marino's Outdoor World.




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
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Education and general history are also important to the Marino family as behind the shelves is a museum-level collection of antique weaponry and firearms with some even dating back to the American Revolutionary War!



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A tribute to Rod Smith; Friend, taxidermist, sports fan



od Smith loved a good laugh and enjoying a good time, whether on the baseball diamond, at hunting camp, at work or just having a beer with friends and teammates at a local watering hole.

This year will mark the first year that Rod Smith won't be reading the Sullivan County Democrat to see who is winning the newspaper's long-time Big Buck Contest.

"Rod was a true friend and he supported the contest full bore for more than 30 years," Democrat Publisher Fred Stabbert said. "My dad loved going into Rod's Taxidermy to tell Rod his hunting stories and catch up on all the local scoops.

"And we can't thank Rod enough for his 30plus years of providing the free mount for the



champion of the Big Buck Contest," Stabbert said. "What he did was make great memories for people for years to come."

Hal Roeder, who owns Buddenhagen Ford in Hortonville, knew Rod for close to 45 years. "I started playing softball for Peck's

Hal said those days were filled with great laughs and great times as the Western Sullivan Men's Softball League was a competitive group that played nearly 30 games a summer plus half a dozen weekend tournaments.

And Rod would be either at second base or right field, always ready.

A true baseball fan, Hal said Rod was looking forward to this year's Mets season.

Unfortunately, Rod passed away on April 18 at the age of 66.

Hal also knew Rod from deer hunting and Rod was the taxidermist who mounted many of Hal's trophy bucks, whether they were from Sullivan County or Nebraska.

"Just last week Chris (Rod's wife) came down to the house and gave me the picture of Rod and I when I won the Democrat," Hal said. "Chris said that Rod had that picture on their refrigerator for a long time - and now it's on mine."

True Mentor

Rod was a long-time Callicoon businessman, owner and operator of Rod's Taxidermy for more than 30 years.

The shop first started in the back of D & K Sports Shop on Upper Main St., in the former Popolillo's Shoe Store, before moving to its present location on 17B.

"Rod operated the taxidermy studio and Don and Kathy Meckle had the sports shop," Louis Milucky, current owner of Rod's Taxidermy, remembered.

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too," Louis said.

Louis remembered Rod as a handshake type of guy, whose word was his bond and who always had time for

fishing," and Rod would watch over the store,

whose word was his bond and who always had time for a friend. Louis was working in Lander's River Mart in the late

1990s when one day he walked into Rod's Taxidermy with Rod's coffee – he always delivered him coffee – and asked if he was hiring.

"I am hiring, but only part-time," Rod said.

"That's fine," Louis said. "And the next day I had a

job."

Rod was old school.

Rod taught Louis the tricks of the trade, how to deal

with customers and how to provide customers with outstanding mounts, no matter the game.

After about 8 or 9 years in the business Louis asked

Rod if he would consider selling – and the rest is history.

"Again, it was a handshake deal and a one-page contract," Louis laughed. "I worked for three more years under Rod and then bought the business outright."

That's who Rod was.

Louis said Rod always had friends in the shop, including long-time fishing and hunting guide Bill Fraser, who loved to play jokes on Rod.

One day Bill brought in a remote fart machine and slipped the microphone into Rod's jacket. When Rod

and coached them on their championship Little League teams when they were little.


Over the years, Rod enjoyed trips to Big Sky Country – Montana – to hunt and visit family.
