Dan and Joan Silna

The Silnas are no strangers to Sullivan County and especially White Lake.

In 1944, the Silna family bought a house on the corner of Lake St. and Route 55 and Dan said, "I have visited Sullivan County every summer and spent part of every summer for my entire life up here."

In fact, Dan and Joan actually met each other in Sullivan County.

And his 78-year connection to the county has been one of caring for the community and wanting to make the area a better place.

In the late 2010s, Dan and Joan embarked on a project that would help

transform Sullivan County's hospitality industry.

They invested tens of millions of dollars in the Eldred Preserve, which includes The Homestead Restaurant and The Bradstan Boutique Hotel.

Combined, the business employs nearly 50 full-and-part-time employees.

"We didn't do what we did for the honor, we did it because we thought it was the right thing to do," Dan Silna, who along with wife Joan, were very hands-on during the building process, said.

Silna added, "Eldred wasn't my first choice, I wanted to do it in White Lake. [But] Eldred is the better place and Eldred is the right place."

"The visual of the new Eldred Preserve is very important and meaningful," he said. "It seems that people really enjoy the facility and take advantage of it."

Silna said last year The Eldred Preserve got off to a tremendous start

The numbers tell the story also. At 11.6% Sullivan County had the fastest year over year job growth in the region. Unemployment is down to 3.2% and we added 3,100 jobs or



of the gains are jobs being refilled, but CEO/President Marc Baez we now have over 250 more

people in the workforce than prior to the pandemic, so the growth is real despite there not being enough people to fill existing jobs.

Tourism destination projects continue to grow with the Northgate/Camp FIMFO investment, continued enhancements at the Eldred Preserve, and Foster Supply Hospitality leading the way. Kerilands, a once in a lifetime conservation resort destination project too holds much promise to take ecotourism in Sullivan County to a whole new level.

Diversification remains a priority as developers have secured approvals for a variety of light industrial/logistics projects with more to come. New microbreweries, an organic snack producer and a variety of new retail establishments round off what has been a busy economic development year here at the Partnership.

Truly Sullivan County IS the place to be! Wishing you all a wonderful fall and yes, the upcoming holiday season.


Earlier this year we introduced an Influencer Program with our social media partner, Awestruck. Since

WVOS celebrates diamond anniversary

station WVOS, known as the Voice of Sullivan, began broadcasting at 1240 on the AM dial on September 26th 1947.

The station, licensed to Liberty, New York, was the county's only radio station for the next 30 years, with a companion FM signal added in 1964.

One of the station's biggest news scoops was on July 20, 1969, when it broke the news that the Woodstock Music and Art Fair an Aquarian Exposition: 3 Days of Peace & Music was going to be held in Bethel, NY.

WVOS dropped its music programming in 2010, when it was


rebranded as Spanish-language: 1240 ESPN Deportes.





HISTORY

raig Schumacher's construction career started soon after he was released from the Military in 1969. He worked for AT&T as a lineman on outside construction before returning to school in 1972 to complete his associates degree. While attending college, he began painting houses to pay the bills. "My wife's grandfather was a full-time painter at the Pines hotel in South Fallsburg and he took me under his wing, teaching me and helped me to acquire a number of contracts I probably wouldn't have gotten by myself." Painting evolved into patching drywall, patching evolved into taping and hanging drywall. Business accelerated to the point that he couldn't handle all the work himself.

so he hired employees and subcontractors and it became Schumacher Drywall. The business hanged and taped hundreds of houses over eighteen years.

By 1990 he decided to move on to become a commercial and unionized contractor, and Schumacher Drywall became Schumacher Systems Inc.

FAMILY

"I don't think that either of us had a clue as to exactly what I would be doing at the company when I started working for my father the Summer of my freshman year at Syracuse University, but we had faith that I would figure it out and I did," says Kori Allen, Schumacher's daughter. "That first Summer, I developed a purchase order system utilizing database software. I continued to work for the

company during school breaks while I pursued my education. During my sophomore year of college, I decided to change my major from the medical track to construction management. "Her dad officially offered her a position at Schumacher Systems the semester before graduation and she accepted, beginning her career as a project manager for 9 years until she took over the accounting department in 2005. "I continued to run small projects and as we grew our accounting staff, I was able to take on large projects again. I believe that I will always have one foot in each department so that I can easily pivot and help where needed." Similarly, her younger brother Brett joined the business after high school where Craig started him as an apprentice on job sites. He also went on to college for construction management and joined the company.

Both she and her brother agree that one of the

biggest challenges in owning a family business is that there is more pressure to succeed because it's not just the company you can let down but also your family. "I feel the same responsibility to my employees and their families as well." Adds Kori.

Reputation Matters! "When Schumacher Systems is hired for a project, we go above and beyond to provide first rate service." Says Kori, "My father was a stickler for quality as are Brett and I, as well as our foremen. Quality work and honest business practices are a cornerstone of the Schumacher name.

Kori feels that there is no substitute for putting your nose to the grindstone. "I worry that the next generation does not really understand what it takes to produce their own success."

TRANSITION

When COVID struck, Kori and Brett didn't feel that

at the jobsites any longer. He agreed but quickly took it one step further and decided that this was the right time to retire. "I think the timing worked out very well. Brett and I had so much experience under our belts that it was an easy transition," says Kori. Craig decided that at almost 70 years of age, it was time to retire. "I love my children and am very proud of them. I hope for their success in business as well as their personal life," says Craig, "I hope they can moderate both. There should be a balance.'


SC Partnership Board of Directors Chairman Randy Resnick said, "This past fiscal year Kelsey has been an invested member of the Partnership's Membership Committee.

Project Includes Replacing Boilers, Geothermal Heat Pumps, and other HVAC Infrastructure and Installing

Energy-Efficient Windows and Lighting

SUNY Sullivan is renewing its commitment to sustainability through a \$9.8 million energy efficiency and facilities upgrade project that will bring significant cost savings to Sullivan County and cement the college's status as a model green campus in New York State.

The energy efficiency project—which includes replacing the campus's failing 22-year-old boilers and 130 geothermal heat pumps, installing high-efficiency windows, LED lighting, and other energy-saving upgrades to campus facilities—is being financed and implemented by the New York Power Authority (NYPA), which will be reimbursed by Sullivan County with matching funding from New York State through SUNY's Office for Capital Facilities Community College Capital Program.

When complete, the project will result in significant energy and cost savings for Sullivan County, reducing annual greenhouse gas emissions by nearly 400 metric tons and strengthening SUNY Sullivan's leadership in environmental sustainability and social responsibility in the Catskills region and across higher education.
