
In 2022, Carl took on a critical position managing the entire logistics team throughout Bethel Woods' busiest year ever, which included more than 200,000



Sara Hazelnis

s a freshman at Brandeis University, Sara Hazelnis thought she was going to be a clinical psychologist. However, an immersive summer semester focusing on the intersection of nutrition, diabetes, and healthcare access in the Boston area set her on a new path.

Hazelnis, 31, has always had an interest in food, with fond memories of baking with her grandmother, and a love of cooking that blossomed while she was in college. This passion for food, nutrition, and a desire to leave a positive impact on her community and the youth, is why she's been a perfect fit at A Single Bite.

The Youngsville-based non-profit was started by Foster Supply Hospitality Co-Founders Sims and Kirsten Harlow Foster as a program educating students about why good food is important.

Its initial goal was to empower Sullivan County students to care about real, healthy food and where it comes from. During the COVID-19 pandemic, they shifted their focus to also provide meals for local families in need.

As the Director of Operations for A Single Bite, Hazelnis manages the vast majority of the organization's day-to-day activities including the development and implementation of their two core programs, the Family Meal Program and Real Food Education Program, the integration of A Single Bite merchandise and promotional materials into Foster Supply properties, the maintenance of financial records and social media for the organization, as well as any and everything else the small organization needs.

Hazelnis and the team are currently working on growing the non-profit, including relocation, the expansion of current programs, and the implementation of three novel programs, details of which will be shared in the near future

A trip south and return home

Hazelnis, a 2009 Liberty High School graduate double majored in Psychology and Health: Science, Society and Policy at Brandeis.

After college she joined FoodCorps, who partners with schools and communities to nourish kids' health, education, and sense of belonging. Their members serve alongside educators and school nutrition leaders to provide kids with nourishing meals, food education, and culturally affirming experiences with food that celebrate and nurture the whole child.

That journey led her to the Mississippi Delta, where she taught gardening and nutrition to public school students and began moonlighting as a manager at a fine dining restaurant. Following her FoodCorps experience, she became Food Service Director at a

where she continued to develop her passion for child nutrition. Hazelnis was then asked to return to the same fine dining restaurant in the Delta as General Manager, where she remained for two years.

During the first year of the COVID-19 pandemic, Hazelnis decided to pivot back into the nutrition field and returned to Sullivan County to pursue an online Master's Degree in the subject. Shortly after, she began volunteering with A Single Bite, before joining their staff in the summer of 2021.

Hazelnis said the thing she enjoys most about her work with A Single Bite is being able to give back to the community where she grew up.

"I think if we can get through to kids specifically, as they're the most malleable, it can make the largest impact, in terms of the health of our county, going forward," said Hazelnis, adding that our area has a lot to offer in terms of food and culinary experiences.

Hazelnis notes that getting kids excited about real food and cooking is something she loves to share with them.

"Even if they don't remember who I am, that doesn't really matter," she said. "What matters is that the little seed gets planted and that has the potential to grow into something positive."

On advice to other young professionals, Hazelnis said it's ok to see where things take you. For example, she didn't think she'd ever work in a restaurant before her time in Mississippi, yet that experience allowed her to develop management, interpersonal, and multi-tasking skills, all in a fastpaced environment.

She also stressed not being afraid to seek advice.

"Talk to other people who [professionally] interest you, whether you're doing the same thing or not. See how your experiences compare to theirs and what you might be able to learn from each other," said Hazelnis. "I think a lot of times we see our careers as somewhat of a competition, but they don't have to be. It's really about raising each other up and, in many ways, doing the most good."



rian Conaty, turning 31 on March 26, is currently the Acting District Attorney (DA) of Sullivan County and has held the position since his appointment late last year.

A local Sullivan County resident and high school graduate from Burke Catholic in Goshen, Conaty set his sights out for something higher.

His parents, Betsy and Phil Conaty, instilled his passion for the work he does through their own careers. His mother, a graduate of Eldred HS, earned her doctorate in sports management after attending the University of North Carolina as a three-times national champion in soccer and an all-American Athlete. His father had a successful career as a lawyer with a local tie, serving as Assistant District Attorney in the Sullivan County DA's Office from 1979 to 1985.

Initially following in his mother's footsteps into the world of sports management, Conaty attended college and earned his undergraduate degree at West Virginia University. After graduating, his career focus shifted to that along the lines of his father – attending school at the Touro Law Center.

After his graduation from Touro Law Center as Magna Cum Laude, he was invited to begin his employment in Sullivan County's legal scene by former DA Meagan Galligan, serving under former DA Jim Farrell. In succession, Galligan became DA after Farrell, and since her ascension to the bench as New York State's Third Judicial District Court Justice, Conaty has risen to take the reins of the office.

Conaty said that he drew inspiration from what his father told him, quoting him saying that "being a prosecutor is the best job in the legal profession," to which Conaty said he found to be accurate.

The Acting DA said that he is proud to have support from the community, and that he hopes to continue to do so in the future, as the General Election will be held in November.

As iron sharpens iron, Conaty understands the struggles of being a young professional in Sullivan County.

"It's becoming possible for young professionals to stay in Sullivan County to find and develop meaningful careers," Conaty said.

In a word of encouragement to other young people of the area, he said to "Find your passion – and be bold enough to chase it."



Brina Cohen

For Brina Cohen, the Music Coordinator for New Hope Community in Loch Sheldrake, the quote, "Where words fail, music speaks," really describes her work for the people New Hope Community supports.

Cohen has been with New Hope for almost 10 years, starting as a job coach and later moving to residential before becoming the music coordinator. She uses music as a therapeutic tool for the people that New Hope Community supports.

On any given day, Cohen starts her day by working with different program groups and organizing activities geared towards adults with varying intellectual and developmental disabilities, like karaoke, music crafts, and music-themed bingo, among others.

Cohen also plays music for the people she supports and has recently worked on a music-themed Candyland-inspired board game.

When the COVID-19 pandemic set in, Cohen was separated from the people she supports by a screen in order to keep them as safe as possible. However, working through a screen just wasn't the same.

"All of the recreation coordinators were using Zoom. I was able to play music and teach the people we support about musicians and some music theory. It was really tricky, but we made it work for the time being," added Cohen.

After the pandemic, Brina was able to organize talent shows, lip sync battles, and a percussion ensemble, among other things.

Cohen says that using music as a therapeutic tool has unique benefits and challenges for the people New Hope Community supports. Cohen believes that music gives individuals who may not be able to express themselves the opportunity to do so.

For Cohen, one of the most rewarding moments of her work was

during their first percussion ensemble concert. For the 12 members, Cohen said she was proud of their hard work. learned They basic rhythms, dynamic changes, and about differpercussion instruments from all over the world. They met once a week and had two concerts in 2022.

"The percussion members were so excited to learn something new and be able to perform and

showcase their talents for their friends and family," added Cohen.

Cohen herself is a musician and has been playing saxophone since she was eight years old, starting when she attended Liberty Central School district. She sings and plays the ukulele, piano, and a little bit of drums. Although she does not play actively in a band outside of work, she enjoys picking up her instruments. Also, outside of work, Cohen enjoys spending time with her family and friends, especially her two nephews.

Cohen is also the advisor for several organizations. She serves as an advisor for New Hope as some of the people supported are in the Kiwanis Aktion Club of Sullivan County. She also advises New Hope's Self-Advocacy group and is a certified coach for the Special Olympics of New York. These roles provide opportunities for the people she supports to connect with others, give back to their community, and develop new skills.

Currently, Cohen is studying psychology at Southern New Hampshire University and says to young professionals who want to live and work in Sullivan County, "If you're passionate about something, stick



with it. There's always an opportunity to find something that fits you."

p until recently, 29-year-old Jessica Thalmann Osterhout didn't know how to conduct a car inspection or do an oil change. This is despite growing up at Thalmann's Service Center, which was started by her father, the late Daniel Thalmann, in 1993.

"The most I did [growing up] was push a broom and clean the bathroom and coffee station," she jokes, also reminiscing of bicycle rides in the parking lot.

However, when her father passed away unexpectedly from a heart attack last spring, Jessica and her older sister Alyssa (a fifth grade teacher at Liberty) jumped in and kept the family business running smoothly.

The sisters now co-own the shop, and while Alyssa assists on weekends, Jessica serves as the manager, arriving each day between 7:15 a.m. and 7:30 a.m. It's in that quiet period before the shop opens that she prepares the list of jobs each mechanic has for the day. She also handles the billing and banking for the shop.

At first the sisters looked for someone to replace their dad, but in their eyes, no one could measure up. Then, Jessica decided that she wanted to stay at the shop full-time and learn mechanics, which Alyssa gave her blessing for her to do.

"That meant the world to me," Jessica said, adding that that night she had a dream of her father giving her a hug and telling her he was proud of her. "From there it just fell into place."

Thalmann, a 2012 graduate of Liberty High School, earned her Associate's Degree in Humanities from SUNY Sullivan, before attending SUNY New Paltz where she earned her Bachelor's in Sociology. She's currently attending Grand Canyon University online, pursuing her Master's Degree in Teaching, while leading the day-to-day at the shop.

She continues to enthusiastically learn the different aspects of mechanics, most recently adding mounting and balancing tires, as well as changing brakes to her repertoire.

While completing her Master's is still the goal, Jessica said she sees herself being at the shop for the rest of her life, not just because it was her father's business, but because she's fallen in love with it.

"Not many people get to wake up and say they love going to work, but I do," she said. "I love the guys here, I love the community and I love the customers."

Jessica is very active in the community, as a member of both the Liberty Rotary and Lions Clubs. She is also a member of the Professional Women of Sullivan County, just jumped in Berean Lake to raise awareness/funds for the Alzheimer's Association as part of Team Strike Out Alz, a member of the Sullivan County Chamber of Commerce, and recently took her father's seat on the Liberty Republican Committee.

When not working or taking part in those organizations, Jessica is very busy with family. She's married to Andrew Osterhout and has three children - Blake (8), Lucas (5) and Thomas (1.5), with the older two very involved in scouting and/or youth wrestling.

On her advice to other young professionals, Jessica said, "Follow your dreams and believe in yourself, even if everyone around you is saying you can't. Hold your dreams near and dear and run with any support you get."

She also thanks the community for all the support they've given her family as well as the shop. She also is grateful for her family and coworkers.

"None of this would be possible without my sister, Alyssa Thalmann, the lead mechanic Troy Nietzel, and mechanics Jim, Joe and Sam," she said. "Troy is the foundation of it all; he was with my dad for 25 years and has been the biggest supporter and help through this all, teaching me the ins and outs of how dad ran the business."

t the age of nine, Erin Denman, now 23, got started with Cornell Cooperative Extension (CCE) Sullivan County's 4-H Youth Development program, specializing in horses. By the end of her high school career, she'd earn the prestigious Norman F. Gabriel award. The Tri-Valley alum had initially decided to attend SUNY Cobleskill, a college where many go for a career in Equine Studies.

"That's what everyone expected me to [pursue] but I threw them for a loop," Denman said with a smile. isn't working, reading or writing, she also enjoys traveling. So far she's been to Sweden, Finland, Denmark and Norway. She also has a love of theater that began in high school.

Denman, who was SUNY Cobleskill's Theater Club President for a time, is still active with SUNY New Paltz's theatre department, having recently served as dramaturg for one of their recent plays, "Unnatural Acts: The Secret Court of 1920."

On advice for young professionals, Denman encourages them to be open to connections, to meet people, make new friends, as well as be open to new experiences.

"Learn everything you can," she said. "Even if at first you don't end up doing what you love, be open to getting your foot in the door, everywhere. Whether it's starting as a food server at a restaurant, watching someone's dog or working on a farm. This year has been a whirlwind of losses for our family; through these losses I have watched my sister Jessica blossom into an entrepreneur and active community member.


