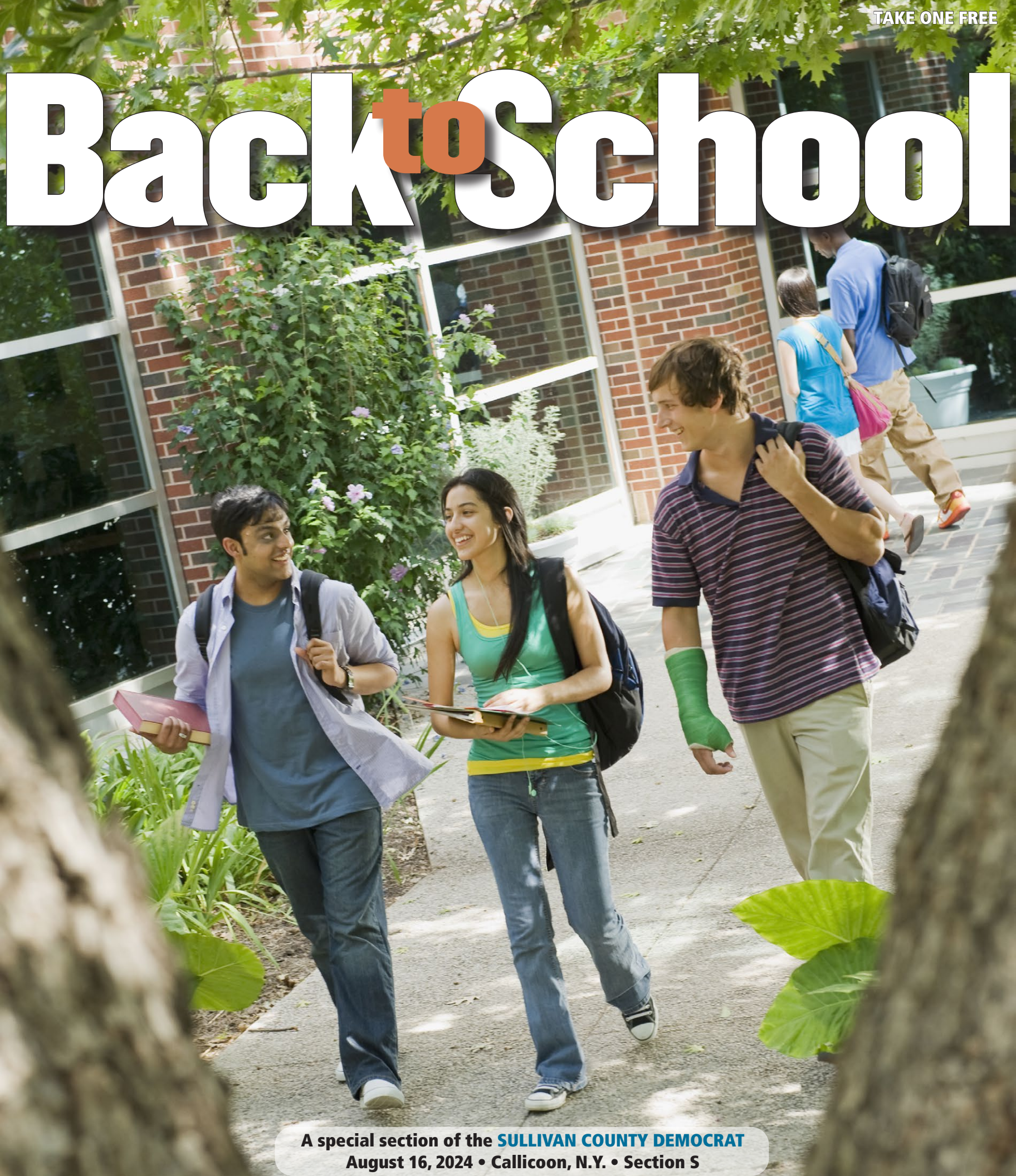

Preparing your kids for a smooth back-to-school transition

As summer winds down, the thought of sending your kids back to school can bring excitement and anxiety. The start of a new school year is an important time for children and parents alike, full of new beginnings and opportunities. Opening day for students will be September 3 for Eldred CSD, September 4 for Fallsburg CSD, and September 5 for the remaining Sullivan County school districts and BOCES.

As parents plan for the new school year, they should periodically check their mail, email, and designated school communication platforms. Districts typically send back-to-school informational packets before the start of the school year.

It is also essential to provide your school district with your current phone number, cell phone number, and email address. Correct contact information allows the district to communicate important information, changes, and events with parents and guardians. Bookmarking the school's website and following them on social media is also helpful for obtaining quick access to the district's latest updates.

School districts encourage parents to schedule their child's physicals early, as getting an appointment just before the new school year begins can be challenging. If a family does not have a pediatrician, parents can also contact the Sullivan County Public Health

Nursing Service at (845) 292-5910 to inquire about vaccine clinics.

To help make this transition as smooth as possible, here are ten essential tips:

1. Establish a Routine

Routines provide a sense of security and stability for children. A week or two before school starts, begin transitioning back to the school-year schedule. Set regular bedtimes and wake-up times to help your child adjust to the early mornings.

2. Visit the School

If your child is starting a new school or moving to a different grade, visiting the school beforehand can alleviate anxiety. Walk through the school, find their classroom, and meet their teacher. Familiarity will make the first day less daunting.

3. Organize School Supplies Together

Involving your child in the process of gathering and organizing school supplies can build excitement and reduce nervousness. Let them choose their backpack, notebooks, and other essentials.

4. Create a Homework Station

Designate a quiet, well-lit space in your home as a homework station. Having a specific place for schoolwork can help your child focus and establish good study habits.

5. Set Goals and Expectations

Who is A Single Bite?
A Single Bite is a nonprofit organization in Sullivan County. Founded in 2019 by Foster Supply Hospitality, their mission is to feed and educate children and their families with real, local food.

Why they do it

Many families in the community lack financial means, nutrition education, transportation, or a combination of barriers to access nutritious food. In fact, one in five children in Sullivan County do not get enough to eat. Thirteen percent of residents live below the poverty line, and the percentage of children who are food insecure — those do not have adequate access to enough food to live an active, healthy life — is 18.3%. That's 2.2% higher than the national average and the highest in New York's Hudson Valley. As a result, children and families are at risk for poor health outcomes.

Their Solutions

A Single Bite works with schools, local pantries, food banks, and assistance programs to help low-income, rural families access healthy, locally grown food.

A Single Bite's free Family Meal Program, provides complete, scratch-made meals to those that need them tonight. Since 2020, A Single Bite has been a reliable source of healthy, nutritious food, providing 170,000 prepared meals. Each week volunteers deliver 600 servings to food insecure children and their families.

They continue to work toward a generational solution to Food Insecurity and related health challenges by providing their Real Food Education Program to middle school students. Through a four-part Real Food Education Program, they teach children

about the nutritional difference between processed food and real food and how those choices can affect their health now and for a lifetime. This experiential program has been provided FREE in every Sullivan County school district since 2019, reaching more than 2,600 different students — up to 700 youth each year.

The Future for A Single Bite

Their recent relocation to the Catskills Food Hub in Liberty has enabled them to expand their core programs further and become an essential part of the region's food economy. Supporting local producers and farm-to-school programs helps increase the volume and variety of fresh produce on school menus, at local food pantries, and for working families.

And, a newly constructed commercial kitchen will enable A Single Bite to increase the number of meals they can deliver — helping them to better meet the needs of local families.

A Single Bite is also a key player in a County-wide Farm-to-School initiative. At the Liberty location we procure, aggregate, lightly process and distribute NYS product directly to schools. By working with the Hudson Valley Food Bank and the not-for-profit Sullivan 180, they are supporting School Food Pantries and Backpack programs to deliver more local food to students.

Entering only their fifth year serving the community, A Single Bite partners with schools, local pantries and soup kitchens, food banks and assistance programs, to help low income, rural families access healthy, locally grown food.

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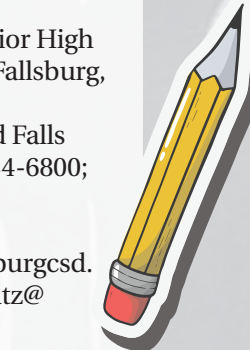

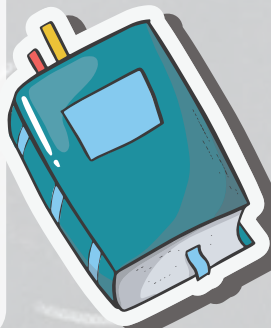

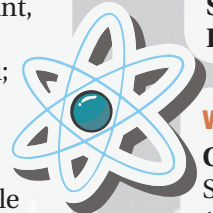

One of the most important aspects of getting ready for the school year is acquiring the proper supplies for the specific grade your child will be going into. Not only is it about what supplies to get, but also where to get them. There are a handful of supply shops in Sullivan County that will help you get everything you need before the 2024-25 school year begins in a couple of weeks.

For any grade a student is going into, they will need a backpack. If a new backpack is needed for this school year, two places to look for them are Marshalls and Old Navy in the Thompson Mall in Monticello. There is a variety of backpack selections in each of these stores, including different sizes, shapes and designs. Keep in mind that sturdiness over style is something to look out for with backpacks, especially for high schoolers who will have to hold a lot of weight with many textbooks and notebooks.

Marshalls and Old Navy are also great stores to go clothes shopping for kids of any age with their wide selection of stylish clothing at great value. Marshalls has a large selection of high-quality and brand-name merchandise, from coats to jackets to tees to shoes and pants. The Art Shoppe, as it is locally known, has markers, watercolor paints, canvases, colored pencils, coloring books, airbrushes, oil paints and a lot more. Most art classes will supply the students with art supplies, but it never hurts to have your own at home.

Other important supplies you should look to get for your kid(s) are three-ring binders and loose-leaf paper to organize their notes, dividers, pencil sharpeners, a water bottle, index cards for studying, a calendar or planner and a lunch-

2022-23 Sullivan 180 Empowering a Healthier

Generation competition winners implement projects

Since its inception in 2021 Sullivan 180's Empowering a Healthier Generation (EHG) program has been actively growing into all Sullivan County public school buildings. The 2022-23 school year saw the launch of the inaugural EHG Competition, a year-long initiative that provided participating schools with a \$5,000 grant to implement a project and then compete for larger prize funding. The competition ended in June 2023 and the next phase of work is happening, with schools making meaningful strides toward creating communities of health within their individual buildings.

About the EHG Program

Empowering a Healthier Generation engages Sullivan County School Districts in promoting health and wellness among students, staff, parents and their communities. The goal of the program is to create a grassroots movement that will change policy and environments, while demonstrating that individuals and families have an important role to play in building a culture of health for themselves and the next generation. Efforts focus on access to healthy food and physical activity as well

as social and emotional wellness.

Sullivan 180 has engaged Healthier Generation Advisors representing all Sullivan County public school buildings and Sullivan BOCES. Healthier Generation Advisors receive an annual stipend from Sullivan 180 to serve as liaisons and coordinators for the Healthier Generation work in their school building. In addition, they are eligible to apply for grants to support and implement initiatives that advance the wellness goals of their schools.

An EHG Council is comprised of School District Wellness Coordinators, Healthier Generation Advisors and organizations that offer resources to the schools and the community.

2022-23 EHG Competition

During the 2022-23 school year, Sullivan 180 launched the first Empowering a Healthier Generation Competition. This competition invited school buildings to apply for a Phase 1 grant of up to \$5,000 to support an idea in one of 4 areas of wellness: Nutrition; Connection to Nature; Mental Health/Social Emotional Wellness; and/or Physical Activity. Participating schools also received Sullivan 180 staff support and technical assistance as part of the process.

Five school buildings were awarded Healthier Generation Competition Grants in the amount of \$5,000 each; and competed for Healthier Generation Awards in the amount of \$75,000 and \$50,000 that were presented in September 2023.

2022-23 EHG Competition Participants & Awardees Included:

- Awardees have been busy implementing the Phase 2 projects since the start of 2024.

Sullivan West Elementary School used their 1st Place Award of \$75,000 for multiple projects. They created a staff fitness center "to provide a space, equipment and opportunity for staff to work together and support one another's wellness goals," as shared in their impact statement. "Being physically

active contributes to the health and happiness of staff so they can be their best for our students."

Additionally, a Book Vending Machine was unveiled in the spring. The Book Vending Machine offers Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS) by allowing students to earn tokens as a reward for meeting school-related criteria. The tokens can be used in the Book Vending Machine.

Sullivan West Elementary also purchased ten Big Wheel Trikes to be used during outdoor activity, four large picnic tables for students and staff members to use during class and breaks, and the entire elementary school participated in Cornell Cooperative Extension's Earth Defender Program. Lastly, Kindergarten through 4th grade participated in the Yellow Chase Bird Concert through Bethel Woods Center for the Arts.

Benjamin Cosor Elementary, Fallsburg has broken ground on an outdoor learning space with their 2nd Place Award of \$50,000. They are completely renovating one of the school's courtyards so that they can bring the students out of the classroom as often as possible.

Livingston Manor Elementary and Middle/High School combined their Judges' Choice Awards totaling \$10,000 and invested in new fencing that allowed them to extend their Nature trail, which now runs from the school building, along the Willemoc Creek, to their outdoor classroom. The fencing allowed for a safe, scenic route

that can be an extension of the outdoor classroom.

Cooke Elementary, Monticello used their Judges' Choice Award of \$5,000 to purchase an independent climber, a fresh new addition to their Kindergarten playground, which replaced an older metal piece of equipment.

Sullivan 180 launched a new round of the Healthier Generation Competition in September 2023. This competition will conclude in June 2025. Stay updated on the EHG Program, the EHG Competition projects and how to get involved via social media and at sullivan180.org/2024-projects.
