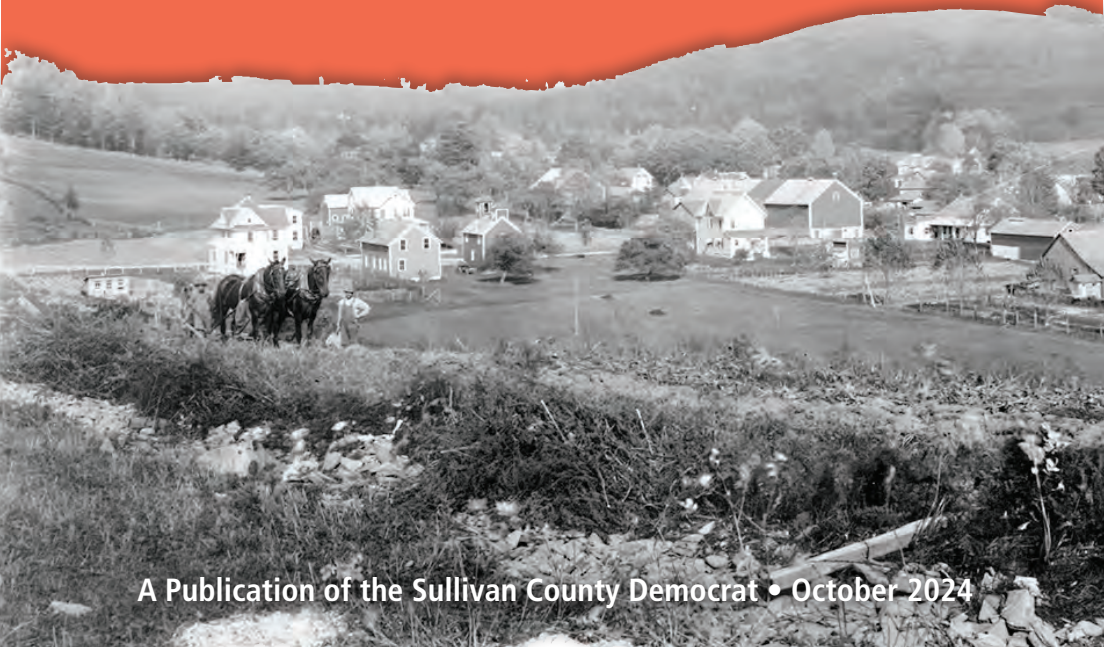

Sullivan County's Jeffersonville at 100

Even before New York Governor Kathy Hochul recently cleared the way for a new village to be formed in Sullivan County – a referendum on January 18 will determine the fate of what is proposed to be called Ateres – there had been quite a bit of attention focused on villages in the state.

There are currently 532 villages in New York, but nearly five times as many have been dissolved over the past 30 years as have been created.

Six of New York's villages are in Sullivan County. Monticello, incorporated in 1830, is the county's oldest village, followed by Bloomingburg, Wurtsboro, Liberty, Woodridge and Jeffersonville. The latter village will celebrate its centennial in the coming year.

Although the community was established nearly a hundred years before, it was in October of 1924 that the residents of Jeffersonville in the Town of Callicoon voted 63-50 to incorporate. Nearly all of those who were eligible to vote in that referendum managed to do so, and many provided their own ballot. Formal incorporation and the election of officers followed a month later.

That area was first settled in the 1830s, and by the following decade had already become home to a large population of German and Swiss immigrants

who named the place Winkelried, after the legendary 14th century Swiss military hero Arnold von Winkelried.

Charles F. Langhorn helped fuel the growth of the community, by building the first hotel in 1846. Langhorn suffered from tuberculosis, and had been told by his doctor to settle in an area abundant with hemlock trees, so he chose that sparsely settled part of Sullivan County.

He called his hotel the Jefferson House, and a vibrant community grew up around it. The hotel was the first building in the area to be painted, and was so substantially built that with some repair was still operating as a hotel as late as 1871, under the ownership of the Egler brothers. The building stands to this day.

By 1870, according to Hamilton Child's Gazetteer and Business Directory for Sullivan County, Jeffersonville had grown to include four churches (Catholic, Methodist, Presbyterian, and Reformed), three hotels, six stores, a printing and newspaper office, one sawmill, two grist mills, two wagon shops, one brewery, one furniture store, a tannery, two harness shops, one mineral water plant, and a school.

Its population at that time was about 500, which ranked it behind only Monticello (1,000), Wurtsboro (650) and Liberty (600) in the county.

The newspaper

office printed a German language newspaper, The Sullivan Volksblatt, as well as the weekly Local Record, which had been started in Youngsville in 1868 by W.T. Morgans, later a well-known inventor. The paper was moved to Jeffersonville in 1870, and was published there by D.J. Boyce and A.P. Childs.

The tannery was owned by E.A. Clark & Company and contained 182 square vats, consumed 5,000 cords of bark annually, manufactured about 50,000 sides of leather a year, and employed about 35 men year around, more during bark peeling season.

The brewery was that of Valentine Schmitt, “a manufacturer and dealer in lager beer,” for which there was apparently an eager market. Manville Wakefield wrote in his 1970 book, To The Mountains by Rail, that a spot check of hotel and saloon bills in 1897 revealed that in the community of 500, over 3,000 kegs of beer were consumed.

A good portion of this beer was served at the dining room of the Beck Hotel, which had 45 rooms when opened by John Beck in 1882, and had grown to accommodate between 150 and 200 guests by 1912.

The establishment was empty on December 12 of that year, when, according to Wakefield, “Mr. Beck placed an oil lamp in the bathroom on the second floor to keep the water from freezing in the pipes. It is believed the oil lamp exploded; but in any event, Mr. Beck had just enough time to arouse his sister-in-law, Miss Christine Ruppert, and make an escape from the second floor. Two hose carts were brought to bear, but it wasn’t until the water pumps in Bollenbach’s grist mill were set in motion that the pressure increased enough to save adjoining buildings.”

The community was not so fortunate a

few years later, when the fire of May 10, 1918 destroyed a major part of its business district. Fire broke out in the kitchen of the Eagle Hotel in the early morning that day, and quickly spread to the Goubelman Building and then the Lichtig Building on the south, and to Eddie Homer’s home and cafe and Beck’s Department Store on the north. The flames also destroyed Becker’s Drug Store and the Holmes & Martin automobile dealership, along with its inventory of six cars.

The community was devastated beyond recognition within just a few hours, but was quick to rebuild, and Jeffersonville continued to grow and prosper, becoming the sixth – and so far last – of Sullivan County’s incorporated villages in 1924.

Jeffersonville today has an active populace and an enlightened, accommodating government, so the centennial celebration could be something to behold. Stay tuned.

The Idea of Jeffersonville



Abraham Lincoln, April 6, 1859: Letter to H.L. Pierce

“All honor to Jefferson - to the man who, in the concrete pressure of a struggle for national independence by a single people, had the coolness, forecast, and capacity to introduce into a merely revolutionary document, an abstract truth, applicable to all men and all times, and so embalm it there, that today, and in all coming days, it shall be a rebuke and a stumbling-block to the very harbingers of re-appearing tyranny and oppression.”

The Village of Jeffersonville is a lovely place. I call it lovely because it is a place I love. I have known it my whole life. I have known the place as it exists legally, as a Village Incorporated in 1924 and thus celebrating its 100th birthday. Seated on Maple Avenue, my law practice has been here since 2011, and I have served as Mayor since 2021. I have also known the place as it exists more abstractly, from its sprawling hills, farms, and roads with postal addresses of Jeffersonville in Kohlertown, the Beechwoods, Kenoza Lake and Swiss Hill. Jeffersonville is a place within a place and its idea is far larger than its geography.

So, what kind of place is Jeffersonville? When I ask myself the question, the answer does not focus on geography or climate. Instead, I am captivated by an idea. It is a lovely idea precisely because it is the American idea. The central

tenant of my political education and the true north on my political compass is the idea of a Jeffersonian Jeffersonville where small is beautiful and independent-minded farmers, tradesfolk, and business owners ferociously guard their self-sufficient independence without asking the permission of Monticello, Albany, or Washington.



Before Jefferson, there was Winkelried

Before there was an incorporated Village of Jeffersonville, the idea of Jeffersonville was forged by hardy Swiss settlers who planted their German language, their Reformed theology, and their fiercely independent sense of agrarian localism deeply into the soil; the legacy of these Swiss settlers continues to be honored by a drive up into the Jeffersonville highlands known as Swiss Hill, or a walk through the Presbyterian or Lutheran (originally Reformed) Church cemeteries where names like Abplanalp, Eggler, Thony, and Luchs are common. These names

remain a common source of ethnic Jeffersonville pride. My grandma was an Eggler, so that pride is mine, too. These Swiss farmers gave Jeffersonville an early name, the Winkelried Society. Graduates of the old Jeffersonville Youngsville Central School fondly remember the name Winkelried as the name of their yearbook. The Tavern on Main harkens back to this Swiss foundation with its Winkelried Biergarten situated squarely within the old Winkelried Settlement area, just down the street from what is now the First Presbyterian Church of Jeffersonville but what was the German Presbyterian Church of Jeffersonville

So, what is a Winkelried?

A Winkelried is not a what; it is a heroic who. Arnold Von Winkelried is a name unknown to us today but was commonly recognized by previous generations of Americans who prized the virtues of independence and believed that small is beautiful.

Edmund Burke, in his Letter on a Regicide Peace, spoke of the mystery of providence by which the winds of history are changed by seemingly insignificant, small people or events:

All this has happened without any apparent previous change in the general circumstances which had brought on their distress. The death of a man at a critical juncture, his disgust, his retreat, his disgrace, have brought innumerable calamities on a

whole nation. A common soldier, a child, a girl at the door of an inn, have changed the face of fortune, and almost of Nature.

Burke's common soldier was Von Winkelried, a hero of Swiss independence who, at the battle of Sempach on July 9, 1386, accomplished the defeat of the Austrians through a courageous and self-sacrificial advance of Austrian spears. The result was the free, independent nation of confederated Cantons known as Switzerland. Since 1386 the Swiss have championed the idea that small is beautiful and that power is best exercised closest to home.

Jeffersonville and the Jeffersonians

Throughout the Village of Jeffersonville's history, the Jeffersonian Spirit of the old Democrat Party lived through its petite bourgeoisie, which included local pillars like Frederick and Valentine Scheidel, Valentine Schmidt, and the Great Mayor, Fred Schadt (whose glorious reign extended from 1945 to 1987).

What does Jeffersonianism look like?

To better understand the meaning

of Jeffersonville, we might ask, what does Jeffersonianism look like? The iconic vision of Jeffersonian democracy is small independent farmers, artisans, skilled craftsmen, independent tradespeople, shopkeepers, tavernkeepers, hotel proprietors, and restaurateurs enjoying the fruit of their labor. Jeffersonian democracy promotes equality by promoting economic independence. Jeffersonian democracy promotes liberty by recognizing that free, independent, secure citizens have a right to determine their destinies. That is the essence of the lovely idea of Jeffersonville.

Jeffersonville and the Future

Jeffersonville is, in many ways, a very different place than the Jeffersonville I grew up in. Many names have changed, businesses have come and gone, and most devastatingly, the numbers of our small and independent farmers have shrunk to levels that break my Jeffersonian heart. Once well-kept fields are filled with brush and saplings turn into woods reclaimed. The Ents ever encroaching upon the Hobbits of the Shire.

But we have no McDonalds! But we have no factory farms. But we have no chains or franchises. These are the schemes of the

Hamiltonians and centralizers. Jeff Bank has resisted the cult of the colossal and remains a genuinely local Jeffersonian institution. Our surviving farmers increasingly look away from the folly of industrial farming and have rediscovered the wisdom of proper husbandry and the artisanal wisdom of value added. Thus, we honor especially the Myers Century Farm and the Tonjes Family Farm even as we enjoy their milk, ice cream, yogurt, and cheese.

As America faces increasing pressures from the failures of globalism and the breakdown of supply chains, could the future be Jeffersonian? Could the seeds of American renewal already be planted on our Main Street and scattered among our breathtaking hills? Could it be that our most excellent crop remains our children, which we have often raised in service of empire and who we have failed to encourage to return home, bringing their gifts to bear by building the culture and economy of their homeland? Are we brave enough to educate like Jeffersonians, encouraging our children to become independent artisans, tradespeople, farmers, and businesspeople who prize liberty over empire and equality over privilege? That is a truly Jeffersonian education.

In my eyes, Jeffersonville is the most beautiful place in the world. Walking among its hills and streets, I am in awe of its picturesque views.

But its more extraordinary beauty lies deeper, embedded in its Jeffersonian heart. Happy birthday, Jeffersonville.
Long live Jeffersonville!
