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
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Distinguished Service Award

ileen Gunther announced back in February that she would not be seeking re-election to the 100th District of the New York State Assembly after 20 years of service. Despite her stepping back, her history within State government attests to the Distinguished Service Award from the Sullivan County Chamber of Commerce.

"I was very honored to hear of this award," Gunther said. "As a New York State Assembly person for 20 years, I've worked with my community and, of course, brought home a lot of money to enhance our community. The Chamber of Commerce is very important to all of us and the work that they do. So I am honored that they are honoring me. I don't expect to disappear after I retire."

Before her political career, Gunther attended Orange County Community College and then went to SUNY New Paltz while working nights and raising children. She has two brothers and one sister, with three of them including her having three children and the other having two. Originally from the Bronx, Gunther and her late husband Jacob lived in California before deciding to move back to New York after his grandfather gave them a piece of land in the area on which they built a house.



The Assemblywoman, who was first elected in 2003 after Jacob passed away, said that she decided to step down from the Assembly due to a difficult situation going on with one of her children.

"It is very difficult when your child is sad and my children mean everything to me," she described. "I'm a single mother of 20 years and I would do anything to keep my kids happy and healthy. My children are the best things in my life and what I care about most. Watching one that is in distress was difficult, but we worked through it and she's okay now."

Gunther was raised by parents who

also served their communities, her father as a policeman in New York City and her mother taught in Catholic school. She said that her mom and dad supporting her growing up was key to getting to where she is today.

But just because she is stepping down from her Assembly seat doesn't mean she's done giving back, as Gunther noted that she wants to continue to work in the community in any capacity that she can – saying "I don't expect to



disappear after I retire."

She said that she hopes to work in a clinic or somewhere similar that has people in need that she can help. In her years of service, Gunther has stressed the need to help and fight for the people of the community.

"I'm a registered nurse and somebody that has a lot of ties with the community," she said. "I was a nurse in the hospital and I worked in the clinic during COVID. I think one of my best assets is helping people and having compassion while knowing different situations."

Gunther described a number of situations that can be difficult for people, including someone living their last days, a family with young children getting evicted from their homes and not knowing what to do and several other types of situations.

"We do all we can to make sure that these folks have someone to talk to first of all, but also to help them," she said. "I think that's very important and this job is a lot more than passing bills or giving out money. I think it's more about having compassion and understanding people's needs. Nursing gave me that edge in being able to do those kinds of things in my community.

Tara (Berescik) Burke teaches agricultural education for Tri-Valley Central School in Grahamsville, New York and has been teaching since 2000.

Her courses include environmental science and conservation, large animal production, small animal care, anatomy and physiology, floral design, food science, international agriculture and sustainability, and middle school agriculture and technology.

Her courses focus on hands-on learning and building career skills but her dedication to her students helps set her apart from others.

Tara and her students operate the Tri-Valley Blooms Flower Shop, a hands on floral shoppe, where the students have prepared and delivered wedding flowers for 211 events since the inception in 2004.

This in class business allows students to develop hands on skills and also allows members of the community to receive beautiful, low cost flowers arrangements for their weddings. In addition, to Tri-Valley Blooms, the agriculture program also boasts a 39-raised-bed community garden.

All of the produce from the garden is donated to local food banks and Tara has been working to teach students in the program how to process and can items to help prolong the shelf stability for residents in need. With her guidance,

Tara's students help protect the environment where they live through conservation efforts and participation in research projects – from a Trout in the Classroom program to Community Stream Watch efforts, the environment and the watershed are in the forefront of the agriculture program. The student learn to educate the public about the importance of native species in the Catskills through their management of a native fruit orchard as well.

As the advisor to the Tri-Valley FFA, Tara is proud to work with over 300 youth in the Grahamsville area to promote the importance of a future career in agriculture as well as a future appreciation for those involved in the

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industry.

The FFA chapter at Tri-Valley is associated with the Sullivan County Farm Bureau, the Neversink Agricultural Society, the Daniel Pierce Library, the Time in the Valley Museum, the Soil and Water Conservation Society and a variety of animal shelters in the area.

As an offshoot, FFA members started Poultry-4-People, a nonprofit program to grow laying hens and donate them to community members interested in starting a small flock. The idea of teaching people to become food sufficient is something Tara promotes and always supports in her students.

The FFA chapter is one of the top rated programs in both New York and nationally and each year many students at Tri-Valley are recognized for their efforts. Tara is also actively involved in her school in other ways, serving as the Theater Club Advisor for over 20 years and teaching courses across the state of horror make-up for the stage.

She has mentored teachers all across New York and has been named the National Association of Agricultural Educators Outstanding Mentor teacher twice in her 25 year career.

Active in the community, Tara write grants for local organizations and seeks to make Grahamsville and Sullivan County the best place it can possibly be. She is a long standing Director for the Neversink Agricultural Society and also served as the livestock for the Grahamsville Little World's Fair. She is a Board Member for the Sullivan County Farm Bureau and also has assist in many aspects for the Sullivan Renaissance Community Beautification efforts.
