ong before sap houses and maple sugar farms came into being, Indigenous tribes were tapping sugar maple trees, transforming the sap and consuming the amber syrup as a sweetener, as medicine, and as a way to recognize the coming of Spring. Our ancestors, our great grandparents, and our grandparents followed.

Maple syrup production has come a long way since then from hanging aluminum buckets on the trees to collect the sap, to plastic lines that connect and run downhill to a larger collection tank, and timing is everything.

The season to collect sap is short, and sweet. A tap can only be successful if the temperatures during the

day are above freezing and then drop to below freezing at night. This is when the sap runs the best, and the clearest, and for the Catskills that means only about 5 to 6 weeks between February and March.

Once the sap is collected, it's then filtered and boiled to a desired thickness. A gallon of sap roughly yields about four ounces of syrup, depending.

Plenty of farms in the Catskills make and sell maple syrup like Diehl Homestead Farm in Callicoon and Catskill Mountain Sugarhouse in Grahamsville. But plenty of others tap the trees on their own properties, making syrup for themselves, or their family and friends, passing down the tradition through the generations.

So while you're here in Spring watching as life begins to bloom again, be sure to stop in a market and grab a local maple syrup. It's a flavor you won't forget.

Editor's Homemade Maple Syrup Dressing

I've never been one to follow exact measurements in recipes. I suppose that comes from years of watching my Grandmother and my Mom work their baking and cooking magic by just adding a pinch of this and a pinch of that, taking a taste, and then adding a little bit more. So if you're a no-measure kind of person, try this out and work it to your taste!

For a personal salad:

• In a small bowl start pouring in your olive oil (It probably ends up being about 1/4 of a cup)

• Next add in your local, pure Maple Syrup (mine is from my Grandfather)

- I usually pour in a little less than half the amount of the olive oil

• Add a good squirt of your favorite spicy brown mustard

- Half a lemon
- A good spritz of water
- A pinch of salt, and a pinch of pepper

Stir it all up until it looks smooth. Taste it. Adjust according to what you like!

it's the perfect place to dine, whether for a casual morning cappuccino or an evening get together.

Opening the door and walking up, you encounter a service counter with desserts and sweet treats on display. There are tables to the right in front of the windows and more seating beyond that. You may see your neighbor, people visiting for the weekend, or people coming in to pick up an order they called in. There is a vibrant, comfortable energy that pulses throughout.

Although the menu is diverse, it has more of a brunch-like feel than dinner, which we personally love. They offer a variety of breakfast dishes along with classic American plates and sides, but more exciting is their Greek specialties like grilled halloumi, a hummus and pita spread, chicken or pork gyros and souvlaki's, and greek fries. Their campfire smash burger, cobb salad, and lentil soup are also a hit.

If you're not in the mood for a full meal, you can order a milkshake, juice, or a frothy caramel latte. They have biscotti, biscuits, and yogurt parfaits. No matter your craving, it's sure to satisfy your taste buds.







story and photos by Autumn Schanil fly fishing mania starts with the first cast

t's hard to be sure exactly where fly fishing began, as documentation throughout history is a bit sporadic, but there are references that date it back to the 1400s in England, and the 1800s right here in the Catskill Mountains.

Writer Theodore Gordon, who many refer to as the "Father of American School of Dry Fly Fishing", spent much of his time in the cool waters of the Beaverkill River and the Willowemoc Creek, developing new methods of fly fishing and altering traditional imported flies to better resemble the insects of our region. It was during this time that Roscoe seemingly earned the nickname of "Trout Town USA."

If you've ever had the privilege of seeing an experienced fly fisherman in the river, it's like a silent dance. A connection between body, line, and water.



Since the 1940s, the anticipated start to trout season officially begins with the First Cast on April 1st at Junction Pool in Roscoe, where the Beaverkill and the Willowemoc meet, followed by an Opening Day Celebration (this year on April 5) at The Catskill Fly Fishing Center and Museum in Livingston Manor.

In further celebration, other events help kick off the fly fishing season throughout the weekend, with style. There will be expert-led casting



lessons by the Theodore Gordon Flyfishers and hands-on fly tying lessons by the Catskill Fly Tyers at Catskill Brewery, the Trout About Town scavenger hunt hosted by the Livingston Manor Chamber of Commerce, the 64th Annual Two Headed Trout Dinner at the Rockland House in Roscoe, and more.

Whether you're a seasoned fly fisherman ready for wading in the spring waters, a complete beginner, or are curious to learn, the Catskills are waiting for you.


