

Happy 150th to the Monticello Fire Department

Historical information and photographs were gathered with the assistance of Town of Thompson Historian and Monticello Fire Department member, Al Dumas, as well as by the accounts of Sullivan County Historian John Conway and former Thompson Town Historian Marge Smith.

n the eighth of March in 1875, two hose companies banded together with 82 members strong, forming the fledgling Monticello Fire Department (MFD). One hundred and fifty years later, Station 22 CONTINUED ON PAGE 6E

village the steadfast protection it has today.

Before then, way back in 1875, the decision to create the MFD as a new, reorganized department was prompted by four massive fires in 1844, 1871, 1874 and finally in 1875.

The third of which destroyed several major structures including the Exchange Hotel, Hindley's Saloon, Kent's Barber Shop, The Republican Watchman newspaper office, Billing's Flour & Feed Store, and Curley's Hotel, according to the MFD. Under the guidance of the very first MFD Fire Chief Friend W. Johnston and first Chief Engineer John F. Tymeson, the company began their protection

over their hometown of over 900 people.

The matters that prompted those to action 150 years ago are still attended to by the diligent Monticello fire men and women, whose actions protect over 65 square miles within the county.

The tools that helped make it happen

The equipment used by the Monticello Fire Department were products of their day, but assisted countless firemen and women in performing their duties. Where they went, so did their tools, such as the original Neptune Engine Company's hand drawn engine CONTINUED ON PAGE 8E



which was purchased from the City of New York in 1875. One year later, a hook and ladder was built by John Mapledoram for the department.

Moving into the age of engines at the turn of the century, the MFD acquired a 1914 Cole, which was used by the Mountain Hose Company and later destroyed by fire in May 1916. Thankfully, the loss of that engine did not spell the end, as the department moved forward and purchased two Ford Model-T's piston pumps in 1920 for \$3,300, and later acquired a Pierce Arrow pumper for \$9,000. Eventually in 1929, the first American LaFrance was acquired by the village for \$12,500.

These machines are just a few examples of the tools used by the department throughout its lifes-

According to Sullivan County Historian John Conway, Griffin, also affectionately known as Black Harvey, was one of the few Black Americans living in the area at the time. The volunteer suffered from health issues, but that did not impede his ability to fight fires alongside his fellow department members and to receive the time-honored accolade of marching in parades.

In addition to being a dutiful firefighter, Griffin was a porter to

After moving from their original fire house which housed the departments for fire and police, the Monticello Fire Department settled down here from 1955 to 2005.

the expansive garden that supplied the Mansion House hotel's dining room with fresh produce, marking his place in the village economy and tourism industry to be just as fruitful to his place in the protection of all things Monticello.

Griffin remained a member of the MFD until his death to Tuberculosis in 1882, whereafter his story was lost to time for over one hundred years until 1998 where firefighter Carl Houman uncovered the start to unraveling what is now known as Griffin's lasting legacy. The year he was rediscovered, a plaque was placed in Griffin's honor and memory on February 15.

Livingston Manor Volunteer Ambulance Corps is ready for anything Story and Photos BY MATTHEW ALBECK

he Livingston Manor Volunteer Ambulance Corps (LMVAC) is nestled in an unassuming building at 98 Main St. in Livingston Manor, and this is the headquarters for Captain Ralph Bressler and his 25-member team of volunteers.

"We're the corps that responds to anything at any time," said Bressler, and they responded to 1,060 calls in 2024 alone.

LMVAC is responsible for maintaining ambulances and equipment, raising funds for supplies, advocating for defibrillators in local businesses, and completing bi-monthly training. Bressler said routine training is important because some medical emergencies are unpredictable:

"We train on the common things [Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR), heart attacks, splinting limbs] because we do them very often and we need to know how to do them, but we also train on the uncommon things [delivering a baby] because we don't do them very often and need to know how to do them."

Bressler has been a CPR trainer for the American Heart Association for 45 years, and his father Herman Bressler was a founding member of the Bethel Volunteer Ambulance Corps. "I can remember [my father] bringing home the Cadillac station wagon on Sunday afternoons, and my sister and I would wash it off and restock it." When it was time for Ralph to volunteer, "it was between fire and ambulance, and I just had more of a pull to

the ambulance corps."

Bressler said his biggest challenge is scheduling volunteers for shifts and recruiting new ones. Some people sign up without realizing they can't handle the commitment, he said; others will drop everything to volunteer, but even the most dedicated members encounter bumps in the road (injuries, tending to a sick relative, pregnancies) that prevent them from serving. "It's always better to have more [volunteers]."

Bressler's primary motivation as a responder has always been to help people, although he recalls a younger self that was excited by encountering an unprecedented medical problem that challenged his abilities. Now that he is older, his simple goal is to serve his community, and when he goes on an emergency call to help a patient, "I am hoping, and actually praying, that they're just fine."

To promote overall health and prevent medical emergencies, Bressler recommends getting regular exercise, improving diet, and doing activities that reduce stress. To manage his own stress, Bressler likes running, cycling, and hiking.

CPR Training

If you have the fortune of training with Ralph Bressler, his natural teaching abilities will be immediately obvious. His instruction imparts kindness, patience, and a desire to help and educate. This is crucial for a CPR instructor, who must present complex medical concepts, life-saving techniques, and the mechanics of complicated equipment, in a way that is understandable and not overwhelming to the student.

Following is a basic overview of CPR theory and practices learned through a training session with Captain Ralph Bressler; it is meant to educate and inspire volunteerism but should NOT be taken as a comprehensive guide to CPR.

The purpose of CPR is to keep oxygenated blood flowing through the body. By doing chest compressions on a patient, you circulate their blood; by giving them breaths, you oxygenate their blood. Though both chest compressions and giving breaths are helpful, The American Heart Association has approved hands-

only CPR [only chest compressions]; this decision was made after they found that in real-life situations, citizens were unlikely to blow into someone's mouth without a device.

The AHA's research also found that by pushing on the chest, you are compressing both the heart and the lungs; when you push on the chest, air is pushed out, and when you let up, air returns to the lungs. It is still better if chest compressions are complemented by giving intermittent breaths, but the approval of hands-only CPR will hopefully lead to more citizens stepping up in an emergency to offer help to a stranger in need.

Because the chances of restarting the heart with CPR alone are close to zero, Bressler advocates for the use of Automated External Defibrillators (AED). Defibrillators are used to restore a normal heartbeat by delivering an electric shock. They also evaluate the electrical current in a patient's body to determine if a shock is warranted.

On the scene: a person is lying on the ground and not moving

The first thing a responder must do when answering an emergency call is to make sure the scene is safe for the patient and all medical personnel. Once the scene is safe, the responder will tap the patient on the tops of their shoulders and ask loudly, "Are you OK? Are you OK?" If they sit up and say "Yes! Why are you hitting me?" then the ordeal may be over.

If they don't answer, the responder should call 911 and obtain an AED; if other people are on the scene, they can tell someone to "call 911 and get an

AED!" The responder will first gently tilt the head back to open the airway, and then look, listen, and feel for signs of breathing. If there is no breathing, they will try to find a pulse in the neck. If there is no pulse, the responder will start chest compressions. They should be administered with clasped hands on the lower third of the sternum and should be forceful and relatively quick. After 30 chest compressions, the responder will give the patient two breaths (with a face mask),

and then return to compressions. The 30:2 compressions to breaths ratio will be continued until they are relieved by another responder or the AED arrives.


The AED is connected to the patient's chest through two pads that must go on either side of the heart. It will evaluate the heart's activity and instruct the responder to administer an electrical shock or not. If the AED says "shock advised" the responder must yell "Clear! Everybody Clear!" to make sure no one is touching the patient. By pressing a red button, the responder can easily administer the AED shock that will hopefully restore the heart's normal functioning and save the patient's life.

How to get involved

If you are interested in volunteering or getting certified in CPR, you can contact your local ambulance corps (LMVAC: 845-439-4150) or the American Heart Association (cpr.heart.org, 1-800-242-8721). SUNY Sullivan offers an Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) Refresher Class and an EMT Basic Course (info@ sunysullivan.edu, 1-845-434-5750).

M.I.L.O. training helps sharpen Sheriffs' and police officers' skills

t's midnight on Route 17B and a Sheriff's Deputy has just pulled over a car for speeding. As the officer approaches the car she notices a handgun sitting on the seat.

What should she do? Although that question has probably been reviewed during training, the Sheriff's Dept. can now put officers through real-life scenarios such as that to insure their skills are sharp and they are observing what they see.

Thanks to a \$35,000 grant from Homeland Security, the Sheriff's Dept. purchased the M.I.L.O. training system, which offers



hundreds of different situations an officer might encounter in the field.

M.I.L.O. – Multiple Interactive Learning Objectices –is a training system which enables local law enforcement to practice their de-escalation skills as well as prepare an officer for potential armed encounters in a safe and controlled environment.

On Monday, Deputy Daiana Doran, a member of the Sheriff's Dept. since last June, was put through several tests by Sheriff's Dept. Training Officer, Corporal

The M.I.L.O. system also comes equipped with a flashlight so officers can simulate night-time encounters. "The flashlight integrates with the screen," Corporal Kelting said. This scenario teaches officers had to keep safe while securing a firearm that is visible on the seat. CONTINUED FROM PAGE 18E

Brian Kelting, and Detective Chris Valastro.

Kelting and Valastro are also Certified Firearms Instructors. In the scenario where Deputy

Doran had pulled over a car, she used a flashlight to look into the vehicle. Spotting a handgun on the front seat she asked the driver to identify herself.

The driver pulled out her badge and Deputy Doran then realized she was a police officer.

"There are hundreds of scenarios available," Kelting said. "There is a lot of versatility. We can make it so officers have to reload their firearm to make the training as realistic as possible."

Kelting also coaches the officers following each scenario to see if there were better ways of handling each situation.

The virtual training includes real-life movies projected onto a screen and officers holding a gun which resembles their own handgun, but shoots lasers instead of bullets.

"This training is a testament to the culture of innovation in the Sheriff's Dept.," Sullivan County Public Safety Commissioner Scott Schulte said. "It's available to any police department in the county and demonstrates a great collaboration of services.

"We ordered their [each police department's] guns which shows forward thinking," Schulte said. "We can leverage constant and repeated training as often as we need to."

Sheriff Michael Schiff agreed.

"This program helps us to find the problems," Schiff said. "We are always looking at what we need to fix. All the scenarios in M.I.L.O. are designed to show the weak spots.

"Learning how to do it better,"

Schiff said. "That's what we want from our department."

Schulte added, "You can go the range and shoot perfectly [but] this brings reality home. This becomes second nature.

"It's a great opportunity that our officers have this experience to train," he said. "They can practice a myriad of situations, and there are no injuries."

Monticello Police Chief David Lindsay was on hand Monday to go through several scenarios himself.




