

Schools receive \$10k gift

Director of Bedford County Schools Tammy Garrett recently accepted a \$10,000 donation on behalf of the school system at the recent Fall Classic Horse Show at Calsonic Arena.

The donation, from the July Horse Show, will support each school's Christmas program of buying toys for the kids.

"It's been a hard year for parents," said Dr. Garrett. "We were fortunate. It's going to make a lot of kids smile."

The Christmas in July show is managed by Carol Missildine and Denny Russell, who helped raise the funds.

Maria Bobo, an Eastside Elementary counselor and walking horse exhibitor, served as the "bridge" between the two groups. She said the goal was to give to the kids and that the Fall Classic Show presented an "opportunistic time"

for the presentation of the donation.

Missildine said they also hope that this donation—the first of its kind— will inspire more youth to be a part of the horse shows in the future.

Coleman found guilty of Circle K armed robbery

At the conclusion of a three-day trial, a 12-person jury found 54-year-old Leslie Lamont Coleman guilty of aggravated robbery Wednesday in the Jan. 15, 2019 armed robbery of a Circle K convenience store in Shelbyville.

Coleman and his accomplice, Deontre Cortez Farris, 21, used knives to threaten the store employee. They were arrested Jan. 16, one day after they committed the crime. The entire incident was captured on surveillance cameras in the store.

Aggravated robbery is when a deadly weapon is used or if the victim suffers serious injury. It is a class B felony punishable by eight to 30 years' imprisonment, as well as a fine of up to \$25,000.

Coleman will be sentenced on Jan. 20.

Farris confessed to the crime and testified against Coleman. His case has not yet been resolved. He was scheduled to appear in court for a review hearing five days after Coleman was found guilty. He could accept a plea deal at the hearing.

It is likely Coleman will be sentenced to a long term in prison as his past criminal history will be considered by Judge Forest Alexander Durard, Jr.

Coleman was sen-

tenced in October 1991 to life in prison in a remarkably similar case.

On Dec. 9, 1990, Coleman (who was 24 years old at the time) and his 17-year-old stepbrother, Kenneth Wayne Robinson, Jr., robbed a Jim Dandy Market on Nolensville Pike in Nashville. In that robbery, Coleman reportedly stole a 12-pack of Budweiser. Coleman and his stepbrother also stole the store clerk's car and later abandoned it and burned it.

Just why Coleman was free from prison at the time of the Shelbyville crime was not determined through investigation of this court case. However, state laws regarding sentencing have changed over the course of those years.

In the Shelbyville robbery of the Circle K, Coleman stole an 18-pack of Bud Light. He and his accomplice also stole cartons of cigarettes (L&M menthols and Newports), various vaping supplies and \$78 that was in the cash register. Coleman is also accused of stealing a

toolbox with tools from the store office.

The biggest difference between the robbery in Nashville three decades earlier and the Shelbyville robbery is in Nashville, Coleman murdered the 35-year-old store clerk, shooting her three times in the back of the head while she lay on the floor in the back room of the store. Coleman initially

blamed the murder on his younger stepbrother but he eventually pled guilty to 1st degree murder and especially aggravated robbery. Coleman's teenage stepbrother, Robinson, was found guilty of kidnapping, robbery and for stealing the store clerk's car but was found not guilty on a murder charge.

Shelbyville trial details

Coleman and Farris are accused of robbing the store at around 12:45 a.m. on Jan. 15, 2019. Testimony this week included how the pair forced the store's assistant manager to comply at knifepoint.

Coleman, who has denied involvement in the crime, was allegedly the robber observed on surveillance video who was dressed in a white T-shirt and black cargo pants. The entire incident was captured on seven surveillance cameras in the store.

The store employee had stepped out of the store to take a break and smoke a cigarette and was approached by two men wielding knives. She was ordered back into the store and told to open the safe. She explained to the men that opening the safe would take 10 minutes as it is on a timer. To open the safe first one key is used to start the opening timer and after a 10 minute delay a second key is then used to open it.

While waiting for the safe opening, the two men are seen on video stealing an 18-pack of Bud Lite beer, cartons of cigarettes (L&M menthols and Newports), various vaping supplies and the \$78 that was in the cash register. Coleman is also accused of stealing a toolbox with tools from the store office.

Before the safe delay timer had run its course, a donut delivery truck pulled in and the two men fled the store. The donut delivery driver was later than normal that night. "He came at a good time," the store employee testified. The donut delivery driver recognized that something was wrong. He spotted former sheriff's deputy Joseph Guthrie, who just happened to be driving by on routine patrol, and alerted him that there was something going on in the Circle K store.

Guthrie saw the two perpetrators standing next to a white Dodge sedan parked in the westbound lane of Wartrace Pike/East Depot Street, just down the hill from the store. When the deputy approached the Dodge and activated his emergency lights the two men jumped into the vehicle and sped away toward downtown Shelbyville. Guthrie testified Monday that the pursuit reached speeds of "above 80 mph, pretty close to 100."

Police and dispatch were not initially aware that the incident was an armed robbery so, following department policy, when the vehicle turned onto Coney Island Road, Guthrie was ordered to terminate the high speed pursuit. Guthrie was unable to get the license plate number. There were no suspects immediately but within a couple of hours police had identified Coleman as a suspect.

The assistant store manager testified that she had seen a white Dodge Avenger with two black occupants circle through the lot approximately a half hour before the robbery. She noticed that the vehicle was marked with a black "Avenger" decal.

Approximately an hour after the robbery, around 1:40 a.m., Shelbyville Police Lt. Fred Harvey, "came across" a white Dodge sedan parked at the Magnolia Village apartments on Landers Street. The temperature that January morning was in the 30s. Harvey got out of his patrol vehicle and felt the hood of the Dodge. "It was hot," he said. He radioed in the license number and it came back registered to


When interviewed in court Monday, the store assistant manger described her emotions during the robbery. Throughout the incident, on the video, she stood with her hands raised and appeared to be calm and collected, but she said calm was not how she felt. She said she was "praying the whole time. I was terrified." "My number one priority was to get them out of there and keep safe,"

Immediately after the robbery, the Circle K employee said, she quit her job at the store where she had worked for 2 and 1/2 years. She testified that she went to counseling, "a lot for awhile." She also testified that in a subsequent job she was unable to work alone at night.

Marijuana, gun found on suspect: Police

A report of a domestic dispute at a Belmont Avenue home led to the arrest of a suspect on drug and weapons charges Wednesday, Shelbyville police said.



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Cleaning athletic clothes

Streaking Titans try to stay atop AFC vs. Saints

NASHVILLE — Mike Vrabel dismissed the idea of talking to his Tennessee Titans about playoff seeding and home-field advantage in the playoffs with a succinct response.

No.

His approach stays the same even if the Titans (7-2) have the NFL's longest active winning streak at five to sit atop the AFC halfway through the season. Better yet, the last four victories have come against playoff teams from last season, with each bigger than the last.

"Not going to change anything," Vrabel said.

Tennessee has a chance Sunday against the New Orleans Saints (5-3) to add another 2020 playoff team to its streak. The Titans still are adapting to life without Derrick Henry, who's still the NFL's leading rusher even after a week on injured reserve, and coming off a 28-16 win in Los Angeles over the Rams.

New Orleans is working through replacing quarterback Jameis Winston. Trevor Siemian, who spent time with the Titans last year, had the first crack last week with Taysom Hill getting some spot duty in his return last week in a 27-25 loss to Atlanta that snapped the Saints' own three-game winning streak.

The Saints also come into this game second in the NFC South, trying to stay close to Tampa Bay after their big win over the defending champs.

"We have the Titans this week, and those are the details we are focusing on," Saints linebacker Demario Davis said. "We do not have the luxury of worrying about anything

Streaking

The Titans are 6-0 this season against 2020 playoff teams, beating the Bills, Chiefs, Colts and Rams over the past four weeks. A win Sunday would make the Titans the second team in NFL history to win five straight against playoff teams from the prior season,

something only the 2003 Eagles managed.

The Saints aren't far behind. New Orleans is 4-0 against 2020 playoff teams, having beaten Green Bay, Washington, Seattle and Tampa Bay.

Bracing for impact

While New Orleans boasts the NFL's No. 1 run defense and Henry is out with a broken right foot, Davis doesn't envision Tennessee abandoning its ground game.

"Any time you want to be an attacking, physical team and run the ball, you can't just do that with one guy," Davis said. "Even though they have one of the top, if not the best, running back in the league, you still have to have other guys that can get the job done. They have good running backs by committee and guys who can come in and get the job done."

One of those replacements is Adrian Peterson, now in his 15th season at 36. Saints coach Sean Payton coached Peterson for four games with New Orleans in 2017, and he said the 2012 NFL MVP is the one player he has coached knowing Peterson had a different body clock than anyone else.

"He still has power," Payton said. "You can see it. That surge on his touchdown run the other night was impressive, and he takes care of himself well. He's one of those unique athletes. It doesn't surprise you."

Ball security

The Saints, who gave up a touchdown last week after a sack-strip of Siemian was returned deep into New Orleans territory, are re-establishing a big emphasis on protecting the ball. It's not just because of the bitter

memories. Tennessee has seven interceptions and four fumble recoveries in its past five games. Safety Kevin Byard has led the way, and he has six takeaways this season. He's also the only player in the league this season to

Newton would be the starter beyond this week, but general manager Scott Fitterer said Newton "came here to play" — and the money the Panthers invested in him for the final eight games of the season is a strong indication they plan on him being more than just a backup. Panthers cornerback Stephon

Gilmore, who grew up about 30 minutes from Charlotte and played

with Newton in New England, spoke to the importance of the QB's return to the Carolinas. "There's a lot of important people in South Carolina and North Carolina, but Cam Newton is prob-

ably right up there at the top two or

top one," Gilmore said.

Outside the gates of Charlotte's Bank of America Stadium, a fan wearing Newton's No. 1 jersey stood waiting for the QB to arrive and greeted people entering the facility with a giddy smile saying "this feels like Christmas to me."

Inside the empty bowl of the stadium the team lit up the scoreboards with the words "He's Back."

Newton met with owner David Tepper and Fitterer earlier in the day and later passed his physical. His plan was to stay late into the night to learn the team's playbook. He's expected to join his new teammates at practice on Friday.

'We had a heartfelt, sincere discussion with him and it wasn't about anything in the past," Fitterer said. "It was more about what are we going to do now moving forward and what is Cam's role and how can he help us and what can we do to support him."

Newton is expected to address the media on Friday.

Newton spent nine seasons with the Panthers, throwing for 29,041 yards with 182 touchdown passes and 111 interceptions. He also set an NFL record for most career touchdowns rushing by a quarterback

Sometimes the Saints have kept the ball on the ground by design and leaned on their 10th-ranked running game averaging 123 yards per game. Last week, anemia in the passing game for most of the first three quarters caught up with them as they fell behind 24-6 to Atlanta.

The Titans come in tied for fifth in the NFL with 23 sacks, led by linebacker Harold Landry with nine. Defensive tackle Jeffery Simmons is coming off a career-best game with three sacks against the Rams and is a big reason they are second over the past five weeks with 96 quarterback pressures.

Odell Beckham Jr. agrees to deal with Rams

THOUSAND OAKS, Calif. — When the Los Angeles Rams learned they had a chance to land Odell Beckham Jr., their veterans assembled in the locker room Thursday morning. Jalen Ramsey made a call, and the Rams took turns recruiting the veteran receiver to their West Coast home.

"Felt like college, huh?" receiver Robert Woods said with a grin.

The Rams clearly sold themselves and their Super Bowl vision quite well to the mercurial receiver. Beckham agreed to a one-year

Beckham agreed to a one-year deal with Los Angeles, choosing this burgeoning super team over several potential free-agent destinations.

The Browns released the dis-

gruntled Beckham on Monday, midway through his third season in Cleveland. He cleared waivers Tuesday with no team willing to pick up the \$7.25 million he was owed under his last contract, freeing the five-time 1,000-yard wideout to sign with any team.

After considering his options and

getting the full-court press from his future teammates, Beckham elected to join NFL yards passing leader Matthew Stafford and coach Sean McVay in the league's most productive passing offense.

"I have a lot of respect for who he is as a player," said Stafford, who played with Beckham in a Pro Bowl. "It's an opportunity for us as a team. It's an opportunity for him to come in here and prove himself to us. What our room is about, the receiver room, is pretty special. I know he'll

fit right in and just continue to get better, and hopefully it will help us as a team."

The Rams swooped in fairly late in the courtship. They closed the deal with the swashbuckling flair that's defined their front office under general manager Les Snead, who has rarely faced a salary cap challenge he couldn't overcome.

The three-time Pro Bowl selection will play alongside NFL receiving leader Cooper Kupp — who has 74 catches for 1,019 yards and 10 TDs, all tops in the league — and starters Robert Woods (556 yards) and second-year pro Van Jefferson (443 yards). One of those three receivers is likely to see less playing time after Beckham joins the Rams, who have run offensive sets featuring three receivers almost exclusively this season.

That's not a concern, according

to the receivers who will be affected. With Stafford and McVay calling the shots, they believe everybody can thrive and win.
"We're all working for the same

goal," Woods said. "His thing is, I feel like, why he left — he wanted to be a part of it and contribute, and I think just coming into this offense, he wants to work and contribute. We're all working toward the same goal: winning, grinding. I don't think it should be anything disruptive."

The Rams (7-2) visit the San Francisco 49ers on Monday night before their bye week.

Beckham is the second veteran NFL star in the past two weeks to join the Rams, who seem to be trying everything to emerge from a

crowded NFC so they can play in February's Super Bowl at their own SoFi Stadium in Inglewood. Los Angeles traded for Von

Miller last week, sending two high draft picks to Denver for the vaunted pass-rushing linebacker. Miller has yet to debut for LA, but he was among those recruiting Beckham by phone.

The Rams also don't hesitate to add talent even to areas in which they're strong: Miller joined a defense that already leads the NFL in sacks, while Beckham is joining an offense that DeSean Jackson left two weeks ago because he couldn't get playing time in front of LA's three starters.

Kupp and Woods emerged from their discussions confident Beckham wants to buy in.

"I think the thing about playing here is when you're not about what we're about, when you're not about playing for the guys next to you, I think you can stick out like a sore thumb," Kupp said. "We have a great culture here. Guys play for each other. They work day in and day out so that when we step on the field, you are taking care of the guy next to you."

The Rams ardently chased Beckham before he was traded to Cleveland by the Giants in March 2019, and McVay has spoken glowingly of Beckham's talents over the years. Beckham's speed, athleticism and ball skills should provide a welcome option for the Rams, who are already back among the NFL's top offensive teams after a two-year lull.

Lakers star LeBron James wel-

comed Beckham on Twitter shortly before the deal was announced: "Welcome to LA my brother @obj! It's GO TIME!!"

They are close friends, and Beckham — who already has a home in Los Angeles — has been making regular offseason appearances courtside at Staples Center since even before LeBron arrived in 2018.

The 29-year-old Beckham has the chance to revitalize his career with the Rams after his tenure in Cleveland never got rolling and eventually came to a fairly ugly finish. After missing the end of last sea-

son with a knee injury, he has only 17 catches for 232 yards and zero touchdowns in six games this year. His father recently shared a video master cut of Browns quarterback Baker Mayfield not getting the ball to Beckham, essentially forcing the breakup with Cleveland.

Browns safety John Johnson,

who spent the past four seasons with the Rams, was on a Zoom call with Cleveland reporters when the news of Beckham's signing broke. Johnson wondered how OBJ will fit in LA.

"They had a good thing going, like a complete offense," Johnson said. "I just feel like, from being in LA, I know for a fact the offense runs through Cooper Kupp. Even in the run game, the pass game, the screen game, it kind of runs through Cooper Kupp. So obviously, Odell's a big name and he's going to want that attention as well. It will be interesting.

Rodgers' vaccine comments may test clout with sponsors

GREEN BAY, Wis. — Green Bay Packers quarterback Aaron Rodgers could be playing football again less than two weeks after testing positive for COVID-19 and misleading everyone about being an unvaccinated player.

Whether the off-field consequences of the reigning MVP's science-defying explanation for why he chose not to get the shot have a similarly short shelf life remains uncertain.

Rodgers is one of the NFL's most visible players. His appearances on State Farm commercials make him a ubiquitous presence even on game telecasts that

don't involve the Packers.

His comments regarding his vaccination status could put that marketabil-

ity to the test.
"It's unlikely right now given the volatility of the situation that he's going to

have new people coming out and wanting to form a partnership with him, but I think it's also unlikely that you're going to have companies split with him," said Patrick Rishe, the director of the sports business program at Washington University in St. Louis.

State Farm stood by Rodgers earlier this week, saying that it disagrees with some of Rodgers' statements but respects his right to have his own personal point of view.

The revelation that Rodgers never got vaccinated for COVID-19 came after he tested positive on Nov. 3, causing him to miss the Packers' 13-7 loss at Kansas City. The earliest he could return to the team is Saturday, which would enable him to play Sunday when the Packers host the Seattle Seahawks.

Assuming he does play Sunday, the reception Rodgers gets from the

home crowd could provide some early hints on whether this episode has impacted his popularity at all. Ashley Dabb, a visiting

sports marketing professor at St. Joseph's University, says the biggest issue is that Rodgers initially was misleading about his vaccination status.

Rodgers said during

Rodgers said during a Nov. 5 appearance on "The Pat McAfee Show" that teammates, Packers officials and league officials knew he was unvaccinated. But when he was asked in an Aug. 26 news conference whether he was vaccinated, Rodgers had replied, "Yeah, I'm immunized."

"Ultimately the heart of the matter is the fact there's now a trust consideration," Dabb said. "Rodgers is now taking full responsibility for the statements, but the fact that he was misleading I think would give any brand pause, not tually sponsor him, but it's a serious consideration when you're not sure if the athlete you're working with would be truthful in all matters."

The NFL fined Rodgers

to say they wouldn't even-

The NFL fined Rodgers and teammate Allen Lazard each \$14,650, and the Packers \$300,000 for violations of protocols. Those protocol violations included the unvaccinated Rodgers appearing unmasked at news conferences.

Rodgers appeared on "The Pat McAfee Show" again Tuesday and stood behind the comments he made last week about why he didn't get vaccinated, but he also took full responsibility for misleading some people about his status.

"I shared an opinion that's polarizing," Rodgers said. "I get it. And I misled some people about my status, which I take full

responsibility of, those comments. But in the end, I have to stay true to who I am and what I'm about."

am and what I'm about."
Henry Schafer is the executive vice president of The Q Scores Company, which measures the awareness and likeability of personalities in various professions. Schafer said the public awareness level of Rodgers ranks behind that of only Tom Brady among active NFL players but noted the three-time MVP's likeability ratings were roughly average compared to other sports fig-

ures the company tracked.
Rodgers' Q Score ratings won't be updated until January, so it's too soon to know how the last several days might have impacted the veteran quarterback's popularity. But Schafer believes Rodgers helped himself by taking responsibility for misleading the general public about his

vaccination status.

by friends Gabriella Ortiz, Adriana Merino, and Fabiola Rodriguez, the studio opened in June and features kickboxing, HIIT, and Zumba classes.

It's been a "roller-coaster" since opening this past summer, the business owners said.

Deeds said she is unsure just how many women business-owners have shown interest in joining "Females about Business," but she assures, "There has been much interest in the concept, and the number will grow as word gets out. We even have interest from women in Tullahoma wanting to participate."

Deeds said the Chamber wants to reach out to business owners to more closely identity their needs.

Deeds explained, finding solutions for concerns like work/life balance, kids, childcare, and apparel are parts of the conversation she wants to open to eventually move on to bigger things with more scope.

"I'm not saying men don't experience those issues also, but I think women are more pronounced in how they handle them," she said.

Deeds said meetings will be quarterly, with the next planned for mid-December.

"If women can tackle some of the business and personal issues head on, then I hope we can assist them in their mission," said Deeds.





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

Bannon indicted on contempt charges

MARKS, Miss. (AP) — Steve Bannon, a longtime ally to former President Donald Trump, was indicted Friday on two counts of contempt of Congress after he defied a congressional subpoena from the House committee investigating the insurrection at the U.S. Capitol. The Justice Department said Bannon,

67, was indicted on one count for refusing to appear for a deposition and the other for refusing to provide documents in response to the committee's subpoena. It wasn't immediately clear when he would be Attorney General Merrick Garland said the indictment reflects the Justice

Department's "steadfast commitment" to ensuring that the department adheres to the rule of law. Each count carries a minimum of 30

days of jail and a sentence of up to a year

behind bars. Bannon's attorney did not immediately respond to a message seeking comment.

The House voted last month to hold Bannon, an adviser to former President Donald Trump, in contempt after he similarly defied a committee subpoena to talk about his role in the violent attack. Meadows had been in discussions with the committee since his subpoena was issued in September, but his lawyer said Friday that Meadows has a "sharp legal dispute" with the panel as Trump has claimed executive privilege over the testimony

Thompson had threatened contempt against Meadows in a letter to the lawyer, George Terwilliger, on Thursday, saying that if he failed to appear to answer the committee's questions Friday it would be considered "willful non-compliance." The committee would first have to vote on the contempt recommendation, then the full House would vote to send it to the Justice

Department. Meadows' refusal to comply comes amid escalating legal battles between the committee and Trump as the former president has claimed privilege over documents and interviews the lawmakers are demanding.

The White House said in a letter Thursday that President Joe Biden would waive any privilege that would prevent Meadows from cooperating with the committee, prompting his lawyer to say Meadows wouldn't

'Legal disputes are appropriately resolved by courts," said the lawyer, George Terwilliger. "It would be irresponsible for Mr. Meadows to prematurely resolve that dispute by voluntarily waiving privileges that are at the heart of those legal issues."

he sitting president, Biden has so far waived most of Trump's assertions of privilege over documents. U.S. District Judge Tanya Chutkan has backed Biden's position, noting in one ruling this week that "Presidents are not kings, and Plaintiff is not President."

The panel's proceedings and attempts to gather information have been delayed as Trump appealed Chutkan's rulings. On Thursday, a federal appeals court temporarily blocked the release of some of the White House records the panel is seeking, giving that court time to consider Trump's arguments. Still, the House panel is continuing its

work, and lawmakers have already interviewed more than 150 witnesses so far as they attempt to build the most comprehensive record yet of how a violent mob of Trump's supporters broke into the Capitol and temporarily halted the certification of Biden's victory.

The committee has subpoenaed almost three dozen people, including former White House staffers, Trump allies who strategized about how to overturn his defeat and people who organized the giant rally on the National Mall the morning of Jan. 6. While some, like Meadows and Bannon, have balked, others have spoken to the panel and provided documents.

Meadows, a former GOP congressman from North Carolina, is a key witness for the panel. He was Trump's top aide in the time between Trump's loss in the November election and the insurrection, and was one of several people who pressured state officials to try and overturn the results. He was also by Trump's side during much of the time, and he could provide information about what the former president was saying and doing during the attack.

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

were over. He continued to encourage himself in the Word of God, studying the Bible every day.

Bartlett continued meditating on that place where "everybody will be happy," and alone in his room he



Bedford County Schools funded for 5,500 laptops

Bedford County Schools Director of Technology Ryan Womack is spearheading a program in which students in Bedford County will soon be receiving extra support in avoiding the "homework gap"—something the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) says is all too common in many areas, especially rural

applied for a federal funding from the FCC as part of its Emergency Connectivity Fund (ECF) program. In late September, the FCC notified Bedford County Schools of a \$2.1 million award, enough funding for the school system to purchase 5,500 new laptops.

In August 2021, Womack

"They're shipping to us in batches and are soon headed to our 16 schools for student use in the classroom and at home," said Womack. "We are beyond excited to make this much progress in bridging the homework gap that the COVID-19 pandemic made so crystal clear was an

According to FCC Acting Chairwoman Jessica Rosenworcel, the agency is committing over \$1.2 billion in a first funding wave for 3,040 schools, 260 libraries, and 24 consortia that applied for support from the \$7.17 billionECF program.This first wave of funding will provide more than 3 million connected devices for remote learning and will make a major dent in closing what Rosenworcel calls one of the cruelest parts of the digital divide.

"Closing the homework gap means that all students can be connected to their schools and teachers," explained Rosenworcel. "Now the FCC has new tools to help do just that. The enthusiastic response to this program highlights just how much help is needed. Together with the Emergency Broadband Benefit Program, we are investing more than \$10 billion in getting students and households online."

"Bedford County Schools is one of the largest award amounts in the state," Womack commented, with various other Tennessee award recipients receiving another \$9 million."However, we are the most happy for our students and teachers and the



educational support this will provide them."

The FCC reports that in

the first application filing window, 3,678 applicants applied for funding. They



Mr. Hamler is exceptionally qualified to help our early learners combat learning loss through reading and will be a thoughtful leader and advisor." Hamler is a product of

the local school system. After graduating from Shelbyville Central High School, Hamler earned his bachelor's, master's, and education specialist degrees from Middle Tennessee State University in Murfreesboro.

For nine years, he

taught sixth grade math and science at Cason Lane Academy in Murfreesboro as well as directed the before and after school program for 5 years. Hamler then served as an assistant principal at John Pittard Elementary for 7 years before returning to Bedford County in 2013 to serve for 4 years as East Side Elementary principal.

He said, "In this role on the GELF Educator Advisory Council, I get to help select books and materials that teachers and schools will use to educate students," said Hamler. "I truly enjoy helping schools succeed, watching teachers' capacities grow, and seeing students excel."

The primary responsibility of the Educator Advisory Council will be to select the books that students and teachers from across the state will be mailed through GELF's K-3 Book Delivery program in Summer 2022. Through its K-3 book delivery program, GELF collaborates with Scholastic to mail highquality, age-appropriate books to kindergarten through third grade students and teachers over the summer to combat learning loss and support learning in the home.

Last summer, GELF mailed books to 90,000 students and teachers across Tennessee, at no cost to families or school

"Reading is fundamental and a part of all content areas," commented Hamler. "The science of reading must be understood, and reading must be explicitly and systematically taught.My desire is for all students to receive a quality education and become proficient readers. Less than one third of Tennessee third graders read proficiently."

Research shows that two to three months of reading proficiency is lost for students who do not read over the summer, and Tennessee Comprehensive Assessment Program (TCAP) 2021 scores show that disruptions to education during the COVID-19 pandemic led to a fivepercentage point decline in third grade reading proficiency. Research shows that placing books and resources directly into the homes of families helps combat learning loss.

improvements made with each speech.

But most of my students don't want to know how they improved. They just want to know their grade.

I look back at my educational career and some of the classes where I struggled the most and the teachers who demanded the most from me are what I remember.

But I also remember what it meant to be recognized for an outstanding

performance in class with an assignment or exam. We all want that kind of recognition whether we admit it or not.
